GREAT BRITAIN. - Unadhesive Stamps 422 R 432).-Mr. Oswald Marsh has shown us a new date on the Provisional Registration Stamp, die 5, with band III., viz., $4 \cdot 3 \cdot 78$. The same correspondent has also shown us a proof set of the Illustrated London News Newspaper Stamps, id. die $\mathrm{N}_{\mathrm{I}}$, ithd. die $\mathrm{O}_{1}$ and 2 d . die Pi, struck on half sheet of white wove notepaper, and surcharged "Specimen" in red. The stamp on whicu this occurs, is situated in the bottom row of pane, and the last to the right hand side. The specimen which I have before me is an unused one, consequently cannut be a mark caused by any accidental means, such as a

The overprint is very crudely handstamped, and we have not seen a specimen in which the " 1 " comes out clearly. Traces of the multiple Crown CA watermark may be seen on the margin.

spot of ink from the cancellation stamp used in the Post Office, or otherwise, but is a clear and unmistakable impression, and the comma (which it appears to be) is produced in the overprinting. It requires no magnifying glass to see this pecularity, as it is quite, if not more distinct than the full stop after the word halfpenny. I should be glad to hear if any of your readers have dis. covered a similar specimen."
G. W. writes :-
"Re Cayman Islands $\frac{1}{2} d$. on id., I have two of these stamps uithont any stop after Halfpenny. The impression of the overprint has so fallen as to leave the over one of the holes in the perforation, with the result that no impression has been taken. I notice in the sheet you illustrated that the overprint was well centred. I have a strip of 12 with it much at one side. The $Y$ in one case turns right over to next stamp."
W. P. writes:-
"I recently received from the Cayman Islands io id. stamps surcharged one-haltpenny, and on comparing then with the sheet you illinstrated in Stamp News I find those received to be different in more ways than one, viz. -
Ist. - The surcharge is slanting, and most of them are so printed that the $\mathrm{Y}^{\prime}$ of penny is rinted on the perforation, and in one case
the stop after the $Y$ falls on the next stamp,
and in two cases there is no stop showing owing to it falling where the hole of the perforation comes.
$2 n d-$ On ont of the stamps the penny in half. penny seens to have dropped and is slightly lower than the word "half."
3rd-The first $N$ in penny is broken onome stamp only.
fth- The ny seems to be smudged.'
The surcharge does not appear to us to be different. the stamps being rather surcharged off centre.-Ed.j.

Ifind on further examinaton a peculiar Over print on one of the stamps a rongh sketch of which 1 enclose. would suggest that this is something like a wonld suggest it only happens, however. on the one stamp out of a strip of twelve. It is the stamp inmediately on the left of the stamp which is attached to the control number. Will this constitute a mmor variety?

TRINIDAD (424 Q 432).-Mr. E. J. Brewer, Jr., writes under date of 18.12 .07 :-
"I received a parcel from Trinidad yesterday, franked with the two $1 /$ stamps enclosed which have the single watermark. The only difference between them and my 'old' i/- stamps, that I have noticed, is that these new arrivals have the words "one shilling" in thinner type.
"I should le glad of your opinion as to how they come to be used now. As all the other i/stamps I have had lately from the same correspondent have had the new wink. ?
"Are they going back to the 'single' again, or do you think that old stock is being used up? "The parcels I receive are all posted at the same office (Port of Spain)
" I thought you might like to hear of this as it struck me as being rather curious.'
The $1 /$ - Trinidad stamps with single watermark have at least once previously been re-issued after the multiples appeared, so that we think it a case of the stock being mixed. The same thing happened with the 4 d . value; new stock being placed on the top and issued first.
In E.IV.S.N. No. 415, we chronicled the $1 /$ lilac on yellow, on the authority of Mr. A. W. Macgregor Frame, but nothing seems to be known of it in Trinidad. Is this another case of known of it in rinidad. is this another case of a new issue appearing for a short time before old
stock is exhansted? stock is exhausted?
VICTORIA (429 O 432). We are informed by the Rev. J. H. Rice that he has the $2 /$. value, punctured US, with Crown A watermark. This value has not yet been reported with the new waterınark.

## CMEXPNESS WITH EFFICIENEY.

## Stock-taking.

Mr. C. J. Phillips, of Stanley Gibbons, Ltd. writes thus in Gibbons' Stamp Weekly.
"I have to give early notice that 391, Strand will he entirely closed for business from the 27 th to the 3 ist instant. This will cause some delay in the after-Christmas trade which cannot be avoided, and I must ask for the kind indulgence of our clients for a few days at that period. This exhaustive stock-taking takes place orly once in three years. During the intermediate two years the stock is estimated on a certain percentage of purchases and sales, which we have found comes out fairly accurately in practice. The stock taking commenced early in November, but the value of the stock books and sales envelopes can only be estimated during the last week of the year."
An interesting contrast is afforded by Ewen's Colonial Stamp Market, Lid. Our entire stock can be counted and valued in one day; in fact our permanent Audit Department's ledgers shows the exact number that ought to be in stock on any given day of any stamp in any of our buying or selling departments and as we now limit ourselves to about 16 ,ooo different descriptions (to be reduced shortly to 13,000 ), it is a comparatively simple matter to verify the balances, especially as our stock is arranged in a remark. ably simple manner.

LABUAN (425 $Z_{\text {433 }}$ ).-We understood that the issue surcharged "Straits Settlements" was first made on 1.1 .07 but we have just seen three specimens of the 2c. postmarked 21 i. 2.06 . They appeared to be genuine.
With regard to the error " no stop after Cents," Mr. Saw Hock Taik writes, under date of 7.12.07:-
"I notice in your Weekly, No. 425, of 16 th inst., of an error having been found in the issue of Labuan surcharged Straits Settlements of $4 / 18$ cents without stop after cents.
"I may state that I received a consignment of these stamps from the Labuan Post Office in Marcb last and at once noticed the errors, but did not wish to make it known to the philatelists
of your city about the matter with a view of seeing what magazine would be the first to discover
it.
"I have also several copies in pairs and sheets of another value, that is $4 / 12$ cents. with the same errors. This was found on the 8th stamp of the ist and 6 th row in the sheet No. 70.
"I may mention that I also discover that the surcharge is not uniform in kind, but are in some cases $n_{1} / m$ apart. 「o satisfy you upon this point, I enclose you a pair for your information on condition, however, that you will inform your readers in your paper as having received this communication from my firm (the Straits Stamp Companyl.
"I am inclined to believe that only four or five sheets of these stamps had been printed in error, and as these had never been discovered before, I must say, I have every reason to believe that I am the only person who possess and can show these varieties.
"I should be glad if you can see your way to dispose of the above pair to any of your subscribers who care for these varieties for the sum of $£ 5$, which I consider much cheaper than i cent Brunei black surcharge."
[The pair of 4 on 12 c . enclosed by our corres. pondent shows one stamp without stop after "Cents" but we do not notice any other variation. The Colonial Stamp Market did not value the varieties found by it at anything approaching $£ 5$. -Ed.]

## Another Cbange in British Colonial Stamps.

(Fronn the Bazaar, Exchange \& Mart).
The recent decision of the postal authorities to the effect that every British stamp shall in future have its value printed in numbers (instead of, or as well as, printed letters signifying a number) will have nore wide-spreading results than most collectors at present innagine. Count. ing up the number of British Colonial stamps whose value is expressed in words only, the total is not much below a hundred. If every stamp in the Empire is to be brought into line with this regulation the change will be far-reaching.
Take Antigua and Dominica first. The values on the present issues, up to 25 . 6 d ., are expressed in words only. There have been enough changes in these two Colonies lately to satisfy the most exacting spectalist - CC's, CA's, multiples, chalkies, and a possibility of unicolour in place of bicolour-and on the top of this there is now the prospect of a change in design, involved by the prospect of a change in design, involved by
the addition of the value on each stamp in the add
figures.

Bahamas, $\frac{1}{2} d$. to is., have their values ex. pressed in words only. So have the majority of stamps of Barbados, Cyprus, Hong Kong, the 18. and 55 . Leeward Islands, 1 rupee Mauritius, and most of the lower values of India-including all Indian Native States of the corresponding denominations.

The change will apparently affect Gibraltar from the tad. value up to $\ell 1$. The same may be the case with Malta (up to 2 s . $\epsilon$ d.) ; Montserrat (up to 2/6); St. Kitts (all through). Turks Island and Trinidad are also affected throughout, and West Australia with the exception of the $2 \mathrm{~s} ., 2 \mathrm{~s} .6 \mathrm{~d}$., and $£ \mathrm{t}$. Others that occur to mind are the 3 d., $6 d$. , and is. Jamaica, N.S. Wales 4 d. to is., the newly-issued 6d. of New Zealand, and some of the values of South Australia.
These occur as examples on looking casually through the catalogue; no doubt a patient investigator could amplify the list. If these stamps are to bear Arabic numerals in future, the design will have to be altered to admit the nurneral, and a fresh issue be thus created. The change may occupy some time. and be spread over perhaps a couple of years; still, the collector will act wisely who gathers suchistamps as are likely to be affected by the change. The first Colony to take definite action in this matter is Ceylon, where, however, the change will not take effect until March next year, when 5 and 6 cents stamps of the new pattern may be ex. pected. This regulation will be considerable, and will fall heavily upon the smaller Colonies, and the new plates will, therefore, only be made as opportuniplates will,'
Not till the above has been mentally digested for a day or two does its depth of meaning appear. It should mean, however, all that is written in this article, although the Philatelic World does not seem to have yet realized the full significance of it.

We have analysed the Quotations in our issue of 28.12 .07 , the last under the old system, with the following result.

This table is of considerable interest in many ways. First and foremost it illustrates the in. efficiency of the methods at present adopted by the trade to keep stock complete (for we are no exception in this respect). This incompleteness of stock is only partially the fault of the trade; the majority of collectors are also responsible, since they insist on extreme cheapness, and it does not pay to keep stamps lying idle in stock unless a good profit is to be made and it is a fallacy to suppose all stamps can be bought at large discounts.
Most collectors think a dealer is making a handsome profit when he makes $33 \frac{\%}{\%}$, yet if he turns his stock over once in two years, he is only earning $16 \% \%$ gross on his annual turnover and an average dealer's expenses including losses and bad debts may generally be reckoued at $15 \%$ to $20 \%$ of his turnover. We know of a case where the ratio was nearly $30 \%$.
In our own case we had at the end of last year $55 \%$ of current stamps in stock, but only $37 \%$ of used stamps. In both cases we believe these figures indicate a high percentage of efficiency, compared with the generality of dealers' stocks. Nevertueless, the question arises, how can these percentages be increased? An ordinary tradesman can replenish his stock by sending an order to his wholesale house, but the stamp market knows no wholesale dealers.

We hope that under our new system, by concentrating our attention on the unused stamps, we shall be able to force our stock to at after the first week of our new system (including a after the frst week of our new system (including a
few stamps) is about $70 \%$, which is already few used stamps) is about $70 \%$, whinch is already
an improvement. The hnancial success of a stamp business lies rather in efticiency than in extreme cheapness of prices and indifferent ervice.
A new and promising profession is opened up by the present situation in the stamp market, namely, that of stamp buyer or " jobber," working in a limited market. Many dealers, who at present try to stock all the 40,000 or 50,000 varieties catalogued by Gibbons in both used and unused condition (nearly 100,000 different descriptious) and who only succeed in maintaining their percentage of completeness at about $20 \%$, would do far more business as specialists in a single group of countries with an efficiencypercentage of $70 \%$ or $80 \%$. It is the percentage of efficiency which wants raising, not the prices reducing. A complete collection, priced separately, will always draw custom, but when its percentage of completeness falls, custom ceases to be attracted.

When it is generally recognized that success depends on a high percentage of efficiency, more dealers will go in tor group dealing or even for single countries, and we may expect West African, American, South African, etc., markets, as on the Stock Exchange.

There are even many collectors at the present day with plenty of spare time on their hands who would find it very advantageous to turn stampjobber in the stamps of a single country. There are many ways of making profits, besides getting first pick (and at lower prices) for one's collection of a inuch larger selertion of stamps. Take the case of a stamp catalogued $1 /-$ A big dealer
may be offered a copy at gd., but he is far too busy a man to bother about a transaction with a 3d. profit attached. The consequence is that the owner offers it elsewhere and a collector with more leisure comes along and buys it. The dealer saves his time but loses his profit besides being undersold, and even perhaps losing a customer. Yet the sane dealer would probably be glad to buy a dozen copies at even iod. or ind. each. This is where the middleman has a fine chance to come in. He makes his profit by saving the big dealer's time and prevents the mavket being depreciated by underselling. It market being depreciated by underselling. It
often happens that where a dozen stamps in one often happens that where a dozen stamps in one
lot might be sold to a big dealer at, say, lot might be sold to a big dealer at, say, iod.
each, it is not worth his time to purchase them each, it is not worth his time to purchase them
one by one at gd. or less. At present, there is no one by one at 9 d . or less. At present, there is no
organization by which big buyers may effectively meet small sellers. For many reasons it is un satisfactory to leave buying to inexperienced employees whilst experienced buyers first want too big a salary and then start in business for themselves, sometimes taking the customers with them.

Our other orders for $£ 2$ stamps have always brought the perf. 12 variety. Monday's mail brought us a surprise in the form of two sheets of the $5 /$-perforated 11 .
Note.-We are told that only twelve sheets were printed and if this is correct we are lucky to have secured two of them. We might do very nicely by putting them in our safe and forgetting them for a year or two till the general Commonwealth series is here, but this terrible New Issue Service of ours again stands between us and a fortune. Hard lines to have to give them all away for $\nsucceq 10$ nominal profit, some of which we shall have to wait months for (we wish a few of our New Issue clients would not be so slow in replenishing their deposits-Americans we excuse but others sometimes delay when they need not. Kemember, we have always to pay in advance, and always promptly if we want to secure the highest efficiency).

BRITISH CENTRAL AFRICA (426 O 434).-No change has yet been made in the stamps of this Protectorate (the title of which is now changed to "Nyasaland ") and the Postal Authorities decline to give any information as to whether a change is in contenplation.
Latest sheets received by the Colonial Stamp Market (issned 4.12.07) bear the following sheet-numbers:- id, chalk-surface A8881, 4 d . single A0446, 6d. single Ao487, 2d. single Ao889.

CAYMAN ISLANDS (433 Y 434).-Our question of last week respecting the $5 /$ : stamp has soon found an answer. The Colomal Office Journal ( $1.08 / 2.46$ ) states that the stamps of this Colony " will in future bear the words ' Postage and Revenue " instead of only "Postage.'" As soon as a set becomes available for revenue as well as postal purposes, high values become a necessity. The same journal states that " $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. and id. stamps of this kind have recently been supplied, but there has been no change of colour or paper. Two new values, i.e. 3 d . and ios. will be issued shortly and a change of the colours of the other stamps of the series is under considera. tion. No change, of course, will be made in the 2td. value."
We may consequently expect all the present stamps to be obsolete shortly and a new set inscribed " Postage \& Revenue" to appear. consisting of the values $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d} ., 1 \mathrm{~d} ., 2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d} ., 3 \mathrm{~d} ., 4 \mathrm{~d} ., 6 \mathrm{~d}$., $1 /-, 5 /-10 / \cdot$
The above notice has had the effect of causing a jump in the price of all Cayman Island stamps and those collectors who had the foresight to buy their copy of the Colonial Office Fournal promptiy on I.i.o8 had an excelient opportunity or fortnight of the New Year.
CUBA (414V +34).-We learn of another value of the reengraved set from Mekeel's Weekly Stamp News (28.12.07/436).
Frank $P_{+}$Azpeitia has supplied us with a hitherto missing link in the new printings of the current Cuban stamps; namely, the re-engraved 5c. value. Mr. Azpeitia nas kindly sent us both used and unused copies of the re-engraved stamp, and the appearance is
strikingly different from the old printing. This is due strikingly different from the old printing. This is due. the peculiar shade of blue ink used, which gives it. a very cold appearance. It is also somewhat lighter than the old stamp. The additions made by the engraver, that are most readily noticed, are two little right-angled ornaments added to the tablet containing the word "Cuba." They will be found in the upper corners, or rather in the extreme points of the tablet, to the left of the "C" and to the right of the "A." The new stamp has been in circulation in Havana since about the first of December.
There are other minor differences than that noted above, including the engraving of the lower leaves at the left, the shape of the ornament in the extreme upper right corner of the stamp, etc, but the easiest
means of identification will be by the two ornaments noted above.

CYPRUS ( 427 N 434).-The Colonial Stamp Market has shown us sheets of the new 5 para stamp. The description given in E.W.S.N. No. 427 is correct, except that the colour is bistreyellow rather than yellow-brown; in fact, the stamp thay fairly be called yellow and black. The earliest postmarked copy we have seent is a correspondent that be bought a copy of the stamp early in $t .07$ off a club packet.

GOLD COAST ( 398 Q 434).-The Colonial Office Fournal (土.08/245) states that "Gold Coast 2 d . stamps will shortly be supplied in the existing colours, but on unsurfaced paper. The id. stamps are about to be printed from a new single colour printing plate." Until recently it has been the practice in the case of surfaceprinted "Postage and Revenue" sets to print only the $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$., id. and $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. values on unsurfaced paper, but from the above announcement it appears likely that the chalk-surface paper is to be limited to the higher values. If so, low values of other colonies, besides the zd. of Gold Coast, may appear or reappear on ordinary paper.

HOLLAND (426 W 434).-As we foresaw, a second issue of the surcharged Postage Due set has been made. L'Annonce Timbrologique (12.07/2511) says :-

LAGOS ( 390 F 434).-Here is the explanation of the J,agos-Southern Nigeria mystery that has been puzzling some of our contempuraries for two years past! When the two colonies were amalgamated, there was of course a stock of Southern Nigerian stamps in Southern Nigeria and of Lagos stamps in Lagos. As hoth colonies were in future to be known as Southern Nigeria, the separate issues inscribed "Lagos" became no longer necessary, but at the same time it was considered inadvisable to waste the stock on hand, which in the ordinary course of issue at Lagos was sufficient to last two years or so. In order to make a quicker end of it, the following procedure was adopied. The post offices in the colony are supplied from three centres-Lagos in Lagos, Calabar and Warree in Southern Nigeria-and these three centres keep the bulk of the stock. The stock at I.agos was divided into three equal portions, one being kept at Lagos, a second going to Calabar and the third to Warree. On the other hand, Calabar and Warree returned their stocks iwhich were of course Southern Nigerian stamps) to Lagos where they have been held pending the exhaus. tion of the supplies of Lagos stamps. as Lagos had used upits third portion (some of the 1o/-remained as late as December 1go7), the Southern Nigerian stamps were issued, and as Calabar and Warree were not so quick in using up their stock, the apparent anomaly occurred for a short time of Lagos stamps being used only in Southern Nigeria and Southern Nigeria stamps only in Lagos. However time has now righted matters and the Lagos stamps are practically finished at all three centres. Probably most of the $5 /$ - on chalk-surface paper were used for fiscal purposes and those of our clients who secured it at a reasonable rate have reason to thank the Colonial Stamp Market for the trouble and expense they went to at the time. The colours of these stamps are doubly fugitive black, green on blue paper, or purple on red

Nos. 4 and 16 are threaded through the white dot at the bottom of the stamp (half way between the value at either side), no doubt with a view to facilitating even surcharging, but the practice is somewhat unfortunate from a philatelic point of view, as the stamps so threaded or pin-holed cannot be considered other than damaged stamps. All values are threaded in the same position.
The surcharged $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. and 4 d . are now quite sold out but the Id.., $2 \mathrm{~d} ., 2$ 2 d.., $6 \mathrm{~d} ., 1 /-$ and $2 / 6$ with small surcharge were still current in November.

TRINIDAD ( 432 R 434).-There is no doubt that the i/- lilac and blue on yellow stamp has been issued, as we are shown a postinarked copy by Mr. N. H. Goodinan. At the same time, it is not quite clear when, as the $1 /$. with single watermark is again in use.

URUGUAY ( 422 H +34).-The following notes on Uruguayan stamps are taken from a let. ter written by Mr. A. H. Davis and published in Gibbons' Stump Weekly (14.12.07/380):-
"Montevideo, 28th Oct., 1907.
" Another extensive forgery of the current 5 c postage stamps has recently come to light, and it appears to have occasioned a serious loss of revenue to the Post Office, as most of the big commercial houses here are in the habit of buy. ing large quantities of stamps at one time for franking their correspondence, and since this forgery was discovered many firms have returned numbers of the 5c. stamps to the Postal Depart. ment, and most are false. Many of the money changers here are allowed to sell stamps, and, of course, this gives the forgers exceptional opportumities for disposing of their stock. In fact, a money changer has been arrested in contiexion with the affair, and he appears to have been mak. ing a good thing out of it. 'The forgeries are said to be so well executed as to deceive even the In spectors of the Schuol of Arts and Trades, where spectors of the Surrent issue was priuted the current issue was printed. The matter was discovered through the arrest of a printer and others in connexion with the forgery of fiscal stamps. The serious attention of the Cruguayan Government has been called to the facility with which the postage stamps are being forged, and they have cabled urgent orders to Messrs. Water low \& Son, of London, for the immediate engrav ing of $7,900,000$ postage stamps of the different values, using for this purpuse the plates and de signs already in their possession. Nessrs. Waterlow were the engravers of Uruguayan postage stamps from 1889 to 1900 , but since then the stamps have been lithographed locally by the School of Arts and Trades, with the consequence that they have more than once been successfully forged. The new stamps should be here very soon.

