—What is the difference between a certain class of philatelists and a counterfeit stamp? One is the imitation of an honest man, the other of a genuine stamp.

—There is a "dealer" in this country that we have an eye on, and if he do not look out there will be a very Vesuvius open upon him and his dealings.

—Departmental postage stamps are becoming rarer each year, so we advise collectors to procure as many varieties as possible before it is too late.

Always attach your stamps with gummed hinges never paste them in for you may want to remove them sometimes to examine the paper especial Match, Medicine, and Document stamps. Don't exchange your old issues of U. S. for Foreign but correspond with some collector who also has a lot of U. S. and you can make many exchanges of advantage to you both and you will soon get a good collection of U. S. Stamps. I do not collect any foreign myself (Canada excepted,) for I find the U. S. stamps present plenty large enough field for the average collector, at least until they get all of the stamps within the reach of their purse. TO COLLECTORS.**

You will have to try some other ruse, if you run across a surcharged revenue or other U. S. stamp always consult your catalogue (Sterlings is my favorite) and you will add many gems to your collection in this way I have several Surcharged stamps not catalogued, you will probably run across some if you keep a sharp look out, if you ever expect to get the Departmentals also Match and Medicine stamps now is the time they will never be as low again as they are at present, my advise is to let reprints alone for they have not much Philatelic Value. Locals unless on the original Envelop are not very desirable, for if you are not a good Judge you

Will get more reprints than genuine document stamps are seldom counterfeited. All grilled stamps of the 1870 issue are valuable and should not pass by your notice, I procured the grilled stamps spoken of last month in looking over several thousand common U. S. stamps. Do not let your common U. S. stamps go without examining them for grilled specimens. I would recommend a blank Album to mount a collection in as the rare cuts that the average collector never expects to get present a naked look and people looking over your collection are always asking why you dont have a stamp in these woodcut blank spaces, also another argument in favor of the blank Album is the collector can arrange his collection to suit his taste most all advanced collectors use blank albums. Try and get as good a collection of Philatelic Literature as you can, there is always a demand for back nos of stamp Papers.

STAMPS of GRENADA

BY WM. SCHAD.

Grenada first issued stamps in 1860. This issue consisted of only two values; 1 penny green, and 6 pence lake description: Crowned head of Victoria, in oval, in center on solid ground "Grenada" above value below on solid ground; Walter's crosses in corners. The whole is laid on a lined background. In 1864 these stamps were issued with watermark of a star. In 1866 the color of the 6 d was changed to orange. In 1876 a stamp was issued having no indicated value, this stamp was printed in purple and surcharged, "Postage" above and one shilling below. In 1881 the same stamp was printed in violet and surcharged $\frac{1}{2}$ penny. It was also printed in claret and surcharged $2\frac{1}{2}$ pence and printed in blue & surcharged 4 pence

the same year. In 1883 it was printed in yellow and surcharged one penny. In 1882 the following stamps were issued $\frac{1}{2}$ penny green; 1 penny rose; $2\frac{1}{2}$ penny blue; 4 pence slate; 6 pence mauve; 1 shilling violet.

Rare old stamps in old chests, and boxes, but the collector who runs on to one of these treasure may count himself lucky. One of the greatest places to find stamps is at a paper sorting house, there you can find some really good but seldom rare stamps. I got 1500 Entire U S postal cards in 1 day at a paper shop, but what was they worth have failed to sell the lot as yet for even 50cents. This is about the kind of rare old stamps generally found in old chests, not so with document stamps if your family have. Continued on 2nd page

A lot of these you can generally get some fairly rare specimens such as unperforated and double perforated, these are most all quite valuable also in the average drugstore you can find a great many Medicine & proprietary stamps. Of all stamps the U. S. gen-issues & Departments are the hardest to get, unless you buy them, I mean stamps worth 25 cents each, or even there is a great difference in the Standard catalogues for instance Scott quotes 1ct. blue Joseph Lockr 2 cents while Sterling quotes the same stamp at 15 cents. Then you will find stamps priced by Sterling below Scott. This

I suppose is because one has a larger stock of some particular stamps than the other. Philately is surely a riddle, hard to solve, but has a great many trying hard to solve it. The best way to make money on stamps is to watch the bargains close when offered in U. S. stamps and snap them up; lay away the spoils and in a few years you are just as sure to get compound interest as the sun is to rise in the East and set in the West. Just look at a Catalogue printed 10 years ago and see what some of the great rarities of to day were worth then at that time there was not 1 tenth as many collectors as there are to day, so of course the demand was governed accordingly, but in 10 years hence there will be at least 5 collectors to every 1 to day and of course the supply will then run short to unobtainable on some of the fairly scarce to rare stamps of the

Present time. It is the case of most all collectors to become a dealer nothing ventured nothing made, but if you hadn't ventured you wouldn't lost is quite apt to be the result. Although some who understand what they are doing and facilities for buying right have good success, and make money fast, but to stand a show with our old reliable dealers you have to sell very low much under standard rates to get a share of the Philatelist patronage. Then another great drawback is the Black sheep in the flock, who you send an approval sheet to and never hear from again. The old dealers who have a army of old customers and are not half as apt to get took in, but some times do for several dollars worth. But if you have got it into your head you can make your mark in the Philatelic world, why sail in and let joy be unconfined.

