GREAT BRITAIN.-Current Issue (418 I 484). -There are two very distinct shades of the current 3 d . on chalk-surface paper, one on yellow paper and the other on nearly orange. We have both in mint unused blocks so that

frequently produced by soaking too long in water.

JAIPUR STATE (480 L 484).-R. states that a correspondent at Jaipur informs him in a letter dated 22.10.08 that from January next the present issue (Chariot of the Sun) will be superseded by a new set surcharged on Indian stamps, similar to those now in use in Patiala, Gwalior, etc.

NEW HEBRIDES ( 469 F 484).-We quote as follows from the Australian Philatelist (10.11.08/29).
"We have received from a direct source proofs and information to the effect that the current Fiji stamps have been surcharged New Hebrides -Condominium in two black lines, the overprint on the stamps on white paper being in heavy narrow block capitals, with the words New Hebrides on a yellow-green background. The overprint on the stamps on coloured paper is in thin narrow block capitals without any coloured background; The stamps were to be issued on the ist instant."

SOUTHERN NIGERIA (474 J 484).-We have received something of a phenomenon from this colony, in the shape of an entire sheet of the new ro/- stamps, which ought to be on chalk. surface paper and which may have been printed on that paper. The chalk-surfacing has however entirely disappeared, except for a trace along the extreme edge of the left margin of the sheet. Only in that place does a silver coin leave a black mark; on the rest of the margin and on
the stamps we failed to get the slightest sign of a mark. If this sheet was treated with the chalk solution, where has the latter gone to? The design of the stamps is quite unaffected. As the stamps show no sign of the chalk-surface, we feel bound to chronicle them as "multiple ordinary," notwithstanding the trace of the chalk-surface on the margin.

## Rotes on Cayman Islands.

(From the Cayman Islands Handbook, 1908.)
The Cayman Islands, forming a Dependency of Jamaica, are situated between the meridians $79^{\circ}$ $44^{\prime}$ and $81026^{\prime} \mathrm{W}$. parallels of $19^{\circ} 44^{\prime}$ and $19^{\circ}$ $46^{\prime}$ N., and consist of three islands, Grand Cayman, Cayman Brac, and Little Cayman. They are said to have been discovered by Christopher Columbus on his return voyage from Porto Bello to Haiti and called "Las Tortugas." Turtle abounded around the coasts till within quite recent years, so that when Columbus visited the islands they probably were very numerous, hence the name "Las Tortugas." The origin of the name "Cayman" appears somewhat obscure. Had the islands ever been occupied by the Spaniards origin might have been Spanish, but the Spaniards Cayman resembles very closely an alligator, so it is possible the name was derived from this resem. is possible the name was derived from this resem-
blance, "Cayman" being another name for alligator.
The islands were originally a rendezvous for pirates, as is evidenced by the finding every now pirates, as is evidenced by the finding every now to the sea coast. Tradition records numerous into the sea coast. Tradition records numerous in-
stances of coins having been found in great or stances of coins having been found in great or
small quantities but as recently as 1903 a large small quantities but as recently as cons a large
number of gold and silver Spanish coins were un. earthed at Pedro bearing dates in the seventeenth century. The pirates usually selected caves near the seashore having a long and tortuous entrance in which to deposit their spoil. Many of these caves are now filled up with sand, so that it becomes more and more difficult each year to locate "likely spots," in fact the most recent "fnds" have all been by accident.
During General D'Oyley's Government of Jamaica, measures were taken for the protection of the islands, and the pirates on account of occasional visits from ships of war left and settled on the shores of the Mississippi in North America, but no attempt was made to colonise the islands till 1734 when Daniel Campbell, John Middleton, and Mary Campbell, took out a patent of land in Jamaica, for all the land on the north side of Grand Cayman. None of these names are now Grand Cayman. None of these pames are now
extant. The next patents were taken out in 1741 extant. The next patents were taken out in 1741
by Mrs. Mary Bodden, William Foster, Murray by Mrs. Mary Bodden, William Foster, Murray
Crymble and Sam Spofforth. Of these names Crymble and Sam Spofforth.
Bodden and Foster still remain.

Unlike other West Indian Islands the majority of the people are white, or very nearly so. This is in all probability due to two facts-Firstly, when patents of lands were granted to people in the early eighteenth century, they were compelled to bring to the island of Grand Cayman with them white people as well as slaves. It is just possible also that when these pioneers arrived on the island they found a number of stray pirates, who being left by their confederates and finding other white people coming, settled down quietly with them.
Secondly, English vessels were often wrecked on the coast of Grand Cayman and the white sailors fiuding so many other white inhabitants, decilors to "take up a claim" and remain. Als often came and settled in Grand Cayman.
The climate of the Cayman Islands for the most part is healthy, but after the rans set in in May or June there are cases of malarial fever of a mild nature. Unfortunately there are at present very few cisterns for the collection of rain water, and consequently after a drought of any length of time the people are driven to drinking water from the wells, which is frequently contaminated with decaying animal and vegetable matter and brings in its train various forms of Enteritis. More cisterns are in course of construction, and it is to be hoped that in the course struction, and it is to he hoped that in the course
of a few years Enteritis from the cause above of a few years Enteritis from
stated will entirely disappear.
On the whole it may be said the islands are exceedingly healthy as is evidenced by the great ages to which some of the inhabitants live. The islands have, of course, their seasons of sickness but these are few and far between, and of short duration.
The inhabitants both black and white are tall, well built men and women, and the strenuous
life to which they are accustomed has made them robust and hardy. The men are great travellers, but the women rarely leave the islands, and when they do it is usually for no longer a journey than to Jamaica and back.
The death rate is only 11 per ioou living, while the birth rate is 22 per thousand. One would naturally expect the population to be rapidly increasing, but this is not the case. The present population of the Dependency is estimated to be 60oo. The males emigrate to the United States and other places in search of work, returning at long or short intervals to visit their relatives and friends. Unfortunately it is deeply rooted in the minds of the people that there is "nothing for them to do here," so they go abroad, in fact they grow up with this idea so embedded in their they grow up with this idea so embedded in their
minds that it is next to iupossible to eradicate it. If all the resources of the islands were utilised If all the resources of the islands were utilised
there would be no necessity for emigration for there would be no necessity for emigration for
many years to come. Like so many other places many years to come. Like so many other places
the people look upon the staple industry of the islands as the only industry they have to rely upon, whereas all round them they see provided by Nature many means of livelihood, which at present are scorned and despised, and counted of no avail.
From November to April it is cool and healthy but from May to October the heat is sometimes very great and oppressive ; mosquitoes abound at intervals during these months and are a torment to man and beast, making life almost unbearable.
The island of Grand Cayman is 17 miles in length and 7 miles wide at its greatest width, and is for the most part rocky, though many acres of good loamy earth are under cultivation. Yams, cassava, bananas, plantains, and practically all tropical and sub-tropical vegetables, grow with great laxuriance. The citrus order of fruits abound; oranges, limes, shaddocks, citrons, lemons, guavas, are to be found in almost every garden and growing wild in uncultivated plots. The guava is so abundant that many tons rot yearly on the ground. The same in less degree may be said of the other fruits. Beyond preserving a few pounds for locar consumption, no attempt is made to utilise the surplus. Mangos, breadfruit, alligator pears, varieties of plums, Cape gooseberry, sapadillos, and many other varieties of fruit trees, are to be seen growing haphazard with care or cultivation everywhere. The almond tree was introduced about thirty years ago, the first tree on the island being planted at Prospect by the late Mr. W. Eden. The climate and soll evidently Muit it as now the tree is to be seen anywhere sunt everywhere.
The cocoanut a few years ago, grew all around the coast and brought in a substantial income to the inhabitants. A disease, bud rot, breaking out among the trees in a few years destroyed practically every tree on the island. Carelessness in preventing the spread of the disease, and laziness in adopting an active and persistent treatment for its cure, has resulted in the loss of many thousands of pounds to the people. Whilst every one bemoans this loss only one person here and there makes any effort to make it good.
The palm thatch, from the unopened tons of which, rope, baskets, hats, etc., are made, grows abundantly in sandy soil all over the island. The tree in addition to being useful is, when young, very ornamental.
Mahogany grows in the rocky parts of the island and is used in shipbuilding and houseisland and is used in shipbuilding and ho
building. There is not sufficient for export.

Logwood, fustic and iron wood, all grow treely, the two former being exported, but the latter used locally for housebuilding and other work for which a strong and rot resisting wood is required. Ferns, orchids (some varieties of which are not found elsewhere), grow with great luxuriance, the one among the rocks and the other on trees. Members of the "Agave" family, Sisal and
Manilla, grow with great luxuriance. It is no Manilla, grow with great luxuriance. It is no uncommon thing to see a man uprooting large fully formed plants of both these varicties at much expenditure of labour, casting them into the sea or piling them up in heaps to burn. From both a very tenacious fibre can be obtained and thus give remunerative employment to a few of the young men who now go abroad.

Needless to say the hand-stamped issue was immediately bought up by local collectors. Should more stamps be required Messrs. Waterlow \& Sons could be instructed to apply the surcharge betore sending out the stamps, thus ensuring a third type and this could be followed by a fourth issue with "Congo Belge" engraved!

The date fixed for the issue of the stamps was 1.11.08 and this was doubtless adhered to, as our correspondent's letter was postmarked "Port Vila, 12.it.o8." It took just under two months in transit.

Port Vila is not nuknown to stamp collectors, as the stamps of the Australasian New Hebrides Company bear a view of the town. The Company issued two stamps in 1897, Id. black and magenta and 2 d. blue and brown for inter island postage, but for some reason they were quickly withdrawn from use.
We have had a cablegram from the authorities to the effect that the face value of the complete set is $2 / 5$, so that the seven values listed above are all that exist
Le fournal des Philatélistes (31.12.08/361) con tains some interesting notes on the new issue and illustrates the 1 d . and $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. values, the latter being on a registered letter, used in conjunction with two ${ }^{5} c$. of the French series, the whole postmarked "Port-Vila, Nelies Hebrides, 30.10 .08 " one day earlier than the official date of issue.
According to our contemporary (page 366), only 15000 francs (about $£ 600$ ) worth of Fiji Islands stamps were surcharged and they were only expected to remain in use a very short time ; in fact both the French and English sets are likely to be suppressed and replaced by a joint set with inscriptions in English and French. All the values except the $\frac{1}{2} d$. and id. have single watermark.

The fd and id. stamps being printed in one colour, have no bar over the word Fiji, but all the other values, viz., 2d.. $2 \frac{1}{2} d$. , 5d., 6d. and $1 /$, have had the word ' Fiji' printed out 'New Hebrides,' have been printed in black, the words - Condominium, ' appearing at the bottom of the frame containing the King's portrait, and just above the value The did. and id. stamps in our consignment are printed on multiple watermarked paper, but all the other values, including the $1 /$, are printed on single Crown and $A$ paper.
"We are unable to say definitely where the overprint on these stamps was applied, but from its uniformity and regularity, and the fact that we were unable to discover the slightest variation in any of the sheets submitted to us, we are of the opinion that the overprint was applied before the stamps left Messrs. De la Rue's establishment, where the Fiji stamps are prepared. The letters are very uncommon, so we are informed, and it appears to us that the printing has been done from electrotypes prepared from a single setting.
"The fact that a change in the Fiji $1 /$ - stamps has been notified, we are wondering as to the likelihood of the scarcity in the near where of the r/stamps overprinted New Hebrides which have just come to hand.

It is quite clear that the stamps are not a recent printing or they would not have single watermark. It also seems hardly likely that the authorities would send the stamps all the way to England to be surcharged, when the work could be quite well done in Sydney of Melbourne. On the other hand, we have examined sets and the workmanship of the surcharges certainly the workmanship of the surcharges certainly bears a Rue \& resembainct to that or Messis. the fact that if Messrs. De La Rue \& Co. printed the surcharge they would receive their instructhe surcharge they would receive their instructions through the Crown Agents for the Colonies, in which case we should have expected to see them noted in the Colonial Office Journal. Perhaps the Fiji Government possess a high-class printing press. Failing London, the stamps are most likely to have been surcharged at Sydney or Suva.

London, Tilbury \& Southend Railway, 16th printing; Nos. $\mathrm{S}_{3} / \mathrm{I}$ to $\mathrm{S}_{3} / 4800$. Transfer The 15 th printing was numbered $\mathrm{S}_{2} / 7201$ to $\mathrm{S} 2 / 12000$ (and not 10000 as previously reported). It is satisfactory to note that the Company are now getting 4800 stamps printed at a time instead of 2400 . Since numbering was started on $22.10 .01,26800$ stamps have been printed and 22000 issued, an average of 3000 per and 2200
Sligo, Leitrim \& Northern Counties, gth printing. The colour has been changed from green to blue. The sheets still consist of 9 stamps. Issued 14.12 .08 or earlier. The stamps are from a new
die, closely resembling type 1 (1891) of die, closely resembling type I (189i) of

DUTCH INDIES (485 G 488).-Nederlandsch Tijdschrift voor Postzegelkunde (1.09/5) states that a new design is ready for the values up to 50c. of the Dutch Indies, Curaçao and Suriname. The fault with the present design is that the lettering of the inscription is too small and our contem. porary also criticizes the use of the word "Postzegel " instead of "Frankeerzegels." "Post. zegel," strictly speaking, means any stamp issued in connection with the post and has been incorrectly appropriated in the past to postage stamps alone.

The same journal (1.09/6) reports having received a block of the i5c. surcharged with bars but without "Java " or "Buiten Bezit."
EGYPT (444 T 488). - A correspondent writes :-" I have received from a friend in the Egyptian Government Service a letter in which he states, 'They have done away with the New Official Stamps for interior use, and reverted to the old ones, the new ones are only used for foreign correspondence now. New Newspaper Rate.
Philatelists need not be excited. The farthing stamp (says the "Transvaal Leader") is not a new issue to add to their already unwieldy collections and perforated gummed engravings. It is nothing more than an impressiun in red ink, very ugly, and with the simple word "Paid" enclosed in a circular border, with the date. It means nothing to philatelists, but a great deal to newspaper publishers and their readers, for henceforth the postage on Transvaal newspapers sent to subscribers in the Transvaal direct from the publishers will be reduced to one farthing. In the past the postage on the "Leader," for instance, has been hd $^{d}$ for 40 oz . This means that sometimes the postage has been td., but with a 16 -page or 20 -page paper the postage has risen to 1 Id. Then, again, the postage on the itd. There can be little doubt that these high postage tid. There can be litte doubt that these high postage newspapers, particularly in the country districts, where there are no shops, and delivery of papers can only be effected by means of the Post Office.
The present reduction applies only to Transvaal newspapers sent to subscribers in the Transvaal, and then only if handed in at the Post Office counter in bundles of not less than 240. This means, of course, that the small newsvendor, who has comparatively few customers, will be unable to take advantage of the present reduced tariff. It is obviously intended to apply only to publishers of newspapers who distribute
normous numbers by post, and will in no way benefit private individuals who wish to post copies to their friends.
Special arrangements have been made by the ohannesburg Post Office Circulation Department o cope with the work. It will entail additional work lower rate, but if it has the effect anticipated, by encouraging the country reader to ke ep himself more fully acquainted with the doings of the day, the Department will be more than satisfied.

It is to be hoped that Great Britain will wake up and follow suit. The halfpenny newspaper ate has now existed 38 years and it is surely time a further reduction was considered. In the case of E.W.S.N. the Post Office takes 52 halfpenvies per annum or half the subscription of $4 / 4$. As it also takes a halfpenny on each free copy posted, it gets, in conjunction with the newsagents, three-quarters of the entire revenue of the paper, leaving only one quarter for the publisher and nothing for the Editor!

## Cayman Islands.

## Result of the Official Enquiry. Islanders Exonerated.

The enquiry into the allegations made against the postal authorities of the Cayman Islands and Jamaica has clearly established the fact that both are innocent of the imputations made against
Official correspondence published in the Gleaner (2, 7.1.09), a Jamaican newspaper, proves that the Cayinan Islands provisional stamps were due to a
bona-fide shortage of the regular issue and that bona-fide shortage of the regular issue and that
they were authorised by the proper authority. they were authorised by the proper authority.
They were not sold to correspondents, because They were nut sold to correspondents, because
on 26.7.07 the Colonial Secretary, Jamaica, wrote to the Cominissioner of the Cayman Islands:"I request that you will not sell any of these surcharged stamps except across the counter." The
Postmistress was therefore not in a position to Postmistress was therefore not in a pos
supply dealers and inust be exonerated.
Whether it was advisable to make such an order is a matter of opinion. It is quite clear that had the order not been made, dealers would bave eagerly bought up the stocks of surcharged stamps as quickly as they were made; on the other hand, it in equally clear that the islanders did the same thing, and under the protection of the order in
question, compelled the dealers to pay a huge question, "Protection" is not what one expects premium. "Protection" is not what one expects moreover the Colonial Secretary's action savours momewhat of ingratitude, because stamp dealers somewhat of ingratitude, because stanp Cayman Islands to their present state of financial pros. perity.
There appears also to have been an impression abroad that dealers who order a large quantity of stamps must oecessarily require then for speculative purposes, but we venture to state
that many of the small urders for half a dozen that many of the small orders for half a dozen
or a dozen provisional stamps received at Grand Cayman were of a much more speculative nature than the larger ones of dealers. Ewen's Colonal Stamp Market, Ltd. for instance, is entrusted with orders from a great many of the leading collect. ors to keep their collections up-to-date, and as such collectors purchase every new stamp as it appears, whether likely to be common or rare, it execute that of a private collector who asks for perhaps only half-a-dozen specimens, one for his collection and five for speculative sale to the very dealer who has been passed over.
We do not however for a moment doubt the good intentions of the Colonial Secretary in the inatter and accept the report of the inquiry as a inatter and accept the report of the inquiry as a
complete vindication of the action of the authorities both at Grand Cayman and at Kingston. But we hope to see free-trade principles re-established at those two places at an early date, for we are still without a single
copy of the $7^{2,000} \ddagger \mathrm{~d}$. stainps ordered over six months ago!

We are sorry that one of our contemporaries commenting on the report should say that "the inquiry has been a shameless farce" and sur. prised that alinost in the same breath it should admit that "t the cliarges which have been made have been wanting in definiteness. . . inore definite and irrefutable proofs shouid have been forthcoming." Should not the "more definite and irrefutable proofs" have been searched for before the charges were made? In their continued absence, would it not be more honest to admit that a mistake was made in making the charges? If it will assist our contemporary to sweep away the editorial cobwebs, we may state that for many years we have purchased stamps from the Cayman Islands Pust Office and that we have also seen much of the Postmistress' correspond. ence with readers of E.W.S.N., and in no case has any charge ever been made over the face scandal, it is that Editors sbould rush into print with such sensational headlines as "Cayman Islands Swindle " when they do not possess an atom of evideoce "ther than their own imaginings. Such articles as "The Disgrace of New Zealand,"; Mail stamps, aud more recently those on Brunei,

Labuan, Gambia and the Cayman Islands are discreditable to the hobby
The exact number of the $\frac{1}{2}$. on $5 /$-and 1 d . on 5/-stamps surcharged was stated in the course the enquiry to be as follows:-

22nd November, 1907. Fifteen sheets of 120 each of the td. and id. on $5 /$.
9th December, 1907. Three sheets id. on 5/.
There were thus $3960 \mathrm{5} /$ - stamps overprinted. The Colonial Stamp Market purchased nearly half, two correspondents each sending us as many as 720 . In one case our success was due to the fortunate accident that the resident to whom we cabled for the 1 d . on Id. provisional was away from the island at the time and returning just when the surcharged 5/: were issued bought them for us instead. He did not however fail to deduce from the fact that we had spent £7 7s. on the cablegram that we wanted the stamps badly and eventually we had to pay him $\oint 150$ for visiting the Post Office on our behalf.

## Cbe Future or Stamp Collecting.

The following remarks by Mr. C. A. Howes iu the 1908 Annual Number of the American Phil. atelist are well worthy of serious consideration by stamp collectors.
Once upon a time there were no stamp collectors. That was nearly seventy years ago. But within the following decade it is safe to say there must have been a few attracted by the novel bits of paper who desired
to retain them as curios, and stamp collecting was begun. Then, in due course, about twenty years after begun. Then, in due course, about twenty years after
the birth of the adhesive stamp, we find the dealers' advertisements beginning to appear. Now what were
ane the prime features that led these eariy collectors and
thement the prime features that led these eariy collectors and
dealers to discriminate between their treasures? dealers to discriminate betwen the de treasures? the design and the colour. And it is these four items that stand pre-eminent to-day, although almost lost sight of in the mass of detail and minutix, even, which load down our catalogues and encumber our albums. ." Rank heresy!" I hear someone say. Maybe; but there are plenty of heretics and there are going to
be more. It is always thus. Man cannot seem to be more. It is always thus. Man cannot seem to
est content with elementary considerations; he must rest content with elementary considerations; he must
build a house of cards upon them, wing added to wing, build a house of cards upon them, wing added to wing,
story to story, tower to tower, until the whole mass story to story, tower to tower, until the whole mass
comes tumbling down in a common ruin. That this would be the result of the development of modern philately, particularly along the so-called ". dotty" philately, particularly along the so-called the best interests of the pursuit at heart, and a true appreciation of its merits as a hobby. It is these who have raised the cry for the simplified catalogue and the simplified collection; who have voiced the protest against overloaded catalogues, against bloated" collections, against the "microscope" philately which is forcing a collector to be a millionaire, and turning away in despair and disgust the novice and the amateur, who might, if ted in the right direction, prove future main. stays in the cause.
Let us consider a moment what has crept in since the early days to cause all this contusion of detail. In the first place watcrmarks which are invisible when the stamp is in its place in the album. Secondly, perfora.
tion merely a convenience for separating the stamps tion merely a convenience for separating the stamps
by breaking the paper between; the early collectors often trimmed of the perforation to improve the appearance of the stamp, which to them was the main thing. Third, varieties in the paper used, mostly no apparent when the stamp is mounted in the collection.
Fourthly, varieties of type, which Fourthly, varieties of type, which may or may not be
visible withou: a magnifier. Fifthly, varieties of visible without a magnifier. Fifthly, varieties of
surcharge as much of a bugbear as the perforations surcharge, as much of a bugbear as the perforations.
Sixth, and lastly, shades, which at least have the merit of lending variety to the appearance of the album page of lending variety to the appearance of the album page
when they are well chosen. In scanning this list. pray when they are well chosen. In scanning this list. pray
tell me if there is anything that effects essentially the stamp itself, which is of course none other than the impressed design, unless it be type varieties, and shades? And if one omits these as trivialities, has he not returned to the "first principles" already enumer-
ated? They are the "big four " of philately, and furnish the true basis for the simple life in collecting.
It is hardly deniable, we think that stamp collecting is not as popular as it was and most dealers and catalogue publishers have to report declining sales. The purchases made by a ew individual collectors are perhaps larger
than in the past but collectors who spend from
£ io to $£$ roo per anuum on stamps have greatly decreased in number. We believe that watermarks, perforations and shades(especially shades) are at the root of this loss of popularity. The hobby has in fact been smothered under the hobby has in fact been smothered under the
science. It is depressing but nevertheless true science. It is depressing but nevertheless true
that the publication of a specialist handhook on that the publication of a specialist handhook on
the stamps of a country has generally rendered the stamps of a country has generally rendered
them unpopular. Australians were the first to them unpopular. Australians were the first to
suffer, undoubtedly because they were the first suffer, undoubtedly because they were the first
to be catalogued in detail and the thoroughness to be catalogued in detail and the thoroughness
with which the catalogue dealt with them killed with which the catalogue dealt with them killed
their sale so far as most general collectors were their sale so
concerned.

Then African stamps became popular, probably because few African Colonies have a past liaunted by watermarks, perforations and shades. Later, came the day of small countries. Collecturs hailed with relief the idea of collecting the stamps of such countries as Seychelles, but down catie the publishers with exhaustive handbooks and collectors fled for safety to new issues. The last issues of Queen Victoria's reign were for the most part tree from watermark and perforation varieties, hence their popularity is easily accounted for. Finally came the Edwardian issues, which saved to the hobby many votaries it would which saved to the hobby many votarer cases, we may point to fiscal stamps, which were never so may point to fiscal stamps, which were never so
popular as when there existed no cataloges of popular as when there existay stamps, we sold
them. In the case of railway more in one year precedug the publication of our history of them than we have done in the seven years since. Even envelope stamps were popular
(cut syuare) till some misguided individual started (cut square) till some misguided individual started to catalogue the different sizes, shapes and qualities. British stamps tou have lost a good deal of popularity since they have been so exhaustively written about
On every side we have the picture of the unhappy Collector being chased from pillar to post by the too enthusiastic handbook publisher, who never seems to realize that stamp collecting attracts as a hobby and not as a science. The writer of these lines is perhaps guilty of more informative catalogues than most students of philately and he frankiy admits that if he had the same opportunities over again, the books the same opportunities over again, the books
would remain unwritten. The great question for dealers and especially philatelic societies is how dealers and especially philatelic socleties is how
to restore to stamp collecting its character of a to restore to stamp collecting its character of a
hobby. Members of Societies now-a.days are hobby. Members of Societies now-a.days are
mainly specialists in the stamps of two or three countries and at a ineeting hardly anyone takes countries and at a meeting hardly anyone takes
an interest in his neighbour's collection or in the an interest in his neighbour's collection or in the
paper of the evening; there is usually in fact a paper of the evening; there is usually in fact a poor attendance. Were simplified general coliecting restored to favour, there would be a common
hond between the members. Even the demand bond between the members. Even the demand for "New Issues" is nothing like what it ought to
be, for there are very few British Colonies which command a sale amongst collectors of of a new issue of stamps; we should like to see 500,000 collectors throughont the world regularly keeping general collections up-to-date.
As a hobby pure and simple, shorn of all science, stamp collecting might play a great rôle in the near future in helping to cement friendship between nations. The time cannot be far distant when the international letter rate will be reduced to id. and such a reduction must give a great impetis to the interchange of correspondence, not only in connection with trade, but also for instance between students who have the good fortune to attend schools where practical methods of modern language teaching are followed. But it is difficult to sit down and write a letter to a fellow student in another conntry withont having mutual interests and we cannot imagine any hobby more suitable than that of stamp collect ing and exchanging to provide the basis of much pleasant correspondence.

