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## PREFACE.

PHILATELISTS, as a rule, are patriotic souls. They collect the stamps of their own rather than of other countries. This is not all patriotism; it is partly due to the fact that in such countries as Germany, France and the United States-where specialism is rampant-proper specialist's calalogues are obtainable. It has often been remarked as a curious fact that comparatively few English philatelists devote themselves exclusively to the stamps of their own country. This is not really a curious fact at all. It is, in my opinion, fully explained by the fact that there has hitherto been no proper catalogue of English stamps.

The first move in this direction was made by Mr. H. L'Estrange Eiven, whose list of used English Adhesives was received with much favour. From this I gathered that "A Complete Catalogue of the Postal and Telegraph Adhesives of Great Britain" was very much wanted, and thus the present work was originated. Cordial thanks are due to Mr. F. A. Philbrick and Mr. Hastings E. Wright, for information on various points; also to Mr. Geo. C. Warden, jr., and J. H. Anheisser for kind assistance. At an early stage in the preparation of the book, I discovered that the work-especially the pricing-would be too much for one dealer. I therefore approached Mr. Walter Murley, of Tottenham, who at once responded most heartily to my proposals. It is chicfly due to his co-operation that the prices are given with such completeness. Although, with the able assistance of Mr. Morley, I have revised the work with scrupulous care, sparing no care to make dates and quotations as correct as possible, I am quite aware that it is still full of mistakes, which, however, I hope to eliminate in a future edition, and to this end I would esteen it a great favour if philatelists would communicate with me on the subject.

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## INTRODUCTION TO PRICES.

In attempting to price every variety of English Stamps,

## Introduction.

 used or unused, we are quite aware that we have started on a somewhat difficult task. We had no price list to go by, only actual experience, and, perhaps, auction reports; the latter, however, are somewhat unreliable for this reason: that prices realised by auction do not always represent the proper market value. We have very carefully revised every quotation, and at the moment of publication are perfectly willing to sell at the prices mentioned, as far as we possess the stamps. Should it in the course of time be found necessary to either raise or lower any of the rates, we reserve to oursel ves the right of so doing. We are quite aware that in many cases it is mere guess-work to name any price, as in the case of imperforate stamps, used or unused, and also those varieties of wrich only one or two copies are known. If we have in such cases inserted a price, we have done it with a desire to make the catalogue as complete as possible, and to give an idea of what these rarities have fetched. It will always be difficult to price these stamps correctly; they will never reach their proper value, for the very reason of their scarcity.
## Unused

Stamps.

THE first column represents the unused stamps. Prices in this column are meant for fair copies with gum. course, worth more, in some cases considerably so ; whereas, on the other hand, copies without gum are worth from 15 to) $20 \%$ less than list price. We believe, however, that if proper attention is once paid to unused English Stamps, prices will go up by leaps and bounds, owing to the great scarcity of some of the plate numbers.

## Postmarks.

It will surprise many to find that we have attempted hitherto been paid to the varictics of postmarks, not only of English Stamps, but of other countries also. The German Collector has always been very much alive to these varieties on his own stamps, and as it forms a most interesting subject, some of the rare postmarks of German Stamps having fetched very high prices indeed.

In searching for some special postmarks on English Stamps, the Collector will be surprised to find how extremely rare some of the varieties are. For instance, a red Maltese Cross on the common id. red impertorate, is a stamp which is very rarely met with. One can search through thonsands of copies withont finding a single specimen. The study of the postmarks on English Stamps is in its infancy, and it is quite likely that the proportion of prices upon which we have
decided in the present work, will be found wrong by experience. There may also be varieties other than catalogued, but we sincerely hope that every Collector who discovers new varieties, will communicate them to the publishers. We are desirous to make this work quite complete, but it is obviously impossible that completeness can be attained at the start.

## Inverted

 We have also priced inverted watermarks. It is a strange fact that inverted watermarks in EnglishWatermarks. Stamps are very rare, much rarer in fact than in any other country. This is chiefly due to the great care the Governament Contractors have to take when printing the stamps, and also to the supervision of Somerset House, in not letting any sheets out, unless approved by them. Of course an inverted sheet would now and then slip through, but it is a fact that there are quite a number of plate numbers, which are not known to exist with inverted watermark. We may be wrong with our prices, they may be worth much more, but collectors have hitherto paid very little attention to inverted watermarks, and we did not consider ourselves justified in raising these prices above to-day's market value.

