## CLASS A.-Championship.

## Section I.- UNITED STATES.

11. WOHTHINGTON, Geo. H.:-Consists of Postmasters' Provisionals, Carrier stamps and United States Government issues, including Department and Newspaper stamps. Included In the Postmasters' stamps are three varleties of the Alexandria, 10 c Baltímore on cover, two Brattleboros, two Millburys, 54 St. Louis stamps including reconstructed plates of all printings. The Carreers include such things as a pair of the Franklin Carrier, unused, with gum; the New York Carrier on rosy buff, unused; the $2 c$ on $3 c$, used on cover; the $2 c$ red in unused pair: a block of i9 unused of the Philadelphia Carrier ic guld on black; the Baltimore and Philadelphia Carriers are complete. The Government issues consist of several thousand blocks and sheets, and contain such rare unused blocks as the万c, 1847; 5c, 1857, brick red; 1861-66, block of twelve 3 c pink; block of six 24 c steel blue: 1867 , 90 c blue with grill; $90 \mathrm{c}, 1869$; block of ten of the 4c Columbian error. The Premier Gravure issue of 1861 is complete. The 1 bic 1869 , unused o. g., with picture inverted, and the 30 c of the same issue, unused o. g. with flags inverted. The special Printings are complete. All the Bureau Printings are represented by entire sheets. The Department stamps are all in blocks.

## Section II. Any country in Europe including Great Britain.

## FRANCE.

12. IfFICHENHFIM, Franz.-With the exception of a few used copies, this specialized collection contains only stamps in mint condition, mostly in blocks of four. Shades and varieties are well represented.

Among the rarities the following may be men-tioned:-"Tete-beche" pairs (nearly all unused and in various shades) of $1849,1 \mathrm{fr}$ rose-carmine, and carmine, and 10 c bistre; 1853 , 1 fr . carmine; $1860,80 \mathrm{c}$ rose; $1862,20 \mathrm{c}$ blue 13 pairs in different shades), and 80 e rose ( 2 pairs); $1863,4 c$ grey (2 pairs). Also all the "tete-beche" pairs of the 1870-1875 issues, each with several specimens in different shades. Among the latter, there is an unused block of $1873,10 \mathrm{c}$ bistre on rose containing two inverted stamps.

In addition, the collection contains: Three unused copies of $18+9$, 1 fr orange, and several unused coples of 1 fr brown-orange, among them one copy showing Ceres with the beard; a block of four, and several single copies of $1850,15 \mathrm{c}$ green, unused; unused copies of $1855,20 \mathrm{c}$ blue on green, greenish and yellow paper; of $1870,20 \mathrm{c}$ Bordeaux type 1 ; unused pairs of $1875,15 \mathrm{c}$ (error), and 10 c

Distre on rose attached; of 1857.1 c black on Prussian blue, etc.

Among the few used copies the following may be noted:-A pair and two single copies of $1849,1 \mathrm{fr}$ orange: a vertical strip of five stamps and a horizontal pair of $1876,25 \mathrm{c}$ ultramarine, showing both types attached: and a cony of the same value in Type ll on green paper on entire letter conly one other knowns; a cops of "25" in manuscript on 1 ic black ['npaid Letter Stamp, on official letter. etc.

The collection also contains an absolutely unique curiosity, viz: A used copy of 1853 , 1 fr carmine, imperforate, showing on its back parts of two stamps of 1 fr of the same issued in a pale carmine shade standing in "tete-beche"

Among those stamps which were prepared but not issued, may be mentioned: A pair of 1849 , 1 fr "Vervelle"; 1850 , 20c blue, first impression: 1876 , 20c Prussian blue on bluish paper. Iournal Stamps jc blue, rose and lilac, imperforate; " $1 / 2$ " on $1 c$ and 3 c of the 1900 issue.

Nearly all the known Offictal Reprints are shown. Among them are a block of four of 1850.40 c orange, showing the two retouched figurez "i"; a copy of 1850 , 25 c in red on 20 c blue; a block of nine of 1853 , 1 fr carmine containing a "tete-beche" pair.

The collection also contains a copy of the Circular of the Postmaster General dated 1 st of December 1849, referring to the change of color of the lfr from orange to carmine, a copy of the Circular of Susse Freres and several other Official Documents.

## GREAT BRITAIN.

13. LOIDFIR, Sydney:-This is believed to be the finest collection extant of this country next to that of the late Earl of Crawford, as it consists not only of Postage, but also Government Telegraphs, Army \& Military Telegraphs, Postal Fiscals, Specimens, Imperfs. Proofs, Essays, Dellvery Companies, Railway Letter Fee, College stamps, Curiosities and Errors which defy description in the pages of an Exhibition Catalogue.

Among other fine and rare pleces in the unused collection may be noted: Mint block of thirty id black, 1840 , including double letter.

Four mint blocks of six 2d deep bright blue, 1840 .
Complete sheet of Plate $10,1 \mathrm{~d}, 1841$, imperforate, and many fine blocks of this stamp in exceedingly rare shades.

Mint block of thirty-six 2d, 1841 , imperi., also a block of eleven of the same stamp showing Plate lll in corner. Several copies of the exceedingly rare 2d. perf. 16, large crown, mint. Of the octagonal adhesives are shown five of the $1 /-$, eight of the 10 d , and five of the 6 d . The rare 4 d , wnkd. small garter, on white paper; a palr of the mediuill garter on blue paper, and a block of four on white paper. A copy of the $3 d$ with white dots in the rectangles. The $\boldsymbol{T} d$. Plate $V$, womd. emblens, extremely rare. A pane of twenty of the scarce 3d. Plate iV, wmkd. spray. The $5 /-, 10 /-$, and $£ 1$, with both Maltese Cross and Anchor watermarks. Two coples of the sa on blue paper, pale and deep orange. A pair of the 1d lilac printed on both sldes. A copy
of the very scarce bd of 1884 , the variety with Arabic numeral and with line under "d" instead of lot.

Also a specialized collection of rare postaltiscals in singles. pairs and blocks. notably a pair tete-beche of the $2 d$ perforated. There is also a specialized collection of Georgian stamps with all the known varieties.

Of the Official issues, which are practically complete. may be mentioned the $1 \mathrm{~d} V$. H.: the 5 sh and losh on bleute paper; the 10 sh cobalt; the $£ 1$ brown lilac, both crown and orbs wmk.; the complete set of King Edward VII; 1d Government Parcels, with overprint inverted; Levant, 1 plastre on 2d, provisionally fssued at Beirut; and many other fine jueces.

Of the Post Office Telegraph stamps the 5 sh, Plate 11, perf. $151 / 2 \times 15$, the $10 \mathrm{sh}, \mathrm{E} 1$ and f 5 , of which there is only one other known (in Crawford collection!, also the 3 sh wmad. crown, of which few copies are known in unused state.

One entire volume is composed of inperfs., colour trials, essays and specimen stamps, most of them exceedingly rare.

Two volumes consist of proof copies cut from the imprimatur sheets, and contain almost all known varieties, and many which are unknown unused, perforated, such as $21 / 2 d$ Plates IV and $V$, wmkd. anchor: 3d Plate V, emblems; Plate 21, spray; 6d Plate $10: 6 d$ Plate 12 in deep chestnut: Plate 18. grey with spray wmk.; 8d orange Plate 1 ; 1 sh on blue safety naner: 1 sh Plate $V$, wmid.emblems; 1 sh Plate 14, green; 1 sh Plates 13 and 14 In lilac; and 5 sh. Plate 4 , with Maltese Cross wmk.

Among proofs of the $P$. $O$. Telegraphs will be seen the 1 d , Plates 4 and 5 : 3 d , Plates 4 and 5 , spray wmk.; td. Plate 2, 1 sh green, Plates 11 and 12: and 5sh, Plate 3, wmkd. Maltese Cross (block of six): $£ 5$ in a block of six th the issued colour, and a single copy printed in gold.

USED. Among the used stamps will be found the $1 d$ red, wink. large crown, imperf., on entire; 1d. Plate 191, an imperf. pair; the 1 sh and $10 d$ octagonal, double printed: the 9d with hair llnes; 1sh. small letters, on blue paper; 10d Plate II; 2sh Plate III; 2sh brown, block of four; $5 \mathrm{sh}, 10 \mathrm{sh}$. $£ 1$ and $£ 5$ on bleuté paper: 6d pale buff. Plate $13 ; 4 \mathrm{~d}$ Plate 17, green; Officials, I. R., 10 sh cobalt blue; Government Parcels, $1 d$ and 1 sh with overprint inverted.