There is an interesting minor variety of the current 5 c . which consists in the ornamentation on the left side of the stamp near the figure of value forming an S . This variety occurs once in each sheet of 100 stamps, and as only 3000 were printed before it was discovered, it is rather scarce. I was fortunate to acquire half a dozen copies. In the new 7 c . there is a slight flaw in the plate which gives to the letters "LI" of republica the appearance of a bad "h." This also occurs once in the pane. Of the current 5 mils., 2 c , and to c . passess blocks 1 mper. 5 mils., 2 c., and $10 \mathrm{c}$. . possess blocks 1 mperties, as I do not remember to have seen them thes, asicled by any of the philatelic papers chromicled by any of the philatelic papers.
have recently seen very good reprints of the 1 c.
and 2 c . of 1882 , and I am told they were printed some years ago.

According to a re!urn just published, there are in this country, in addition to the General Post Office, 8 sub post offices, 77 branch offices, 787 agencies, and 50 telegraph offices; and consider. ing that this is a very sparsely populated country, with only two or three towns of any importance I think we are remarkably well served.
From the ist inst. the letter weight has been raised from 15 grammes to 20 grammes, and as the postage on local letters costs 2 dd. and on foreign 5 d . this is a considerable concession to those who have large correspondence."

## CHEAPNESS WITM EFFICIENCY.

The $2 / 6$ sold very slowly at the Post Office and we believe were not all gone even only a few weeks ago, so that we should doubt if they will be as valuable as the 4d. Everyone who has the 2/6 will want a $\ddagger$ d. to fill the gap in the set but there are many collectors who bought the set $\frac{1}{d}$. to $1 /$ who will not add the $2 / 6$, so that decreased demand will more than counterbalance the $7 \%$ shortage of stock. Altogether our New Issue clients have done well out of Papua. We have not only sold them both sets complete at a total cost for the two of about $13 /$ - but we delivered them as early as anyone. From $40 /$ to $60 /$ is a rough estimate of their real market value.

BARBADOS (418 B 435).-We are informed that the total quantities of the Nelson issue printed on multiple Crown CA paper were as follows:-

There is presumably no record as to the proportion of each shade in the lot of 2 d . but the bistre shade seems to be rarer than the bright yellow. All are now obsolete.
BRITISH GUIANA ( 424 A 435). - The British Guiana Philatelic Journal (12.07/9) advises its readers, if they want a speculation, to buy the 60 c . single CA of 1903 and multiple ordinary. Of the former 10,080 were printed and of the latter 10,320 , most of which were doubtless used for fiscal purposes. The same journal states that the 48 c . single watermark occurs in two distinct shades, (i.) grey black and brown-lilac, (ii.) grey and brown-lilac.

CAYMAN ISLANDS (434 $Z$ 435).-We are informed by Messrs. Coates \& Marsh that they have received the following new stamps. There will now presumably be an end of the provisional stamps.

Most of these stamps have now been in use since 1903 , a matter of nearly five years, and the above figures are an eloquent testimony to the small number of collectors there really are in the world who make an attempt to get anywhere near complete in even low value stamps. Supposing firstly that two-thirds of the above 312012 anna (or 1/-) stamps have been issued, secondly that three quarters of these have come on the philatelic market and thirdly that half of the last-named number are held in dealers' stocks, how many collectors of Chamba stamps are there in the whole world, making allowance for collectors of pairs. blocks and shades (not to say varieties of type and entire-sneet collectors)? Signs are not wanting that general collecting is rekaining popularity and if it does, how are cullectors to be supplied with such stamps as those just referred to? They are ever so much
rarer than Sydney Views and Cape Woodblocks Collectors of modern issues have evidently got a good thing in hand if only they have a little confidence and patience.
GIBRALTAR (427 Z 435).-We are shown by Mr. J. Ireland a copy of the $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. printed in one shade of green only; the value has hitherto been in a darker green.
GWALIOR STATE (417 F 435).-We have already reported that the $\frac{1}{2}$ anna green " Postage \& Revenue" had been seen by a Continental contemporary, presumably a specimen copy, as the Gwalior State authorities informed us in 12.07 that it was not then known to them. However, confirmation of its printing is to hand in the Philatelic Journal of India ( $12.07 / 447$ ) where we read of the following :-

SIAM (426 N 435). The Colonial Stamp Market has shown us an entire sheet of 120 of a new provisional issued on 16.12 .07 . It seems that there has been an unusual demand for this value lately, and the stock was used up quicker than that of the other values. Possibly it was not considered worth while to order from England a fresh supply of this one value ; at any rate, no order was sent until a few weeks ago, when the stock was on the verge of exhaustion. Consequently a provisional became necessary, and 200,000 of the current design 24 atts have been surcharged "I Att" with a thin bar through the old value. If stamp collectors and dealers should be so unkind as to buy the post office out of this supply. it will be forced, willy-nilly, to nake a second provisional, as there is no chance of the fresh supply of 1 att stamps arriving from England before February. However, 200,000 1 att stamps would cost $\$ 2000$ or about $f_{150}$, so perhaps they may last out. We have gone carefully over the sheet and cannot find any carefully over the

## Reviews.

Stanley Gibbons' Catalugue, Part I., 1908. The philatelic event of last week was the publication of the 1908 edition of this well-known catalogue. The new edition this year has been awaited with unusual interest, owing to the many suggestions for simplifying the hobby. The publishers have however taken no steps to differentiate between "standard" and "minor" varieties and have even added to the latter number at the expense of new issues. We have been looking through the various editions of this catalogue, commencing with No. 8 of 1891 (the earliest we possess, unfortunately) and they throw an interesting side light on some burning philatelic questions of the diay.

At the present time, stamp collectors are divided up into a number of rival camps, the two strongest of which numerically are perhaps the general collector and the collector of British Colomal New issiles. The former accuse the latter of trying to exterminate general collecting by encouraging with their purchases hordes of New Issues, which are swelling the number of catalogue varieties to such an extent that the collector of ordinary means must either (a) give up the hobby, (b) fall a victim tu specialism which has been gradually gaining power for some ten or fifteen years past, or (c) in the last resort, go over to the camp of his hated enemy, the New Issue Collector. The latter retortsand with a very good show of reason-that it is not new issues which are swelling the Catalogue and thereby rendering general collecting impossible, but the over-elaboration in the listing of old issues. A comparison of the new Gibbotis' with the old editions makes this very clear. Take, for instance, the case of New South Wales:
Merived of Use.

Down to 1891 New South Wales had thus issued 47 really distinct stamps, but collectors had multiplied this to 105 of their own free will by agreeing to recognize differences of watertnark, perforation, engraving, etc.
If collectors had kept to the simple standard of designs, values and colours, as advocated at the present date by Ewen's Stamp Quotations, only five new issues would have appeared since 189 : five new issues wo
to trouble them.
If they had kept to Gibbons' specialist standard of 1891, namely, designs (including the more important modifications), values, colours (including the most important shades), surcharges
(without types), and watermarks, they would still have only had about 30 or 40 New Issues to reckon with.

On the other hand, a glance at the new Gibbons reveals the following astonishing figures. The 1891 total of 105 varieties plus to new issues has grown to the grand total of $5+9$ varieties of postage stamps only. In face of this fact it is really ludicrous that collectors should ascribe the increase in the catalogue to New Issues. Of these 404 added varieties only 121 were issued since i 89 r , so that, although New South Wales has been busy printing its stainps on ordinary and chalk-surface paper, borrowing paper from Melbourne, chauging its perforating machines down to the fraction of a tooth, producing different dies of the same design and generally out-NewZealanding New Zealand, it has only succeeded in adding 121 new issues to 283 new varieties created by collectors and stamp dealers themselves!
If we examine the catalogue in this light we begin to see how matters really stand in the philatelic world. Moens, in one of his earliest stamp albums, published probably about 1860 , thought so little of perforation that he inserted a note in the album recommending collectors to "cut the perforations off and gum the stamps down "! Then the fashion started of distinguish. ing between perforate and imperforate stamps
and later still Dr. Legrand invented the perforation gauge. Stamp dealers eagerly seized upon these new teachmgs because they were not only enabled thereby to sell to each collector 2 or 3 copies of the same stamp but on the plea that one was rarer than the others they could get an enhanced price for it. Every development that has since come along has put increasing profits in the pockets of both stamp dealers and collectors, in fact, of everyone who had unsorted material on hand and at the same time was wide awake enough to keep abreast of the times.
In 1891 matters had so far progressed that Gibbons' catalogue differentiated between imperf. and perf.; between the principal watermarks and CC $12 \frac{1}{2}$ and $\mathrm{CC}_{14}$; and even in a few instances noted shades, but even such differences of design as British plate-numbers were still entirely ignored (although probably priced distinctively in their stock-books). Each specialist developinent has been welcomed by collectors because each collection was so much raw material which yielded prizes at every turn. During the last yielded prizes at every turn. During the las fifteen years dealers and collectors have been
buying all they can find, and sorting it, and classitying it with such thoroughness that the chance of finding new varieties in a puying pro portion is now probably gone for ever. If the development has now reached its limit, what is to become of specialism? Will it still continue to attract, now that there is no longer the excite ment of making discoveries and the stimulus of finding common varieties suddenly become rare? Or are we on the eve of a reaction that will carry us back to the "Simple Life," sweeping awas perforations, watermarks, surcharges and the multitude of other distinctions with which the modern catalogue is encumbered

Dealers have, of course, during the past fifteen years made huge paper profits out of the specialist development. Whereas in 1895 a dealer would set down in his stock-taking a parcel of 100 stamps at say id. each or $8 / 4$, his stock-sheet in igoo would read :

Or a paper profit of cent. per cent. As most dealers adopt the bad system of valuing their stock at a certain percentage off catalogue price, it follows that a large proportion of their apparent profits are really only paper profits, and in view of the fact that the specialist development is now nearly at an end, paper profits from this source mnst of course cease, a serious outlook in some cases. In 1go8, the above stock-taking would read:

This time a paper profit of about $140 \%$ ! Inagiue the development that has taken place in the last fifteen years, and one cannot doubt that enorinous profits must have accrued to someone. No wonder a collection like the Breitfuss, in course of accumulation for 30 years or more past, sells for five figures! In the first place, most of the stamps must have been bought as New Issues and even though the New Issue rate in those days was cent. per cent. have alone proved a fine investment, but all this material has been enormously enhanced by the specialist development alluded to.
The fact that as soon as a country is fully developed and collectors are provided with a more complete and reliable guide than they have ever had before, their interest begins to abate leads us to the question, "Are the rank and file only tolerating all these minor distinctions so long as development means a chance of picking up bargains?" Is it not a rather startling and disheartening fact that as soon as a catalogue of a country attains to a high state of excellence, the demand for that country's stamps begins to fall off? Is it not the truth that collectors like to make discoveries but do not want to read about other people's? Is not the demand for a

Modern issues of British Cotonies are can easily imported in enormous from the statistics furmshed by the sinaller see from that "enormous quantities" are not even printed. We will even go so far as to doubt whether many more are imported to day than in Moens'time. Where the Colonies reap a harvest
is by issuing longer sets, including high values. As we pointed out some years agc, to buy a single complete set of all our Colonies' stamps up to $£$ I face value would to-day cost about $£ 50$ and
few collectors care to go beyond blocks of four; few collectors care to go beyond blocks of four; in fact we do not know of a single collector who has done so. Furthermore in the old days
dealers got cent. per cent. on New Issues and it paid to put them away; if they sold half ther impurtation they got their capital back and could lock the rest up as an investment. In Moens' time there were fewer Colonies (Africa being still shurt, so that a quarter the capital would sell two or three times as many of each stamp. Even British Railway newspaper stamps Moens used to import by the handred. This "speculation in new issues "is a bogey put up by dealers who are
anxious to shake their growing popularity. In anxious to shake their frowing popularity. In
igor we were told that "enormous" speculation was going on in Queen's Head Colonial stamps, yet to day Messrs. Gibbous have to admit that yet to day Messrs. Giblons have to admit that of the late Queen and of the eurlicr issues of His

to pay higher for many of these stamps, the selling prices are also raised." If one wants to trace 'speculation' in stamps, go to the exhibitions and look at the hundreds of such stamps as Cape Triangulars, Pence Ceylon, Syduey Views, often gathered together in a single cullection. GREAT BRITAIN.-Kailway Letter Stamps $437 \mathrm{H}_{4} 3^{8}$ ). - Considerable interest attaches to 437 H 438 ).-Considerable interest attaches to present happenings on the Great Western
Railway and there is much speculation amongst Rallway and there is much speculation amongst
collectors as to what it all means. It will be collectors as to what it all means. It will be
remembered that last week Mr. Bevir drew remembered that last week Mr. Bevir drew
attention to the fact that Swindon Railway attention to the fact that Swindon Railway
Station was using Manchester and Milford Station was using Manchester and Milford
Railway letter stamps (a railway now merged in Railway letter stamps (a ralway now merged in
the G.W.K.) in an unknown design surcharged Great Western Railway "in black.
It so happened that the famous Crystal Palace football team were playing Swindon in the Southern League last Saturday so the Editor took the opportunity of "killing two birds with one stone" and made the journey to Swindon. At Paddington he tried to purchase some of the stamps unused but the clerk was too wide awake, although he was ultimately persuaded to show what he had in stock. They were all torn into singles and appeared to consist solely of the surcharged variety. On the way down the Editor handed a letter out of the train at Didcot but it met with no success, the stamp being one of the old unsurcharged ones, 3 rd printing. At Swindon after the inatch Mr. Ewen discovered the parcels office and was assured that the stamps were kept at the booking office, only the stamps were kept at the booking office, only
to be told by the booking clerk that they were kept at the parcels office. On returning to the latter place the clerk said be had none of the stamps but on being pressed admitted that there stamps but on being pressed admitted that there
was a stock on hand but that they were locked was a stock on hand but that they were locked
up and the clerk who bad the key had gone out! up and the clerk who had the key had gone out!
On heing asked what he would do if he had to On being asked what he would do if he had to
send a letter, he replied that he would nse a $2 d$. parcel label, all of which seems to indicate that the Great Western Railway have a very lax system of dealing with letters. However the Editor left a letter to be despatched when the clerk with the key came in and it duly arrived with a surcharged stamp No. 6573. Mr. Bevir's was No. 6558 . Truly. the collection of rallway letter stamps is more a sport than a hobby!
If any readers who live near a Great Western Railway Station and have occasion to write to the Editor would forward their letter by train, he would be extremely obliged and would of
course refund the cost. The Great Western Railuay has until recently had in its possession the remainders of railway letter stamps taken over by it when amalgamating the Pembroke $\&$ Tenby, North Pembroke and possibility that, being worried by collectors with possibility that, being worried by collectors with applications for specimens, it has ordered them to be surcharged and used up. If so there is a strong likelihood that some very rare varieties are now in use somewhere on the system. The
Editor is especially anxious to purchase them Editor is especially anxious to purchase them
unused. If the railway officials refuse to sell, unused. If the railway officials refuse to sell,
they can sometimes be induced to exchange, that is to say, give new varieties for old, of which there is a liberal supply of unused specimens on the market.

In 1896 the construction of the railway from Djibouti to Diré-Daouah was begun by a French society. Mych British capital was engaged therein. Though France pays a subvention of 500,000 francs annually for this railway, it has always to face financial difficulties. The line could not be continued up to Addis-A beba, and the French society several times sold obligations to the Ethiopian Railway Trust (London), and was on the point of becoming Anglicized. To prevent this he Ethopian Convention was signed the 3rd December, '905, by France, England, and Italy. France will now buld the rallway up to the capital ( 500 km .) ; from thence it will be continued to the valley of the
Nile by England. In the last few years the French Nile by England. In the last few years the French
influence has much diminished in favour of Great Britain. A proof of this is the opening of the Gareat Abyssinia, more or less ruled by the National Bank of Egypt. Just now there are grave difficulties between Menelik and the French Government.
At all events, Abyssinia has a great postal future. First there were French and Italian offices maintained by the respective Legations. French offices exist still in Addis-Abeba, Harar, and Diré-Daouah. A regular nostal and telegraph service was introduced by Minister Ilg at his private cost and risk. He engaged the officials-Swiss, French and Greek. Till a year ago the postal administration was his private property, then it was taken over by the State. Twice a week there is communication between the French Somali coast and Diré-Daouah by rail, the train leaving Djibouti at six o'clock in the morning, and arriving at six in the evening. The next important office is that of Harar, where the famous Ras Maconen lived. Following a very bad route of 500 km . over mountains, through

At the stations men and mules are changed in order to proceed during the night, the whole journey occupying a week. Natives specially for the Legations, the European and Indian merchants, and for tourists, who in ever-increasing numbers pay a visit to the "African Switzeriand," To day the Postmaster.General is a Swiss. the letter and parcel post is organized. Postage for letters can only be paid to Djibouti, the addressee having to pay an additional tax. A postal order service has not yet been established. Abyssinia is not in the Universal Postal Union; however, it will enter as soon as it can
give full guarantee for objects confided to it for transmission. For this purpose the final protocol of the

We illustrate the cover of the last letter received by the Colonial Stamp Market from Abyssinia. ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION (436 B 439). -The following further details are published by the Stamp Collectors' Fortuightly (8.2.08/2 13 ).
King Edward VII. Land.-In the Fortnightly of Jan. irth, under the heading of "Philately at Home and Abroad,'" appeared a news paragraph relating to the issue of surcharged stamps for "King Edward VII. Land," the " jumping off place" for Lient. Shackleton's expedition to the South Pole. We now have the following cutting
from Mr. A. Kosenburg, of Woodville, from Mr. A. Rosenburg, of Woodville, N.Z., which sets forth the proposal in greater detail :-
The Postmasterifeneral (Sir Joseph Ward) yesterday [Dec. I8th, 1907] gave authority for the establishment of a post office in King Edward VII. Land, where the base of the Nimrod Antarctic Expedition will be situated.
One hundred sheets of New Zealand penny stamps will be overprinted and sent down to the ceclad territory by the Ninnod for the use of members of the expedition, the 'overprinting indicating to those who receive the letters that there is a New Zealand post office in the most southerly portion of the world. Sir Joseph Ward's announcement evoked considerable interest."

BRITISH P.O., LEVAN'T (438 F 439) -We are indebted to Mr. K. H. Kricorissian for the information that a British Post Office was opened at Stamboul on 7.2.08.

ECUADOR (418 J 439).-The following note is from Mekeel's Weekly Stamp Neros (1.2.08/4 t). -
Hermann Focke has shown us some inore of the Ecuador control marks, now current in that country.
The first has a circle 19 mm . in diameter, with heavy single rule with an inner circle 22 mm . in diameter with thinner rule. Between the two circles is printed "Consejo Escolar" meaning Within the inner circle is the word Quito, show. ing that surcharge is in use in that city. This surcharge has been seen on ic., 2 c . and 20 c ., all of the new issue, and it is printed in carmine.

The new 5 c . stamp has also received a surcharge for use in Quito, which covers several stamps, but the specimens shown us by Mr. Focke are not suntient to give us the whole of the
wording. The surcharge is printed in purple, and evidently consists of a heavy rule sliaped as a large oval, the only words appearing being ireccion D"-
These new surcharges rather tend to discredit the opinion that the new surcharges are control marks, unless they are for official use and intended to provide a way to prevent the misuse of govern.
ment funds or stamps.

HAYTI ( $426 \quad \mathrm{E}$ +39).- Are we to have another provisional issue? Mekecl's W'eckly Stamp to be in the throes of a revolution and some
measure of success having been gained by the insurrectionists, it is represented that the revolutionists are marching on Port-an. Prince. As the loyalists are unlikely to allow their chief city to capitulate, some interesting occasions are anticipated. Further, it is not improbable that necessities will arise for various emergency issues during the progress of the campaigns of the opposing armies.

NICARAGUA (429 K 439).-We read as ollows in Mekcel's Weekly Stamp News (1.2.08/44). Nicaragua.- Hermann Focke submits some more novelties from this country, including 50c. orange, Waterlow print, surcharged "Vale soc." in blue, reading down. A companion to the provisional officials chronicled in No. 890 is also included the rc. Waterlow print having been surcharged "OFICIAL-15 cvs." in two lines reading up.
Mr. Focke also submits a postal curiosity, which is of interest, though not entitled to a place in the catalogue. A letter was mailed at San Juan del Sur in one of the 1900 roc. envelopes surcharged " 1907." The postage and registration required 70 centavos postage, and lacking postage, the postmaster or the sender added six more black envelopes of the same denomination, all carefully postmarked, and fastened together at the corner by a brass clip. The 7oc. being thus made up, the package came along all right and was received in New York in good order. This was not a case where a curiosity was fixed up by interested parties but was fonnd in the mail of a well-known New York house, having business connections with South and Central America.

