THE ISSUES OF 1879.

IN submitting the annexed catalogue of the numerous Issues of 1879 to our philatelic friends, we have to apologise for its somewhat late appearance; we having announced that it would be published early in January. The reason is, we were anxious to include in the catalogue all issues up to the end of December, as *far* as practicable.

During the year there have been issued an unusually large number of postcards, amongst which are several handsome and well executed designs. The new Postal Union card for the United States is especially well worthy of notice, although something more elaborate might have been expected. It is printed in light blue, on light buff card, and has a neat border. The stamp, which is in the right hand upper corner, is oval, containing a head of Liberty, (bearing a tiara, with the word "Liberty" in small letters), on a white ground. The inscription is as follows:—"Universal Postal Union" (Union Postale Universelle)—United States of America (Etats-unis d'Amerique.) The notice respecting address runs—"Write only the Address on this side."

"Bosnia and Herzegovina," Bulgaria, Bohore (India), Sirmoor (India), and Tobago, are countries which have appeared upon the "Philatelic Stage" for the first time.

There have been, as usual, numerous issues of United States and Russian Local stamps, but we have not taken the trouble and time to weary our readers by giving a list of them.

We sincerely hope that this, our first pamphlet, may be beneficial to philatelists, and that they will recommend it to their friends. By doing this, they will confer upon us a great favour, and encourage us to produce, at the close of the present year, a similar work.

"CURIOUS COLLECTORS OF STAMPS,"

By J. D. HAMLYN.

IT is now eleven years ago that stamp collecting first attracted my notice, and gained to its ranks an ardent follower; one who has followed it through the ups and downs of its precarious life, and one who hopes to follow it "*to the death.*" I purpose giving a short account of some few collectors whom I have had transactions with: some are my friends and old schoolfellows, others "old men and maidens."

In London there are thousands of these collectors of old stamps; one meets them every day, every hour, and every minute. It was during one of my rambles through the city, in the year 1868, on a splendid summer's afternoon, that I first alighted on a genuine curious collector of stamps. I was passing through one of our most ancient thoroughfares, when my attention was drawn to an odd-looking shop. Its windows contained old medals, old bronzes, china, bric-a-brac, autographs, old boots, pipes, canes, and last, but not least, in the centre of the window, and in a small gilt frame, a rather curious kind of envelope, above which stood this inscription, "The oldest envelope in Europe, by Mulready, *only 12/6.*"

I at once resolved to make further enquiries, and in less than no time stood in the midst of the curiosity collection. The proprietor, or, rather, proprietress, was one of the old school, and in answer to my query fully explained the meaning of "The oldest envelope in Europe." Further enquiries led to further productions of curious books full—yes, crammed full—of rare and costly labels. I first saw a book containing Trinidads, and ventured to ask the price of *one*. "Two shillings." Then I thought by taking a quantity there would

be a reduction. "How much for a *dozen*?" "Two shillings *each*, sir!" "How much for a *hundred*?" Still came the old price: "Two shillings each if you take the *whole book*."

Next were shown me books of the old Mauritius, Cape, Bolivia, Ecuador, Montevideo, Newfoundland, and others too numerous to mention. I never thought there was such a quantity of stamps before seeing these. The prices were *all* fixed according to "catalogue," and no reduction, *whatever*, would be made—no, not even if one bought the whole lot, for the old lady believed, and still believes that she will get *her* prices.

I left her sorrowful, and did not venture to see her for two years afterwards, but still she had the stamps and her old prices. I could not do anything with *this* curious collector of stamps.

I have always found that foreigners are as enthusiastic in the philatelist cause as ourselves. There are several foreign gentlemen in London who are very eccentric in the collecting of these adhesive labels—one, in particular, known wherever the philatic cause flourishes—one who has done more to advance it than any other. This gentleman collects two used and two unused of each variety, beside those with different watermarks. His collection is a marvel and ought to be seen by all, especially of one country with which he has taken great care and spent pounds to bring to its present state of perfection.

Another collects bills or fiscal stamps; his collection amounts to several thousands, and his knowledge in this particular branch is such that he can explain the minutest details of any fiscal, and continue his explanations for the period of a month, or even for a whole calendar year. His promised work on these interesting stamps is looked forward to with great interest.

There are collectors of watermarks, surcharges, proofs, forgeries, dates, used and unused labels. In fact, every collector has a whim; one sticks them upside down, another sideways, one must have all his stamps postmarked in the centre, another at the side. One old lady, an excellent customer in years gone by, would insist upon having part

of the envelope or wrapper adhering to the stamp. This was to prove they were genuine; but once, when looking over her album, I discovered some "Liverpudlean" forgeries, all adhering to the supposed envelopes. I afterwards learnt that some sheets had been sent from Liverpool, "with compliments." On her remarking that she purchased stamps only when adhering to the envelope, several other sheets were sent with the same stamps, postmarked on to common pieces of paper. This proved to the old lady they were genuine, "besides, so good and cheap, much cheaper than yours!"

Three years ago there was often seen in the stamp shops of this city a gentleman who soon drew the attention of others to him. He generally came in about twelve, would silently look over the albums, sheets and packets on the table, going over them again and again—generally three times—finally purchasing one halfpenny worth!!! then he vanished as silently as he came. Not one word was spoken the whole time. We called him the "Mysterious Philatelic," for no one knew whence he came or whither he went.

