Help on the Beginner.

An important point often everlocked in the stamp business is the creating of trade by arousing enthusiasm among beginners. This can be done in various ways, one of them, which I have found to be quite successful, is to send out each month to a few new names procured during the preceding month, packets containing 25 to 50 common or medium grade foreign stamps and inclosed in the same envelope I have a four-page circular descriptive of stamp collecting, also containing price list of cheap sets of stamps, packets, etc. One of these free packets almost invariably secures a response and in some cases a customer who buys liberally who in all probabilities would never have had dealings with us ordinarily. Try this scheme and see how it works.

Another thing, many of us know hosts of little friends to whom the possession of a few foreign stamps would greatly delight. A

few packages of cheap foreign or Seebecks would be very much appreciated by them and might result in the development of many future philatelists. An experience of my own might be cited in this regard as showing how there is always a possibility of securing a recruit: In the winter of 1895 a friend calling at the house arrived as I was mounting some stamps in an album and was immediately interested. He stated that he had a few stamps at home, which he had had some time and saved for curiosities. A few days later he brought them over to show us. They were the 1887 set of Samoa, unused, a very pretty set. down our duplicate book and presented him with about 125 varieof the commoner stamps. We also showed him copies of Mekeel's Weekly, which surprised him greatly as he had no idea that there was such a thing as a publication devoted to stamp collecting. We also let him borrow our Scott's catalogue for a few days. In a very short time thereafter he had procured an album, subscribed to a couple of stamp journals, had written to and received from several dealers selections on approval. Gradually he has been working up a small business until to-day he has one of the finest collections in the city, United States, Canada, Newfoundland and Hawaii being especially strong. He also subscribes to about a dozen publications and has the most complete philatelic library it has ever been our good fortune to see.

Probably you have among your own acquaintances one who might some day prove an ardent collector if a little effort were made to arouse his interest. . Won't you try?

ON EXCHANGING.

OME of the most practical and most useful departments which Philately affords us is that grand medium whereby we are able to use our duplicates as a means of adding to the number of varieties in our collections. It is a great satisfaction to know that this or that treasured stamp has been obtained not by the actual outlay of money, but by exchange with some fellow men:ber of the stamp collecting fraternity.

It is for this reason, and because of the fact that exchanging has been recognized by all as a fair means of increasing a collection, that everywhere and at all times exchange is taking place. It is not the aim of this article to define or to dilate particularly upon the beneficial qualities of exchanging stamps but rather on its most profitable methods.

Let us then examine each of the systems and investigate which one is the most profitable to the collector.

- 1. By CUR Societies .- All of our societies have among their most important departments one which is devoted to the exchange of stamps. As a rule they are conducted not on a basis of true exchange but rather upon a cash basis and in that they no longer partake of an exchange media but are rather nothing more or less than a sales department. However, the collector who 's desirous of securing a nice and choice lot of stamps at low prices or get rid of some duplicates will do well to patronize these society departments.
- By EXCHANGE CLUBS .- A new method and one which deserves some commendation, is that means afforded by clubs organized wholly for the exchange of stamps. These societies have but one object and hence their efforts are concentrated upon the subject of exchange and it is perhaps one of the best methods

"WILL A STAMP SOCIETY BENEFIT ME?"

The young collector, as he passes along that grand highway of philatelic experience is confronted by all sorts of questions. No sooner has he become enrolled in our band, and perhaps ere he can claim the scant collection of 100 varieties, he is asked to subscribe to some stamp paper. Later on, when a few months of practical experience have shown the true status of our science unto him, he is asked to decide whether he will confine himself to simply collecting the regular stamps, or whether he will pay attention to the thousand and one subjects included under "minor varieties." And, as he goes on still further, again he must pause when the question arises whether it is policy for him to collect the entire or the cut square envelope. Thus day after day these matters rise and on their decision depends the future of the collector and the collection.

Finally, after being in the ranks for some time, he is asked to join one of our philatelic societies. And I can imagine him as he sits there, in the gloaming perhaps, reading and re-reading the application blank and the accompanying literature, and as he considers the question, and ponders over the idea, methinks I hear him say, "WILL A STAMP SOCIETY BENEFIT ME?"

To make use of an old saw, "There is no way of judging the Future save by the Past," and were this question asked me I would refer the inquirer to the brilliant record which our societies have made in the past. Will a stamp society benefit me? YES!

I say "yes" not without reason. I am a firm believer in organization in all branches of life. Men of all sorts and conditions associate themselves into organization for mutual protection. And why should not the philatelists be bound together for the mutual attainment of certain set subjects?

"How will the society benefit me?" you ask. A trial or even a research will be more convincing than words. It will benefit you in a hundred ways. First of all it protects you. Close scrutiny is made of all applicants before joining and hence members of societies are the best of the hobby. Then it brings you into close connection with your fellow collectors and generates between all a true spirit of fraternalism. Again it affords you an excellent medium whereby you are able to convert your stamps into cash or into other stamps—in other words all societies have fairly good exchange departments, which are managed by men who can be fully relied upon to do the right and square thing with you.

These are some of the benefits, and there are many more, but space prevents even the mention. But we must not forget the convention. Have you ever attended a convention of stamp men, chatted with them, heard their eloquent addresses and grasped their hands? Aye! it's a week of delight. Then, in addition, you receive the official organ of the association, which in many cases is worth alone as much as is paid for dues.

