Creasurer's Report.

MR. PRESIDENT AND FELLOW-MEMBERS:

For the sixth time I come before you to give an accounting of the funds you have entrusted to my care, and take pleasure in reporting a steady increase in value. Compared item by item, you will find, with few exceptions, a uniform gain. We commenced the year with (omitting cents) \$183 in bank. We now have \$329. Dues in 1900 amounted to \$1,010. This year I have received \$1,097. Entrance fees, \$170, against \$100. Interest, \$60, against \$5 the previous year.

The only unsatisfactory feature is in the matter of house receipts, which have decreased nearly one hundred dollars, owing to the small attendance.

The Club is recognized throughout the civilized world and while members and visitors from afar are certain of a hearty welcome, the city members do not frequent the building as its merits demand.

The sleeping rooms have been occupied the greater part of the year and one member practically makes his home in the house.

The assembly room should never be without an occupant, and I strongly recommend that each governor in turn should be required to spend an evening in the building. This would insure company at all times, at the expense of one evening in nine to each gentleman intrusted with the management of the establishment.