There is a great trade done in stamps amongst the boys of this city. One in particular deserves mention, a little fellow—one can always fancy seeing him—sharp, shrewd, and in every respect a thorough business man. At certain times he could be seen at various places in the city, surrounded by a motley assemblage of telegraph, errand, office, and shoeblick boys. His word is law, and when once he makes an offer there is no advance in the price. They are all attended to in order, and seem to go away perfectly satisfied. We knew him by only one name, and that is "City Merchant." Lately, trade being bad, he has disappeared from his accustomed haunts, and from what I hear I fear "the places that knew him shall know him no more."

Some years back there was a little stir about some curious collectors of stamps in the West End. Several dealers and collectors requested me to make enquiries, as their sheets and packets were not returned to them. It fell to my lot, after several weeks' work, to expose the greatest stamp swindle on record. I found that four boys, ranging

from 18 to 12 years of age, had been writing from all the newspaper and tobacconist shops under assumed names, having sheets and packets left there "to be called for." Their operations were very extensive, it was wholesale and retail with a vengeance. I traced them from one shop to another, night after night; but my work and money was entirely thrown away, for after having gone to a great expense, and brought it clearly home to them, no one would prosecute, although it amounted, in the aggregate, to £50. The various police stations in the district, and the authorities at Scotland Yard, have the particulars, but they could not institute a prosecution. Of course that is altered now, for have we not a Public Prosecutor?

A friend related to me the following incident which came directly under his notice:—"I was once being shown over a family mansion for letting purposes, when I came to a small, dingy attic. There on a stool sat a human being—a sort of an overgrown boy or deformed man—with a vacant stare, his head bobbing up and down, and clasping in his hands a very old collection of rare and valuable stamps. These were his only playmates, his only friends; he knew not what they were: they looked pretty and the various colours greatly pleased him. The only word he ever spoke, or will speak, was 'Mother.'"

I will conclude this with a few remarks respecting a recent young collector of stamps. When first I advertized sheets on approval, I had, amongst my numerous answers, one from a widow lady, who particularly wished a good assortment for her only son. Sheets were sent and returned empty. Large sums were constantly paid for various stamps. At last I thought a visit would, perhaps, lead to further business. The first time of my passing that way I determined to call: I did so. The lady was not in, but on stating my business I was politely requested to walk upstairs, and was ushered into a beautifully furnished room, where, on a couch, I saw the young collector. He was in a deep consumption, one could see it plainly. I learnt from him that stamps were his only pleasure. His album, which was lying beside him, was a wonder, so neat and clean; all perfect specimens, and every stamp stuck in with gum paper at the

back. Months and even years had been spent in the formation of this collection. He felt deeply in some new stamps which I happened to have with me, and he in his turn explained some of his most curious labels. I was particularly struck with the great care with which he handled his stamps. He called them his children, and for each one he had a fond affection. I called again some months afterwards, but my young friend was gone; yes, gone, but "*not for ever.*"

I must now bring my paper to an end. I trust it will prove of interest and benefit to some; especially to those about commencing. All that I have mentioned has been brought under my own notice, and although some of the incidents occurred a few years back, I cannot forget, and probably never shall, these "CURIOUS COLLECTORS OF FOREIGN STAMPS."

Gossip.

HERE seems to be a mania, just now, for publishing a "Stamp Paper," and a still greater mania for publishing them irregularly. In January 1880, we had No. 1 of the "Foreign Stamp Advertiser and Review," and also of the "Philatelic Review." Now, we do not wish to be *rude*, but still cannot refrain from having just *one* word to say respecting the first named paper, which has, since its first appearance, devoted itself almost entirely to exposing the faults in other papers. For one thing, it upbraids the "Philatelist's Gazette" for publishing in its columns the so called "Reference List," which it classes under the *slang* title of "Biefieldism." We did not expect to find *this* inconsistency in the "F.S.A. & R.," inasmuch that in that paper appears monthly, a "BLACK LIST!!" and a list of "FORGERYMONGERS," both of which belong to the "Black Mailing System," or "*Biefieldism.*" We hope soon to see either the "Reference List" introduced into this paper, or else the {expulsion} of the "Black and Forgery-mongers' List." Bye the bye, we are glad to observe that the editor of the "Philatelist's Gazette" has the common sense to treat their unfair criticisms with the contempt they deserve. Respecting the

"Philatelic Review," we have only to say, that, taking it all round, it is one of the best monthlies published and we recommend it as such. The "Foreign Stamp Gazette" is another new production, which promises to be a good one, but would recommend the publishers to issue it "*punctually*," in accordance with their promises.

The "British Philatelist" *is*, we hear, to be published on April 1st!!!

The best thing Collectors can do, is to purchase these pamphlets *regularly*.