PAPUA ( 436 B 439). We read as follows in Mekeel's IVeekly Stamp News (1.2.08/42).
"Far Away Papua.-A highly interesting and extensive report on the present conditions in the territory of Papua has been prepared by a royal commission of investigation and submitted to the Australian government. When the name of British New Guinea was changed to Papua and the stamps of the colony surcharged Papua to conform to the new order of things, there was some inquiry by philatelists as to the necessity of the overprinting; and in this way, attention was directed upon the colony in a general sense. From the report, we learn that the white population consists of miners numbering two hundred, approximately, besides a sprinkling of government officials, missionaries, traders, etc. There are several plantations under successful cultivation. The native or aboriginal population is from 300,000 to 400,000 divided among tribes innumer. able, who speak different languages. Some of the natives are intractable to authority but the inhabitants of the coast and the islands are under inhabitants of the coast and the islands are under
control. The commission suggests that all inducements be lield out to enconrage coloniza. tion by Englishmen and it also favours the

## advisability of taxing the natives in some mild

 form; so, fiscal stamps may appear to keep company with the postal issue.'SALVADOR (428 L 439). We read as follows in Gibbons Stamp I'cekly of 15.2, o8/112 Messrs. Whitfield King \& Co. have drawn our attention to an interesting point in connection with the September, 1907, issue.
The stamps of this issue show a picture of the Palacio Nacional, beneath which appear the words palacio nacional. We had not previously noticed that this inscription exists on each stamp in black, and also in the colour of the frame. As two-colour printing theans two distinct impres sions from two different plates, it follows that this inscription must exist on both plates, probably with the idea of superimposing the two inscriptions so as to get the rest of the stamp in perfect register. It is not apparent on every because of its inscription is in two colours because of minuteness, but traces of the second colour can generally be seen.

SOUTHERN NIGERIA ( 432 R 439 ). -The issue of the $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. all green is now reported by the Bazalar, Exchange E Murt (12.2.08/434).

UNITED STATES ( 429 H 439) -We quote as follows from the Stamp Collectors' Fortnightly (8.2.08/213).

United States (Alexandria).-Newspapers to hand from America report the discovery of a new variety of the Alexandria postmaster's issue, showing the impression on blue paper instead of on the thin buff. The London Philatelist just published, makes the following extract from a Boston newspaper.

Kept for sixty years merely because of family associations and then by chance discovered to be of value and sold for $\$_{4} 000$, is the history of a stainp that has just found its was into the collection of George H . Worthington, the well known stamp fancier of Cleveland, $O$.
"This unappreciated treasure was in the hands of Mrs. M. Fawcett, an old resident of Alexandria Va . Recently she showed it to a stamp col lector, who recognised its value and told her so She then wrote to a Boston stamp dealer, J. M. Bartels, who offered her $\$ 3000$, but she did even better than that, in the end disposing of it to Mr. Worthington for $\$ 4000$, and collectors say that in Europe it would have sold for $\$ 5000$.
"This valuable stamp is a postmaster's pro visional, issued in Alexandria, Va., in $18+7$ It is the only one known to be extant and is printed on blue paper. Collectors are con gratulating themselves that it is to remain in this country, and especially in Mr. Worthington's collection, which, report says, will never be broken up, but is to go sometime in the possession of a museum."

The specimen, we learn, is in fine condition, and though cut round, it is lightly cancelled "Paid." This word also appears on the envelope, and the circular Alexandria postmark also fills the upper left hand corner.

Surcharges that are frequently forged in this manner are those of the rarer British Officials, French Colonials, etc., and none of these should be purchased except from experts.
Fifthly: Forged perforations, made from imperforated stamps, or from common perforated stamps with extra large margins, etc.
Sixthly; there is a new and, I think, a dangerons forgery; it is made by taking a stamp of a low denomination, costing a penny or two, removing its value by chemical means, and then printing in a new value of a much higher printing in a n

2nd, PROOFS AND ESSAYS.-I collect all kinds of Proofs and Essays, but only when they are of the same design as that of the issued stamp; an Essay of a design that differs from the stamp is of no use to me for expert work.
3rd, FORGERIES.-My collection of these is very complete, and is kept as up-todate as is possibie. 1 am always anxious to secure new and dangerous fakes of all kinds, and willing to pay a fair price for collectors.

I, for one, think it is the greatest mistake, and is calculated rather it is the greatest mistake, and is caiculated rather
to encourage the class of collector to whom this hobby is very fleeting pastime, than the class hobby is very fleeting pastime, than the class who go steadily on year after year. I am in no sense a specialist, but simply a collector of all English and Colonial stamps, yet it seems to me ridiculous to thus ignore stamps which are actually manufactured in a different way, when at the same time the New South Wales stamps (chalk) are listed, while more than a page is given to every conceivable way of printing the letter $G$ in Griqualand, and the extraordinary list of the New Republic, South Africa, of which, I am sorry to say, I have never yet seen a single specimen! The whole of the chalk faced varieties that have so far been printed would not take up nearly half the space of the two countries I have mentioned. My point is that these chalk and ordinary faced multiples are in no sense freaks, but were made distinctly different by the Postal Authorities for definite reasons, and there is no sort of excuse for ignoring them, so long as in other instances distinctions, such as between white and blued paper, are made and other differences of a like nature.'"

position at the left corner of each stamp) and position at the left corner of each stamp) and
mentions that it was issued on that day, and that there were only two sheets surcharged. My informant also mentions that the authorities had intimated that the stamps would not be sold to dealers, as they were all required for local use, and were expected to be all used by the following day."
We believe it is correct that practically none of anty of the Cayman Islands provisionals are heing sent to dealers at face value, the idea amongst the Cayman Islanders evidently being that they will thereby foster a hungry and competitive market amongst the trade and reap big profits for themselves. And perhaps they are not far wrong, for collectors want the stainps and dealers have no redress against the postal officials. Dealers are in much the same position as a man who is blackmailed and to get the stainps for their clients they will have to pay and of course clients will have to pay too. It is only to be hoped that a just retribution will overtake those responsible for the speculations.

Special stamps have been printed for the new postmaster to take south, and the lieutenant and his staff were quite busy for some days politely declining to sell these stamps. One would be purchaser, more importunate than his fellows, made a

Sir Joseph Ward is a very fine fellow and a gentleman for whom we have the greatest respect. We cannot say who originated the idea of overprinting the
stamps and appointing Lieutenant Shackion stamps and appointing Lieutenant Shackleton as postmaster of an uninhabited part of the globe, but
whoever it was he must have a "kink" in his brain so far as postage stamps are concerned. Lieutenant Shackleton has proved himself such a good stage manager that we should not be surprised to learn he suggested the scheme and applied for the appointment. We wish the expedition every success, but such clap. trap advertising is contemptible, and we are at a loss to know why philatelists are singled out in this manner as "good marks" for spoliation.
As "suuvenirs" the stamps may be appreciated, but we doubt the inference of Professor David that they will ever become valuable as rare stamps.
We must express our profound regret that the New Zealand postal authorities have of late "kicked over the traces" so frequently. it is very bad policy which, while bringing the Dominion more prominently under the eyes of the world for the time being, leaves an is highly undesirable in any country having respect for is highly undernity.

Among the innumerable new duties which have been suddenly thrust upon him by the tragedy at Lisbon. King Manuel of Portugal has been compelled to accord several interviews to photographers, coinage and postage stamps, the issue of which will commence as soon as possible.

As the change will extend to the Colonies many hundreds of new issues will become necessary, although under our simplified system of stamp collecting the number will probably be reduced to about 70 or 80 .

GREAT BRITAIN.-Railway Letter Stamps 4+1 K 443). -Although the Wirral Railway entered into the usual agreement with the PostmasterGeneral in 189 permitting it to carry letters, it was only in January of this year ( 1 go8) that it commenced to issue railway letter stamps. These commenced to issue railway letter stamps. These design is unconventional; in fact, both colour and design are contrary to regulation, the former being red instead of green

Wirral Railway. 1st printing, shetts of 5 in one row with large margins; stamps apparently printed one by one. Design large upright rectangle, with Arms at top, value in centre and inscription below; no inner frame or orna mentation. Perf it Issued 1.08
The stamps are evidently printed from a single type-set design, as the five impressions in the row are exactly alike and on two of the sheets before us stamp No. 1 is in bright vermilion and the other four in brownish-red. The Editor has a number of duplicates, unused and mint, which he can supply at 3 d . or the entire sheet of five, $1 / 3$.
Great Western Ratlway [E.W.S.N. 21.3.08].We have been pursuing our investigations on this railway and the state of affairs seems to be rather remarkable. Apparently some clerk blun dered and instead of ordering a new supply of 50,000 Great Western Railway letter stamps, ordered them with the title "Manchester \& Mil ford" Railway (a line just absorbed) and moreover had them numbered consecutively, a practice which has never been adopted by the G.W.R. for these stamps. The G.W.R., to rectify the mistake, seem to have had them surcharged "Great Western Railway' and in issuing them to stations are 1 gnoring the control numbers. At any rate, the stamps are being issued indiscriminately. First of all we wrote to the station masters at 2 I G.W.R. stations enclosing a dummy letter and 2 d . and asking them if they would mind having it forwarded by train. The result was not very satisfactory; 5 letters arrived with ordinary G.W. 3rd Issue; + station masters returned the money and the remaining 12 station masters kept the money and never sent the letter. We have remarked before that the percentage of theft (whether by the station officials or by the Authorities at headquarters) is far higher on the G.W.K. than on any other com. pany's system. In May 1905 under similar pany's system. In May 1905 under sinces, $50 \%$ of our remittances were "confiscated." ${ }^{50 \%}$ However we sent out more applications and got some interesting resilts.

We found two stations with the new sur charged stamps further surcharged in violet "G.W. \& G.C. Jt.," the control Nos. being 4703 and 4216 r respectively. All the other stations with one exception had either ordinary G.W. 3rd Issue or the new issue with Nos. between 42,000 and 44,000 . The exception was Oxford, which sent No. 10022. The "thousands" known so far to have been issued are therefore $4,6,10,42,43$, of which the last two largely preponderate.
We also had a number of letters posted on other railways, and are pleased to say we me with almost uniform courtesy from the station masters. Readers may be glad of the tip; the Editorial recipe is as follows:-
Make a dummy letter, address it to yourself and stamp it id. Enclose it together with two Id. postage stamps and the following circular letter in a larger envelope (to avoid folding the dummy) and address the same to "The Station Master, -- Railway, -Station" (adding the postal address, if it is a small station). The Editor keeps a supply of circular letters (printed on a duplicator) running thus:-
"From H. L'Estrange Ewen,
32, Palace Square, Norwood, S.E.
Would the Station Master kindly oblige by affixing a 2d. railway letter stainp to the enclosed envelope, and forward same by an early train?"
Except on the Barry, G.W.R., and Hull and Barnsley Railways the station masters are an
exceedingly courteous body of men and $95 \%$ of our letters always come back promptly with the desired stamp. The Editor has kept a record of every application to a rallway company or station since 1898 and puts the corresponding number on the envelope. The total has now reached 19,842 ! With the exception of the G.W.R. and I. \& N.W., we believe that every station in the United Kingdom has at one time or another received an application and many remarkable finds of old issues haye been discovered in this way. To give a few instances, Bradbury on the N.E.R. was still using the first issue red stamps in 1898 (seven years after their issue from head. quarters ceased); the Editor secured them all and a fresh supply of stamps was sent there numbered 124,000 odd. Althourh ten years have elapsed and the current N.ER are numbered elaper 280,000 this old 1808 supply is still in use at Bradbury. Bradford (Market Street), Brockley, Carnaby and Carville on the N.E.R. are still using 1goi issues numbered about 170,000 . using 1901
Cargo Fleet sent No. 125,134 .
As a general rule however it is rare to find an issue more than two or three years old. Take for instance the L.B. \& S.C. Railway. On 7.3.08 the Editor sent out 32 applications and received 29 replies of which 27 were stamped. The issues comprised :-

There is not now much chance of finding the very early issues but from 1898 to 1904 there were a good few, as they had not then been sought out by collectors. An interesting way of collecting railway letter stamps is on the entire envelope and if the above procedure is adopted the cost is only 4 d. each plus a slight percentage for losses. The Editor has abont 5,000 duplicates on entires (many old issues) for sale at 5 d . each.

ROUMANIA (435 O 443).-The Post Office does not seem to get rid of its remainders, although it is constantly offering them. They number about $10,000,000$ with a face value of some $f$ i20,000, there being 2 I varieties. The authorities want $£ 8,000$ whilst the first auction only produced a bid of $£ 2000$.

Le Echo de la Timbrologie reports that in the course of February two more offers were received and refused, $£ 2,600$ from Messrs. Hugo Griebert $\&$ Co., of London, and $£ 4,200$ from Messrs. Senf Bros., of Leipzig.
A new sale was therefore announced for 9.3.08, when Messrs. Senf made their offer $£ 4,300$. would sooner surcharge the remainders than let them go at such a price. Consequently if no one comes forward with $£ 8000$ we are likely to be overwhelmed with sets of surcharges.

These together with the entire stock not required for the sets were to have been burnt on 16.2.08, in presence of delegates from the representatives of foreign powers accredited to Belgrade. As these were addressed not only to its members in Spain, but also to collectors and dealers in other parts of the world, a supply of provisional 2 c . and 5 c . had to be made. The 10 and 15 centimos also had to be made, owing to the shortage. It is to be hoped that another year the Barcelona Society will post its New Year greetings at home.

BRITISH SOLOMON ISLANDS ( 427 J 444).-We make the following extract from the Australiun Philatelist (1.2.08/7t).
We have been favoured with a call from Mr. Barnett, also Chief Postmaster and Solomon Islands, who is present on a visit to Sydney. He informed us that the postal service of the Islands is rapidly assuming definite shape, additional post offices have been opened at Gizo, the Shortlands and Gavutu, the head office being at Tulagi. The advisability of conforming to the requirements of the Postal Union as indicated by us on a former occasion is rectiving the serious consideration of the High Commissioner of the Western Pacific, and it is most likely that the present series of stamps will shortly be superseded by another.
Mr. Barnett gave us a rough outline of the difficulties which had to be overcome in establishing the service, but resuits have fully justified the action of the Resident
Commissioner. Already the trade of the Islands has increased, and the postal facilities are likely to play an increased, and the postal facilities
important part in their progress.
The mail service to and from the Islands is monthly, and the distance from Sydney is 1500 miles in a northand the dissance from Sydney is
easterly direction. The average mail is rooo letters per month.
It has been decided that when new stamps arrive, any remaining stocks of those superseded are to be immediately destroyed.

FRENCH Soudan.-We are informed that a new camel post is to be inaugurated on ist March right across the desert of the Sahara. The present postal service in Algeria extends to El Salah, 700 miles from the coast. El Salah is just in the northern Tourareg district.
From here monthly malls will be dispatched through the Great Oasis, south east to Agades, 850 miles distant ; therice another 800 miles due west on camels to Timbuctoo, on the banks of the Niger. The nails will then be taken by buat up the Niger as far as possible, into French Guinea to Konakry, 950 miles from Timbuctoo Konakry is on the coast, and the whole journey from the Algerian coast is about 3.300 miles, of which three- पluarters will have to be done on
camel-back. The mails will run in both camel-back.

We have ro information at present as to what stamps will be employed. It is unlikely that the French Soudan will be resuscitated, as they are the old Tablet type. French stamps are used m Algeria, so most probably they will serve for this route, in which case they will be recognizable only ly the postmarks.
Algeria has long desired a separate issue of stamps; perhaps this occasion will be mads' the excuse for one.
JAPAN (422 V $4+4$ ). -The Daily Graphic of 19.3.08 reports that two high values have been placed on sale, 5 and 10 yen, but gives no particulars.
PAPUA (439 C 444).-Various of our contemporaries are reporting that the remainder of the permanent set have "now been issued." This is incorrect. Only the $\frac{10}{d .}$ and 4 d . have yet been over here before the summer at earliest. Doubt. less what started the mistake was the circulation of "specimen" sets.
SIAM (436 P 44t).-We make the following interesting extract from Gibbons Stamp Weekly (29.2.08/144):-

With regard to the recently chronicled $t$ att on 24 atts provisional, Mr. Fred J. Melville very kindly sends a most interesting extract from a recent issue of the Bangkok Times.
The article starts by referring to the frequent shortage of stamps, and the reason for this shortage, as follows :-
"This trouble has now been going on for a period of ten years. Periodically since 1897 there have been no 1 or 2 atts stamps available. In each case the public has blamed the Post
but although many grievances are urged against
this branch of the public service, the blame for the present famine in 1 att stamps must be laid on other shoulders.
"The position is this. Contrary to the system which prevails in every other civilized country, it is the Treasury which orders new stamps from Europe; it is the Treasury that undertakes their safe keeping and distribution. When stamps are requred by the post office authorities, a request is sest to the Krom Bat at the Treasury for the values required. Also when sendung these stamps, the Krom Bat, monthly, furnishes a statement of the stock, and when this is getting staw the Post Office requests the Treasury to order more. It very otten happens, however order more. It very otten happens, however,
that not one request but several have to be sent the Krom Bat before the order is dispatched to Europe.

Over a million 1 att stamps are used every year, and therefore it is imperative that a good stock should always be kept of every value, bear ing in mind that at least five weeks must lapse before a fresh supply can be obtained.
"The result of following custom so zealously for a period of ten years has resulted in Siam having about twelly five different surcharges and now 200,000 of the $2+$ att stamps are being surcharged 1 att in order to meet the difficulty caused by one branch of the Government service usurping the duties of another. It is really to be hoped that the present experience will help to check the tendency of other departments to do the work which naturally falls within the regular province of the $P$. and T. Department.
"For such a thing as a stamp famine to happen once is unfortunate; for it to happen every few years is disgraceful. The difficulty has contmued for ten years, and it would seem a happy moment, now that the cycle is completed, to break the tamniem' and to proceed on business lines more in accordance with His Majesty's well-known desire for efficiency."

Trinidad is printed. The blue paper was only comparatively recently replaced with the multiple variety. We accordingly chronicle:

Mr. Tarrant writes:-"I do not remember seeing that you bave chronicled the $f_{I}$ Trinidad single CA on chalky paper. I had one sent to me early in June last year. My correspondent says that they were received about November, 1906, but not recognized at the time as the single
CA, being on chalky paper.
"When I was at the Junior Philatelic Society's Exhibition the week before last I asked several dealers about them. One of them told me that he had been surprised to find some amongst his stock a short time ago but the others had not heard of it. One dealer said he thought it was similar paper to the first issue Labuan but the paper had been chalk-surfaced. If you can give me any explanation I should be obliged."
As we have had the 5/-chalky on single CA paper, it is quite likely the $f_{1}$ may also exist. Stock is issued in Trinidad in such an unbusiness like way that one never knows what is in use there. The Postmaster General appears to take pleasure in preventing dealers from getting supplies of new issues, and no information can ever be had. The Colonial Stamp Market has tried many times but has never been able to get the $1 /$ - lilac on yellow; a year ago the $1 /$. black chalky was on sale; now there is nothing but $\mathrm{t} /$. single wmk. at the G.P.O. again. We believe the f - lilac has never been on sale there, yet it is known in good condition. The 4 d . plate i also was issued after the 4d. plate 2. Perhaps the $t$ I single CA on chalky paper will appear again when the multiple is exhausted. At any rate it seems to exist and we chronicle it on the strength of Mr. Tarrant's letter.

It is worthy of remark that the Ci was not chronicled on chalky paper by any philatelic journal till 5.07 and the Colonial Lamp Market's frrst supply received on 24.6.07 bad multiple Crown CA watermark. The $5 /-$ with single watermark on chalk-surface paper had however been received early in 1906. Unfortunately no $£_{1}$ Trinidad stamps had been imported during this interestiug period, those received during the months of 12.05 and 3.06 being sufficient to last until the summer of 1907 When, as stated, the multiple Crown CA came. Supplies of the $f 1$ received 10.07 and 2.08 were also on the multiple Crown CA paper.

Owing to these stamps not being numbered it is extremely difficult to keep track of them and it may even be possible that one or two printings have existed without our knowledge. The printers never seem to have printed off 1008 stamps ( 84 sheets of 12 ) but probably ran off a supply once a year or so when their stock was getting short. The supplies sent to the Company, if taken from this stock, may have consisted of either new or old printings. It is to be hoped the Company years' supply at a time; the English companies years' supply at a time; the English
have greatly reformed in this respect.

These stamps are remarkable from the fact that they are made from the same die as the forgeries that were put on the market in June 1898 , only the title being redrawn. This fact, if any were needed, would be sufficient to show that the Company's printers made both the genuine and forged stamps; the explanation as regards the latter being that "they were made by mistake to the order of another Company." There are, however, good grounds for believing that they were made for a Dublin collector, along with forgeries of the Kanturk \& Newmarket Company, the printers no doubt acting innocently enough. Anyway the curious fact remains that the die made for these forgeries has now been employed for a bona-fide printing.

