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His Views Considered Too Mild by Many Members of His Party. BLOODSHED NECESSARY TO SECURE REFORMS. Living Among Foreigners Who Wrongly Estimates the American Workman—Ideas of the Modern Society.

It is an extremely difficult matter to persuade Most or any other consistent Anarchist to unfold his whole philosophy and especially to express an opinion as to whether or not he believes in the expediency of one thing Most and all his followers are convinced, and that is that only by bloodshed and the worst form of social conflict can their revolution be accomplished.

Most speaks with the radical individualists upon the question of the future society. He expects that it will take the form of communal and industrial groups, holding land in common, perhaps, and owning machinery in the same fashion. There would be little or no law in these communities, such as there would be made and administered by the community itself.
