## THIRD EIITTION.

## GANADA.

(a)CCUPYING the northern part of the continent of America, is a country which is destined some day to become one of the most populous and prosperous countries on the face of the globe. It extends from the Atlantic Ocean on the east to the Pacific on the west, and reaches from the mighty St. Lawrence, and the chain of great lakes, on the south, to the Arctic ocean on the north. This immense tract of land contains about $3,500,000$ square miles, and is equal in size to the whole of Europe. The soil is tery fertile, and millions of acres are yet uncullivated; it is also rich in minerals and timber, and the rivers, lakes and forests abound with fish and game. The population is $6,000,000$ and they are a hardy, industrious and prosperous peopie. In support of this statement we have only to look at the immense progress they have made durirg the last few years, and at the gigantic public wotks they have undertaken and carried to a successful issue, chief of which is the Canarlian Pacific Railway, a great highway extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific, a distance of over 3,000 miles, binding logether with an iron bund the several provinces.

The Government holds out many inducements to intending sethers, giving them free grants of land, and assisting in many other ways. It
has a first-class Postal System, and the Money-order and Savings Bank Branch is said to be the most complete in the world.

To most of our readers the Postage Stamps of this country will be of more interest than the people, or anything else connected with it. Being a British colony, for many years the Post Office Department was controlled by the Post Master General ol Great Britain. But, on April rst, 1851, the Government of Canada assumed control of its own postal affairs and postage stamps which had been previously been prepared, were issued to the public at once. They were of three demoninations, 3 pence, 6 pence, and 12 pence, and were engraved and printed in New York. They may be described as follows :--The 3 pence is oblong in shape, and has in the centre a beaver surmounted by a crown, and the letters "V.R." Around this in an oval horizontal frame is the inscription in capital letters of "Canada Postage," "Three pence," and in each corner the figure " 3 ." Color, red and red brown. The 6 prence has the picture of the Prince Consort, in perpendicular oblong frame, with the inscription "Canada Postage" above "Six Pence" below, and a figure " 6 " in each corner. Color, purple and black lilac. The 12 pence is a very rare stamp, and was evidently an error on the part of the designer, as stamps representing the same value for other countries are issued as "One Shilling" and not " i2 Pence." This stamp bears a crowned head of Queen Victoria, facing to left, enclosed in a perpendicular oval frame, "Canada Packet Pustage," at top, "Twelve Pence" at bottom, value in figures at each corner; color, black, In 1855 another stamp was issued, viz., the 10 pence. It was ornamented with the head of Jacques Cartier, facing to right, in perpendicular oval frame, "Canada Postage," above, "Ten Pence" below, "8d. stg," in both upper corners, " torl. cy," in looth lower corners, color, deep Blue.

In 1857 two other stamps were issued viz., the half penny, and seven pence half-penny. The half-penny has head of Queen Victoria to left in oval frame, "Canada Postage " above, " One Half Penny" below ; color. pink. The $71 / 2$ pence bears a picture of Queen Victoria similar to that on the 12 pence, in oval frame, "Canada l'acket Postage " above, "Six rence, Sterling" below; " 6 d stg," in the upper and lower left hand corners ; " $7 \frac{1}{2}$ d cy," in the upper and lower right hand corners ; color, green. The above stamps were all unperforated.

In 1858 the half-penny, 3 pence, and the 6 pence were issued, perforated.

In 1959, owning to the changing of the currency from f. S. D. to $\$$ and cts., a new set of stamps was issued, consisting of five values, the designs of these stamps being the same as theprevious issue, the value of each being expressed in cents. The I cent same design as the half-penny, the 5 cents same as 3 pence, the to cent same as 6 pence, the $121 / 2$ cent same as $71 / 2$ penny, and 17 cent same as the 10 pence. All were perforated.

In 1864 a two cent stamp was issued, bearing head of Victoria to left, in oval frame, "Canada Postage" above, "Two Cents" leelow, and a ligure " 2 " in each corner. In 1867 the Dominion of Canada was formed, and in 1868 a new set of stamps was issued, of the following denominations, they all, with one exception, leing of similar design, though of different denominations: $1 / 2$ cent, black; i cent, brown red; 2 cent, green; 3 cent, red; 6 cent, brown; $121 / 2$ cent, blue; and 15 cent, violet, and may be described as follows:-Head of Queen Victoria to right, in circle; "Canada Postage" above, value in figures and letters at bottmm.