This collection was exhibited in London in October 1912 when it was awarded the Championship Great Gold Medal, since which date it has been entirely re-arranged, and very largely added to and mproved.

## NETHERLANDS.

14. WAllifN, A. J.:-The various shades, retouches and peculfarities of each plate of the first issue are shown in detail with the aid of dated coples and entires. A further confirmation is gained by the reconstruction of the third. fourth. fifth and sixth plates of the 5cts. The sixth or last plate shows good printing on stout paper and. in its last stage, poor work on thin pliable paper. The last or tenth plate of the 10 cts shows the same diversity of printing.

The numbers given to the stamps of the first plate of the 5cts are those of the Proof-Plate shown in black.

Plates $I V, V$ and $X$ of the 10 cts are shown. In this way is completely proved that the "thin, soft pliable paper" was only used for the latter. The completion of Plate $V$ in addition to Plate IV also proves the separate existence of Plates III and VI. Plate IX has different characteristics again from Plate VI, but both have still to be constructed.

The perioration of the second issue is illustrated by a fine block of forty of the 15 cts .

In the third issue the varieties of perforation are fully shown, with a few retouches. Rarities are especially the $10 c t s$, type 1 , perf. $101 / 2 \times 10$, and the 25 cts perf. $131 / 2$ and 14 .

The postmarks used for the first three issues to Indicate the passage of letters through different postoffices and on the railways, are shown in full and explained.

The remaining issues are given in all varieties of shades and perforations with many blocks and entires. There are also strips of the lct and $21 / 2$ cts, 1898 , to show how small defects are multiplied in this form of printing.

The postage due stamps are fully exhibited.
A novel point of research has been the numerous minor faults in the 10 cts of 1870 , and the discovery that these do not exist in the type 111 of the 1881-1893 issue but re-appear in the 1894-95 type lll stamps which were evidently printed from a rearrangement of the old plate which had apparently been preserved intact.

Note the splendid block of forty of the 10 cts , 1870, perf. $121 / 2 \times 12$, a treasure from Moens' old stock. Also the reconstructed plate of the first printing of 1894-95. This latter was undertaken to show the number and position of the two forms of the fraction used for the $121 / 2 \mathrm{cts}$. value. The newer form with larger "2" was the only one uged for the later printings.

With the later issues and the "de Ruyters" the methods of using these Postage Dues are fully exemplifled by means of entires.

## SWEDEN.

15. LFIJONHUFVUD, Haron Erik:-The collection contains all the rarities and varieties in single copies, blocks, and whole sheets.

There are 15 coples in all shades of the 3 Sktlling Banco unused, and 20 used copies, some on original envelopes, some in strips. Among the 4 Skillfng Bancos is one unused block of four, first print, and the greatest rarity in Lancos, viz., a complete quarter of a sheet (2⿹) with margin, the largest block of the Bancos in existence. There are three coples of the extremely rare grey-blue 4 Skill. Banco unused. Ten unused 6 Skilling Bancos, of which one is the very rare, grey-brown, thick paper. Thirteen unused eight Skilling Bancos in all shades, the blurred yellow specimen being perbaps the only unused copy in existence. There are nine copies in mint-condition of the 24 Skilling Bancos, one of which has the corner margin with the watermark.

The collection of reprints of the first two issues is most complete. W'e find specimens and blocks of all the reprints, including the one of 1885 , both
on ordinary and thin paper. There is a complete set of imperforate Bancos in blocks of four, the only ones in existence. It is also probable that the set of blocks of the Shield-issue with the L.ocal and Lion-type reprints are the only reprints, perf. 13 , that are to be found in private hands. Of the original Shield-issue there are blocks of various sizes, man!, the only ones in the world. To this issue belong the two copies of the 12 ore printed on both sides; they are the only two complete copies, a third one being damaged, and are probably among the rarest stamps of Sweden or of any country. The only unused specimen of the 24 dre with the typefault "Ör"" instead of "öre" is also shown. Also the only complete sheet of any of the old issues of Sweden ever discovered-it is a sheet of 100 used 50 öres 1858.

The 3 ore Lion-type printed on both sides is represented by one of the very few copies in existence. The 17 bre grey is shown in single specimens, one block of four with margin, and one unique block of eight. There are a great many blocks among the first figure-issues, perliaps the most difficult of the Swedish stamps to procure in unused blocks. A block of the 6 ore grey is probably without rival. Of the well-known "Error" $20 / 30$ of 1880 , there are four unused and five used specimens. The collection lias two blocks of the extremely rare "En Rikslaler" perf. 13, one of which has full cornermargin. Of the provisional stamps many are worth laking notice of:-There are three coples of the $10 / 6$ instead of $10 / 12$ surcharge of 1889 ; four copies of the official stamps surcharged $10 / 12$ perforation fourteen, one of which is unused, and the only one in existence. Two copies of the official $10 / 24$ "inverted surcharge," one used and the other unused, the latter an extremely rare stamp. The only copy in private hands of the famous error 5 ore brown instead of green of the 1891 King Oscar issue is also shown. One copy of the first print of the King Oscar line-engraved 10 bre is nearly as rare as the solitary error. There are specimens, pairs and blocks of all the imperforate stamps, official and unofficial, of which special mention ought to be made of the entire and only sheet in the world of the 8 ore King Oscar line-engraved. Also a block of the official 20 ore blue, one of the few large blocks that have been preserved.

## Section III. Any British Colony. <br> BRITISH GUIANA.

16. IILIEFN, H. J.:-The circular stamps of $1850-51$ include a very fine pair of the $2 c$ on cover and a $4 c$ on pelure paper with very large margins, also on cover. The issues of $1852-53$ and the provisional issue of 1856 are well represented, the latter including two coples of the $4 c$ on blue surfaced paper and two copies on dark blue "sugar" paper (one being on cover). The plates of the provisional issue of 1862 are reconstructed of initialed specimens, unused and used.

## MAURITIUS.

17. HUNEWN, H. J.:-Unused copies of both $1 d$ and $2 d$ "Post Oflice" are shown. The issue of 1848 includes a block of four of the $1 d$ and a single copy
of the -2 , both on yellowish paper and unused, in the earliest state of the plate: also a block of four of the $2 d$ on yellowish paper, unused, medium state of the plate. There are reconstructed plates of both values and numerous specimens showing all stages of wear of the plates. There are also reconstructed plates of the small and large "fillet" of 1859 as well as single specimens unused and used. The collection includes numerous unused copies of the lithographed stamps of $185 y$, a perforated 1 sh green of 1862 , unused, and is practically complete in all the subsequent issues, unused.

## TRANSVAAL.

18. WOHTHINGTON, Ger. H.:-Practically complete according to Gibbons catalogue, mostly unused, and containfng over 22 3 blocks and sheets.

## Sectios IV. Any other Country.

## ARGENTINE REPUBLIC.

19. PACK. Charles I.:-A specialized collection in fourteen albuns. The first issue is fully studies, the changes in the make-up of the plates explained and illustrated by drawings and diagrams. The later Arms type stamps are broadly and extensively treated. There are two copies of the $12 c$ without accent, one of which is unused. The owner has a fully worked out scheme for detecting counterfeits of this rare stamp. The "Rivadavia" issue fills two albums, and is mounted by printings. Attention is called to uncatalogued and recently discovered varieties and rare pairs. There are many copies of the 10 c and 15 c imperforate, both used and unused. The early issues are also extensively shown on original covers. New information has been worked out in some later issues. Attention is called to the study of the Envelope Stamps of 1882 3. There are two coples of the rare error 5 c , green instead of red, with sun watermark. The stamps with inverted centres are all included.

## HAWAIIAN ISLANDS.

20. WOIXTHINGTON, Geo. H.:-A cover bearing one $2 c$ and 5c "Missionary:" a 5 c and 13 c "Mission-
ary", unused o. g.; one ne used on cover and two 13 c used. The Numerals are represented by recon. structed sheets, original uncut sheets, and many singles showing errors etc. The engraved issues are all represented by blocks and entire sheets.

## JAPAN.

21. IHVMrN. H. J.:-A highly specialized collection displayed on 245 pages, including complete sheets. blocks and single copies, all unused. The stamps with syllabic characters have been given special attention and are practically complete.