The Postage Stamps of NICARAGUA.

BY C. F. EUSTIS.

Nearly every philatelist has a liking for the stamps of one country more than for those of some other division of the globe and it is usually the one whose issues are almost complete in his collection and those whose beauty especially attracts him. Now my taste for the above reasons has always leaned toward Nicaragua ever since the time, years ago, that I got the first issue complete for a very trifling sum and I propose to tell you what little I know on the subject of Nicaraguan stamps. The country is as you probably know a Central American republic, (what a liking we have for any country that is a republic) the last president according to the extent of my knowledge being Joaquin Zavala.

The country first issued stamps in 1862 the denominations and following issues being as annexed.

Issue Perforated, Yellowish Paper.

1862	2c	dark blue.	
"	5c	black.	
1869	2c	blue, white paper.	
"	5c	black,	" "
"	10c	vermilion	" "
"	25c	green	" "
1871	1c	brown	" "

Perforated, white paper.

The country also issued another set the same as the 1862 issue except that they were Unperforated.

The design on all of the "bits philatelic" are nearly the same, (the ex-

ceptions being in the edges of the 1862 and '83 issues,) and consist of a foreground of mountains behind which the rising sun* is seen with a liberty pole standing on the summit of the hills. They are finely engraved and were made for postal purposes and not to draw money out of the collector's pocket. Hoping that these few words may serve to create an interest in what seemed to me as usually being "passed by" stamps I remain

Collecting Envelope Stamps.

Now I think the right way is to collect entire Envelopes, of course you cannot always obtain entire specimens and to meet this I have pursued the following course, I have 2 Blank books one for Entire and the other for cut specimens, No. 1 & 2 in No. 1 I have all the entire envelopes, and when space is left vacant. 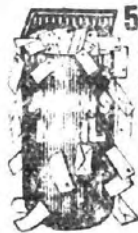

Collecting Envelope Stamps.

In your paper, I have noticed at different times, pieces from different Collectors on collecting Envelopes, stamps, most all seem to think that the only way to collect is to collect square cut specimens, giving as their reason that collecting entire specimens is collecting stupidity. From this I judge that they pay no attention to sizes or water marks. Now I think the right way is to collect entire Envelopes, of course you can not always obtain entire specimens, and to get this I have pursued the following course, I have 2 Blank Books one for Entire and the other for cut specimens. No. 1 & 2 in No. 1 I have all the entire envelopes, and when space is left vacant. Continued page 2

If I can obtain or have the specimen cut square, in No 1. to correspond with the space in No 2 and then when looking over the entire ones, you can readily find the specimen in No 2 that is not in No 1. I think a collection of clean entire Envelopes looks a hundred times better than a collection of cut stamps. And they certainly are worth a great deal more than the square cut specimens. The size color and watermark often make a stamp worth much more than if not there, so that when you collect entire envelopes, you collect not only the stamps but the sizes and water

Marks. suppose you only collect sq cut specimens, and you come across an entire envelope it is very likely you will pay no attention to the size or water marks, but simply cut out the stamp and you have no size or water marks, it may be that you have come across a very scarce size or an unwater marked specimen and you destroy all but the stamp where if you had kept the entire envelope you would have a very scarce and costly stamp Of course you can mark the size under the sq cut stamp but what proof have you that it was that size. Now the collector who collects entire specimens will find that he has a collection worth a great deal more than the one who collects cut specimens, and last of all I do not think he is collecting stationery. 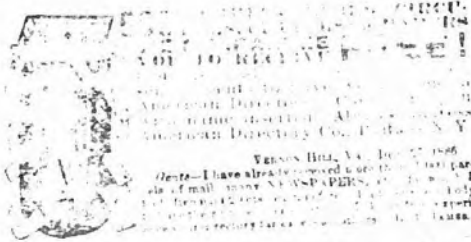

Again, many collectors make a specialty of Great Britain and her colonies, France and her colonies &c.,

But it cannot be denied that specialties are becoming common among collectors of all grades as a complete collection of all stamps issueing countries is impossible. And a complete collection of only one country or more is sometimes very easy, Bosnia for instance or Hamburg. But the U. S. is not so easy a field as it has issued as many stamps as any country in the world.

The day is surely coming when every Philatelist will be a specialist.