Specimen
Stamps.
"Specimen" Stamps have not as yet been much collected by English Collectors. There has heen a certain sight of the fact that a Specimen Stamp is really the representative copy of a Stamp, and for this reason, sheets surcharged with " Specimen," were as rule those which were printed first ; they must therefore be printed in the proper shade, on the proper paper and the design must show as clearly as it is possible. Unused copies of course also represent the respective stamps, but such stamp may be second, third, or even a later print, and therefore differ in some degree from the original approved issue. Then again, fine unused copies of many stamps are extremely rare, and in every case where an unused copy is nearly unattainable, a "Specimen" copy will take its place before a used one. Collectors although not very much in favour of Specimen Stamps, have lately been obliged to pay some attention to them, and for this reason we thought it necessary to give prices, where possible.

## Prices of these, are as nearly correct as it was possible <br> Used Stamps. to make them. Some quotations will be a revelation to

 many, and we are quite a ware that we shall have to encounter a great deal of opposition with some rates, but we may mention that every price has been carefully considered and revised, and we feel confident, that even in those cases where some of our quotations will not coincide with those of other Dealers, time will prove that we are right. The prices are meant for fair used copies, but owing to thefact that English Stamps, especially of the period from $1865-85$, have been heavily postmarked, specially fine lightly-postmarked copies, will be worth up to $25 \%$ more than catalogue prices. Any Dealer is aware that out of 50 average copies, especially 4 d . and 6 d . values, only one really lightly postmarked copy is to be fouud.

## Colonial

Postmarks.

Very few Collectors are aware that British Stamps were used in the Colonies before the special issues of the various Dependencies. Here we may say that no attention whatever has been paid to these issues, and we maintain that a British Stamp used, say, in Antigua or Valparaiso, is really not a British Stamp, but an Antiguan or Peruvian Stamp. It is utterly immaterial whether the design happens to coincide with those in use in the British Islands; it might just as well have been a piece of paper with the respective postmark. The latter, in such a case, gives the stamp a rew character and transfers it into a stamp belonging to the country where it is used. We have given a list as complete as it was possible to make of the various postmarks used in the Colonies, but we are sorry to say that we must confess that this is the most incomplete part of our cataloguc. We propose to give a much wider scope in the next edition, and to give particulars of all the various English Stamps used in the Colonies, thus making a catalogue of its own. When we included this incomplete list we did it for the purpose of drawing collectors' attention to these colonial postmarks and to induce them to separate them from their collection proper. We are, of course, unable to price these varieties, but we propose to do so in the next edition.

## C. VARIOUS OBLITERATIONS OF 1844.

Different obliterations were used in England, Scotland and Ireland; they consisted, roughly speaking, of the Office number surrounded by straight lines. The shape of the English postmark was an ellipse. In the Scotch all lines were parallel, but the shape varied greatly. (London and Edinburgh had special cancellations). The Irish postmark was diamond shape.

## THE EMBOSSED SERIES.

The stamps of this series are octagonal in shape. The sixpenny and shilling values were printed in sheets of twenty, the tenpenny in sheets of twenty-four. Each stamp being struck separately, they may be found over-lapping. The die numbers are found tmbossed at the base of bust, either following or preceding the initials W. W. (of Wm. Wyon, the engraver). "The tenpenny and one shilling were printed on unwatermarked "Dickinson paper," containing two silk threads (about $1^{4}$ or inch apart) arranged vertically. The sixpence was printed on paper watermarked "V.R." and is without silk thread. The first issue was printed on thick yellowsh paper, the later ones on thinnish white paper. Since about 1856. date plugs were inserted into the dies, which were then used for stamping envelopes and telegraph forms.

## BRITISH POST OFFICES IN FOREICN COUNTRIES.

Owing to the insecurity of some native Post-offices, Foreign Governments have been permitted to establish Post-offices for the carriage of homeward-bound mails, and in some cases special stamps were issued. In others, British stamps could be used which were obliterated with distinctive postmarks, of which the following is a fairly complete list :-

## GENERAL NOTES ON ENGLISH STAMPS.

> Specimen

It has been the custom of the General Post Office to apprise Postmasters of a New Issue by means of a Stamps. special circular announcing such Issue, and bearing one or more coples of the Stamps referred to. Such Stamps have been surcharged with the word "specimen" in various types. This surcharge is sometimes printed vertically, but as a rule, the overprint is horizontal. The colour is black with the exception of the 6 d . and $\mathrm{I} /$ - of the embossed series, in which case it is also in red.

The G.P.O. ceased to send out "Specimen" Stamps about 1856. The Authorities of the I.R. Dept., however, do so from time to time; but the surcharge is of different type, i.e., much thinner than those sent out by the G.P.O., which was invariably in heary block letters.