## MEXICO.

22. TAYIAㅅ, Fdward M.:-A highly specialized collection containing about 60,000 stamps. Each issue opens with a display of stamps emphasizing the plate varieties and main types of overprint, and then follows a remarkably complete exposition of the district names and their numerous varieties. The early issues are particularly noteworthy, including some large blocks of unused and most of the rare names used. The collection is a thoroughIy complete one and embraces all issues. It abounds in errors and uncatalogued varieties and practicalIy all the known rarities are represented. Amons the more noteworthy items are two copfes of the 1 real of 1856 showing part impression of the 4 rls. on face, blocks of nine of the $4 r$ and $8 r$ and almost complete sheets of the $1 / 2 \mathrm{r}$ and 2 r . The 1861 issue is also very complete and there is a wonderful display of the Eagle type including nine coples uf the rare 3 centavos and numerous examples of the scarcer sub-consignment numbers. The lithographed stamps of 1866 are shown in large blocks and the rare varfeties of 1867 are fully shown. The 1868 to 1873 jssues are extensively specialized. a number of complete sheets and panes beins shown. In the later issues all the rarities are represented, including the 5 and 10 pesos of 1884-92, the rare perforation varieties of $1895-98$ etc. The official stamps are shown on an equally complete scale as also are the Porte de Mar stamps. The Guadalajaras are also highly specialized and in Campeche the 25 c and 50 c denominations are digplayed.

## CLASS B.-United States and Possessions.

## Section I. U. S. GOVERNMENT ISSUES.

23.* ACKFIRMAX, Hon. F. H.:-TThe foundation of this collection was started more than forty years ago as Mr. Ackerman has been a consistent collector of postage stamps ever since he was a little boy.

This collection of stamps is chlefly remarkable for the fact of its having a very large quantity of interesting covers and also large blocks of stamps, Mr. Ackerman having collected blocks long before they were as fashionable as they are today. There are a large number of United States stamps used from China and other Foreign Countries scattered throughout the collection, in fact, anything that is of an odd or curious nature appeals to Mr. Acker-
man and is represented in this collection, which is one of the finest in the country.

25. CHAPMAN, C. F.:-The basis of this collection was the celebrated Sussdorf collection, purchased by Mr. Chapman in 1908, to which many choice and rare items have been added. It includes: $1847,5 \mathrm{c}$, mint block of eight in unusually fine condition. 1869, 15 c and 24 c with inverted medallions: 30 c with inverted fiags; 30 c without grill, mint block of twenty-five with corner margins, imprints and plate numbers. ## Section V. Philippine isLands.

36. 13ARTELS. J. M.:-The collection consists of two parts: Issues under Spanish Dominion followed by those of the Revolutionary Government and stamps issued under the United States.

The collection is complete in all numbers contained in Scotts' catalogue except No. 112 , the existence of which is doubted by all American authorities. The strongest feature of the collection is the wonderfully fine condition and unequalled array of shades, nearly every stamp being unused.

The first issue contains the "CORROS" error very fine and unused, also a proof of the 10 c in black. Other principal features are as follows: $1855,5 \mathrm{c}$ pale red, the four types, all unused and very fine; 1859 , a fine lot of blocks and a full sheet of fifty-six 10 c rose; 1863 , 1 r , three shades; 1868-74 surcharges, $1 r$ violet unused, first issue, lr blue and $2 r$ green, of the latter only one other is known

1879, a horizontal pair both the error "COREROS." The 1881-88 surcharged issues are worked out with great care, especially in regard to the various types of some of the surcharges. The 10 c on $24 / 8 \mathrm{c}$ uitramarine, first re-engraving ( $\mathrm{S} . \mathrm{No} .90$ ), is a little appreciated rarity. The $8 c$ on $10 c$ (S. 115 ) is shown in an authenticated copy. $1 r$ on $1 p$ green (S. 128) in two types of surcharge, one of them unique on this stamp, as far as known.

The U. S. issues are first shown singly in a fine range of shades; these are followed by blocks of four also strongly shaded. A strong feature is the special printings, consisting of the 19016 c . $\$ 1$, $\$ 2$ and $\$ 5$, the latter with the only existing plate number 288 on margin, the 6 c in a plate number strip showing the plate cancellation line; same, 1902, 2c in a block of six with plate number. The special surcharges of the 1902 series are shown in plate number strips.

The blocks are followed by a very full collection of plate number strips of three, divided into the different printings, an otherwise impossible task.

Another volume contains an extensive collection of official stamps, mostly "O. B." surcharges. The printed tssues are very complete, including many double surcharges and the "Escolta Press" issue. The handstamped surcharges are worked out by the exhibitor into 84 different types.

The collection contains also a page of the 1898 issue surcharged for the Mariannas which are complete, mostly unused and used including one "cover."

The revolutionary issues are also a strong feature. Four types of forgeries of the surcharges "Philippines" on used stamps are shown, also a reference collection of the earlier surcharges. Several pages of proofs and essays add to the exhibit.

Envelopes (including O. B. surcharges) and postal cards are also included.

The whole collection consists of over 4000 stamps comprising 225 pages.
37. PALMEN, Major F. I.:-Thig fine collection, in seven large, loose-leal albums, is complete, according to Scott's Standard Catalogue, except as to Nos. $38 \mathrm{~A}, 90$, and 112 , besides containing numerous varjeties not mentioned theretn. In addition to the collection of stamps and covers proper, there is a magnificent showing of all Revolutionary issues, as

Well as of the experimental printing of the $O$. $B$. issues, both on and off cover. The collection of envelopes is practically complete both as to regular and $O$. $B$. issues. While not entirely complete, the post card collection shows several of the rarities There is also a fine collection of the Spanish issues of the Revenue Stamps as well as of the stamps from various classes of stamped paper dating from 1836 to 1898 , close of Spanish Dominion.

Especially to be noted are the fine specimens. unused and with original gum, of the $185+$ issues: considerable progress has also been made in the plating of these stamps, from ten to twenty-two varieties of each being shown. The four types of the $18 \overline{9} \bar{a}$ issue are shown (Scott's No. 6). Of No. 10 , there are fifty-four copies, used and unused, in splendid condition and arranged so as to illustrate the settings of the five separate printings in which this stamp occurred, as well as the different papers and shades. A full mint sheet in perfect condition and showing arrangement of the types in the only printing known for No. 11 is also shown. Among the numerous rarities to be noted are splendid copies of Nos. 32,33 , and 38 . The rare No. 114 is shown in both known types with surcharge normal and inverted; this stamp is also shown on cover. There is also a fine copy of the rare No. 115. Of No. 322 , there is shown the only known copy with the black surcharge only.

The Alfonso XIIth issues are shown in both clichés and in numerous shades, arranged according to the date and purpose of issue. The United States issues are complete in singles, blocks of four, and in numerous shades: there is also a fine collection of plate numbers which, however, is not entirely complete. Current issues, 1906 and since, are practically complete to date. There is also a considerable collection of the different cancellations used from 1854 to date, and including postal, fiscal, and telegraph cancellations, as well as those used for both mall and fiscal purposes.

In addition to the foregoing, there is a considerable collection of full sheets of stamps of the Revolutionary issues, and of parts of sheets of many of the Spanish issues showing top margins and one or more rows of stanips below, thus illustrating the arrangement of the panes and cliches in the various printings or issues of the same stamp for various purposes, as well as the position of defective clichés in various settings.

## Section VI. CANAL ZONE, GUAM, PORTO RICO.

38.(S).MAsON, I. B.:-A speclalized collection of the stamps of the Canal Zone, unused, in blocks of four. showing varieties and errors of surcharge. The first issue is also shown on original covers.

and arrangement, and is contained in 22 large albums. It includes, in addition to the regular United States issues, Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Philippines. It embraces likewise United States envelope essays and an extensive collection of the Western Franks. An important feature of the collection is that it shows not only all main dies but also all known die varieties, especially of the famous early Nesbitt issues. it contains, moreover, all prominent shades of stamps and papers. On account of these features and the unexcelled care in systematic arrangement of the collection it is not only most attractive in appearance, but enables even the layman at a glance to identify each specimen. Owing to its wealth of exceedingly rare and unique envelopes, it easily ranks as the premier United State; envelope collection of the world.