The Parcels Post Convention between the Hawaiian Kingdom and the United States of America provides for transmission, between these two countries, by mail, of parcels not exceeding eleven pounds in weight, nor exceeding three feet six inches in length, nor exceeding six feet in greatest length and girth combined. The rate of postage is fixed at twelve cents for the first pound, and twelve cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

Letters, post cards, and written matter of all kinds, that are admitted under any conditions to the domestic mails of the country of origin, are not admissible to the parcels post; neither are publications which violate

the copyright laws of the country of destination, poisons, and explosive or inflammable substances, liquids and those which easily liquify. confections and pastes, live or dead animals, except dead insects and reptiles when thoroughly dried; fruits and vegetables, and substances which exhale a bad odor: lottery tickets, lottery advertisements or lottery circulars; all obscene or immoral articles; articles which may in any way damage or destroy the mails, or injure the persons handling them: also opium. It is also provided that a letter or communication of the nature of personal correspondence must not accompany, be written on, or enclosed with any parcel. No parcel may contain parcels intended for delivery at an address other than the one borne by the parcel itself.

The following customs arrangement

should be noted: The sender of each package shall make a customs declaration, pasted upon or attached to the package, upon a special form provided for the purpose giving a general description of the parcel, an accurate statement of the contents and value, date of mailing, and the sender's signature and place of residence, and place of address. The package in question shall be subject in the country of destination to all customs duties & all customs regulations in force in that country for the protection of its Customs Revenues; and the customs duties properly chargeable thereon shall be collected on delivery in accordance with the customs regulations of the country of destination.

The foregoing are the main features of the Convention of interest to the general public and are here given for the benefit of our readers. The Convention went into operation on Friday the first day of March, 1889.

Necessary Postal Reform IN THE UNITED STATES

By Ph HEINSBERGER, N. Y.

The postal service in the U. S. has not improved in keeping with the business needs of the country. Businessmen having traveled in Europe, says that the U. S. is fifty years "behind the times." There is a good deal of truth in this. The U. S. Government has done "very little," to improve the service. What has been accomplished is the result of individu-

al enterprise in building railroad lines and in running fast trains.

The large as well, as the smallest states on the "European continent" have given to the people every postal facility, and made any improvement. In Europe the mail for "all" cities, and "all" the country places, is delivered to residence by postmen "free of charge." The European post offices forward packages (ten times larger sizes, than the U. S. do) to residence, deliver money to residence, are responsible "financially" for mail risk value. They collect C. O. D. orders, collect drafts and checks for the business and private men. Each postman carries, in city and country, along a full supply of all postal stationary, stamps.—all this is done—for the "Convenience of the People" and at a trifling fee!

How different in the Rich U. S. A.

Whenever private enterprises come into competition with the Government, the latter suffers. The people of New York well remember, that a dispatch company, which undertook the delivery of letters or circulars a few years ago, was broken up by the postal authorities, because it was making great inroads on the postal business. In the same way the express companies, which have begun the issue of money orders, and which forward remittances, are doing a very large and rapidly increasing business. They promise to deprive the Government of the greater share of its money order business. And they also do more business in the way of forwarding small packages, which might go through the mail than does the Government.

and in expediting the service on star routes. Postmaster-General Wainmaker promises to improve the service. But we do not look for much from him. He has made it his first duty to "cut down the Sunday mails." A letter posted in this city now on Saturday night with a ten cent special delivery stamp on it, in addition to the regular postage, and directed to any point in Philadelphia will not be delivered for nearly twenty-four hours. This is a sample of the Government service. In the very heart of the business section of Philadelphia four and five hours elapse be-

tween the collection of letters at street boxes in the middle of the day. This kind of service in this age of steam & and electricity is almost scandalously defective.

The service is better in New York, but even here the Postmaster has to make a constant fight to get money enough to carry on the work as at present conducted, although the office pays a yearly revenue of 3 millions of dollars. This thing is highly discreditable to the Government, but the prospects of anything better are not bright

Rare Stamps are Easily Found. [Sometimes.]

In looking over my files of One Dime I noticed in the Jan, and Feb. Nos, an article by some one on "Rare Stamps not easily found."

Possibly the gentlemen who wrote it had no "luck" but be that as it may

I want to tell the numerous readers of One Dime of some finds I have made since I began collecting. My first was a lot of Medicine Stamps that I discovered in a drug store all soaked off the bottles and in fine condition. Some clerk that had worked in the store had done it, and left them. I grabbed them. Their catalogue value was over \$15.00 so I had some excuse for grabbing. My next great find and the one that brought me in the most cold hard cash happened in this wise. A friend of mine mentioned the fact that his mother had a lot of old "love letters" and if there were any stamps on them that I wanted I could have them for looking the letters over. I consented in a hurry and immediately started for "those letters". The day happened to be Sunday but as is said "the better the day the better the deed" and

so I thought when I commenced to look them over. The first thing I struck after I had been almost discouraged, was a 3-cent 1868 grilled all over. How I jumped. Catalogues at \$5 and hard to get at that price. A little further and I run on to a lot of 1869 grills. Most of these were low values although there were a few 12c. Then I struck a large package of 1868 3cts, grilled in all sizes and among these I found four more grilled all over making five in all. Besides these I found a lot of entire stamped envelopes, containing some rare ones of the earlier issues. I looked them all through and found a few more cheap stamps that I took for duplicates. I then made a bee line for home and my catalogues, to see how much my find footed up. Five 68 3 cts, \$25, 69 issue \$3, Entire env, \$5. All others about \$2, Total 35 dollars.