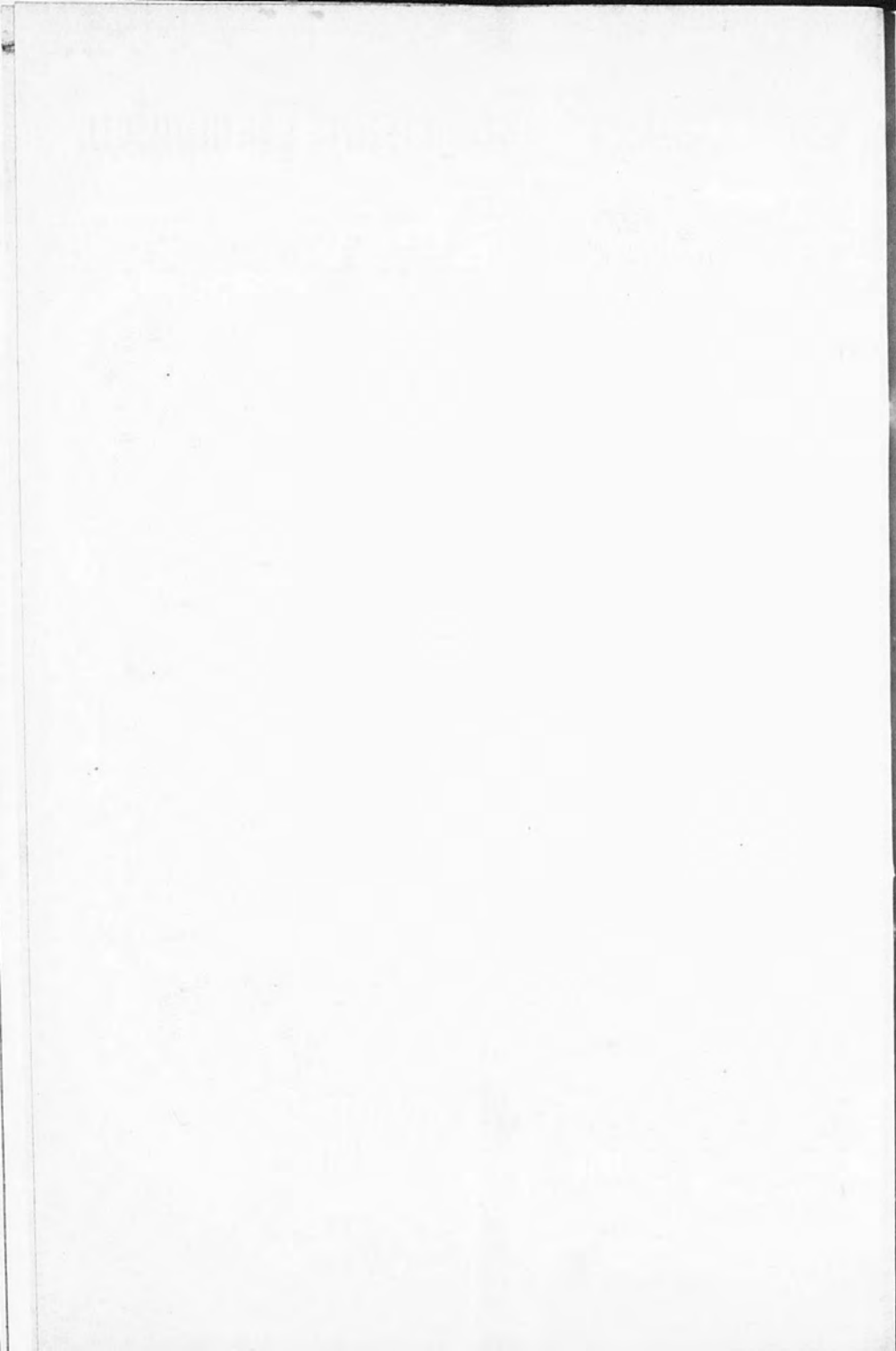

POST CARDS AND ALBUMS.

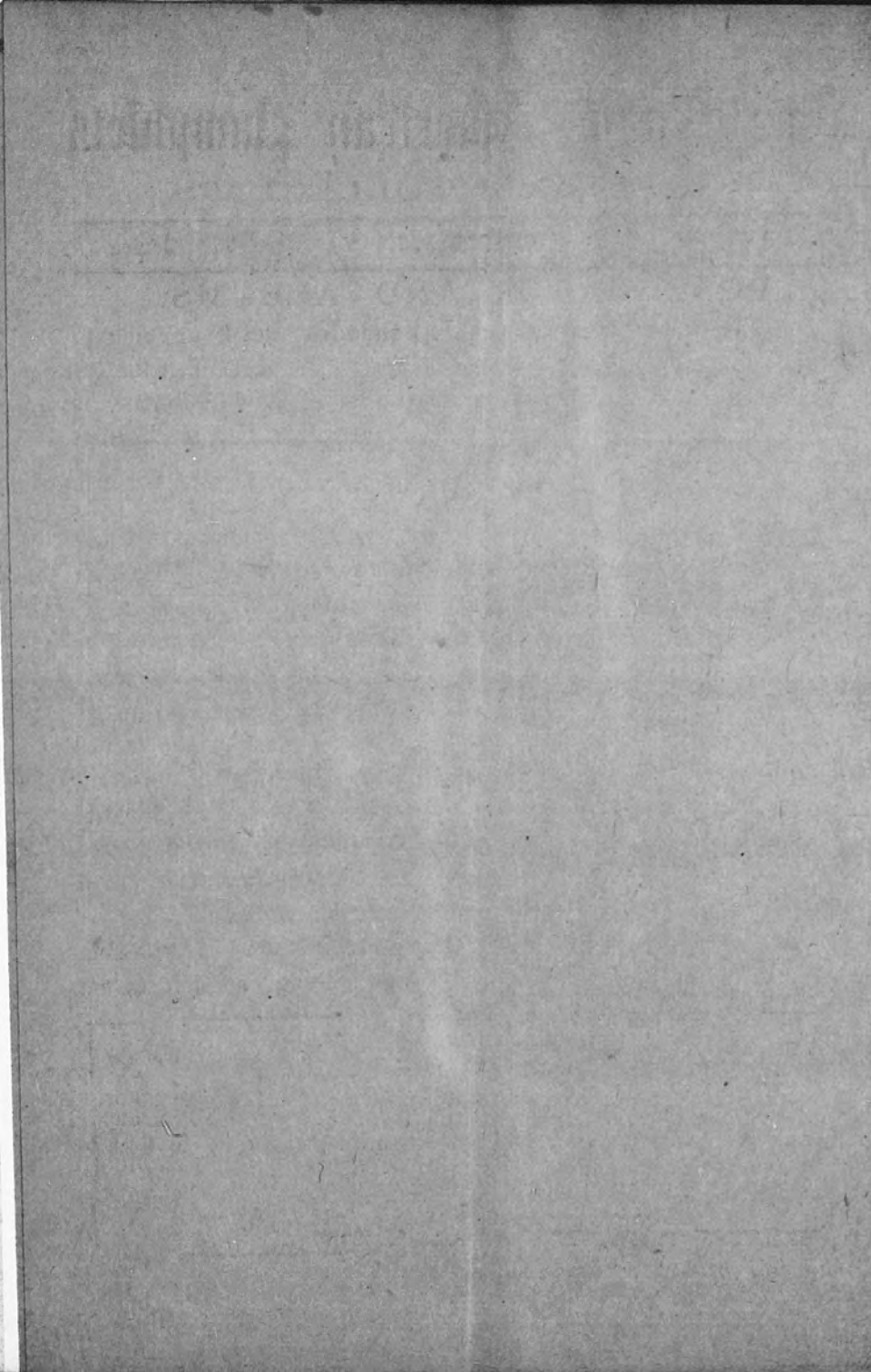
I DARE say most of my readers are wondering what I am going to say concerning *Post Cards and Albums*. Yet it is a fact that, at the present time, "How to arrange Post Cards in Albums" is one of the most prominent and difficult questions that Philatelists have ever had to solve.