## Future or Stamp Collecting.

LAST week we asked our readers to reply to the question:-" Which form of stamp collecting do you think will be most popular in the future?" In order to assist voters, we suggest the following five groups as those most likely to find favour, namely:-
t.-General Collecting, without watermark, perfora-
ions, shades, surcharges. About 9,500 different ions, shades, surcharges. About 9,500 different varieties of postage adhesives exist, giving a reasonable
chatice of making a representative collection of the chatice of making a repres
stamps of the whole world.
2.-General Collecting, according to existing detailed atalogues. Anything approaching completeness (40.000 varieties) impossible.
3.-General Collecting. limited to current and new issues, chiefly unused. The usual method is to join a New Issue Service.
4.-Moderate specialism, limited to mother country and colonies or to certain countries only
5.-Scientific specialism, limited to a single country or even issue at a time.
Judging from the papers sent in, opinion seems to differ widely, but there are one or two conclusions that find support from a majority of our correspondents. They are almost unanimously agreed that No. $I$ is the best system for a collector so rigid a system is unsatisfying.
Thus "F" (Cardiff) says:-"Class I. will always be the most popular for beginners and Class IV. increasingly popular for those who continue collecting for more than a couple of years."
Not one of our correspondents however touches upon the point of what the beginner is to do with his general collection after he has passed through the probationary period. Our own advice is that he should retain it and keep it up-to-date, specializing here and there any country, issue or single stamp which takes his fancy. The advantages of such a system of collecting are many. Should any country's tamps suddenly become popular, the collector has a nucleus with which to start a more elaborate collection. Again, he can always compare collections with a friend; even though they have different specialties, they still have a common ground to meet upon. Such a simplified collection is, too, an excellent foundation on which to build a collection of new issues. There are, in fact, any number of reasons for making a general collection. On the other hand, the general collection. On the other hand, the
collector who limits himself to a few countries is very apt to find himself stranded high and is very apt to find himself stranded high and dry, especially if such countries lose their
popularity. Here are some more opinions of our readers:-
(Chertsey).-."Get together a general cullection of about 3000 and then add all the new cheap issues as they come out in blocks of our and dozens in double rows.
" S " (Dover). -" No. i for a collector of small means; after that 4 ; No. 5 for fanatics!
"J" (Urmston).-" Nos. 1 and 3 are the most interesting to my mind. The amount of detail which has been introduced into philately would kill the finest business or hobby ever known."
"N " (Burnham, Somerset). -"General col. lecting, without watermarks, perforations, shades, and with only one distinct kind of each surcharge." [Has $N$ carefully weighed the enormous difference that collecting surcharges means? Their collection increases the number of different arieties from 9500 to about 14,000 , many of the additional 4500 being very expensive stamps; but what is still more serious, it means that the 9500 must be collected unsurcharged, whereas under our simplified system, a surcharge makes no more difference than a postmark. Take the case of Obock for instance. The 25 and 50 franc case of Obock for instance. The 25 and 50 franc respectively, which is equivalent to saying that 99 out of 100 collectors will never possess ders of these stamps were overprinted permitting their sale for $\frac{d}{}$. and id. ( 5 and ro centumes) respectively and soon after their issue they were to he had very chraply and even now cost only 2/- or 3/- each. C'nder our simplified system these overprinted 25 and 50 francs are as eligible to fill the album spaces as those without over print and the cost of a representative collection
is much reduced. But once admit that a
surcharge constitutes a difference and the blank spaces in the album can only be filled by the specimens costing $£ 2$ and $£ 3$ apiece. We think our system cannot be improved upon, especially as it in no way prohibits a collector from making a supplementary specialized collection of Obock or any other country if he really wants both surcharged and unsurcharged varieties. Another point of the utmost importance to philately is the check that would be placed on unnecessary surcharging (if indeed such exists). It is clear that if, say, a $1 /$ - stamp is surcharged $\notin I$ (as in the case of Oil Rivers), the Post Office is running a great risk of forgery, and surcharging to a higher value is rarely practised. On the other hand if a $1 /$ - stamp were reduced by means of surcharging to $\frac{1}{6}$ d. all collectors following our system would buy this cteaper variety and the post office would suffer by losing the revenue from the sale of the unsurcharged $1 / /$ stamp. A typical case is that of Tunis which recently surcharged its stock of 5 fr . stamps " 75 c .
Colonial Stamp Market's Quotations Dept. has, as a result, ceased to import the 5 fr. stamps unsurcharged and stocks them surcharged only, the $7 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. variety being equally eligible under our system to fill the space at the end of the set.Ed.].
"C" (Beckenham).-"Intermediate between Nos. 1 and 2 . Collecting in plain albums or sectional printed ones, thus avoiding blank pages and comprising more or less countries according to one's ineans." (We cannot see the advantage of excluding a certain number of different designs in order to enable other stamps to be represented in duplicate, such duplicates leing often indistinguishable by the unaided eye. Still, "C is entitled to express his opinion.-Ed.

N" (Lewishatn). "I have been ten years a collector and consider that No. 1 is undoubtedly the ideal form either alone or combined with No. 3 (New Issues)." 【And so says the Colonial Stamp Market!].

G" (Sidmouth).-"I believe in a general collection, unused and mint if possible, different watermarks and surcharges but not perforations or minor varieties." [This is the Continental system, and with the substitution of used for unused has obtained a great vogue in Germany.] "M " (Rickmansworth).-"I think any changes will be bad for a good many collectors so I vote that everything remains as it always has been." If our correspondent had said "as it is," we should have left him to his opinion, but as be says " as it always has been," we feel bound to remind him that the prevailing system of stamp collecting has been perpetually changing and is still changing. The Editor of the Stamp Collector's Magazine thus recounts, in the first number of that journal, dated 1st February, 1863, his intro duction to stainp-collecting.

> Postal Chit-Chat.
"Have you a yellow Saxon?" "I want a Russian.", "I'll give a red Prussian for a blue Brunswicker.", "Will you exchange a Russian for a black English ? ", "I wouldn't give a Russian for twenty English! Such were the exclamations that saluted our ears two
years or so since, when waiting for an interminable line years or so sices to break sufficiently to allow us to cross Cheapside. . . . We found the remarks proceeded from . . . a score or more of youths just poured forth from a noble educational institution in the neighbourhood.
Subsequently country and colour were supple. mented by denomination and " black English became " black penny Englisb" but even to this day it is the contrast of colours which attracts in the first place as much as anything. For instance, we recently came across the following dialogue in Fijne Beschuiten, a comedy by Justus van Maurik, Jr., (5th Act, ist Scene) :-

Carolicntje.-If you'll give me this Brazilian stamp, ("dien postzegel van Brazilie ") you can have two blue Austrians (" blauwe Oostenrijkers ") in exchange.
Henriettje.-No, I want to keep that one; I got it from Mr. Bosch.
Caralientje.-Well, what of that ? You can ask him for another! Giver
one for the Austrians.
Henriëtje.-No, that's quite impossible; I can't nrictje.-No, that's quite impossible; I can
give that away, as Mathilde gave it to me! and so on. Here is a new view of specialism! Stamps classified according to the friends who
gave them

Passing from these very elementary forms of stamp collecting, we have not very far to go before reaching our Sinplified System, which recognizes only country, design, denomination and colour, anything overprinted on a stamp being treated as a cancellation provided that without it the stamp would still have been complete. This was practically the system in vogue between 860 and and 1870, but collectors in those days took envelope stamps (cut square), local stamps, railway stamps, in fact almost everything besides. After 1870 only postage stamps survived and stationery came to be collected entire. Advanced collectors began to study watermarks, perforations, etc., but it was only after 1890 that they were thoroughly exploited in the catalogues. The increase in the size of the catalogue was then checked by throwing overboard locals, stationery, and in fact everything that could be conveniently separated, and now that there remains nothing else to throw, some people would like to blame "new issues" tor the growth of the catalogue! The over-elaboration has practically killed The over-elaboration has practically killed general collecting, which has always been the
backbone of the hobby and we should like to see specialized collections relegated to a secondary specialized collections relegated to a secondary
position and simplified collections on the 1860 position and simplified collections on the 8860
system (now about to celebrate its jubilee) restored to general favour. We feel certain both dealers and philatelic Societies would benefit and even specialists would have a fine field for recruiting.
"S." (Tiverton, Devon).-"I collect as No. I but Great Britain and Colonies only."
"O" (Leeds).-" I give my vote to No. 2."
"D" (Kinsale).—"I prefer moderate specialism limited to mother country and a few colonies." [The drauback to this system is that the collectors of each country isolate themselves and there can be no comradeship between the colectors of different nations. For ourselves, we take a pleasure in corresponding with friends of other countries and there is probably not a civilized country with which we have not corres. ponded.-Ed.].
" L " (Birmingham). - "Collections of one's own country and colonies. Excluding varieties such as multiple watermarks and perforations and hades. The last are a downright nuisance."
"C" (Jersey).-"I consider that geveral collect. ing will be most popular in the future, but that attention will be given to the older stamps of each country in preference to New Issues. [We sincerely hope not !-Ed.]
"R" (Ramsgate). "My opinion is that general collecting limited to current and new ssues chiefy unsed $T$ This is better - E .] countries or colonies will be most popular.'
"M" (Barking).-"If you take watermarks and surcharges away, you remove all that is interesting.'
W" (Streathanin).-" Moderate specialism, limited to mother country, some of her colonies and some foreign countries to insure stability of entire collection.'
"J " (Rugby School).-." I should like to vote for No. I but my opinion leads me to suppose No.
(Devonport).-"4, $1,3,2,5 \cdot "$
(Bath).-"No. 4 is the best way to form a collection although No. 3 is very good."
"M" (Birmingham). - "The most popular form of collecting postage stamps in the future will be only one or two favourite countries.
But fiscals are the stamps of the future as they But fiscals are the stamps of the future as they
are comparatively cheap and there is much virgin soil to be covered by specialists. I collect postage. fiscal and rail stamps, in singles, pairs, strips and blocks, used and unused, and take all shades, watermarks, perforations and every possible variety of them all." (Let us hope that "M" may stand for "millionaire" some day! W'e foresee good times for dealers !-ED.].
Although we have only quoted a snall number of the papers sent in, we think we have given everyone a fair hearing, and must confess that we are no wiser as to what the bulk of collectors look forward to. Everyone seems to want something different!

The supply of the $1 /$-value has been exhausted. The new stock may be either multiple watermark or the new colour." Our contemporary (11.1.09/52) also states:-

## New Hebrides

We have received the series overprinted on New Caledonia stamps as announced in our November umber. They came to hand from Yort Vila on the fth December. Several of our English contemporaries announce the issue of these stamps. This is owing to he fact that the stamps for all French colonies are procurable at the Postal Bureau in Paris.
We have been informed that both the British and French Resident Commissioners in the New Hebrides have decided to prohibit the sale of the new stamps in arge quantities to dealers, the idea being to check ramekg ben.
We have .. Condurther informed that the omission of he word "Condominium" from the New Caledonia sumply is exhausted it will be rectified
supply is exhausted it will be rectifed. We are also further informed that the overprint on the Fiji stamps was applied at the Government Printing Office in Fiji. The authorities there deserve every credit for the admirable manner in which they have xecuted the work
It is certainly a feather in the cap of the Government Printing Office in $F i j i$ that its work has been so generally admired and, in fact, attributed by most experts to Messrs. De I.a Rue \& Co.
Le Timbrophile de France ( $10.2 .09 / 5$ ) says that he stamps are suld at a French face value of $5 \mathrm{c} ., 10 \mathrm{c} ., 20 \mathrm{c} ., 25 \mathrm{c}+50 \mathrm{c} ., 60 \mathrm{c}$. or if. 25 as the case may he, also that the design for the new joint issue has been sent to Paris.

NEW ZEALAND (489O491).-We read as follows in the Australian Philatelist (11.1.09/52):-
" We have received from Mr. F. Neist, specimens of a slightly altered type of the id. Universal, and the 6d. reduced size, both overprinted Ufficial. At a first glance the id. value does not show much difierence, but a closer inspection proves that a new plate has been prepared from a redrawn die. The rosettes in the upper corners are very much altered, the shading on the drapery of the central figure is vertical instead of diagonal, while the lines on the geographical globe are diagonal instead of the geographical globe are diagonal instead of eertical. The words C niversal postage are
slighty smaller, while the turret of the ship in slightly simatler, while the turret of the ship in
the background is totally different. The waves the background is totally different. The waves
close to the bow have almost disappeared in the close to the buw have almost disappeared in the
redrann type. The scroll work round the sides of the new type is very much heavier and more distinct. As these stamps are printed from engraved steel plates it cannot be argued that an electro has bee: redrawn on the same plan as those in the Melbourne Printing Office. We have not yet seen the id. stamp without the word ' ()fficial,' but we presume it will come into general "use by and by if it has not done so already."

Mr. P. Malone contributes an interesting note on the first postare due stamps to the Australian Philutelist (11.1.og/54).

- Although postage due stamps were first issued in New Zealand in December, 1899, over eight years ago, no attempt appears to have yet been made to chroncle thein in their proper order either by the philatelic authorities in New Zealand or abroad, and we find at the present time in the leading catalogues that they are divided into funr divisions, with an apology for further subdivision, whereas if placed in proper order one lot only is necessary. If a collector were to arrange the stamps in his collection would get to catalogut (vide Stankey Gibions) he the following order, viz.:- $\mathrm{d} ., 8 \mathrm{~d} ., \mathrm{i} / \cdot, 2 / \cdot 5 \mathrm{~d}$ the tollowing order, viz. :- $6 \mathrm{~d} ., 8 \mathrm{~d} .$, I/-, $2 /-5 \mathrm{~d} .$, 6d.; tod., $\frac{1}{\frac{1}{d} ., ~ I d ., ~ 2 d ., ~} 3 \mathrm{~d} . ;$ Id., 2d. and $4 \mathrm{~d} .$, quite a congiomeration, which is not only unsightly in a collection, but according to the able trouble in counting ornaments and dots
with the aid of a magnifying glass in order to place his specimens; it means also a loss of time, all of which is absolutely unnecessary, as I will endeavour to point ont in this article.
"Most collectors, especially of British colonial stamps, usually desire when possible to have them arranged, from the lowest value of the series upwards, and there is no reason whatever that such should not be the case with these stamps instead of the complication of values given above.
"Certainly there are two distinct types of the stamps, as well as large and small 'D's' in the pence value, but it is a remnarkable fact that ouly one value appears in both types, viz., the $\frac{1}{3} d$. while in the case of the large and small D only two stamps, the 1 d . and 2 d . values, appear with both, and all in the other values only one variety exists, although different values appear in differ ent types. According to the present arrangement of these stamps all the higher values are placed under Type I., while the lower values are placed under Type II., excepting the $\frac{1}{2} d$. value, which is in both types. To simplify matters it will be necessary to arrange the types so that the lower values shall be under Type 1. and the higher values under Type II.

The difference in the two types can be easily discerned, but to avoid a long account of the details, and to enable the collector to distinguish each type at a glance, I will describe them concisely as follows;-
"Type I., N.Z. small, last ornament in circle turning outwards."
"Type II., N.Z., large, last ornament in circle turning inwards."
"In the case of the large and the small $D$ in the pence valnes I will refer to them as $A$ and B respectively. Now, with the above particulars to work upon, it is a very easy matter to arrange all the values in their proper order as follows:-

## Future of Stamp Collecting.

## Revolt of German Societies Against <br> Over-Detailed Catalogue.

We continue to receive an inmense amount of correspondence on the subject of "Will be nost of Stamp Collecturg?", and many of our Continental readers have now forwarded us opinions. Briefly, the five most popular methods of collecting are:-
-General Collecting; no watermarks, perforations, shades, surcharges.

2.-New Issues.

5.-Scientific Specialism

The original form of collecting was, of course, No. i, but it was not limited to postage stamps as most old albums testify, and there is no par ticular reason why it should be at this day. In recommending collectors to adopt No. 1 as their standard, we have never said "collect nothing else." In fact we are strongly of opinion that Nos. $t$ and 3 would make a fine combination, and the formation of a collection on our No. I system does not prevent a collector also making specialised collections; in fact it distinctly aids him in the selection of the country or colony likely to interest him.

Although stamp-collecting commenced with nethod No. I, it was subsequently superseded by No. 2, and the latter was universally popular until about twenty years ago, when collectors and dealers began to study their stamps seriously and o create a mass of varieties never before though time, because so long as it was incomplete a time, because so long as it was incomplete
there was anopportunity of finding varieties soon to be wase and quoted in the catalogue at high to be rare and quoted in the catalogue at high
prices, and it goes without saying that the dis covery and exploitation of varieties was a godsend o dealers, each re-classification of their stock sending up its value and increasing their (paper) profits, besides inducing their clients to purchase wo stamps where one would have sufficed before. But now that every country is catalogued out in detail, the chance of such profit disappears; verywhere stocks of stamps bave been examined Even the stimulus of ever-increasing discounts has failed to keep public interest alive and the great bulk of collectors would only be too glad to release themselve: from the yoke of special. ism. That a crisis is at hand is evident from the following announcement now being circulated on the continent. Most collectors even in this published by Messrs. Senf Brothers, of Leipzig. The Senf Catalogue has been the basis of all stamp transactions in German speaking countries for 20 years or more and probably has a larger circulation even than the Stanley Gibbons' Catalogue in English speaking countries. Therefore the announcement that the leading German and Austrian societies have decided to abandon and Austrian societies have decided standard and use instead the simplified Kohl Catalogue is a matter of international pholatelic importance. "F" (Lytham).-"I think there are three classes of collectors to be considered.-(A) The schoolboy collector who does not spend much money; (B) The moderate collector who is more or less of an enthusiast and spends from say $£$ to to $\ell$ too or so annually; (C) The wealthy collector who spends hundreds or thousands of pounds annually. Class $A$ will collect whatever comes his way and Class $C$ is well able to take care of itself, so I take your questions to apply to Class B, to which I belong. From that point of view I should vote for your No. 2, but strictly modified by the exclusion of (I) Varieties of perforation, (2) Varieties of surcharge including inverted and double surcharges as most of these are really printers' waste or are deliberately manufactured
for collectors. [We do not agree.-Ed.] (3) Varieties of paper ; (4) Varieties of position and shape of dots and letters; (5) Slight varieties of shade; ( 6 ) Varieties of foreign watermarks for shade; (0) Varieties of foreign watermarks for
English collectors; (7) Most of the very rare English collectors; (7) Most of the very rare
stamps for financial reasons; (8) Even some of Stamps for hnancial reasons; (8) Even some of
the slighter varieties of Colonial watermarks. the slighter varieties of Colonial watermarks.
On these hines I fancy your 40,000 varieties would On these hines I fancy your 40,000 varieties would
be reduced by probably $50 \%$ or more. For ex. be reduced by probably $50 \%$ or more. For ex ample I reduce Austria from 432 as catalogued
to 173 stamps; Hungary from 177 to $8+$; Holland to 173 stamps; Hungary from 177 to $8+$; Holland
from 235 to ioi ; British Bechuanaland from 99 from 235 to 101 ; British Bechuanaland from 99 to $5^{6}$ : Griqualand West from 129 to 6; Malta from 51 to 43. I think this would not be unmanageable, but you must keep up with the New Issues. Further, if necessary, an English collector might leave out certain countries like Salvador ( 632 stamps catalogned), Nicaragua (533) ; French, Spanish and Portuguese Colonies with perhaps 7000 or 8000 varieties catalogued. In these remarks I exclude everything except postal adhesive stamps.
We do not quite see why Salvador, Nicaragua, nor French, Spanish and Portuguese Colonies should be excluded altogether. It is much better to simplify every country on consistent lines, without favour, and build the foundation of a collection on such simplified lines; afterwards any favourite countries or issues can be special. any favourite countries or issues cano be special sed. Many correspondeats have modined their vote for No. 1 by meluding surcharged stamps; his is equivalent to saying that they are in Colonial surcharges, Colonial surcharges, the mass of recent Ecuador and Nicaragua surcharges, and so on. They don't mean this ; probably they merely want to express their regret that such sets as the first issues of Gibraltar, Levant, Morocco, Somaliland, Straits Settlements, Maldives, etc., should be excluded. But collectors who vote for "surcharges" would have to include the former as well as the latter, whereas those who support our " no surcharge" principle are always at liberty to add anything in the way of surcharged stamps as a supplement to their collection. We want collectors throughout the world to divide their collections into two parts, nucleus and supplentent. We want the nucleus or foundation of the collection to be a general one, comprising all the countries of the world and we want to simplify this general colection in such a way that it will be of equal interest to all the collectors of the world. Beyond this, each collector can give rein to his individu. ality by forming a supplementary collection, such extension being made in any direction his fancy may dictate. The advantare of having the nucleus of every collection throughout the world nucleus would be many: for one thing philatelic simlar would be many; for one thing philatelic societies would fourish becanse all members wonld have a common gromen on which to "talk stamps"; exchange relations with foreign countries ${ }^{\text {monders }}$ specialise only the staups mpossible if collectors specialise only the stamps of their mother country); and the firmness imparted to stamp values ; the international market in such stamps would assuredly be impart ed to all classes of stamps, even specialist varie ties; but such an international standard must be
on simple and consistent lines and we consider on simple and consistent lines and we consi
the exclusion of surcharges inevitable.-ED.
"" (Tunbridge Wells).-"As collectors cannot afford No. 2, they will probably take up No. ${ }_{4}$, but will lose the pleasure of filing up blank spaces, a great attraction to beginners. [General collecting, according to some standard fixed hefore. hand, is really the only method which appeals to the collecting instinct, becanse it is the only one which accords the pleasure of "filling up blank spaces." Specialist collecting is necessarily indefinite.-Ed. 1
"S " (Cork).-" No. 3 (New Issues) will be the style of the future, in thy opinion. Why should the nature of the paper affect the value of a stamp? This is'mannfacturing' varieties with a vengeance.'
"L" (Herne Hill).-" I agree with your No. 3 (New Issues).'
" W" (Canterbury).-"Being myself a 'moder ate specialist.' I naturally favour that kind of collection. General collecting, as you advocate it, I have no interest for; and general collecting on the lines of detailed catalogues' I have neither time nor money for. If, however, we all

It would not only be better for themselves, but for the community as a whole. The Lord Mayor also emphasised the value of philately as forming an excelleut hobby for men hod had to retice from busimess on account of old age, and concluded by saying that the Exhibition would act as a stimulus and encouragement to would act as a stimums and enconr.

The result is great confusion and no hittle delay and they are freely predicting that several of the present colours will not outlast the presen administration, if they continue unchanged for so long a time as that.
"I presume that this is about the only office that has had much experience with them so far as, as near as I can find out, they seem to have above ac practicaly no offices wisw not be pink, as heretofore announced, but will be a grey, or grey-black. very closely approaching the light, early tint of the 8c. of 1902.03 . It is expected to be issued at any time now."

" B " (St. Andrews) writes us again :-
"I am sure that all your readers are very much interested in the discussion at present going on in your columns with reference to the various methods of collecting stamps. I observe that in your issue of to-day you give publicity to a few rather desultory remarks of mine, in which I accuse you of being illogical in your own system of general collecting. By way of criticisin, you very properly observe that I did not prove my statement. At the time when I wrote my remarks I bad no time to go into details, but I now venture to offer a few further remarks with the object of showing that there is something in iny original accusations.
"In the first place, in the British Colonial section you will find that you distinguish between such stamps as Grenada No. 31 and Sierra Leone No. 38. At the same time you refuse to distinguish between the many varieties of French Colonials which are all lumped together under Nos. 21 to 41 , and, as an even more extrene Nos. 21 to 41 , and, as an even more extrente various Spanish Colonials that are collected under Nos. 74, etc., of Fernando Poo. Now on your Nos. 74, etc., of Fernando poo. Now on your
attitude it is no argument to say that British Colonials are popular, while French Colonials are less so, and Spanish Colonials much less so; and perhaps you will permit me to observe that if the relations as to popularity had been reversed have stood as it now does, as far as the classes have stood as it now does, as far as the
of stamps now referred to are concerned.

In the second place, you include in your list the early issues of Panama; but no place is found for the issues of Antioquia, Bolivar and the other constituent States of Colombia. It is true that Panama is now no longer a part of Colombia and also true that its stamps are rather more popular
than are those of Antioquia. etc.; but is there than are those of Antioquia, etc.; but is there any real reason for differentiating between the states, so far as concerns their early issues?
"I daresay that 1 could give other instances if I took the trouble, but perihaps this will suffice as evidence of bona fides. As to surcharges I allow that your position is much stronger, and I am not prepared to attack that part of it which excludes such surcharges as merely alter the denomination of the stamp, although that is not with you in connection with such surcharges as the first issue Gibraltar, the early issues of

Somaliland, etc. Such surcharges with proper limitations are not very numerous, and l cannot
see how a collection that disregards them can be regarded as in any sense complete.
"Now a word as to New Issues. I cannot see in what way specialism in New Issues differs from any other kind of specialism. The specialist of New Issues of to day will be a specialist of old issues when his stamps will have become obsolete."

anything when it is obsolete. With regard to surcbarges, we cannot see with our corres pondent. Collectors are agreed that "precancelled " U.S.A. stamps are not different stamps; that is to say, a mint sheet of stamps surcharged with the name of a town is still an ordinary United States stamp. We adopt the same view with regard to Gibraltar, Somaliland, etc. The Indian Government has supplied stamps not ouly to Somalitand but also to East Africa, Zanzibar and Straits Settlements. as well as to the Native States, Chamba, Faridkot Gwalior, Jhind, Patiala, etc., and if we constituted even only one of these as a variety, we should have to brits in the lot, along win alt the Straits Settlements surcharged Perak, Johore, Selangor, etc., the New Zealand overprinted Aitutaki, Niue and Penrhyn, the new talians
just surcharged for Jerusalem, Janina Constanti just surcharged for Jerusalem, Janina, Constantinople, Salonica and other places (perhaps more later, etc.) Having got so far, we should be compelled to admit all the different names of French, German, Portuguese and Spanish Colonies and end up by getting in a hopeless muddle trying to exclude such stamps as the Nevis postage stamps surcharged St. Christopher for revenne purposes or the current King's Head Transvaal id. and 6d. surcharged Swazieland. No thanks, Mr. B.! We know when we are well off! Surcharges are irrevocably banished from our simplified system of collecting. The most we will acknowledge is that, say, an English stainp surcharged Cyprus is interesting, but so is an English stamp postmarked Cyprus. If any of our No. i Collectors fetl attracted by the stamps of a country or colony, they are always at liberty to make a supplementary specialized collection. Panama was included in our cata. logue because its stamps have always been of different standing to those Antioquia, Canca and Co., which are practically locals. TWe published our definition of a local stamp some years ago). For nearly the same reason we may also decide to exclude most stamps of Afglianistan.
It would be hopeless to attempt to simplify British Coionial stamps in the same way as those of French Colomials; besides, the former possess an individuality which the latter have
never had. The subject would take up too much space to discuss here.-ED.]

In connection with this discussion it may be recalled that in the C.S.A.R. libel action (February 1907), the Lord Chief Justice (Lord Alverstone) thought it infortunate that collectors should be ready to pay many times the value of a stamp just because it was overprinted with a name or initials and doubtless, if he were still a collector, he would be an anti-surcharger.

