CONFEDERATE NOTES.

Less has been said in regard to the collecting of these interesting curiosities, than that of any other branch of collecting, but this neglect is undue, for here we have the mementos of one of the greatest eras in the annals of our history, here we have authentic portraits of the prominent Confederate generals and many views of public buildings and scenes of the South.

The increase in this branch of collecting, during the last few years has been very rapid; from a mere handfull of collectors in 1875, the number has grown to thousands. This increase has been principally in the United States and Canada.

The first six CONFEDERATE NOTES were issued early in 1861, the engraving was executed by the National and Southern Bank Note Co. The engraving is well executed, and compares favorably with the U. S. Bills. This issue is very scarce, and command a good price.

The next set of Notes were issued July 25th, 1861. By this time, all intercourse with the North had been cut off; engravers had to be procured, but the South could produce but few experts, "Making a Virtue of Necessity," a large num-

ber of men and boys were apprenticed to learn this art, their first and worst attempt we see in this issue.

A very perceptible improvement both in the design and execution of the engraving, can be traced through the Seven issues that followed.

Doubtless no government ever issued, in so short a time, a greater variety of Paper Currency than was issued by the Confederacy; For instance, we find in the issue of September 2nd, 1861, ten varieties of five dollar notes, differing either in the design, color of ink used, or by whom engraved. Together, the 9 issues contain 140 varieties, differing either in one or more of the points mentioned, or in shape or size of the Bill. If we take into consideration the various Series and Letters, we will find a total of about 1900 varieties

In making a collection of Confederate Notes, several modes may be selected, but we advise all amateur collectors to adopt the following plan: Take one note of each denomination and design, of each issue, this will give a very desirable collection of about 75 Notes.

POSTAGE.

AZORES.

A report is current that four new stamps are in preparation, for this country, values and color unknown.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Mr. B. E. S., has our thanks for a specimen of the new half penny wrapper, printed in brown, this takes the place of the green one.

The two international post cards bear the values 1, and 1 1-2d., printed in brown on buff.

ITALY.

Two new cards have been issued, a double card, brown on rose, and a 10 centesimo, brown on white.

SALVADOR.

The following is a list of the new set: 1 centavo green, 2 centavo rose, 5 centavo blue, 10 centavo black, 20 centavo violet.

SPAIN

THE COLLECTOR'S NEWS announces the following: 2 centimos de peseta black, 5c. blue-green, 10c. carmine, 20c. yellow-bistre, 25c. ultramarine, 40c. brown-bistre, 50c.

At last, the set of unpaid stamps have been put in use, values, 1, 2, 3 & 5 cents, (We have not seen the last mentioned,) color brown, the design is very simple; large numeral in centre, Postage Due in upper, and value in lower half of oval.