Statistics.
It may perhaps be news to many Philatelists to learn that from May 1840 , to December 31st, 1879 , no less than $23,4 \mathrm{r} 5,024,090$ Postage Stamps were issued to the Public, who paid for them $£$ Iro million sterling. Of this immense number, $88 \%$ were rd. Stamps and $7 \%$ or about $16,000,000 \frac{1}{2} d$. Stamps. We extract this tit-bit of statistical information from "The Life of Sir Rowland Hill."

Proofs.
Proofs are trial printings made for official approval, or in order to show off a new design. They are found both unused and with trial obliterations, and either perforated or unperforated.

 and Taxes, who, after satisfying themselves that the sheet was faultless, endorsed it; the date upon which this was done is called the "Date of Approval." The sheets thus approved are preserved to this day at Somerset House. Together with this sheet, five or six others were printed, so that in case the first should meet with an accident there might be another ready to take its place, but the extra five being very rarely required for this purpose, usually found their way, after being perforated, into the Post Offices, and were thus issued to the Public. Indeed, this practice frequently led to the curious circumstance of Stamps being sold to the public which were printed from plates never actually "put to press." "The following is a list of Stamps of which there was no general issue, but of which a fev-probably four or five-sheets were eventually allowed to pass into stock and thence to the public. Specimens of those which are marked with an asterisk -*-have already been discovered :-

## Reprints.

The only official Reprint known is the one made by Royal command in 1864 . For this purpose an impression was taken from the retouch plate on paper, showing the large crown of 1855 reversed. Other Reprints exist, made by Messrs. Perkins, Bacon and Co. in 1867 for the Paris Exhibition of that year. Two sheets of the Id. and one sheet of the 2d. were printed. For the id. plate 103 was used, one impression being in carmine, for the other one (" the millioneth impression"), the colour selected was black. Both sheets were printed on soft, thick, unwatermarked card. The 2 d . sheet was printed from plate 9 , the colour being blue and the card being the same as that used for the one penny.

## Forgeries.

The most dangerous forgery known is that of the V.R. Different "makes "exist, and the most famous one is that which gained for its perpetrator three years' penal servitude. (Dr. Assmus's trial in 1892). An ordinary black Stamp was taken, the maltese crosses in the upper corners, skilfully removed and replaced by the letters "V.P." Another somewhat recent "fake" is the 4 d . carmine, large garter, on so-called azure safety paper. As a matter of fact, however, this Stamp has never been issued on such paper, and all alleged copies met with are chemically changed. A somewhat interesting forgery has recently been unearthed. A copy of the $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. red of 1870 was shown to have plate 12 on one side and plate 13 on the other. The former figure was cleverly altered from the 13.

Some very doubtful specimens exist of the Archer roulette, but owing to the very irregular condition of the genuine roulette it is somewhat difficult to be quite sure about any specimen.

## Perforations. <br> Perforated stamps first came into general use in 1854. Mr. Henry Archer, the inventor of the perforating

 machine experimented, at the three official trials of his contrivance, on about 5000 sheets. A few of these he bought and presented to friends, the remainder, with one or two exceptions, were destroyed; those which escaped were sent to country Post Offices. Mr. Archer, as is well known, sold his machine to the British Government for $£ 4,000$. Other inventors were not slow to improve upon it. Changes were introduced in quick succession, and the perforating machine of to-day bears very little resemblance to the original design.Several sheets of stamps being perforated at one and the same time, it sometimes occurred that the bottom sheet would be imperfectly punctured. Stamps torn from such sheets would be called "roughly perforated;" on the other hand, the top sheet would appear to be well-perforated, and in some cases so much so, that the "teeth" would almost appear like points. Used specimens of the Id. and 2d. of the Line Engraved Series in this condition should be worth from $1 /$ to $2 / 6$ each.

## Unofficial

Roulettes.

The id. red-brown of 1844 is known to exist with a private roulette, undoubted and used copies or piece of letter should be, worth from $30 /-$ to $£ 2$.

## Obliterations.

It were a work of supererogation to inform philatelists that stamps were first used for the prepayment of postage in 1840 . Mail matter going out of the country did not come within the scope of the new system until four years later, up to which time it was necessary to pay the postage of foreign letters in cash. From 1844 to 1850 , both Inland and Foreign letters could be prepaid by either stamps or money at the will of the sender; but after the later year it was made compulsory to use stamps for the prepayment of all mail matter irrespective of destination.

Abour 1854 to 1856 , English stamps were sent to the various Colonial offices, where they were used uritil the special issues for such Colonies were introduced. British stamps also were-and are still-sent to the British Post-offices in the Levant (?) though of late years some of them have been surcharged with the equivalent of value in Turkish currency. Letters posted on British ships are also prepaid by the stamps of the Mother country. Hence envelopes may be found bearing the postmarks or obliterations of many ports which had a regular mail service with Great Britain. A special but unfortunately incomplete list will be found on another page.