RUSSIA (491 Y 493).-We quote as follows from the Standard (20.2.09).

St. Petersburg, Feb. 15.
Russia is gradually putting on sale a new issue of postage stamps of the highly artistic design which has always characterised Russian stamps. A stupid story has been circulating in certain papers that the new issue will bear the heads of various wearers of
Imperial Crown, including the present Emperor!
Such a use of the Imperial head is utterly inconceivable in Russia. Postage stamps are made to be defaced, and usually in a very rough and ready manner. No Russian would dream of subjecting the manner. the Czar to such usage as this. Even on the coins, hallowed by immemorial usage of the great nations of antiquity, Russia does not use the Imperial head except on the pure gold and pure silver coins, the base-silver and the copper coins bear "head" in Eagle only, and the Russian
"heads or tails" is always "eagle."

The new stamp issues, of which several values are already on the market, are generally on a lighter ground than the old issues, but the colours are the same. The design is mainly heraldic and ornamental scroll work, a riband at the top bearing the inscription "Postage Stamp," and another at the bottom the dividin with the figure indicating value dividing the words and standing out conveniently plain.
The stamp edging of the new issue has peculiat markings on it and is prettily watered. Postmasters
are trying to force the public even in St. Petersburg to are trying to force the public even in Si. Petersburg to
accept the stamps without the edging, even when whole sheets are bought; presumably the new edgings whole sheets are bought; presumably the new edgings
have some value to the collecting world. I have have some value to the collecting world. I have
noticed slight irregularities between sheets in the depth of tone of the stamps; this is especially noticeable in the two kopek value.

We don't think the latter remark, with regard to margin, is quite correct. When the Editor was in St. Petersburg in 1907 he purchased stamps every day at the Post Office (there seemed to be only one in the whole city!) and never saw any with margin and we should imagine that it is removed from the stock every day before the office opeus. Perhaps this is to prevent the office being littered with the marginal paper, as most of the applicants for stamps appeared to purchase only just sufficient stamps to frank the letters in their hands. Supplying the stamps without marginal paper is in any case no new practice.

## Cbe Future of Pbilately.

Readers are still writing us on this subject which we also nutice is now coming in for attention in the current issues of several of our contemporaries. We classified the systems of collecting as follows :-(1) General collecting, no watermarks, surcharges, etc. ; (2) general collecting, detailed; (3) new issues; (4) few countries only; (5) scientific specialism.
"s" (Boston. Mass.) says:-"I believe the time has arrived when the majority of collectors will concentrate their energies in moderate specialism, either taking up some single country or philately, thus following the trend of all the philately,
"C". (Helena, Mont.).-Nos. 1 and 3 .
" M " (San Francisco).-"General collecting, one of a kind only, without watermarks, perforations, shades or surcharges. That is enough to keep a poor man guessing."
"B" (Denver, Colorado.)-" No. 1, Genera Collecting, then No. 4. No. 3 will also always be popular."

H" (Oak Park, Ill., U.S.A.) - "No. 4.
"G" (Herttord.) - "I think that moderate specialism limited to Britain and Colonies will be the most popular form of stamp collecting in the future. I think that such collection should include all distinctive types of watermarks, perforations, shades, etc., but not the multitude of almost imperceptible varieties which burden the hobby at present.'
"I"(Brighton.)-" I personally vote for No. i, as being tnost practicable. I collect that way myself.'
day." (Feltham).-" Nos. I and 4 will carry the day:" (I_ondon).-" No. 4, moderate specialism. Collectmg of Continents or Groups as the only way of representing a decent show and giving satisfaction to the collector."
"U " (Mitcham)..". General collecting on S.G. catalogue lines and specializing in one or more countries."
" P" (Bedford Park).-"I vote for No. I, try. ing to run into No. 2. If No. 3 is to have the vote then I say good-bye to stamps." [That is very unkind! However we let our iriend-or must we say enemy-lave his say.-ED.]
" L " (Finchley Road). "No collecting of any thing is worth domg without specializing. It is the small differences that make interest." [We should like to hear " $L$ " discuss the subject with " G " whose opinion is given above!-ED. 1
" B " (S. Norwood).-"No. I, General collecting without watermarks, etc.
"K " (Stirling).-" First No. 1, but with surcharges; second, No. 4
W," (Kingston-on-Thames).-" Nos. I and 4." "C" (East bourne).-" Will probably be No. 4 . lecting by adults, not school-children.'

Many other readers have sent us their opinions on this interesting subject, but we think we have already published sufficient to show that there is no chance of getting a defnite reply to our question :-" Which will be the most popular form of collecting in the future?"

Hardly anyone had a good word for No. 5 , but that is easily explained by the fact that it is far and away the most expensive form of collecting, and very few people are so happily circumstanced that they can adopt it with pleasure to themselves.
No. 3 New Issues has received many fewer votes than we should have anticipated, but this again is easily explained. We have been so accustomed to read tirades in a certain class of the philatelic press against the army of specula. tors who are supposed to exist only for the hoarding up of new issues as an investinent, that one halt believed in their existence. There is no doubt, however, that such people are very rare The truth is that new issues are bought almost exclusively by Collectors kecping their collections up to date. Consequently so far as our readers are concerned, this discussion has resulted in a competition between classes 1,2 , and 4 , all of competition between classes 1, 2 , and 4 , al
whor buy new issues as a matter of course.
It seems strange at first sight, but No. i ha received proportionately more support in the received proportionately more support in the
United States than over here. That is unUnited States than over here. That is undoubtedly due to our superior wealth of colonial
issues, which leave a collector but little time to issues, which leave a collector but hittle
wander over the borders of our Empire.
ander over the borders of our Empire.
No. 2 has suffered because it is too immense a task for the average collector.
On the whole we think the battle will be between methods Nos. I and 4, and collectors of both will take New Issues. No 4 is largely preponderant at present in Great Britain, and was bound to receive many votes.

## The Postage Stamp comments thus:-

Progress of General Collecting.
I wonder how general collecting really progresses. Ewen's Weekly Stamp News has endeavoured to elicit the views of its readers on this point. but the result is disappointing. One would scarcely expect a very
helpful solution from a constituency mostly devoted to helpfrul solut
new issues.

It will probably be very difficult to get a really reliable opinion.
But I am inclined to think that not a few causes are making for the greater popularity of general collecting. To begin with, the microscopic philatelist frightens many collectors and keeps them from venturing into
such difficult work; then the terrific multiplication of such difficult work; then the terrific multiplication of set back the development of the " bloatery, serious the fashion in the accumulation of blocks of setting these drawbacks tend to make many general collectors.

The following extract (for which we are in. debted to the Philatelic Record) is from the Stamp Collectors' Magazine (September, 1866 !).

## "To the Editor, S.C.M.

"I cannot allow ' Sentinel' to challenge enthusiastic and scientific students of postage stamps without having a shot or two at his remarks. prefers selecting his stamps by their faces only, by all means let him do so. We of the French school prefer and think it both useful and advisable to inspect their backs, their edges and their hue, before we can feel
satisfied to classify them properly satisfied to classify them properly. There is as much difierence between our mode of pursuing our investiga-
tions and his as there is between a botanist and a horticulturist. We are the botanists of philately; we
he go deeply into the matter, we study the peculiarities of goteps, their history, their date, their formation and their usual term of existence, whether annuals like the Spanish and Granadines or perennials like the English and Russians. He and his supporter are, on the other hand, the horticulcurists of philately. So that the stamps look pretty and form a nice row in the album, no matter the date when introduced nor how brought
to perfection, no matter whether serrated or smooth -these are trivial varieties. But was Linnæus more frivolous than Paxton? . . . Botanic philately, if 1 may be allowed the term, may suit one mind; horticultural philately may suit another. Let each cultivate that which best suits his taste.
"Fentonia."
It is difficult to believe that that was written nearly 50 years ago; but Fentonia is quite correct. Thousands of people take pleasure in cultivating gardens without feeling obliged to study botany. Why therefore should not stamp collectors be left in peace to follow their hobby without being compelled to study the science of Philately, if science it be? So far as stamp collectong is concerned, the situation has only become scrious since all the catalogues hitherto accepted as popular guides have gone over to the scientific side: it is as if the trade were trving to force everyone who grew a few flowers in a garden to become an advanced botanist. But the majority of people will always prefer to admire a flower of people will always prefer to admire a fower
than to dissect it, and the sooner the minority than to dissect it, and the sooner the minority
stops butting its head a against a brick wall, so stops butting its head against a brick wall, so
much the better for both the botanists and hortimuch the better for bo
culturists of Pbilately.

The bill which is to be introduced shortly in Parliament for the prohibition of newspaper entrance-fee competitions is likely to be quite as advantageous to the stamp hobby as to those newspaper proprietors who have climbed to success by means of such competitions and now want to prevent other people using the same ladder. There is no doubt that the craze for "missing word" competitions, limericking, etc., drew thousands of people away from stamp collecting or rather from what passes for stamp collecting now-a-days.

A boy's paper called Chums recently invited its stamp-collecting readers to say how many different stamps they had in their collection. The average was little over 1000 . Seeing that even our simplified system runs to 9500 varieties we get here eloquent testimotiy to the folly of teaching the young collector to bother about waterinarks and surcharges.

BELGIAN CONGO (489 E 495).-We quote as follows from the Philatelic fournal of Great Britain (20.2.09/25).
"An article in $L^{\prime} A$ n nonce $T$ imbrologique contains a lot of information about the overprinted stamps, of which we chronicled two values last month. The whole set up to 5 fr., as well as the two Parcel Post stamps, 3 fr. 5oc. and tofr., have been similarly overprinted. It appears that, as first issued, the surcharges were hand-stamped, and that, subsequently, they were typographed. To make matters worse-or better, according to the point of view-there are three varieties of the hand-stamp, and so four sets can be made. The principal differences are as follows :-

## "Handstruck Overprint.

" Letters measuring nearly 4 mm . in height.
Type A. The L of belge is very close to the g, in some cases these two letters touch at the foot. The overprint is about $1 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~mm}$. shorter than in types $B$ and $C$.
Type B. This type is distinguished by the $E$ of belge, which has the topmost arm slightly raised. The letters are irregularly spaced.
Type C. The topmost arm of the $E$ is quite borizontal and the letters are regularly spaced. This type closely resembles the typographed overprint.

- Typographed Overprint.
" Letters measuring $3 \frac{1}{\frac{2}{m m}}$. in height.
More clearly printed than the handstruck, the letters being more sharply defined. The overprint shows through on the back of the stamp. The ink is blacker and glossy.

## Che Universal Postal dnion and Commemorative Postage Stamps.

A subject which bas been claiming considera ble attention lately is that of the collection of commemorative and speculative postage stamps. The question was debated at the recent Manchester Philatelic Congress and Mr. I. J. Bernstein made the following suggestion:-
One of the great grievances stamp collectors have is the issue of what are called temporary stamps or
emergency stamps; that is to say, certain countries will emergency stamps; that is to say, certain countries will
run out of a stamp, and will frequently surcharge run out of a stamp, and will requenty surcharge
another value, causing a shottage of that value. Then they have to surcharge some other value to make good the stamps they have surcharged of the previous value. . . whether the Postal Union will have any power to dictate to these small colonies that they are not to have small issues of stamps-I will not say exactly for the purpose of running short of them, but keeping small stocks of stamps-whether they will have the power to interfere and say to these colonies, 'You must not issue emergency stamps,' is something that I really cannot say. As I said at the beginning, the Postal Union, from what we have seen of it in the twenty-six or twenty-seven years it has been in existence, I believe, tends solely to the good of all matters relating to the Post Offce, and incidentally, of course, of Philately; and I feel perfectiy sure that a resolution in the Posms al Union, backed by suge Ehitadic Congres of Great Britain, would at least command their of Great Brit
consideration.
Mr. W. H. Peckitr: Speaking from 2 dealer's point of view, I strongly agree about these things. I do not of view, strongly agree about these things. I do no
really think the majority of dealers want them we really think the majority of dealers want them; we
have already got quite enough to deal in, too much in fact. As regards the Postal Union, whether they have power to stop it 1 do not quite know.
I think that something could be done in the way of Commemorative issues, such as all this Jubilee rubbish and so on, which are constantly coming out. They have to have notice, and they have to be allowed before they are available for inter national purposes, but in the case of a surcharge, to take one example. it was all over London long before it was advised. I do not see what could be done there. I think the Jubilee stamps should be stopped to a certain extent. Speaking on behalf of dealers, I do not think the majority of them like them. Personally, I detest them. I should think Mr. Bishop's to the Postal Union might do someining Possibly in the Poantime some of the continental Possibly might join in and in that way make it more powerful might
still.
Mr. M. P. Castle: My brother delegate from the Royal Society suggested I should say a word on this important point. As Mr. Bishop has said, it is not a some fifteen years ago, goaded to a state of philatelic frenzy by the constant appearance of these stamps I put pen to paper and started a discussion on this subject, which led to the formation of a Society. The thing was founded on perfectly sane lines, and if it had been adhered to as it should have been done by a certain number of dealers, there was no reason why it should not be in existence to-day. There was no attempt to dictate what people should collect, but one of its main objects was, if possible, to approach the countries and point out to them the inadvisability of issuing stamps which were not required for public purposes. believe that Society in its existence did some good ; in the case of. I believe, the Greek stamps and others help a decerr itat Mr.
I cannot help thinking that Mr. Bishop has struck a very sensible note in his advocacy or suggestion of a
remedy for this complaint. I do not know that it will have any practical effect, but I certainly think it could have no possible bad effect if we were to approach the Postal Union with a carefully worded petition on behalf of the Philatelic Congress of this country, deploring the appearance of so many unnecessary issues. and asking them, as far as they possibly could, to discountenance any stamps which were not really issued for public postal purposes. I think that the mere knowledge that such a petition was sent in to the Postal Union would certainly have nothing but a good effect; and, speaking for myself. I should be very glad to support any resolution that was brought forward on those lines. There is no doubt about it that, as Mr. Peckitt has told us, the constant appearance of these stamps, many of which are abso-
lute rubbish, has a very bad effect. them when they have them to sell and the collectors hate them when they have boupht them; and I am sure if we could expunge from the catalogue and from our collections nineteen-twentieths of all the issues of

Commemorative rubbish, Philately would be all the better and we should be all the happier. I have much pleasure in supporting Mr. Bishop's proposal.

Eventually the following resolution was put to the meeting and carried unanimously.
"That this Congress is of opinion that a petition should be prepared and presented to the Universal Postal Union, soliciting their help in the prevention stamps which are unnecessary for the public service."

If dealers and collectors dislike commemorative and provisional issues so much, why do they fall over one another in impetuous desire to obtain them?

The truth is of course that the average stamp collector is so tired trying to split hairs in identifying his old issues according to every minute detail that the very first time a handsome commemorative issue comes along, without a troublesome past, he flies to it with relief. Naturally, dealers who have large elaboratelyclassified stocks of the older issues object to their clients going off in this way.
The Post Office records of every country will show that whenever a commemorative or provisional stamp has been issued, the applications for it are much in excess of the demand for the ordinary stamps. At present the demand for such commemorative and provisional stamps shows no signs of abatement. In fact it would be far greater if there existed an adequate system
of advertisement and distribution throughout of advertisement and distribut

It does not follow however that the public would continue to buy such issues if their number very largely increased and we should not be surprised if the Universal Postal Umon in its own interests sought to control their production, only allowing a conmemorative or secondary issue where a really good case could be made out for it.
In the case of surcharged issues, it is noteworthy that the outcry is only directed against adhesive postage stamps. Postcards, envelopes, fiscal stamps, etc., are constantly being surcharged and not a word of complaint is heard. Neither the fault nor the remedy therefore lies surcharged stamps can collect on our New System which does not recognize any printing or writing on the face of a stamp as constituting a variety.

There is no doubt that commemorative stamps are welcomed by general collectors and are often the means of obtaining many recruits for the hobby. If evidence were required that not enough commemorative stamps are issued, we minht refer to the fact that even non-postal labels are
largely bought by collectors. The bigger and largely bought by collectors. The bigger and
gaudier the labels, the more stamp-collectors like gaudier the labels, the more stamp-collectors like
them. Every Pbilatelic Exbibition issues them them. Every Pbiatelic Exbibition issues them and usually dues so in all the colours of the rain-
bow. Many dealers have now had coloured labels designed and attach them to their correspondence. One leading dealer, Mr. Field, has actually accepted the agency for the sale of the triangular labels issued by one of the Sicilian Earthquake Relief Committees, altho' such have no postal character at all. All of which goes to show the trend of public feeling.

If the Postal Union should ever cousider these questions, it will probably do so without the slightest regard to the wishes of stamp collectors. The U.P.U. policy may be inferred from two reforms for which it is responsible, namely, the printing of all $\frac{1}{2}$., id. and $2 \frac{1}{2}$. stamps in green, red and blue respectively and the requirement that all stamps shall have their face value indicated in Arabic numerals. If the opinion of the U.P.U'. could be obtaned, say, on the recent contant changes of colours of stamps by Paraguay, we have no doubt that that practice would be condemned. We infer that the L.P.U. postal staffs throughout the world in checking the postare paid on foreign correspondence. If this is so, the following further reforms by the U.P.U. is so, the folitiving
are possibilities.

1. The demonetization, as regards interna. tional postage, of all issues except the current one.

Corollary.-It follows that only one issue at a time from each country could be good for international postage.
It is unreasonable to expect a postal official to know which superseded issues have been de-
monetized and which not; in fact, few stamp collectors possess complete knowledge of this subject.
2. The definition of its attitude towards surcharged stamps.

Example.-Supposing that a letter costing $5 /-$
postage were despatched from the Cayman Islands to France franked with a 5/. stamp surcharged id. At Grand Cayman it would presumably have been taxed double the deficiency or $9 / 10$. But the addressee would probably have been within his legal right in claiming free delivery. The Postal Union was never notified of the surcharge and internationally therefore the stamp remained a $5 /$ stamp and franked the letter in full.

In connection with the Postal Union's attitude towards surcharged stamps, a serious matter is the overprinting of internationally-valid postage stamps with words and names which are only intelligible in the country ot issue.

Examples:-Current postage stamps may be
overprinted Muestra, Specimen, Postal Service,

officials to know which of the stamps are good for
postage and which are not?
The remedy here is clear. No stamp of current issue overprinted with a word or name should be valid for international postage unless such word or name has previously been registered and registration should not be granted without good cause. 'Specimen' stamps would be pre-
ferably cancelled with a large cross extending ferably cancelled with a large cross extending
from corner to corner each way rather than with from cor
Stamps issued by a country and not available for international postage although such country is a constituent of the U.P.U. might, we think reasonably be put under a separate heading at the end of the catalogue. Instances are the New Sonth Wales Consumptives Issue, De Ruyter Issue of Holland, and recent charity issues of Roumania.

Personally whether these issues are put at the end of the catalogue or not, we are convinced they will always have a large sale and it is futile trying to prevent people collecting what they have shown so unmistakeably they prefer. however would enable the collector of old issues to emulate the ostrich by burying his head in the catalogue and refusing to see the supplement to it. Then perhaps we might have peace.

as the Zanzibar overprinted on India and yet not the various broken type in the English Official stamps is inconsistent.
The only remedy for this is for collectors to issue a tandard catalogue for themselves. Two or three delegates from every philatelic society in Britain could meet together after having collected the opinions and uggestions of their fellow members, and then decide what should or should not be listed, and also what arieties not to be found in any catalogue, should be included. I am sure it would pay to publish the catalogue, and the stamps would be priced according o their actual rarity, not according to the sock hev the dealer. The value of many sample, many of the arly European increased, for don't think the idea mpracticable, for such things have been done before Only a few years ago every catalogue included Russian and Chinese Locals (many of which were marked at big prices and undoubtedly scarce), now such stamps go begging; whole specialized collections are practically given away at the auctions. Likewise cut cards. envelopes and wrappers had to go. Surely it is better o collect such things rather than absurd varieties of hades (often caused by a little coo or surgigh or mmersion in water), silly varieties of perf
I will give an example of how the catalogue could be simplified and uninteresting varieties weeded out. Turn up Gibbons' British Colonial Catalogue, pages I92, 193. up Gibbons' British Colonial Catalogue, pages $192,193$.
Here we find the New Zealand issue of $1882-97$ of ten designs divided into no less than seven sets-5 8 stamps in all! There is very little difference between the prices quoted for the sets perf. $12 \times 11 \frac{1}{2}, 11,10,10 \times$ in. Probably if one obtained a thousand specimens of each of the ten stamps he would be able to pick out complete sets of all the perfs. given and perhaps several thers hitherto unknown. Then taking the shades, why chronicle " pale ultramarine" and "ultramarine" especially when the stamps are of the same value?

I have priced them at something like their average value. This, of course, would need careful revision. That is all. I should add a note of a fact that is in this series are found with advertisements on the back. This is puzzling to beginners, who are sometimes led to think the stamp is part of the advertisement and not the advertisement part of the stamp. Scotl catalogues the id. imperf. horizontally and the 2d. imperf. vertically, but there is no finality to such varieties and they might well be left out.
I feel sure that you will agree with me that such a change would make stamp collecting more interesting and would be more beneficial to all concerned. Have you ever thought what collecting will be like in say twenty years' time? If the present system of cata loguing every trifing variety as well as the never ending stream of new issues. with still more trifing varieties. the yearly catalogues will have to be a series of books as big as the Encyclopxdia Britannica, collect ing will become more and more difficult, and many wil give up their colle

## Future of Stamp Collecting. <br> A FEW MORE OPINIONS.

"S." (Penang) votes for "General collecting ithout watermarks or perforations.

B" (Singapore) writes :-" No. 2 General Collecting, just what one fancies whether varie ties, postal-fiscals or even locals, according to existing catalogues."
" s " (Calcutta).-" To my way of thinking I consider that stamp collecting in future will take the form of moderate specialism although such a course is deplorable. The present trend of events show us that." ["S" need not be so pessimisic! The present backboneless methods of stamp collecting are hardly likely to continue. There is a strongly growing movement in favour of restoring simplified general collecting to its original pre-eminent position.-Ed.]

It is only natural that he will obtain mainly current stamps from his friends and he can complete the sets by ordering from a dealer. If he still has ambitions, his best plan is to classify his stamps according to Ewen's simplified system, but even this system is too advanced for a collector unless he can afford to spend at least $1 /$ per week on stamps.]
"F" (Lytham) writes:-"Perhaps you will excuse a further letter from me on the question of 'The Future of Stamp Collecting,' Much may be said for the exclusion of watermarks, perfora. tions, and shades, though I consider the leading watermarks onght to be collected. But to omit all surcharges is out of the question even for a beginner. Do you think anyone would fili up the space for the current id. of Great Britain with the stamp overprinted 'Morocco Agencies 10 Centimes,' or the space of the Bermuda d. with the corresponding stamp overprinted 'Gibraltar'? Surel) these instances cause your system to break down completely. It is much more logical to exclude surcharges altering the value of a stamp if one wants to Eunplify collecting. What a difference it makes in a country like Ceylon!",
[With all respect to " $F$ " we cannot see that our system breaks down at all. The roc. Morocco can be used to fill up the space for the current id. Great Britain and the Gibraltar can perform the same service for the fd. Bermuda though

personally we should reject both these stamps on the grounds (a) that they are cheaper unsurcharged and (b) that they are too heavily overprinted to be considered in good condition. Although in principle we ignore surcharges, we reject all surcharged stamps as bad copies when the overprint obliterates too heavily a salient portion of the stamp. "Heavily postmarked" and "heavily surcharged" are synonymous to us. The Griqualand " $G$ " stamps are a case to the contrary.-Ed.]

Now for examples of its working, both with 'stamp collectors whom the trade refuses to cater for, and with philatelists. In your issue of 13.3 .09 you say: "The terrific multiplication of minor varieties . . . . is another very serious set-back.' It would not be a set-back in the above catalogue ; a collector puts his finger on the cheapest or any other, at once; at the same time the scientist (!) finds all the information he needs. Again, you say: 'The catalogues have gone over to the scientific side.' This is incorrect, they are unscientific masses of details, which a true scientist tmust re-arrange."

## Ewen's <br> Simplifled Stamp-Collecting.

The salient feature of this system is as most of our readers are already aware, the classification of stamps according to name, design, colour and face value only; whilst details of manufacture (types. watermarks, perforations, shades, etc.) and surcharges are ignored. The object is to render practicable the collection of the stamps of the whole world as opposed to group or single. country collecting. "General Collecting" has until recently been the backbone of the hobby and is in fact the only means of collecting open to the beginner who is dependent largely on gifts of stamps from friends who have foreign corres. pundence, or on cheap packets of stamps, which are now collected by millions in continental convents. The stamp collector has lately been compared to the botanist and horticulturist. The present state of affairs is much as if the gardener said to himself :-" My flowers are pretty but the stalks and roots add nothing, to their beauty. I will destroy the latter and keeponly the former!" For a few days perthaps he inight retain the colcentrated beauty of his garden but it would soon be borne in upon him that the stalks and roots served a very useful purpose. In much the same way a collector who goes to an Exhibition may come away with the idea that there is nothing to beat a fine specialized collection such as those of Great Britain, Cape triangular, or Ceylon pence, but everyone cannot make such collections and it is folly for the rank and file of collectors to attempt anything other than a simplified general collection. If specialism succeeds in genseral collection. If speciaism succeeds in
ousting general collecting, then the hobby will ousting general collecting, then the hobsy wil
wither away just as coin-collecting has. Of course there are still 10 times as many stamp collectors as coin collectors-perhaps too times as many-therefore there is still a chance to remedy matters betore it is too late.
But there are many things to be considered before the standard of simplified stamp collecting is fixed. For instance, our present system is lunited to postage adhesives. This is too arbitrary? The catalogue publishers killed the collection of envelope, wrapper and postcard stamps by the over-elaboration of details which had no connection with the stamp at all and then, without any attempt to seek the remedy, threw this whole important branch of philately overboard. This is surely an episode that reflects no credit on the stewardship of the catalogue publishers.
Are collectors willing to support us if we set this wrong right ? If we follow our principles we find that, for instance, a first issue Finland is the same stamp whether gummed for use as an

close enough to look like imperforate stamps whicl, have been printed in sheets.

