Novel Uses for Stamps.

A person having some spare stamps may make many ornamental things with them without injuring the stamps. I found a good heavy piece of glass not long ago and I thought I would make a philatelic paper weight. Taking a Tasmanian scene stamp, I placed it in the center and arranged other stamps around it, some overlapping each other. This makes a very attractive paper weight. A glass inkwell can also be arranged with stamps to look very well.

I noticed a friend of mine taking all the stamps he could find off old letters. As I knew he had no collection, I inquired what he intended to do with them. He reluctantly told me his secret. When he got enough he was going to use them instead of wallpaper on a small dep.

Another interesting thing to make is a stamp scrap-book. Put in any freaks, special postmarks, notices about stamps from the newspapers, application blanks for clubs and membership cards, or anything else of interest. When you get through you have quite an attractive book.

The small index postals have been on sale here for several months.

The stamp vending machines, that I spoke of last month, have only been removed from the Post Office, as there was no need for them there. They are still being used to a great extent in the hotels, and at stations.