This portion of Mr. Pack's Cape of Good Hope collection received Gold Medals at Vienna and London.
74. PICK, J.:-The collection includes among unused stamps 23 "triangulars" and 1874-80, error "ONE IENNY". Among the used stamps are 71 "triangulars", including pairs of the "wood blocks", both errors of color and the retouched 4 d blue; 1882 , error of surcharge "Half enny"; 1893, 1d on 2d, double surcharge; "specimens", etc.
75. WOHTHINGTON, G. H.:-There are 450 triangular stamps of which 60 are wood blocks, many of which are unused. ## EXTRACT FROM THE RULES AND REGULATIONS.

(1) All exhibits entered for competition must be boma fide the property of the Exhibitor. Joint collections must be shown in joint names, but no combination of collections or parts of collections, the property of two or more owners, made for the purpose of the Exhibition, will be admitted for competition. Exhibitors in class $K$ must, if called upon to do so, furnish evidence of age which shall be satisfactory to the Executive Committee.
(2) Each exhihit intended for competition must be entered in the class appropriate to it. Fxhibits which the owners maty desire to enter "not for competition" will be so marked and shown in their proper classes.
(10) The Executive Committee reserves the riglit to refuse any exhibit or any part of an exhibit, without assigning any reason for such refusal. In the event of there being insufficient space available for displaying the whole of an exhibit, the Executive Committee reserves the right to show only such part of the exhibit as it may select.
(11) Allums of stamps will be shown open at such pages as seem interesting to the Executive Committere. These pages will be varied from time to time during the Exhibition. Such albums will be shown in cases and may not be inspected, except by the judges, without the permission of the owner, and then only in the presrence of the owner or of a member of the Committee.
(12) Exhibitors who desire to sell their exhibits may have the same entered upon a sale register, to be kept by the Secretary. Such exhibits will be marked with a red seal. No price or other notification of sale may be affixed to any exhibit. Should a sale be made the price will be payable to the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. J. W. Scott, 36 John St., New York, who will ac-
count to the owner for the purchase money, after deducting $21 / 2 \%$ to be applied toward the general expenses of the Exhibition.
(13) No exhibit may be removed prior to the close of the Exhibition.
(14) The Judges will be appointed by the Executive Committee and their decision will, in all cases, be final. They shall have power to withhold any award where, in their opinion, there is insufficient competition or other reason which makes it seem desirable to do so; and they may, with the approval of the Executive Committee, increase the number of awards where the competition is heavs. The Judges will be requestell to base their awards on a consideration of the following qualifications: Completeness, Rarity, Philatelic Knowledge and Research, Condition, Arrangement and Neatness.
(15) No exhibit by any of the Judges may be entered for competition.
(16) No single exhibit may be entered in more than one class or may receive more than one awaril. This does not apply to the Grand Prize, the Original Research awarl or the Visitors Cup, which are not to be regarded as awards to be competed for but as honorariums to be presented for supreme merit. There is, however, no limit to the number of exhibits a collector may enter in one or more classes.
(1i) All questions that may arise concerning the Exhibition and not provided for by these rules and regulations will be decided by the Executive Committee.
(18) The signature of an exhibitor on the accompanying application form will indicate that he accepts these rules and regulations.
(19) A diploma will accompany each award conferred by the Judges.

92. HANCOCK, Col F. H.:-Jammu and Kashmir. A highly specialized collection which is fully written up and described. All issues are practically complete in numerous varieties and shades, among which are the following:
I. The Circulars. The rarities include three copies of the 1866 , 1 anna blue-black, three of the $1 / 2$ anna emerald green. usid on entires and a pair of the 4 annas bright blue, used. The various issues are extensively shown on entires.
93. Jammu Rectangulars. The early rectangulars are, with but few exceptions, complete in all shades and a large number are on entires. 187476 , the rare emerald green plate is complete with some duplicates. 1877 issue in ofl color. The very rare $1 / 2$ anna black and the $1 / 2$ anna deep blue are shown, the latter being on entire.
94. 1866. Kashmir Rectangulars.
(i) Of the $1 / 2$ anna black printed from a single dic there are nine coples, six of which are on entires. Both the gray and the jet black shades are shown.
(ii) Of the $1 / 2$ anna black printed in twenty types, all twenty types are shown, twelve of them on entires, also a few duplicates.
(iii) The five types of the 1 anna black are shown, also six duplicates.

## MALTA.

93. OTT, C.:-Almost complete, with good postmarks, blocks, etc.
94.(S) WIII,AMs, J. K.:-A specialized collection of Malta together with British stamps used in the Island. The British stamps include such rarities as the $\mathrm{LH}-\mathrm{FL}$ error of the $21 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$, in a strip of three: the 9 d of 1867 , watermark spray (the only known copy); $1 \mathrm{sh}, 1862$, the K in circle variety; 2sh brown (three copies), 5 sh, plates 1, 2 and 4; 10 sh gray (three coptes); $11 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ rose red, on entire; 1 sh , plate 7 , imperforate, etc. There are also blocks of twelve of the 6 d surcharged 6 d and 1 sb Emblems watermark. Of the 1881 , 1 sh orange brown, plate 13 , there is an unique block of twenty. The Nalta general issues from 1860 include mint blocks of no watermark $1 / 2 d$ on blued paper, perf. 12 声 buff, perf. 14 golden yellow and perf. $14 \times 121 / 2$ yellow buff. There is also a fine block of twelve with marginal inscriptions of the 1870 , $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ dull



orange and a block of sixty CA yellow buff,
The used specimens are all superb and include three copies of the rare " 31 " postmark and eight dated copies of the $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ on blued paper. Other yellow series are shown in all shades and varieties, many of which have never been catalogued. A really magnificent entire is shown with a pair of $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ buff on white paper, no watermark.

The $4 d, 1893$, imperiorate, is shown in both mint and used state, a particular piece being a pair used on the entire envelope.

Later issues are all complete and include sheets of the 1 d on $21 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ showing error of surcharge. The collection is enriched with color trials, proofs, specimen stamps and many curiosities.

A feature of the exhibit is an almost complete collection on entires of British stamps used in malta and the general issues. A study of the postmarks is attacied. The collection is well written up and contains interesting matter not hitherto made public.

## NEW SOUTH WALES.

95. IUVEEN, H. J.:-Portion of collection unused, mainly Sydney Views and Laureated Head issues, including a superb mint block of fifteen, of the 3d Sydney View.

## NEW ZEALAND.

96. HENIDIRICKSOK, Win. H.:-The collection comprises those stamps issued during the nineteenth century, both unused and used. All issues are represented. In the London printing of 1855 the $?$ pence blue will be found on the white and blued papers, unused, and fine copies of all values irsed. In the Colonial print of 1856 a fine unused copy of the 2 pence on blue paper will be noted and all values used, some in pairs. The issue on white, unwatermarked paper is shown in all values both unused and used and attention is called to the fine copy of the 1 shilling unused and to the used copies serrated and rouletted. The issue on pelure paper is represented by fine unused coples of the 1,2 and 6 pence and fine used coples, imperf., rouletted and perforated. The collection is also represented in all issues and varieties and in nearly all the perforations, through to the end of the century. Particular attention is called to the rare unused and used copies on paper watermarked N. Z.
97. PACK, C. L.:-Early types. The retouches, both unused and used. Particularly strong in the early private perforations.

## PAPUA, including BRITISH NEW GUINEA.

98. (S)MATTHES, Wim. H.:-Mint British New Guinea and Papua stamps, especially the unsurcharged, in singles, palrs, blocks, strips and full sheets.

## QUEENSLAND.

99. HENDIRICKSON, Wm. H.:-This is a collection of unused and used stamps of the nineteenth century. All issues, watermarks and perforations are represented. In the imperf. issue of 1860 used coples of
the $1 d$ and 2 appear in pairs with two fine coples of the 6d. Fine unused copies of the imperf. Id and $2 d$ and the perforated $2 d$ and $6 d$ are also worthy of note. In the issue with small star watermark unused copies of the 3 d and the "Registered". with clean cut perforation, and all values with the rough perforation will be found. All values on thick yellowish paper, without watermark, of 1862 67. appear in unused and used condition, of which the rare ld Indian red is probably the most noteworthy. Unused copies of the truncated star watermark are shown in all values, of which the 6 pence and 1 shilling are the rarest. The Crown $Q$ watermark of $1868-79$ is found unused in all values of both perforations and many in shades. All other issues have received attention and are represented in varieties and shades.