It is not so very long ago that we came to the unanimous conclusion that the best way to arrange *Stamps* in Albums was by adopting what is termed the hinge system; but this system certainly does not refer to Post Cards, although it has been adopted by a great many, principally among our advanced Philatelists; nevertheless, go where you will, each one have their own ideas on the subject, and consequently arrange their Post Cards to their fancy. Therefore, as most of my readers may not know the different methods adopted at the present time, I intend giving a short review, which I trust will be found useful to all, and help to throw a little light on the subject.

I. Gum each corner of the card lightly, and stick in album, care being taken not to press too hard; a piece of stout card-board placed at back will greatly help to straighten the card and leaf.

II. Make four small slits with a sharp pen-knife in leaf of album where the corners of the card should go, taking care not to ent

POST CARDS AND ALBUMS.

It is not so very long ago that we came to the unanimous conclusion that the best way to arrange *Stamps* in Albums was by adopting what is termed the hinge system; but this system certainly does not refer to Post Cards, although it has been adopted by a great many, principally among our advanced Philatelists; nevertheless, go where you will, each one have their own ideas on the subject, and consequently arrange their Post Cards to their fancy. Therefore, as most of my readers may not know the different methods adopted at the present time, I intend giving a short review, which I trust will be found useful to all, and help to throw a little light on the subject.

I. Gum each corner of the card lightly, and stick in album, care being taken not to press too hard; a piece of stout card-board placed at back will greatly help to straighten the card and leaf.

II. Make four small slits with a sharp pen-knife in leaf of album where the corners of the card should go, taking care not to cut

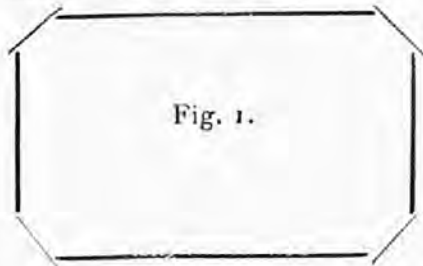

through other leaves, a piece of wood placed at the back will answer this purpose, then insert the corners of the card allowing them to protude through at back, (Fig. 1.) or make another slit further towards the corners, somewhat smaller than previously, bringing them back to the front again. (Fig. 2.)

III. Cut a slip of stout paper or thin card, say about $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. by $\frac{1}{4}$ in., bend across the middle and gum one half to the card, midway at the top, the bend reaching to the edge, and the other half to the album, which will admit of the card being lifted up for the purpose of seeing the back. (Fig. 3.)

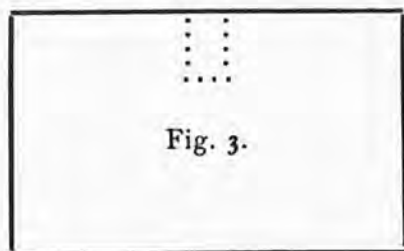

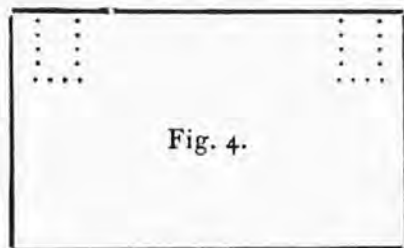

IV. Same as above, only with two hinges instead of one; to be fixed at the ends of the card at the top. (Fig. 4.)

V. Cut two narrow strips of stout paper about $\frac{1}{2}$ in. longer than the breadth of the card, and gum the ends in the album so as to allow the strips to cross the card at each end, which will admit of the card being taken out when required. (Fig. 5.)