We had also supposed that aur was a complete word like üre and it is so treated in all the catalogues we have at liand, but if the stamps be examined carefully it will be found there is a full stop after both "eyr." and "aur." Written in full, the values are i eyrir, 3 atirar, 4 aurar, etc. In our chronicle of the new stationery in E.W.S.N. No. 413 we inadvertently described the values as cents instead of aurar.
Froin the same grammar we learn that the diphthongs $e y$ and $a u$ have not the same sound as in German or English. $A u$ is nearly like ij would be in German and $\varepsilon y$ is something like German aj or English ey in they.

GREAT BRITAIN.-Railway Letter Stamps 445 M 446). - Mr. E. L. Booty writes us :445 M 446).-Mr. E. L. Booty writes us :-
"With reference to note in E.W.S.N. No. 443 , I Withe reterence to note in E.W.S.N. No. 443, Milford No. 5335 cancelled at Portland 10.3 .08 ; also No. 42481 cancelled at Weymouth 13.3 .08 . This latter stamp thas on the margin in pencil 6 stamps Dec. 6th 1907.' Is this a reference to the manner in which they are distributed to stations?'
It is quite likely that the G.W.R. send out only six stamps to some stations at a time. This s the usual number on the Great Central, Metropolitan, Lancashire \& Yorkshire and other Companies. The idea is to keep the number of stamps outstanding as low as possible, but some companies are not so economical. The NorthEastern has always sent out its stamps in sheets of 30 and the London Brighton \& South Coast sends at least 3 sheets of 12 at a time to most stations. A big company like the London and South Western actually only obtained a supply of 3000 stamps in February 1891 when the railway letter post was inaugurated and out of that quantity it had to provide a supply for every station on the line. As a result most of them only got six specimens apiece, which accounts for the rarity of the early issues unused; they were much more quickly used up. Of
course stations where there is a proved demand course stations where there is a proved demand
get large supplies. Several Metropolitan stations receive 120 stamps at a time.
Inverted W'atermarks (403 I 446).-The list recently published was unfortunately inaccurate, having been reprinted from an old number of E.W.S.N. by inadvertence. Taking into consideration some inverted watermarks advised us by Mr. V. Gregory, the list of unknown varieties should be as follows :-

We must confess to being rather sceptical about the reliability of this information. The list of adhesives seems very precise, but it includes six values not at present in use. namely, $3,8,13 \mathrm{c} . \mathrm{H}_{1}$ 1, 82, 83. Granted the right of a colony to issue a commemorative set of stampsand we consider it is perfectly entitled to do so if it likes-there are no just grounds for adding new values nor for changing the subsidiary sets, such as postage due and express delivery stamps. If the values $3,8,13$ cents, $8,2,3$ are going to be added to the every-day business set, then there is no harm in ineluding them in the commemora tive set also. It is rather remarkable that Canada has never had a regular postage stamp of higher value than $2 /$ although there is a
precedent for high values in regard to a commemorative set, of which by the way the dollar values seem to be common enough used at considerably less than face value, thus implying a good legitimate demand for them. The new stamps are to be adorned with pictures repre. senting the history of Canada.

CAYMAN ISLANDS (44I B 446).-After all, there is some doubt whether the Cayman Islands are to blame for the recent provisionals. What at first seemed a clear case against them has crumbled away in remarkable fashion. It appears that when the bi-coloured 4 d., 6 d . and i/- stamps were issued, an order was given by the Administration of Jamaica to withdraw the singlecoloured stamps from circulation. An interesting point here arises. Did the Administration specify that only the 6 d . and $\mathrm{t} /$ - were meant? the one shilling stamps with single watcrmark were the one
issued."

## Is THIS SO?

From the Metropolitan Philatelist.
On another page will be found the views of Mr. H. L'Estrange Ewen on dealers' stocks, as at present conducted. Although we concede that his remarks are quite true, there is still another side to the case. Undonbiedly the collector wants to get what he orders but at the same time it gives him great pleasure to know that lie secured the last one in the dealer's stock especially if he has already tried half a dozen other dealers without success. In other words the pleasure of collect. ing consists in the hunting for rare stamps. All ing consists in the hunting for rare stamps. All hunting and no game is very discouraging work, but if it were as easy to buy every desired stamp sould be very little pleasure in collecting and of would be very hittle pleasure in collecting, and of hose who still continued in the game the richest man would have tie best collection. In early days before the annual catalogues were veritable encyclopedias of stamp lore, Philatelic Societies flourished, the amateur had made a discovery, he had a distinct stamp showing many points of difference from the catalogne variety. He took it to the next meeting and the stamp was discussed. That day has passed. If he gets a new variety he at once concludes that if different from the accepted stamp it must be a counterfeit, or if quite different, a new issue. The catalogues have taken away all incentives to study or talk of new acquisitions. If the cataognes would cut down to lists of designs leaving out all varieties there would be inany more collectors. And so with dealers' stocks, the amateur likes to be able to buy any stamp he wants, but he is better satisfied if he frequently has to keep his cash and wait for his stamps.

This opinion coincides with ours that it is the excellence of modern catalognes which has killed interest to a large extent in old issues of stamps; it is only in the case of new issues that the average collector has a chance to get anything that he can show his friends with the certainty of ther being interested. "New Issues" have arisen to save the holsby. 1

## 1／．Stamps on Green Paper，

The April number of the Colonal Office fournal kes an announcetnent of great importance to collectors．Briefly，the present bi－coloured system of colouring is to be abandoned and in
fiture values under 3 d．will be uni－coloured， whilst those of 3d．and over will be printed on coloured papers－red，yellow，blue or green． There is a small remaining stock of the green paper still on hand with single Crown CA water－ mark，so that the first prinungs under the new scheme on this paper may become rare．
We quote as follows from the Colonial Office fournal（4．08／339）．

## ＂Colonial Stamps．

＂In our last issue we stated that we hoped to be in a position to discuss definite schennes for rendering impossible the manipulation of the values of stamps．
＂One method would be for all the Colonies which employ the Liniversal key－plate system to purchase a new set of duty plates for use with a new Universal key－plate，which has been made new which shows only the head of His Majesty and Wing in an oval frame，somewhat similar to the Transvaal key－plate．The cost of this change， the Transvaal key－plate．The cost of greachange，The however，wound have been very great．The
following alternative plan which is on the point of being submitted to the various Colonial Governments would involve no expenditure except in very few cases．We may be able to announce the decisions arrived at in our next issue．The scheme，which will allow of the existing plates being retained，is the adoption of single singly－fugitive colours for all stamps of less value than 3 d．，stamps of the value of 3 d．and upwards being each printed partly in doubly fugitive ink on the following coloured papers，i．e．， red，yellow，blue or green．It would occupy too much space to detail the varieties thus obtain－ able，but it would be essential for all Colonies to agree upon the same colour for the same，or approximately the same，values．The colours chosen will be seen as the issue of stamps of the different values is announced from time to

It may have been observed that some stamps are printed on thicker paper than others．This is only supposed oo apply to stamps printed by the steel or
copper－plate process，as it has been found that the copper－plate process，as it has been found that the thinner paper too much．The paper referred to is about 25 per cent．thicker than the ordinary paper，and it has been inadvettently used for printing the last two issues of the large Antigua stamps．
It will be interesting to see if other stamps besides the $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$ ．turn up on the thick paper．We were informed that only 6,300 of the $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$ ．on thick paper were received in Antigua，so that presumably this printing will be scarce，as the presumably this printing

＂British Central Africa Protectorate．－ The name of this Protectorate having been changed to Nyasaland Protectorate，it has been necessary to make a corresponding alteration in the stamps of the Protectorate．They will in future be printed from the two new Universal key plates and will be the first stamps to be so printed．The stamps will not be despatched until April，and their colours will follow the Universal colour scheme．There will be one new value，i．e．，$\frac{f d}{}$ ；the other values ordered being id．， 3 d ．， 4 d ．，6d．，is．，2s． 6 d ．，4s．，1os．，$\ell 1$ and $£$ ro． The new colour scheme will be followed through out，and the is．stamps，of which 60,000 are being supplied，are on single watermark green paper．The last four values are of the large size，and have，in our opinion，a very fine appearance．＂

As these are being sent out to the Protectorate this month，there is presumably no possibility of the old B．C．A．stamps being overprinted Nyasaland Protectorate．
It is to be hoped that with this issue the Nyasaland Protectorate will introduce a system atic method of numbering its sheets of stamps． With the nigger design issue each printing had a new consecutive letter the series running from A to I The King＇s Head issue commenced A A to Back to A．Perhaps there was a new postmaster who had learnt the alphabet backwards！

It is the policy of the present Postmaster General of the Protectorate to check by every Geans in his power the revenue from stamp means 111 his power the revenue from stamp collectors and in pursuance of this policy it may be taken as practically certain that remanders of the British Central Africa stamps will be either used up（without a surcharge）or burnt，the latter course being the most likely one． The 6d．on chalk－surface paper，in mint condition，will thus become a scarce stamp．We sent a reply paid telegram to the Postmaster General some two or three months ago asking as to the policy to be pursued，but were not even favoured with an acknowledgment by post；we think，however，it is quite likely the Nyasaland stamps may be seen over here in July，if not earlier．

It will no doubt be of interest to our readers to see this sketch, so we reproduce it. The surcharge presumably was issued on the 9th March, as several bearing that date and posted to me by the Postmaster of Lagos, reached England on the 3oth March. I think the gth March may be taken as fairly accurate."

England. This will probably be of the same design but engraved. Even if it is not despatched for a year or so, there is very little pikelihood of any of any of the Sydney printed stamps being changed in colour. The rumuur that the 2 d. and 5 d . stamps had been issued in new colours is unfounded.
We are officially informed that the only value which shows any sign of running out of stock is the d. blie, of which 60,000 were printed.
From February, 1907, when the issue was first made, down to February, 1908 , some 24,000 had
been issued, but this includes a big demand from been issued, but this includes a big demand from
stamp dealers which is hardly likely to continue stamp dealers which is hardly likely to continue at the same rate. Should however the remaining
stock of 36,000 show signs of becoming exhausted before a new supply can arrive from England, a fresh order will be given to Sydney and the Postal Union colour of green will be adopted.
Perhaps surcharging may be resorted to, in order to bring the stamps into line with Postal Union requirements. The id. are of course already red, but the green $\mathrm{g}_{\mathrm{d}}$. might be surcharged to $\frac{1}{2} d$, and the blue ad. to $2 \frac{1}{2} d$. Then of course the $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. yellow would have to be turned into twopennies, whilst some of the 6d. and $1 /$. could be borrowed for fivepennies. There is little likelihood of any such proceeding taking place, however, as Australian and Australasian Colonies have never taken kindly to surcharging.

CHEST OF STAMPS WORTH $\$ 100,000$ WASHED ASHORE FROM WRECK.
On Way To Newfoundland.
New Bedford, Mass., April 2.-Postage stamps valued at upwards of \$100,000, forming a consignment in process of shipment from New York to Newfoundland, have been washed ashore at the Island of Cuttyhunk of the wryent Newfoundland issue, and were being of the current Newrundardisue, and were being Shipped to the Newfoundland Government.
They came ashore several days ago in a single box, which was cast aside by the male wreckers, but was whichly seized by the women. Many sheets of the quickps have been given away and some are said to have been sold. They are in two and five-cent denominations. One woman is said to have possession of all the five-cent stamps, valued at $\$ 80,000$.
The stamps are not listed on the ship's manifest, the insurance adjusters here state, but were shipped as cash in charge of the purser of the steamer.
NEW ZEALAND (446 D 449). - With reference to the clean-cut perf. 14 rd. mentioned last week Mr. A. H. Stamford writes us:"With regard to your reference to the issue of the 1 d . with clean cut perforation, I may mention that I have a block of six from a new perforating machine ( $14 \times 14 \frac{1}{2}$ very clean cut) which were issued in October, 1906, I got these shortly after that date. The number of the sheet from which they were taken was $1,813,300$. This may be of interest to you in the article which 1 understand you are shortly to produce in the Weckly, and to which I am looking forward.:

We do not know what gave rise to the latter expectation, but we have no intention of writing or publisting any article on the stamps of New Zealand, beyond chronicling any new issues which may appear.
Mr. J. A. Leon also writes us on the same snbject:-
"With reference to your note on New Zealand comb perforation in E.W.S.N. of inth inst., I beg to refer you to the Postage Stamp of Feb. 22nd (No. 21), p. 270, wherein a comb-machine $14 \times$ $14 \frac{1}{2}$ is mentioned as having been in use for about a month during October 1906 [? 1907 -J.A.L.] for the $\frac{1}{1}$. and id. values. I have a block of the do with this perforation in my collection, which is at your service if you care to see it. I have gauged the perforations very carefully, and am certain that it is the work of a comb-machine.
"Unfortunately I do not possess the id. value. "They do not appear to be altogether happy large block of each value from your firm last week, and noticed a decided tendency of the comb to slip from row to row; this is probably due to unsteadiness of the operator in pushing the sheets through tine machine. But the irregularity is so pronounced that many blocks of four would be taken as having been perforated by a single.line cutter."

rather the old one restored, for by the Protectorate, or rather the old one restored, for by the name of Nyasaland the country was known twenty years ago. It was
thus christened by the late Mr. Horace Waller in a lecture delivered in Edinburgh, in the year 1887 , and afterwards published under the title of "Our Titie Deeds to Nyasaland."
When Sir Harry Johnston took up the reins of administration he dropped the poetical name of Nyasaland, and for it substituted the clumsy and cumbrous designation "British Central Africa." Doubtless he was led to do so by the names of the neighbouring territories under the rule of the two Chartered Companies, "British East Africa Company" and the "British South Africa Company." Our British Central Africa Protectorate seemed to occupy a central position between them. Hence the name we have borne these seventeen years. But for the country lying along the shore of Lake Nasa, the eantest know and better title could be devied inal Aat or "Nyasa, what better title could be devised than that of "Nyasaland?"
" lake." Whelled with one s-is the Yao word for " What." is the name of the great nyanifa that lies to the north ?" the reply doubtless was "It's the Nyasa," north?" the reply doubless was "It's the Nyasa,"
that is "It's the Lake." For it is the Lake par that is "It's the Lake. For it is the Lake par
excellence, and it had no distinctive name of its own. To the dweller on its banks it was "the Lake." Thus it comes to pass that we have now returned to the name that in England would be called "Lake Land." But then there are many "Lake Lands," but only one " Nyasaland."
As we happen to possess in the editorial library "A Handbook of the Yao Language" by the Kev. Alexander Hetherwick, M.A., F.R.G.S., the Rev. Alexander Hetherwick, s.A., R.R.G.s., far it confirmed the above. The entry' we found (page 265) was :-

NYASA, a large river.; a lake. The Shire is called Nyasa ja mpango, the Belt river.
We also extract the fact that the word consists of two syllables only "nya-sa," the ny being similar in sound to the French "gn" or Spanish "ñ." Most collectors erroneously pronounce the name " Ni -as-sa" instead of "Nyar-zer" or "Nyar-ser" (we cannot discover whether the "s" should sound like $s$ or $z$ or whether both are permissible as is the case with some Yao words). If the latter is the case English orthography would require two s's in the name Nyasaland.

PAPUA (444 D 450).-We have made the discovery that there are two different watermarks on the British New Gninea stamps. The first has oblong rosettes about $12 \frac{2}{2} \mathrm{~mm}$. apart in the horizontai row and gmm. apart vertically, whilst the second has narrow rosettes 9 and $12 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~mm}$. apart respectively. The variation cannot be produced by turning the sheets sideways as the change extends also to the paper, the wide rosettes being found on thick paper and the rosettes being found 0 a
narrow rosettes on thin.

The small surcharge was mainly made on the latter set and the large surcharge on the former supplemented by the $\frac{1 d ., \text { Id., } 2 \mathrm{~d} . \text { and } 2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d} . \text { of the }}{}$ latter. We have however just succeeded in finding the $2 \frac{1 d}{}$., $1 /$ and $2 / 6$ of the former set with small surcharge, varieties which we believe will prove very scarce.
The fact that the $2 / 6$ value occurs on both thick and thin paper indicates that the change did not take place before 1905 , when this value was first issued.
Specialists who have postmarked copies with dates might render valuable aid in this matter. At whatever date the thin paper came into use, it is likely to be the rarer of the two insurcharged. The issue of King's Head stampssince stamps almost as dead as a doornail and con-
sequently of later printings few were imported or preserved. How extraordinary the truth really is we were not ourselves a ware until going through our ledger account with British New Guinea.

The bulk of the stamps purchased in 1902 were sold at once, only 60 sets remaining on hand at the June 1903 stock-taking, so there is no excuse for the smallness of the subsequent demand, except that everyone was after King's Heads with single watermark. These figures tend to show how enormously many varieties of unpopular countries must advance when they in turn become popular and how surpassing wise is the regular subscriber to a New Issue Service who takes everything as it comes and allows himself no fads. In this case we were caught napping, as although we noticed the difference of thick and thin paper we thought collectors would probably say the difference was too trivial to collect (as they have a way of doing in the o collect (as they have a way oing in the we did nof import it as events we did not in collectors As end probably ou appreciate the possession of the two sets had pprent them. The moral is of course to collect we sent them. The moral is of course to collec very anty, howevit much a policy one sate. But the pursuit of such a policy tends to increase the cost of a New Issue Service

It is possible that the qd. and 6d. may also exist in this set and if so we should be glad to have specimens submitted by any collector who is fortunate enough to meet with them.
Taken altogether British New Guinea for Papua) is about the most interesting country a collector could take up to specialize. Even entire sheets are possible, as they only contain 30 stamps.
The original plates had plate-numbers (1 and 2) at the lower left-hand corner, but in clipping the margins of the sheets these were almost invariably cut off. The only plate number of which we noted the existence in E.II'S.N. was, we believe, $2 / 6$ plate 2.
There is a curious variety on the sheets of $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. blue. On Stamp No. 27, there is no shading on the leaves in the lower left thand corner of the stamp. This variety, of course, occurs on the stamp and not in the surcharge and it would be interesting to know whether it is dine to an original defect of the plate. Our New issue department inform us that they did not notice it, so that many of our readers must have received it at the price of the ordinary variety.
Since writing the above we have received quite a budget of correspundence on the subject of these stamps, showing the widespread interest taken in our discovery and we shall hope to go further into the subject next week.

## Errors of Spelling.

Quite a number of people write to us asking Course, do you not publish indices now?" Of those cases wheare a little knowledge is a dangerous thing. We no longer publish indexes to Ewen's Weckly Stamp News because we find our system of indices effective and very much Reaper.
Readers who ask us to distinguish between "imperforated" and "perforated" stamps in
our Quotations probably mean to say "imper forate" and "perforated." There is not and never has been a verb in the English language "to imperforate" and therefore there cannot be a past participle. The verb "unperforate "has a participle "unperforated," but the latter is gradu. ally dropping out of use in philatelic circles. "Imperf." and "perf." are contractions of "imperforate" (without a 'd') and "perforated" (with a'd ${ }^{\prime}$ ).

## An Object Eesson in Catalogue Prices.

A remarkable instance of the wide variation between the prices in different catalogues of one and the same stamp is that of Russia 10 kopeks, brown and blue, with value straight. In used condition this stamp is quoted as follows :-

J. I. writes :--" Noticing that you would like to know how many stamps the winners of your albums have succeeded in obtaining out of the total number required, I take the opportunity to inform you that my total for Europe and Colonies is 1527.
"Before l arranged this portion of my collec. tion in the album you kindly sent, I had about 2,000, but this included Unpaids, Officials, etc. I am acting on your advice for the disposal of these and am sending them round an exchange club.
"I may mention it requires a deal of moral courage to collect on your system, when one has philatelic friends, and I believe I am looked upon by most as a fit and proper candidate for a lunatic asylum. But while others are buying second rate copies of 'varieties,' I content myself with one finc copy, and should I at any myself with one fine copy, and should at any
time have to sell, I think I know which is the most saleable article.
"Just a word of comment. As you include the wavy' and 'dotted backgrounds of Denmark frst issue, $I$ cannot (engraved) issue of France is omitted-both large for omitting the thunderbolt issue of Russia. I should have thought both of these more impor. tant than the Denmark varieties.'
[J. I. has our admiration; he will live yet to contound his old-fashioned friends! The greatest enemy of our new system of stamp collecting is the lack of moral courage which most collectors exhibit. They are slaves of the catalogue, fettered hand and foot. But our little band of pioneers is growing and will win in the end, just as surely as right methods always vanquish wrong. It is attempting the impossible that causes so many beginners, full of valuable potentialities for the stamp dealer, to give up in disgust and despair at the bopelessness of ever filling bis thirty or forty-thousand space album.

BRITISH SOUTH AFRICA (393, 400 D 452).-The Colonial Stamp Market bas shown us the following new stamps, issued 19.5 .08 . These values complete the current set.