## TASMANIA.

100. HIVFFN, H. J.:-An unused collection, displayed on $5 \mathbf{5}$ pages, highly specialized, particular attention being paid to the early issues and rare perforations.

## WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

The war stamps are almost complete. There are entire sheets of the Macedonian 2 lep. with double surcharge, both inverted; of the 25 lep., first setting, with surcharge inverted and showing the error first "I" missing in the second word (probably unique); the 5 and 10 lep. lithographed issue, fourth setting in black, inverted and showing all the errors, etc., etc.

The collection is practically complete, containing all varieties of paper, types, and perforation. One original sheet of the 40 paras blue, issue 1858 , and many original sheets of the 1862 issue in all varietles of paper, hand-struck and machine printed. One original sheet of the 30 paras on thick paper with very thin gum (only this one sheet being known). Issue 1 . includes a very fine 81 paras, unused, with original gum, from the Castle-mann collection; fine used copies of the 27 , 54, and 108 paras ion letter); some remarkable "proofs" of the first issue (only three sets being known). ## RUSSIA AND POLAND.

136. HOLANSKY, W. von:-A. Russia and its Postoffices in Forelgn Countries. B. Poland.

Each issue is represented by unused and used stamps, many being on entires, with pairs and blocks additionally arranged according to shades. In the case of the earlier issues interesting postmarks are also included. Varleties, errors, curiosities, proofs, essays, reprints, and forgeries are numerously represented. Reprints and forgeries are fully "written up," the points of difference with the originals being clearly enumerated. Some interesting issues, particularly provisionals, are accompanied by illustrations in elucidation of the text.

lussia: 1857-58, 10 kop., unused marginal pair, also 10 , 20, 30 kop., wmk. 1, 2 and 3 , superb, unused. 1866,1 kop., horizontally laid paper, used block of eight, with inverted background. 1866 , 10 kop., horizontally laid paper with inverted ceutre. 5 kop. of 1866 on vertically lajd paper, unused. 1 and 7 kop., 1883, with laverted background. $1888,31 / 2$ roubles on horizontally laid, instead of vertically laid, paper, used. 1889-94: 14 kop. on horiz. laid paper, used. 1903-6: 25 kops. and $31 / 2$ roubles, horiz. laid paper, faverted centres, used. 1905 , Charity stamps, 3 kop. palr, perf. $111 / 2 x$ 1314 , unused. Rare essays and proofs.

IRussian Idevant: 1863,6 kop., used and unused, also two original sheets (pale and dark shades), used with scarce postmark (France). 1865, 10 paras used. 2 plastres used and unused.

IRussian lost-ofices in Chinn. 1889, 7 kop. on horiz. laid with inverted overprint, used.

Poland: Letters with Franco postmark used in the 18 th and 19 th Centuries, prior to the issue of
postage stamps. The collection shows a specialized study of the single adhesive stamp of Poland, in shades, plate varieties and curios, supplemented by a collection of the impressed envelopes.

## SPAIN.

This collection, of which the main body was exhibited in Vienna in 1911 , has since been materially increased by many fine blocks of stamps, various proofs, and the fine work on the plate printing errors and differences drawn by Major Conradi, which drawings now foral part of the collection. The collection has been entirely remounted and rearranged and has been newly described for the greatest part. On 546 leaves, it contains 10,833 unused and 1594 used stamps, in singles, pairs and blocks, also 76 complete sheets.

Amongst the great number of mint copies of the unused part we may mention:
1879. Plate I, perf. 12, quite irregular: a unique block of 27 of $1(\mathrm{kr})$ and another unique block of 40 of $5(\mathrm{kr})$ besides blocks of four of all the other values. A special part of this issue forms the 56 leaves with 357 enlarged drawings of plate errors and printing difierences in the three plates. Each of these flne drawings is followed by some used or unused copies of the respective stamp. The difierences of the three plates are shown on a special leaf in enlarged drawings.
1900. All perforations in singles and blockg on ordinary, flseal and ribbed paper. The rare special issue of 1905 is represented in all its perfs. in blocks of four. Proofs in black on cardboard and coloured proofs on yellow paper.
1906. This issue is specially strong, showing all clean and mixed perfs. In blocks. On 79 leaves are given the various combinations of the mixed perfs. $61 / 2.91 / 1$ and $12 \frac{1 / 2}{}$. Blocks of the rare perf. $131 / 2$, the rare perf. 10 mixed with $91 / 2$ and $12 \frac{1}{2}$, amongst these a unique piece of 2 K . perf. $101 / 2$ all round.

A great variety of black and colour proofs in singles and blocks, die proofs with centre and frame apart, etc.
1910. All values in blocks, further die proofs with centre and frame apart.

## MONTENEGRO.

1+4. TAMIOIR, E. M.:-A complete and highly specialized collection. In the carly issues the perforations are carefully worked out and numerous rare and interesting blocks are shown. In the 1893 overprint complete settings are shown on all values, as well as numerous minor varieties and all the catalogued errors. The bi-colored issue of 1896 is also extensively specialized, and among the many valuable items are blocks of four of the 2 nov. and 3 nov. with centers inverted. The $190 \%$ surcharges are shown in full settings, and the types, errors of color etc., are wonderfully complete. From $18!4$ onward the stamps are arranged in chronological order of the plates, according to varleties of paper and watermark.

This exhibit is a very deep study of the stamps of Norway, and gives a great deal of hitherto unknown information

Among the Postage Due stamps, the block of ten of the $\overline{\mathrm{jpi}}$ with the red border.

The used stamps are also very well represented in all values, varieties, and errors; a total of 176 unused, including 32 tete-beche, four pairs, and three blocks; 91 used, also six tete-beche, 20 tetebeche on letters, also five pairs, a strip of four, and three strips of three.

The smaller stamps of 1873-79 are shown mainly in unused blocks of four fincluding an unused block of four, a strip of five, and four singles of the rare $1+$ ets.l carefully divided into the different printings and papers. showing how the numerous plate flaws ran through from the earliest to the latest printings.

The rare 3cts imperf. is shown, also the double surcharge of lct on icts of 1877 , and a block of the 2cts on 3cts rose and grey-blue, perf. $14 \times 131 / 2$.

The postage due stamps are shown in entire sheets and the later issues in used blocks of four with a nice page of proofs and essays.

152, PACK, (. I.:-A collection in one Oriel album specialized by printings, etc. and including a consprehensive study of minor varieties. This collection has never been shown before.
153. ToWfil. Wm. H.:-The collection includes: 1872$73,4 c$, part-perforate: 1902 , 2c on 3c with " 1901 " error and with green surcharge.

1\% t. Hontilifis, (: J. H.:-Curactu: The 1873 issue on bluish paper, complete in blocks. Other issues complete in all types and perforations, also the rarities.

Ilutch Indies: The early issues complete. The postage due stamps, 1874-75, 5c, $10 \mathrm{c}, 15 \mathrm{c}$ and 20 c in singles, peirs, strips and blocks. The later issues of postage due stamps are complete in all types.

Sulinam: The 1873 issue on bluish paper, complete in blocks. Later issues complete with a single exception. All the rarest types of the postage due stamps.

1in. WAliRFN, A. J.:-llutch Indiew. A collection of entires, 1789 to 1847 , showing the methods and rates of postage current in these islands during the domination of the Dutch East India Company, followed by the French. English and Dutch administrations.

All the regular issues from 1864 are fully shown by strifs, blocks and pntires. Full details are given of all noteworthy shades of color, varieties of perforation and methods of cancellation. The many shades of both issues of the 2cts ( 1876 and 1883 ) are remarkable.

The late issues, "Java", "Buiten Bezit" and "Dienst", are fully shown, including "inverted"

In Postage Dues note that the 10 cts , 1874 , shows the same minor faults as were found in Holland. 1870.

The full detalls of the later issues with their respective "faults" of each type are supported by large blocks and full sheets.
("uracal and turinam. All issues are fully given with entires and large blocks to show perforations.

Rarities are the $21 / 2 \mathrm{cts}$ and 5cts Curacao, 1879 , perf. $111 / 2 \times 12$ and some Postage Dues in both.

In Curacao Postage Dues we find the first use of the second form of the fraction in the 12 友cts. The full sheets of this value showing types are quite interesting. 157. OTT, C.:-German Stamps used in the ('ulonies etc. without overprint. A widely extended collection of all the various cancellations, peculiar combinations of stanps, colored or defective post marks including several unique things. Also covers, Army Post, China, Kiaochau, German South West Africa and German Sea Post cancellations, on stamps of Germany as well as on Foreign stamps such as Hayti, Portugal, Great Britain, French Colonies, and Liberia.

