## VOLOPUKIA

THE phenomenal rapidity with which this language, during the few years passed since its first introduction, has spread to every corner of the earth, naturally prompts the question: What does Schleyer's Volapuk aim to do, and is it equal to the demands that may be made upon it? The answer to this lies in the simple fact that it is not proposed to displace any of the existing languages and make Volapuk the only language on the face of the globe, which would be nothing less than insanity to attempt. Volapuk, on the contrary, is supposed to become merely the means of communication in international intercourse of a social or commercial nature, and thus furnish the traveler, the merchant and the official a way of escaping the laborious and time-wasting drudgery of learning several foreign languages, or employing an army of translators and correspondents, in order to communicate with his fellow-men outside the confines of his own realm. If it continues to spread at the rate it has begun, it will therefore, in a few years, be a language which every tolera-

bly well educated person should learn, in addition to his native language, if he desires to make himself understood without difficulty wherever he goes.

To no one will Volapuk do greater service than the philatelic world. Mr. Lunderfelt, the Librarian of the Milwaukee Public Library has prepared a handbook of 130 pages, which I will send to any one on receipt of price, bound in paper 50 cents; in cloth 75 cents. ### Faunce's Penny Post.

The Minnesota Philatelist, for April, gives a two-page history of this interesting post. It was started by A. S. Faunce in the latter part of 1884 in Atlantic City N. J., and continued in operation until July 1, 1887. When the establishment of a governmental force caused its suppression. The stamps of the post were first used in April 1885. The M. P. thus describes them: "They are small round labels about the size of a five cent piece, printed in red on black. The design is 'PENNY POST' within a circle, outside of which within an-

other circle is Faunce's Atlantic City. The stamps are scarce and no reprints have been made." I have been fortunate enough to obtain some of the last remainders of the last local post from the former proprietor, and can guarantee the genuineness of each one. ## PROPOSED POSTAGE LEGISLATION.

**M**ANY important proposals have been brought forth in Congress during the past few months, few of which are summarized below:

Mr. Wheeler has introduced a bill regulating the pay of fourth-class post-masters, \$15. per quarter the post-master who opens and closes one mail each week, and an additional \$5. for each other mail opened and closed until \$250. is reached.

Mr. Blount has introduced a bill that provides books whether printed entire or in part; sold by subscription or otherwise, be allowed second-class rates. This is aimed at such publications as the Seaside and other libraries.

The same gentleman has introduced a bill providing for the erection by the Government of a post-office building in places where the receipts are over \$3,000.

Mr. Baker has introduced a measure placing bulbs, plants and seeds in 3rd class matter.

Mr. Bingham has a measure whereby periodicals at a delivery office shall pay one cent per pound. Heretofore, every pub-

lication if printed at a free delivery office had to pay one cent for each copy.

Mr. Stone has introduced a bill to prohibit the printing of return requests on envelopes by the Government.

### CHANGES IN FOREIGN MAIL.

The following bulletins have been issued from the office of foreign mails.

Washington, D.C. June 20, 1888.

The International bureau of the Universal Postal Union have advised this department as follows:

Books, bound or stiched, which, to judge from their number cannot be considered as for the personal use of the persons to whom they are addressed, but as intended for sale, are liable to custom duties upon entering the Republic of Uruguay and consequently are not transmissible by mail to Uruguay from other countries of the Universal Postal Union.

Washington, D.C. June 20, 1888.

The Government of the German Empire having officially de-

clared its adhesion to the Universal Postal Union, to date from June 1, 1888, for the territory of Togo (West Africa) and from October 1, 1888, for the territory of the Marshall Islands (in the Pacific Ocean), protectorates of the German Empire; correspondence exchanged between the United States and the territory of Togo and the Marshall Islands, on and after the 1st of June and 1st of October, 1888, respectively, will be subject to the postal rates and conditions applicable to correspondence exchanged between the United States and the other countries and colonies of the Universal Postal Union.

### AN UNIVERSAL LANGUAGE.

The need of a means of communication between persons of different nationalities, unacquainted with the language of one another has for centuries been felt. In 1879 the problem was solved by Johann Martin Sehleyer who only gave his plan to the world after twenty years of careful study. This new language—Volapuk—is built upon the word basis of several Modern languages and is so constructed as to be easily learned by either the English speaking world or the Asiatic races. Philatelists often desire to correspond with foreign collectors but are often times unable on account of inability to correspond in foreign languages. Volapuk has as yet few students in America but in the Old World, books, papers and magazines are published in the new language. K. Linderfelt, the librarian of the Milwaukee library has issued a neat hand-book of 130 pages upon this interesting language. I will send postpaid a copy bound in paper for 50 cents. #### Postal Facts Concerning Costa Rica.

A new law which recently went into effect in this country, allows the FREE transportation of periodicals to regular subscribers outside of the district in which the publication is published.

Those residing within the district have a postage of 1 centavo per each 50 grammes to pay.

No postage is charged on books whether bound or unbound, for transmission between stations on a line of Railroad; but if they are transported either in part or whole, by stage or carriers, they are subject to the rates on commercial papers; 6 centavos for the first 50 grammes, and 1 centavo for each and every other 50 grammes.