Owing to a difficulty in illustrating the various postmarks used in the United Kingdom, we have decided not to give more than a general list of the most important ones.

The above are the most notable varieties; many others are to be found, but we do not think it advisable to classify them at present. We have also left out the various registrations and parcel post obliterations, as the material on hand does not appear to us to be sufficient to give a complete list. We may mention that the old registration obliteration, " R " above official number within parallel lines may be found in black, red or blue, and also that recently, parcel post obliterations are mostly done with an indiarubber stamp and aniline ink. Newspaper cancellations may be distinguished by the letters N.P.B. (Newspaper and Book-post).

It may be noticed as a general rule that English obliterations —and for that matter Colonials also-can be distinguished by the curved lines at each end of the official numbers; Scotch obliterations only consist of straight lines, mostly parallel, in the shape of a square or oblong, with official number in centre; whilst the Irish obliterations are diamond shape.

## IV. LOCAL OBLITERATIONS.

I. Name only; 1854 to 1858 .

THis obliteration was only intended for local letters, but it would sometimes happen that it was used for letters going outside the town boundary. Two varieties exist, one with name of street in one line, either with or without border, or name of street in two lines, with or without border. Of the latter variety Queen Street seems to be the one mostly met witl.

Some firms had permission to have their names

Firms'
Initials. printed on the back of Stamps before the latter were gummed. Various plates of the $\frac{1}{2} d$. Id., I $\frac{1}{2} d$. red and 2d. blue are obtainable, worth about I/- to $2 / 6$ each, used. In later years the Post Office permitted private firms to perforate stamps with their initials as a preventive against theft.

## 0xford

Union Society.
This Society was in the habit of vertically surcharging in red all stamps used by them with O.U.S. in sma!l capitals with a small wavy line on each side. This surcharge is found on the issues of 1857 and 1864 . (various plates) and should be worth from $1 /$ to $2 / 6$ each. In the 1864 series it also exists on the back of the stamp.

Watermarks.
Small Crown (i840). Various minor varieties exist of this watermark; in the most notable one the wire
 used for the construction of the first supply was thicker than that used later on, hence the id. black appears to be printed on a paper with a much clearer wmk. than the later issues.


Large Crown. This appeared first in July, 1855 , while the New Crown came into use on the ist January, 1880.
"V.R." in capital block letters, used only for the 6d. octagonal of 1854 . It may be more often found inverted or reversed than in its right position, in fact, in the latter state it is somewhat scarce.

Garter. Of this watermark there exist five varieties. The so-called small garter was first used in 1855 , the medium garter in 1856 , and the large garter in 1857 . Very few collectors have been able to distinguish between the medium and large garter owing to their great similarity. We think, however, that the annexed illustration will make the difference better apparent than any letter-press could do. The chief difference is, that the band in the medium garter is wider than in the large garter.

The garter of 1867 is precisely similar to the one of 1857, only it is inverted, i.e., with buckle at top. (All other garters have the buckle at bottom). The garter of 1873 is again similar to the one of 1857 , but the wire used for its manufacture was much thicker.

Heraldic Flowers (emblems). These consists of two roses at top, thistle and shamrock at bottom; the two upper flowers may be found in a great variety of positions, occasionally one of them is found inverted, sometimes, however, both are in this condition.

The following varieties therefore might exist :-
Var. I.-Both upper flowers inverted. (Three petals at top instead of two).
Var. 2.-Upper right hand flower alone inverted.
Var. 3.-Upper left hand flower alone inverted.
Spray of Rose. This watermark was in use from i867 to 1880 , it may be found inverted and reversed. A variety exists without the circle in the centre of the rose.


Maltese Cross, or "Croix patée." This was in use from Sept. of 1867 to 1883 .
"Halfpenny." This watermark was only used for the $\frac{1}{2} d$. of 1870, and extended over three stamps in script letters.

Anchor. Two varieties are known, the small anchor, used for the $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. lilac-rose, and the large anchor employed for stamps of high denominations in 1883 .


OrB, also known as "globe." Only used for the $2 \frac{1}{2} d$. lilac-rose of 1876 , and also in error for the oblong $£ \mathrm{I}$ brown in 1888 and Id. Ireland Revenue.

Shamrock. Paper with this watermarli was solely used for telegraph stamps of the values of $\frac{1}{2 d}$., id., $£$ I and $£ 5$.

Most of the above watermarks may be found inverted, but owing to the great care exercised by the Government printers, are extremely scarce, in fact as yet unknown in a good many varieties of plate numbers.
