T H E

P R E F A C E,

**T**HE Editor of the following Sheets thinks he needs no Apology, and therefore will make none, for giving the Publick more accurate Directions for Travelling, than are to be met with in any other Book of the Kind.

JOHN OGILBY and WILLIAM MORGAN, were appointed by King *Charles II.* and the Lords of the Council, to survey the Roads of *England*, which they did at the Expence of 7000*l.* and accordingly printed the *Britannia* in 100 whole Sheet Maps; several Abstracts and Abridgments whereof have been published: But length of Time has produced great Alterations by turning the Roads, and the Traveller, by following *Ogilby*, has often been led into the Mire. Many Instances may be found where new Roads are struck out, that were never known, or frequented, till lately; particularly one from *Meriden* to *Chester*, page 84, which is now the usual Coach Road: from *Enston*, through *Stratford upon Avon*, to *Birmingham*, page 74, *Peterborough* to *Lincoln*, page 173, and many others not in *Ogilby*, or any other Books of Roads yet published. Another Objection is, that all the Books of Roads hitherto published differ in the Situation of

Mile Stones, and, instead of being a Guide to the Traveller, serve only to confound him. *Ogilby*, by taking his Measure from *Cornhill*, makes it 12 Miles and a Half to *Hounslow*, but the ten Mile Stone is really on the Heath, a little beyond *Hounslow*; and this Difference is made almost in every Road in *England*.

The Mile Stones are here printed as they are, or ought to be placed on the Road. It were to be wished, that the Commissioners of all the Turnpikes were obliged to continue their Measurement agreeable thereto in a regular Manner from *London*. Instead of which, the Measurement from *Chester* to *Castle-Bromwich* begins at *Chester*, and is continued to *Castle Bromwich*; the same from *Portsmouth* to *Petersfield*; from *St. John's Bridge* to *Fisfield, Berkshire*; from *Peterborough* to *Lincoln*; and many others. This Regulation, it is hoped, will by and by take place, as well as the Amendment of the Roads, by the total Prohibition of narrow Wheels on Waggons and Carts drawn with more than two Horses, till which Time good Roads cannot be expected at such a Distance from *London*, where the narrow Wheels overpower the broad ones, and spoil what they mend.

'Tis surprizing the Farmers should continue so obstinate, and not open their Eyes to Conviction; but so it has been in other Nations besides *England*. It is well known, that the Farmers in *Ireland* used to draw their Ploughs tied to the Horses Tails, and would have continued the same foolish Custom to this Day, had they not been obliged by Act of Parliament to make use of Harnesses. Mr. *Salmon*, in *The Universal Traveller*, Vol. I. page 573, says, that in *Poland* their Ploughs are in Shape like ours, but in many Places are made all of Wood, having no Iron about them: and in the Province of *Sannagotia*, when their Lords would have

have obliged them to fortify their Ploughs with Iron, they chose to lie still and not plow at all, rather than depart from an old Custom.

It may not be at all amiss, in a Book of this Kind, to take Notice of the vast Disproportion between loading heavy Luggage on the fore or hind Wheels of a Carriage, it being plain from Mathematical Experiments, that it will require five Times the Force to draw a Carriage out of a Slough, the Weight being on the fore Wheels, as would draw the same, were the same Weight on the hind Wheels. This the Carriers, Coachmen, &c. won't believe, and still continue laying as much of their heavy Luggage as possibly they can in the Boot of their Coach, and on the fore Part of the Waggon; but as this does not affect the Roads, let them persist in their Folly.

The greatest Care has been taken to make this Book as complete as possible, without a regular Survey, the Expence whereof, every one will readily suppose, cannot be defrayed out of the Profits of a Book of so small a Price as this is. The Method, therefore, which the Editor has taken, has been to procure all the Information he could from his Friends, and from several of the Post Masters in the Country, who have favoured him with their Assistance. Notwithstanding which, some Mistakes and Inaccuracies will very probably happen. He would think himself greatly obliged to any Gentleman who will favour him with any Additions or Alterations, which may be necessary by making of new Roads, for which many Acts are passed every Session of Parliament. I shall only add,