To take the example of France, 22 of the 23 postage stamps which have been struck on stationery do not differ from the adhesive stamps. The exception is the 75c. Peace and Commerce, which was struck as a provisional in 1878 , in black on pneumatuc-post letter cards. The German States on the other hand afford a fine series of embossed envelope stamps differing entirely from the adhesives.
We ask therefore:-(1) Should an adhesive stamp and a stamp cut from stationery, differing neither in name, design, colour or face-value be considered one and the same stamp? (2) fin not, why not? (3) Shall the remaining non-adhesive stamps be restored to a place in our albums? Please note that we do not here refer to the collection of postal stationery which, although akin to that of stamps is really as distinct trom it as coincollecting. Onr discussion only relates to stamps, and whether gummed there by a member of the public or impressed in advance by the post office is immaterial.]
In order
In order not to complicate this discussion we purposely leave to consideration at a later date the question as to how far, for instance, a Mul. ready design is entitled to be considered a stamp.
It is equally arbitrary to exclude postage due,
egistration, express and official stamps. The registration, express and official stamps. The
simplest conception of general collecting is the simplest conception of general collecting is the
collection of anything that can be found on the outside of an envelope, and that possesses the four attributes of name, design, colour, and face-value. In practice, however, collectors have come to look upon only those labels as stamps which have face-value, and if as "stamps" they do not find favour they are termed "locals" foften erroneously) and dumped somewhere outside the philatelic kingdom. As postage due, registrabin, they have been collected by nearly everyone. Have we any right to exclude them from our simplified system?
All the British Colonies between them have issued only 75 postage due stamps (details of manufacture and surcharges ignored), but they are fairly common in Continental countries and, colonies. Victoriz alone has issued a "Too late" stamp whilst Canada (3), Queensland (1) and Victoria (1) make the total of Colonial registration stainps 5 . There are however many non-adhesive registration stamps (just over 100 for British Colonies but, writing from memory, not over ten for all the rest of the world). Canada (I), Mauritius (2), New Zealand (I) contribute Express or Special Delivery stamps which are also rare elsewhere. Jamaica is we believe the only
colony which has issued an official stamp, the 2d. printed in grey instead of green, although the I.ife Insurance stamps of New Zealand may perhaps be included in this group. Beyond the British Empire however we come up amongst
many of our oldest friends. Who bas not seen many ong Swedish official stamp, for instance? Then there are most of the Seelieck sets of South Alnerica over again, printed in yellow. But the claims of the majority of official stamps are of claimse of the majority of oficised throngh our nun-recognition of surcharges. What then is the position of postage surcharges. express, registration and envelope stamps in relation to our simplified system of collecting? inext on our list for consideration are fiscal and telegraph stamps, whether allowed to be used for postal purposes or not. Even when these are surcharged "postage" we do not consider they have any right to recognition. We have agreed to ignore surcharges; therefore a fiscal stamp surcharged "postage" remains a fiscal stamp. (The question as to the status of a postage stamp surcharged "Revenue" will be discussed later; we merely remark here that the answer to one question must be the answer to the other if we wish to be logical). It is a case of rendering unto Caesar that which is Caesar's and we must return to our brother the fiscal stamp collector all the odds and ends that we have borrowed from him from time to time. It may be hard to part with such old friends as the first issue of Tobago, the New Zealand stamp-duty, the Natal ist Issue, the B.C.A. cheque stamp, but really they do not belong to us. There is even a doubt as to whetlier any of the inland Venezuelan stamps or the "Stamp Duty" stamps of Victoria are postage stamps, but we are inclined to claim a half share in them as "Postage and Revenue" stamps. We do not here propose to consider
whether fiscal stamps sold over the post-office connter therefore gain any special rights. Are then fiscal stamps used postally postage stamps?
The next question deals with private and local stamps and also stamps of a semi-local nature.

There are two outstanding cases, those of Colombia and Russia. Almost in every country collectors have refused to collect these stamps, interesting though they are, although those of the Colombian Departments have found a place in every catalogue. We believe it to be place in every catalogue. We believe it post Office issues its own stamps to every post office throughout the country and that these stamps alone have been valid for prepayment of postage on correspondence passing from one department to another and, since 1881 , for international postage, (either in virtue of Colombia's membership of the Postal Union or of special contracts entered into with various countries previous to that date). At the same time the Colombian Government authorized the departments to run their own postal service and issue their own stamps if they cared to and some of them (notably Antioquia, Panama and Tolima) took advantage of this offer. Lately the Colombian Government has regretted according this privilege and withdrawn it, allowing the Departments however to purchase the Government issues at half price as compensation. In 188 x when Colombia joined the Postal Union, we believe the Departiment of Panamá (which has always been semi-independent and is now a separate republic altogether) also did so ; at any rate its stamps alone of the Departmental issues have been valid for figured on correspondence crossing the Atlantic, their preater popnlarty with collectors over their greater popularity with collectors over
here is explained. The stamps of Panamá here is explained. The stamps of Panama
are on the same footing as those of Colombia are on the same footing as those of Colombia
and cannot be ignored; but the question is, and cannot be ignored; but the question is,
what of the departmental issues? The latter what of the departmental issues? The latter
seem to be almost in exactly the same posiseem to be almost in exactly the same posi-
tion as the issues of the Indian Native States, tion as the issues of the Indian Native States,
of which there are now about 300 varieties of which there are now about 300 varieties
according to our simplified system. The according to ollr simplified system. The
Colombian
Departments probably exceed this number as Antioquia alone numbers iso varieties. But whereas the former are mostly coinmon, the latter are mostly rare, and soon would be unob tainable if any considerable demand sprung up for then. We are disinclined to banish Indian Native States stamps from our Simplified System, but we cannot very well keep them and inconsistently exclude the issues of the Colombian Departments. Shall both be accepted or both go? Or shall we compromise and include them amongst the Postage Due and Registration stamps. We shall probably have to divide our Simplified system into two sections:-(1) As at Simplified system into wo sections:- (1) As at
present, except Indian States; (2) All the other present, except ingibles, including Indian Native States.

Russian locals are of course mainly of municipal issue, and are very popular at present amongst Russian collectors, but they have little vogue elsewhere. Is there a difference between local stamps issued by a department or State and those issued by a town? Then there are the Chinese, Danish, and Moroccan locals, all interesting in their way. We are afraid, however, that we must draw the line at local stamps issued for any district less important than a department or State, although we do not quite see our way to defend ourself from the charge of being arbitrary.
Then there are the semi-private issues of the Fiji Times, Coolgardie Express, Suez Canal, Madagascar British Mail, Pietersburg, Mafeking, Uganda Missionaries, Pacific Steam Navigation Co., Danube Steam Packet Company, Mount Currie Express (Griqualand) La Gnayra, Guadalajara, Morocco, Wenden, Lady McLeod, American Postmasters' stamps, etc. What is the status of these to be? Inreality, a very great deal of interest attaches to these issues.
What is the position of reprints in relation to our Simplified System of Collecting? Take the recently discovered reprints of Salvador. The name is correct, the design is correct (being printed from the original plates), the colour is correct (although from a specianst piffen the shade of the colour might be different) and points by which cone we are guided. This is points by which alone we are guided. This is perbaps the most important question we are asking in this article. Think of the answer you would give and then see how it applies to the which were in every collection 20 years ago. Ot which were in every collection 20 years ago. Of
course, to the collector who attaches importance to details of manufacture reprints are not genuine because the details cease to be correct when judged by the specialist standard, although in many cases-in most cases in fact-they should be collected by the scientist as posthumous printings (occupying a similar position to that of essays) and not rejected as forgeries without value or interest. Governments may continue printing stamps right up to the day they cease to be on sale at the post offices and such stamps, even though sold as remainders, are accepted by all collectors. But supposing the stamps were printed the day after an issue became obsolete, would they then be collectable as stamps? How far is it legitimate to "reprint" stamps and can a Government market its rights ?

"M" (Bombay) writes:-" I must say No. 3 suits me very well, as I get all the New lssues through your New Issue Service.'

Mr. Karl Wiehen is very severe on our Simplified Stamp Collecting but as we wish all Simplitied Stamp Collecting but as we wish all
sides to have a fair hearing, we give his letter sides to have a fair hearing, we give his letter
below, although of course we do not agree with below, although of course we do n
it the least little bit. He says:-
"No grown up man will ever find pleasure and recreation in sticking little pieces of paper in books. [We never said he would.-Ed.] If you destroy for instance the difference between a Montserral 4 d . blue CC and CA you destroy the interest in stamp collectas the interest would be lost.

It appears to me ridiculous to advocate on one page of your Journal the most simplified collecting and to ofter on the next page rare minor varieties at high prices. By all means start a journal for children, if you wish to cater for them but it will not be a success.
1 consider it absolutely impossible for a serious advanced collector [our correspondeht overlooks the fact that we only recommend our system for the medium collector.-Ed.] ever to return to the simple ways of days gone by. 1 remember when 1 was a little boy in Germany at a time when 1 would gladly exchange 2 three-cornered Cape of Gooc hope made
colour for a square Cape, which then had just made their first appearance, [ New Issues even then in prefer ential demand over old !-En. 1 that my brother and I one day observed the different letters in the corners of the common red English penny stamp and what a fresh zest this gave to our pleasure of collecting and how eager we were to collect as many of these different letters as we could find. And the same tendency I find to day among boys of the present time. They search with the most eager interest for cheap minor varieties
in favor of what you call standard varieties and all this in favor of what you cash to destroy! It is 10 me healthy interest you wish to.
At any rate I prefer dealers who are consistent and are not at work undermining our spiendid hobby, which is the only recreation I know, not having had a proper holiday for more than 12 or ${ }^{2} 4$ years.

Severe as Mr. Wiehen tries to be against our Simplified System, he nevertheless proves our case in Simplified System, he nevertheless proves our case in how can that be? We will explain in a minute, but first we want to deal with our correspondent's but first we want infarion insinuation that we are trying to very unfair insinuation that we are reying to
undermine the hobby. People have very short undermine the hobby. People have very short
memories or they would not make such a memories suggestion.
The main branches of the stamp hobby in this country are the following
r.-General collecting according to various standards set by the catalogues and printed albums.
2.- Specialism in British stamps and postmarks.
3.-Specialism. limited to other single countries or groups and frequently to the colonies.
ew Istues, either the whole world or the Colonies, only.
5.-General collection of stamps impressed or
6.-Collection of telegraph
and fiscal stamps. From 1890 to 1900 Mr. Ewen was almost exclusively interested in class 2, namely the
stamps of Great Britain (without the Colonies). stamps of Great Britain (without he Colonies). gaining or losing popularity?
From 1900 to 1909 Mr. Ewen has been popularizing the collection of New lssues. Have they gained or lost in popularity ?
Mr. Ewen is now trying to restore general collecting to its former condition of healthy prosperity and it seems rather unreasonable to accuse hm of trying to " undermine " the hobby!
Mr. Ewen has never turned his attention to No. 5 (we speak here generally), but other firms, Messrs. Stanley Gibbous and Messrs. Senf Bros. for instance, have published catalogues of stamped statiunery. Has it gained or lost in popularity? It is practically dead.
Mr. Ewen has never touched fiscal or telegraph stamps. Have they ganned or lost in popularity?
There are very few enthusiasts left in England.

Finally, we ask with regard to No. 3 (specialized collections of single countries other than Great Britain):-Has this section of the hobby (the staple of the Strand) gained or lost in popularity? Has the market for old Colonials impreved or deteriorated?
If it has not deteriorated, then Mr. Wiehen's accusation is pomeless; if on the other hand it is contended that it has, and that Mr. Ewen, by popularizing one branch of the hobby has injured the others, we would ask, how is it that the supporters of the latter have allowed one man to beat them ?
Think only of the two great houses of Stanley Gibboos and Peckitt, with their unrivalled stocks of ali that is rare and choice in philately; yet it was Mr. Ewen who as a schoolboy of 16 showed
Stanley Gibbons how to catalogue the platenumbers on British stamps and in later years it was Mr. Ewen who showed these two firms how to make a New Issue Service popular! Again Mr. Ewen was years ahead in publishing a Weekly Stamp Paper (next week by the way E.H.S.N. Stamp Paper (next week by the way ${ }^{\text {E. }}$.
attains its $500 t h$ issue without a break.
If one looks at the enormous growth of philatelic literature in recent years, one cannot doubt that philately as a whole still holds its own. And if the philately as a whole still holds its own. And if the

This was at the time the only catalogue pricing British plate-numbers;' (Stanley Gibbons did not do so in their catalogue till a year later) and the edition of tooo copies was speedily exhausted at sixpence a copy. Considering that the first plate-number was engraved on a British stamp in 1858 (2d. blue, plate 7) it is a little surprising that it should have been left to Mr. Ewen 35 years later to he the first to give the information in popular form to the world. Of course we are not forgetting the work of Messrs. Philbrick \& Westoby, nor the various magazine articles which appeared about the same time, but they were not accessible to everyone like a sixpenny catalogue.

Mr. Ewen was also the first to compile and publish for collectors a list of the postmark publish for collectors a Specialist's fournal). Even the list in Daniel's Specialists fournal. Even the list in Darnail's
History was based on Mr. C. F. Dendy Marshall's History was based on Mr.C. F.Dendy Marshall's
list and the latter was a copy (no doubt revised and added tot of Mr. Ewen's original manuscript. Of course it is simple enough now-a-days to Of course it is simple enough now a.days to
compile catalogues but in those days Mr. Ewen compile catalogues but in those days Mr.
had to work on almost entirely virgin soil.
Not only was Mr. Ewen the first to establish a New Issue Service on modern up-todate lines (his system is now being copied in many quarters)
but he was the first to publish the handy list of but he was the first to publish the handy list of
current stamps which our readers find each week in our supplement and which has also been extensively copied (we have had to bring three actions for infringement of copyright in respect of this list; two were settled amicably and the third was taken into court and resulted in a verdict in our favour).
There are some dealers who probably think that Mr. Ewen was to blame for making the standard rate only $1 / 2$ per $1 /$ face value, but they forget that in these days of cheap postage and colonial postal-orders any higher rate is impracticable.
Both collectors and dealers may rest assured that our simplified system of collecting will be for the benefit of the hobby, and we now proceed to redeem our promise and show how Mr. Wiehen's letter proves the opposite to that which he supposed.

Mr. Wiehen refers to exchanging a "triangular Cape of any colour for a rectangular one," and we may, therefore, assume that his collection was at first on our simplified basis. He then proceeds to refer to the pleasure he found in studying English corner letters. Curiously, he hits upon one of the most important branches of specializing which is in no way dealt with in any of the catulogues usually accepted as standards. We thus get the admission that minor varieties do not depend for their interest on inclusion in the catalogue. Inferentially they rather lose their interest when they become
standard; it is, we think, Mr. Wiehen's case that when a stamp becomes standardized, it becomes common-place, and that our simplified system is on that account unattractive. But if this hypothesis is correct, is not that system likely to be the most popular which standardizes the fewest stamps and leaves the greatest play for origi. nality? Mr. Wiehen refers to the 4 d . blue CC and CA Montserrat (catalogued, by the way, $7 / 6$ and $€ 3$ respectively in their cheapest condition), and argues that because they interest him they must be made standard varieties, i.e., everybody else must collect them willy nilly or suffer a blank space in his album.
It may be as well here to make clear that what we mean by a standard collection is a collection of stamps, chosen consistently and fairly repre senting the issues of the whole world, with a minimum of arbitrary restrictions.
There are many standards, Ewen's being the simplest, recognizing only name, design, colour and face value. Stanley Gibbons' standard goes to the other extreme and creates 55,000 different stamps. A collector who adopts a standard is in no stamps. A collector who adopts a standard is in no way compelled to collect only within that standard. He can still display his originality in any way he
chooses. Consider for instance the following practical illustration.

The collector who adopts Stanley Gibbons' Catalogue as his guide sets out to obtain 200 varieties, of which Stanley Gibbons themselves do not price 66 either used or unused. If the stamps of Fiji specially appeal to him it will be a labour of love, but if they do not, he simply says "I won't collect Fiji" and the dealers lose another customer for that country, and the auctioneers have another passenger when lots of that country are put up.
If on the other hand that collector adopts Ewen's Simplified System he turns up the sets list and finds that (excluding the Times Express which we class with locals and private issues) he can get Fiji complete except the $5 /$ and $£ 1$ king for about $25 / \%$ in fact 21 of the 31 stamps will only cost him a few pence apiece or less. The current number of the Colonial Office fournal makes the announcement that "there
have been extensive forgeries in Paris of British North Borneo Company stamps. About $2.000,000$ forged stamps were seized on the premises of a printer, and correspondence was found which it is stated showed that an order for them had been given by a I.ondon firm. The Paris police also found evidence that Transval and Fiji stamps had been forged."
This possibly has some connection with the
article which appeared in 1 Echo de la Timbrologie ( $31.10 .08 / 649$ ) where a letter is published from a man at Givet, France offering $£_{\mathrm{I}}$ Transvaal stamps at 2 ofr. per $10,5 /$. Orange River at 15 fr . per 10,50 and 100 lire Italy at $30 f r$. per io pairs and stating that though torged "personne ne peut contester l'authenticité de mes timbres." Our contemporary illustrates amongst other stamps the 50 c . on 2 pes. Gibraltar, postally used and states that not only the stamps but the postmarks and the Crown CA watermark were correctly forged.

It is surely quite time that stamp forgers were dealt with more severely or the tholby will be overrun. Collectors mfurtunately will persist in not taking proper precautions when they buy stamps.

The Colonial Office Journut* also gives the usual list of forthcoming New Issues of Colonial postage stamps, to some of which we refer below.

## Che Question of a Simplitied Catalogue.

Both here and on the Contiment there has been an agitation for a simplified catalogue, but the chief difficulty in the way of compiling it is this:-Each collector or dealer wants to see hose minor varieties excluded in which he takes no interest, and those included which interest him. As tastes differ, such a catalogue is an impossibility.
At present a general collector follows the Catalogue, taking those minor varieties which are catalogued and leaving out others which are not catalogued. But would it not be better to substitute a simpler standard and then leave collectors to add toit according to their own fancy? The pleasure consists in discovering these minor varieties rather than collecting them according to a fixed catalogue. In any case, varieties should not be included in a catalogue in such a way as to obscure the standard. They should be distinguished so as to render their collection optional.

Instead of a simplified catalogue of this kind, we should like to see the publication of small sixpenny "sectional" catalogues for the more important countries and groups of the world. Nearly all the important plulatelic works are published at prohibitive prices, and owing to the pubbished at prohibitive prices, and owing to the expense of reproduction canot be frequently
reprinted and brought up-to-date. Besides thiey do not give the prices of the varieties they describe

If such little books were accepted by collector as the standard for prices, much of the present day price-culting would be checked, as only the more important dealers would stock the entire series. The prices should be fixed by agreement amongst the leading dealers and "spheres of influence " should be recognized and a little more brotherly love might be encouraged! Discounts want standardizing. But before anything useful can be done in the way of supporting marke prices, steps would have to be taken to prevent the present leakage that occurs in big stocks. Quite apart from the loss $t$ to the owner, the market is seriously injured by the fact that such stamps are usually sold at less than their value thereby enabling others to undersell the original owner with his own stock! We beheve that Ewen's Colonial Stamp Market Lttd. is the only firm which has succeeded in establishing a really effective control over every stamp in its stock, a system moreover that has now stood the practical test of several years' working, although of course it entails sacrifices and a rather strict system of book-keeping.

In connection with the discussion on simplified stamp collecting, it is worth noting that our first simplified catalogue ran in serial form through this journal and commenced in No. 1, close on ten years ago.

## Mr. Karl Wiehen writes us:-

"I have read with much interest your remarks on my letter to you and I am glad that it has given you an opportunity to state afresh and define sour position and I hasten to tell you, that 1 went too far, if $i$ suggested, that you were undermining the hobby of stamp collecting and I tender you my sincere apology for this. I have subscribed to, and have now all the numbers of your journal from the beginning, and I have learned much from its pages.
Yet I believe that it is better not to advise collectors $t o 0$ much about what they should coliect. Give them a good catalogue like Gibbons, and let each individual collector determine for himself what he will collect, and what he can afford to collect. A complete collec. yontem, will hardly interest any on hedy for simplified system, will hardly interest anybody for long. As far as my experience goes with beginners and juniors, they prefer Gibbons Catalogue to Whitfield King's, few of the stamps listed, but they like to sty a the catalogue and will get acquainted with the different issues and minor varieties and gain in this way, almost without knowing it, a great deal of information which will be valuable to them in later years. I always try to encourage beginners to look and search for minor varieties, many of which are cheap and easily obtainable, and I have always met with a ready and ofien with a grateful response.
I personally prefer very much the old stamps to the new issues, but no doubt the new issues have brought an increasing number of new collectors, which is certainly a gain; still I consider the old stamps the backbone of the hobby, and they will be so in the future.
Our correspondent does not even yet seem to understand our simplified system! We therefore give one more illustration.
A collector with one of the leading printed albums will find at least 30 or 40 spaces tor the Sydney View stamps of New South Wales; he is tred down to collecting these 30 or 40 varieties in single copies; if he finds a variety not provided for, a pair or block, there is no space provided for, a pair or block, there is no space cost from $£ 1$ upwards apiece even used, he will cost from fi upwards apiece even used, he will
never fill a quarter of the blank spaces. never fill a quarter of the blank spaces
Sometimes he has only three or four copies, Sometimes he has only three or four copies perbaps all of the 2d. and not a single $1 d$. or 3 d Result, that collector gets disgusted and New South Wales become an unpopular country.
Under Ewen's simplified system, the collector has only to secure one copy each of the ${ }^{1 d}$. red, 2 dd . blue and 3 d . green, and he is complete according to standard; no blank spaces. If he subsequeutly gets additional copies in distinct shades, pairs or blocks (entire sheets if you like!) copies on original, scarce postmarks, etc., etc. he is at liberty to add them (blank pages are liberally interspersed throughout our printed albums), and he can do so according to his own fancy, without being haunted by blank spaces. Any variety, whether in or out of the catalogue, always has a chance to interest him. Ultimately he may extend this nucleus so far as to make it worth while to specialize, and there is nothing in our system to prevent him specializing one stamp; any stamp anywliere in the cullection that appeals to him can be specialized and yet the collection remains a general one and a consisten one.

At present a collector feels bound to spectalize a whole comntry, with lamentable results. Many of our readers may have noticed that at Exhibi tions the magnificently specialized collections of sutch countries as Cape or Manritius are often shirked in the matter of recent issues.
If one considers the great vogue that British stamps with foreign postmarks have had lately, one is confirmed in the opinion that collectors don't like following the beatell track and although some sort of a standard is necessary to provid the framework of their collection, the least the framework of their col
exacting standard is the best.
If collectors prefer Stauley Gibhons' Catalogue to Whitfield King's, it is because the former prices more varieties; the average stamp collector has a strongly developed commercial instinct. The catalogue publisher, if a practical man, will give his public a minimum of information and a maximum of prices.

This report was investigated by the stamp committee, which recommended the acceptance of Mr. Cooke's offer.

## Stanley Gibbons' Catalogue, Part I., 1909 Edition.

We are afraid the new Catalogue will be a great disappointment to those who have been anticipating that justice would be done at last to modern issues.
The following are a few of the more impurtant alterations:-

British New Guinea.
This is placed under Papua, and the list has been rewritten and now includes the different papers and watermarks. The prices have been bused on a careful study of three specialized collections Stanley Gibbons have recently purchased.

Cape of Good Hope.
Some of the early issues have been slightly re arranged and the colours placed in the order in which they were issued.

## Fijt Islands.

This has been entirely rearranged to accord with the Fiji Handbook.

Morocco Agencies.
The list has been extended to include varieties that are generally taken by collectors.

New Zealand
The prices in this country have been somewhat increased. The demand from New Zealand for the older issues is constantly increasing.

Trinidad.
This list has been carefully revised, and special attention has been pard to the colours of the earlier stamps.

## Colour Names.

Similarly, as mentioned in Part II., an attempt has been made in this volume to make the above more consistent, and in future still more particular attention will be given to this point.
As regards the prices quoted, we have not felt it necessary to increase those of many of the older
issues. Colonials have gone up for some time and we consider that. for the present, the prices are, in we consider that. for the present, the prices are, in
general, quite high enough; there are, of course, many exceptions to this rule.

The last paragraph is very contradictory; how can there be many exceptions when the prices of many of the older issues have not been increased?
The fact is that the bulk of the old stamps have stood still in value, whilst the bulk of the New Issues have gone up, but as it would never do to let collectors see this, the prices of the latter are omitted in a great number of cases, especially used. The falure to distinguish between " multiple ordinaries" and "multiple chalkies" of course renders it impossible to quote the higher prices of the former.

Grenada furmshes a surprise, the 1o/. King multiple being quoted 8o/.. Another surprise is the 2hd. Papua, horizontal wmk. ("wide rosettes"), priced 5/-and 10/- respectively, according as it is on thick and thin paper.
The New Zealand list is now one of the must thorough in the catalogise. We notice the $1 /$. perf. $14 \times 13$ has been advanced to $4 /$ and the 6 d . is unpriced.
Why is the $£ 25$ Northern Nigeria included and the $f 20$ Natal omitted? Also, why is the $\$ 50$ Pahang on $\$ 5$ Perak ignored?

The turtles on page 283 have two heads! Is this compensation for not distinguishing the two watermark varieties?

The toc. design is triangular. All stamps are perf. 14 except the ioc. which is rouletted. We have received the following notes concerning the new issue for publication.

## "Liberian Stamps.

"A new issue of the ro lower values, I to 75 cents, of Liberian Postage Stamps has just been made. Strikingly original as was the last issue 'Landscape Series,' certainly surpasses it. All the stamps have been designed, engraved, and printed from steel plates by that well known firm of stamp engravers, Messrs. Perkins, Bacon \& Co., Ltd.
"The i cent gives a view in a coffee plantation in Liberia, with hills in the distance, the frame being simple arabesque in style with numerals in being simple arabesque in style with numerals in
the upper corners, and a few coffee beans at each the up
side.
"The a cents, with a small portrait of President "The 2 cents, with a small portrait of President
Barclay, from a very life.like photograph by Messis. Fradelle \& Young, has rather a more ornate styie of frame, with numeral in left-hand bottom corner.
"The 5 cents is perhaps one of the most remarkable 'seascape' stamps ever seen. The Liberian gunboat 'Lark' is seen lying with steam up ready to protect the shores of the Republic, the effect of the Postal Union blue sea and sky being very pretty. A rope frame with the usual knots, with numerals in lifebuoys in the bottom corners, completes a very unique stamp.
"The to cents is triangular in form, with alle. gorical figure representing Commerce. with Anchor, \&c.
"The 15 cents shows a native woman making cotton thread, sitting under the branches of a huge tree, with her bowl of carded cotton; holding the spool high in her left band, she twists it rapidly and the thread is drawn of by the right. Numerals are in both bottom conners and palms overshadow the vignette in a graceful manner.
"The 20 cents is une of the 'plant series,' showing the Malagueta pepper plant, a native of Liberia, with its leaves and flowers. The frame, with numerals in left botton corner, is a sugges. tion of Borassus palm leaves, blending very tion of Borassus palm leave
prettily with the pepper plant.
"The 25 cents gives the idea of a calendar or show-card, but instead of the almanack, a pretty native view of palms, and hills in the background, is shown.
"In the 30 cents, one colour stamp, we have a larger and a very striking portrait of the President. Such an effect as is shown in this stamp is only possible in plate work; surface printed stamps can never show the like.
"The 50 cents stamp has been pronounced the most beautiful of the series. The four natives in their ' dug-out' canoe, three rowing, one steering, on the broad river, with the jungle foliage in the background, show a typical native scene. The frame with the 'travellers' tree,' a wonderful kind of palm tree of the country, on either side, gives an appropriate surrounding.
" The 75 cents is, we suppose, one of the most singular and extraordinary and at the same time appropriate stamps ever designed. The last of the series of views is, most sultably, an album of
views! No similar stamp has to our knowledge
ever been printed. It shows the book, as accu. rately as circumstances will allow, and on the cover is a label with a pretly view of a native village. The illusion is complete and we can only commend the designers of this elegantly devised novelty for their ingenuity.
"The 'On Service' stamps are printed from the saine plates, but in different shades and 'O.S.' being in writing style as before, the position in the stamp being varied according to the design. "All stamps are perforated 14, by the comb machine, with the exception of the 10 cents stamp, which is rouletted."