In 1869-70 another set of stamps was issued of same designs as previous isjue but somewhat smaller in size, the denominations being the same, with the addition of a ten cent, pink.

In 1875 three denominations of Registered stamps were issued, two cent orange; 5 cent, green; and 8 cent; blue. They were oblung in shapre, having value printed in letters across each end ; the value in figures, in both upper corners and across the face of the stamp in various sized type the words "Canada Registered Letter Stamp." In this year was also issued a 5 cent stamp, color olive-green, design similar to the issue of 1868.

In 1879 the stamp was issued called "Officially Sealed," it was used $i^{n}$ the Dead Letter Office at Ottawa only, was brown in color, and hal the following insaription printed in two curved and one straight line across it, "Post Office, Canada, Officially Sealed, Dead Letter Office."

Stamperl Enve'opes were first issued in $\mathbf{8 6 0}$ and were of two denominations, viz : 5 cents and to cents. The color of the 5 cent stamp was vermilion and that of the 10 cent chocolate. They were printed on laid paper of good quality which was watermarked with lines running diag-
onally from left to right, and these lines were crossed by the letters in large capitals "Ca" and below this "P. O. D." Both denominations were the same size, $31 / 4 \times 5 \frac{1 / 2}{2}$. Very few of these were used, the public not appreciating their convenience; and even to-day very few stanped envelopes are used in Canada.

1877 two other values were issued viz:, I cent, blue, and 3 cent, red. They were printed on laid paper, watermarked with diagonal lines. The 1 cent was $3 \times 5 \frac{1}{2}$; there being only one size of this denomination. There were two sizes of the 3 cent, known as No. 1 and $2 ;$ No. 1 has the same size as the 1 cent viz: $3 \times 51 / 2$. No. 2 , a little larger, its size be ing $33 / 8 \times 5 / 8$.

Newspaper wrappers were first issued in 1875 and like the envelopes, there were very few of them used. They are all printed on sheets of paper $47 / 8 \times 10 / / 4$, and frum four different dies and on a number of varieties and shades of paper, a very complete list of which will be found further on with correct dates attached. For convenience we will numleer the dies $1,2,3$ and 4.

Die 1 was used frotn 1875 to 1882 , dic 2 from 1882 to 1887 , and die 3 from 1887 to 1892, die 4 is in use at present.

Postal cards were first issued in 1877 . They were printed on heavy paper, $3 \times 43 / 4$, and were of two values, I cent, blue, for domestic use, and 2 cent, green, for use to the United Kingrlom. The 1 cent hlue may lee descrited as follows:-Head of Queen to right in eircle surrounded by a fancy frame with the words "One Cent" below; to the left of this and reaching across the top of the card in capital letters is "Canada. lost Card," and below this in small type "The address only to be written on this side," and below this on the left hand side the word "To" which is intended to be followed by the address, for which purpose there are three ruled lines. The above is contained in an ornamented frame enclosing a space $21 / 4 \times 4$.

The 2 cent, green, is alrout the same as the I cent, except that it has the words "Canada l'ost Card" in a curved line and in addition below it the words "To United Kingdom." They were engraved ly the British American Bank Note Co. of Montreal. Some of the 1 cent, blue, have "British American Bank Note Co., Montreal and Ottawa," on them. The reason Ottawa was adiled was that owing to a tire in the
above mentioned company's establishment, the printing of said carts was done at Ottawa.

In 1881 a new 2 cent card for foreign use was issued, the use of such cards having been authorized by the I'ostal Union Treaty. The design was similar to the " United Kingcom" card and the same color viz., green.

In 1883, two new varieties of cards were issued, they being a little larger than the former issues, $3 \times 5 \frac{1 / 4}{4}$. The design of the stamp was same as die 2, of the wrappers in use al the time. There was no border, simply a plain carll with the same inscription, omitting the word "orily" from the second line. The words "Canada l'ost Card" were on a curved scroll. The one cent was light blue, and the two cent reply was black.

In 1885 the two cent reply was issued in error, with the stamp in the upper left hand corner instead of the upper right hand corner. They are quite scarce as the Government stopped the issue and only a few were put in circulation.

In 1887 two new cards were issued of the same design as the previous is sue having the stamp same as die 3 of the wrappers. They were one cent, blue, and 2 cent reply, black. In 1888 the two cent reply was changed to a very dark shade of green.

In 1892 a new I cent card similar to die 4 of the wrapper was issued,
Many errors in printing have occured such as having been printed twice on the same card, \&c. They are prized by collectors as odelities.