DIRECTIONS for finding the Road to any Place to which the Traveller wants to go, *viz.* If to *Coventry*, look in the Alphabetical



tical Index for *Coventry*, and opposite to it you are directed to page 66, where you will find the Road to *Coventry*: the rest of the Pages referred to, shew the Cross Roads from *Coventry* to *Cambridge, Gloucester, Hereford, Leicester, Worcester, Droitwich, Oxford, Banbury, Derby, &c.*

If you want to go to a Place not in a high Road, *viz.* to *Aldborough* in *Yorkshire*, the Alphabet shews, that it is one Mile East of *Boroughbridge*, the high Road to which from *London* you will find in page 35.

But as it is impossible to lay down all the Cross-Roads, that every Man may have Occasion to go (as a Thousand Men may each have a different Way to travel) therefore a Map is added, that if you do not find in the Book the Road you would go, by finding in the Map the Place you are at, and whither you would go, you will presently see what Road will bring you thither. For Example, Would you go from *Ipswich* to *York*; you will find by the Map your Road is by *Bury, Ely, and Peterborough* to *Stamford*, when you are in the high *London* Road to *York*.

All Northerly and Easterly Winds are called *Winds above*, then your Passage must be on the Flood, or coming in of the Tide, and then but five Hours Passage.

When the Wind and Tide go both one Way, there is no passing over.

It is computed, passing *Aust* and the New Passage varies half an Hour; so that when the Tide is coming in, and the *Wind above*, you may pass at the New Passage half an Hour sooner than at *Aust*; but the Tide going out, and the *Wind below*, then at *Aust* half an Hour before the New.

The Mail Roads, with their Stages, are begun from the *General Post Office* in *Lombard Street*, where Persons that ride Post, or with the Mail, must take out Warrants. For the first they must pay 3<sup>s</sup>. 6d. and for going with the Mail 5s. 6d. with the last they must travel Night and Day.

The Postmaster-General, or his Deputies, shall receive of every Person that they shall furnish with Horses and Furniture, or with Horses, Furniture, and Guide, to ride Post in any of the Post-Roads of *Great-Britain* or *Ireland*, Three-pence *British* Money, for each Horse-hire for every *English* Mile, and Four-pence for the Guide of every Stage; but shall not charge any Person riding Post for the carrying any Bundle or Parcel along with him, so as the same exceed not the Weight of Eighty Pounds *Averdupois*, to be laid on Horse rid by the Guide; and no Deputy is obliged to carry above that Weight for any Person riding Post.

That if any Deputy-Postmaster in any of His Majesty's Dominions, doth not, or cannot, furnish any Person riding Post with sufficient Horses within the Space of half an Hour after demand, such Person is at Liberty to provide himself as well as he can to the next Stage, and so at every Stage where he shall not be furnished; and the Person who shall furnish such Horses, shall not be liable to any Penalty contained in the said Act by reason thereof.

But if through Default or Neglect of the Deputy Postmaster, the Person riding Post shall fail of being furnished with sufficient Horses after Demand as aforesaid, then the Deputy Postmaster so offending, shall, in every such Case, forfeit Five Pounds, one Moiety to the King, and the other to the Person that shall sue for the same.

And

And the Deputy Postmasters, by Instructions of the Postmaster-General, are to have ready at all Times Servants above the Age of fourteen Years, to ride with and carry Mails and Expresses, and to serve as a Guide with his Horn, to all Persons riding Post; and that such Servants do ride all the Year after the Rate of five Miles an Hour, and wind their Horns once in every Mile, and three Times in every Town and Village, and upon meeting of any Passenger upon the Road.

**W**HEREAS by an Order from the Post-Master General, bearing Date the Eleventh of March, 1684-5, all Carriers, Stage Coaches, Higglers, and Drivers of Pack-Horses, are forbidden to carry, or re-carry, any Letter, or Packet of Letters (except what concerns their Pack) upon the Penalties therein expressed: Therefore, for the better Accommodation of all Persons in their Correspondency, there are *Foot Posts* settled for the collecting and delivering of all Letters, as well for the General Post-Office, as others to those Towns round London, branched out from the Six Offices as followeth, viz.