## Australian Stamps.

## Not Recognised by Great Britain.

 A Serious Outlook.The above ace headlines which appeared in the Sydncy Morning Herald of the 8th instant, over the following :-
"A complaint has been received by the Central Postal Administration from a firm in Brisbane to the effect that a letter posted by them to a firm in J.ondon, and bearing the required postage, has been taxed by the British Post Office. The London addressees returned to the Brisbane firm the envelope, which shows that the reason of the surcharge was that the stamp was obsolete. It is contended by the British authorities that the stamp, which is of the Queen's Head pattern, universally used in Australia, is not valid, because the die is more than six years old."

As such stamps are valid in the Commonwealth, and the matter, which is of great importance, has been referred to in the press, I have to ask you to be good enough to furaish full information on the subject.'
Mr. Courtenay Smith, of this city, sent us a cutting from the Argus of the 16th January, containing a similar complaint, but at the time we considered that the case was an isolated one, due, perhaps, to the ignorance of some overzealous postal official. It would appear now, however, that there is a disposition on the part of the British anthorities to challenge the right of the Federal authorities to continue to issue stamps bearing the portrait of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, which most likely is considered to be an insult to His Majesty King Edward VII. If their objection is on this ground, and is backed up by some legality on the subject, then we say their action is quite justified. We have we say their action is quite justified. We have
in days gone by contended that stamps bearing the portrait of Queen Victoria should be super. the portrait of Queen Victoria should be super-
seded, but we got so weary of doing so that we seded, but we got so
gave it up in disgust.
This action on the part of the British authorities should force the hands of those in this country who are responsible for the issue of staups, and bring about perhaps earlier than was anticipated, a Commonwealth series which need not necessarily bear a portrait of the King, but must not, in accordance to the above information, bear a portrait of the late Queen.
It was stated in the press some time since that an undertaking was given that the first issue of Commonwealth stamps would bear a portrait of His Majesty King Edward VII. Perhaps there is more in the affair than appears to ordinary outsiders. Some people in authority contend that as stamps are a kind of currency, like coins, all new issues should bear a purtrait of the retgning monarch.

throne. The d. and id News-wrappers beal King's Head stamps, as also do the postcards.

Victoria．Only the $\mathcal{L}_{1}$ and $£^{2}$ of the adhesive postage stamps bear the head of King Edward and in the case of the stationery it has only Western Allstralia．Except five of the hith value postage stamps，all stamps are of the Swan design．
It may be mentioned that King Edward＇s portrait has replaced that of Queen Victoria in he not of pictorial design，fotably the postcards， envelopes and registration envelope．
Although the delay in replacing the portrait of Queen Victoria with that of King Edward has been ascribed to disloyalty in some quarters，we think it much more likely to be only an advertise． ment of the inabslity of the Commonwealth authorities to deal with inter－state jealousies．A new set of stamps bearing King Edward＇s head should be printed at once for use throughout the Commonwealth，but under the laws of the Com－ monwealth all the work must be done within its own burders．Unless it is to be done six times over， it can only be done in one State and apparently the States cannot agree amongst themselves as to which sball be favoured．Evidence of the muddled state of the stamp question is to be found in the fact that although the five years book－keeping period is long since over，all the States are still Postage lar still，Victoria using its own set printed at Melbourne whilst the other five States use another set printed at Sydney！

## Commemorative Stamps．

＂One would arrive at the conclusion from a perusal of the remarks made at the recent Con－ gress held at Manchester and reproduced in your last issue，that postage stamps were produced solely for collectors，and that for the transmission uals，they take a secondary place．To approach the Postal Authorities，as it is proposed to do，as to what they shall or shall not issue，is certainly， in my opinion，a high handed proceeding and one that will be resented in the proper quarters．I would respectfully point out to grumblers that stamps are issued for use，not abuse．The con－ stamps are issued for use，not abuse．The con．
tinuous groaning and moaning of certain special． ists regarding Commemorative issues or what ists regarding Commemorative issues or what Surely if this small section don＇t care about these stamps they can leave them sererely alone．But stamps they can eave them sererely alone．But
they have no mandate to act for the majority as they have no mandate to act fro the majorty as
to their suppression．Judging from conversations to their suppression．Judging from conversations
I have had with dealers，this＇rubbish＇is in big I have had with dealers，this＇rubbish is in blg
demand．Instead of being a deterrent to collec－ tors they are in my humble opinion an incentive． In fact 1 am sure that the ranks of collectors would dwindie without them．They certainly brighten up our album pages．One is apt to get tired of glancing at portraits of Kulers．A change is necessary in most things and stamps are no exception to the rule and that change has been brought about by the introduction of these Com． memorative issues，the majority of which are excellent examples of the designers art and the printers＇craft．Growlers are apt to forget that a thing of beauty is a joy for ever．＇Such stamps as the Cabot series of Newfoundland and the Quebec series of Canada are examples that thight well be followed by some of our other Colonies．
＂Commemoratives have more legitimate righ to inclusion in the catalogues than the so－called varieties of perforation，thin and thick，wove and laid papers，broken letters，minor shades，etc．，etc．， which could very well be omitted with advantage to the hobby．To enable one to detect these so－ called varieties requires in addition to the aid of 2 powerful microscope，the eyes of a hawk，as well as a knowledge of paper $m+k i n g$ ，printing well as a knowledge of paper miking，printing trades mentioned possess and which could only trades mentioned possess and which could this be obtained by years of careful study．In this age of competition and rush persons have not the time to devote to this study and it is there fore desirable that the hobby should be made as simple as possible．It certainly behoves dealers to give this matter of simplicity their careful consideration if they wish the hobby to be a permanemt one．They must appeal to the multitude．i．e．the general collecting class and not to the sinall section of＇micrnscopics．＇Fur this reason it would be a good plan tor Stanley Gibbons to issue their catalogues in two volumes as usual but in place of allocating them to（1） Great Britain and Colonies and（2）Foreign Countries I would suggest one volume being devoted to general issues of the whole of the world for the use of general collectors and the other to microscopic varieties including variations in perts．，minor shades，etc．，for the use of specialists．Although not a betting man I would like to wager that the volume for general collect－ ors would have a circulation one－hundred fold of that prepared for specialists．＂

We are sending with the current week's New Issues the Straits Settlements 5 c . King in the new colour, yellow, (inultiple watermark), Somaliland ra. all rose (multiple watermark, ordinary paper), 2a multiple, chalky paper, and the CEF on India 12 a . King. These stamps illustrate very clearly our remarks of last week on the subject of complete distributions.
In the case of the 5 c . yellow Straits Settle. ments we read in the Colonial Office Journal that it was to be issued and at once remitted for a supply. The authorities denied all know. ledge of it and replying that they supposed we had made a mistake sent us the old 5 c . violet instead. A few days later they issue it! But it will be six weeks before we can get the 5 c . violet exchanged and in the meantime one of our correspondents kindly sends us a sheet of 120 of the new 5 c . orange. What should we do with it? What we have done with it is to distribute it amongst our oldest New Issue subscribers; there is of course no chance of completing the distribution on so meagre a supply. Should our full supply when it arrives turn out to be a second printing in a different shade (as sometimes happens), the distribution of the first shade cannot be completed, but it is noteworthy that in the case of a New lisue Service which limits itself to complete distribu tion, the distribution of the first shade would tion, the distribution
never have been begun.
An alinost parallel case is that of the 2 annas Somalitand on chalk-surtace paper. We obtained, as we thought, a full supply, but when we came to examine it we found that by mistake all except one sheet had been sent with single watermark. We accordingly distribute the one sheet and order a further supply immediately.
In the case of the 12 annas King's Head India surcharged "C.E.F.," we have now been successtul in securing a sufficient supply to complete our distribution.
The $1 /$. Cayman Islands with multiple water mark fortunately arrived in a full supply the first time (the money for it having been deposited in the islands eleven months!) so that everyone gets it the same week, but however great one's foresight it is not always possible to ensure this.

We reproduce the following article from "Mckeel's News and Trade Circular," but although the subject is not uninteresting and may be Philately, we do not think it is stamp collecting.-Ed. E.W.S.N.

The Post Office Department of the United States, recognizing the utility of various patented devices for Vending Stamps and Machines for Rapid Mailing purposes, has issued stamps in special form for the convenience of users of these arrangements.
Stamp collectors will recognize that we are entering a most interesting and important epoch of philatelic and postal history in the United of philatelic and $p$
States at this time.
These special issues may be classified under the three following heads:
I. Part Perforated in Strips.

These strips ăfe issued in rolls of 500 and 1000 stamps.
a. Rolled sidewise, perforated vertically between.
b. Rolled lengthwise, perf. horizontally between.
II. Unperforated in Strips.

These strips are issued in rolls of 500 and 100 stamps.
a. Rolled sidewise.
b. Rolled lengthwise.
III. Unperforated in Sheets.

Issued in sheets of 400 stamps ( 20 by 20.)
I. Part-Perforated in Strips.

The part-perforated stamps, whether rolled "sidewise" or "lengthwise" are attached in consecutive strips of 500 or sooo stamps and rolled upon a small paste-board cone ready to be placed in the machine for immediate use. The perforation used is the same as the regular The perforation used is the same as the regular
issue, and a pair of the "sidewise" variety is illustrated as follows:-

The Department is now prepared to issue limited quantities of postage stamps in rolls of 500 or 1000 for use in stamp-vending and stamp-affixing machines. The stamps will be coiled on paper rolls, one-half inch in diameter. To secure stamps in this form post masters will make requisition on Form 3201, and attach to it a letter stating :

Unperforated in Strips.
The unperforated stamps issued in strips rolled "sidewise" or "lengthwise" are attached in consecutive strips of 500 or 1000 stamps rolled and put up in the same manner as the partperforates.
These, however, are not ready for postal use until the spectal perforation required by certain machines are applied.
The "sidewise" rolls are intended for use in "Schermack Mailing Machine" of Detroit. This is known as the "hyphen bole" perforation, and

on account of the extensive use of these mailing machines by large Chicago concerns, has been the best advertised thus far
The "lengthwise" rolls are made use of by certain stamp vending machines, which require a special means of separation.

The "U.S. Automatic Vending Co." in New York employ what is known as the "Notched" roulette, and a pair is here illustrated.

As issued at present, these would be classed as "Un-Official Perforations." being applied as they are, by the makers of the machines.
An effort, however, is being made to have the P.O. Department adopt the patented perforating parts of these various devices so that they may supply the stamps in rolls with the special perforations as required for each kind of machine.

## Cbe 50 Raresi Stamps.

(From the Philatelic fournal of Great Britain).
The February number of the Timbre Poste, the new French monthly, contains a list, drawn up by M. Victor Flandrin, a well known writer on philately, of the hundred rarest stamps of the world. Similar lists have been drawn up before in this country, more than once, but nothing of the kind has been attempted of late years, and possibly our readers will be interested in reading the latest list. It will be seen that the same stamp is treated as two, according as to whether it is used or unused. The list starts, of course, with the ic. ${ }^{2} 856$, British Guiana, of which only one copy is known; this is followed by the 2c. Hawaii, first issue, of which no more than ten are known. Then come the two Mauritius "Post Office" which are represented by twenty four specimens known, and four or five whose existence is suspected.

To the specialist such stamps as the inverted centre varieties or British plate-numbers are both of more importance and more value The rod. wmk. Einblems is surely more worthy a place than the Nova Scotia I/ unused?

If the list were extended in other directions such stamps as the r/- yellow Matritius envelope would not have to be lost sight of, nor several of the telegraph stamps of certain countries.

FIJI ISLANDS (501 A 507). -We have lately lad some sheets of the 5/-Queen's Head stamp liad some sheets of the $51-$ Queen's Head stamp

we take the opportunity of giving what we believe we take the opportunity
in April 1906 Sir Everard im Thurn, к.c.m.g., Governor of Fiji, furnished Mr. C. J. Phillips, who was then compiling his "Postage Stamps of the Fiji Islands," with an "official list which he had had prepared." We make the following extract from this official list:-

Stamps Issued by British Government.
[Here follows a list of stamps values $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. to I/-.]
5s. stamp . . ${ }^{+}$first issued 23 rd May No. issued
No King's Head stamps have been included in the foregoing list.
The Governor of Fiji states distinctly that the whole 23,200 were "issued" and we believe that hat occurred was this.
The stamps of Fiji were printed at that time by the Government Printing Office, Sydney, which usually, if not always, prints off larger quantities of stamps than have been indented for. A portion of these are perforated and from them the quantity indented for is selected. The remainder, partly perforated and partly imperforate and ungnmmed are then laid aside and would in the ordinary course be utilized to supply the next indent or part of it. This is the procedure in the case of the Commonwealth Postage Due stamps printed at Sydney.
In the case of the $5 / \cdot$ Fiji 10,000 were indented for about 1882, but we believe, although we have oo documentary evidence of the fact, that about 23,200 were printed, of which 10,000 were sent When the Elaced on sale 23rd May 1882. remainders on hand in the islands were sold. Subsequently it was found that owing to the practice detailed above (which practice is confirmed by the letter printed in Appendix 111 . of Mr. Phillips' book), the Government Printing Office, Sydney, had also a stock on hand, which included 264 sheets of $505 /$ - stamps, some of which were perforated-and having been perforated at the same time as the 10,000 sent to Fiji in 1882 , were of course perforated with the old gauge ro. Those which were not perforated were then (about 1906 ?) completed-of course with the machine then in use, gauge nearly 12 whilst a few sheets which were of defective colour or of which the head was off centre were left imperforate, probably not being deemed worth completing. These 13,200 stamps, made up of the three varieties perf. to, perf. 12 and imperf., along with the stocks of the other values were then postinarked "Suva 15 DEC 1900 " and shipped to the Fiji lslands, where the Govern. "sold to the public" and consequently these stamps have every right to be considered as issued. If it be contended that the postmark is not a postmark, then it can only be a surcharge, but in any case it was done with Government sanction, and Sir Everard im
Mr. C. J. Phillips, in his work "The Postage Stamps of the Fiji Islands," professes to find well defined differences in the design between stamps of the 10,000 issue and those of the 13,200 issue, but it is obvious from the explana than given above that no differences exist, other
those which are common to both issues. There are not two issues, lithographed and electrotyped, but one, of which the frame is lithographed and the head probably printed from a copper plate. Mr. Phillips states that the 10,000 issue was on paper watermarked "Cowan" whilst the 13,200 were on a later paper water marked "New South Wales Government." A
sheet of the " 13,200 issue" before us is watersheet of the " 13,200 issue" before us is water-
marked "Cowan" and we believe both papers marked "Cowan" and we believe both papers
were used indiscriminately along with the

Saunders and Sanderson papers (as to which much has already been written in our columns at the time the stamps were in use),
It is curious that "a new plate" for printing the $5 /$ - stamps should have been made in $1899 \cdot$ 1900. The $5 /$ stamp being printed in two colours could not be produced without two plates. Therefore what does the Government printer mean in the three records which Mr. C. J. Phillips has copied from bis books and quotes on page 79 ?
He speaks (4.10.99) of having "taken one electro from steel die N.S. Wales Duty, which gives the the part required to form plate." What part was this? Was it for the head plate? The New South Wales Stamp Duty stamps were printed from two plates, the Duty Plate and the Head Plate. The head plate consisted of the bead of Queen Victoria on a circular lined ground, enframed with the inscription "New South Wales-Stamp Duty." Presumably the Government Printer " so took an electro" from this die ment Printer "so took an electro" from this die
as to give him "the part required," i.e., the head as to give him "the part required, i.e., the head
without the band. And this head, so obtained, tallies exactly with the head on the stamps issued tallies exactly wit
seven years before.

Mr. Phillips states that this record was copied from the printers' books for him by Mr. A. F. Basset Hull and was dated 4.10.99. Is there not some error in the date? The head was no doubt referred to as "Five Shillings Fiji Stamp" because although exactly similar to that on the I/- stamp, the die for the latter probably combined the head and duty portions, and the head was not therefore available for separate use. Mr. Phillips produces no evidence to show why "a new 5/- plate" was required in 1899. nor that it was ever printed from. His words are (referring to the 13,200 ):-" These doubtless had been printed from the electroplate in auticipation of an order." On the contrary, we believe them to have been left over from the one and only prinkng in 1882.

To continue this amazing history, records are quoted from the printers' books, said to be dated 10.7.00 and 19.7 .00 and authorizing the production of a $5 /$ - die and an electroplate of 50 electros, the former to supersede "the present copper plate " [die?] and the latter enabling the litho stone to be cleaned off. Why? No evidence is produced to show that new $5 /$ plates had been ordered by the Colony of Fiji , nor that even a fresh supply of stamps had been ordered. Why were they made, if they were made? We note that the excerpts from the printers' books are rather in the nature of memoranda and there is no evidence that this die and plate was ever
printed from or even made. printed from or even made.

It may be that this new 5/- die and plate were ordered by error, but whatever the truth may be there is nothing whatever in the official records to show that it was ever printed from or that the 13,200 remainders were other than the remainders of the 1882 printing.
In appendix II. of Mr. Phillips' work, by the way, the printings of $1883-1889$ appear to have been omitted. For instance, only $100,0001 /$. ate entered, whereas on page $74125,000 \mathrm{I} /$ are accounted for.

Whilst we are on the subject of Fiji, we may point out that tue footnote on pages 66 and 76 is incorrect. Mr. Phillips says :-

Under this heading [Perf. in $\times$ nearly 12] are
included all the stamps formerly catalogued as
perf. $12 \times 11,11 \times 12,11 \times 11 \frac{1}{2}$, or $11 \frac{1}{2} \times 11$. They
are all compounds of perf. 11 with that of the machine gauging nearly 12 , which has sometimes been measured as $11 \frac{1}{2}$ and sometimes as 12 .
In E.W.S.N. (133/12.4.02) we wrote :-
Fiji Islands (B120).-A new perforating machine gauge IIt $\frac{1}{2}$, has been brought into use for Fijian stamps. Since about 1887 they have been perforated Io, 11 or 12 , or compound. Five values have now been shown us, perf. II 1 int the
latter gauge being even, and apparently quite distinct from the $11 \frac{1}{2}, 12$ gauge employed for New South Wales stamps.
The colours of the 4 d . and 6 d . were brighter, signifying a new printing, these being probably part of the supply sent from Sydney on 19.2.01. In E.W.S.N. No. 16I we chronicled the rd. issued perf. in $\frac{1}{2} \times 11 \frac{1}{2}, 12$, the former being the new even int gauge and the latter that described by Mr. Phillips as "nearly 12 ."

The note on page 85 of Gibbons' Catalogue is, to the best of our belief, entirely mistaken.
This discussion brings out excellently the advantages of Ewen's Simplified Stamp Collecting. Having only 32 Fiji to get to complete his collection the collector who follows this system would have plenty of spare time and funds to specialize really well one or two stainps of the whole series. We can recommend the $1 /$ and $5 /$. Fiji stamps as two ideal stamps to specialize, although it might take years to get together sufficient material to form reliable conclusions as o the number and identity of the various print. ings. Both stamps would have to be shown in entire sheets and the stamps would require to be supplemented by a study of the essays, the watermarked papers, perforating machines, postmarks, etc., with bibliography, etc. Still, even so, the cost of the whole collection would be considerably less than a moderate display of all the issues and the latter would have little or no philatelic value, whereas the former would be a philatelic value, whereas the former would be a
really valuable contribution to our philatelic really valua
knowledge.
Mr. Charles J. Phillips is to be congratulated on the excellent work he has put into his hand. book, and we should think he must have fully realized that the whole of the issues of a colony is a very big undertaking, almost too great, in fact, to be recommended to the average collector.
Hence the advantage of a simplified general collection which enables him to specialize one or two stamps of a colony and gives even the smallest collector a chance to do really valuable philatelic work whilst still keeping in touch with philatelic events all over the world.

FIJI ISLANDS (507 B 508).-In our article last week, we overlooked a curious point. Writ. ing about the remainders on page roo, Mr. Phillips says in his book:-
About 1go6, after the introduction of the King's head stamps, the remainder of the old issues on hand were sold obliterated in full sheets, but the obliteration used was different from that actually used to postmark stamps.
The postmark in actual use for the past twenty-five years has been of one torm. This is dated in centre, Forn the remainder stamps the word " $\mathrm{Fiji}^{\text {" }}$ "has been romoved and two curved lines with dots between inserted in their place. In the remainder stamps the authorities seem to have allowed different dates to be inserted. The most common are $15,12.00$ and 21.6 .02 .

The italics are ours. With regard to this, the Australian Philate!ist (10.5.0g/rog) states:-
One of our esteemed correspondents, Mr. Ulph, of New Zealand, disputes this assertion, and has backed up his opinion by submitting to us certainstamps which
must have passed through the post in the ordinary way and bore the cancelling stamp without the word "Fiji,", but with the two curved lines instead. One envelope bore the words "Packet Boat" as well.
On looking through our own stock we were astonished to find Mr. Ulph's contention corroborated, and we have before us as well some stamps with the King's head obliterated with the town name "Suva," but without the word "Fiji" at bottom.
Did it not occur to Mr . Phillips that it would be quite unlikely that a cancelling stamp of the character postmarking remainders only in a small place like Suva? probably only one obliterating stamp would be sufficient for all ordinary purposes, but if a mail happened to be going out or a rush of letters came in would it not be quite natural that a second obliterator should be brought quite natural that a second obliteratorshould be brought did not contorm in every particular to the other? Most postmasters would consider that so long as the stamp was obliterated it did not signify as to the character of the obliteration.
We will agree with Mr. Phillips that the two dates above mentioned have heen mostly used on remainders or stamps postmatked to order, but we think he is not justified in dubbing all those stamps as remainders which are postmarked with the obliterating stamp as
he describes it. he describes it.
Mr. Ulph states in a letter 10 us of recent date that when he was in Fiji in 1 go6 King's head stamps were requently postmarked with the obliterating stamp,
with the word "Fiji" at foot omitted and bearing two with the word "Fiji" at foot omitted and bearing two time that the other obliterating stamp with the word "Fiji" in it was being used as well.
As a matter of fact this Suva postmark without "Fiji" and with two lines divided by a star is quite a common one and there are at least two varieties of it as witness our illustrations.

As will be seen in the report of the last meeting of the New Zealand Philatelic Society, Mr. Bate (by the courtesy of the New Zealand Postal Department) issue. As this will probably be the first announcement
of any change in our stamps, I thought I had better forward you a few rough notes on same.
There are six new stamps of the following values:2d., $3 \mathrm{~d} ., 4 \mathrm{~d} ., 5 \mathrm{~d} ., 6 \mathrm{~d}$. and $1 /-$; and of course these will eventually take the place of the present stamps of the corresponding values. Apparently there is to be no change in the $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d} .$, Id., $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d} ., 8 \mathrm{~d} ., 9 \mathrm{~d} ., 2 /$ and $5 /-$.
The new stamps are printed from engraved steel plates, and are the work of Messrs. Royle, who it will be remenibered were responsible for the two plates marked Ri and R2 used for printing some of the later "Universal" pennies. The workmanship is everything that could be desired, but whether the design could be improved upon is, of course, a matter of opinion. Personally, I would like a little more of his Majesty, and not so much of the "Dominion of New Zealand." The design is practically the same for all values, the alteration in some of the values being merely in the value. - New Zealand being in fairly bold type; in fact, somewhat after the style of certain stamps of the Republics of Central and South America. Beneath New Zealand is a crown and below this appears the head and is a crown, and below this appears
shoulders of King Edward in an oval frame, the head being somewhat below the centre of the stamp. His Majesty is in uniform, the head is turned slightly to the right, the pose being similar to that on the $f i$ and $£ 2$ Victoria. On one side of the stamp appears the word " Postage," and on the other "Revenue," while the bottom is reversed for the value (in words). This much of the design ts common to all six values.