You ask me which to join. Well, they are all good but, as in all things, some are better. The A. P. A. is the premier, but if you are a young man you will hardly care to join it just yet. The S. of P. is one of the best, but for my part the P. S. of A. is to all intents and purposes the best for the young man.

The two smallest papers to arrive this month are the Collectors' Monthly, (4 pages 2½x4) and the Auxiliary Philatelist (8 pages, 2½x4). Better to commence small and then increase in size than to start in big and then fail to keep your promises. The Stamp Exchange proved the truth of this method. (?)

When you mount your duplicate stamps on sheets to exchange you should see that the paper is removed from the back and that they are in good condition. The dealer who sends out neatly arranged sheets of choice stamps is the one who gets the greatest amount of custom, and the collector who follows his example is the one who has the largest number of pleased philatelic correspondents.

"MINOR VARIETIES."

Are They Not a Source of Much Discouragement to the Beginner in Philately?

EVERY year sees more and more varieties of stamps listed in the catalogues. Not alone is this increase made up from distinctly different designs and colors, but of late even shades of ink, textures of paper, etc., have begun to be listed. These come under the head of "minor varieties," so-called, and, in my opinion, do more harm to stamp collecting than all the "speculative issues," "Seebecks," or "commemorative issues" ever foisted upon philatelists by any stamp-issuing country. Just think of it! If, in the printing of a batch of stamps, the color happens to run light (owing often to carelessness in inking the plates), or, in mixing the ink the printer does not get the exact shade, a new "variety" is at once listed (vide Canadian "map" stamps and of late U. S. since 1890). The same may be said in regard to the "thick" and "thin" paper varieties. Suppose a sheet or two of paper of a lighter weight happens, (probably by accident, often by design) to be printed, immediately arises a cry of "new varirty," even if there can be found no difference in design or coloring. Does this encourage the young collector, the future supporter of our hobby? Decidedly not. He finds that he must needs be an expert in the art of distinguishing between a sea green, gray green, blue green, a light blue, sky blue or ultramarine, a dark red, brown red, vermillion, scarlet or carmine or any shade of color in which a stamp is printed. He must also know and be able to distinguish the difference between not only laid and wove paper (a difficult thing for an expert paper man to do with such a small sample as is contained in the ordinary postage stamp, and which I wager not one out of every ten collectors can do with

any satisfactory degree of accuracy) but he must also make a distinction between different weights of the same kind of paper.

Was ever anything so discouraging? Do you wonder that before a collector has been collecting stamps six months he becomes disgusted with trying to form a general collection. In days gone by it used to be a delightful pleasure to look over a collection of stamps and find therein a goodly lot of specimens from all the stamp issuing countries of the earth. But nowadays such a collection is rarely seen. The collector usually gives up the idea of forming a general collection after he has been collecting a twelfthmonth. This is a great misfortune as it has a tendency to create a lack of interest and certainly does not instruct either geographically or historically, as was formerly the case.

Watermarks and differences in perforations were bad enough but isn't the "variety" business overdone when we get to "shades" and weights of paper? What inducement does philately hold out to the recruit but to attract him through the good name it made for itself in the old days; and when he once enters it, to entangle him in a hopeless maze of "varieties" from whence he either emerges a non-collector or else, what is to be as rigorously shunned, a pessimistic "specialist."

Can't we have a catalogue from which all varieties of shades and textures is rigorously expugned and which would be to the beginner a real guide-book to the distinctively different issues of the postage stamps of the world?

Let those that desire to become so-called "students" of philately still dote on their "varieties" if they wish, but let us, who collect chiefly for pleasure, and as a gratifying occupation for otherwise wear-isome hours, still be able to get together a collection of postage stamps without wearing our eyes and patience out trying to decide which shade of stamp we have or on what weight of paper it is printed. Such a catalogue is bound to come ere long and the man who will give us such a one will deserve the undying gratitude of all true philatelists.

Germany has gone into the colonial business of late and has already given us surcharges of Caroline Islands, Marshall Islands and Marianna Island, with more to follow later, perhaps.

England, Germany, Austria and Hungary have all had new issues this year. They should have the effect of procuring many new recruits to philately in the countries named as well as it this country.

The collecting of philatelic literature is again becoming popular, and now that literature collectors have three papers devoted to their favorite branch of our hobby they should gain many new recruits to their ranks.

Some of the most popular stamps ever issued are gradually advancing in price until they will shortly be beyond the reach of the young collector, who has always sought for them. I have reference to the triangular stamps of the Cape of Good Hope, which every beginner eagerly hoards up his pennics, nickels and dimes to obtain.

The old-time stamps which our grandfathers used are the ones which I would advise the would-be speculator to buy. These old-time stamps were not used in as vast quantities as are those of to-day, and they were not saved so extensively by dealers and collectors as are the stamps now in use, or those which have been used within the last ten years.

The Buffalo Pan-American stamps should make a very pretty addition to our albums, and at a comparatively slight expense. I understand that but five values are to be issued, 1, 2, 4, 5 and 10c. The designs will probably be as follows: An American lake steamer; a modern express train; a bridge over Niagara Falls; a view of the canal locks at Saulte Ste. Marie, and an automobile. May they add to our ranks as many recruits as did the Columbian issue.

He needs, as does the young child, primary instruction, and this he finds in the small "junior" efforts.

We would say to the publishers of these, keep up your good work, don't be discouraged by adverse criticism in the larger journals, you have probably been the means of interesting some one in the collecting of stamps, probably yours is the first stamp paper that they have ever seen.

