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## South הfrican Postcards, 8 c .



IHE events of the last six years have caused greater attention to be paid to the stamps of South Africa, as also to the postcards and envelopes used there. More especially is this the case with the Orange Free State issues, the postcards printed locally being very varied and in such small quantities that most are very scarce, and it is evident they were not made for sule to collectors, or they would be more plentiful. A brief description of types and main varieties in a specialised collection may be of interest.

The Nos. used are from the 1900 (last) catalogue of entires published by Strnley Gibhons, Ltd.


Bechuanaland has not been favoured with a type of its own, merely the Jritish or Cape Cards with overprints. The first were 1d. Cape cards with British Bechuanaland in black across the stimp in three different kinds of type, followed by British cards, on which the new name appenred across the letterpress heading in harge capitnls. Cape cards were again used with name above headlines and across stamp also; with the $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. cards for foreign use, the overprint of which is in small block letters on stamp, without and with a final stop, which last is very scarce. In 1894, the red li. Pinglish reply card was overprinted like previous brown one, and sinsle card was surcharged Thiree-haLFidence.

The British South Alrica Co began with Cape cards in 1892, having Mashonaland over the heading of $1 d$. and $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. cards and thi Id. reply, followed by an engraved card stamp with Arms of the Company ; replaced in 1897 by another having khoidesia for headlinw, and a new Arms stamp. In 1900 another design appeared, ulso a $\frac{1}{2} d$. card and letter-card.

Cape of Good Hope in 1878 had a framed card lithographed in

Capetown, with a poor copy of the engraved 1d. stamp all in red, of which some proofs in black have been seen. In 1882 a properly engraved oval 1d. stamp and card was issued, also a $\frac{1}{2} d$. in 1889, both being in red-brown, followed by a $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. (No. 4) in gray. In 1892 the $\frac{1}{2} d$ s. small card was changed to green, and large reply cards introduced in two values. The 1d. single card in 1894 was surcharged one-halfpenny in two lines, two curved lines barring out original value (No. 8), and in October the $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. (No. 9) had a new headline with Union Postale Universelle all in gray. In 1897, the external rate having been reduced, the $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. cards (9) were surcharged one penny, and three curved bars below (No. 11). Apparently some were so printed in gray like the stamp, and again overprinted in black for clearness, the first print usually showing as if letters were shaded. The older cards (4) were also used, having the U.P.U. line added in black at same time as a headline (No. 10). There are four distinct settings of this headline, used in different years to clear off old stocks returned from outlying offices; the original overprints are rather scarce with a faulty U , though priced by Gibbons instead of next line (No. 11) in error, as they had mo supply of them beyond specimens. There are some with stop alter "penny," but more without-also minor variations, as with the $\frac{1}{2} d$ on 1d. (No. 8). Another setting of the penny surcharge was in lighter capitals, with stop, and two thin lines below (No 12). The red 1 d. of 1898 (13) is found plain, with sepia views on back, and with six views in gray on front. There is also a large size $\frac{1}{2}$ d. with inlanj servicse as on the previous reply issue. One letter-cime type omly-1d. red on brownish gray with Queen's and King's heads. The King's bead is on current $\frac{1}{2} d ., 1 d$. , and reply cards.

Natal in 1885 commenced with small-size $\frac{1}{2} d$. brown and ill red (3) on huff-later printings of $\frac{1}{2} d$. were on pale-buff, as also the reply card (2). A large $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. card (4) was out in 1891, followed bu 1d. reply in the large size (5) ; and in 1893 the 11 $\frac{1}{2} d$ value (no lomen required) was utilised by barring out first word on stamp, so making it read "halfpenny." At the same time U.P.U. heading was aldul in new printings of the 1d.; but it is not generally known that at printing of the large ld. single card was in use in 1893 without inn U.P.U. line, not in catalogues. In 1900 the penny cards han :a series of five varieties of three (war) views on the back; also at letter-card, which is scarce with head of Queen, who died a finw months after. Envelopes, too, were then printed for the first time and stopped as they did not arrive until ifter her death. The ! 1d., and letter-cards now in use are with King's head. Certian
cards were printed in Ladysmith during its besiegement, but being unofficial and requiring adhesive stamps, have no philatelic interest -they were also reprinted afterwards with variations.