## CANADA BILL STAMPS

Bill Stamps were first issued in 1864 and were used continuously from that date till 1882 when the Act authorizing the collection of this tax was repealed. There were three different issues during this time. The first issue was in 1864. These stamps were all of similar design, nearly
square, with the head of the Queen to the left in a perpendicular oval at top of same " Bill Stamp," below "Canada;" in the upper corners the value in figures, and across the bottom the value in words; color, blue.

We have seen nearly every value of this issue unperforated, but have ascertained that the reason of this was that an occasional sheet was unintentionally not perforated, and, therefore, unperforated spec:mens may be collected as oddities. The one, two or three dollars were somewhat larger than the lower values.

The second issue took place in 1865 and may be described as follows: The $1,2,3,4,5,6,7,8$ and 9 cent were scarlet colored, head of the Queen to left in perpendicular oval; across the top of stamp in two slightly curved lines the words "Canada Bill Stamp," across the bottom the value in words, and just above this, at either side, the value in figures.

The 10, 20, 30, 40 and 50 cents were blue, head of Queen to left in octagonal frame, valuc in upper corners, in figures; "Bill Stamp," above in curved line; "Canada," and value in words in two lines across the bottom. The one dollar has head ofQueen to left in a circle with the words " Bill Stann," above and "Canada," below ; the value in figures in upper corners, and across the top between value in figures "One" and across the botton "One Dollar." The two and three dollars were of similar design. We have seen several of the values of this issue singly and in pairs unperforated but as they were always unused we believe them to be proofs.

The third issue occurred in 1869 . The $r, 2,3,4,5,6,7,8$ and 9 cent were of similar design, but of various colors, and may be described as follows:-head and shoulders of Queen with widow's cap and chin resting on right hand, in frame having three rectangular sides, the top being slightly curved; the word "Canada" alove and "Bill Stamp" below, value in figures in both upper corners and in words across the bottom.

The 10, 20, 30, 40 and 50 cents were blue, with bust of Queen in same position as in lower values, enclosed in a circle. Above circle the words, "Canada Bill Stamp," below circle at either side the value in figures and across the buttom value in words. The one dollar has bust of Queen same as the other values of this issue, enclosed in a circle. Within the circle at the top " Canada," and at the lottom "Bill Stamp." In the centre at the top the word "dollar," and on both sides of it the " $\$ \mathrm{I}$ " in figures, and across the bottom the value in words.

The Two and Three dollars were of similar design. We have seen the one dollar of this issue unperforated, but as it was also unused and ungummed we consider it simply a proof.

## SUPREME COURT STAMPS.

These stamps I believe are the least known of all the Revenue Stamps of Canada.

In 1876 the inspection of Weights and Measures and Gas Meters as well as the regular duties of the above Court were placed underits control and during the same year three sets of stamps were issued for the purpose of collecting the revenues from these Departments. These stamps are divided into !hree classes viz: Supreme Court Stamps proper, Gas Inspection, and Weights and Measures Stamps. The Supreme Court Stamps proper may be described as follows: length, three inches, breadth one and one-quarter inches, perforated; color, blue shaded, from very clark to light; acruss the top and bottom in an oblong frame is the value in figures; in the centre, but much nearer the top than bottom in a circle about an inch in diameter, is the Queen's head, crowned; at the top of the circle the word "Canada" and at the bottom "Law Stamp"; between the head and the value at the botom on a scroll is the registered number in red and just below this on a curved scroll, the value in words.

These stamps are fincly engraved and I consider them the most leeautiful stamps ever issued by the Canadian Government.

There are six values, 10 cent, 20 cent, 25 cent, 50 cent, $\$ 100$ and $\$ 5.00$. They are all of similar design.

Gas Inspection Stamps are two inches long and three-fuarters of an inch wide and perforated. They may be described as follows :-color bright blue; across the centre is a blank space in which the registered number is printed in red. I may here add that in each value the registered number seems to be printed with different type of various sizes. Albove the registered number we have the word "Gas" and below "Inspection." The upper part of the stamp is occupied by a crown surmounted by an irregular frame; in the centre of the lower part is an oblong frame in which is the value in figures, surrounded by engraving similar to that seen on bank notes around the values. There are nine values, 5 cent, 25 cent, 50 cent, $\$ 1.00, \$ 1.50 . \$ 2.00, \$ 3.00, \$ 4.00$ and $\$ 10.00$.