You have it in your power to attract still more, and the "junior" of to-day is the advanced collector of to-morrow.

Let the good work go on!

Many a would-be sapient collector, when he is shown some hitherto uncatalogued minor variety, would elevate his proboscis to an exceedingly self-satisfied and complacent angle, as much as to say, "Oh well, I guess that the Scott Company know almost as much about stamps as you do. Huh, if there were any other varieties in existence they would have found them and listed them. I guess I'll stick to the catalogue." Of a certainty, the catalogue is good enough for any one, being as near to perfection as poor human beings could reach. But it is ridiculous to try to claim that the Scott Company has discovered every minor variety in existence. That would mean that they had carefully scrutinized every stamp in the world, which is a manifest absurdity. It is an undeniable fact that the newly-found varieties of to-day are the much-sought-after catalogue rarities of to-morrow.

If a chemist or a physician should attempt the pursuit of their respective sciences, depending wholly on old text-books, he would be immediately, and justly, branded as manufitious and unprogressive, and so it is in collecting stamps; we should investigate and study in fresh fields and pastures new, for the very novelty adds zest to the search. Therefore I describe, this month, to the readers of this paper, a few of the varieties which it has been my fortune to come upon recently.

marks are left, about one and a half millimeters across. Another stamp in this set has a marked variety. The two lepta has, on some specimens, the whole outer side of the border, on the left, entirely missing.

I am very positive that not one collector in fifty has noticed that on the upper corners of the 1886 issue of Guatemala there is a train of cars and a steamboat, but they, most assuredly, are there. Now if you look carefully at all your specimens you will, in all probability, find that on several values, principally the six centavo, the roof is sometimes missing from the train, exposing the passengers to the terrors of the elements, which, however, are not very terrible in Guatemala. And that reminds me, by a peculiar mental process, of the 1893 issue of Hayti. In those stamps there is an anchor leaning against the tree; and such an anchor it is! It is fearfully and wonderfully twisted, or else its engraver was.

The two centavo, Chili, 1878-86 has been seen by me with the design on both sides of the stamp. At first I thought it possible that there were two stamps stuck together: but no, the longest bath in water did not stir it a little bit, so that means one more oddity.

The 1872-73 issue of Servia comes on yellowish, but more often white, paper. Although I have not seen this variety mentioned elsewhere, it is more than probable that some one of the almost countless catalogues mentions it; even if so, my intentions are good.

The next variety to which I shall direct your attention is the five centavo stamp of the 1895 issue of Peru, No. 143, with the man's head. In the ordinary stamp the background consists of crossed horizontal and diagonal lines, but in the less common variety the lines are all horizontal. While speaking about this set, I would like to mention the ten centavo, a stamp catalogued only two cents, but, as far as my not very extensive observation goes, it is lacking from many collections and is well worth ten or even perhaps fifteen cents.

One more variety this time and I will cease. In the one novcica stamp of Bosnia the ornaments on the head of the left eagle sometimes touch his wing and sometimes do not. And with this I close, with the hope that the reader may find among his duplicates a few, at least, of the varieties mentioned, and, if he has good luck, still different ones.

FROM THE KEYSTONE STATE.

THERE are thirteen pawnbroker shops in Philadelphia where you can raise something on stamps.

The ads. of three new papers from Philadelphia have appeared in various philatelic papers: The Universal Philatelist, The Philatelic Gazette, The Quaker City Philatelist.

It is being whispered that the Philatelic Monthly and World, the oldest stamp paper in America, will cease publication shortly the reason given being non-support.

A branch office having some 2c Columbians which they had overlooked put a small placard in the window announcing the same and the clerk told me it had not been there an hour before all were sold.

Claude T. Reno and others are trying to organize a state philatelic society and are working hard to do so. A temporary organization has been formed with R. C. Potteiger, of Wilkesbarre, as secretary and Mr. Reno as president.

Lewis Robie has made a new conquest. J. Ellwood Lee & Co., of Conshohocken, who are large users of revenue stamps, will shortly have private proprietary stamps of their own. The denominations and colors are as follows: ½c blue, ½c red, 1¼c green, 2½c yellow, 5c brown. Robie has been made agent for their sale, but a fellow in Norristown claims that he has been granted a similar privilege.

Smethport certainly has reason for congratulation in being the home of as fine a philatelic magazine as the Philatelic Post, It has come to the front rapidly and already outclasses many of the old standbys. No charge for this Bro. Redfield.

changed shortly they can be first in the field and buy them up, confident they will soon rise 100 per cent. or more in value before long. But in such cases note must be made of the country which issues these stamps, more particularly as some countries have an unpleasant habit of reprinting and reissuing obsolete issues, and then declaring the reprints "regular" and perfectly legitimate.

One thing, in closing, we must observe: Stamps sold in the countries in which they originate and which they represent are generally dearer in price than the same stamps in foreign countries. The reason for this is that there is more demand in the home country for these stamps than there is in the foreign ones. In Germany rare old U. S. are offered for almost nothing.





WE'VE ALL MET HIM.

An unphilatelic person recently heard a stamp collector talking of a sale he had made and became greatly enthused with the desire to hunt stamps when he heard of the price the collector realized from the sale of them. He decided to at once look over some old papers which he knew contained "some very rare stamps." Among the first stamps that he came across was the 3-cent blue (locomotive) of 1869, which he at once thought was a very great treasure owing to its quaint design. He also succeeded in unearthing a 3-cent dull red of 1851, imperforated, taken from a letter sheet without envelope.