Orange Free State.-The cards of this state and colony are very interesting, and require more detailed information. With their hahiturl economy, the Boers had but one engraved card (with frame) in use for 13 years, its value being 1d., printed in light, full. and brownish orange tints, which, on reduction of internal rate to thl., was surcharged with that value in black by the London printers in 1891, and in 1897 they had $\frac{1}{2} d$. stamp in the original frame minted in red, and larger sizes for $\frac{1}{2} d$. and 1d. reply cards in usual IUP.U. colours without frame. In the intermediate years $\pi$ great rariety of type-set cards were issued with $\frac{1}{2}$ d. and 1 d . adhesives, and some with 2 d . and 3 d . stamps, which were overprinted $1 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. hecause there was no stamp endraved of that value. These were not "surcharfed" in the usual sense as a separate printing, though one-the rarest-had the provisional adhesive Id. on 3d. blue then in use, and another had $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. semarately printed in red on $2 d$. manve when on the card. The others with new values were all done in one printing of the card on which an adhesive had first been affixed in iop centre, each card singly. The type headline was set up with an lims block between Bhief and kankT, with address lines below, and in printing the Arms came across the $\frac{1}{2} d$ or $1 d$ adhesives, so wiving them a distinctive character if separated from the carcl, and when $1 \frac{1}{2} d$ eard was wanted for over-sea rate, the figures were set ill above the Arms so as to print on the 2d, or 3d, stamp that had heen first affixed for that purpose.

The first five catalogued for 1888 should be preceded by annther that was actually in use, though but one copy (dated Feh. 14s.9) is now known. Nos. 2 to ( 5 are scarce with set up frumes (wnmosed of 59 w's alternately reversed at topand bottom, and 37 on rach side, but this rarity has 57 w's only, and the Arms are not draned with flags as in all others. No. 8 appears to be the first th. value (no frame and smaller type), while waiting for the surcharged supply (7). In 1892 the next scarcest cards appeared with thl adhesive and the surcharged " 1 d ." above referred to, of which there are four varieties of the finely dotted lines; these are numlerad 9 and 11 by Gibhons, though evidently the same printings in mary detail but the adhesive stamp. The one given as No. 10, with
Kart, 31 mm . Iong," did not appear till following year, but one issued with blinisf katrt exactly as in No. 12, the last word amb stop measuring 29mm., which is not in cataloguc, though sold
later as $10 a$. The first $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. now came into use with "Orange Vrijstat" added, but no address lines; both 3d. and 2d. adhesives were utilised ( 12,13 ). Later in 1893, the $\frac{1}{2} d$. ( $G .10$ ) appeared, along with the $1 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. (14), having larger type for second line, the peculiarity of hoth these heing that the curl of B in BRIEF is broken or bent hack, and that KAART measures 31 mm . Up to this time all the Arms are with flags behind the shield, with the rare exception first above noted, numbered 1a on Reference List.

It may be as well to refer here to the four types of Arms used. the clearest differences being in the relative positions of the wardon shafts and tailpiece above the word immigratie. That real first we call No. 1 Arms has the ends of shafts over first $M$, and tail outside final E with a stop. No. 2 has short dumpy shafts over second 3 . tail over second I, the shading lines on side of wagon are horizontal in this type only. No. 3 is similar, but side shading is vertical, shafts hetween the two M's, and tail over space between I and E. No. 4 has long shafts nearly up to i, no tail to speak of, hut the lion looks ver fierce and more like a short-horned bull, with his curly tail more uprisht. Nos. 2 and 3 are with flags, 1 and 4 with plain shield outline. The script "Aan" at berinning of first line is mostly like the cansital A we write with curled centrepiece, but in the card last describod, and in next one it has a straight coross-har, the $T$ of $T e$ in last linn being under $n$ of $A n m$; in earlier issues the last line is much shorter