## Some useful Rules for Riding, drawn from Nature and Experience.

**T**HE things principally used for helps, are corrections and cherishing; which may be reduced to these three heads (viz. the voice, hand and leg. When you would help your horse with your voice, it must be in a mild and cheerful tone, as thus, So then! Well done! But speak with a mild and sweet voice, at the same time inclining or bending your body to, and gently patting or stroaking him on the neck or shoulders. As the hand and bridle are the chief instruments in managing a horse, it is necessary to be a little particular on this head. If a rider would mount a horse properly, he is not to stand near the hinder part of the horse, with the bridle at a great length in his right hand; for so you are liable to be kicked, or the horse may go on and play his gambols before you can shorten the rein to prevent him. If you would mount with ease and safety stand rather before the stirrup, than behind it. Then with your left hand take the bridle short and the mane together, help yourself into the stirrup with your right, so that in mounting your toe does not touch the horse. Your foot being in the stirrup, raise yourself till you face the side of the horse and look directly across the saddle, then with your right hand lay hold of the hinder part of the saddle, and with your left lift yourself into it. Thus having a sure hold with both hands, you may either dismount safely, or throw yourself upon him and be seated in the saddle.

When you quit your horse, hold the bridle and mane in the same manner as when you mounted; hold the pommel of the saddle with your left hand to raise yourself, bring your right leg over the horse's back, let your right hand hold the hind part of the saddle, and stand a moment on your stirrup, just as when you mounted. But beware in dismounting you bend not your right knee, for fear your spur should touch the horse.

Let your position on the saddle be square, and the purchase of the bridle such as not to pull your shoulder. Let your body be in such an even posture as if you held a rein in each hand. Your hand must be perpendicular, the thumb uppermost upon the bridle. Your wrist should bend a little outward, and in pulling the bridle lift your hand towards your breast. Let the bridle be of such a length that if the horse stumbles you can raise his head and support it with your arms. If you use a curb, be at the trouble to hook it on yourself; for however quiet your horse may be, should the curb hurt him he may endanger his rider's neck. When you fix the curb turn the chain to the right, and the links will easily unfold. Let the chain be put on so loose as not to press upon his jaw till the reins are lightly pulled.



If your horse is of a quiet temper, and has been taught to stand still when mounted, a groom to hold him is useless; however suffer him not to finger the reins, but only to meddle with the part of the headstall that comes down the horse's cheek. The management of the reins belong only to the rider; and to hold a horse by the curb (which always gives him pain) when he is to stand still, is therefore improper.

The next thing that comes under our consideration is the leg, which includes the calves, the heels, the stirrup and the spur. As soon as a rider is mounted, let him sit quietly a few moments, lest any sudden motion should disorder or disturb him, till he is well settled in the saddle, with his nose directly opposite the horse's ears, his legs hanging strait down, neither thrusting forward the toe, nor lifting up the heel, but with the ball of his foot flat in the stirrup, as if he stood upon the ground; the stirrups rather short than long, winding his toes somewhat nearer the horse's sides than the heels, holding the reins even with his crest, the thighs and knees close to the saddle, sitting with his body erect, his ridge bone answering to the ridge-bone of the horse; so that the horse and rider may seem as one body in all motions. If your horse is vicious, stops short, or by rising and kicking endeavours to throw you off, you must not bend your body forward, as is commonly practised in those cases, because that motion throws the breech backwards and moves you from your fork or twist, and casts you out of your seat. But the right way to keep your seat, or to recover it when lost, is to advance the lower part of your body, and to bend back your shoulders and upper part.

In flying or standing leaps, a horseman's best security is the bending back of the body. The rising of the horse does not affect the rider's seat; he is chiefly to guard against the lash of the animal's hind legs, which is best done by inclining the body backwards. Observe farther, that your legs and thighs are not to be stiffened and as it were braced up, but your loins should be lax and pliable, like the coachman's upon the box. By sitting thus loosely every rough motion of the horse will be eluded; but the usual method of fixing the knees, only serves in great shocks to assist the violence of the fall. To save yourself from being hurt in this case, you must yield a little to the horse's motion, by which means you will secure your seat, which an unskilful horseman loses by striving to fix himself. Another rule is, not to stretch out your legs before; because in so doing you are pushed on the back of the saddle; nor must you gather up your knees, as if you was riding on a pack, for then your thighs are thrown upwards. Let your legs hang perpendicular, and the hollow or inner part of your thighs grasp the saddle, yet so as to keep your body in a right peise. This will be a means to keep

Keep your spurs from the horse's sides, and to bring your toe in properly. Let your heels hang strait down, for while your heels are in this position, there is no danger of your falling. This will secure the seat, especially if assisted by the bend of the back, to those who stand firm in their stirrups on a full gallop, or full trot.