How is that for an afternoons work. I have got about 25 dollars clean cash from that find by selling and exchanging, and have a beautiful specimen of the 3c for my collection. My last haul was seven P. O. Dept. Envelopes that catalogue at 1 dollar each. These I discovered at the post office and they were given to me. This makes my total for these three finds 57 dollars. Geo B Ward.

Japanese revenues bear the conventionalized chrysanthemum; while those of British Guinea are adorned with a palm-tree.

The impressed British document stamps do not bear the queen's portrait. They are surmounted generally by the crown, however, and often display the coat-of-arms or some heraldic device. Some of them are simply heavily stamped in the paper without color, while others are embossed in colored circles or other designs.

The exquisite variety collector will keep two of the Swiss envelopes, one with the color struck through and one without. The stamps on these envelopes are in the upper left hand corner, like those of many other European states, instead of being as with us in the upper right. H C Q.

**Austrian-Hungarian Lloyd
Mail Steamer Statistics.
BY PH. HEINSBERGER, NEW YORK,**

The Austrian Secretary of Commerce has accepted the proposition in regard to the mail steamer routes of the "Lloyd" pro 1890. The number of mail routes remains the same as in the previous year, but the time of departure and regarding (stops) in calling ports was altered and the mail routes were shortened. The mail steamer which formerly left Triest (Austria) to Bombay [India] on the 22 each month is transferred

to depart on the 3rd This route runs "Via" Brindise (Italy) Iou-Said, Suez, Aden (Egypt) to Bombay (India) formerly 19 days way, and now shortened to 16 days way. A second mail route was from Triest (Austria) to Hong Kong [China] This mail steamer formerly left Triest on the 10th, and have been transferred to depart on the 15th of the months of February, April, June, August, October and December, and sail from Triest "Via" the red sea (Egypt) to Hong Kong [China] The stopping in Hong Kong, formerly 8 to 10 days was shortened to 5 to 7 days, and the departure from Hong Kong is also one day earlier as previous The "Branch mail steamer route, Bombay (India) to Hong Kong China, transferred their departure from the 14th to the 21st of each 2nd month.

The "Branch" mail steamer route from Calcutta (India) to Colon (Ceylon) transferred their departure and arrived for 6 days later as previous. A third mail route is from Triest (Austria) to Santos (Brazil) formerly the trip took 42 days, and is now shortened to 40 days, and if more steam is used, to 38 days each trip. The total increase of sea miles, "gained" in the year 1890 will be 29,000 per annum. The Austrian Hungarian Lloyd Steamship Co., is subsidised by the government of Austria, and these mail steamers are in time of war to the service of the Austrian government, according to the mail contract.

The entire inscription on the outer edges of some of the British telegraph stamps reads in plain capital: "Telegraphs one Shilling," The word

"telegraphs" is used in England very largely in place of "telegrams" which word is considered an Americanism. These stamps are stuck on telegraph blanks as postage stamps are used on letters, and are cancelled with the postmark of the sending office. A cable message sent from a small office will sometimes be stuck all over with low value stamps. For cable messages are sent as uncommonly in small towns in England as in America. I have a cablegram in my possession with a sheet of 20 green one-shilling stamps on one side and 8 more on the other, besides a sixpence brown. Each stamp is neatly postmarked. These stamps, by the way, have the plate letters in the lower corners, and a figure in the upper ones, the same in each corner.

1) The Secretary for the Posts and Telegraphs of the "Columbian Republic" recently has notified the U. S. Department of State that all mail matter addressed to "Arpinval in future" must be addressed "Colon," otherwise such mail will be returned to sender. The city of Arpinval in Columbia (streames of Panama) was founded by "Lloyd Arpinval," a New York merchant, and named in his honor. But the Spanish Americans call the city "Colon" in honor of Christoph Columbus. Honor to the founder of Arpinval (Lloyd Arpinval) but "Glory" and Honor to the name "Christoph Columbus the discoverer of America (and discoverer of Columbia. CONTINUED ON 2 page.