They are all of same design and color. The Weights and Measures Stamps are the same size, perforation, and design as the Gas Inspection
with the following changes, viz: "Weights \& " alove the blank space in the centre and "Mensures" below. The registered number is sometimes printed in blue and sometimes in red ; it is also sometimes printed across the top of the stamp instead of in the centre; also various. sized type is used in printing these numbers.

There are eleven values and thirteen varieties made up as follows:I cent, 2 cent, 5 cent, 10 cent, 15 cent, 20 cent, 30 cent, 50 cent, $\$ \mathrm{~J} .00$, $\$ 1.50$ ard $\$ 2.00$ all in black, and I cent and 2 cent in blue.

The Supreme Court Stamps proper are used on writs, summonses, dec., issued by the Supreme Court

Gas Inspection stamps are used on certificates issued by the Inspector certifying to the correctness of the metres.

Weights and Measures stamps are used on certificates given by the Inspector certifying that the scales and measures he has tested are correct.

## BRITISH COLUMBIA

## AND <br> VANCOUVERS ISLAND

This Province issued its first postage stamp in 186I, and it may be described as follows: Head of Queen to left in centre of stamp, "British Columbia" at top, " Vancouvers Island " at hottom, looth in two lines; on left side "Postage," and on the right side in two lines, "Two Pence Hall Penny," color pink. In 1864 a three pence stamp was issued for use in British Columbia only. An oval scroll occupied the centre of the stamp, and on the scroll " British Columbia Postage, Three Pence," in the space enclosed by the seroll the Roman numeral $V$, surmounted ly a crown.

In 1868 sheets of stamps were printed from the above plate, and surcharged with values in cents.

In 1865 two stamps were issued for use in Vancouvers Island alone. They had head of the Queen to left in circle, "Vancouvers Island" above, and the value in words below.

## LAW S'IAMPS.

These Stamps were authorized by Act of Parliament in 1879, and were issted to the public during the latter part of the same year. They are oblong in shape, and designed as follows: Full length figure of Justice, holding aloft in her right hand a pair of balances, and in her left a sword pointing downward. They have the words "British Columbia Law Stamp," in two curved lines at top and the numeral value in figures in each lower corner, with the value in letters between.


## MANITOBA.

The only stamps issued by this Province is a series of Law Stamps. They are all of similar design being oblong in shape. In the centre a figure of Justice holding a pair of balancess in her uplifted hand. The 10, 20, 25 and 50 cent have the words "Nanitoba Law Stamp" in two curved lines at the top, and the value at the bottom.

The 1 and $\mathbf{2}$ dollars have the value across the top; below the value in a curved line "Manitoba," and across the bottom "Law Stamp."

Each value is surcharged by various letters, which signify for what particular purpose the stamp is used: "C. F.," Court Fees; "L. S., Law Society ; " J. F.," Judge's Fees; "B. F.," Bailiff's Fees.

In 1882, the border of these stamps was somewhat changed, and can be detected easily by observing the scollips down the sides; they are much smaller on the later issues, there being only six on a side of of the carly issues, and on the later nine. From the information at my disposal I think it is caused by re-engraving.

The Act authorizing the use of Law Stamps in this Province stated that stamps would lye issued for use on November 1, 1877; through some oversight the stamps did not arrive from the printer till November 14. During these 14 days a provisional issue was used, description as follows: Coat of Arms of Great Britian in black on yellow wove paper; at the top "C. F.," in black, and across the centre the denomination in large figures in red. Each stamp is initialed by the officer issuing the same. They are very rare.

## NEW BRUNSWICK

The first issue of Postage Stamps in this province took place in 1851. They were lozenge shaped, and showed a crown in centre with rose at top and bottom, a shamrock on the left and a thistle on the right. On the two upper sides "New Brunswick," on the two lower sides the value in wotds and "Postage." There were three values all of similar design.

- In 1860 a new set of stamps in decimal currency was issued. They were of various designs, all having the words "New Brunswick

Postage," and the value in words round an oval, enclosing on the one cent a frain of cars; the five cent, head of Queen; the ten cent, head of Queen; twelve-and a-half, a ship; seventeen cent, the l'since of Wales ; also the value in figures in each corner.

In 1861, the celebrated "Connell" Stamp was issued and it was in use, but one day, when it was withdrawn from use because it had Mr. Connell's purtrait on it.

In 1863 a two cent stamp was issued similar to the others.