CAYMAN ISLANDS (450 F 452).-The 5/- Postage and Revenue was issued on 22.4 .08 or earlier and now only the 6 d . value is required to complete the set.

There are no "Postage-Postage" stamps of any kind left in stock at the Post Office and no more provisionals are to be made, not even a sixpenny to supply the present gap in the set.
It has been stated that there were only 240 $2 \frac{1}{2}$ d. on 4 d . made. Although this was the extent of the first printing, we should think it very the intention of the authorities to print a supply for each American mail, as required.
FRENCH F.P.O. (443 D 452).-Correction.The new $1,2,3,4 c$. stamps were chronicled in error as being surcharged on stamps of France. This should of course have been "stamps of Freach P.O. Morocco" which are of the same design but inscribed "Maroc" instead of "Postes."

"I have the honour to enclose you a set of three unused stamps that have just been issued by 'The Labrador Company,' of American origin; they are intended to frank letters and parcels both to and from Labrador.
"The said Company have received a Charter from the Governments of the United States and Newfoundland to develop the country, on the condition that a postal service to various parts of Labrador is kept in operation during the navigable season

the Company."
Our contemporary goes on to state the stamps are absolutely hideous, and are badly printed in very unsuitable colours: the 5c. portrays a seal; the 25 c . an Esquimaux; and the \$1 bears a faint resemblance to a map.

Later on we hope to be able to give further particulars about this "Company," but its chief object appears to be exploitation of collectors. We hope that none of our readers will be tempted to buy this bogus rubbish.

In a parcel of common used Canadian stamps offered to the Colonial Stamp Market recently, there were some of these stamps on pieces of envelope and cancelled with (apparently) a piece of cork on which three or four straight bars had been cut. We can testify to the hideousness of the labels and vulgarity of the colouring and there was some evidence that the labels had been attached to the pieces of envelope after the latter had been through the post. One was evidently a U.S.A. official envelope marked "On postal business only-Free."

"We all appear to be on the outlook for something new in 'Papuans.' Would you consider the $2 \frac{1}{2}$ d. type I , narrow rosettes, below described, a variety or rather a series of varieties all in one, viz. : bottom loop of $S$ of postage on N..East corner missing ; No. 2, the crossbar of $T$ so faint as to appear non-existant, except with magnifier : No. 3, no crossbar in A of Postage ; No. 4, the bottom of $G$ which distinguishes it from $C$ is missing, and it is a $C$ with the bottom curve very faint; No. 5, the final $E$ is an $F$, all in the word postage in the N..East corner, as above described. This much you would say ought to be enough on one stamp, but I have not done yet, there are four large leaves over the value and three of these are a white mass, only defined by the outline, on the lower right hand corner, you chronicle it this week on the left hand corner (or something similar).
"I have also $\frac{1}{2}$ d. type 2 , with similar leaves to the $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. above described and in same position."

In these latter stamps the bar is intended to cross out the word Oficial but from specimens of all three shades kindly shown to us by Mr. A. H. Thompson we can testify to the fact that it rarely succeeds in getting even near it.
Mr. Thompson has also shown tis copies of the 5 c . on 2 c . red and 5 c . on 2 c . green (clironicled in E.W.S.N. Nos. 413 and 427) without the figure " 5 " in the surcharge (which is otherwise similar to that illustrated above). Its omission is obviously an error as "Habilitado en Centavos" is meaningless.

Crown is altogether rounder, and is quite separate from the "A." This new watermark must not be confused with the Crown and single-lined $A$ of the Australian Commonwealth and New South Wales. Unfortunately, in the Catalogue, as Type 29, we illustrate the latter watermark, instead of the former, the new one. To remove all doubt we would make it quite clear that in every Queensiand stamp described as being watermarked Crown and single-lined A, the new watermark illustrated below is intended; this remark applies equally to the four high values- $\mathbf{2 8 .}$. 6d.t, $5 \mathrm{~s} . \mathrm{t}$, ios., and ${ }_{23 \mathrm{E}}^{\mathrm{E}, \text {, and also in our }}$ chen catalogue as Nos. 229, 230, and stamps have the new watermark, Crown and single. lined A, twice sideways.
The perforating of the new issue is also worthy of comment; it is done by a comb-machine, gauging left-hand side of the sheet ; it is worked across the sheet vertically from left to right, so that the left-hand margin is unperforated, while the right-hand margin shows horizontal lines of perforation. The top and bottom margins are perforated to within a quarter of an inch of the edge in each case.
Referring again to the four high values, three of which are catalogued under the numbers above, we are now able to state that the perforating was the work of a single-line macinine, gauging from $12 \frac{2}{2}$ to 13 .

TRINIDAD (447 U 452). -We are informed that the last supply of the $£$ I stamps received in the colony came to hand in September 1907. As this stamp was chronicled in 5.07 on multiple watermark chalk-surfaced paper, the previous supply as well as that of 9.07 must have consisted of this variety. We should think Trinidad does not require $f$ stamps printed more than once a
year, so that this would carry us back to the end year, so that this would carry us back to the end
of 1006 . As late as 3.06 the Colonial Stamp of 1006 . As late as 3.06 the Colonial Stamp Market was receiving this value on ordinary single Crown CA paper, so that presumably the same variety chalk-surfaced was sent out at the end of 1905 or the beginning of 1906 and was in use during the summer of 1906 .
The Postmaster.General still adheres to his statement that he has no $1 /$ - lilac on yellow stamps in stock, but as he franks his letter with one and sends us a large supply inside, it is evident that he has a different opinion to us as to what colour lilac is. On a yellow ground lilac looks brown and we believe all the stamps recently chronicled as brown on yellow would be more properly described as lilac on yellow.

## What is this Stamp Worth?

HERE is another remarkable instance of varying catalogue prices.

The collector who buys at "half-catalogue" in Germany will thus be paying $2 \frac{1}{2}$ times the English catalogue price. It is again noticeable how the catalogues of each country follow one another in the matter of pricing.

The Colonial Stamp Market's buying rate for this stamp is $2 /$. but, perhaps, it is needless to state no transactions have taken place. The collector or dealer who has any naturally sends them on to the Continent, where he will do much better, even if be gets only a third or a quarter of the quotations ruling there. On the other hand, if an English dealer attempts to compete with the Continent by offering say $3 /$ - or $4 /$. apiece for the stamp, how is he to make a profit? If he attempts to sell it in this country he will be told it is too dear by his clients, whose com plete ignorance of its international market value does not prevent them from expressing a very decided opinion. Their only argument is that it catalogued so much by' so-and-so, and they seem to think that is the beginning and end of the discussion.
It will be seen from the above example that a collector inay often make a better bargain by paying full catalogue price than by buying at Endin the case of the above stamp the English collector buying at "full catalogue" is better off than the German collector paying half yet the latter is probably pleased with his "bargann" whinst the former is grumbling at the dearness of his acquisition
It is very often a fact that a collector who only buys at half-catalogue makes a worse investment than one who pays full price. It stands to reason that a dealer who sells at a big reduction must stock in a large proportion those stamps which are falling in value or stamps which are quoted above their international market value; stamps which he knows to be rising in value he keeps in his safe, whilst those which are quoted higher in foreign catalogues he sells abroad. The collector who buys at a big discount off catalogue is thus filling up his collection with stamps which are falling in value if only he knew it. The collector who only asks a moderate discount from catalogue gets a much wider choice of stamps, if he is wide-awake But as few collectors are competent enough to know what is going up, they can only be sure of not missing the good ones by insisting on of not missing
completeness.

To checkmate this some genius invented the collection of perforations, watermarks, shades, surcharges, etc., whereby the catalogne would be swollen to such an extent that completeness would be rendered impossible

It is to checkmate this genius in his turn that we have invented our simplified system of stamp collecting. An almost complete collection is brought within the bounds of possibility to every. one who can afford to spend ro/-a week on stamps and even schoolboys can get three-quarters of the known varieties. Roughly, a third of the stamps in this list are worth more than catalogue price and another third are not worth half. Collectors who want to know which are which, would do well to study the list appearing in E.W.S.N., as it is being thoroughly revised on an inter. national basis.
Our great difficulty in connection with our Quotations is that there are either no stamps to be bought or else collectors mix them up with a quantity of duplicates distinguistied by perforations, watermarks, etc., and refuse to separate them. Our difficulty will be appreciated by anyone who has looked through an average Exchange Club packet. Nearly everything is labelled " rare shade," " scarce unused," "the rare perf.," "single watermark," etc., and a generous addition to the price of the stamp
made. When a real stamp is at last found it is generally slightly defective, off-centre or heavily cancelled. If it is a fine copy it is probably a postage due, fiscal-postal official stamp or non-adhesive or something else we don't list! Collectors who try to obtain the gooo different and real stamps listed in our Quotations will be surprised at the difficulty of getting complete, in fine condition, notwithstanding the fact that the bulk of the stamps are quoted under a shilling. But if this difficulty is overcome the owner will find he has a first-class investment.

## Stamps of Esthonia.

A Norwegian dealer sends us a fine strip of hree of the seven rombles Finland of the 1891 issue (the Russian design with dots and circles) on "piece of original." What striack us as remarkable was the thinness of the paper, which would be quite useless as a wrapping material for a registered packet requiring 44/- postage.
The letter is addressed in Russian "to the Hon. Gustav Petrovitch Millender, Vezenberg," and is marked "Registered." It bears a red regis. tration label "Z. 245-Bieloostrov P.O." of the design used in Russia. It is therefore certain esign used in Russia. It is therem Bieloostrov to Vezenberg.
How then does it come to be franked with Finnish stamps? Bieloostrov is presumably in Russia and Vezeriberg we know to be in Esthonia.
Lastly, the most suspicious circumstance of all, the stamps are cancelled *Vezenberg " (the town of destination instead of despatch) and the date is 3.4 .08 , only six weeks ago! These stamps were supposed to have become obsolete years ago. The same postmark "Vezenberg 3.4.08" occurs thrice on other parts of the cover and one of these impressions, heavier than the others, effectively obliterates the Bieloostrov postmark, rendering it impossible to read the date. In order to make matters more secure a bit of stamp edging was stuck over the two marks but although we soaked this off, we could only just make out "..ostrov" on the under postmark and nothing of the date.

## 5ow to Collect French Colomies and Consular Ortices.

TWO WAY'.
(By a Winner of one of our Competition albums.)
In looking through an ordinary general collection, when one comes to French Colonies the owner is apt to apologise for the empty spacesbeing 1 and 2 cents Peace and Commerce type, inscribed with certain of the 27 names with willich each of the as values can be found. Consular Offices, excepting Levant are generally lett unrepresented. Now, why is this? Let anyone whoreads these lines ask himself why the stamps of the French Colonies are so poorly represented of the French Col
in his collection.
Putting surcharges on one side, the stamps Putting surcharges on one side, the stamps The Peace and Commerce type was first issued in 1892 , and in many of the Colonies is still in use-a record to date of 16 years. The Consular Offices set was issued in 1 go2, and is still current.
Most collectors, however, attempt these countries on the principles laid down in Gibbons' catalogue-a very excellent method if one is specialising in French Colomals. But does the general collector realise what he undertakes when he attempts French Colonials on this plan? I think not.

The total number of stamps issued for the Consular offices to the end of last year according to Gibbons' catalogue amounted to 607, and the Colonies 1861, a total of 2468 stamps, which has already been considerably added to.

Therefore it is but reasonable to suppose that it is the number of stamps very similar in appearance that dishearten the collector. That is the old system.
Now for the system adopted in Ewen's "Good Old Times" album. In this case we come right down to stamps i.e. designs. Put on one side all surcharges, names, etc., and the problem assumes a very different aspect.
For the general issues for the various colonies commence with the 1859 issue- 6 stamps. Ignore the imperforate French stamps. Then the second set $1881-14$ stamps. Then take one set of the Peace and Commerce ( 1892 ) issue as a representative set as used for the 27 colonies. Remember, the only way in which they differ is the coloured inscription at the bottom of the stamp. You can if you wish have each value from a different colony, thus showing the system in practice. This set will consist of 21 stamps, thus giving a total for the general design of 41 thus giving a
stamps only!
Now a start can be made on the special issues.
Taking them alphabetically, they are as fol-

The reader may say that such a collection would not be complete. Perhaps not, but it will probably be found to be more complete than most collections of French Colonials in a "Generalists" album.

We would particularly draw the attention of collectors and dealers to the last paragraph, which contains a world of wisdom. It is better to accumplish a little than attempt much.-ED., E.IV.S.N.]

A Cullection of Used Stamps.
So many collectors now go in for unused that a great many overlook what can be done in used stamps.
nused stamps will probably always remain the choice of high watermark collecting because ha it is unque condition, the actual mint state, and it unquestionably the best for investment.
But used stamps, especially of modern issues, are so cheap that a grand general collection may be made for less money than would suffice for one small colony like Lagos in the unused form.
I am, and have been for many years, before all things, a specialist in unused, but I am sorely tempted to go in also for a general collection of used stamps. When 1 see whole series of issues offered for a few pence per set, and reckon up what I might do with the aid of a printed album, I feel in a very yielding frame of mind.

Govt.); this envelope, like that we previously described, seems to have had 7 rouble Finland stamps attached to the front and cancelled at the town of destination, Vezenberg. As the stamps and postmark appear to be genuine, we suppose there is no great harm done, but we don't quite see what is the object of attaching them to letters which have already been through the post.

ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION (442 D 455 ). -We have seen quite a large number of the King Edward VII. Land stamps and there would seem to be hundreds of them on the market just

now. The specimen we illustrated some time ago was genuinely used on a letter to a resident in England, being postmarked 15.1 .08 and we can personally vouch for the fact that the letter uas not franked in any other way.
The specimens now circulating are postmarked 3.2.08 and appear to come from letters which were already franked with either a Id. New Zealand or a 2d. New South Wales stamp. One such shown us by Messrs. Edwin Healey \& Co. has a single copy of the King Edward VII. Land stamp in the corner postmarked 3.2 .08 and this is supplemented by two id. New South Wales o8 $10 .-A M-$ N.S.W.,' the latter from their position having apparently been stuck on after. wards. The letter was addressed to a school in Tewkesbury.
If the earlier letter was franked with an Ant. arctic stamp, why was it considered invalid for the later ones? The explanation seems to be found in the following letter which Capt. R. writes us:-

### 22.4.08.

" It may be of interest for you to know that to-day I received a letter from Lieut. Shackleton, on the envelope of which was the Id. New
Zealand surcharged ' King Edward VII. Land.'
"As he has failed to reach that land, and has made his winter quarters at Cape Royds, in McMurdo Strait on Ross Island, which is some 700 odd miles from King Edward VII. I.and, he is no longer allowing the issue of the stamps given to him, consequently the only ones in circulation are the ones on the letters which were sent back in the ship which towed them down to edge of the ice. I understand that he atends returning the remainder to the New Zealand Government on his return next April. I hope to get from him the actual number he has issued, but as no letter can reach him before the Nimrod' sails, next December, it will be some time before I can know. I do not know whether he actually stamped all the letters himself, or whether he issued a certain number to each member of the Expedition. If the former, then no unused copies should be about, tho' 1 have heard of a block of 4 , which was received by a friend. His wife I know has only got two used ones on an envelope sent up by the tow-ship. ones on an envelope sent up by
This ship left them on Jan. 15 th."

provided that should Princess Marie die without heirs male, the succession should devolve upon her younger sisters.
In spite of the opposition of Nicolas (the HeirApparent, a nephew of the Grand Duke), the Bill was passed by a large majority. When the Grand Duke William dies we shall probably have stamps of Luxemburg bearing a poritrait of the young Grand Duchess. It is highly probable that the present issue will not last long.-fournal des Philatélistes.

"In your issue of zoth May you give the English value of various Portuguese currencies With regard to that for Portuguese India, I think there must be some mistake. When I was at Goa some years ago, the currency under, i believe, a convention with the Indian Government, was the equivalent of the Indian currency and Goanese coins used to circulate in the surrounding districts of British India and were hardly distinguishable in appearance trom British Indtan coins. I have not heard of anty alteration since then, and therefore the Goanese rupee would be equal to is. 4 d ., and the tanga would equal 1 anna or id., the reis being equal to the India pie or 1 d ."

There certainly seems to be something curious about the table of Portuguese Colonal currency, but we found it in Gibbons Stamp W'eekly where it was referred to as an official table. To take only two items, namely :-

Secondly, if 400 reis are worth is. 9.6 d . then iooo reis wolld work out to exactly $4 / 6$ whereas the milreis is only ${ }^{\text {a }}$ (vide daily papers) Taking milreis is only $3 / 11_{15}^{1}$ (vide daily papers). Taking the inireis a $1 / 6, \mathrm{~d} .$, a considerabie reduction frome but
given as the value of a Goanese rupee but much above the Indian $1 / 4$.

In the table in question, the explanation seems to be that the equivalent of the milreis is taken as $4 / 6$, which is as accurate as sajing that a franc is worth lod. or a mark $: /$.. If 1000 reis equal 4/6, then 8oo reis would equal 3 s 7.2 d . and 400 reis $15 \mathrm{~g} .6 \mathrm{~d} .$, but unfortumately for the table, just as a franc is not worth iod. nor a mark $1 / \cdot$, neither is a milreis worth $4 / 6$. If some one would supply a really reliable table giving the current actual values of all foreign currencies they would certainly be filling a long felt want. In the case of factuating currencies the minimum and maximum rate of recent years could be given.

ZANZIBAR (45+ $Z+55$ ).-Correction,--There was a slight error in our chronicle last week, the values $3,6,12 c$. being a different design to the others, with "Zanzibar" at top instead of bottom.

The status of the issue is irreproachable, as not only was it necessitated by the change of currency but also by the accession of a new Sultan.

The earliest date of issue at the Post Office of the values ten rupees and above that we know of is 27.5 .08 , but we think it very likely they were placed on sale with the other values 4.5.08 or earlier.

## Coinage of the World.

It is only a fortnight since in commenting on table of Portuguese Colonial currencies which had been published by a contemporary we
wrote:-" If some one would supply a really wrote:-" If some one would supply a really all foreign currencies they would certainly be filling a long felt want.'
Possibly influenced by this remark the Editor of one of our contemporaries devotes several pages of his current number to an article on the Coinage of the World, but unfortumercial Dictionary" which he claims as his source must have been a very early and out-of-date edition of that work.
Articles on foreign coinage which appear in philatelic journals are presumably written with a view to giving collectors information respecting the tace value of stamps. If read in this sense the table which our contemporary publishes is misleading from start to finisth. We cannot deal with all the entries but a reference to a few will
suffice to show how unreliable the article in suffice to s
question is.

France. The table of values is thus given:-

In other words 25 franc piece is worth as much as 5 Ifr. pieces and 2 20c. pieces ! Surely 5 coins of ifr. are the correct change for 1 frr. piece? Putting 2ofr. as worth $15 / 10$, then $3 / 11 \frac{1}{2}$ is correct
for 5 fr., but ffr . should be a fifth of $3 / 11 \frac{1}{2}$ or $9 \frac{1 d}{}$., for 5 fr.,
not $8 \geqslant \mathrm{~d}$.

If one goes to Germany one will soon find that more than 5 marks change is not to be had for a 5 mark piece or a 5 marks bankuote. The value of 20 marks German whether paper, gold or silver, averages $19 / 6$, the exchange fluctuating as a rule between $19 / 5$ and 19/7. The value of 1 mark is foth of $19 / 6$ or the merest fraction under $11 \$ \mathrm{~d}$.
Japan. "The unit is the yen of roo sens; i yen $=4 / 3 \frac{1}{2}$;" To begin with, yen and sen do were to order a i yen plaral and the Post Office a Money Order for $2 / 6$ would not only pay for the stamp but the postage and registration fee to England as well. To say that a Japanese yen is worth $4 / 3 \frac{1}{2}$ is equivalent to saying that $f 100$ Consols are worth fioo. $^{\text {. }}$
Mexico. It is misleading to state in a philatelic journal that a silver peso coin of Mexico is worth 4/31. Collectors are apt to suppose it costs $4 / 3$ to purchase a peso stamp.
Russia. Our contemporary thus states its case for Russia.

Having been to St."Petersburg last summer we can write from practical experience of recent se and as regards the value of above table is utterly misleading.