2) News comes from Mozambique Mozambique is a portuguese colony in Africa, that the Portuguese officials at Quilimane, at the mouth of the Zambesi, have forbidden the captains of British steamers in that port from receiving for transmission to England despatches or letters, official or otherwise, from Mr Johnston the British Consul, and have issued Preemptory orders that all such com-

munications must pass through the Portuguese Post-office

3) The english mail steamer "In-bria" arrived in New York recently and delivered a mail bag marked "Ottawa" Canada which was forwarded to that city. On opening the mail bag the Post officials at Ottawa found "only" mail matter addressed to New York City among them letters for Ph. Heinsberger New York. The smart postofficials in Glasgow [Scotland] had by a mistake! put the mail for New York in a mail bag and had marked the bag "Ottawa Canada." The consequence was a delay of 3 days!

4) The Secretary of Commerce of Austria has authorised the austrian postoffices in the cities of Adrianople, Salsnichi Beireet, Smyrna, Constantinople to establish an Postal Collecting Service. These Austrian post

offices are located in Turkey, and stamp collectors know their stamps as "Austrian Levant postage stamps. Beginning with February 18th 1880 those post offices will collect business and private bills, drafts, checks, in Turkey, and also in Belgium, Germany Austria, Hungary, Italy, Roumania, France and Switzerland, according to treaties with those countries. The value of money must be figured in France, and only people living in the above named countries are permitted to use this postal collecting system.

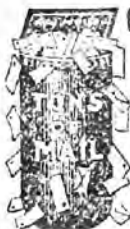

Superintendent Morgan, of the City Department, to whom the reporter was referred for further details, said:—"I would like to tell you stories of fatigued letter carriers, worn out with lugging tons of love's messages about the city. I know it is the usual thing, but am restrained by an uncontrollable desire to tell the truth. The fact is, that it is the poorest showing in years. I doubt whether in the mail distributed there will be 40,000 valentines, all told. Six years ago there were more than two hundred and fifty thousand, but there has been a steady falling off

since then in the number distributed. This is the more remarkable when the great increase in the population during that time is taken into consideration. In former years we always expected a tremendous increase of work at this time of the year and provided for it by a requisition on the Departments at Washington for additional clerical help. Everybody had to work extra hours during these two days, and the carriers were almost worked to death trying to keep their routes cleared up.

"In the downtown districts the increased delivery is scarcely perceptible. The same is true of the Harlem district. The increase is mainly felt in the crowded tenement districts on the east and west sides of town, but the managers of the branch offices there inform me that they have no trouble in handling the extra mail matter."

Mr Morgan said that the falling off in valentines was accompanied by a corresponding increase in the delivery of Easter and christmas cards. Exchange of Easter cards at the close of Lent appears to hold the lead at present with those who distribute their sentimentality by mail

Stamp Out The Frauds.

Recently the stamp dealers seem to have become especially bitter against frauds, for several of our prominent dealers have dug up the hatchet and started on the war path in a way which promises to make it very interesting for those who are in the habit of cheating.

If all other dealers & collectors would only join in and add a few more examples like that of the Union Stamp Co, to the list, frauds would soon begin to make them selves scarce.

Dealers would then be able to send out approval sheets with out always requiring a reference. They would also be able to supply collectors with stamps at a much lower figure, for there is no doubt that these swindlers do much toward keeping up the price of stamps. Dealers now have to keep in mind the fact that a certain per cent of their stamps, despite their best effort, will be stolen, and they therefore have to mark all the stamps just so much higher. I think at present that frauds are on the increase and that the dealers loss in this way is becoming heavier every day, but as soon as they begin to decrease prices will begin to drop.

So let both collector & dealer resolve that they will do all in their power toward bringing these scoundrels to justice and to make things so lively for them that they will either have to give up their fraudulent practice or be treed and roasted by means any thing but pleasant.

GREATLY IMPROVED MAIL SERVICE.

Several weeks since we felt constrained to censure the officials and subordinates connected with the mail service of New England, and did so in good faith, believing that we had most excellent reasons therefor. At that time we called the special attention of the post-office officials, the superintendent of New England railway mail service, as well as the department at the national capital, to the fact that the TELEGRAM'S mail was being unnecessarily delayed en route, and that letters containing money had failed to reach us. We spoke in pretty severe terms, without calling any names, intending that the blame should be placed exactly where it belonged and nowhere else.

We also harbored the idea that a little judicious kicking, now and then, is not only relished by the best of men, but is pretty liable to bring about a change and a marked improvement in the right direction. Such has been the happy result in the present instance.

Since the time when we had cause to complain of the loose manner in which the TELEGRAM'S mail was being handled, there has been a gradual and steady improvement in the desired direction, until now scarcely any complaints are received at this office from week to week, and the postal service of New England seems to be running along smoothly and to the satisfaction of the public and everybody concerned.

Ryan of Boston, the genial superintendent of the railway mail service of New England, and S. W. Shepardson, his capable and faithful assistant, and to these gentlemen and all their subordinates, high and low, we desire to proffer our most sincere thanks. It is one of the cardinal and fundamental principles of the TELEGRAM to bestow credit upon whom credit is due, and we take pleasure in stating that, at present conducted, we are much pleased and highly gratified with the prompt and efficient manner in which our mail, both going out and coming in, is being handled in every section of the six New England states. **MANCHESTER TELEGRAM.**

A Philatelist.