Upon discovery of this he was sure that he had a rival to the \$5 State Department and on finding a few \$1 values of the Civil War revenues he thought for certain he had some of the rarest stamps in the world.

With such trophies as these he hastened to his collecting friend and expected to be besieged with liberal offers of cash for his supposed rarities. That these are not made surprised him greatly and shook his faith in human nature. He firmly believed, despite all his friend could say, that the stamps were very valuable, and he still thinks that the collector is trying to play upon his ignorance and get these stamps from him for nothing.

He is only one of many such who we have all had experiences with. It is of no use wasting time to explain to such people as they do not believe you and think that you are only seeking to secure possession of their "finds" in order to realize a large amount from them yourself. May the day soon arrive when all such will acquire a true insight into philately and get to know the real market value of their "great finds."

"Pre-cancelled" stamps, of which so much is heard lately, and which some are collecting, are stamps which are cancelled by having the name of the postoffice printed on them while the stamps are still in the sheets and before they are pasted on the envelopes which they are to prepay. By so doing firms which mail large quantities of mail matter at a time save the postoffice authorities considerable labor.

The J. Ellwood Lee private proprietary stamps are now on the market. Price ONLY \$1 per set of five values. Talk about speculative issues, how's that for a set of stamps the face value of which is only about 10 cents? (D——!!!)?

The stamps of Finland will be replaced by the stamps of Russia January 14, 1901, but they will still be distinctive as the values thereon will be given in Finnish currency. Uruguay is to have a new set of stamps soon, to consist of 1, 2, 5, 7 and 10c.

Fernando Po is soon to have a new set of twenty varieties. It is said there are 600 varieties of Canadian revenues.





PHILATELIC GLEANINGS.

A new 2s stamp has been issued for Queensland, light green in color and figures in four corners.

The Protectorate of Northern Nigeria, British West Africa, is said to contain 300,000 square miles.

Malta has a new stamp of the value of 1s 4d and showing a view of the Graud Harbor at Valetta. Color, red-brown.

The late Niger Coast Protectorate has been enlarged and is now known as the Protectorate of Southern Nigeria. A new issue is promised therefrom.

Greece has lately entered upon the surcharge stage of its existence and is rapidly making up for lost time. There is already over twenty-five varieties listed and the end is not yet.

Cook's Islands are to be annexed to New Zealand and the stamps of that colony (N. Z.) may supercede the ones now in use in the Cook group. Fiji and Tonga may also meet with the same fate.

The design on the new Turks Island stamps represent a sailing vessel in an oval frame. The values and colors: ½d green, 1d carmine, 2d brown, 2½d blue, 4d orange, 6d violet, 1s brown, 2s violet, 3s lake. The 2s and 3s are larger than the other denominations.

The Philatelic Era says: There is certainly no more annoying practice among a few stamp dealers than that of sending out, indiscriminately and entirely unsolicited, lots of stamps on approval. It is not businesslike and often times an imposition on a busy man to be thus annoyed.

New Zealand has a new set of envelope stamps of the values of ½, I and 2d. They bear a cameo bust of Queen Victoria embossed in white on ground of solid color encased in scalloped oval with inscription "New Zealand" above and "Postage — Penny" below. They are a very handsome set and promise to become very popular.

Great Britain has issued stamps for the Cayman Islands, a colony of hers in West Indies, value 1/4d green, 1d rose. The design is the same as on the current issue of British Honduras.

It is predicted that the 2c green Canada, Jubilee issue, unused, will soon rank next to the 1/sc in point of rarity.

No one expects to make a complete collection (of stamps). No one would care a great deal for it, perhaps, and none are striving for such foolhardy results. The spirit of the true collector is to secure just as many stamps as he can afford to buy and for which he can afford sufficient time to study. Any one can collect stamps—the idea is to study them.—The Exchange.

The 3½c proprietary of the 1898 series of revenues appears to be good property.

No more stamps will be surcharged for Forto Rico, those current in U. S. being acceptable for postage on the island.

The set of Charles Marchand private proprietary stamps, it is predicted, will be the most difficult to obtain of any of the '98 revenue series.

It is said that North Borneo, in 1899, issued stamps to the value of £20,800, of which only £800 was used to prepay postage. The balance were purchased by stamp collectors.



ically insert after a stamp the name of the personage or scene depicted, as is done in the case of stamps of the United States. Publishers of papers could also accomplish much in this direction by devoting some of the space now given to uninteresting "Notes" and "Reviews" to short histories of personages pictured on stamps of a country or a description of a scene so pictured. The older magazines at one time devoted some little attention to this subject and were well repaid for their trouble. A republication of much of the information given in such papers as the old Philatelic Journal of America and similar journals would be of incalcuable benefit to us of to-day.

The \$1 Columbian furnishes, I believe, the best "horrible example" in philatelic history. Three years after its issue this stamp was selling at auction for \$5 and \$6 and listed at \$8, either used or unused. It is now advertised at \$1.25 used and \$1.75 unused and doesn't seem to be in very much demand at that. As a deterrent to speculation could anything be more eloquent?

Watch out for a corner in 8c United States surcharged Porto Rico. There's going to be one.

PHILATELIG GLEANINGS.

British Honduras is to have a 5c stamp printed in three colors, gray, black and blue.