## LAV ST'AMPS.

A set of Law Stamps, consisting of feur values, were issued for use in this province in 1884. They were printed in blue, on white paper. The design is a figure of Justice, holding a pair of balances in the right hand and a sword in the left. In 1887, the color of the 20
cent was changed to red. In April, 1890 , the color of two values was again changed.


## NEWFOUNDLAND.

Stamps were first issued in Newfoundland in 1857. There were nine values, of various colors and shapes. The I pence and 5 pence were square, with a crown in the centre, with roses (two) shamrock and thistle at each corner; on the left " $S t$. John"s," at top "New. found," on the right "land," at bottom "Postage " and value in worls; also, value in each corner in figures. The 2 pence, 6 pence, 6 pence half-penny, 8 pence and I shilling, all rectangular in shape, having a lunch of roses, shamrocks and thistle on a white ground in the centre. Above this "St. John's, Newfoundland," in a curved line ; "Postage" and value in words at bottom; value in figures in each corner. The 3 pence is triangular in shape, having a rose, shamrock and thistle in centre, "St. John's, Newfoundland," along the upper sides, and "Postage. Three Pence," across the bottom.

In 1866 , stamps with values in cents were issued. They were of various designs. A codfish on the 2 cent; a seal on the 5 cent; Prince of Wales on the 10 cent; head of the Queen to left on the 12 cent; a sailing vessel on the 13 cent , and a full-faced portrait of Queen $V i c t o r i a$ wearing a crown, on the 24 cent.

In i868 a I cent lifac was issued, having a portrait of the Prince of Wales, dressed as a Highland bay. In 1870 a 3 cent stamp was issued, having a portrait of Queen to right, in widow's cap, also a 6 cent stamp of similar design.

In 1887 a set of stamps of new design were issued, having head of Newfoundland dog on the half cent, and a sailing vessel on the 10 cent.

In 1889 stamped envelopes and newspaper wrappers were issued, and in 1890 the design of the 3 cent stamp was changed.

## NOVA SCOTIA

Postage Stamps were first issued in this province in 1851. Three values were issued during this year, 3 pence, 5 pence, and a shilling. They were lozenge-shaped, with a crown in the centre; alove the crown, a rose, at the bottom a mayflower, at the right a thistle and at the left a shamrock. Along the two upper sides "Nova Scotia," along the two lower ones the value in words and "I'ostage," and in each corner the value in figures.

In 1853 the the 1 penny was issued. The design was head of Queen in lozenge-shaped frame, "Nova" above, "Scotia" below. "Postage" on the right, the value in words on the left, and the value
in figures in each corner. In 1860 five new stamps were issued. The I, 2 and 5 cent had the head of Queen to the left in a circle, "Nowa Sentia" above, value in words below. The other stamps of this issue were similar in design, with a full face portrait of the Queen.

## BILL STAMPS.

Sometime after Confederation the government ascertained that certain persons were buying large quantities of Bill Stamps in Nova Scotia, and sending them to the other provinces, there being a difference of airout $21 / 3$ per cent. between the Canadian and Nova Scotia currency. Thus, you see, they were defrauding the revenue. To prevent this, an Order in Council was passed, ordering that all Bill Stamps for use in Nova Scotia should be surcharged with the letters "N.S." As the currency was soon corrected, these stamps were in use but a short time, and so are quite rare, especially the higher values.

The one, two, and three dollar are surcharged at the top, all the other values are surcbarged at the bottom.

## LAW STAMPS.

In 1879, an Act was passed by the Legislature of Nova Scotia authorizing the Barristers' Society of this Province to collect a fee of 25 cents upron every writ of summons issued out of, or made returnabile to the Supreme Court, at Malifax, or the County Court of District No. 1, except in summary strits, "towards the support of the Law Library, at ILalifax ;" and also, that the said Society should provide adhesive stamos
for the payment of such fees." Accordingly a stamp was issued, dark green in color, design a half-length figure of Justice, holding a pair of balances.


## ONTARIO.

The only stamps issued exclusively for the use of this I'rovince were Law Stamps. The first of these were issued in 1864 . They were large rectangular stamps, perforated, and designed as follows: Full length figure of Justice, blindfolded, holding aloft, with the right hand, a pair of lialances, and grasping with the left hand, a sword, pointing downwards. The 5, 10, $20,30,40,50,60,70,80$ and 90 cents are green in coler; on the right "Canada," and on the left "Law Stamp;" at the top the value in a word in the centre, with the value in figures on both sides, and at bottom the value in words. The 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 dollars were green, with black centre, having a figure of Justice similar to the lower values in the centre ; on both sides the value in words; at the top, in both corners, the value in figures, and between them "Canada;" at the bottom "Law Stamp." They were surcharged just above the figure in the centre, with the letters "C. F.," denoting Consolidated Fund ; with "F. F.," denoting Fee Fund, and with "L. S.," denoting Law Society.