Especially North German Postal District, and first issue German Empire used in the Levant, including original covers. The same used in China, arranged according to towns including Pekin, rare wood-block cancellations and army posts also select copies cancelled "Aus West Afrika" and with Hamburg Steamer cancellations, New Guinea, German East Africa, Lone, Zanzibar, Bagamayo, Dar-EsSalaam etc.

171. IBAISNHAltT, J. H.:-Collection showing the type and perforation varjeties, make-up of sheets, etc; annotated with various remarks, many of which are based upon original study. No great raritlesthere are none among Paraguay stamps.

## AFGHANISTAN.

172. HANCOCK, Colonel F. H.:-A highly specialized collection consisting of complete reconstructed sheets of all four plates of $1870-71$ also of 1871-2. The 1872-3 issue complete. The plate of sixty types is shown in eight uncut sheets, each showing a different watermark. The 1873-4 issue is complete both in black and in purple. The rare tablet issue of $1875-6$ is complete with three exceptions in black and one exception in purple; there are also several duplicates on varieties of paper.

The plates of the second issue of 1293 (1875-6। are fully represented, most sheets being complete or nearly so, while the rare chocolate brown and purple black (including those on card paper) are well represented. All the later issues are strongly shown and the whole collection is fully written up and all papers are minutely described.

## JAPAN.

173.(S) PFiksHAB, Malho:-Description not received.

## SHANGHAI.

174. AEVV, Julius:-All issues specialized, including used and unused. Especially strong in the first lssue, of which there are pairs, strips and sheets This issue is arranged by printings (groups)
but the numbers of Thornhill are given. The later issues are rich in shades, many on covers.
175. WOHTHINGTON, Ger. H.:-The country is nearly complete unused. Many strips, pairs and blocks.

## SIAM.

176. IKOW, IR. W. Harold:-A large and highly specialized collection of the postal issues of this country, including examples of practically all known errors and varieties. The main idea which has governed the compilation of the collection, and also its arrangement, has been that of determining the relationshlp and order of issue of the various surcharges and the separation of the various settings. To show these inter-relationships as clearly as possible, each issue or related group of surcharges is headed by a Type-sheet to show what types or settings are at present known, and this is usually followed by one or more lemonstration-Sheets on whtch their relationship is proved. Finally, each stanp or setting is taken separately, and a number of pages devoted to showing the range of varlation found in it.

Complete sheets, or more or less complete reconstructions, of most of the surcharges are also shown

Among the items of special interest may be noticed:

The Strafts Settlements surcharged "B" are well represented, including mint copies of the $2 c$ rose and the 8 c orange with inverted surcharge.

## CHINESE TREATY PORTS.

178. (S)FATON, W. C: - -Undoubtedly the most complete collection of the Chinese Treaty Ports fomitting Shanghai) in existence: made by Commodore Eaton When three years in China while the stamps were being issued and in use, the Postmasters of the Treaty Ports giving him every assistance that his collection should be complete. It was from this collection that the list in the scott catalogue was made. It contains every stamp there listed with but one or two exceptions, some of these exceptions at least, If not all, being listed by mistake and the stamps not existing. Commodore Eaton visited personally most of the Treaty Ports and kept continually in touch with them by letter when not present. All the stamps were sold at the Post Offices at face and were thus actually good for postage and not "Printer's waste", the only exception being the "P. P. C." stamps of Wuhu, many of
which were doubtless made. i. e., surcharged, after the office was ordered closed. All the others, imperfs., inverts. doubles and "printed both sides" were sold at the Post Offices at face and thus available for postage. A collection absolutely impossible to duplicate, as numbers of the stamps exist in no other collection and scores are extremely rare.

## COREA.

1\%4. Howrs. (. A.:-A specialized collection. specially mounted, with explanatory notes, translations of inscriptions etc., giving a fairly complete history of ('orean stamps without the necessity of referring to a catalogue or other treatise. A knowledge of Oriental characters has enabled the owner to identify and classify the local surcharging of the "Tal Han* issue and detect fraudulent work in this connection by Japanese dealers. A rare rellc of the first issue of 1884 , and a unique stamp (the only known inverted "Tai Han" surcharge of the printed Seoul typel are included in the exhibit.

## LIBERIA.

180. HIX. (ierorge f.: - The first type arranged according to paper and perforation. Some of these stamps are rare, and all are scarcer used than unused.

The issues of 1881-1892 represented by unused and used. Postmarked copies are rare, the usual cancellation befng the bars.

Of the pictorial stamps. there is a fine lot of genuinely used specimens, every known postmark being represented. Some of these are very scarce.

A fair number of the "Ordinary", 1901, are shown. These were entirely unnecessary, as ordinary and official stamps have been used indlscrimInately.

Of stamps with inverted center there are flne copies of the $1892,8 \mathrm{c}$ and $1906,1 \mathrm{c}, 2 \mathrm{c}$ and 25 c .
181. NEWMAN, H. R.:-A total of 929 stampg, focluding 204 of the first issues. Errors of color. Inverts. Also a fine lot of counterfeits.

183. (MOHITANF: W. J.:-Issue of 17 th April, 1864, "Rivadavia." This is a highly specialized collection of the "Rivadavia" stamps of the Argentine Republic so far as the single issue (April 1864 ) permits, the later "Rivadavia" issues not being included in the exhibit.

An attempt has been made to differentiate between the plates used for printing the 5 centavos stamps. The dates of the varlous printings have been recorded for each of the three values but the Exhihitor of this collection claims to show the procedure of the use of the three plates of the 5 centavos used for the 1864 issue (the fourth plate being brought into use in 1867 ) by describing and illustrating the gradual wear of each plate and retouched specimens of the first two plates. Also specimens showing that plate 11 suffered damage

by breakage and the injurious effect of the ink used in printing from the second and third plates is demonstrated.

This is not attempted in the case of the 10 centavos and the $1 \overline{5}$ centavos stamps, for printing which two plates were used for each value.

The collection contains some $i 00$ odd specimens, a large number of which are mint, while the used stamps include pairs, strips and blocks, in several colors, and many on pieces of covers showing dates. There are also various proofs in different inks, showing the different plates, some of which proofs are in blocks of four. Imperforate stamps from the first printing are shown, also imperforate specimens from later printings of the 5 and 10 centavos. Bisected 10 centavos stamps are shown on entires and on pieces showing the postmark.

## BELGIUM.

184. HEATY, Joseph 13:-Line Engraved Stamps of Belgium.

1849: Both the 10 and 20 centimes with double impression of numerals. The six varieties of shifted transfer from the left pane of the 10 centimes numbered fith plate position, and two varieties from the right pane. Stamps arranged according to varieties of watermark and paper. Numerous pairs. Reprints on laid, and thick and thin wove paper.

1850, Framed watermark: Vertical pair 10 centimes, top stamp shifted transfer, showing double print of numerals and "POSTAGE." Double impression of 20 centimes. Fifteen retouches of the 20 centimes, one exceedingly marked, completely changing the form of the leaves in lower left corner. Stamps arranged according to watermark and paper varieties. Many pairs.

1851, Watermark without frame: Stamps classified according to plates. All the varlous papers noted. Attention called to stamps watermarked with parts of the letters of the marginal watermark inscription "MINISTRE DES TRAVAUX PUBLIQUES, BRUXELLES, BELGIQUE, POSTES." Particular attention called to about three hundred 10 and 20 centimes showing retouching varying from slight to exceedingly marked, completely changing the character of the leaves and scroll work of the frame. The exhibitor was the first to call attention to these retouches in an article. "The Belgian Postage Stamps of the 19 th Century," published in the Philatelic Rerord, 1910-11. Shifted transfer to the 20 centimes showing double impression of numerals and "POSTAGE." Many pairs etc. Block of eight proof impressions in black from first plate of 20 centimes, on thick vertically laid yellowish paper.

1856-60, Without Watermark: Stamps printed from the last plates of two hundred impressions used for the watermarked stamps. Short portrait oval. Stamps classified according to paper. Attention called to some very marked retouches. Numerous pairs etc.