It is said by some that a genuine philatelist should collect, adhesives, envelopes, revenues and postal cards. Postal cards have not received much attention from most philatelists. I would advise a young

collector not to buy a cheap album but get a good International album which is cheaper in the long run, it also shows cuts of stamps and has places for the stamps according to their denominations, has places for rulers coats of arms and flags of all nations. Do not mix postage and revenues. After you have advanced a little if you feel like it get an extra album for revenues and postal cards. The term philatelist should not be applied to any one but an earnest energetic collector. A. T.

Philatelic Breezes.

The "Standard Philatelist" has been refused second class postal rates.

What stamp issuing country is like a colored person? Montenegro.

There is a good deal of truth in the following taken from a old stamp paper. "Not long since we read in a Philatelic Journal that there is hardly a person who can not with diligence, make a very respectable collection by searching the papers and letters of his own family and trading the duplicates. We are not quite prepared to dispute this for a great deal may depend on what is meant by a respectable collection; If it is to be considered respectable in view of the difficulty in making it in that way the term may be applicable, but if it refers to number and variety we fear very few could lay claim to that title. We tried "family letter" plan

and got a good many stamps, but they were all of such common varieties that nobody wanted our duplicates. The best way to get stamps enough to make a respectable collection is to buy them."

Gen. A. B. Hazen of the board of management for the government exhibit at the Chicago Columbian Exposition says the Post Office department has asked for 25,000 feet of space. "One feature of our exhibit," said he, "will be a first class Post Office in full operation. Cars will be run into or near the building and unloaded, and the mails made up and every thing carried on just as in the best post office in the country. Then we shall exhibit, of course, all the appliances used in transporting the mails, with a full set of stamps and perhaps a stamp envelope machine in full operation."

It is said that the coolest place in Washington is the Justice department.

Minister Guzman of Nicaragua called at the department recently and had a brief conference, with the postmaster general, and later Minister Irvesada of the Argentine Republic called. Other conferences will follow from time to time. No general conference of the representatives of South America countries is expected.

Some days ago the postmaster general sent an invitation to each of the ministers of the South American governments to meet him at any time and place to suit their convenience and submit to him their views as to what might be done under the provision of the new postal subsidy act to promote communications between the United States and those countries. Quite a number have already replied accepting the invitation, but in some instances disclaiming power to act in the absence of direct authority from their respective governments.

A Fort Yuma correspondent writes that they have a little fun once in a while in that dry place. The fun was this: an officer had left twenty dollars worth of U. S. postage stamps on his table. Now the habits around the fort are rather of the free and easy kind, and the Indians are left to roam about the barracks at will if they do not steal. A young squaw, very much at home anywhere, and everywhere happened to stray into this officer's room, and, seeing the stamps, began to examine them with great curiosity. She at length discovered that, if wet, they would stick and forthwith a happy idea struck her. Now it is a fact that fashion reigns as supreme among ladies of her class, as in the faraway wigwams of her pale faced sisters, and this squaw was anxious to become the envy of the other ladies of her tribe. So she went in on the postage currency, and soon made her appearance on the parade ground almost covered with the stamps from which the faces of Benjamin Franklin and the Father of his Country smiled

benignly on the soldiers. It is needless to say that they returned the smile with full interest up to date, officers and drummer-boys joining in the roar of laughter that greeted her appearance. The squaw, Indian like, preserved her dignity, and sailed serenely off to make more conquests in her novel attire, while the officer rushed into his room, only to find himself minus twenty dollar's worth of postage. That which was intended for the mail was used by the female.

Certainly she might have been put in the overland coach and gone through; decidedly she would not have been stopped for want of being prepaid.

Past and Present of the Postage Stamps.

WHO MADE THE FIRST POSTAGE STAMPS.

Like many other things, of daily use which once were not and now are, postage stamps have become such a familiar object that but few people ask, whence? But the history of their origin is very interesting. In the reign of Louis XIV of France W. De Nelayer who did letter carrying

for a consideration placed boxes at the corners of the streets for the reception of letters wrapped in envelopes with slips of paper tied around them bearing the inscription "postpaid the—day of—1655." These slips were sold for a small sum at the palace, at the turn tables of convents and by the porters of colleges. W. De Nelayer would have been called a "hustler" had his birth been delayed some three hundred years; for he soon extended his business to the printing of letter sheets with blank forms applicable to ordinary business among the inhabitants of larger towns, leaving spaces to be filled in with such special matter as might suit the writers object.

He evidently was ahead of his age for these slips and forms were not largely used, and his business soon died out.