In 1870 a new st of Law Stamps were issued for use in this Province. The design was similar to the previous issue. The figure of Justice was not llindfolded. The 5, 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80 and 90 cents have "Ontario Law Stamp," in two curved lines at the top; the value in figures in both lower corbers, with the word "cents" between. The $1,2,3$ and 4 dollars have the value in figures in both upper corners, with the word "Dollar" between; below this, in curved line, "Ontario ;" across the lottom, "Law Stanip."

A great many of the last issue are found with the perforations cul oft, and many collectors have supposed that this set was issued unper-
lorated. Such, however, is not the case, the perforations being cut off by certain vendors, to mark them.

## PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Stamps were first issued in this Province in 1860 . There were three values; 2 pence, 3 pence, and 6 pence. The 2 pence has head of

Queen to left in a circle ; around this circle "Prince Edward Island Postage," across the bottom value in words. The 3 pence was of similar design, having head of Queen in octagon frame. The above stamps were perforated " 9 ." In 1864 a I pence and 9 pence were added, rlesign similar to the previous issue.

In 1869 a 4 pence stamp was issued, design head of Queen to the left ; "Prince Eidward Island Postage" across the top in two curved lines; across the bottom "Four Pence." In 1870 a $41 / 2$ pence currency stamp was issued. Design, a full face view of Queen in oval frame, surrouncled by the words "Prince E'fward Island Postage;" across the bottom " 3 d . stg. Cy $4 / / 2 \mathrm{~d}$."

In 1871 a new set was issued with value in cents. They all had head of Queen to left, in various shaped frames. The 1 cent has Oucen's head in circle, surrounded lyy "Prince Edward Island Postage ;" value across the bottom in words, and in each corner in fugures. The 2 cent has head of the Queen in oval frame, "Prince Edward Islansl Postage" in a half circle at top, valuc across the bottum in words, and in each corner in ligures. The 3 cent has heal of Queen in an irregular circular frame, " Postage" across the top; below this, in curved line, "l'rince Edward Island;" across the luntom the value in words, and in upper corner the value in figures. The 4 cent and 6 cent have head of Queen in irregular fancy frames; " Postage, L'rince Edward Island," across the top in two straicht lines; value in words across the bottom, and value in figures in each corner. The 12 cent has the head of (Jueen in a circle; "I'rince Edward Islant l'ustage "above in curved line: value in worls across the bottom, and in figures in looth upper corners.

## QUEBEC

The first stamps issued for use in this Province was a set of Law Stamps in 1864. They wore the same design as those issued for use in Upler Canada, and no dould finted from the same plate. They were the same color, viz.: Green, and were surcharged "L. C." (Lower Canada) in red In 1870 another set of Law Stamps was issued, the diesign being as follows:--Full length figure of Justice in centre. The 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80 and 90 cent have "Law Stamp," acruss the top in a straight line, and below this the value in figures and the word "cents;" across the bottom " Quelse." The 1," 2, 3, 4 and 5 dollar, have "Law Stamp" in straight line across the top; below this in a curved line " $\$ 1$ tlollar $\$ 1$;" on the left "Province" on the right of "Quelrec;" across the lottom in a wavey line the value in words.

## QUEBEC REGISTRATION STAMPS.

The first issue of these stamps took place in 1866 . They were used on all documents filed in the Registry offices and also on search deeds. These stamps were sqtare with the value in large white figures in the centre surrounded lyy a circle on which are the words " Registration Low r Canada." In each upper corner there is a maple leaf, and in each lower corner a beaver, and between the beavers the word "cents."

In 1871 a new set of these stamps was issued, the design being a beaver in a circle in the centre facing to the left.

Across the top in a straight line "Registration," below this in a curved line "(Quelec," with the value in figures on both sides of it; across the buttom the value in words.

## QUEBEC ASSURANCE STAMPS.

These stamps were issued in 1876, and may be described as follows: Long rectangular slamp, with "Quebec" across the centre in white letters in an oval-shaped frame; aloove this, in two curved and one straight line, " Assurance License Stamp," below the value in figures, and helow this again the value in words. These stamps are redeemable, used or unused, liy the Quebec Covernment at their face value.