The values appear in numerals as well as words, the numerals being (in some) in the bottom corners, in others higher up.
So far I understand the authorities have not definitely decided upon the colours for the various values, and if, as I believe to be the case, the firat printings are to be made in England, it will be some time before the new issue makes its first appearance. I might add the stamps are apparently the same size as the current $\frac{1}{2}$ d. and id. the comb machines when printed locally

The stamps will bear the portraits of Columbus, stamps, from 1c. to 50 c ., will be of the same size a the present ones, and those of $\$ 2$ and $\$ 5$ will be of the same size as those of $\$ 1$, and will bear at foot, in small letters, the name of the person represented; they must be engraved on steel and perforated. The models of the entires will be as at present, the engraving to be at tenderer's option. Delivery of the accepted tender to commence within 180 days of the date of the corresponding decree, under deposit of $5 \%$ of the value for one year as guarantee. Tenders may be made of stamps commemorating the centenary of our political emancipation. Tenders will be opened on 2 ith July next.'
We believe it to be contrary to the laws of Chili for stamps to bear any other portrait than that of Columbus; at any rate if the bead of Columbus has served so many years it might

very well remain; we cannot find any reason for a change in the stamps of this country, nor for introducing high-value stamps of $\$ 2$ and $\$ 5$. BRITISH SIAM.
What Postage Stamps will be Used?
The Foreign Office yesterday issued the text of the treaty signed at Bangkok on March loth between which Siam cedes to Britain all rights of suzerainty over the States of Kelantan, Tringganu, Kedah, Perlis, and adjacent isles. The jurisdiction of the Siamese international courts is to be extended to British subjects in Siam, but this jurisdiction is to be transferred to the ordinary Siamese Courts after the promulgation of the new codes of law.
Attached is a memorandum explanatory of the circumstances which rendered a modification of the system of British extra-territorial jurisdiction in Siam desirable.
As regards the transfer to Great Britain of jurisdiction over the territories referred to, it is stated that, owing to the distance from Bangkok and the difficulties of communication, especially
during the north-east monsoon, it was impossible for Siam to control their administration effectively. The people are Malays and Mohammedans, like the
natives of the States to the South which form the Federated Malay States. The administration of the States is at present self-supporting, and there is no reason to fear that it will become a burden either on the Federated Malay States or the British taxpayer The possession of the fine harbour of Langkaw is a matter of considerable importance in connection with the trade route to the Far East. Whilst enabling Siam to consolidate her power and render her administration effective in the northern part of the peninsula which remains to her, the transfer will lead to a great expansion of the trade and commerce which tinds an outlet through the ports of the Sill getlemens, and the transfer of Penang of the recommendations of the Opium Penang of

＂postprint＂is the id．black，printed in 1864 for a member of the Royal Family．If the term ＂new print＂were limited to impressions taken off for purposes other than the ordinary，it would correspond to the German＂Sonderausgabe，＂ whilst our postprint is the German＂Nachdruck＂ and preprint the more familiar proof or＂Pro． bedruck＂（though iṇ a more limited sense）． ＂Neudruck＂then coiresponds to our＂reprint＂ or imitation．The history of a stamp may thus be set forth as follows：－I．，Essays；II．，Die proofs and plate proofs；III．，Preprints；IV．，First print ； V．，Newprints（sometimes there are none as in the case of the 5i－Figi ；VI．，Postprints；VII．，Re－ prints（or imitations of an essay，proof，prepriut， first print，newprint or postprint made from the original die or plate）．All of these may be either （a）official；（b）inade privately but with govern－ ment authority（like the Seebeck postprints）or （c）purely private．The latter should be a criminal act in every country and when imitation plates or dies are used，amounts to forgery．

Either the dates given above are incorrect or the Patu Salan is a very slow boat, as the Postmaster, Maldives, informed us that the stamps only arrived at Male on Sunday, 16.5.09 and were issued on 17.5.09. "Thursday last" in a daily paper dated 4.5 .09 would mean Thursday, 29.4.09, so that presumably 17 days were required to traverse the distance between Colombo and Male, which seems rather long.

We quote as follows from the Postage Stamp (26.6.09/146) : -

In looking over some sheets of the new Maldives, 1 find the sheets of the 2,3 and 10 c . are perforated by a comb machine, and the sheets of the 5 c . by a single line machine. Possibly some of my readers will find sheets of the 5 c . perforated by the comb machine, and the other values with the single line. As is now well known, these perforations can be distinguished in pairs or blocks by the crossing of the horizontal and perpendicular lines of the perforation, as in Gambia.

In the rush with which the mails must be handed many letters bearing the new stamp have escaped similarity in size and colour to the one-cent stamp.

Washinoton, 9.6.09.
The Post Office Department is preparing to issue a new postal card. Postmaster-General Hitchcock has called in the expert chemists of the Department formula that will give a much better paper than can be made under the contract now in force. He says the Postal cards issued by this Government are inferior to the product of almost every other country and that it is contemplated to make improvements in the general style of printing and arrangement of the type and designs. It has been decided to change also the colour of the ink and the tint of the paper.
The Government issues seventy-five million postal cards a month. The present four-year contrac expires December 31 next, and in the meantime the Postmaster-General is giving personal attention to devising a more substantial and ornate card.

NEW HEBRIDES CONDOMINIUM ( 500 J 5 II ).-Mr. H. L. Bevir writes us:-
"I have received by the last two Australian mails two rather interesting envelopes from the New Hebrides. The first, which was franked with a complete set of the 'Condominium' issue, bears the following postmarks: 'Port-Vila Nelles Hebrides 15 Mars 09 ; Sydney N.S.W. Ap. 1009 ; London 14 My og .' It contained a card inscribed G. Roy, Agent Postal du Condominium franco anglais des Nouvelles-Hébrides'; "With compliments of the season, Vila 15.3.09.' The secoud letter was franked with specimens of the $\frac{1}{2} .$, id., 2d., 2t d. and 5d. 'Condominium' issue, and is postmarked 'Vila New Hebrides Ap 5 og, Sydney N.S.W. Ap 19 og, Loudon 23 My og.' This letter also appears to have been despatched by Mons. Roy, and the French and British postmarks seem to be used indiscriminately. The 6 d . and 1 s . values were apparently exhausted when the second letter left. I thought that possibly these particulars might interest you."

It is interesting to bote that complete sets of the surcharged Fiji stamps were still being supplied at face value, as late as $15 \cdot 3.09$, because the Colonial Stainp Market's first requisition reached the Vila Post Office over two months before and to this day they have not been allowed by the postal authorities to purchase any complete sets! Care should be taken, when purchasing such stamps, to see that all are postmarked in June, 1904; all the rest must be doubtful."

## f Damaged "De La Rue" Plate.

King's Head "Postage \& Revenue" Plate I.
( Reproduced from Gibbons Stamp Weekly.)
Probably most of my readers are aware of the fact that there are two of the "general" De La Rue plates, inscribed "Postage \& Revenve," from which the King's Head stamps of such from which the King's Head stamps of such colonies as Northern Nigeria, Straits Settlements St. Vincent, etc., are printed. One of these is numbered $" 1$ ", The first is used for printing numbered 2 . The first is used for printing sheets 120 stamps in two panes of sixty each, while from the latter, larger sheets of 240 stamps in
four panes are produced. The first of these four panes are produced. The first of these plates (No. i) has been used far more than the other, and at present it is showing signs of wear, for there are marked defects on certain stamps on each sheet. On Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 9, 10, II, 12, and 28 on the left-hand pane, and Nos. 1 and 2 on the right-hand pane, the inner line of the name-tablet is broken at the top right-hand corner. On numbers $2,3,4,5$ and 6 it is quite a substantial break, and one no collector can fail to note, but on the others the defect is not so pronounced. Of course, these defects may have been on the plate from the first, but 1 hardly think this probable, as I do not recollect having noticed them on any of the stamps printed prior to 1907. I first noticed the flaws when examining some sheets of the Cayman Islands stamps issued in 1907, so that they should appear on all the stamps printed at that time or later, viz.:-

NATAL (50: X 513 ). We are informed by Mr . A. J. Cohen that the $1 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. and $30 /$ postage stamps have been withdrawn from issue.

NEW HEBRIDES CONDOMINIUM ( 511 K 51 ).-We quote as follows from the N. Z. Collectors' Exchange (4.09):-" The surcharged $F_{i j i}$ stamps were in use a few weeks before the New Caledonians, the exact date of their issue being the 2gth October, 1908.
The Fiji Government claimed the modest sum of $£ 13$ for the supply of these surcharged stamps. The first Postmaster of the Condominium is a Frenchman, the sum allowed to this official by the French Resident being much lower than that of his French colleague. The first parcel of snrcharged Condominium stamps contained the following quantities: [Here our correspondent quotes the same number as published in our March No.-Ed.]
The two issues are used together, pending the arrival of a new general issue, which will prob. ably show us local views and objects.

Two obliterating stamps are used, an English one (New Hebrides) and a French one (Nlles Hebrides). Both are used indiscriminately, just as they are handy.

2.-On and after the first day of December 1908, any letters, etc., transmitted through the Condominium Post Office to places in and beyond the Group, bearing stamps of issues other than those directed by the Resident Commissioners, shall be considered as unpaid, and postage of double deficiency shall be payable and such sur. charge shall be marked on the article at the office of origin.
3.-All moneys received from the sale of stamps at the Condominium Post Office shall be credited to the funds of the joint Administration.
4.-Interim use of surcharged Fiji stamps authorized.

Stamps of the Colonies of Fiji imprinted with the words 'New Hebrides Condominium' may be used from the date of this regulation of the first of December 1908 , concurrently with those of N.S.W., and New Caledonia, for the prepay: ment of postage on correspondence with places in and beyond the Hebrides."

ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION (469G5I4) -We quote as follows from the Stamp Collectors' Fortnightly ( $24.7 .09 / 85$ ):-
From the full text of the report of Lieut. E. H.
Shackleton, as Postmaster of King Edward VII. Shackleton, as Postmaster of King Edward VII.
Land, addressed to the Right Hon. Sir Joseph Land, addressed to the Right Hon. Sir Joseph make the following extracts:-
The first mail opened in the Antarctic, brought from New Zealand by the Nimrod, contained 1,510 King Edward VII. Land Post Office, the Nimrod taking this mail when she returned after landing the shore party. All the letters passed through my hands as Postmaster, and were postmarked with the date-stamp provided for the purpose by your department.
lepartment. plateau in latitude 88.5 south, longitude 162 east on January 7th. 1908. I considered this to be in the sphere of King Edward VII. Land, which connects with the plateau. I propose to forward you photographs showing the position at which the post office was flrst opened, the winter quarters from which the bulk of the letters were dispatched, and the branch office on the plateau.
Under the peculiar circumstances of this work, in my capacity as Postmaster, I found it necessary to widen the range of the post office from the portion
of the Antarctic continent known as King Edward VII. Land to points between 450 miles and 800 miles distant Some 2,000 letters passed through my hands, and I sold the bulk of the stamps to members of the little community. I have further to report that all registered letters for which addresses could not be found were returned to the head office in Christchurch, New Zealand. The many communications addressed to me as Postmaster were attended to as far as possible. I understand that the head office in Christchurch received instructions not to forward to the Antarctic a large number of letters which bore obviously fictitious addresses. On my return to New Zealand, I returned the date-stamp and seal to the head office, and also delivered over $m y$ records and receipts.
CANADA (508 E 514).-The Colonial Stamp Market has shown us entire sheets of 100 ( 10 rows of 10) of the King's Head $2 c$. imperforate. The marginal plate-number is in every case $\mathbf{r} 3$.
CAYMAN ISLANDS (510 Z 514.)-Mrs. Few sends us a variety of the current $2 \frac{1}{2} d$. in which the name is spelt with an $M$ having a short left foot. The variety is said to occur on the 3 d . stamp in the 5 tb row of a pane.
SUDAN (491 A 5I4).-Mr. E. L. Angeloglous writes under date of 18.7 .09 :-"I beg to bring
to your notice and through your paper to that to your notice aud through your paper to that of collectors generally that forged Sudan 'Army Service' stamps are on the market made in
Khartonm. Cp to the present I have seen $\mathrm{I}, 2$, 3 mill. and 10 piastres used. The stamps are genuine, also the obliteration, but the overprint is forged. Enclosed is a stamp for your in. spection."

ANTARCTIC BXPEDITION (469 G 514) -We quote as follows from the Stamp Collectors' Fortnightly (24.7.09/85) :-
From the full text of the report of Lieut. E. H. Shackleton, as Postmaster of King Edward VII. Land, addressed to the Right Hon. Sir Joseph Ward, Postmaster-General of New Zealand, I make the following extracts :-
The first mail opened in the Antarctic, brought from New Zealand by the Nimrod, contained 1,510 letters, and 550 letters were despatched from the King Edward VII. Land Post Office, the Nimrod taking this mail when she returned after landing the shore party. All the letters passed through my hands as Postmaster, and were postmarked with the date-stamp provided for the purpose by your
department. department.
opened a branch of the Post Office on the inland plateau in latitude 88.5 south, longitude 162 east on sphere of King Edward VII. Land, which connects with the plateau. I propose to forward you photographs showing the position at which the post office was frst opened, the winter quarters from which the bulk of the letters were dispatched, and the branch office on the plateau.
Under the peculiar circumstances of this work, in my capacity as Postmaster, I found it necessary to widen the range of the post office from the portion of the Antarctic continent known as King Edward VII. Land to points between 450 miles and 800
miles distant. Some 2,000 letters passed through miles distant. Some 2,000 letters passed through
my hands, and 1 sold the bulk of the stamps to members of the little community. I have further to report that all registered letters for which addresses could not be found were returned to the head office in Christchurch, New Zealand. The many communications addressed to me as Poststand that the head office in Christchurch received instructions not to forward to the Antarctic a large number of letters which bore obviously fictitious addresses. On my return to New Zealand, I returned the date-stamp and seal to the head office, and also delivered over my records and receipts.

In an early number we will publish a further summary but in the meantime our readers can by adding the three groups together ascertain the cost of a general collection with limit fixed at any amount. The "simplified" collector who limits himself to a penny per stamp can obtain-


A collection of 3000 on our simplified system represents one-third of the known varieties of postage stamps and should cost only about $£ 46 \mathrm{~s}$. Id., a remarkable result. The collections of 3000 varieties usually sold are padded out with surcharged stamps, shades, watermark and perforation varieties, postage due and official stamps, locals and envelope stamps, etc., and the low values of French and other European Colonies are often included many times over, only showing different names, yet the usual price is $£ 5$ or more.
Even if a collection of 3000 were made by purchasing from our approval sheets (on which the minimum price for even the commonest stamp is $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d} .7$ the cost would be-

There is of course more pleasure to be got out of stamp collecting if the stamps are added one by one than if they are bought wholesale, although the expense runs up in the case of stamps worth under a penny.
"Victoria Park," in response to our enquiry, writes that he has the following number of different stamps mounted in our three "Good Old Times " Albums, counting those in printed spaces only.


Can any of our readers beat this total? When a collector has obtained 1590 of the British and British Colonial stamps listed in our Quotations No. 3I, he should have every stamp, complete, listed at ${ }_{4} \mathrm{~d}$. or under (costing 6d. to buy), whilst in getting 1881 difterent European he need not spend over $2 \frac{1}{1} d$. on any one stamp ( 1905 are listed at idd. or under) and the same limit applies to 1475 varieties from the Rest of the World.

Turning to the other end of the scale the collector who limits hitnself to spending $f i$ on a single stamp could have a collection lacking only the following:

He would however still lack the postage due, official, registration and " too late" adhesives, the various unadhesives and the locals in Gibbons local catalogue, which total another 6000 or 7000 . Further afield he would find thousands of private locals, such as those of Germany listed in Sternheim's new catalogue, thousands of railway stamps, tens of thousands of adbesive fiscals (Champion's Catalogue lists about 5000 adhesive fiscals for the Argentine Republic alone!) and still more thousands of unadhesive fiscal stamps. Surely a vast enough field for research without multiplying it fourfold by distinguishing details of manufacture or overprinting!

## f morning at the Irelbourne Stamp Prining ofrice.

Through the courtesy of Mr. Scott, the Secretary of the Postal Administration, and Mr. Cook, the Government Stamp Printer, to whom he gave me an introduction, I was afforded an opportunity of a visit to the stamp printing branch of and on a day when a fresh supply of sume of the Victorian postage stamps were being printed. As it was my first visit to the Melbourne establishment, it is needless to say I made the most of $m y$ inspection.
As is well known, Mr. Cook, who was only recently appointed, did similar duties in Adelaide, recenty appointed, didsimiar duties in Adelaide,

Before describing the methods of prother at present in use, I may inform my brother philatelists that he, like Mr. Scott, is thoroughly in favour of the steel plate process for printing stamps, and of designs that will be 2 credit to the Commonwealth, and he also recognises the fact that there must be no delay having this question settled before the end of the Braddon clause in the Constitution Act comes to an end. colour if it can be avoided. The recent alteracolour if it can be avoided. from yellow to slate was necessitated owing to the many complaints having reached the central office that the colour made the design often unintelligible. The only change likely to occur, not affecting the present postage stamps, is now under consideration, but until it is definitely settled I have been asked not to give it publicity
The stamp printing room in Melbourne is of about the same size as the Sydney one, but not so conveniently arranged, but as soon as some new machinery ordered arrives the necessary alterations will be effected. The main press is fairly up-to-date and does quick work. Each sheet of the ordinary-sized stamps contains 480 , divided into four panes of 120 each. During my visit a fresh supply of the id. Victorian postage was being printed, and 1 noticed what will account for the shades met with in these stamps. Whilst the supply of ink to the roilers is well kept up there is no difference in color, but as soon as it is running out the color becomes a little lighter in shade, and with the first of the fresh supply the shade is a little darker than the normal. But this only occurs when the attendant happens to let the supply of ink get too low, whi made on the Alemises and are ground uniform shades centre color of the Victorian Postage Dues is entre color the Vietorian Postage Dues is catalogued boin rosine and carmine, I was told hat one color only bas ever been used, and that the so-called carrathe shade is due to the atteadant not keeping the rollers plentifully supplied. I am told, however, that shades will be avoided as much as possible with the new machinery to come.
$\mathrm{As}_{\mathrm{s}}$ soon as printed the sheets are transferred to the gumming machine. The gum used, as I
saw it in the vessels, looks like a dull white liquid, but it is pure wattle gum, and besides encouraging, as it does, a natuve industry, it never gives trouble, and always works smoothly. A long and broad canvas belt takes the gummed sheets from the machine to the drying-room, which is heated by electric radiators. When dry they are cut into panes and handed over to have the edges of those that may have curled smoothed down, and from that operation they go into a press, whence they emerge after a time thoroughly flat. The next process is perforating. There are at present four machines in use ; two triple cutters gauging r2 $\times 12 \frac{1}{2}$, one single cutter gauging II , and one gauging $12 \frac{1}{2}$; only on rare occasions, when there is a rush of orders, have the single line cutters been used. But Mr. Cook is so averse to this that he told me the 11 gauge perforator will not be used again for postage stainps, especially as additional triple cutters are to be put up. The needles in the perforator are sliding ones, and can be taken out to be sharpened. When much worn they make larger holes, and this will account for the slight variety of gauge sometimes met with. This will account for compound perforation in the d. green Victoria. It was whilst pointing out to Mr. Cook what a tax these vagaries were on the collector that he pronised it would he avoided in future, as he desired to meet the philatelist as much as possible. Another lady goes over the stamps to see that the printing has been correctly done. and when satisfied, the sheets are passed on to the numbering machine, an ingenious instrument. They are then again carefully gone over and counted, and handed over to the accountant who sees them put into the strongroom. One key of this is kept by the Government Printer and the other by the accountant, but neither can open the door without both are present, and before stock goes out it is again counted. Thus there should not be the slightest chance of impertorated or defectively printed sheets seeing the light, as has happened occasionally in the past.
The other rooms are used for mechanical purposes, such as preparing the plates for the printer, making of dies, \&c., and repairs, alsu storerooms. In one of the latter I saw a quan. tity of machinery used in the South Australian othce, most of which will be utilised. When Mr. Cook gets everything in order he, as he tells me,

asked if it was the intention to print all the asked if it was the intention to print all the
Commonwealth stamps in Melbourne he told me Commonwealth stamps in Melbourne he wold me
that nothing had yet been decided. With the present plant and conveniences, my opinion is that it could not be done, unless both day and night are utilised. Even then it is doubtful if the work could be overtaken; rather the reverse.
"Until I had shown Mr. Cook the two types of "Queeesland" on the same sheet of the gd. stamp of that State he was unaware of this peculiarity. Nor could the foreman printer enlighten me, except that it had been recently brought under his notice, and that the defect had now been remedied. There are only three of the smaller type-from the top row down-wards-in each sheet. Entil the stock now in hand goes out he is unable to verify my state. ment, as the sheets on top are all from the now correct plate. It is his intention, however, to keep back sheets showing the two types and have them destroyed. This should be good news to those collectors who have already a pair of the two types.

KEDAH \& KELANTAN (510 C 517).There has been considerable ${ }^{\text {c }}$ curiosity as to whether the stamps of the Malay States would be surcharged for use in the new States. We are now able to answer this question in the negative and stamp collectors will have to sigh in vain for what would have been an exceedingly attractive addition to their albums.
A correspondent sends us a copy of an envelope used from Kedah, and in fact one of the first to be despatched with Malay stamps. The letter was franked to the value of 9 cents, the equivalent of the Siamese letter rate (about $2 \frac{1}{2}$ d.). The rates will however shortly be brought into line with those of the rest of the Malay States.
We quote as follows from the Pining Gaxette and Straits Chronicle (19.7.09/5):-

The Transfer of Kedah.
(From Our Special Correspondent). Alcor Star, Kedah, July 16. Following my telegrams I now forward a more detailed account of the ceremonies which took place here yesterday in connection with the transfer of Kedah from Siamese to British suzerainty.
Mr. Max
Mr. Maxwell arrived at Alor Star in the F.M.S. launch Rapid, at noon. He was in plain clothing -solar topi, blue coat, white trousers, \&c. ,-and had no official escort of any description. At the wharf he was received by Mr. Williamson, Financial Adviser to Siam and Siamese pleni. potentiary for the purposes of the transfer, who has been acting as Adviser here since Mr. Hart left for lidia. Mr. Williamson introduced him to various personages present beginning with Tunku Mahmond, brother of H.H. the Sultan, and President of the State Council; the memburs of the State Council; Dr. A. L. Hoops,

State Surgeon and Inspector of Prisons; and the other European and Malay Officials. There was a short exchange of compliments and then Mr. Maxwell inspected the guard of honour of fifty Sikhs, drawn up under Mr. B. E. Mitchell, Commissioner of Police, and drove with Mr. Williamson, to Beta Baku, the Adviser's residene, in a carriage placed at their disposal by the Sultan.

At the Balas Beggar.
The formal ceremony of handing and taking over in the Sultan's presence was fixed for three o'clock in the afternoon at the Bahai Besar, or clock iou ne afternoon at the Bala Cesar, or
chief Council Chamber, a handsome building near the palace. Here a large crowd had near the palace. Here a large crowd had
assembled, inside being all the principal officials, assembled, inside being all the principal officials,
members of the royal house, and hajis; the only members of the royal house, and haj is; pondent. Outside was a guard of honour and a large concourse of the people. Unfortunately, owing to a delay in making translations of the various documents, it was four o'clock before Mr. Williamson and Mr. Maxwell were able to start from the Government Offices, and by this time His Highness the Sultan had arrived at the Balai Besar and taken his seat in the centre of a number of chairs reserved for the members of the State Council. When he appeared all present rose, but he motioned them to be seated and waited the arrival of the procession with the despatches. His Highness is a spare, dignifiedlooking Malay, and the reports we have heard of late regarding his mental and physical condition would appear to be greatly exaggerated, for he bore himself yesterday with perfect composure and ease, was most affable in his manner, and and ease, was most a arable in his manner, and
followed the proceedings with evident interest. Like all the other Malays present he was in plain Like ale the other Malays present he was in plain
European clothes-frock-coat, etc.-and did not European clothes-frock-coat, et
wear any of his Siamese orders.
Shortly after His Highness's arrival the beating of drums announced that the procession with the despatches had left the Government Offices, situated a few hundred yards away. The documents themselves were borne under a yellow silk umbrella and carried by a high Court dignitary in a golden tray of exquisite Malay workmanship. Mr. Maxwell and Mr. Williamson followed immediately after, the former in the uniform of the Straits Civil Service, and the latter wearing the full insignia of the second class of the order of the White Elephant, recently conferred upon him by the King of Siam. They were escorted by several of the principal European and Malay officials, the royal drumbeaters and bannerbearers, and various other persons, including the Malay who until a few years ago tell the then important office of Lord High Executioner. During the progress of the procession the nobat.

or religious band, emitted weird but not untunefurl music. On its arrival at the Council Chamber the guard of honour presented arms, certain officials advanced to the bottom of the steps leading to the Hall of audience and Tunku Mahmoud conducted the envoys with the despatches into the Sultan's presence. His Highness bowed, and the envoys seated themselves, Mr. Williamson on the Sultan's right with Tunku Mahmoud and Mr. Maxwell on the left with Tunku Sulong, the Sultan's eldest son, while other high officials sat facing them, the golden tray with the letters being placed on a table covered with a cloth heavily embroidered with gold. All present remained standing until the envoys were seated.

## The Speeches.

The formal speeches and reading of documents then took place, each being first read in English by Mr. Williamson or Mr. Maxwell and then in a My Mr. Williamson or Mr. Maxwell and then in a Malay translation by an official who placed a long
strip of royal yellow silk across his left shoulder strip of royal yellow silk across his left shoulder
while reading, which he did in a rather inaudible while r
voice.

Signing the Transfer.
Mr. Williamson then again rose and said :"Your Highness,
"Now that Mr. Maxwell has presented to you the Despatch from the Governor of the Straits Settlements, of which he was the bearer, the only formal business remaining to be done is the signing of the deed of transfer by myself and Mr. Maxwell as the representatives respectively Mr. Maxwell as the representatives respectively
of the Siamese and British Governments. With of the Siamese and British Governments. Your Highness' permission we will now proceed to this business. The deed will be signed in
duplicate, of which the Siamese and British duplicate, of which the Siamese and
Governments will each retain one copy."
Courts for Europeans, and British Subjects.
The transfer having been signed, Mr. Maxwell turned to the Sultan and said :-"I have now to inform your Highness that the jurisdiction of the Court of the British Consul will cease in Kedah; and that all cases which formerly came before that Court will now be tried in the ordinary courts of this State.
"I am directed by His Excellency the Governor to request that Your Highness may be pleased to grant me authority to sit in any case in which a European or British subject is concerned, and in which I may think that it is advisable that I should sit."
Sultan's Protest against New Frontier.
To this His Highness gave a ready assent, and then proceeded to express his thanks to Mr. Williamson and Mr. Maxwell. He said that

there was however，one matter which he thought required further consideration，and that was the new Kedah boundary line，as defined in the Treaty．This boundary would deprive Kedali of territory which it had held since time immem． orial，and he trusted that the British and Siamese Governments would respect the rights of Kedah in this matter．He concluded his speech with an expression of thanks to the British and the Siamese Governments and with renewed thanks to Mr．Williamson and Mr． Maxwell．

Mr．Maxwell then asked the Sultan whether the 6th August（a Friday）or the 7 th August（a Saturday）would be more convenient to receive the Governor．The Sultan replied that Saturday would be more convenient and Mr．Maxwel promised to inform His Excellency accordingly．
Coffee was then handed round and after a few minutes＇general conversation His Highness withdrew and Messrs．Maxwell and Williamson drove off to Bata Baka．

New F．M．S．stamps were introduced this morning in place of Siamese but the rates remain the same for the present，both for letters and telegrams．They are ridiculously high and will，it is to be hoped，be reduced in the near future to the same as rule in the Straits and F．M．S．A money order branch should also be established at the same time in order to give facilities for remitting money to the Colony and elsewhere；at present it has to be sent by hand， an expensive and not altogether safe system．

I have just learnt that Siam has made Kedah a handsome farewell gift in the shape of the whole of the State postal and telegraph system which on instructions from Prince Damrong was handed over by Mr．Williamson to Mr．Maxwel this morning．It comprises several post offices， something between 150 and 200 miles of line and a very complete set of instruments，etc．

## Alleged stamp Frauds.

Unsuccessful Prosecution at Melbourne.
[From the Melbourne Argus, 24.2.09].
The Chief Justice yesterday delivered his reserved judgment upon an order nisi to review a decision of Mr. Dwyer, p.m., and a bench of honorary magistrates at the District Court in November last, in dismissing four informations laid by Detective Burvett under the Stamps Acts against Frank Roland Moody, a public servant employed at the City Court.
employed at the City Court. Stamps Act 1890 , and alleged that the defendant Stamps Act 1890 , and alleged that the defendant
did fraudulently affix to certain warrants of distress adbesive stamps which had been fraududistress adbesive stamps which had been fraudu lently removed from other documents. It was proved in evidence that stamps had been affixed by the defendant to a number of distress warrants issued by him, the stamps having been originally used or cancelled on other official documents.
The defence was raised that it had not been proved that the defendant had fraudulently removed the stamps from the other documents, and that it was necessary to prove such a fact as an essential ingredient of the offence charged. The magistrates dismissed the cases, and the informant sought to review their decision, on the grounds that it was not necessary for the in formant to prove that the removal of the stamps was fraudulent, that the justices were wrong in deciding that there was no evidence of fraudulent removals. Alternatively it was contended that the justices should have convicted the defendant, under another part of section 23, of being concerned in the fraudulent acts of affixing to the warrants the adhesive stamps which had been previously used and cancelled, with intention to defraud, and should have allowed the informa. tions to be amended so as to charge such an offence, as asked for by counsel for the prosecu offenc
Aft
After hearing arguments on the return of the order nisi to review, the Chief Justice reserved his decision, inatir that woul in meantime ask the agistates upon they had dismissed the informations.
The Chief Justice yesterday said he had received a reply from the magistrates stating that they had held as a matter of law that there should be a fraudulent removal from the first document as well as a fraudulent affixing to the second document; but that they had also con sidered the facts fully, and that the majority of the Bench were not satisfied that defendant in fact fraudulently affixed the stamps to the docu ments in question, and that the Bench were unanimous that there was not sufficient evidence that defendant had frandulently or otherwise removed the stamps from the documents to which they had formerly been attached. The Chief Justice said that in his opinion the magis. trates were wrong in their law, but that, as they had virtually acquitted the defendant on the facts, he could not interfere with their decision. He also thought that they had a discretion not to allow an amendment of the information so as to ask the defendant to meet a practically new and different charge. The decision of the magistrates would therefore be upheld, and the order nisi to review discharged with costs.