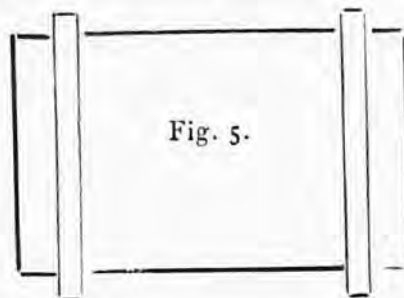

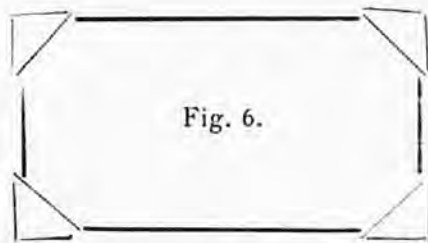

VI. Cut four triangular pieces of stout paper—a piece 1 in. square cut across the middle will make two—then put a border of gum about $\frac{1}{2}$ in. wide on the two smallest sides and stick them in the album where the corners of the card should go, the side ungummed, which is the largest, being inside; by slightly bending the card the corners can then be inserted in the pockets. (Fig. 6.)

VII. Same as above, only instead of triangular pieces cut and gum at the ends four narrow strips of paper, which should cross the corners, allowing them to protude beyond the strips. (Fig. 7.)

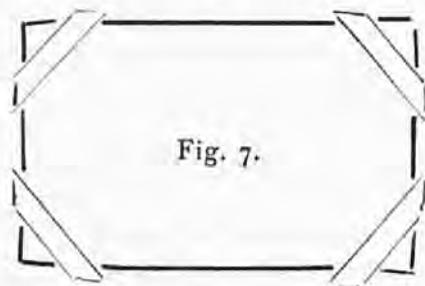

Now, from the above my readers will no doubt be enabled to see the various advantages and disadvantages of the systems more or less now in practice.

The first is the old style, its principal feature being, that the cards lie flat and are not likely to become disarranged, and a very good feature too; but on the other hand you must bear in mind that you cannot see the backs of the cards, which is often essential; and again it is impossible to get the cards out without injuring them and also the album, which means that, in breaking up a collection, the cards and album lose more than half their value, which should be, if it is not, a great consideration to every Philatelist. The second is certainly a most destructive method, although it may be found very useful for preserving cards in books while working up a collection. The third is what is termed the hinge system, which appears to be most in favour at present; but its disadvantages are many, inasmuch as the cards will not lie flat and are thus likely to become erased,

besides their appearance being unsatisfactory; and again the hinges soon get out of order and do not improve either the card or the album. The fourth is a slight improvement on the above, the two hinges holding the card much firmer than with one. The fifth may be termed by some as untidy, still it is a vast improvement on any of the foregoing as it does not injure the cards in the least, and the slips can remain in the album. The sixth and seventh are on the same principle, but the last mentioned being somewhat difficult and scarcely worthy of adopting, I will give attention to the sixth only. This method which I am sorry to say is the least adopted, is the one which I should recommend above all others in existence, to my knowledge, and although it may require a little more time, it more than repays one for their trouble. In the first place, the cards can be taken out without the least injury, and the pockets can remain in the album where they will always be found useful; and again, if any of my readers study the improvement of their albums, they can design the pockets to their fancy, and, therefore, as well as for usefulness, they will be found an improvement to any album, and if an album is worth keeping, in my opinion, it is worth keeping *well*.

And now, in conclusion, I must add that still I am far from satisfied and yearn for the time when we shall have an Album which requires no addition for insertion of Post Cards, somewhat after the style of the Photographic Albums where the backs of the Cards can be seen and at the same time not separate from the Stamps, and the Inventor of such will find a warm supporter in