A new series of stamps have appeared from Salvador, the design same as the 1899 issue with date changed. All are surcharged with a sun and rays.

The 10c violet of the last issue of Chili has already become obsolete, that value now coming printed in yellow.

The colonies of Germany now supplied with their own set of

stamps are: Cameroons, Caroline Islands, German New Guinea, German Southwest Africa, Kiao-Chiao, Mariana Islands, Marshall Islands, Samoa, Togoland. A full set consists of fourteen values, 2, 3, 5, 10, 20, 25, 30, 40, 50, 80 pfennig, and 1, 2, 3, 5 marks. German East Africa has a set also, but the values are in pesas and rupees instead of pf. and marks: 2, 3, 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 40 pesas, 1, 2, 3 rupees.

Surcharged imperial stamps are in use in the other German colonies: German China, 13 values; German Offices in the Levant, 12 values; German Offices in Morocco, 13 values.



SOME THOUGHTS OF YE EDITOR'S.

I herewith call the attention of collectors and dealers to the fact, which you may not have noticed, that this number of SWAP marks the beginning of its second year in the philatelic ranks. Several times during the past year I have been open to a great deal of criticism owing to irregularity of dates of issue, but beg to assure all that this will never occur again. Swap will hereafter be mailed promptly on the 20th of each month, and all copy for insertion in same must reach me not later than the 15th. As an exchange medium Swap seems to be meeting with favor among collectors and our advertisers inform me that it brings in very satisfactory returns, considering the little time it has been before the philatelic public. As our circulation is just at present increasing very rapidly the rates for advertising pace must soon be raised and may be with next issue. Advertisers who desire to take advantage of the present low rate should at once contract for same. You'll never get it lower and may pay more. The attention of philatelists is called to our free Exchange Column, I know for a fact that it has helped collectors to some pretty good "swaps."

Fault is often found by some exchangers with persons in foreign lands to whom they have sent selections of stamps for exchange. The following letter recently received by me no doubt explains much of the cause for dissatisfaction:

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"Yours received and herewith exchange, which I hope will suit. It was quite refreshing to get yours, asking for common stamps, after receiving several letters from the States inclosing 'tobacco tags,' revenues and documentary and asking me to be sure and send real good Victorias! However, that is, I expect, a natural failing all over the world, 'wanting a lot for very little.'"

The greatest boom of late years seems to have struck the Hawaiians. Values quoted in the new catalogue are totally inaccurate as many varieties readily sell at from 10 to 50 per cent. over prices given therein. It is said a firm in San Francisco offered twice catalogue price for a supply of the 2c lilac rose of '82 and could secure none. The 50c of '83-'86, unsurcharged, is also said to be underpriced, as high as \$10 being paid for it and it being listed at only \$7.50.

PHILATELIC GLEANINGS.

British Honduras is said to have a new set in preparation.

The \$1 red documentary revenue, uncut, will be good property.

The 48c of British Guiana now appears in dark gray and lilac-brown.

The 1c, 2c and 4c of Mauritius appear in new colors with type unchanged, 1c, gray and black; 2c, lilac and violet; 4c, lilac and carmine on yellow.

Stanley Gibbons, Ltd., of London, one of the largest dealers in postage stamps in the world, will hereafter cease to chronicle or deal in post pards, stamped envelopes or wrappers.

New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia, Tasmania, Victoria and Western Australia will soon be consolidated into the Commonwealth of Australia and hereafter but one series of stamps will be issued for use in all of the six former stamp issuing colonies.

The color of the 5c stamp of Hong Kong has been changed from blue to lilac.

It is said there were but 5,000 each of the 3c, 4c, 6c, 8c and toc of the Guam stamps issued and a rise in the prices asked for these may be looked for as no more are to be issued.

Persia has a "provisional" issue of 16 values.

Current issue U. S. revenues have been surcharged for use in Porto Rico.

Macao and Timor each have a new stamp of a very singular value, 78 avos.

Roumania has issued a commemorative set of ten values "to celebrate the opening of the new general postoffice at Bucarest." What next?

The total number of free delivery offices in the U. S. is said to number 795, at which 15,322 carriers are employed.

Canada has at last issued the 20c stamp for its numeral series. The color is sage-green.

Malta has a new I farthing stamp, brown, giving a view of the harbor at Valetta.

The Pan-American stamps will not be placed on sale until May 1st. They will be available for postage anywhere that the regular U. S. are.

The color of the new 1 heller stamp of Hungary has been changed from gray to lilac.

A new issue for Siam is said to be in preparation. Why?



SPECIALISM.

B. C. A. Daly.

Specialism now holds the field and is rapidly gaining in popularity on account of its innumerable outlets. No collector, short of a millionaire, would take up collecting stamps of all the world as it is practically an impossibility. Look at your catalogue and see what hundredth part of the stamps catalogued you can expect to get-will get. The collector who will begin specializing in the stamps of Greece, Holland, Denmark, Norway or Sweden will have few blank pages, and the outlay will also be within reason, that is, to the average collector.

Russia and Italy also offer a fine field to those of us whose expenditures must be limited to stamps below 50c or \$1 at most. And then, let us not forget Germany, though of late she has given us a good bunch of new issues, that is including those for her new colonial possessions. She has been good to us collectors in the past, though, and no one should find fault with the beautiful set which has lately emanated from the domain of the "war lord."