The rouble is worth about $2 / 1$, the value being so stable that the Post Office announces that money orders in sterling from England are paid in Russia at the fixed rate of 9 roubles 44 kopeks for $£ \mathrm{I}$. The money in use in St. Petersburg is for $t$ I. the kopek works out at exactly one farthing.
Every day we went down to the Post Office to buy stamps (we say " the Post Office" as during the whole of our stay we never discovered but the one) and the young ladies at the counter seemed quite unconcerned whether we tendered paper money, gold or silver. The only occasion on which we found that a rouble had two values was in hiring a droschki. Experience quickly showed us that if we hired a droschki outside the hotel a rouble would only carry us half as far as if we bargained with the izvoishchik on the rank round the corner! To be seen coming out of a hotel is evidently the signal for a slump in the carrying value of Rissian currency! In Russia one does not hire a cab as in England but you say where you want to go and invite the cabman to make a quotation. If you are wise, you pass down the rank and take the third or fourth quotation. But we are digressing somefourth quotation. But we are digressing some-
what from our subject. The actual value of a rouble is soo kopecks or farthings, and 100 rouble is 100 kopecks or farthings, and 100
farthings we know from our own experience to farthings we know from o
be worth $2 / \mathrm{I}$ and not $3 / 2$.
Most stamp dealers put the silver dollar at the round sum of half-a-crown, apparently oblivious of the fact that for some time past its value has been fixed at $2 / 4$ in the Straits Settle ments, Malay States, Labuan and other places, whilst in Hongkong it fluctuates wildly, being at present as low as i/Io and on the other hand above $2 / 5$ in Shanghai.

In compiling tables of foreign currencies for the lay reader, it is best to keep to the actual value of coins and notes in present use and leave out of the question what such coins and notes should be theoretically, or were once, worth.

The Post Office Guide forms the most reliable guide to the values of foreign currencies we have seen. It gives at pages 838 to 844 the exact rates at which money orders issued in this country are exchanged in foreign currencies. We make the following extracts:-

GREAT BRITAIN.-Telegraph stamps (391 B 458).-Mr. Oswald Marsh has shown us a used copy of the 1/- yellow South Eastern Railway Electric Telegraph Frank of 1860 (S.G. No. 2) with Control No. 132 and perforated 9. This tamp has hitherto only been known perf. 12 and perf. 13, the only values previously known perf. being the $2 / 3$ and $2 / 9$. The stamp in question has such an early control number that it seems to us possible that the first printings of all values may have had this perforation, though so far no copies have been found.

CANADA (454 O 458).-Under date of Ottawa, 16.6.08 the Superintendent of the Post Office Department of Canada writes us:-
"As for any new issue, there may possibly be one in connection with the Quebec Tercentenary, but the Department is not yet in a position to give you any details respecting the series. The public will, however, be duly apprised of the essential particulars in the ordinary way by official Circular.
It is much to be hoped that a commemorative issue will be made, as precedent shows that such au issue always leads to a considerable remforcement of the ranks of stamp collectors. In fact we firmly believe that a commemorative issue does as much good to the hobby as the publication of a dozen books on "How to collect." Sonetimes the good is partly undone by those busybodies who directly they see a new recruit to the hobby who has filled his album with pictorial issues presume on their fancied experience to tell him he is collecting rubbish. The average young collector does not take any interest in the dingy old issues that his grandfathers stuck on their letters; they are an acquired taste and to be told that what he does like is rubbish (which is alisolutely untrue) is often sufficient to damp his ardour altogether.

Details as to the design, denominations, etc, are all a matter of conjecture at present.

The whole trouble arises from the fact that stamp collectors are divided into two camps, the one specializing old issues and collecting used stamps and the other supporting Colonial stamps in unused condition. Ten years ago the first camp had matters practically all their own way but since Ewen's Colonial Stamp Market was established the second camp has been gaining in popularity, slowly at first but latterly by leaps and bounds and it is to be feared to a certain extent at the expense of the older camp, which tries to recover its lost position ly throw ing mud, not only at the new collecting but also at the unfortunate postmasters, who are certainly in no wise to blame and have never invited people to collect stamps at all.
Our advice to Colonial postmasters is to be practical. If you can get rid of your old stock by surcharging it, then surcharge it ; collectors are not compelled by law to buy it and if they do so, it is a fair assumption that they do so because they like it. In any case, don't take any notice they like it. In any case, don t take any no

GREAT BRITAIN.-Control Letters (420 A $460)$ - Mr. W. J. Tullett is the first reader to send us the id. with control G8, whilst Mr. P. H. Young sends us $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. G8. Recent control letters were issued as follows:


The fact that $F_{7}$ appeared on 5.7 .07 and $G 8$ on 0.7.08 appears to indicate that stamps are issued on an average about six months after printing. If that is so, then control letter $G$ commenced to be printed about 3.07 and $F$ 2.06. If 2 letter lasts 13 months, H would commence printing about 4.08 and its issue may be expected about the end of 10.08 .
Unadhesive Stamps (451 W 460).- We are shown by Mr. E. Bentley Wood a copy of ad. die 75, postmarked 9.7.08. Our list now stands :-

BRITISH HONDURAS (453 C 460). The Colonial Office Journal (7.08/54) states that British Honduras has adopted the new colour scheme but that no order to print has yet been received.
It is doubtful if this will mean any new issues in the near future. The ic. is already "all green " and was bound sooner or later to be supplemented by a 2c. all rose and 5 c . all blue, whilst as regards the other values it is the practice of British Honduras to keep many years' stock on hand. As however this practice in the past has led to considerable waste of public money in printing stamps which had afterwards either to be surcharged (when the currency was changed from pence to cents and again when the stamps were rendered available for revenue as well as postal purposes) or destroved, it may be that a more economical policy has been adopted in requisitioning for the King Edward stamps.

Papuans and Caymans still hold the field of philatelic speculation. They are still the rage for the very good reason that there is a spice of real speculation ghout them, for no one knows what next to expect. There may be a ss. Cayman on $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$., "P Postage $\&$ Revenue." or new perf. combinations of Papuans, any hour. The eminent collector frowns his sternest on these sordid philanderings, but, on the sly, he takes a hand at the cards, just for the fun of it, don'therknow. And, after all, it is only a bit of a farce to vary the more serious business of collecting. All work and no play, makes the philatelist a dull boy.

Mr. P. Bridge informs Ewen's Weekly Stamp News that he has received a letter from the Postmistres informing him that four sheets of 120 each of the 4 d were surcharged " 2 ddd." Mr. Ewen adds "It had been freely asserted that only 240 were done." And I can assert that the statement that only 240 were done was equally authentic, for 1 have seen a letter from the Postmistress to that effect. The explanation is obvious: there has been a second supply printed.
Consequent on this ieport as to a second printing a copy which was sold at Glendining's on the 24.6.08 fetched $£_{4}$ 16s. od. as compared with the $£ 655$. od. at a previous auction. But how far will another 240 go towards really lowering the price.
We swear roundly at this surcharging scandal, but, all the same, we scramble for the stamps.
On 20.5.08 the Postmistress of the Cayman Islands wrote to a reader of Gibbons Stamp Weekly ( $1.7 .7 .08 / 31$ ) that the $\frac{1}{2} d$. stamps were exhausted.
The stnik must however soon have been re plenished, as a large consignment was despatched to the Colonial Stamip Market on 4.6.08.

One and the same postmarher is often used for canceling stamps used on letters, telegrams, postal receipts of all kinds and various other documents. One might just as well suggest that a bank-note has been through the post becanse it is postmarked. (It is a practice in Post Offices to postmark bank notes

Of course the use of a postmarker may be restricted to a certain purpose and then a postmaster would have no authority to allow it to be used for another. But in the absence of any such restrictive regulation, there is nothing inherently wrong in postmarking stamps for collectors. In this country we believe the practice was officially sanctioned in connection with the Penny Postage Jubilee in 1900 when at the Guildhall, and Kensington and Naval Exhbbitions special postcards and envelopes were sold either postinarked or not. ## ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION (455 E 46r).

 -Capt. R. writes us as follows:-"I think I can give some explanation as to why there are so many ' King Edward VII. Land' stamps on the market, or at any rate how they got there. In my last letter to you on this subject, I spoke of the issue of these stamps as having ceased, but in this I may have been wrong, as I have since received copies, all dated Feb. 3rd, o8, two on genuine envelopes, and some others apparently stamped as required. These came up in the 'Nimrod,' which ship left Lieut. Shackleton un Feb. 22nd, after which date no communication has been or will be possible, till she returas for him in December or January next. The question is as to how these stamps were originally issued to the ship's company? Up to the 15.1 .08 , when the 'Koonya' left them at the edge of the ice, Lieut. Shackleton had hopes of reaching King Edward VII. Land, and so consequently the letters sent back by the "Koonya" were stamped with those stamps. It was not till that land were given up, and the Expedition turned towards McMurdo Sound, arriving there Jan. 29th. When the 'Nimrod' finally left the shore party on Feb. 22nd, she bronght back their last letters. Why the date on all these stamps last letters. Whould be Feb. 3rd I cannot imagine; it was on should be Feb. 3rd I cannot imagine; it was on on Cape Royds (vide Lieut. Shackleton's report). Personally, I am inclined to think that no more Personally, 1 am inclined to think that no more
stamps were issued after Lieut. Shackleton had stamps were issued after Lieut. Shackleton had
failed in his original intention, except to those of the shore party who were remaining behind, though it is pure supposition on my part. I know for a fact that his last letter to his wife had only the ordinary $N Z$ id. and it was probably stamped on the ship's arrival at Lyttleton. I have two separate copies, genuinely used, on two letters, both dated Feb. 3rd, and with no other stamp or postmark on the letters. I can only call them genuine, in so far as I received them direct. Looking at it from another point of view, I see no reason why those stamps should not be used by the Expedition, for whom they were issued, until stopped by the New Zealand

Government, although they are not sent from the place for which they were issued. Providing no stamps are dated after Feb. 22nd, when one knows for certain that that was the last opportunity the shore party had of sending letters, I should be inclined to look on them as genuine. One does not know how many were given to the ship's company who returned in the ship, nor if they were stamped before they left the Antarctic regions. Up to the present time I have only heard of one block of four stamps in unused condition."
There is one specially interesting fact here. Capt. R. has seen the envelopes of three letters sent by Lieut. Shackleton himself, the leader of the expedition, to his wife in England. Two left by the Koonya and were franked with King Edward VII. Land stamps postmarked 15.1 .08 whilst the third letter, carried by the Nimrod leaving on 22.2.08 had an ordinary New Zealand id. stamp. Had Lieut. Shackleton wished to speculate in these stamps, as certain of our contemporaries have most unfairly and ground. lessly suggested, he would assuredly have taken every opportunity of using them. He seems to have completely failed to appreciate both the fact that the stamps were valuable and that his relatives would be bombarded with applications for them! Lieut. Shackleton's father and sister both live about a mile from the Colonial Stamp Market's offices so that he had a ready market at hand, yet Miss Shackleton recently reported that not a single copy of the King Edward VII. Land stamp had been received from him.

AUSTRIAN F.P.O. (449 H 46r).-L'Echo de la Timbrologie ( $15 \cdot 7.08 / 440$ ) states on the authority of the Berliner Briefmarken Zeitung that there are to be two new sets for use of the Post Offices in Crete and Levant. The Turkish values will be engraved on the die instead of surcharged as at present. The $5,10,20$ paras, 1 and 2 piastres will be similar to the current Austrian 5 heller, and the 5,10 and 20 piastres similar to that of 60 heller.

BENADIR (512 T 461).-L'Echo dela Timbro. logie $15.7 .08 / 440$ ) states that at the end of September a new set is to be issued here and that the designs will be "èlègantissimes."

CAYMAN ISLANDS (460 K 4 $^{61}$ ). -Mr. McNaughtan writes, under date of 16.7 .08 :-

> "Re Cayman Surcharges."
"I have to day received a note from the Post Office authorities at Georgetown, Grand Cayman. This letter is dated June 17 th and it says that they thought some weeks before that, that they would need to surcharge more for the $\frac{1}{2}$ d. and td . values, but they had succeeded in making the supply do duty till the other new stamps had reached them. From this I take it, that there is no Id. surcharged on 4 d ."

The $\ddagger \mathrm{d}$. stamp has been issued already! It is not a "King's Head" but in quite a novel design, which we illustrate this week, but the colour is not quite as pleasing as it might be, being not quite as pleasin
rather a dull brown.

cipally for the convenience and profit of dealers and others in Great Britain and the Continent, and owing to the enhanced values placed on then by the Maldiv-
ians, to the advantage of these gentry, also thereby
contravening postal regulations. For instance, some thing like $20,000 \mathrm{rs}$. worth would be requisitioned for per mensem, while the postage actually from the Islands for that period would not cover any more than some 200 letters and parcels, amounting to anything between 5 and Io rupees, therefore the surcharge held and the ordinary Ceyton stamps made available for postage from these Islands.
"The Ceylon Government were a little put out, as a
very nominal cost was charged the Maldivians for oververy nominal cost was charged the Maldivians for over printing the stamps.
The reason that sales of stamps were far larger than had been expected is surely an extraordinary one for stopping the issue altogether. The first object of a post cffice is not to carry mails but to make a profit; the convenience of the public is always made subsidiary to financial considera. tions. It should be the business of every post office to supply all the stamps for which it is asked and we cannot see that it matters in the least whether the applicants are stamp-collectors or letter-writers, so long as they pay cash.

Members of our great stamp clubs are, we inderstand, much exercised as to how to attract large attendances at their meetings. The display of collections is cloying the appetites, and papers tend to become too erudite for all except the few advanced collectors of the stamps of the particular country under discussion. A recent suggestion has been inade that medals should be offered for the hest papers read but this might bring a rush f readers and yet not achieve the lesired result The objection, too, is made that each reader would think his own production the best and the medal would have to be split. It reminds one of nedal woul the Greek splin. $t$ ter the Persian he story fin balloted for the prize for valour invasion. They balloted for the prize for valour, and each got one vote, but Themistocles wa unanimously named second!
The fact is that philatelic societies, like the hobby at large, are suffering from too great attention to detall. We have got too far away from the simple ideas of stamp-collecting, and as a consequence much of our collecting and discussion has become too irksome to be pleasant.

[The only remedy in our opinion is to return to general collecting, which enables all collectors to meet on a common footing. Even if a specialist paper is being read, all the inembers will probably have at least a few of the stamps of the country in question. But general collecting is impracticable unless it is cut down to a limit of $\mathrm{r} 0,000$ varieties (comparatively few collectors reach a total of half that number of standard varieties) and that means ignoring watermarks, periorations, shades, surcharges, etc. Ed. CANADA (464 S 465).--The Colonial Stamp Market has shown us a further large supply of entire sheets of all values of the Quebec Centeuary Issue, issued on 30.7.08. The one and two cents this time are from plates 3 and 4 ; in last week's supply they were from plates 1 and 2. The other plate-numbers are as stated in E.W.S.N., No. 463 .

ECUADOR (463 N 465).-We illustrate the new set (chronicled in E.W'S.N. No. 418 ).


HONDURAS ( 458 O 465).-We illustrate the design of the new set (chronicled in E.W.S.N. No. 391).

ROUMANIA (452 S 465).-We quote as follows from Stanley Gibbons Monthly Journal (30.5.08/240) :
"Messrs. Taylor Bros. kindly send us photographs of the three varieties of ' $\mathrm{P} R$ ' watermark, which we referred to in January. It is easy to see from these photographs that the letters are not sans-serif in any of the types, so that they can only be described by measurements, which we make as follows:

1. Resembling Type $15,11 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~mm}$. high, width
of the two letters across the upper loops
16 mm .
2. Height $12 \mathrm{~mm}_{n}$, width measured as above 14 mm .
3. Type 22, height 15 mm ., width 14 mm .
"Now we want to know whether any two of them occur in the same sheets, and, if not, what values are found with each.
"The same correspondents show us some varieties of type of the 25 bani, Type 13, and the 15 bani, Type 20, which seem to be due either to wear or to retouching of matrices or clichés. In the former stamp the principal variation is in the widths of the white and coloured lines surrounding the oval that contains the head; in one case the inner white line is comparatively narrow and the coloured line surrounding it wide; in the other the white line is distinctly wider and the coloured line proportionately narrower. This might well be due to some cutting away of the frame of the die of this value, into which the head is probably fitted as a separate piece when takiug the impressions for reproducing the various values. In the case of the 15 bani, Type 20, the variation is in the outer frame line, which in one variety is thick and heavy all the way round, and the semicircular projection in the centre below possesses circular pte white frame. in the other possesses line is quite thin and the white frame of the projection below is cut away in the centre, the projece design being as it were clipped close all whole Our correspondents show us the is bani rose in both these varities, and they tell us that, rose, in beve found the two, and the 15b., drab, and violet, in the the t"

SIAM (444 Q 465).-The Madrid Filatélico (31.7.08/109) states that the Siamese Government have in preparation a commemorative issue to celebrate the anniversary of the accession to the throne of King Somdetch Pbra Paramindr Maha Chulalongkorn, which took place on M. $10.4^{8}$.

The Postage Stamp is informed that the provisional stamp 1 on 24 atts is obsolete, and that a fresh supply of the ordinary 1 att stamps has been received. The colour of this differs from that of the original printing, the frame being orange instead of yellow. The Colonial Stamp Market has also shown us the 1 att orange and green.

Judging from the average life of our Colonial issues, very few of the following sets will be still current ten years hence, and a new generation of Collectors may have to pay as much as we are now doing for the issues of 10 years ago.-[E.W.S.N. 18.11.99.]

During the same period $f_{100}$ of Consols have fallen in value from $£$ ro4 to $£ 86$ and most other securities have shown a downward tendency, so that despite bad trade and scarcity of money, it is interesting to find current colonial stamps advancing so considerably. Swimming against the tide is always more difficult than with it.
During the last ten years old issues, on the other hand, as will be seen from the above table, have hardly been able to avoid falling in value.

Stamps which were 30 years old in 1898 advanced from 41 times face value in that year to 46 times face value in 1908 or only an average gain per annum in catalogue value of $1 \downarrow \%$.
Stamps 20 years old in 1898 advanced during the last 10 years from 41 to 43 times face value, whilst sets to years old in 1898 stood stationary at 13 times face value.
An interesting fact exhibited by the above tables is that of the 10 sets referred to therein which had attained the age of 40 years, only one now stands at less than 19 times face value in the catalogue, whilst of the 25 sets which had attained the age of 30 years, only one again stands at less than to times face value. The exception in each case is Bermuda, a colony which easily holds the record for the longevity which easily holds the record for the longevity
of its stamp issues, having even been known to of its stamp issues, having even been known to
print a stock of a stamp 30 years before it was print a stock of a stamp 30 years before it was it seems likely that given prosperity on the it seems likely that given prosperity on the Stock Exchange, any set of Colonal stamps kept for 30 years should then be worth a minmum of 10 times face value, whilst a
number of sets kept that length of time would average in catalogue value 46 times face value.
Similarly the above tables seem to indicate that sets of current Colonial stamps kept thirty years should then be worth an average 40 times race value.
Another inference to be drawn from the tables is that once a stamp has advanced to 40 times face value, it is not likely to go much further abead, because it is then too expensive for the majority of collectors and the falling off in demand for it counteracts its increasing rarity.
We have not dealt with King's Head stamps at all in this article, as the remarkable manner in which their early printings have advanced in value is seen at a glance from our current supplement.

"Mr. Maney Lake was the first to inform us that new electros had been brought into use for the $\frac{1}{2}$ d., 4 d., 6 d ., and $1 / \cdot$ values. The sheets are dated 1907, and have coloured margins; and we understand that all the stamps are placed the same way on the plates, so that inverted watermarks will in future not be so plentiful as the normal kind, which was the case with some normal kind, which was the case with some
values. Most likely the $2 \frac{1}{2}$ d., 8d., Iod. and $2 / 6$ values. Most
values will follow suit. We understand that one of the reasons for making these new electros of the reasons for making these new electros
was in order that the sheets might fit the new was in order that the sheets might the government printing office pretty much on the same lines as the Adelaide press. The stamps are fed into both of these machines automatically, and there can be no possibility of imperforations, or double perforations; besides, the work is done much more quickly. The gauge of the recently installed machine varies a littie from. the triple cutters, some would say it was 12 all round, but in reality it gauges about $12 \times 11$, and we shall still continue to list it as $12 \times 11 \frac{1}{2}$. He wouldbe 2 clever man who could tell from single specimens which stamps were perforated on the old triple cutters, which on the Adelaide perforating machine, and which on the new rotary. We might, add, however, that those values-new electros-above $2 \mathrm{~d} .$, perforated on the new machine, have the gutters between the panes perforated, while the margins are not. It is the reverse on the old triple cutters."
The Australian Philatelist (1.7.08/134) also contains an exhaustive catatogue of New South Wales perforated official stamps.