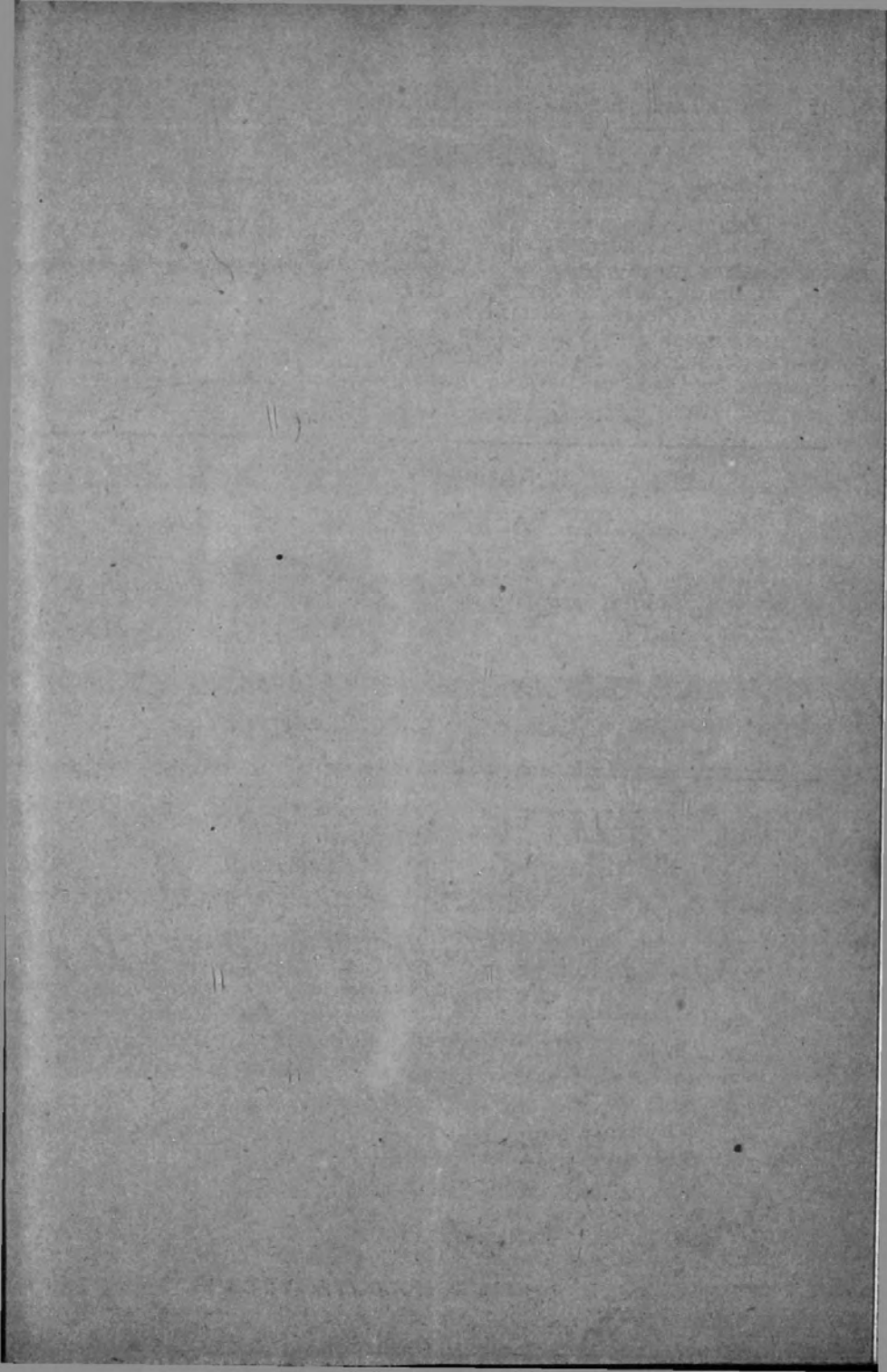

THE STAMPS OF THE UNITED STATES.

IN attempting to give a complete list of United States Postage Stamps, I do it with the hope that it will meet with the full approbation of all who may see fit to read it. No other country has issued more stamps, including the revenue and all others, nor more postage stamps, counting, of course, the hundreds of varieties of United States envelopes. All the stamps of the United States would make quite a Picture-Gallery of the noted men of the country—as well as in the 1869 issue, for instance, of some of the notable events.

In the first part of the table at the end of this article, you will find a list of stamps issued by seven cities. These stamps were acknowledged by the Government, and, in the case of New York, I believe, ordered by it; but they were issued by, and at the expense of, the various places. The stamp issued by the city of New Haven is the only envelope stamp among the Provincial. The "Beaumont" stamp, as it is called, has a number of varieties, since it was engraved in a sheet of ten; the St. Louis stamps also have a number of variations.

The Carrier stamps mentioned immediately under the Provincial were issued so that people could post their letters when the Post-office was closed. This idea was, in fact, the primary cause of all our earlier issues. The one-cent blue comes both perforated and unperforated.

The first general issue of the United States came out July the first, 1847 (see tables). The reason of the discontinuance of these stamps was the reduction in the rates of postage, and they were accordingly suppressed in the latter half of 1851. In the 18-60s of 1851-60, commonly known as the 1851 set, although there are fourteen stamps, there are the portraits of but three persons, namely, George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, and Thomas Jefferson. All these men were noted in the early history of their country. Who has not heard of George Washington, the father of his country, and the story of his little hatchet? All these men were noted in the early history of their country. Who has not heard of George Washington, the father of his country, and the story of his little hatchet? Of Benjamin Franklin and his electric kite? Of Thomas Jefferson, the third president of the United States? There

were sixteen different adhesive Postage Stamps issued up to 1861, when, on account of the war of the great rebellion, they were called in by the Government, and, consequently, are not now worth their face value. The Government thought it advisable to call them in; probably because there was a large quantity of them in the Southern States. In the 1861 issue there are nine stamps, but no new portraits. In fact, this set and the last are so near alike, that it often confuses young collectors—young in years, as well as those young in Philately—to tell to which set a stamp belongs. Each value has the head of the same person in the one set as in the other, and in almost, if not quite, the same position. The colours are the same, or at least very similar. About the only difference between the sets is the fancy work, which is, however, a very essential part of a stamp. In the two stamps, issued in 1863 and 1869, are the portraits of Andrew Jackson and Abraham Lincoln respectively. This portrait of Jackson shows that vigour and resolution which characterises his administration. Abraham Lincoln held the position of Chief Magistrate of the United States during the war of the great rebellion until his assassination, April 14th, 1865. The set issued in 1869 is entirely different from any other issue of the United States, and, in fact, of any other country. The two-cents. and the three-cents. stamps are meant as a contrast to one another; the former showing the early method of carrying the mails, and the latter, that of that time as well as the present. The twelve-cents. stamp alone shows how the mails are carried on the ocean. The ten-cents. and the thirty-cents. stamps are, in a manner, representations of our national emblem (an eagle perched upon a shield). The fifteen-cents. and the twenty-four-cents. stamps are pictures of two events familiar to the whole world, and especially dear to all the inhabitants of the United States: the first represents the landing of Christopher Columbus in 1492, and the second, the Declaration of Independence on the fourth of July, 1776. The ninety-cents. stamp is a portrait of the real hero, as it were, of the period in which these stamps were used.