The South American republics have all got a good many varieties, the cost of which will not drive you far down in your pocket. But-it is better to collect used specimens if they can be procured at a reasonable price.

A collection of one country, or a group of countries, which one has completed, or nearly so, will prove both interesting and

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A collection of one country, or a group of countries, which one has completed, or nearly so, will prove both interesting and instructive, and will be a source of untold satisfaction to its possessor. Another good feature of such a collection is that the new issues may be added thereto without bankrupting one's self.

Foreign revenues are being specialized in to a great degree, of late, and is an attractive field both to the beginner and the advanced collector, with its large stamps and fine engraving and colors—and prices. I saw one lately sold for \$37, a South American revenue, but such prices are exceptional. The majority of the revenues are comparatively cheap.

When you get a revenue stamp and a postage stamp compare them and see which one will give the most pleasure. I did it and must say the co lecting of the revenue stamps of the world has given me the most enjoyment. They are also gone through further by my friends than my postage collection.

I would advise all collectors that when they see a revenue stamp of any country to keep it and put all you get in a blank book. Some day you will not regret it and will look complacently backward in years to come and not like the collector of to-day who lived twenty years ago and who now sees, too late, what a fine chance he missed when he was young.

PHILATELIC GLEANINGS.

Bolivia will be on hand soon with another new issue.

A new set of postage stamps is being designed for use in Switzerland.

Bosnia has three new stamps, 40 heller orange, 1k lake and 2k ultramarine.

The 16 centavos of Argentine has been withdrawn becaue, it is said, there is no longer any use for it.

Korea has a new set of stamps in preparation, with the value

in cents instead of chuen. There will be 13 values and the design is said to be a bird—the imperial falcon.

Canada is said to be already preparing designs for a new set of postage stamps with the head of King Edward VII, thereon. If this is so you'd better fill in those blank spaces of the numeral issue before they take a leap skyward, especially the 20c sage green just issued.

If the stamp is scarce, it is sometimes better to have a damaged specimen than none at all, but if a stamp is common why not choose a good copy? The feeling is growing among collectors that damaged common stamps are so much waste paper. Leave damaged stamps alone, unless they are scarce. Exercise your individual judgment in stamp collecting as in other matters.—American Philatelic Magazine.

The Era says: A rumor is current that the 25 ore stamp of Denmark is to be withdrawn and a 24 ore issued in its stead.

A set of four postage due stamps have been issued for Soudan; 2, 4, 10 and 20 milliemes.

Spain's new set consists of 2, 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 40 and 50 centimos, 1, 4 and 10 peseta.

Costa Rica has issued a new 20 centavos stamp in two colors, supposed to be the forerunner of a new set.

The quantities of Pan-American stamps ordered to be printed are as follows: 1c, 71,000,000; 2c, 160,000,000; 4c, 5,000,000; 5c, 8,000,000; 8c, 3,000,000; 10c, 4,000,000.

In the last number of the Adhesive Miss Swift corrects the erroneous impression formed in many minds regarding the bird pictured on the stamps of Guatemala. It is not a parrot, says she, but a quetzal, a member of the parrot family. It cannot live in captivity and was for that reason chosen by the Guatemalans as symbolical of a people who could not exist in bondage.



A WORD OF ADVICE TO EXCHANGERS.

In my experience of the past year in publishing this little journal I have found that garcely one in ten collectors send in their exchange notices so written that one can tell just what they desire to dispose of, or what they desire sent them, without a lot of preliminary correspondence being gone through with before an understanding is reached. This has a tendency to discourage the would-be exchanger and to obviate this as far as is possible I desire to offer the following few words of advict o those sending in exchange notices, and hope it will prove beneficial.

First—Make up your mind what you desire to exchange. If you have a certain variety of stamp, or lot of stamps, or any particular article you desire to exchange, say so. Also, if you desire a particular stamp or stamps, state just what is wanted. Don't say, "John Smith would like to exchange stamps with collectors," and expect everyone to rush to ask what you have. That takes time and postage. Word it "John Smith would like to exchange stamps of U. S. for ones of Canada or British colonials," or "Have good copy of 1c 1869 issue of U. S., used, to exchange for a good used copy of 5c 1875 issue of Canada, or other good stamps of same value." A collector knows then what you have and whether he is in need of it, also if he can supply your wants. If he has what you want he'll let you know. Always state exact condition of stamps (used or unused, off-center or well-centered,

lightly or heavily canceled), honesty in this respect prevents much ill feeling and makes friends.

Second—In answering an exchange notice don't expect the "other fellow" to send first. You know what is wanted and if you have it you save postage by sending it on at once, instead of simply writing to ask for his selection first. Then, if selection sent you proves unsatisfactory, you should at once inform your correspondent. Undoubtedly he can supply you with one more satisfactory to you, and will at once do so.

Third—Change your exchange notice occasionally, it is a little trouble, both to yourself and us, but we can stand it if you can. The best results are to be obtained from frequent changes of your notice. Changes can be sent on a postal card each month, or you can send in several at once and we will run them in rotation.

Fourth—And this is important. Remember that we expect all who use this column to be strictly honest and if any prove otherwise we would esteem it a favor if we are immediately notified, so that we can warn others against them.

PHILATELIG GLEANINGS.

A new set of stamps has just been issued by Costa Rica. It is said to be a very handsome set and has the higher values given in colones instead of pesos. The set is printed in two colors and consists of 1, 2, 5, 10, 20, 50 centimos, 1, 2, 5 and 10 colones.