In 1758 W. De Chamouset established a post system in Paris, the charge for postage being prepaid by stamps similar to those now in use. The government, however, seeing that there was money in it released him from the care of this business although it compensated him for the loss of income with an annual pension of twenty thousand Francs. But when the post came into the hands of the government, as the use of stamps did not necessitate enough red tape to keep the officials busy, the stamps soon fell into "ennocuous desultude" and were forgotten.

Notes on U. S. Stamps.

The so called reprints of the 1847 issue which were placed on sale by the Government when specimens were offered at the Centennial were nothing more or less than counterfeits, as they were printed from entirely new plates prepared and engraved by the Governmental bureau of printing.

How many collectors have noticed that the 2 center is of a lighter shade than when first prepared and also that specimens can be found on a trifle thicker paper than usual.

Why is it so few collectors make a study of the grills of the 1861-68 issue. Quite a little collection of the different varieties of size of grill can be found.

As a curiosity the writer recently obtained a 3 cent 1868 which was perforated to the same size as the 1869 issue. It is probably unique.

How many collectors are aware that the 3 cent 1871 issue can be found on a fine ribbed paper. Specimens are rather scarce, to be sure, but not so much so that they should be fairly well known to collectors.

Again the hero ideal of the gallant 306 of the Chicago Convention of 1880 is to be complemented by having his Profile on our new Post-Cards. Surely if any historical personage should be thus honored Grant is preeminently the one.

Why should not the government prepare a special stamp or envelope for use of the World's Fair Commissioners. Certainly such a relic would be eagerly sought after by collectors.

There is about five or six hundred good stamps that comes from the various European nations.

Why Brazil Used Tobacco Stamps.

Brazil, though separated from England by the Atlantic Ocean, was the second to follow her example in the adoption of postage stamps, and a decree of Nov. 29, 1842 ordered their creation.

It was the design of the head of the postal department to reproduce as in England the features of the sovereign, but the director of the mint had a very highly developed bump of reverence and the idea of reproducing this emperiors features upon a common postage stamp is backed him so much that he made representations to that effect in a letter dated February 13, 1843. His delicate sensibilities were respected, and the first stamps of Brazil closely resembled parts of our Tobacco stamps having a large figure upon an oval of intricate engraving, even the reverence for Kings, and at present the portrait of his Brazilian Magistry beames upon his subjects from beautiful stamps printed in two colors. My Idea of a True Phil.

E. H. WILKINSON.

Nearly every Philatelic paper we pick up contains an eulogy on some person who has a very large collection. These articles are often the cause of a great number of mistakes made by a beginner.

A beginner, perusing such an article, will naturally think that all that is necessary for him to become a Philatelist, is to have a large collection. He will think that it does not matter whether the stamps he obtains are genuine or counterfeit, or whether they are torn, or a good specimen in fact, that it makes no difference what kind of stamps he has, so he has a large number of varieties.

Of course, I do not mean to say that to be a Philatelist, you must not have a large collection, but I do say that to be a true Philatelist, in the stricter sense of the word, a person must not collect merely with the desire to get a large collection, but he must take enough interest in his collection to throw out all counterfits, reprints, and such rubbish, and only retain the genuine stamps.

If he is a true Philatelist, he will usually have some speciality. If there is a certain stamp lacking in a set, he will not be satisfied until he has obtained that stamp, and when he has obtained it, it will be a source of great pride and joy to him. He will not purchase a stamp if it is torn, but will wait till he can obtain a good specimen. Each new stamp that he gets, he will carefully and neatly place in his album, not with the thought that it is mere-

ly one more variety added to his collection, but that it is a stamp he has long needed to complete or to help complete a certain set, or that is of a country of which he is especially desirous to obtain stamps as it is his speciality.

He will carefully study his stamps, and perhaps once in a while, he will find some difference in the design, or some new variety of paper or shade which has not been noticed before.

On the other side, a person who merely collects stamps to see how many varieties he can obtain, is not a Philatelist. He may be called a stamp collector, but certainly not a Philatelist. I know a collector in this city who has this idea. He has about 800 varieties, and one of Scotts small albums, which contains space for about 1000 stamps. This collector does not care whether the stamps he gets are genuine or counterfeit. His main desire is to fill his album. When he gets the space allotted in his album to a certain country filled, he has no desire to get any more of that country.

He is one of that class of collectors who should not be designated as Philatelists, but only stamp collectors.

There is another class of collectors quite noticeable among the younger collectors. They collect only a few months, and then get tired of their collections, and sell them for a small sum. I do not think a person who collects other articles besides stamps is a true Philatelist.

Past and Present of the Postage Stamps.

CONTINUED.

SARDINIA WAS NEXT.

November 7- 1818 Sardinia issued some Postal paper of three values, which could be procured at post-offices and from Tobacco dealers who received a commission upon their sales. This paper was but little used and was withdrawn in 1836. One very probable reason why it did not find more favor with the people and the great masters was its lack of beauty. A Boy, whose only clothing was a tin horn riding upon a fiery mustang, did not make a very artistic postage stamp.