We now come to those stamps which are in use at the present time, namely, those issued from 1870 to 1875. These add seven new portraits to our picture gallery: as follows—those of Henry Clay, Daniel Webster, General Winfield Scott, Alexander Hamilton, Commodore Oliver Perry, Edwin Stanton and Zackary Taylor. The seven-cents. stamp was issued to pay postage to Germany; but few of them were ever used. In 1875, the colour of the two-cents. stamp was changed from brown to vermilion, and a five-cents. stamp added to the set. I remember that two or three years ago there was a rumour that the colour of the three-cents. stamps had been changed to blue; and so it appeared in some of the daily papers, and seemed

to be confirmed by reports of persons who said they had seen it. Before I had an opportunity of seeing one another rumour went the rounds, that it was changed by the use of acids. And so it proved to be upon investigation. In 1875, there were thirty adhesive stamps reprinted, as follows—two of the 1847 issue; eight of the 1851-60 issue; ten of the 1861-6 issue; and ten of the 1869 issue—besides the two carrier stamps of 1851.

We next come to the consideration of the Unpaid Letter Stamps, which were issued July 1st, 1879. The design is a large numeral in centre, postage due above, and value spelt out below. They were issued to prevent postmasters from stealing money which was received for letters insufficiently prepaid. Each postmaster is furnished with a certain number of these stamps, and is held accountable for them. The department stamps were all issued in 1873, and are all of the same design as the same values of the general issue of 1870-71; they are all rectangular and of the same size, excepting the four highest values of the Department of State, which are much larger, but of a similar design. They were for the exclusive use of the different departments. The periodical stamps are used by the postmasters for putting on their memorandums of second-class mail matter, that are kept by the post office. The first four issued were $2\frac{3}{8}$ inches by $3\frac{1}{8}$ inches in size; but the 1875 issue are much smaller, though not as small as the general issue. The large stamps have small heads of Washington, Franklin, and Lincoln, while the smaller ones have various full length figures.

In 1876, there were two three-cents. envelope stamps issued—one green and the other red. They were of a very pretty design: 1776 above Pentage, at top; U. S. and S. in upper corners; 1876, below three cents., at bottom; postboy over locomotive, and telegraph in centre. There were two dies; one that was used in Philadelphia at the Centennial Exhibition, and the other at Hartford; and as both colors were manufactured at each place, there were, consequently, two varieties of each. As there is already a very good work on the stamped envelopes of the United States, and, also, as I have not enough space to describe them with their different, dies, tints, sizes, watermarks, &c., as they should be described, I merely give a list. Although I have not touched upon revenue or local stamps, I would state that either class is much larger than this.

PHILATELIC NOTES :

BY R. B. SPINK.

PHILATELY AS A HOBBY.

"**H**APPY is the man that has a hobby"! Such are the words that fell from the lips of the late Lord Chancellor Brougham. Most men, we believe, have some favourite object to which they resort for refreshment of head and heart. To any outsider the hobby may seem useless, it may even seem absurd, and yet to the individual himself may afford the utmost pleasure and gratification; and if so no one else has anything to do with the matter.

Many retire from their daily business to find relaxation in the pursuit of science, art, or literature. The mind, like most other things, requires rest. By this we do not mean entire cessation from all thought, but only a respite, so to speak, from the severe concentration which business or study demand. Indeed, there is quite a chorus of voices uniting to sound the praises of hobbies.

Well, then, since every one is agreed in having some favourite pursuit in which to employ his leisure, the only question is, what shall

it be? Botany, Geology, Natural History, Bicycling and Cricket all come in for a fair share of patronage, and surely, without giving offence, we may be allowed to add one more to the list—namely, Philately, or the art of Stamp Collecting. It is not our purpose here to enter upon a panegyric of this truly catholic* custom. We will merely glance at one or two of the advantages that commend themselves to our mind.

One of the principal arguments advanced by the friends of Natural Science for a study of Botany, Geology, &c., by young people, is that it affords such an excellent discipline to the mind, by bringing it into direct contact with fact and practising the intellect in the completest form of induction: that is to say, in drawing certain conclusions from particular facts made known by immediate observation of Nature.

This we most readily admit, and would not, upon any consideration, utter a word in depreciation of the study. But we venture to ask, Does not Philately also afford similar scope for the scientific faculty? We think it does.

As in Botany, &c., so in Philately, careful observation and perpetual comparison have to be made, habits of accuracy and quickness of applying them are developed, and the important faculty of judgment is constantly called forth, trained, and stimulated.

Let us take an example. Here is a tulip, we describe it somewhat as follows:—"Calyx, none; Corolla inferior, of six egg-shaped petals, bell-shaped; Filaments erect, flattish, anthers oblong, four-cornered; Germen superior, oblong, large with three blunt corners; Style none; Stigma triangular; Capsule triangular, three-valved, three-celled: Seeds numerous, egg-shaped, flat." Compare the above with the description of a stamp—say a Nicaragua, 5c. of 1862—and we shall see that the mind undergoes similar operations. "Sunlit mountain landscape with cap of liberty on central plate in inscribed marginal frame, bearing numerals of value in circles at angles; black imp., inscribed, 'Nicaragua Corveos Forte, 5 (cinco) centavos

black.” And then if the collector have a taste for Geography (as he ought to have) he will endeavour to find out something about the history of the country which uses the objects collected; what is its population, what is its form of government—in short, there is scarcely any limit to the pleasure and information an intelligent collector may derive. Let those who have been in the habit of ridiculing the custom give it a fair trial, and we think we know what will be their verdict. Indeed, so far from being unable to see anything in Stamp Collecting they will say:—

“How charming is divine *Philately*,
Not harsh and rugged, as dull fools suppose,
But musical as is Apollo's lute,
And a perpetual feast of nectar'd sweets,
Where no crude surfeit reigns.”

