ME. BROWN'S ETCHINGS.—Mr. William Brown, of Salisbury, has sent us a set of examples of his stchings, a series of which he is publishing in illu-tration of his own beautiful cathedral city, Canterbury, Edinburgh, and other picturesque scences. A good contrast, on the other hand, is afforded in the stern drawing of the Canony ite, Edinburgh, and the lonely grandeur of his Stonehenge.—The Bookeeller.

Mr. Brown a local artist, has selected for illustration some of the more notable relies of antiquity in the old cathedral town, and although his etchings vary in excellence, they all display power and force of expression, while some are very delicately finished.—Pall Mall Guzette.