## Che Comparative Condition or stamps.

## (From the London Philatelist.)

Having regard to the steadily growing dearth of the old issues of many of the popular countries, an examination of some recent remarks as to the relative value of the differing conditions of a stamp by a well-known French Philatelist may not be out of place. The theme is not a new one, nor have we any wish to weary our readers to any extent by any divergencies into the bypaths that meander from this well-known track, such as standard values, collectors' catalogues, or the question of unused issues versus used.
In a recent number of Le Postillon M. Montader - who is well-known as a philatelic student, and who was largely responsible for the production of the Official Catalogue of the Sociéte Française de Timbrologie-has analysed the relative states of a particular stamp, assessing its value according to the various phases of its condition. M. Montader takes a well-known stamp as an example, i.e., the 15c. green, of the French Republic of 1849 , and thus appraises it :-

We see here that $M$. Montader ranges bis values on lines from $£ 5$ down to tenpence! We venture, however, to make his discrepancies still wider. This particular stamp exists in at least three marked shades-in dark green, yellow-green, and clear slightly bluish-green. The last shade, which
closely resembles that of the first reprints, was found in a number of copies a few years since, and is to be had in blocks of four-this, in our view represents the $£ 5$ stamp of M. Montader's list. The dark green and the yelluw-greenare, however immensely rarer, and may both be held to be at least twice as valuable as the one cited. The "Catalogue Officiel" quotes the dark green, unused, at $£ 12$, but we doubt if its publishers could produce a mint copy, and we do not hesitate to say that a faultless block of four would be worth nearly fioo. We also think that M. Montader overrates the comparative value of the gum and underrates the importance of the colour. With regard to the used specimens, these stamps are catalogued in the French Society's work at nearly ten shillings for the "vert clair," and twelve shillings for the dark green. Used pairs of this stamp are, moreover, well known to be scarce, and are probably worth double these prices, while blocks or strips of four would also doubtless be worth a still higher figure. M. Montader furthermore calculates that stamps with light obliterations are only worth half as much again as those heavily only worth half as much again as those heavily
postmarked. We differ from him agann, to a marked degree, our opinion being that a heavily cancelled stamp has been deprived of three. cancelled stamp has been deprived of three. quarters of its beauty and value, and that a stamp that has a light and well.placed cancelt is termed an average copy. The last stage of declension in value in the case of a copy of this stainp-sans margin, colour, or condition-may well be even lower than the franc bestowed upon it by our confrize, and be valued at a modest penny! We thus get a range of value from $f$ roo for a faultless unused block in the rarest colour to practically nothing for a very poor used copy !
The purport of our remarks is to show how doctors differ in their diagnoses, and how absolutely impossible it is to establish anything like a standard value for stamps. Beyond the inherent virtues of a stamp as depicted above are the important determining factors, as to its value, of locale and purchaser, which might very materially modify any of the preceding quotations. In this case a simple stamp has been taken for example -one presenting no varieties of impression. In the case of such stamps as Sydney Views, early Mauritius, or other engraved issues, the relative condition and value of the stamp might be enormously increased by the state of the plate. Hence is the question of a standard value one to be deferred unto the Greek kalends!
The question, however, of a proper appreciation of condition is one that is ever before us, and is constantly developing in importance. The shrinkage of the old issues will ultimately make this question one of vital importance to the collector who desires to see a return of his capital, and we think the importance of this subject and we think the importance of this probation on the score of triteness or redundancy.

BRITISH ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION.
Dispatch of Supplies to Lieutenant Shackleton.
Active preparations have been in hand for some time past in this country and in New Zealand for the despatch of tenant Shackleton and his comrades to Mc Murdo Sound, in the Antarctic regions, where they are wintering preparatory to the sledge journey to the south, east will be shipped to Lyttelton, New Zealand, where they will be put on board the expedition ship Nimrod.
The Nimrod will take food supplies for thirty-eight men for one year to provide against the possibility of being frozen in. She will sail from Lyttelton for the Antarctic on December sst, and she is at present in dry dock at that port undergoing repairs.
The Nimrod left Lieutenant Shackleton and his party in the best of health at McMurdo Sound base, 77 degs. south latitude, on February 22nd, and she returned to Lyttelton. She successfully landed all the stores at the above base before sailing-namely, a portable house, $33 \mathrm{ft} . \times 19 \mathrm{ft} . \times 8 \mathrm{ft}$, acetylene gas plant, iwo years' food supplies, equipment, ponies, dogs, ormathe comfortable for the to make their sta

RUSSIA (4 10 R 469 ). -The following is from the Standard ( 27.8 .08 ).
Nearly three-quarters of a million sterling has been stolen in the past three years from the Russian Post stolen in the past three years from the Russian
Office Department by a gang of swindlers, headed by a post office official of Moscow. Over a score of arrests have been made in and about Moscow and in Warsaw. The Moscow official advertised for used stamps, and bought and Germany. These were sent to Warsaw, where the postmarks were cleaned off, and the stamps, made up in packets of thousands, returned to Moscow. They were sold mostly in small shops that make a business in Russia of keeping a stock of postage stamps to save the public the endless delays involved in a visit to a Russian post office. Numbers were also disposed of at the Moscow head post office by the official interested, who offered them to impatient customers tired of waiting their turn in the queue.

The mudus operandi of the Warsaw Jews accused of cleaning used stamps is simple in the extreme. It is postmarks than to soak the stamps for a time in petroleum, after which they are dried, and only an petroleum, after which they are dried, and only an
expert eye can then detect the fraud. It is believed expert eye can then detect the fraud. It is believed the frauds extend much beyond what has yet been discovered, as large quantities of bill stamps have also
been found to be clever forgeries. These stamps are not susceptible to the cleaning process, as the usual way of defacing them, at any rate in large offices, is with a perforating machine.

CAYMAN ISLANDS ( $461,469 \mathrm{M}, 470$ ) Alas for the hopes of dealers ordering $\ddagger \mathrm{d}$. stamps! No one got any'. The postmistress evolved the following notice:-

NOTICE is hereby piven that farthing stamps and fatthing postcards, being provided solely for internal postage in the Cayman Islands Dependency, will only be sold across the counter at a Post Office in the Cayman Islands.

Having thus authorized herself to sell the $\ddagger \mathrm{d}$. stamips only across the post-office counter, Miss Gwendolyn Parsons proceeded on the one hand to refuse every application from stamp dealers and on the other to supply all her friends ad tib., for oll 24.8 .108 (only 45 days after the issue of the above notice) she reports that "we have only d., id., $5 /$ and ro/-stamps at present in stock.', kesidents in the Cayman Islands are now busy inviting offers from dealers for the |d. stamps!
Beyond printing the $1 /$ and tol- stamps on multiple paper, we shall be very much surprised if the Cayman'Islanders are allowed to have any more new issues just yet.
The $\ddagger$ d. stamp should be inmediately reprinted to an extent of at least 300,000 , as besides the Colonial Stamp Market's order for 72,000, we understand that another dealer ordered 36,0oo.
A dealer received a few days ago a letter stating that only $\quad \mathrm{d} .$, id. and $10 /$ stamps were still obtainatle; if this is correct the $5 /$-stamps must have run out shortly after the postmistress wrote us on 24.8.o8.
We have been favoured with a copy of The Caymanian, a newspaper published in the Cayman Islands although printed at Kingston, Jamaica. The copy in question is No. 6, dated Augist, 1908, and we make the following extracts :-

The Estimate for the P.O. was $£ 500$ for the year October o7 to September of but already after less than eight months it had realised $£ 21$ short of $£ 1000$ and he was almost sure it would amount to $£ 1500$. Taxes, estimated at $£ 200$, had given in $7 \frac{1}{2}$ months $£ 432$. imports estimated at $£:, 100$ had realised to middle of May $£ 85 \mathrm{o}$. He said he was opposed to increased taxation in any form.
A Petition largely signed by men and women from the outlying districts was read by the Chairman. It asked for free education to obtain which it prayed for the imposition of an additional $2 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. on the mport duty. The reader, the Chairman, said he was ot in favour of the extra $2 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent.
Evidently things are flourishing in the Cayman Islands, and we should not be surprised to learn that all taxes were soon remitted.
The Postal Revenue from 10.07 up to the date of the meeting, 14.5 .08 , amounting to $£ 979$, may seem small, but it must be remembered that the surcharged stamps would only figure in the postoffice accounts in respect of their face value, $£ 28$ 15s., although the fortunate islanders who purchased them must have received ioo times as much from European and American dealers. We should imagine also that this total does not include the $£ 700$ (?) or so realized by the Crown Agents in April, 1gu8, for the remainders of the single colour stamps, nor a large proportion single colour stamps, nor a large proportiond
of the money sent out for the "Postage and Revenue" series, which was first issued partly Revenue series, which was irst issued par The postal revenue will probably have reached at least $£ 3.000$ before the end of the financial year in y.o8, and would have been even larger if al orders had been executed. In 8.08 orders from the Colonial Stamp Market to the amount of $£^{685}$ face value were not executed, and other dealers have also doubtless had orders refused.
The Caymumian states that the mail despatched by the "Oter1" on June 3 rd, 1908 , consisted of I,or8 letters and papers. A Post Office law has just been passed by the Legislative Body making it compulsory for masters of vessels leaving the islands to take mails. The "Cash on Delivery" Service has beell extended to the Cayman Islands as from I.8.08.

NEWFOUNDLAND (449 Q 470). -It will be remembered that in April $\$ 100,000$ worth of two and five cents stamps, shipped by the American Bank Note Co. of New York to the Neufondland Government were washed ashore at the island of Cuttyhunk from the wreck of the Sylvia. The stamps were rescued by the islanders and apparently treated by them as perquisites, although it was subsequently stated that the bulk of the stamps had been recovered. If so, they were presumably destroyed as they would be of little use after their bath.
We wrote at the time to the PostmasterGeneral asking if the occurrence would lead to the demonetization of the stamps in question, and the issue of new 2c. and 5c. stamps surcharged or otherwise. He rephed stating that no change was contemplated
it is evident, however, that the authorities changed their mind, as we have just received changed

The Territory of Papua is evidently postally in as flourishing a condition as the Cayman Islands，as the Acting Chief Postmaster writes us：－＂Owing to the much higher demand for the surcharged stamps than was anticipated，the stock with the exception of the $2 / 6$ is almost completely exhausted，both at Port Moresby and the other Post Offices．＂
A rough calculation shows that the total sale of British New Gumea（unsurcharged）postage stamps for all purposes，from 1901 to 1907，was soont $f_{4}, 000$ ．Of this，probably about $f_{1,000}$ represented the first purchases by dealers in 190r－02，leaving an average of $£ 600$ per annum $1901-02$ ，leavining years．
The surcharged stamps came into use about January，1907，and represented the following amounts ：－

Of these the Postmaster says practically all he $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$ to $\mathrm{I} /$ have been sold，and probably $£ 800$ worth at least of the $2 / 6$ ，in addition to very large quantities of the new issue．
We have seen a card which covered 500 sheets of the new id．stamps，and it indicates that the same were checked at the Government Printing Office，Melbourne，on 20．8．07，and at the G．P．O．， papua，on 7.10 .07 ．The earliest postmark seen on any stamp of the new issue is 6．11．o7，on a copy of the $\frac{1}{2} d$.

CA YMAN ISLANDS ( $470 \mathrm{~N}+7 \mathrm{I}$ ) - - With reference to the official notice that the $\ddagger \mathrm{d}$. stamps were only to be sold across the counter because they were "provided solely for internal postage," the Editor has received a picture postcard from the posimistress herself, franked with four of them! Postage from Grand Cayman to Norwood is hardly "internal" postage.
CONGO (A 471).-We take the following from the Newcaslle Chronicle (18.9.08).
Philatelists have been awaiting with some eagerness the issue of the new Congo stamp which will indicate the annexation of the Colony to Belgium. The stamp will be on sale shortly, and it is already known that the changes involved will be very slight. They are in fact limited to the substitution of the "Colony of the Congo" for the older inscription "Congo Independent State." The Belgium Government has thought it best to preserve the old symbolical features of the elephant, the palm tree and profile of black natives, and practically the new stamp will be the same as its predecessor. As, neverheless, every hitlee eetail, no mater how oilectig, the new issue will no doubt find plenty of purchasers.
The Congo Free State is a country very free from New lssues; this is, in fact, our first reference to it since we introduced our present index system in E.W.S.N. over nue years ago! It has never been a very popular country though; perhaps with a few new issues it may revive philatelically.
DUTCH INDIES ( 468 C 471 ).-The follow . ing notes concerning the new "Java" stamps are sent us by Mr. A. Chippendale.
" Kegarding the new surcharged stamps of Java, I am enclosing one of the 15 cts . for your inspection; the cross bars are on, but the wording
is missing. On a close inspection you will find the foot of A and the full stop, just under the beginning of the bottom line. I also notice in the 2 tcts., as also in the other values, that there are thick and thin printings of the surcharge. All the enclosed have conie by this morning's mail. The Java mail just now is like a lottery, because the surcharges are so varied; the specialist collector will need almost the whole 19 millions surcharged before his collection is complete. I also enclose a Java postmark, which has been cancelled by machine; this is the first 1 have received from Java. I have never seen it chronicled that they had this in operation.

The delay in carrying into effect the reform equiring bd., id. and $2 \frac{1}{2} d$. stamps to be in Postal Union colour is probably a direct outcome of the outcry against surcharged stam:ps some years ago. Smaller stocks were then kept in hand and were hable to run out if any exceptional demand arose ; hence necessitating provisionals. To pacify collectors large stocks are now kept, and in a country too where the gum very rapidly deteriorates (every one of the millions of stamps in the Pust Office has to be interleaved with a sort of blotting-paper). The result is inconvenience to the Post Office and to the local public who often find the gum on the stamps a doubtful quantity and delay in bringing the Malay States into line with the stamps of other Postal Union countries; let us hope the Anti-Surcharger is happy!

NEW ZEALAND (470 K 471).-We have received the following note from Mr. K. J. Kingsley, under date of 12.8 .08 .
"I am sending you a registration envelope I purchased to day. Our post office here (Nelson N.Z.) has been without this size envelope (G) for over four months; the excuse bas been, they were getting a fresh plate engraved, $\mathcal{S c}$. At last 1 wrote the chief secretary, and after three weeks a supply was sent, which I find is similar to the old one with this exception-the label a the bottom of the stamp is blank, whereas in the old it was a dark blue, like the groundwork at the top of the stamp, and with the words registration fee in white letters. I do not know if this is to be the permanent type or not, but I send you this early copy for your information.

3d. dark blue. The space inside the lower label (formerly "Registration Fee" in white letters on blue ground) is now on either side is also removed. Size G.
It will be remembered that a fortnight ago we reported the 3 d. size $G$ with manuscript surcharge ${ }^{2 d}$. in red ink (these latter were postmarked Ashburton N.Z. 20.6.08 and 25.6.08). Needle:s to say, the price he now realizes will show him a very handsome margin of profit, although his pleasure will not be unalloyed, because in 1905 when the $2 / 6$ value appeared he took the advice of a certain philatelic journal, which rashly dared to assert that new issues "were being imported in such large quantities now-a-days that they could never be rare" and contented himself with a single copy of the $2 / 6$.

The centre of the stamp is taken from a painting by Larravide of the Bay of Montevideo, in which the Lruguayan navy, consisting of the gunboats Montevideo and 18 de fulio profusely beflagged, appears. These stamps will be on sale only on the 23 rd, 2 th and useless for postal services, but the Post Office will accept them in exchange for the current issue. "In order to supplement the salaries of the postal clerks, the Director-General allows them to hold periodical sales of all the stamps which are returned by the Dead Letter Office, and amongst a lot of these stamps a friend came across a few specimens of the 200. of the 1904.5 issue (grey-blue) in black; but I suppose the change of colour is due either to chemical action or to exposure. I am unable to discover any more minor varieties of this issue, although I have diligently searched tor them.'

We also take the following note from the same contemporary (3.10.03/223).
"We have received the three stamps mentioned in Mr. Davis's letter printed on another page of this number. The description he gives is so complete that little need be said here. It may be mentioned that the style of manufacture is peculiar. There is a background of fine meshwork. which together with the central picture seemis to have been printed in one operation, probably from separate clichés, made by a photosraphic half tone process, clamped together. The frame looks as if it had been lithographed, but it is difficult to decide from single specimens. The name of the steamer, 18 de $\mathcal{F u l i o}$, mentioned by Mr. Davis, recalls the date 18 July, 1830 , when the Constitution of the Republic was sworn.

Every bi-coloured stamp requires at least two operations to print and as two impressions mean more expense than one, it was necessary tha the bi-coloured stamps should be the values least used. We therefore agree with the decision of the authorities on this point, but we do not think the choice of coloured papers is very happy.
It is true the blue paper distinguishes the values between $1 / 6$ and $3 /$-but the inclusion of a $5 /$ stamp on yellow and a 5 d . on white paper prevents the yellow paper recalling the values between 2 hd . and 6 d ., whilst the $1 /$. on green paper is an obstruction to the assignment of this colour to the values between $5 /$ - and fr . Red paper used to recall the $£ 1$ and $£ 5$ values (for instance, Zululand) but is now appropriated to the $\ell_{1}$ only, whilst to complete the confusion white paper is dotted in and out throughout the scheme and the $\notin 25$ stamp actually differs only from the $\frac{1}{1} \mathrm{~d}$. in that the value is in red instead of from the did. in that the value is in red instead of green, a distinction that would

One undesirable result of this arrangement is seen in the case of the Cayman Islands, which seen in the case of the Cayman Islands, which
has two stamps ( $\mathrm{I} / \mathrm{and} \mathrm{mol} \cdot$ ) on green paper and has two stamps (r). and iof.) on green paper and
none on blue or red. Supposing that one Colony Dune on blue or red. Supposing that one Colony
had in its set the values 3 d . and $10 /-$ and no $1 /-\mathrm{C}$ had in its set the values $3 d$. and $10 /$ - and no $1 /$ or 5 /- and a second Colony the values $1 /$ and $5 /$ and no 3 d. or $10 /$, the result would be that yellow and green paper would signify exactly the opposite in the two cases; in the one, the high value would be on green paper and the low value on yellow and in the other just the opposite.
If yellow paper had been adopted for the values 3 d . to $5 d$., blue for those from $1 /-$ to $3 /$, green for those from $4 / \cdot$ to $10 /$ and red for the higher values, with tne remaining values below i/- unicoloured on white paper up to $2 \frac{1}{d} d$ and thence bi-colourea (partly purple) on white paper, we should have known "where we were," and with the majority of colonies only requiring one value from each of the five bigher groups 3 d, to

5d., $7 \frac{1}{2}$ d. to 1 od., $1 / \cdot$ to $3 / \cdot, 4 /$ to $10 / \cdot$, 1 I to $£ 25$, the sets would have shown greater variety.
In the unicoloured series it is also rather a pity that such a pretty colour as orange is thrown away on a value so little used as the Itd., whilst the two lowest values are apportioned a dingy black and brown. Perhaps printing in yellow or orange is more expensive than black or brown.
It will be noticed with the exception of the 4 d., $2 / 6$ and $4 \cdot \cdot$, which are in black and red, all the bl-coloured stamps have the body of the stamp in either purple or green.

The designs have been prepared from photographs taken by Lieut. L. Giudice, of the Artillery. Those of the six lower values are oblong and of the other four rectangular. In the upper right-hand corner will be the Crown of Savoy and in the opposite corner the words of Savoy and in the opposite corner the words the bottom, "Colonia Eritrea."

GERMAN COLONIES ( 457 B 474). -The sale of German Colonial stamps, which, according to a German paper quoted by Gibbons Stamp Weekly, is conducted in Germany solely at the Post Office in Berlin, has been so great since the end of 1 goo, when this office was opened, that in this time stamps to the value of $1,002,76_{4}$ marks have been disposed of. Since such stamps sold in Germany have been but little used for postage in Germany have been but little used for postage the clear profit to the State through philatelists the clear profit to the State
reaches an important figure.
It would be interesting to compare this figure (about $£ 50,000$ ) with the value of British Colonial stamps purchased for collecting purposes during the same period. Stamp collecting is of course enormously more popular in Germany than in England, but on the other hand there are many more stamp-issuing British Colonies and the sets run up to a higher face value as a general rule (the German Colonial sets only go to 5 marks). The total must be greatly in excess of the above figure; in fact the purchases of the Colonial Stamp Market alone considerably exceed it.

GRENADA (453 D 474).-The new stamps were issued on 1.10 .08 , as had been expected, and the colours are as given by us last May. The set is a very pretty one, the $2 /-$ being especially attractive. The plate-number is in each case " 1 ."
We may recall that of the $\mathrm{I} /$ - and io/- values 25,000 and 10,000 respectively have been printed, so that these are hardly likely to becone very rare with single watermark, although of course the next printing will have multiple Crown CA watermark.
We have not heard what is to become of the remainders of the King's Head issue, but judging by precedent they will be withdrawn from circulation and burnt.

ITALY (445 A 474).-A new Express Dehvery stamp has been issued here, for foreign service, with inscription in French "Exprès" instead of " Espresso."

## Portuguese Currency.

" I noticed some weeks ago, when I was in Fngland, an interesting article on the value of foreign currencies in your journal.
"Very few collectors appear to understand the currency of Portugal and her Colonies, and 1 trust that the following will be interesting.
" Portuguese currency, as far as Great Britain is concerned, is quoted either as so many pence to the milreis, or as so matny reis to the pound sterling, and one is easily calculated in terms of the other by dividing 240,000 by the pence quotation, or the same fignres by the reis 48 pence the value of the sovereign is 5,000 and vicè-versà
"In Macau and Timar the official value of the avo is 5.4 reis and the patacu or dollar 5.40 reis. "In Portuguese India the value of the real (the singular of reis) is 2 reis, and of the tanga 25 reis but 9 reis Indian is calculated as 19 reis Portu guese and 21 tangas as 62 reis Portuguese. The rupee is 400 reis Portuguese.