The new Spanish stamps, so 'tis said, have the plate number impressed on the back of each stamp. Here's another for the faddist to form a collection of.

New Zealand is not included in the Australian Federation, formed with the beginning of the present year, but is said to have under way a little federation of her own to include Fiji Islands, SWAP.

Cooks Islands and Tonga. Collectors will surely pray that she may be successful in this undertaking.

It is said that the stamps of Port Lagos are now obsolete.

The 10c current revenue of Ecuador has been used for postal purposes.

The 1, 2, 5 and 10 centimos of Ecuador now appear in new colors.

The current 1½ sen stamp of Japan has been surcharged for use in offices in China and Corea.

Peru has issued a set of bi-colored stamps to celebrate the opening of the twentieth century.

The 60 ore, dark blue, or Norway, has appeared with posthorn unshaded and "Norge" in Roman capitals.

West Australia has issued a new 21/2d stamp of a very elaborate design.

Bermuda is said to have surcharged the I shilling gray of present issue for use as "one farthing."

Sarawak has issued a new 1c stamp in two colors, blue and red.

Southern Nigeria has a new set of bi-colored stamps with queen's head, values from ½d to 10 shillings.

Bermuda is said to have surcharged 240,000 of her ½d stamps for use as ¼d, which were immediately cornered by speculators. A new stamp of the value of ¼d is said to be in preparation.

The Dominican Republic has issued 1/4c and 1/4c stamps of the new design.

Regular Japanese stamps, unsurcharged, are used in the island of Formosa.

The issuing of a new 1d stamp for "universal postage" by New Zealand will, it is said, make the 2d red-violet of that country somewhat rare.

Owing to a shortage in the regular 1c and 5c postage stamps. Chili has been obliged to surcharge several of her revenues for use postally. Only a limited number of these were issued and they promise to become scarce.





"ABOUT EXCHANGING."

Under the above caption in a recent number of "Redfield's Weekly Philatelic Post" Mr. Edgar S. Brightman seems to find many and various reasons for the discouragement of this practice among stamp collectors. That is, excanging by correspondence, in his opinion the ONLY really really satisfactory method of exchanging is: "When you look your fellow exchanger in the eye, when you examine carefully every stamp you get, when you exchange catalogue value for catalogue value, then it is that you may be satisfed, but not till then." Very good. But suppose your own city has few collectors and your own collection far surpasses theirs and your duplicates are numbered by the hundreds, and you can find nothing among the other collections which you don't already possess. What then? You must either dispose of your duplicates, at a sacrifice, to some dealer or else you MUST exchange them by mail with collectors in other cities.

Regarding this Mr. Brightman says: "At first thought one may say that it seems as though long distance exchange is as fair as any, for each party has sufficient time to examine the stamps before he takes them; but think for a moment on the wiles of the unscrupulous." And then he goes on to tell of the various ways whereby the unwary collector will be taken advantage of, having worthless, mended, badly centered and heavily canceled specimens foisted upon him, at greatly inflated prices, in return for his own really good and fairly priced stamps.



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As I have always been a steadfast advocate of exchanging by mail and have for the past twelve years been actively engaged in this "dangerous" practice, during which time I have "swapped" stamps with hundreds of other collectors, both in this and other countries, I cannot but take exception to these remarks of Mr. Brightman's. Judging by my own experience and that of several of my intimate friends, I am inclined to believe that Mr. Brightman has either written about something of which his actual knowledge is extremely limited, or else his exchange ventures have resulted in experiences the like of which rarely occurs to the average exchanger and which must have had a very disastrous effect on his sense of fairness.

In all my experience of exchanging by mail I have met with nothing but the fairest treatment from fellow collectors and I can recall but one case where I was badly treated in an exchange and that, more than five years since, was through sending a lot of stamps to an irresponsible boy without first asking for references and making inquiries, entirely my own fault I am sure.

Among my many philatelic friends in this city, and in numerous others, all of who have indulged in this "dangerous" practice of exchanging by mail, I find an experience almost like my own and a unanimity of opinion that the cases of dishonesty that have occurred in their exchange deals are few and far between. Occasionally cases of dishonesty occur in exchanging but so they do in everything else in this wicked old world of ours. The approval sheet man can relate to you by the hour cases whereby he has been defrauded by dishonest persons, but, does he consider that because he has met with losses in occasional cases he must at once shut up shop, go out of business and refuse to send out any more sheets?

If care is used in selecting correspondents and references are given by both parties before exchange relations are entered into, satisfaction will invariably result and many a pleasing and profitable "swap" made. Exchanging by mail is a necessity to stamp collectors. Those of us who haven't time, after the day's work, to go from our own home to that of another collector in the same town, can and do find the time to write to some fellow collector in a distant city. Ten minutes of writing often suffices to bring about a mutually satisfactory exchange deal by mail, whereas an hour might be spent in making a trip to the home of a local collector and result in nothing.

Another thing, you often find the staid business or professional man exchanging by mail with the schoolboy, whereas, if they were residents of the same town, they would probably not be even acquaintances. It if often difficult, I have found, to get a business man to admit to a fellow townsman that he is even interested in stamps, while, at the same time, he may have a dozen correspondents, in as many different cities, with whom he exchanges regularly.