The later issues from 1894, without the flags, have some minor details differing from above, the first $\frac{1}{2} d$. (G. 15) being of same type heading as last described, but the upright of $T$ 'e is without the tow loop. A new setting of this has the broken ir remlaced, and the letters IrT at end are very close, making hut 30 mm . for Kaart. Boll these have the hull-lion type of Arms, the last printing being used too with a $2 d$. stamp, which was surcharged with large $1 \frac{1}{2} d$ in mal The next setting of top line in 1895 is closer and shorter, and is found both with and without " $\frac{1}{2} d$ " minted over the Arms on thu" $\frac{1}{2} d$. stamp, the last rule-line with 'Ie is now of same length in others, the type of seript being similar to early issues. In 1896 the ndhesive was the $2 d$. mauve again, with narrow $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. printed in black (instead of separately in red), and the $\frac{1}{2} d$. stamp was light orange in colour in 1897, a later minting on it had No. 4 Arms and foot of $\%$ broken off. A further printing of $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. on 2 d . has wider black figures, the stop after $d$ having fallen out during minting, the lous letter d alone can be found high up or low down, also slantime outwards. Ahout this time, the and of 1897 , the $\frac{3}{2} d$. engraved type in rose, and the new reply cards, came into use.

N.B.-There are a few minor varicties not listed, through breaks in rule lines or missing dots, or bad printing.
There have been unusual overprintings or "surcharges" reported, and some decided "fakes" about the year 1900. One is described on a Transvaal nostcard, dated June, 1896, as an inverted $1 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. black on 2 d ., of which six copies were offered. If this means that " $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. ." alone was inverted, I douht its genuineness, as the whole of the black printing was done at one operation (already. described), and we cannot credit a compositor with the folly of setting the whole three figures and dupside down. Another novelt in the possession of my friend Mr. Skipton is "1d." surcharged on $\frac{1}{2} d$. stamp, about which be writes: "I have two different lots; one with Kaart $24 \frac{1}{6} \mathrm{~mm}$. (No. 8), of which there are three different sizes of the 1d.; also with Kairt 29 mm ., and Aan with straight bar. Thesu all came from Rilpath." If genuine, these could only be essays or sughestions for a supply of provisionals of this value, as in No, 10 of above list. Mr. Ridpath had also other strange overprints in his stock, one being a $\frac{1}{2} d$. curd for Mashonaland on Cape cards of 189 . all of which came apparently from a Johannesburg printer.

In 1900, when the British troops had seized Pretoria, the postcards found there of the engraved type were overmrinted, with V.R.I. in various arrangements of type, and a few also of the old type-set ones that were already overprinted $1 \frac{1}{2} d$, but as the over-sea rate was quickly fixerl at ld. there are not many of these to bre found, either used or unused.

The main types are Roman V.R.I., early in 1900, and sanserif or block type from .July of that year, each having subdivisions in after printings. All the engraved cards being used up, recourse wan had in 1901 to a supply from the Cape, consisting of the remains of the old surchanked 1 d . on $1 \frac{1}{d}$ d. cards, in all their varieties, and somb new settings of the U.P.U. headline in back. These had olram, miver codony either over or under Cape of Good Hope line, whid was harred out-there are at least eight varieties of settings, inchat. ing two sizes of O.R.C. ahove the ond: PIBNY surchamed on stamp. The ld. rejly card of Cape was also requisitioned, and Orange Riven Colony printed on the Queen's hearl, in addition to the headline in which there were two or thee settings. In 1903 ath engraved semin
appeared of $\frac{1}{2} d$. and 1 d . values, with reply cards having the King's husd on.

Transvaal issues, as "Zuid Afrik Republiek," are few and simple. In 1855 , a 1d. card was engraved with stamp of rectangular shape, having Arms in central circle. Nine years later the stamp, was octagonal, but the wagon had shafts, and was corrected to a pole on next printing, which is rather scarce. In 1896 a new series appeared of $\frac{1}{8} \mathrm{~d}$. and reply card in green, the 1d and reply, having the U.P.U. heading, and all in red but the value in green.

In August, 1900, on arrival of British troops at Pretoria, a type-set 1d. card was set up at Machadodorp, and many found their way used to Europe, but they are scarce. The British seized the old cards which were overprinted with V.R.I., of which no real varieties are known. The Colonial type was then used with head of King, $\frac{1}{2} d$. on large white card, also reply, 1d. and reply on buft, along with a letter card on blue. The 4d. registration envelopes were also overprinted V.R.I., and later E.R.I.

Zululand.-The British $\frac{1}{2} d$. (small) and reply cards on thick white were overprinted for use in this possession, both B . and C . varieties of stamp being found, and three combinations on replies. Also the 1d. red on buff and reply were similarly treated.