Perhaps some of your readers would say whether any of the shading errors occur on the higher values.
We have examined the Colonial Stamp Market's stock and find that all their sheets of 2d. small "Papua" surcharge show the same two varieties of leaves unshaded and in the same positions (Nos. 20 and 27) though perhaps not quite so pronounced as in the $2 \frac{1}{2} d$.
We have also made the extraordinary discovery that even the minutest defects on the $2 \frac{2 d}{} d$. plate find their counterpart in that of the 2d. Take for instance the band to left of the leaves in the lower right-hand corner. This is shaded with 29 vertical lines, of which the last four touch the outline of one of the leaves. Note the the outline of one
following stamps:-

No. 20 on sheet. There are 7 clear lines (starting from the left), the 8th line is very short, the
oth only slightly short, ioth and ath very faint, 12 th, $13^{\text {th }}$ clear and 14 th partly clear, 15 th very faint, 16 th quite clear, 17 th and 18 th very faint, igth to 22 nd clear, 23 rd broken in middle, 24 th to 29 th clear. (In the 2 d . sheet the 2gth line in indistinguishable, but this is merely due to over-inking).
No. 25 on sheet. The 18 th, 23 rd and 25 th lines are defective at top and the 21 st at foot.
No. 27 on sheet. The first line is broken at top.

It is out of the question for these defects to be due to wear of the plates, because the two plates could not possibly be expected to develop pre cisely the same set of defects; there is not one discrepancy. It was equally impossible to prin $2 \frac{1}{2} d$. stamps from the 2 d . plate and vice-versa. Whence then do the two plates derive their extra ordinary similarity? The td. plate is also in some degree similar but it is No. 28 instead of 27 which shows the white leaves in the lower left-hand corner and the lines of shading are faint rather than altogether absent.
With regard to the plates for printing the central design, of which we believe there were two, we should not be surprised to learn that they could be distinguished. We have examined half sheets of the unsurcharged $\frac{1}{2}$ d. to I/- British New Guinea, probably an early printing, and find that No. 20 on the sheet of each value has a white space at the top of the shading of the sky. The white blotch usually falls under the letters
ive have bristish New.
We have this variety on a sheet of $1 /$ with large surcharge but of four sheets of $1 / /$ with small surcharge only two have it, whilst the other two have a somewhat similar variety on No. 25 .
There is another remarkable variety in the plates of the central design. On some sheets the white clouds are plain white on every stamp of the sheet; on others a magnifying glass shows them to be faintly shaded with horizontal lines. The absence of the shading may be due to wear or may indicate another plate.
We are afraid we must leave all these matters in a very indefinite state; perhaps some of our readers who are specializing British New Guinea and Papua may be disposed to investigate further and give us the result of their research.
Besides the above there are of course varieties due merely to over-inking such as the $1 /$ - of which we have sheets showing clear impressions at the top and very black ones, with stormy sky, in the lower row.
In the case of the permanent issue inscribed "Papua" there are also many interesting varic. ties. No. 20 on the sheet is again of special ties. No. 20 on the sheet is again of specia

There are a few other specks but all the above are distinctly noticeable."
Correspondents seem to miss the main point in connection with varieties of this nature. Dots have no philatelic importance nnless they mean something. Thus, the two small white dots in tise 3 d. "small letters" of the 1862 Issue of Great Britain constitute the difference between plates 2 and 3 and are so important philatelically that their presence may change the value of the stamp, from pence to as inany pounds. Yet even larger dots on another stamp, if caused accidentally, may have no phitatelic importance at all and may even detract from the value of a stamp by spoiling its appearance. In the case of the Cayman Islands $\frac{1}{d}$. on id. the dots in the surcharge have no philatelic value as varieties because there was only one setting of the surcharge and nothing therefore to distinguish between. They might possibly have some value to an expert in case a dangerous forgery came on the market. In the case of the black dot which occurs on stamp No. 20 of the permanent Papua issue, its presence does not onstitute a catalogue variety nor even a collectine variety in the ordinary sense, but it is of later on may possibly be the means of telling us when on may possibly be the means of telling us when a new plate is brought into use for printing the central design. Our Bangkok correspondent states that these three provisionals have again been caused "by the negligence of the Treasury in ordering fresh supplies from Europe," but we think it far more likely that the delay in ordering from Europe was premeditated in order to enable the stock of remainders ( 850,000 stamps) to be surcharged and thus avoid wasting them. As the three values surcharged are now but little used owing to the reduced postal rates, this seems to us a more likely explanation in every way.
It is expected however that these surcharges will be the last, as the control of the postage stamps is now to be given to the Postal Depart. ment.
On 15.11.08 new stamps of $1,2,5,10,20$ and 40 ticals will be issued to replace the present provisionals of 10,20 and 40 ticals. We look upon the numbers and names as being surcharged on Mexican stamps for the purpose of control and in our opinion the stamp is complete, whether it has them or not. ABYSSINIA (473 Y 477). - The following notes are from the Pustuge Stamp (7.1I 08/69).
Messrs. Whititield King \& Co. inform us that there are two types of the recently issued I piastre provisional. One has the surcharge in a pale faded blue with the letters rather blurred, and in the other the impression is clearer and the ink employed is bright ultramarine. our corresponde as "guerche", and that the surcharge was necessary owing to the fact that the entire supply of I guerche stamps was exhausted, and there were not ufficjent of the $\frac{1}{2}$ guerche stamps to use in their place. This is the only provisional and the 7000 overprinted were distributed amongst all the Post Offices in Abyssinia. Messis. King \& Co. further state "Our correspondent's letter is dated Septe nber ryth, and he stares that the few stamps of the i piastre sent us were all that were left, and that there were remaining in stock no stamps of $\frac{4}{4}, \frac{1}{2}, 1$ or 2 guerches of any issue, surcharged or unsurcharged. In consequence of this shortage the Postage Due stamps overprinted 'Taxe APERCEvork" were allowed to be used as ordinary portate stamps, and our consignment was franked with some of these stamps."
Sbyssinia enters the Postal Union on November ist, and on that date there will be a complete new issue, all the siamps of which will have the values engraved in prastres. On the same date all the stock in hand of the bisolete stamps will be burnt

The Colonial Stann Market received a supply of some hundreds of each however by this mail.

No. 372, our correspondent has found the 1865 issue with Emblems No. I on lettering FL and PC and Emblems No. 2 on PB.

Railway Letter Stamps (475 Q 478 ). - Mr. Shelley informs us that he has the following new printing. London \& North Western Railway, 8th printing, Nos. 220001 to 250000 . It is already nearly half exhausted and does not differ in any important respect from the preceding issue.

Between these two we have the 6d. and $1 /$. which alinost resemble the "thick, opaque paper" variety but differ in that the watermark can be seen farly distinctly and the paper appears a fraction thinner, but both differences are more likely due to less gum.
With regard to our correspondent's second point, we confess that we fail to understand his argument. The marginal plate-numbers are printed in black, and therefore only belong to that part of the stamp which is printed in black. There were two plates for the centre design, 1 and 2 , and only one plate, we believe, for the frame of each value and this had no marginal plate number.

"I am to express regret that it is not practic. able to meet your wishes, inasmuch as the entire stock of that serses was exhausted some few weeks ago, so far as its issue from the Department is concerned, and that except at compara. tively few post offices throughont the Dominion where they may still linger unsold, the Department is unable to say where any of these stamps may now be obtained. In any case it would he impossible for you to procure as many as 2,000 half-cent stamps of the series in question. At the Ottawa Post Office there are still unsold, I muderstand, a small quantity of Tercentenary stamps but not sufficient $\frac{1}{2} c$. to fill such an order as yours."

FRENCH FOREIGN P.O. ( 457 V 478 ).We take the following notes from Gibbous Stamp Weekly (14.11.08/317).

Re-issue of French Zanzibar.
From information contained in Le Postillon, it would appear that the French Government are really making some sort of an attempt to suppress speculation in the stamps of the French Colonies. Not only are the recent issues of Indo. China to be put on sale again but the same thing is to happen to the 1,904 issue of Zanzibar, Nos. 265 to $z 74$ in my publishers' Catalogue. Our contemporary rightly states that the French

Agency in Zanzibar is closed, and so the stamps cannot be sold on the spot; nevertheless they will be sold at face value to all comers in Paris by the Colonia authorities.
It is quite true that this issue was the result of local speculation among the officials of the Post Office and the Administration, and although the Government is endeavouring to spoil the market for these gentlemen, they turned their attention to the somewhat hypothetical honesty (?) of purpose exhibited by some of the present postal officials in charge of the French Offices in various countries and colonies. However, the author ities seem to be moving in the matter, and I can only hope that something will come of it.
It must not be imagined that all French Colonial stamps are speculative, and that the prices of all will go down. This is very far from the truth. Take these French offices in Zanzibar as an example: the firs portion of them. Nos. 21 to 252, is beyond reproach All the ctamps are worth quite what they are catal ogappens they can never be reissued.

It appears that it is the practice of the Luxemburg Postal Administration to provide publishers of news. papers, prospectuses, circulars, and printed matter in general with quantities of not less than two hundred stamps of a sort of the $\mathrm{Ic} ., 2 \mathrm{c}$, , 5 c . and 10 c . in complete sheets, alrcody cancelled. Printed matter franked with these stamps must be posted in quamities of nof les than a hundred in the town of Luxemborg or fity in any other post ofice. Ancell but the tax payable by the consirnee is the usual but the tax pa
rate, not double.
The precancellation is naturally done in type in a printing press, and it sometinies happen that sheets of stamps get put into the machine the wrong way round, and so the cancellation is found inverted.

ABYSSINIA (477 $\bar{Z}$ 799).-On I.II.08 this comntry entered the Postal Uinon and in order to comply with Postal Union requirements a new set of stamps was ordered from France, having the values inscrihed in Arabic figures. Unfortunately, the stamps have not yet arrived, so a provisional issue has had to be prepared, of which we take the following description from sheets received by the Colonial Stamp Market.

The Handbook states that " there are throngh. out the Dependency one or two small places which in the past were used as gaols but within recent years no convicts being forthcoming they have been to all intents and purposes closed.
The only foreign Consuls resident in the Cayman Islands are those apponnted by Norway and Sweden.
There are about forty miles of road in Grand Cayman and fitteen in the lesser Caymans. The ruads are for the most part narrow (not exceeding 12 feet wide) and flat, but pretty, the luxuriant growth of the Almond and other trees providing plenty of shade.
We are informed by the Conmissioner that the Cayman Islands Handbook for 1009 is to be published in January and may be obtained from Mr. A. J. Roblerts, Shedden Road, Georgetown, Grand Cayman, post free for a British postal order of $1 / 7$, and if asked we have no doubt Mr. Roberts would use four td. stamps for pustage. In size it is to be nearly doubled.
The Cayman Islands also have picture postcards, for three of which we are indebted to the Commissioner:-(1) Mary Street, Georgetown, Commissioner:-(1) Mary Street, Georgetown Bay, Grand Cayman; (3) Government House from N.E., Georgetown, Grand Cayman.

We are able to illustrate an envelope franked with a number of the famous $\ddagger \mathrm{d}$. stamps, showing both types, and have also made a careful examination of an entire sheet.


The $f$ d. stamp appears to be lithographed in sheets of 120 , divided as usual into 2 panes of 60 , each 10 rows of 6 , entirely without marginal lines or marks, except a + on the lower margin, The trans. fer is made up as shown in the diagram.

The whole 120 stamps are lithograplied at one pull, so that defects occurr ing on the left pane are different to those found on the right-hand pane. The principal are :-

No. 19 (left pane, ist in 4th row), large white rectangular space to right of crown.
No. 57 (left pane, 3rd in roth row), white dot under $N$ of "Islands."
No. 108 (right pane, 6th in 8 th row), white spot under $S$ of "Postage"
These defects are of special interest, because they will probably serve to identify the first printing. It depends on what procedure the printers adopted. If the defects were caused in transferving the design to the machining stone, it is very unlikely they will be seen in the second supply.

The same + types may however gnite likely occur in future printings, unless the printers decide to preserve no transfers but to start direct from a single die each time.

Type 2 is easily distinguishable from types 1 , 3 . + . as the letters MA of "Cayman are separated, whereas in the other three types they are touching and more often than not appear to be joined by a white bar. We have not yet discovered a satisfactory means of distinguishing between types $1,3,4$, but the identity of any specimen can of course be inferred if it is in a bluck with a specimen of type 2 .

In 10.08 the $\ddagger \mathrm{d}$. stamps became completely exhausted and envelopes had to be franked by the Postmaster, as shown in our illustration, no
further provisionals being allowed to be created. further provisionals being allowed to be created.
On one and the same stieet of $\ddagger \mathrm{d}$. stamps, dark and liglit brown shades are to be found.

ABYSSINIA (479 A 480 ).-We read in the Deutsche Briefmurken Zeitung (19.11.08/179) that 100,000 of each value, $\ddagger$ to 16 gairsh, have been surcharged. Our contemporary states that originally 200,000 of each value was sent out unsurcharged to Abyssinia and that half were delivered to the Treasury and half to the Post Office. The latter's supply have heen doled out in sinall quantities from time to time with a new surcharge every year and as the stock of even the lowest value does not seem to have been exhausted, there must still remain the bulk of the 100,000 high values. On the other hand the Treasury is said to have kept its 100,000 sets intact and has now surcharged them to make the provisional issue of 11.08 . If this is al correct, then there will be a huge stock of remainders when the permanent issue arrives. It has been stated that the

BOLIVIA (294 J 480).-This country is follow. ing the annoying example set by Persia and Uruguay and reissuing stamps of obsolete design Gibbons Stamp Weekly (28.11.08/351) is informed by a correspondent that two values, the 50
centavos and i bolivar are reverting to the 1867 centavos and i bolivar are reverting to the 1867 design (2nd issue), but that the colours will be changed. Our contemporary has been shown a copy of the soc. printed in vermilion (instead of blue) and is of opinion that the stamp was printed from the original plate of 1867 .

So far as collectors on our Simplified System are concerned, this stamp constitutes an actual reissue of No. 16 in Ewen's Stainp Quotations, buying quotation 7 d . We do not distinguish between the two issues with 9 and 11 stars, nor between shades of red, consequently we amalga. mate the 1867 , 1887 , 1890 and 1893 as "second issue of 1867 ,'" and the above stamp becomes to all intents and purposes a reissue of S.G. No. 55, joc. red, with 9 stars, perf. i2, cat. $3 / 3$, used or unused ( $3 / 6,2 / 6$ by Senf, $1 / 8,1 / 10$ by Yvert and 7d. buying, IId. selling by Ewen). Has there been some mistake? Can the stamps now being issued be only remainders of the 189050 c . red?
CANADA (479 Z 480).-The Colonial Stamp Market has received a fresh supply of sheets of the $t$ and 2 cent Quebec Centenary stamps. The cent still have plate-number 3 or 4 on the top margin, but whilst some of the 2 cent sheets have plate-number 3 on the top margin, others have it inverted on the lower margin. This confirms the note we published a fortnight ago and would lead one to suppose that it is not due to error but denotes a regular and probably new printing.

CHINA ( $458,469 \mathrm{~V} 480$ ). -We read in Koh and Co's Post Card Exchange Register (io.o8/ sup.
plement to p. 13) that " several, if not all, the present values of China Postage Stamps are to be altered in colour, so as to fall in with the colours in general use by countries which belong to the Universal Postal Union."

CRETE (476 D 480). -The Colonial Stamp Market has shown us entire sheets of all the new stamps, except the 2, 3 and 5 drachinas, of which however we have large enough blocks to partially identify the settings of the surcharge.
The first setting of the overprint was used for the small-size stamps, the plates of which contain 100 stamps in 10 rows of 10 . We believe the following were issued, but have not seen the three inarked.*

This setting was carefully prepared, as there are no errors and only three examples of broken type of any importance.

broken off at top.

Type c. No. $5_{4}$ on sheet. Same as a but less marked.
This setting was used also for all the postage due stamps.

Second setting of surcharge.
To print the oblong 25c. and i drachma stamps the same type was used but merely rearranged.

Type a. This now occurs as No. 13 on sheet.
Type $b, c$. We unfortunately omitted to note these but trust to locate them when our next supply arrives.
This setting was also probably used for the 3 drachmai. but we did not have a large enough portion of the sheet to decide definitely.

Third setting of surcharge.
The 2 drachmai being a large upright design, the setting had again to be shifted, but apparently the same type was used, as on the portion of the sheet we received, we noted the following.

Type a. This is No. 70 on the sheet.
Type $b$. This is No. 38 .
On No. 98 the surcharge was very feeble, whereas on the next stamp to it it was printed heavily enough to show einbossing at the back of the stamp.

Fourth setting of surcharge
The 5 drachmai stamp being again larger than
any of the others, the type had to be re-set and we noted types $a, b$.

Type $a$. This is No. 13 (as in the 2nd setting). Type b. This is No. 51.
The i lepton and the 10 lepta with portrait of Prince George were quickly bought up, soon being followed by the 2 lepta, necessitating fresh printings of these values. For the ro lepta the new "Hermes of Praxiteles" issue was requisitioned. The setting shows none of the above varieties The setting shows none of the above varieties
and evidently new type was used. We have the following.

Each variety only occurs once on each sheet of 100 .
We understand that these surcharged stamps will only remain in use till the island is formally annexed to Greece, when Greek stamps will come into use.


The postcard surcharged is a new one, also in the "Hermes of Praxiteles" design (which we illustrate). The surcharge is roughly hand stamped, the letters being a little larger and more spaced than in that of the adhesives.

DANISH WEST INDIES ( $7_{7} 8$ G 480 ). We illustrate the design of the new stamps.


DUTCH INDIES ( 477 E 480 ). -We are hown two copies of the 25 c . Java, with sur charges of slightly different design, but the difference may be due to light and heavy print ing. The J's are however very distinct, one having a round foot and the other a heavy straight foot.

GREENLAND (224 B 480.) - Der Deutsche Philatelist (in.08/ir+) chronicles and illustrates thrce stamps, on the authority of Mr. Rudolf Kroninann.

The stamps are said to be parcel stamps and to be issned by the Danish Government anthorities, but the low face value of the stamps seems to be against this explanation. "Pakke.post" means parcel-post it is true, but "pakke" alone has the signification of packet as well as parcel and packet is a word which is often used in this country as a general name for everything sent through the post. In Greenland "pakke-post" may possibly have a wider meaning than in may poss
Denmark.

JAIPUR (441 K 480 ). We are informed by Mr. W. E. Raper that on 31.12 .08 this Indian state will cease to issue its own stamps. The current issue (Chariot of the Sun design) has only been in use about 3 years.

MALTA (459, 461 V 480).-We are shown the 4d. Malta, single watermark, by Mr. Petre, in two distinct shades of brown.
NYASALAND (475 I 480 ), - All the 4 d . Nyasaland stamps received by the Colonial Stamp Market in its large consignment of a few weeks ago had inverted watermark. Does this stamp exist with normal watermark?

## The New Postage Stamps.

A fresh departure is being also made in the new issue of United States postage stamps. The present Postmaster.Gen ide. Mr. Meser, considers hat he national or patriotic lidea as expressed in stamps does not need
the multiplicity of heads now appearing in the various the multiplicity of heads now appearing in the various
issues. In the process of simplification it has been decided to limit the designs to two, the portraits of Washington and Franklin. Washington, typifying the national idea, and regarded as "pater patriz," will appear on all denominations, with one exception, the one cent stamp. For this Franklin is to be retained, the favour being shown to him alone by reason of the peculiar and unique place which he holds in the memory and affection of the American people.
The only decoration is a few laurel leaves with "U.S. Postage" at the top and the value at the bottom. The portraits will appear in direct profile, hough hitherto the faces of both Washington and Franklin have appeared in a three-quarter, aspect. This change is made partly for economy's sake, effecting a saving of $£ 4,000$ a year, as the steel plates from which the slamps are printed will not need to be replaced so oten. The wne lines or he three-quarter thus following the custom of other nated states is the same head of the ruler through all the denoming tions, and is giving up the variety which has aimost run riot in special issues.
There is a strong sentiment against any innovation which would put the portrait of the actual President upon the national postage stamp as in the case of a monarch, and apparently the plan of issuing those of past Presidents in regular sequence has been abandoned. For the new stamps it has been possible to obtain the most authentic likenesses of both Washington and Franklin by copying the original busts made by Houdon. When Franklin returned from abroad he brought with him the famous French sculptor, who made a cast in plaster of the head of the living Washington, and followed this up with a companion bust of the printer-philosopher.
The original Houdon bust of Washington is in the possession of the Bureau of Engraving at Washington, and the other is the most valued memorial in the more satisfactory for such purposes than a death mask it is worth reme prering that the wainal Museumat, Washington preserves one of Abraham Lincoln.
Later.-Mr. F. P. Brown is first in sending us the new 2c. stamp, issued in booklet form on 25.11.o8. It is not yet obtainable in sheets and consequently cannot be had perforated all round.