Mr. Schutt (instructed by the Crown solicitor) appeated for the informant to move the order absolute; and Mr. D. C. Levy for the defendant to show cause.

"Turks Islands are preparing to issue a set of stamps of a type similar to those of the Falk. land Islands. The colours will follow the new colour scheme, except in the case of the following:

4d. red on yellow paper.
2s. red on green paper.
3s. black on red paper.
"The stamps will thus each be printed in one colour by the copper-plate process. The paper will therefore be unsurfaced."
"Amicus" writes us as follows:-
Rarities among the Turks 1slands Stamps.
"I see there is to be a new issue of stamps in Turks lsland, the design is to be similar to the stamps of the Falkland Islands, with the Head of King Edward VII. The stamps are to be printed by the copper plate process.
"I am anxiously waiting to see these stamps and I trust 1 may be as fortunate in finding among them as many rarities as I have found in the present issue of the Ship design. The present design is, 1 think, one of the most beautiful of design is,
"It happened about two years ago that I got the first rarity among the Ship design of these Turks Island stamps. I was going to Jamaica Turks Island stamps. I was going to Jamaica
on the Royal Mail Steamship 'Port Kingston'; on the Royal Mail
we arrived at Turks Island at 10 a.m. in a dazzling sunshine. What an opportunity to get some stamps, I ran down to the gangway to the Chief Steward to find out if there was time to go ashore. 'Oh, no,' he said, 'you need not go ashore to get stamps, I have lots in my cabin!' As soon as the ship got under weigh, I went to inspect. He showed me several sheets of the lesser denominations, and a few sets.
"I bought two two pennies, two twopence halfpenny, and a set. Next morning I examined them with Stanley Gibbons' catalogue, and to my astonisbment I found that. of the twopennies, one was watermarked Crown C.A. and the other had no watermark whatever.
"Since this bit of luck 1 have been carefully investigating and I have found that one stamp only in a sheet on an average of about every twenty sheets is left unwatermarked. The easiest way to get an unwatermarked stamp is to buy a sheet and with luck one may be there. I have only been successful in finding the unwatermarked specimens among the pennies, two pennies, two-pence half-penny, and sixpenny denominations. Among the sixpennies, they are exceedingly rare.
"In order that Collectors who are sufficiently interested may see these stamps, I haue sent strips of three of each of the following denomina. tions: 1d., 2d., 2fd. and 6d. to Messrs. Ewen's

Colonial Stamp Market, Ltd., 32, Palace Square, Norwood, London, S.E. It will be noticed that the centre stamp is untouched by any watermark while the stamps on either side are Crown CA.
"The stock of ship design stamps have not been quite exhausted yet and may be bought locally at the Turks Islands Post Office.
"These unwatermarked stamps are far greater rarities than the $2 \frac{1}{d}$. or 4 d . surcharge of the Cayman Islands, and are bound to become very valuable.
"Among this disappearing issue will be found several sheets of inverted waterinarks a mong the two pence half-penny denominations."

## Commemorative Postage to be on Sale

 Here September 25 th.The issue of two-cent stamps, of special design, o commemorate the discovery of the Hudson River by Heary Hudson in 1609 and the intro. duction of steam navigation on its waters by Robert Fulton in 1807, will be placed on sale in this city on September 25 th.
The stamps, which will only be issued in the two cent variety, are oblong in shape and are seven-eighths by one and three-eighth inches in size. They will be printed in the same colour as the regular issue of that denomination. Each stamp is surrounded with a border containing at the top the inscription "Hudson-Fulton Celebration" and the dates 1609 and 1909 immediately underneath on the sides.
Below this inscription on a curved line are the words "U.S. Postage." At the bottom on each side of the stamp is the Arabic numeral " 2 " side of the stamp words "Two Cents inscribed in a panel. In the centre of the stamp is engraved a picture showing the "Half Moon "sailing up the river and the "Clermont" steaming in the opposite and the "
direction.
In the background is shown the Palisades of the Hudson River In the foreground is the picture of an Indian in a canoe and in the distance, just discernable, is a canoe containing four other Indians. The canoe represents the first means of navigation along the river.

## Rare Stamps Found at Bale.

(From the Standard).

Lausanne, Aug. 18.
When part of the Archive Office at Bale was being cleaned recently a sheet of fifteen rase postage stamps was discovered amongst a heap of dust-covered papers. The stamps, which are known to collectors as the " doves of Bâle," are very valuable and extremely rare. This sheet of fifteen stamps-the largest number known to exist in one set-has been roughly valued at $£ 300$ but, though a much larger price might be realised if the stamps were sold separately to collectors, it is improbable that they will come into the market.

The Schweszerische Philatelistische Nachrichten (8.9.09/II4) illustrates the block, which is in 5 row of three with margins at top, bottom and right. hand side. The block was purchased by the Berne dealer, Mr. Ernst Zumstein and is valued by its present holder at $£ 300$.

## Special Postmarks.

The 2ist Annual German Philatelic Congress was held at Karlsbad in August, 260 philatelists taking part. To celebrate the occasion, special postcards of 3,5 and to heller were issued and correspondence was cancelled with a special postmark, machine type, inscribed " Karlsbadpostmark, machine type, inscribed "Karis
XXI. Philatelistentag " (Philateliste' Day).

When at Reims for the flying week, the Editor posted a number of picture postcards at the special post office at the back of the stands. The stamps are postmarked with a hexagonal mark inscribed "betheny-aviation--marne ——9*22.8 o9 ${ }^{\text {" }}$, probably the first special post. mark ever struck in connection with aeroplan. flying.

Le Collectionneur de Timbres-poste (1.9.09/276) illustrates the Betheny postmarks, saying:"Pour la deuxieme fois depuis dix ans, un bureau de poste spécial vient d'ètre installé sur le terrain de mancuvres de Bétheny. AUSTRALIA (52I A 522).-We are in. formed that the new postage due id. and $2 d$. stamps have as yet only been issued at Sydney and Hobart. We quote as follows from the Melbourne Argus, 6.7.09.
"Lack of uniformity in the postage stamps of Australia, and the charges made by the Postal department for exchange or re-purchase of inter. state stamps, are causes of occasional complaint by the public, particularly those who receive small remittances from other States in the form of postage stamps. It is explained by the Central Postal Administration that the variation in the stamps of different States enables accurate accounts to be kept in respect of the revenue with which each State must be credited under the operation of the 'Braddon clause' of the Federal Constitution, which expires next year. The charge made for re-purchase of stamps is 2/. in the $£ 1$, and for exchange of inter-state stamps a charge of a halfpenny is made for amounts between fivepence and eighteenpence. The exchange charge increases on a sliding scale to threepence for $£ 1$ worth of stamps."

MOROCCO, BRITISH P.O. (502 Q 522).

- Mr. Prieth writes us:-
"In looking over my G.B. King's Heads surcharged 'Morocco Agencies,' I found two distinct varieties of surcharge on the $2 / 6$ value. In the one the word 'Agencies' is longer than the word ' Morocco,' projecting a few millimetres at both ends, while in the other variety, both words are of exactly the same length. I have not yet seen the former variety catalogued, and would like to know whether it also exists on the 5/- and $10 /-$ values."
We have only seen the $2 / 6$ with the two words of equal length and the 3 pesetas on $2 / 6$ with "Agencies" longer than "Morocco." The 6 pesetas on $5 /$ - is overprinted like the latter and the 12 pesetas on $10 /$ - like the former.
ST. LUCIA (521 E 522). - The authorities do not seem disposed to issue the new stamps, although they have received them, preferring first to exhaust the stock of old ones.

TURES AND CAICOS ISLANDS ( 520 N 522).-Mr. G. A. Green writes that he has a strip of four single CA $\frac{1}{4}$. from the bottom right-hand corner of sheet and of these the second stamp is unwatermarked.
The $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d} ., \mathrm{td} ., 2 \mathrm{~d} ., 2 \frac{1}{\mathrm{~d}} \mathrm{~d}$. and 6 d . are therefore now known withont watermark and we should think the 4 d . and $1 /$-also probably exist. The same stamps also exist showing part of the inscription (intended for the margin of normal sized sheets) "Crown Agents for the Colonies." Mr. F. Herinhootem writes:-
"With reference to a short article in your Weekly' for to day, from 'Amicus, re what he
calls ' An Calls 'Rarities amongst the Turks Island Stamps,' alluding to certain stamps which have
escaped the watermark, therefore being " Without Wmk.', I do not think these should be called rarities in the strictest sense. Certain Victorian stamps were formerly listed by Gibbons as being without watermark, but they now don't list them, for on page 297 theysay: 'Theyare believed to be specimens from watermarked sheets which have escaped falling on the watermark.' I have several copies in my collection and whilst calling them 'No Wmk,' of course, I don't consider them to be rarities at all, though interesting minor varie. ties simply. I consider these Turks Islands come under the same category."

We expect to see Gibbons next omitting stamps perf. if "because they are believed to be specimens from sheets which have been perforated by tise 14-gauge machine!" Gibbons' catalogue lists all the "mixed perf." varieties of New Zealand which are of much less philatelic interest than the "no wmk." varieties, although both to our mind are interesting rather than important. These "no wmk." stamps exist in many other countries, notably New Zealand, Cook Islauds, Aitutaki, Nive, Penrhyn, New South Wales (Melbourne print) and only recently we reported a case in the San Martin issue of the Argentine Republic (unless it was a new printing).
VICTORIA (5I4 F 522).-Our Melbourne correspondent, writiog under date of 13.7.09, says that he has found some 5:- Crown A perf. $12 \frac{1}{2}$. We must confess we would rather see this stamp before chronicling it; on previous occasions the supposed "A" of the "Crown A" watermark has always turned out to be "V " inverted. Our correspondent also writes :-
"I have discovered a copy of the $\frac{1}{8} d$. with mixed perfs. $12 \frac{1}{2}$ and 11 . The top of this stanp, mixed peris. $12 \frac{1}{2}$ and in. The top of this stainp,

Concerning the new Duty stamps, we read in the Melbourne A rgus, 29.7.09:-
As provided in the regulations under the Stamps Act, notice is given in the "State Government Gazette "' that duty stamps of $1 /-, 1 / 6,2 /-, 2 / 6,3 / 4,4 /-$, and $5 /$. denominations will, on and after August 28th, be printed in colours different from those now being used. Until September loth, fees and duty may be paid by duty stamps, either of the old or of the new issue, but after that date duty stamps of the new issue alone can be legally used. Any person who may have purchased and have possession of any stamp of the old issue of the denominations mentioned, may, on or before February 11th, 1910, have them exchanged for a stamp of the same denomination of the new issue.
The $2 / 6$ is to be carmine instead of orange and the $5 /$ deep mauve instead of carmine.

Not a few well-known collectors gave up collecting altogether, but with the boom in new issues there has been a general re awakenngs of interest, although the new genera. awakenng of interest, although the new genera. tion of collectors prefers living stamps to dead the conmemorative and surcharged stamp for their revivifying powers.

And here we come to a curious point. These collectors of old issues are almost to a man specialists of certain countries only, in some cases even of certain issues only. Nut one per

Only Mr. Bishop has any canse to grumble, as he has to describe the stamps in his fortnightly chronicle.

Why then are these gentlemen so anxious to suppress commemorative and unnecessary issues? Such stamps do not come within the scope of their collections. Presumably because the "collectionneurs novices" buy them in preference to the older issues and having bought a few go on buying more, which means of conrse that they are a lost market for the older issues.

It must not be supposed that we wish to stand up for unnecessary issues of stamps. We should be very glad to see the Postal Union take some steps towards controlling the issue of new stamps. At the same time, if we were to address a communication to the Postal Union we should word it a little differently to that reproduced above.

Commemorative stamps are seldom issued to exploit stamp collectors, and if there were statistics available it would be found that not a twentieth part of such issues were purchased by stamp collectors. Take the Quebec Centenary issue for instance ; of the 62 million stamps issued, it is very unlikely more than 3 million were purchased by collectors. Not a hundredth part of the United States Commemorative issues are purchased by collectors. The same thing can purchased said of Bulgaria, Japan and other countries. The postage stamp forms a convenient formin of The postage stamp forms a convenient formo of advortising a national anmiversary, and thonsands of non-stamp-collectors buy them as somvenirs. Commemorative stamps are, in fact, the recruitng sergeants of philately, and do far more good than even exhibitions. To give an illustration of the possibilities of the postage stamp; if the Postmaster-General would issue a special stamp in February, 1911, to commemorate the twenty years establishment of the railway letter post, he would probably find it a more effective advertisement of that little known facility than all the many pages that have appeared about it in the Postal Guide. A postage stamp will often circulate where a newspaper won't, at least, in countries where there is not a "Daily Mail." But we should have thought for advertisement purposes, picture postcards were more suitable than stamps. Belgium, for instance, issues 5 c. and roc. postcards, advertising the Ostende. Dover route between the Continent and England. New Zealand is a case of a Colony issuing pictorial cards. No one suggests these are "made for collectors." Why, then, the adhesive stamps?

It is conceit on the part of collectors to suppose that issues of stamps are made specially suppose that issues of stamps are made specially on their account and an impertiveloce on to sugest to foreign and colonial governpart to suggest to foreign and colonial govern-
ments the suppression of connmemorative and ments the suppress.
surcharged stamps.

It is the business of postmasters to keep the public supplied with stamps, whether surcharged or otherwise. Collectors can collect the stamps or not; there is no one to force them to do so if they do not want.

A legitimate grievance against the postal anthorities is created, however, when in the matter of the sale of stamps collectors are discriminated against. It is, besides, bad policy. The moment the sale of a stamp to a dealer is stopped, it rises to a premium and the postal employees are provided with the opportunity to speculate. It is to their credit that there are very few cases on record, but it is bad policy to put temptation in the way.

The ideal post office is one which knows nothing of the existence of stamp collectors; which prints stamps by any means the most convenient and which issues them to all and sundry without enquiring into motives. The stamp because stamp collectors might object is no more living up to this reputation than that no more living up to this reputation that surcharged stamps solely for sale which issues
to collectors.

We cannot close these few remarks without expressing our surprise that the writers of the above letter could not have accomplished it without finding it necessary to make remarks derogatory of their own country. We wonder what $M$. the "Secretaire Colonial" thinks of their patriotism. Are not the words used rather strong in view of the Colonial Office report disproving the charges which had been made? We note the words "nous avons déja attire l'attention du Sècretaire Colonial "; have we to thank our four friends for all the recent mudthrowing?

The older stamp issues will not regain their popularity at the expense of new issues and the attempt to destroy the market for the latter by writing against them will not revivify the market for old issues, neither will cutting the profit on New Issue Services lead dealers to transfer then capital to the olsolete stainp market. But there is no reason why the older issues should not flourish alongside of the more popular new comers. But to effect this, more life is wanted in the "old issue" caınp. We feel fairly certain we could treble the membership of a certain lead. ing philatelic Society and others could do the same if they would only look in the right direction.

We fully agree with the remarks about not attempting too much, but no one who studies the stamps of a single country or group of history or geuraphy lat us sup abs that ofthe or gers fur one of the readers of the famaica Times follows Mr. Jamaica. Geographically, it is true, he will learn that Jamaica is a British Colony, but historically the current stamps will lead him to suppose that Queen Victoria is still Queen of the Sinted Kingdom!
Stainp-collecting is a grand educational medium, quite apart from the fact that it tends to give a live interest to such subjects as history and geography. But as soon as stamp-collecting degenerates into a study of the details of manufacture of the stamps of a limited area, it is only educationally valuable in training the eye to be observant in the matter of small details.
The way geography is taught in schools is sometimes terible. We have memories of learning masses of detail that conld never be of the hightest use to us, whereas we were never taught how to understand Bradshaw! There are plenty of schoolboys who conld pass an average school examination in geography and yet who could not name the quickest routes from London to any of the chief continental cities. The school curriculun should include a course of Haedeker Bradshaw and Stamp Collecting on simplified lines. It is a fact that at Calais the other day the Editor was asked by an American how many centimes inade an English penny! He evidently was not a stamp collector. We have examined a number of entire sheets but find a variation in the surcharge on the same sheet. In one sheet of $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. the surcharge of the bottom row is very thin, whilst the remaining surcharges are clearly thicker. We also have the $\frac{1}{2}$ d. single watermark with a strikngly thinner surcharge; it has margin at top.

There are, by the way, at least three distinct shades of the fa. with multiple watermark.
(a) td. green and dull green.
(b) $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. green and bright green (so far as we know only one sheet of 120 of this was found in the first printing and it was distributed through Euent's New Issuc Service.)
(c) $\frac{1}{2} d$. light green and green; the general appearance is much paler than that of the other two. It only occurs in the second printing and was distributed at id. to all clients of Ez'en's New Issue
Service who are on the list for shades.

The Australian Philatelist (io.7.09/134) states as follows:-
" Mr. H. Venables Vernon, of this city [Sydney], who has business relations in the islands, has acquainted us that only three sheets of the $\frac{1}{t}$ d. value on single Crown and CA paper
were at first received at the chief post office were at first received at the chmef post office, Port Vila, but sixteen sheets have since been
found on single-watermarked paper in Fiji, which have been surcharged 'New Hebrides Condouinium.' They have also been sent to the islands and put into circulation. This represents a total of 2280 stamps on this paper."
This is certainly rather extraordinary. As is well-known, the $\frac{1}{d} \mathrm{~d}$. Fiji with single watermark was supposed to have become obsolete long ago. Yet it is now stated with preciseness that there were three sheers in the first printing for the New Hehrides and sixteen in the second printiog. This indicates that the entire supply must have been exammed in a philatelic manner before being issued and it would be interesting to know to whom the sixteen sheets were allotted, and what premium is wanted for them.

The second printing of the 5 d . and 6 d . has the lar in a slightly different shade, but the id., 2d. and $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. appear to be the same.

labour-saving machinery and general economy.
On Mr. Gullick's statement that the New Wales stamps cost 4 td. per thousand, what do you estimate could be saved?-£489 in the Commonwealth printing the New South Wales halfpenny, penny, and twopenny stamps alone. For the whole Commonwealth, for stamps of all denominations, I estimate a possible saving of approximately $£ 1000$. I would be in favour of printing all the stamps at the Federal capital.
What special footing do you claim for your inven-tions?-There is my perforating machine. I have devised an improved numbering machine for postal notes, of which 1 now print three millions for the four States. Whereas the old machine numbered 8000 or 9000 a day, my improved machine can do 30,000 . I pay a lot of attention to details. I seem to have an intuitive power of seeing quickly whether there is anything wasted.
Senator De Largie.-Is there danger of successful forgery of stamps?

## Cancellation to Order of Swiss Stamps.

Hitherto it has been against regulations in Switzerland (states Gibbons Stamp Weekly) for post office clerks to cancel stamps sold over the connter when requested to do so by the buyer, comater when requested to do so by the buyer,

As was pointed out in E.W.S.N., some time ago, a postmark is not and ought not to be any guarantee that a stamp has been used on a letter. The Post-office postmarker is supplied either for the purpose of cancelling stamps or of marking letters, postal orders, bank notes, savings-bank books. etc., which may require dating. It is used equally for stamps on letters and for those on telegrams or elsewhere. It is absurd therefore, as some people do, to look upon a postmark as as some people do, to look upon a postmark as evidence that a stamp has franked a letter. A postmark should be evidence that the impression was made at the town or post-office inscribed on it, at the time named; this, and nothing more. Consequently there is no objection to the "can. cellation to order " of stamps either from a collectors' or a postmasters' point of view, except that it wastes the latter's time. Of course the former makes a present to the Government of the face value of his stamps, but if he chooses to do so, why prevent him?

We are very glad to see the Swiss Post-office taking a rational view of the matter.

## Rotes.

Judging from Messrs. Yvert \& Tellier's new catalogue, philately is booming in France. And it is noteworthy that the Frencl Catalogue is the most simplified of leading catalogues. Moreover simplification does not meau incompleteness, as even " perforated officials," C.S.A.R. stamps and telegraphs are included. Envelope and wrapper stamps are now excluded.

Althongh we believe Gibbons' Catalogue price of $80 /$ - for the Grenada King's Head to'- multiple wink. was an error, the market actually seems to be getting fixed at this figure. The new Senf did not price it but the 1910 Kohl quotes 80 mark and now the 1910 Yvert supports this with 80 francs. The first issue of the Maldives is up to ito francs unused and 128 francs used (over E5!).

The Transvaal CSAR's have also gone up by leaps and bounds, the set of seven, 6 d . to $1 / /$. leaps and bounds, (nearly $E_{14}$ ) used and left being quoted 34ofr. (nearly 14 ) used and eti
unpriced unused. The cheapest values are tlie dd. and id. quoted to and 15 francs respectively.

The Colonial Office fournal for October is out (and can be supplied $1 / 9$ post free). Attention is drawn to the fact that not only the 2d. yellow St. Vincent but also the current 3d. violet will have to be changed, whilst the current id. and 6d. have already been altered, the new stamps having the stop under the " d " of " 6 d ." omitted from the first printing.

From the same source we learn that several penny stamps are likely to be changed, the present carmine shade now giving way to one more closely approxımating the Postal Union rose.red.
In the list of the 100 rarest stamps we pub lished on 4.9.09, there were one or two misprints, owing to the Editor being on the Continent and out of reach of printer's proofs. The "Connell "' should have been New Brunswick of course and not Newfoundland, whilst Madrid 2c. is evidently a misprint but which stamp it was intended for we cannot at the moment say. The Austrian Mercuries were also confused, owing partly to our Simplified Stamp Collecting, which, if it would be consistent, must necessaring account the red and rose Mercuries as one and the same stamp.

A railway porter expects more than a halfpenny for labelling one's luggage, yet if a new issue service (small initial please) dares to charge its New Issue Customer (capital N. I. C. please) a halfpenny profit for the trouble of discovering, importing and invoicing a new halfpenny or penny stamp, there are actually some individuals n the world who appear to imagine they are eing robbed! The whole trouble appears to lie in the unfortunate arithmetical fact that a halfpenny profit on a halfpenny stamp is $100 \%$ and "cent. per cent." appears to some people to be a terrible imposition even when it is only reckoned on a halfpenny. Or is it that there are educated people in existence who imagine that $100 \%$ on a penny stamp and $10 \%$ on a shilling one, if the stamps are supplied separately, mean an average $55 \%$ ? If any of our readers should catch a dealer rying to suggest to them that it is so, they will be well advised to have nothing further to do with him. Such rates as $50 \%$ and $100 \%$ mean practically nothing when applied to fractions of a penny. If people were to object to $100 \%$ under such circumstances the world could not go round! Every time a reader buys E.W.S.N. (or probably any other penny paper, for that matter) he pays the newsagent $100 \%$ profit, since the newspaper is bought from us at practically $\frac{1}{2}$ d. and sold at id. If a dealer only gets a halfpenny profit on a stamp he sells and has to pay expenses out of it, don't grudge him it !

GWALIOR ( 525 M 526). -With reference to our note last week, Mr. B. Gordon Jones writes : " Re your distinction between the heavier print ( 24 m . between lines) and the clear print $12 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~m}$. between lines) I think you describe these wrong. The narrower interval variety is from the type-set overprint, and the other from the stereotyped plates
(with elear prints) now being used. This explains (with clear prints) now being used. This explains
the absence of varieties and errors. You will prob ably find similar clear prints in Chamba, etc. The Jhind 2 tas. is also from sterco print settings. Some of these Kings with the irregular type-set prints will be rare, especially the Jhind Service high values, etc. Re the Service varieties with wide and narrow intervals, I think the last is the standard type now in use, and it has probably appeared also from the stereo plates? The 2tas. King has evidently been re-issued from the new,
plates, but it can hardly be called a 'reprint.'
plates, but it can hardly be called a reprint.
"The variety noted by the Postage Stainp and G.S.W. with the surcharge shorter is neither of the
varieties you know of. It is altogether a NEW setting, and seems also to be from stereo plates. It is a distinctly shorter surcharge, and has nothing to do with either the 24 or $2 \frac{2}{2} \mathrm{~m}$. apart varieties you describe."
We give Mr. Jones' letter in full, although he is quite wrong in supposing that we did not know what we were talking about. We have made no distinction between "heavier print" and "clear print" varieties. Our distinction in the ordinary issne was between the old surcharge (lines $2 \neq \mathrm{mm}$. apart) and the new one (lines $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~mm}$. apart), and each surcharge occurs with heavy or light printing. The second variety, chronicled by us over a year ago, is that just discovered by Mr. Gordon Jones and the Postage Stamp. The ordinary overprints of Gwalior are as follows:-

## Rew Issue Arithmetic.

Some Curious Resulits.
A correspondent writes, in relation to our New Issue terms:-"You mention a $1 / 1$ rate, but 1 presume $\frac{1 d}{}$. stamps would still be invoiced at id. or a premium of $100 \%$, so that your offer to supply at $8 \%$ would be somewhat incorrect, is this not so?