The length of your stirrups must be determined by your seat. If a more precise exactness is required, then let the length of your stirrups (of a hunting saddle) be so proportioned, that when you stand on them there will be the breadth of four fingers between your body and the saddle, which should be fitted to rest as near the back-bone of the horse as possible, without hurting him, for the nearer you sit to his back, the safer is your seat.

When your horse begins to play his pranks, or grow unruly, take the reins separately, one in each hand, put your arms forward and hold him short; but pull him not hard with your hands low; for by lowering his head he has the more liberty to throw out his heels: but if you raise his head as high as you can, this will prevent him from rising before or behind; neither of which motions is it in his power to make while his head is in such a position. If your horse should prove headstrong and run away, hang not on his reins by a continued pull, but by just shaking the reins and pulling him frequently, you will by degrees bring him to his duty. Horses when they go forward are so used to bear on the bit, that to refuse to let them do so is a discouragement. There is this further inconvenience in a continued pull, that it makes a loose-necked horse throw up his head; in which situation, the front of his face appearing to the rider, he loses his command over him. When you observe this, let your hand fall and slacken the bridle, and he will quickly drop his head into the proper place, and while he is falling it, give a gentle pull and you will have his mouth again. By this method a horse has been stopped within the distance of a few yards, in the midst of his career when he has run away, which all the rider's pulling could not effect. It is a common observation that when a horse feels himself pulled, even when he is in a gentle pace, instead of stopping, he mistakes it as a direction to bear on his bit and go faster.

Another good rule in horsemanship is, that the rider should never correct his horse, but when gentle means and cherishing will not prevail; which every horse of a good temper will yield to, if he be made sensible how and when to do that which is required of him: but the horse that will not be moved by gentle means, the rider may be assured he is of a bad nature. Whenever he offends correct him moderately, at the instant he errs.

Horses are frequently taught to start by whipping them for starting. There are few horses but would pass quietly, by an object they were beginning to fly from, if the rider would throw the reins on the horse's neck, instead of gathering up their bridles, and putting themselves in a posture to prevent danger where there is none.

It is customary with most riders, when a horse starts at a thing on one side of him, to turn him out of the road and force him up to the thing he starts at. If this does not rid him of his fear, or make him readily comply in passing the object, he makes a great circle out of the road; instead of which he should be taught to keep straight forward, without regarding objects wherever he sees them on one side or the other. If he sees any thing on the right to make him start, hold his head high and keep it straight forward on the road. And if you turn his head a little more, his croup may be forced up to the object that frightened him. Never quarrel with your horse, if you can help it. If he is apt to start, occasions enough will offer to teach him obedience; if the thing lies directly in his way which he starts at, force him to pass it, if he is not used to start, do not contend with him about a trifle.

Though a horse ought not to be forced up to a carriage he starts at, yet if you should meet with one at a narrow part of the road, which you think will frighten him, after you have made him sensible he is to pass, do not flinch from your purpose, but resolutely push him on, especially if part of the carriage has already passed you; for if he has been used to back and turn round when frightened, you may assure yourself he will do it if he perceives your hand slacken, or feels not your legs pressing him, and this at a point of time when both you and the horse are in the greatest danger, that is, when the wheels of the carriage may take him as he turns. Be sure at this time not to check him by touching the curb reins.

The snaffle is preferable to any other sort of bit; but use the curb very sparingly. The most proper snaffle is that which is thick and full in the mouth. Those that are small and long, cut the horse's mouth and put him in pain. In the management of the curb it is not the strength of the arm, but a gentle turn of the wrist you must apply to it.