1861, Without watermark: Stamps printed from plates of three hundred impressions. Long portrait oval. Stamps classiffed according to paper. Attention called to many sllght retouches to the plates of the 1 and 10 centimes. Numerous pairs.

1863: Stamps classified according to paper and peforation, a distinction being nade betreen
stamps perforated by Government order and those perforated by private order. Attention called to many slight retouches and to some interesting specimens of the 20 centimes from a cracked plate. Meprint or Government Counterfeit of the 10 centimes from a die never used for the stamps.

## BOLIVIA.

185. TAMIAH. Fiward M.:-A suecialized collection of the stamps of the first type issued in $186 \%$. It is chiefly remarkable for a wonderiful study of the ic green. The various re-engravings and retouches are not only shown in numerous uncut or reconstructed sheets but, by means of single stamps. pairs, blocks, etc., the connection between the different states of the plate is clearly traced and their logical order is established. Proof is given of a hitherto unsuspected retouch and some states, previously considered as retouches, are proved to be due only to wear. The other values are also extensively specialized, the most noteworthy items being: an uncut sheet of the sc litac; a reconstructed sheet of the 10 c brown; and a reconstructed sheet of the 50 c blue. Lastly, there is an excellent display of the famous Euerhardt forgeries, including two unique blocks.

## GREAT BRITAIN.

186. HOMAN, William:-Exhibiting 380 specimens of the "Mulready" the tirst postage stamp ever issued), also 34 Essays and Proois and 89 specimens of caricatures, which caused the withdrawal of the Mulready from circulation within a year after its introduction.

This exhibit embraces 26 Essays submitted In 1839-1840; three "IJondon District Post" cover Essays. being the first attempt at prepaid postage; five India Paper Proofs pulled fron the first plate engraved, two of which were purchased from a grand-daughter of John Thompson who engraved the plate; specimens printed fron the first stereotyped plate, No. 1, 1840 ; two presentation specimens autographed by Mr. Pearson Hill, son of Sir Rowland Hill, Postmaster-General of Great Britain. under whose administration prepald postage was first introduced in the world: two entire sheets, measuring $364 / 2 \times 25$ inches, of One Penny and Two Pence wrappers; two entire sheets, measuring $303 / 4$ $20 \%$ inches, of One Penny and Two Pence envelopes; a group representing a cancellation for each day in May 1840 , the first month of prepaid postage; a group representing 147 different plate numbers; a group with "Adhesive Labels" (stamps) cancelled; a group with cancellations covering 30 years; a group representing a large varlety of advertisements; a group representing remarkable cancellations; Official clrculars issued from the General Post Office at Edinburgh in April 1841 with the new varieties of "Adhesive Postage J,abel Stamps" and of the stamped envelopes to replace the "Mulready".

89 specimens of caricatures of all sizes, colors and designs, several of which, issued in 1840 . contain suggestions of the Parcels Post recently adopted by the United States Post Office Department.

Several caricatures. Issued in 1840 , illustrating the dellvery of letters by Balloon Post, a feat now being accomplished by airmen the world ovor. Several torgeries of the Mulready are ahown. Jubilee
specimens, issued in 1890 , commenorating the 50 th anniversary of the first postage stamps, and the inevitable caricature "Post Office Jumble of Uniform Penny Postage 1840-1890".

The entire exhibit consists of about 500 different specimens and illustrates the earliest introduction of prepaid postage in the world.

## NEW SOUTH WALES.

187. 1'ACK. C. I..:-A study of the Sydney Vlew stamps, nearly 800 specimens, filling one Oriel album. There are six complete plates of the 1 penny and seven plates of the 2 pence. The gathering of the material has taken some fifteen years or more, and the results are shown here for the first time. Attention is called to the strips and blocks of four.

## SAXONY.

188. COCHIRANE. W. J.:-A small specialized collection of the 1851 issue of Saxony in unused and used condition. The design of the stamps is described in detail, and the variations in the numerals of the lower values are shown by illustrations and examples. Considerable attention has been given to the obliterations used on these stamps, the varlous types in the order of use being illustrated by drawings and specimens, while the different classes of town postmarks are shown. The varieties of paper used are carefully noted and tabulated, there being three specimens of the $1 / 2$ neu groschen on buff paper, which variety of paper may not have been chronicled before.

## AUSTRIA AND LOMBARDY VENICE.

189. CHITTENDEN, J. Brace:-Stamps of the flrst igsue arranged according to Kohl and Kropf plus two years of research. There are only eleven stamps in this set, printed from the same plate by changing the clichés of value, and to be obtained for the small sum of one dollar. This exhibit is designed to lllustrate how much real collecting can be done with very cheap stamps. For the ambitious, Scott lists 21 varieties, Gibbons calls for 38 stamps, Whereas Kohl indicates that we need at least 100 . Of these Kohl intimates that nine varieties are unobtainable and for two others concedes that $\$ 250$ and $\$ 625$ are fair prices. Unused they are practically unobtainable. I differ only to this extent that I require 1200 coples to adequately illustrate these eleven stamps and several are missing even then. In thirty-five years of collecting I never encountered the real thing until $I$ wrestled strenuously with Austria.
190. MANN, I'ercy Mci.:-The first issue of Austrian stamps, moderately specialized on original lines; including the rare 9 kreuzer blue, on vertically laid paper.

## BRAZIL.

191. PACK. C. I.:-A study of the substituted or borrowed heads found in the 100 rels stamps of 1894 97, including the substituted head, interesting sec-
ret marks and other varieties to which the Exhibitor first called attention. Shown on sheets flling one Oriel album.

## BRITISH CENTRAL AFRICA.

192.*B.1(ON. F. 11.:-Issue March, 1898. Complete and partly reconstructed sheets of the various settings used for these stamps, including a pair with the centres of the stamps inverted and a block of four the two upper stamps of which are wlthout the central design.

## MEXICO, CHIAPAS ISSUE.

193.(S) SCHMFCKPFPEIR, Ed.:-Provistonal issue of stamps in the State of Chiapas, used from 1866 to 1868, being on four entires, the following values and copies:

One pair of medio real greyish blue, together with dos reales rose.

One pair of un real light green.
One dos reales rose.
One cuatro reales white.
Used and cancelled in Tuxtla (Gutierrez) with exception of the first piece which was used in Tonala.

Section IV. Any single Issue printed from Lithographic Stones or any process not included in Sections I, II and III.

## BRAZIL.

194. PACK, C. I., - A study, fllling one Oriel album, of the 100 Reis, 1893 , with particular reference to the inverted rame, inverted stamp and "printed on the back" varieties. It is believed that considerable advanced information and new discoverles are here shown for the flist time. The number of positions occupled in some sheets by the inverted frame and tete-beche stamps is shown to be greater than heretofore known.

## BRITISH GUIANA.

19 . FFilf(x)N, A. I.:-1853 issue. T'his collection shows the varieties of type of the label of value of the 1 c from varlous lithographic transfers.

Horizontal strip of four with right hand margin of sheet of the tc vermilion, also block of eight, both being on orlginal envelopes. A letter sheet bearing a horizontal pair and two vertical strips of three each, and another original cover bearing two horizontal strips of four. In all thirty-four specimens of the 1c. The blocks shown fllustrate the possibility of plating the 1 c vermilion.

Numerous specimens of the 4 c showing varieties of shade and type of value label, also the retouches. The 4 c with framed corners is shown.
Reprints and proofs of this issue are also included.

BACK, Ls.-The numeral issues of $1866-72$ in fully reconstructed plates of the $5 \mathrm{c}, 10 \mathrm{c}, 15 \mathrm{c}$ and 20c, believed to be the first successful attempt to reconstruct all values. Evidence is shown that there were variations in the arrangement of the varieties on some of the lithographic stones used in Montevideo. Much of this evidence is believed to be new. Diagrams illustrate the make-up of the plates, and a description of varieties is given in detail as follows: 5c, 100 varieties, $10 c, 50$ varieties, $1 \bar{c} .35$ varieties and $20 c, 25$ varieties. Besides the reconstructed plates there are various printings, shades, papers, etc.

202. ${ }^{*}$ HALSHLXIRG, I. I.. R.:--Reconstructed sheets of the $1 d$ and 3d, "Half-length" figure of Queen Victoria.

Close printings: 3d medium spacing, 1d and 3d wide spacing.

1854: 2sh green, printed from wood-blocks.