THE POSTAGE OF LETTERS IN BY-GONE DAYS.

The postage of letters was first established in the short reign of Richard the Third. The plan was originally formed in the reign of his brother, Edward, when stages were placed at the distance of twenty miles from each other, in order to procure Edward the earliest intelligence of the events that passed in the course of the war with the Scots. The revenue of the Post Office in the reign of Queen Anne was only £60,000; in 1761, it was £142,000; in 1769, £300,000; in 1794, £445,600; in 1800, £745,000; in 1820, (for the United Kingdom) £2,500,000; in 1840, new rate, £471,000; in 1860, £1,100,000; in 1870, £1,500,000. About the year 1730 to 1740, the post was only transmitted three times a week from Edinburgh to London; and one day, it brought but a single letter, which was for Sir William Pulteney, the banker; in 1790, the letters from Edinburgh averaged twelve hundred daily. The remittances from Scotland to the Post Office, in the ten years preceding 1770, only averaged £9,500; but from the year 1790 to 1800, the annual average amounted to £41,400.

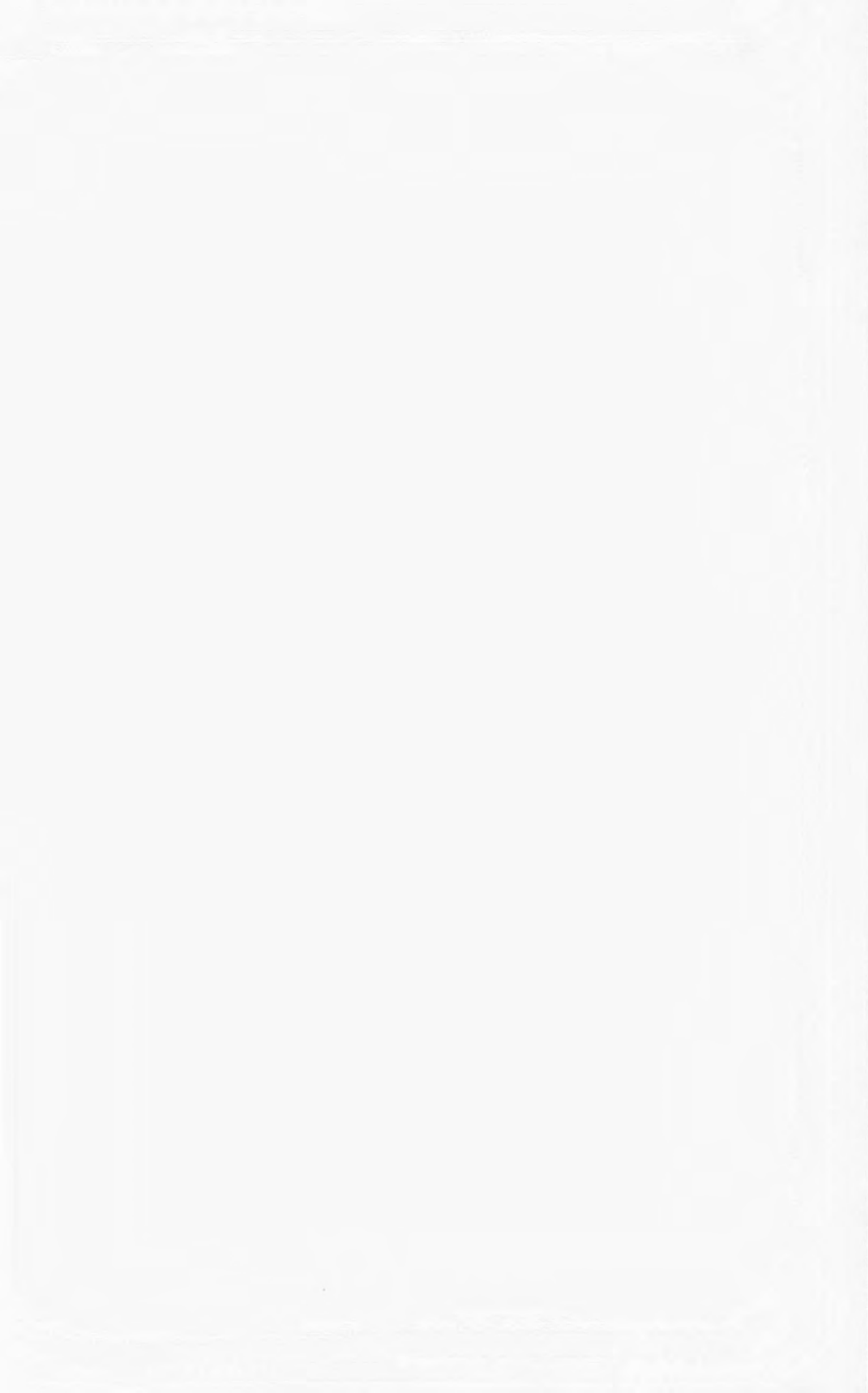