Answer. Supposing that we had, for instance, in the case of the new Southern Nigerian set, invoiced the td. stamp separately at id. the result would have been as follows to our chents. Face value $\frac{1}{2}$ d. to $£ 1$

Whereas $1 / 1$ per $1 /$ on the whole $40 / 1=43.52_{2}^{2}$
Is it not a pitiable spectacle, this poor man losing 43 of a penny? It is all very well for our New Issue service to argue that it had all the trouble of dealing with and invoicing this stamp separately, but to charge such a big, big fraction as $\frac{1}{2}$ of a penny for its profit, well--(words fail us).
We see that we do our correspondent a slight injustice. He would be willing to pay us $\frac{1}{4}$ of a penny for our trouble, so that he only lost if and not $\frac{21}{2} \mathrm{~d}$.

The same set at $10 \%$ over face would cost $40 / 1$ plus 4/076 or $44 / 1 \frac{1}{10}$.

Moral. It is better to buy at i/1 per $1 /$. even if the halfpenny stamps are reckoned at id. than pay $10 \%$. Otherwise you strain at a gnat and swallow a camel.

It is an arithmetical fact that if you purchase a $5 /$ set of stamps at $10 \%$ over face value, you pay the same price as the man who buys both the $\frac{1}{2} d$. and the id. stamps at cent. per cent. and the rest at $1 / 1$ per $1 /-$. Here are the two sums:

We have left out fractions of a halfpenny in the calculation because they do not affect the matter. as will be seen by working out a similar sum for a set of the face value of $5 / 2$.

We refer to this subject at length because some unscrupulous person has circulated a statement that we charge $100 \%$ for halfpenny stamps and that this nullifies the advantage of getting the other values at $8 \%$. Incredible as it may seem, yet some people apparently believe this! As a matter of fact (I) cent. per cent. on a halfpenny stamp makes practically no difference at all, as may be seen from the sum at the head of this article and (2) we never charge id. for a da. stamp except when we import it specially and by itself, which occurs but rarely, and chiefly in the case of such stamps as the India, C.E.F., $\frac{1}{1}$ anna King's Head, and scarce shades, thich are not distributed by any other New Issue Service at any price.

New Issue Arithmetic is however quite put into the shade by the Arithmetic of Large Col lections. Every credit is due to a dealer who pays out $£ 20,000$ for a collection, even though it pays out $£ 20,000$ for a collection, even though it

ment will ado intruduced by Messrs. De la Kue \& Co.. the stamp makers, and which is now used by severai of the British Colonies, particularly those in Sonth Africa. It is also likely, when a new indent is made, that Ceylon, where it does not at present coincide, will also adopt the Colonial colunr scheme, as suggested by Messrs. De la Rue \& Co. This scheme is to have the stamps of the United Kingdom, and their equivalent values in the Colonies, all printed in the same colurs. The following of such a proposition is left to the different Governments, and Ceylon at present in several of the values is in line with other Colonies.
GAMBIA (524 C 527).-Ewen's New Issue Service has received f500 worth of the new stamps and will distribute them this week-end. An addition has to be made to the list published
three weeks ago, and a description will be given iil our next issue.

The Colonial Otfice fournal states that it has been decided in future to print all stamps over the value of $2 \frac{2}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. in doubly fugitive ink and consequently on surfaced paper. This decision was not arrived at until after the printing of the 3 d . and 6 d . stamps. the despatch of which is chronicled above.
The following extraordinary description of fugitive ink is from the Weekly Times of Ceylon.
Fugitive colouring, either in one or two colours, aims at the prevention of stamp thefts. The printing of the stamp colours is done with a paint which runs, when wet, thus defacing the stamp. When the stamp is first used the gum on the back just prevents this, but afterwards moisture used stamp valueless. When rinted in two colours the one runs into the other, and when printed in one the face of the stamp is blurred.

They were posted there about May, 1906, and are perforated $14 \times 144$, so far the stamp is catalogued by Stanley Gilbons, but in this block of 10 you will notice there is between each stamp of the lower row a coloured dot (almost level with the scroll) between euch stamp and these dots are connected by a red line running along the top of the scroll. In the upper row the coloured dot is quite near the foot of the stamps, and there is no dot and no line at the top. Stanley Gibbons often catalogues retouched plates, therefore I think this may be worth your notice."

RUSSIAN F.P.O. $(526 \times 527)$.-Ewen's New Issue Service has shown us the complete sets surcharged "Constantinople" and "Jerusalem" at top of stamp in Latin characters. The surcharge is larger on the 10,35 and 70 piastre values. There appear to be no type varieties on the sheets, although there are variations of thick and thin inking, even on the same sheet. The second " $n$ " of "Constantinople" is sometimes so faint as to be altuost illegible. On all the values the overprint is in black.

A used stamp often sinks helow face value. We remember specially the Austrian Jubilee 2 kronen, the Northern Nigeria, the B.C.A., and others. Personally we become more in favour of mint unused stamps every day.
Mr. W. H. Peckitt thinks we were a little unkind to him last week in referring to his $£ 2,4,500$ purchase and we hasten therefore to say that we had no such intention. But after hearing of the E 30,000 record Mann Collection and then of the $£ 50,000$ Breitfuss Collection, it is just a little startling to be told that $£ 24,500$ is the record, and we may surely be excused for having sug. gested that there was an error in the arithmetic somewhere. In justice to Mr. Peckitt, however, we can say that we have seen and held in our hands the paid cheque for $£ 24,500$ and believe this to be the largest yet drawn by a stamp dealer in payment of stamps. Large collections are usually paid for by instalments or sold on commission.

The Editor is always pleased to receive Early Infor ation of New Issues, or of Discoveries interesting to Stamp Collectors.
The inder number and serial letter after the title of last reference to that country appeared.

GREAT BRITAIN.-Current Issue (484 528).-Last week's Post Office Circular contained the announcement that new 4 d . stamps could be issued on 1.11 .09 and in due course they appeared.
The stamps are printed as usual in sheets of 240 , divided into 2 panes of 120 by a horizontal gitter filled in with horizontally-shaded pillars. The marginal lines round the panes are very thin.
The design of the stamp is the same except that the space which existed previously. between the brown and green portions of the stamp is dimnished.

The colour is very unsatisfactory. At the noment of writing 2 sheet of these new 4 d stamps is lying on the editorial table in the aeighbourhood of some pennies and being in the hade and at a distance of two feet from the riter, the colours are almost indistinguishable bas light, whilst the figures of value are by no neans clear. We should not be surprised if it were found necessary to change the colour.

The reason for the change is probably the argely increased consumption of the 4 d. value rendering it advisable to print it at one operation and consequently more quickly and more cheaply. The + d. stamp has now many additional duties notably that of the 5 d . for foreign correspon. dence.
The sheets have watermark letter $F$. The fact that the stamp is not on surfaced paper looks as if the authorities intended to discontinue the use of it, or is the orange ink unsuitable to surfaced paper?
The new colour carries us back to 1876, as it closely approximates to the corner-letter fourpenmes of 1862.76. Subsequently the 4d. stamp passed through shades of sage-green, brown and green and for the last 22 years has been bi coloured, brown and green.
The 4 d. brown and green stamp overprinted or use in the Levant and Morocco will also, we presume, be changed.

The index rumber and serial letter after the title of rach paragraph indicate the issue of E.W.S.N. in which the last reference to that country appeared.

BELGIUM (499 C 531).-We quote from the Globe (5.11.09) :-
Stamp collectors are warned against purchasing, unless through respectable dealers, the obsolete 1 franc red Belgium stamp. According to a dispatch from Brussels, the place of origin of the forgeries is said to be Germany. A Bruges collector was the first to make the discovery. Besides this old stamp the artists have been at work on the current stamp of the same value. The forger, it is said, has produced an imitation that can deceive at first sight wen the Belgian postal authoritics. Many of the counterfeits have been recognised in different towns ill Belgium. In regard to the obsolete stamp, it is of the current issue the result is different.
We have underlined certain words in the above notice. It is a very strange fact, but the postal authorities, not only of Belgium but also of other countries, are very easily deceived by forgeries. The average postmaster if asked what the watermark of his stamps should be, or what is the gange of the perforation, would say that he did not know, and that he left such matters to stamp collectors. Surely it is the first business of the postal authorities to know all about their own stamps, even down to the smallest philatelic detail.

The low values of the Jubilee issue are printed in sheets of 100 divided by margins into four panes of 25 , each 5 rows of 5. As
Panes regards the "Mont Athos" overprint
A $B$ there is very little variation, but we
C D notice two slight defects, which furnish a clue as to the composition of the setting.
(a) The " $n$ " of "Mont" is short at foot; the "A" of "Athos" has a serif on the left foot.
(b) The left foot of "A" of "Athos" is the merest fraction shorter than the right one.
These variations occur on the sheet in the following positions :-


The stamp marked* (No. ro of pane C) is an error, "Mont-Atho" without the final "s." It is obvious from the above that the setting was
made up from blocks of ten types, of which $a$
and $b$ are Nos. 5 and 8 respectively; also that the whole sheet of 100 was overprinted at one operation. It may further be remarked that the "peration. It may further be remarked that the "Mont-Athos" surcharge was
already overprinted " 5 para."
The no piastres "Mont.Athos" are in sheets of 40 , eight horizontal rows of five types, of of 40, eight horizontal rows of five types, of
which No. 4 is more heavily printed than the others.

The 35 and 70 piastres are in sheets of 25 , five rows of five. In type 1 the serifs of the " $A$ " of "Athos" are solidly joined and in type 5 the left serif is broken off at left.
As regards the "Salonique" overprint, there are unfortunately no defects which give any indication as to the method of composition of the setting. In Nos. 11, 12, 16, 17 of pane $A$ and Nos. 16,17 of pane $D$ of the 5 para sheets before us the overprint usually looks like "Salonlque" but the sixth letter is only a broken " i ." On the other values, the " $i$ " is sometimes clear and sometimes like " 1, " which shows that it is only a matter of inking.
The high values are in sheets of the same size as those of Mont Athos but show no variations. The $5,10,20$ para and 1 piastre of both sets just described have the imprint " Kred. Typ. 1909."

The sets were immediately on issue cornered by local speculators, and have ever since been in very strong hands. They were at first sold at a rupee per anna; but atter a year or two the price
per set was increased one and then two rupees. The stamps were immediately forged at Zanzibar and many of these 'forgeries were exported to India and thence re-exported to Europe. The genuine stamps were mainly sold to passengers and others on vessels calling to Zanzibar Ewen's New Issue Service also secured a good lot of the genuine stamps and was the only New Issue Service which distributed them. There cannot, therefore, be many of the original genuine sets left and to our knowledge the bolders have never abated their price one penny. As long as three years ago, our Zanzibar agents reported that it was very difficult to get 8 annas stamps to complete sets. Yet now we see them offered on all sides and at prices that can hardly bave permitted of their purchase from the original holders, even if the latter had the quantities left, which they certainly have not. Has there been a reprint?

 New Stamps for Bulgaria.
According to Der Philatelist a set of new postage stamps has been ordered from Messrs. Bradbury, Wilkinson \& Co., of London. The work of preparing the issue is already well advanced; sketches and trial printings were submitted to the Minister of Finance for his approval some months back.
The issue will consist of twelve values, of which particulars of nine are given below; the finished stamps may vary slightly from this description, as the final essays have not yet been passed :-

1 stot. The "Czar," otherwise Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria, on horseback.
2 stot. Profile portrait of Prince Ferdinand; inscription at top, "bulgaria"; colour, green.
3 stot. In the centre, picture of Tirnova, the capital of Bulgaria; above, the ancient imperial Crown of Bulgaria, with in colour, red-brown.
5 stot. Portrait of Prince Ferdinand; colour, bright green.
10 stot. Portrait of Prince Ferdinand in the uniform of an Admiral of the Bulgarian Navy; colour, red.
5 stot. In the centre, a landscape; above, the Imperial Crown; on the right, the Lion of Bulgaria ; on the left, the Bulgarian Arms ; colour, orange-yellow.
25 stot. Full-face portrait of Prince Ferdinand; colour, blue.
30 stot. View of the Monastery of Rila ; colour, brown.
2 lei. View of the celebrated Sv. Troitza Monastery at Tirnova, with elaborate ornamentation round the central design.
The order for this issue was for $165,000,000$ stamps, the cost of which was to be $£ 7200$, and the face value $£ 370,000$.
According to current report the stamps should be ready for issue in the early part of 1910 , and the stock is estimated to be sufficient for five years; this estimate, however, is only based on the ordinary post office sales, and should the stamps come up to the usual standard of Messrs. Bradbury, Wilkinson \& Co., it is quite possible that they will be sufficient for only two or three years.

CAPE COLONY (486 V 532).-About seven years ago ( $E$. W'S. $^{\prime}$.N. No. 190) we published a list of dates of issue of the King's Head stamps which came from official sources. It would now appear that these were only the dates when the stamps arrived in the colony from the printers. We wrote at the time that "it is somewhat remarkable that most of these stamps should have been in use months before the fact was discovered by collectors." As a discovered by collectors. As a matter of fact the stamps had not been issued, in the philatelic sense of the word, but were hidden away at the Treasury where collectors could not get at them. We append a list giving the official dates and

1 centavo, Portrait of Leona Oicario, a heroine of the War of Independence.
2 centavos, Portrait of Quintana Roo. Ignacio Rayon. Josefa Ortez de Dominiguez. Hidalgo (an old friend). Allende Aldana.
50c., 1, ,' 5 pesos, Historical Scenes of the Period. All the stamps have been designed by local artists, but the work of engraving and printing is being done in London. The colours will be those of the current set.

NORWAY (503 T 533).-The Nordisk Fila. telistisk Tidsskrift (29.11.09/182) states that the 35 öre stamp is not to be printed further after this year, as there is little use for it.

Our contemporary questions the wisdom of this as registered letters to Sweden and Denmark cost 38 and 48 öre respectively and without a 35 öre stamp 3 or 4 stamps will have to be used. Fancy having a simple postal rate, requiring four stamps to make it up!
There is a possibility of a new printing of the I krone stamp, similar to the 2 kr . issued in 4.09 , as the dies of the new high value stamps will not be ready until after the stock of the present issue of Ikr . is exhausted. As the plates of the I and It krone were re-engraved at the same time as that of 2 krone, there would be no difficulty as to this.

This is only supposed to apply to stamps printed by the steel or copper-plate process, as it has been found that the wetting necessary in printing by this process tries the thonner paper too much. The paper referred to
is abrout 25 per cent. thicker than the ordinary is abrout 25 per cent. thicker than the ordinary
paper, and it has been inadvertently used for printing the last two issues of the large Antigua stamps.
"It will be interesting to see if other stamps besides the $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. turn up on the thick paper. We were informed that only 6,300 of the $2 \frac{1}{2}$. on thick paper were received in Antıgua, so that presumably this printing will be scarce, as the next will be on thin paper."

CAYMAN ISLANDS (527 D 534).-Mr. C. B. Bostwick writes as follows to Gibbons Stanip Weckly under date of New York, 8.1 r.09:
"The letter from Mr. Cox in your issue of October 30 has interested me. I had not previously noticed the irregularity in the formation of the letter ' $m$ ' on the Cayman Islands stamps. On looking at my collection I find a number of copies of the $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. stamps on which the right leg of the letter ' $M$ ' is longer and drops slightly below the alignment of the other letters. I have no sheets of these stamps, so I cannot be sure of the location of the 'long-leg' variety on the the loca
sheet.
"In my collection, out of nine copies of the $2 \frac{1}{6}$. CA stamps only one shows the variation. Out of fifty-four stamps six copies of the $2 \neq \mathrm{d}$. multiple wmk. show the 'long-leg' variety; and two out of nineteen 4 g. "Postage \& revenue " are thas abnormal. It is remarkable that my stamps should show this variety in precisely the
same proportion to the nurmal in each one of the
three issues. My single copy of the 'long-leg variety on the single CA stamp is not quite clear, as the cancellation covers the ' m .' There is no appon, however, why the variety should not appear on both the single and multiple stamps if they were, as I understand, printed from the same plate.

On looking at all my Cayman stamps to dis. cover what I could about this variety, I learned for the first time that there are two types of the letter ' $m$ ' used on those stamps. On all values over one penny the apex of the two inner lines of the ' $m$ ' stands considerably bigher than the bottom of the letter; while it comes all the way to the bottom on the $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. and id. stamps.
"While these are matters of minor specialism, I thought that you might be interested to note these facts as supplementary to Mr. Cox's interesting letter."

NEW HEBRIDES ON FIJI (524 O 534). -Mr. L. J. Worthington writes :-
"I have been examining my surcharged New Hebrides and find a small variety I have not seen noted. I have two copies each of the 2 d . and 5 d . In the first 2 d . the yellow bar at top is divided lengthways by a fine line, as if the bar consisted of two parallel printing blocks, the upper one being thicker, ratio about 3.2 . In the second, where the yellow is rather paler, the upper bar is the thinner, in the same ratio. In the first 5d. (old shade) there are no signs of this line, the thick bar being undivided. In the second specimen, the second printing, there are upper being thinner. In the $2 \frac{1}{2} d$. and 6d. the bar is undivided quite pronounced, the upper being the thicker. 1 have not been able to examine any other copies but perhaps you will be able to find more but perta

NEW ZEALAND (530 A 534 ).-We quote as follows from the Wellington Standard (9.12.09). New Stamp Issue.
On November 8th, a new issue of Postage and Kevenue stamps will be ready for sale. The stamps, which range in value from $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. to 1 s ., will bear, with the exception of the id. oue, the portrait of the King. The necessity for the new issue is shown by the substitution of "The Dom. inion of New Zealand" for "New Zealand." With the exception of the 4 d. stamp, which is now of an orange colour, all the new stamps are of the old colours, so that the public may not be confused. The purtrait of the King is considered to be the finest that has yet been produced, and, in the case of most of the stamps, has been printed from steel engravings by the Recess process of printing. The plates were manufactured in London, and the whole of the printing executed in the Government printing office. The $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$., 9 d ., 2 s ., and 5 s . values remain as before in $2 \frac{1}{d} ., 9 \mathrm{~d}$.

From the Wellington Dominion (10.09) we clip: " With the new issue of stamps, referred to in yesterday's issue of The Dominion, the majority of the present not unpicturesque stamps, which created a good deal of joy in the heart of the philatelists, will disappear. The new stamps are prosaic to a degree. The design-a good (bust) portrait of the king in field marshal's uniformis the same on the whole range of stamps. The only difference is the tint in which they are printed and the nuinber showing the face value. We notice that a leading dealer is sending out circulars and advertisements bearing not
inconsiderable similarity to our Subscription Stanip Collecting and from the fact that it follows so closely on our announcement, evidently intended in an inimical spirit. This is all the more surprising as the dealer in question has an excellent business in the older issules, with which we have never interfered or issumes, with Why under such circumstances he
compete competed.
should wish to sit upon other people's door-steps and interfere with their business, we cannot iinagine. Although as long as 50 years ago new issues were being regularly imported, notably by
Moens, the smail-percentage New Issue Service Moens, the smail-percentage New Issue Service
is Mr. Ewen's invention, and it is just as well is Mr. Ewen's invention, and it is ju
that this fact should be remeinbered.
Mr. Ewen is merely fighting for his own, against those who would deprive him of it. It is not so long ago, for instance, that Mr. Ewen had to bring three actions for infringement of his copy. rights, and although only one came into court, all three terminated or were settled in his favour. To day we have to complain of this circular, in which a leading dealer, who borrowed our idea of the small-percentage New Issue Service without so nuch as a 'by your leave," seeks to prove that his service is not worth the annual subscriptions we are asking. It is quite true that it is not. But unfortunately people who have not tested the relative merits may imagine because one is not, the other is not either! At least one collector collector who has never subscribed to a New Issue Service, says he has seen our advertisement oi Subscription Stainp Collecting and also the adiertisement of the other dealer, and he cannot see how it would pay to join, because "it works out at $20 \%$ above face." Thus the trap claims its
victim. For the suggestion that Subscription victim. For the suggestion that Subscription
Stamp Collecting or the Subscription New Issue Stamp Collecting or the Subscription New Issue
Service bear any resemblance to the monthly Service bear any resemblance to the monthly
doles of New Issues which our friend sends out doles of New Issues which our friend sends out
is absurd. New Issues are of three kinds ; (i.) 1s absurd. New lssues are of three kinds;
those which can be imported in sufficient quantity to complete the New Issue Service at one distribution; (ii.) those which are not sold to the public at all; and (iii.) those which for some reason or other are only obtainable in small quantities, often the case with provisionals (but not all), shades, perf. varieties, type varieties, etc. The reason why Ewen's New Issue Service is so superior, is that it distributes all three classes, class i. practically complete, class iii. as far as possible, even if it is only to the first client on our list and sometimes even
class ii. is represented. Mr. W. H. Peckitt class ii. is represented. Mr. W. H. Peckitt
for instance has a different systenn, as he only distributes stamps of class $i$. and still further limits his service by excluding foreign countries. The great difference to the collector lies in the fact that it is the stamps of classes ii. and iii. which are most likely to become rare. for correctness of these statements is vouched advertisements that "Every, who states in his avertisements that "Every subscriber to my
New Issue Service receives their full supply at New Issue Service receives their full supply at the same time"; and heads this "complete distribution." In other words, he ouly dissupply. If he has 200 customers and only gets supply. If he has 200 customers and only gets
too copies of a new issue (as must often happen, tor theres are many rare minor varieties con. lor there are many rare minor varieties con-
stantly appearing of which only rco or less are issued), it is clear that they are not distributed at all. Ewen's New Issue Service distributes everything, as and when it gets it, even if it is only a single copy. We cannot go further into details, but collectors will see that there can be a great difference of efficiency in New Issue Services and figures relating to one are no guide whatever to another.
We may perhaps give one illustration. The Papua on B.N.G. ${ }^{2}$ d. large and small surcharge
were both sent to cvery subscriber to Ewen's New were both sent to everry subscriber to Ewen's New
Issue Service at 5 d. each (one subscriber had 60 Issue Service at 5 d . each (one subscriber had 60
of each !). On the other hand, a certain $10 \%$ service did not get a full supply of the 4 d . large
surcharge and consequently did not send to anyone at all, and now such collectors have to pay 15/- for a copy, which makes everything else cost $\mathbf{2 5 \%}$ all round instead of $10 \%$ ! of the 4 d . current design, perf. 12 $\frac{1}{2}$, we were only able to get enough for our retail subscribers, whilst of the $2 \frac{1}{2} d$. perf. 12t normal watermark and the same stamp inverted watermark (ali three now rare stamps, inverted watermark (ali three now rare stamps, especially the latter two), we were only able to secure enough to supply $30 \%$ and $90 \%$ respectively of our subscribers. Had our policy been "complete distributions," we should have put these stamps away in our safe for a year or so, say until the present time when we could get a big profit for them. Instead we distributed them as far as the supply went, at $5 \mathrm{~d} ., 3 \mathrm{~d} ., 3 \mathrm{~d}$. respectively!
No stamp is rare of which the supply in unlimited, and it is shortness of supply which con stitutes rarity on the stamp market. We leave our readers then to choose between the "complete distribution "New Issue Service.(where the short-supply varieties go into the proprietor's safe) and the "incomplete distribution" New Issue Service where everything is distributed and the subscribers first on the list get the best chance. In the case of Ewen's New Issue Service, seniority in each class goes by length of subscription, a subscriber of 10 years' standing having priority over one of 9 years, so that everyone has a chance to get an early position in time.
The value of the British Colonial stamps, face value $2 / 6$ or under, distributed by Ewen's face value $2 / 6$ or under, distributed by Ewen's
New Issue Service during the year ended roth December, reog, was about $\ell 9$, so that if a $10 \%$ New Issue Service charged only 10 /- commission during the same period, it must have left out nearly half the new issues we distributed!
The following remarkable example of stamp dealers' arithmetic has come to our notice. Russian stamp dealer advertises the new Jubilee Levant stamps at $20 \%$ over face value and he adds for your convenience, "the rouble equals $2 / 3$." This is exactly the value given by a well. known English catalogue, so that the purchaser imagines he is getting the stamps at $20 \%$ over their Post-office cost. He would be considerably startled to learn that he was paying $62 \%$ ! (sixtytwo per cent.)
The explanation of the Russian Levant trick is this. Firstly, the rouble is not worth $2 / 3$ but 2/It ; money orders sent by post are converted 25.4 d. per rouble. 9 r. 44 kop. per $\ell_{1}$ stg. or 25.4 . per rouble. But although the face value

70 piastres at 2 d . which equals $11 / 8$; and $18 / 11$ 70 piastres at 2d. which equals $11 / 8$; and $18 / 11$
is just $62 \%$ more than $11 / \mathrm{G}$ ! We notice by the way that Messrs. Stanley Gibbons, Ltd., in their well-known catalogue quote $6 / 6$ for nearly all current stamps of 5 /- face value and they also quote the same price for the British Levant 24 piastres on $5 /$. and 6 pesetas on $5 /$, so that people might almost suppose the full face value of these was $\mathrm{s} / \cdot$; it is however much less.

RUSSIA (521 G 535).-We quote from Alfred Smith \& Son's Monthly Circular:-
"The D.B.Z. points out the interesting fact that in the earliest printing of the 7 kop . stamp three specimens on each sheet differ from the normal type in the following details: (i.) in the white spaces shaped like elephants' trunks to the right and left of the medallion, the projections of the upper ornament are further entrenched upon by the outline, rendering them less white; (ii.) to the right and left, below the medallion, there are three pearls instead of four; (iii.) 'KOP' is followed by a double dot instead of a single one. It appears that the three cliches were from the eariier state of the die, and were inserted by accident. As soon as the dis. crepancy was noticed they were replaced."

The recently－issued io cents（Washington） tamp printed in yellow is to be withdrawn，and will be re－issued in brown on yellow paper．
The 10 cents brown on yellow will be quite an innovation for the United States，and will herald the beginning of a colour scheme．
The new 12 cents stamp，when it does appear， will bear the portrait of Washington，and will be printed on coloured paper．
At the time of our information，the Postmaster－ General being away from Washington，the com－ biliation of colours for the 12 cents had not been decided．
It is also on the cards that the 8 cents and 15 cents will be changed to conform to the coloured paper arrangement