203. IPACH, C. I..:-The Queen on Throne 2 pence value reconstructed, as shown by ten plates in four states or conditions. Two plates are composed solely of pairs. The minor varieties are shown and explained. All the rare substituted varieties of transfer are accounted for and explained by the stamps themselves and by diagrams.

Five unused strips showing the two types of surcharge and their position in the setting.
207. WolitHINGTON, (ier. H.:-Practically complete, many varieties supposed to be unique and unlisted.

209. FHFIMEH, F: fi.:-British Levant: Surcharged Issue of 1906 , 1 plastre on 2 pence, two blocks of six stamps, one unused and one used. Also a letter authorizing the issue.

## GRIQUALAND.

known setting is represented by types 3 and 7 b , in red. both unpriced. The third or black setting lacks only the 6 d . type 10 , but includes the rare type leb, only two in the plate, unlisted, and the exceptional type 14 , only one in the plate. In the settings of the small "G" all the primary stamps are shown and of the rare tarieties, eleven of the thirteen inverted. six of the twelve possible double surcharges and three of the double surcharges inverted. These are old honorable surcharges. made in i874, for the Postoffice and not for collectors. Practically all of the rare specimens have passed through the hands of Mr. Luff.

211. STOHFH, A. H.:-A collection of the postage and postage due stamps of the $1903-04$ issue, including all types, varieties, inverted and double surcharges etc. mentioned in the exhaustive lists in Gibbons' catalogue, together with varieties not listed.

## ORANGE RIVER COLONY.

212. IOFWY, Benno:-Issues of the British occupation, surcharged V. R. I., in singles, blocks and sheets,
used and unused and on covers, including many unlisted varieties.
213. Hitil, leull de:-Specialized collection of the surcharged stamps of Orange River Colony.

In this collection is demonstrated by single coples and entire sheets the different printings and settings.

217. I?FCKITT, Harold d.:-This collection of Twentieth Century British Colonlals in mint condition is practically complete in all known types, including the most minor varleties of shade and perforation.

Among the notable examples are such rarities as the 30 sh Natal (brown-orange and purple), while in Cayman Islands is an entire sheet of the $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ on 5sh, one stamp being without surcharge, which is quite unique.

There is also a block of four 1 d New Hebrides overprinted on Fiji, the two top stamps being entirely without surcharge: the very rare one cent Brunei ton Labuan), the overprint being in black instead of red. Here is introduced the only example of a used stamp in the collection where we find. in addition to an unused pair, a strip of three uged on entire, a remarkably rare plece.

The more ordinary types, such as Lagos C. A. are, of course, complete. Leeward Islands has a good showing in the "One Penny" surcharged on $4 \mathrm{~d}, 6 \mathrm{~d}$ and 7 d , where seven complete sheets are displayed to show all the various settings.

Perhaps the "piece de resistance" of the whole collection is the great series of proofs and essays, which is most probably unique. Here we see all the now familiar designs of modern British Colonial stamps in issued and unissued colors. In this section of the collection we may especlally note the proofs of Ceylon in black and colors, upon special paper, for the issues of both Edward VII and George V.

219 . STOHFir. A. H.:-This is one of the finest collections of the stamps of the Twentleth Century that exists in the world, in fact, it is doubtful if there is a better one anywhere. Not only are all the regular issues fully represented but the minor varietles of the same, where such exist, are shown. Anong the great rarities of this collection might be mentioned a pair of British New Hebrides, one without surcharge (of which but six coples exist); the Liberia 75 c on $\$ 1.00$, inverted, with the large "C" fof which but two copies exist); and many other great rarities which are too numerous to mention. Although the collection is highly specialized all through, the owner enters his Guadeloupe under the class of Specialized Surcharged lssues, as representing the most difficult combination of surcharges to get together.
220. TOWNE., I. H.:-This collection is formed on simple lines. The owner does not collect the small varleties. Occasionally, as a matter of interest, the collection shows some double surcharge or inverted head. The line along which the collection is formed is that of the completion of regular strafght issues, which is, of itself, no easy task.

A large number of blocks is shown, and the collection is well represented with shades, various obliterations and inverted watermarks. Among a few of the better stamps are Gambia provisionals, 1906, 1/2d on 2sh6d and $1 d$ on 3sh, the former showing the error "Pfony"; 11 Southern Nigeria, single CA; £1 Gibraltar, single CA; £l Bahamas; £1 Fiji, single and multiple CA; $1 / 2 d$ on 5 sh Cayman Islands; $£ 1$ St. Vincent, mint and used; and Gibraltar, 1911,4 sh and 8 sh postally used. Special attention has been paid to the condition of the specimens.

## PAPUA including BRITISH NEW GUINEA.

225. (S) BAGNALI, Chas. L.:-Queensland Stamps used in British New Guinea. Nearly 200 Queensland
stamps whth B. N. G. local cancellations, including ten with the very rare $\mathcal{K}$. $\mathbf{G}$, cancellation. Numerous blocks, etc. on entires, many not before chronícled.

I'runts. Four proofs of 1901 issue without figures of value, believed to be the only copies in existence. Proof of the Brisbane small overprint "Painua" on transparent paper. Proofs of "Stamp duty" overprint and various proofs showing different settings of the perforated "O. S."

1901-05 Issue. This issue is classified under three varieties of paper. A number of the rare Ush6d value shown including eighteen singles, one pair and two bloctis unused and twelve used copies. including one locally used on entire and a unique used pair. The used portion is especially strong and includes specimens showing every known cancellation. A split provisional is shown on entire, half of a $4 d$ stanp being used to prepay the postal rate of 2d to Queensland. This is probably unique. Three vignette plates of this issue are described and shown. Double prints, double perforations etc.

1906-07. Large Overprint. All known varieties included, several used pairs, strips and blocks of the rare $4 d$ and 2 sh6d values, also double prints, double perforations, plate varieties etc. One mint copy of the extremely rare $2 \operatorname{sh} 6 \mathrm{~d}$ on thick paper with vertical watermark.

1907, Small Overprint. Five copies S. G. 37a and two copies 3 Tb (with vertical overprint twice), only three copies of the latter stamp exist. Two mint blocks and a single, S. G. No. 38 b , several mint copies and one used on entire of $S$. G. No. 49, showing varieties of overprint, double prints, etc.

Issues of 1407-10. Very strong used and unused. Two coples of 6 d perf. $121 / 2$ (S. G. 74), also 2d perf. $1 \mathrm{tx} 12 \frac{1 / 2}{2}$ (S. $\mathbf{G} .80$ ) and 4 d mixed perf. 11 with $121 / 2$ (flue copies known). Numerous unchronicled varieties, retouches, plate varleties, postmarks etc. are shown of all the foregoing issues.

Eintire Sheets. Very complete, occupying two albums, frame pate and vignette plate varieties carefully written up.

Oflicials. Several unchronicled values and numerous interesting errors and varleties.

and plate varietles, shown by proots in blocks and sheets and veritied by used specimens.

## PORTUGAL AND COLONIES.

231. (ClliN, Curtis G., Jr::-The King of Spain courtesy collection of the stamps of Portugal and her Colonies was prepared by order of King Carlos of Portugal as a gift to king Alfonso who, during a visit to Lisbon in 1903 , expressed a desire to possess a complete collection of Portuguese and Portuguese Colonial stamps. As the Director of the Mint was unable to supply the entire issues of the nation, the stamps lacking (459) were specially struck off. these forming what are known as the "King of Spain" reprints and completing the collection to 1905 , it having taken two years to assemble all the specimens necessary. Since but eighty-four of these sets exist, of which several have been broken up, they are of interest not only for their philatelic and historical value but for their rarity as well.

244. BA WTREF, A. F.:-This exhibit is the result of a challenge made in the British journal. The Postage Stamp. It shows reproductions of the "Ideal" stamp issued at the London, 1912, International Exhibition. The exhibitor has discovered that the ink of any intaglio printed piece of work can be stripped from the paper onto glass and thus yleld a printing transparency for photography, which eliminates all the difficulties this class of printing has hitherto offered to photography. Sets of prints are shown proving that genuine proofs differ from one another more than these photographic reproductions differ from the originals from which they were taken. Photo-micrographs illustrate the identity of the copies, proving that "Private marks" on the originals are a positive source of danger, as they appear to perfection in the coples. A tablet of 36 mixed genuine and counterfeft stamps is given and visitors are invited to distinguish between them if they can. An extract of a very full discussion by representative English and American experts also forms part of the exhiblt.