Another thing with which Mr. Brightman finds much fault is the exchange departments of our stamp societies. His remarks thereon have a decidedly "space-filler" flavor and will, instead of helping to better things, render them infinitely worse, as they are well calculated to frighten the collector who is not posted and make him decide to give all societies a wide berth. Thus a probable member is lost to the society and the collector loses the benefits which would certainly accrue to him were he to join, and all because some philatelic paper was in need of a couple of columns of matter and would take "any old thing" to fill them, regardless of the amount of knowledge of the subject possessed by the writer, and which in this case was extremely vague.


Philatelic Pencillings.

When the next catalogue comes out I'll warrant you'll find yourself surprised by a good many of the advances. Buy what you can to-day, to-morrow you'll have to pay more for the same thing.





If you find yourself becoming afflicted with an attack of that to be dreaded molady, forgetfalness, fight it have "if it takes all summer," for now you will find the bargains of the year, as dealers are vying with each other to secure the nimble dimes and dollars and are offering stamps at prices which cannot be expected in the cooler and more thoughtful days. This summer, at least, make no your mind to see to at least at hour or two a week to your stamps and when the long winter eveningare again at hand and you look over the additions to your collection which you have made during this period, and compare the prices paid therefor with the then market prices a feeling of satisfaction will certainly be yours and you will never again feel like giving your stamps a "vacation" on account of the enervating days of sunny summer.

Every collector should be a member of at least one philatelic society. You owe it to other collectors as much as to yourself.

The collection of revenues is optional with the collector, but it is very interesting and to many very satisfying and profitable.

"Quick returns and a fair profit" should be the dealer's motto. Holding for a "rise" is seldom profitable as the "rise" seldom materializes, the opposite more often being the case.

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Subscribe to several stamp papers. Maybe you do "know all about it" but occasionally a pointer WILL get by you if your eyes are not constantly open. Just because a paper is small is no good reason for thinking that it cannot occasionally contain something which may prove of benefit to you.

Fifty per cent. discount off catalogue price may be given you on a certain class of stamps by some dealers, but don't expect to secure everything you desire at this reduction. You're lucky if you get some stamps at the prices given in the catalogue.

Even "cheap" advertising can be made profitable if but a little study and forethought is given to the needs of those among whom it circulates.

If you are a dealer don't despise or neglect the small orders. Fill them as promptly and as carefully as you do the larger ones. Through a small order being filled satisfactorily and with dispatch more and larger ones are often times secured.

The "boy trade" is often ridiculed, but it is the very backbone of the stamp business.

Trash worked off for the beginner's cash is undoubtedly profitable to a certain degree, but a satisfied patron who becomes a regular purchaser is a thousand times more preferable.

A single experiment will convince the stamp dealer that small advertisements frequently repeated are worth more than the full page advertisement displayed but once. The stamp buying public has but a short memory at best. It soon forgets you and your offerings unless your advertisement is kept constantly before its notice.

Would an ad. in SWAP benefit you? Have you ever tried it?

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

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

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but one little sentence therein appeals with double force to us as it voices our ideas exactly and puts forth a principle which we have long striven to advance.

It is all contained in this: "Collect everything that costs you nothing, or ONLY TIME AND LABOR OF EXCHANGING."

That's it, exactly. You'll find a great deal more pleasure in stamps that you have secured through exchange with a fellow collector, and which has cost you comparatively nothing, than in a stamp in which you have invested some of your hard-earned cash. You won't have to worry over whether its price goes up or down in the next catalogue and how much you will have gained or lost on your purchase. If it takes a drop in price you soothe yourself with the thought, "Well, I got that in a trade, it cost me practically nothing." And, if a rise in price be its portion, how cheering to think "I have that stamp, got it in an exchange from Mr. ——, and it is all clear gain to me."

You can not fail to get lots of pleasure out of exchange relations with your brother collectors, not to mention the benefit to yourself and them through an interchange of ideas and opinions regarding all stamp matters. A quiet tip is thus often secured from a correspondent which may prove of incalculable benefit to you. Try exchanging this winter and see if it does not help to while away many an hour which would otherwise prove dull and profitless. And next spring's inventory will be filled with pleasurable remembrances of the winter's pastime.

In sending to a dealer a request for stamps on approval always inclose a 2-cent stamp for a reply, especially if you have SWAP. 3

never had transactions with him before. It shows him you mean business and are not writing just out of idle curiosity.

Good stamp hinges can be bought for about 8c per 1,000. What kind of an opinion will collectors form of you if you persist in mounting stamps on sheets with torn bits of heavy gummed paper, etc? A very high one, think you?

The 2d stamp of South Australia, printed in purple now instead of brown red, is certainly a handsomer looking stamp than formerly.

'Tis said, "A drop of ink makes millions think," but sometimes it makes a million thinks, especially if it is a nice, large drop of canceling ink smeared over the face of one of the high value postage stamps.

More attention is always given to an ad, that has prices attached to goods offered than to one that has not. Bear this in mind when writing your ad, copy,

That 1899 issue of Mexico adds attractively to a collection.

To succeed in any line of business it is necessary to keep well informed. If you expect success in the stamp business you should subscribe to at least a dozen different stamp journals and READ them, taking especial note of the various offerings of dealers in their advertisements and of their prices quoted. Only in this way can you keep in touch with the trade these hustling, bustling days.

Much diversity of opinion exists among dealers as to what is the proper market value of the last issues of U. S. revenues in cut condition. My advice to collectors is to hold off from purchasing them until the new catalogue makes its appearance and thus gives us their approximate valuation. By doing so you will undoubtedly save considerable money.
