

To Our Customers.

Reader, we presume you are a stamp collector, and as a collection of stamps without any knowledge of their history or value possesses but little or only a passing interest to an infelligent mind, we need no apology in calling your attention to the following catalogue of Philatelic publications:

The first requisite for a person desirous of forming a collection of simps (postal or fiscal), is a descriptive price list, so that they may count the cost of the undertaking, and lay their plans accordingly; the next indispensible is an album in which to arrange their treasures, and it is of the otmost importance that a suitable one be selected, for it must be borne in mind that this is to last, if not as long as you collect, at least for a number of years, and any one who has had the stouble of tearranging their collection, and the expense of replacing form specimens, will see the importance of selecting a good album at first. In these pages will be found, reduced, for similes of leaves of some of the best albums, by which the amsteur will be able to form a good opinion of the various styles. There is no album printed only on one side of the paper, published at a lower price than \$3, therefore we should advise all who can afford it, to endeavor to get one of these, for besides the comfort and beauty of having their collection in a thoroughly good book; if ever they should determine to sell, they will be able to realize twice as much for their collection than if it were in a book printed on both sides.

Presuming you have a catalogue and album, by all means subscribe to some stamp paper, and obtain intelligent information on certaing your favorite pursuit, for there can be but little interest in amassing a collection of labels the history of which you are totally ingorant of, we can assure you that independent of the knowledge which you will derive, which will enable you to buy scarce stamps from your acquaintances for a mere trifle, and detect counterfeits, and so save yourself being awindled; you will find more pleasure in receiving a colly of a paper containing interesting news about your stamps every week or mouth for a year, as the case may be, than you would for the same dollar expended in stamps, which would add bus little to the number of your collection.

The photographic postraits of the different rulers of the world, and the brilliantly colored flags of the different nations, add beauty and interest to any album.

Hoping these few remarks may be of service to you, and that you may long continue in the ranks of the stamp collecting army.


It has specially designed spaces for the reception of every Postage Stamp ever issued, rather larger than the Stamp itself, thus showing a near border round each adding much to the appearance of a set. Each space contains the description of the stamp it is designed for, thus making it nearly immossible to make mistakes in arranging the collection. It is brought up to the present time, having spaces provided for the Stamps of the Decean. Fiji Islands, Japan. &c., &c., also, for the new issues of Canada, Ceylon, Louis, Norway, Priuce Edward Island, Unit of State Official, &c., &c.

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"Special care has been taken to leave plenty of room for those governments that are still in existence, so as to accommodate future issues, and blank pages are left at appropriate intervals for the reception of Stamps from any countries that have not at present issued Postage Labels; but should any one desire additional leaves, specially designed pages to correspond with the body of the book are prepared for all new issues as soon as they are received. These are sumplied by the publishers at a nominal rate, and can easily be inserted in their proper order by gumming them to the guards bound with the book for that purpose, thus making the Album Perspectly Persanners, and as good after ten years as one just published."


EXTRACT FROM PREFACE.

In the present state of knowledge concerning revenue stamps, it is simply impossible to make the book perfect, nor would it be advisable to do so, if the necessary dain were at hard, as the supply of there labels is, at present, very limited, which would in that case, make it impossible to fill the Album. Perhaps the greatest charm in collecting a versue stamp-consists in the uncertainty and romance connected with it; nearly every amount bearing specimens in his album which and totally inknown to his better collectors, and there being no definite value or degrees of value yet exhabilished, but, of course, this state of things is rapidly passing away, and ere many years, or even months have elapsed, collectors will awak a to the knowledge that they have some priceless rarities among their revenue stamps which, perhaps, have only continent two or three cents.

Taking these facts into consideration, spaces have only been prepared for well known and obtainship series of foreign revenue stamps; but by the plentiful distribution of blank pages throughout the look, ample room has been secured for all fiscal stamps that may be acquired by the owner. In regard to the emissions of the United States the case is very different, as nearly every American Philatelest is desirous of conducing a complete set of the fiscal stamps of his own country. With the exception of been taken to provide space for every stamp that has ever been issued by our own country, with the exception of been, solvit, and tobacco stamps, which it has been pronounced liberal to collect but as large numbers do collect them, sufficient blank pages have been left for their accommodation, and taking into consideration their large size, they can be arranged with count facility without the slat of lines.

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