SPAIN GOES INTO THE POSTAGE STAMP BUSINESS.

After France, Spain was the next country to use postage stamps, their use being authorized by a royal decree of December 7 1716. This allowed the secretaries to the Crown Prince, etc., etc., to have the privilege of impressing in ink upon letters, addressed to other authorities a seal bearing royal arms of Castile and Leon, which would pass their letters free. It is probable that some of the secretaries to the Crown, etc., etc., used this official stamp to save postage on letters to their sweet-hearts and friends; for about eighty years later notice was given that stamps mentioned in the decree of 1716 were to be used only for letters concerning public business. These official stamps remained in use until the beginning of the present century. To be continued.

STAMPS OF BRAZIL

In 1843 the Empire of Brazil issued their stamps, viz.: 30, 60 and 90 reis black. The figures were large and in oval. Size of stamps 1 3-16x1 1-16 inches. unperforated.

1844-46 seven more were made size $\frac{7}{8} \times \frac{3}{4}$ inches, they were printed on white paper with black viz 10, 30, 60, 90, 180, 300 and 600 reis, black, unperforated.

In 1850 a set of eight were issued, size $\frac{7}{8} \times \frac{3}{4}$ inches, unperforated printed with black on white paper, they were 10, 20, 30, 90, 180, 300 and 600 reis.

1854-61 stamps same design but slight changes in color. New ones issued, viz. 10r blue, 30r blue, 280r red, 430r yellow.

In 1866 a set of 12 were issued same as before only perforated.

In the same year 8 more were issued with head of Dom Pedro II in circles ovals, and squares, perforated.

10r vermilion.	20r lilac.
50r blue.	100r green.
80r violet.	200r black.
20r brown.	

300 Reis was issued in 1878.

In 1876 seven more stamps were issued, same as last only rouletted instead of perforated, new values added, viz.

10r vermilion,	20r lilac,

500r orange.	} Size of stamp $1 \frac{1}{8} \times \frac{3}{4}$ in.

In 1878-79 a set of ten more were issued, with heads of ruler in center. Brazil above head and value in figures and words at bottom. In this 10, 20, 50, 300 and 700 reis the value is in figures in

corners, rouletted.

In 1881-82 four similar stamps were issued only smaller and perforated.

10r black, 100r olive, 50r blue, 200r blue.

In 1882-84 four more were issued like last.

50r blue, 200r cream, 100r olive, 200r pink.

1884-85 five more were issued lined ground.

100r orange, 100r olive, 100r

10r orange, 100r cream,

20r olive.

In 1887 three more were issued.

50r blue, 100r blue.

100r blue.

ENVELOPES.

In 1867 were issued four stamped envelopes with head of Dom Pedro II in oval Brazil above value in words at bottom and in figures at sides of head.

100r black, 300r vermilion,

200r black, 300r vermilion (on buff paper.)

—Addenda—

1888-89 three more stamps were issued. The 100r is similar to that of 1885, but the numerals are on plain ground perforated as before they were.

100r reis lilac. 700r reis marvy,

1000r reis pearl gray.

The Stamps of Salvador

In 1867 the Government of Salvador issued four stamps. The stamps were $1 \times \frac{3}{4}$ inches, arms in oval, value in figures in corners and in words in ends. "Correos Del" above arms "Salvador" below arms. They were $\frac{1}{2}$ real blue, 3 reals green, 1 real vermillion, 4 " brown.

In 1874 the same stamps was surcharged "Contra Sello" and arms.

In 1879 there were issued five more stamps size $13-16 \times 1$ inch, with arms in oval in center. "Union Postal Universal" above oval "Republica Del Salvador." below oval; value in corners, they were.

1c green,	5c blue,
2c rose,	10 black,
20c violet.	

In 1887 two more were issued, arms in oval. "Salvador" above value at bottom in words, and at sides in figures in one the 10c "Servia Postal Del" Salvador, at top, value in words and figures at bottom.

3c brown, 10c orange.

1888 same as 1c green of 1887 (first) with heavy line over Salvador. Size $1 \times 1 \frac{1}{4}$ inches. 5c blue, arms in oval, "Servicio Del Salvador" above oval value in words at bottom and at sides in figures.

1890 four stamps were issued, "Servicia Del" at tops of stamps arms in oval "Salvador" above oval "America Central" below oval, 1890 at bottom of stamp, value in words at bottom of stamp and at sides in figures.

1c green,	3c yellow,	
2c brown,	5c blue.	AUT.

AN ANCIENT COLLECTOR.

Some twenty or thirty years ago there were very few people that had taken any interest in stamp collecting. (in U. S.)

There were some boys and girls that would try to see which could get the most stamps (common U. S.)

They would take old song books, almanacs or any kind of a book they could get and put all of the 1c stamps on one page. 2c on another etc., In one of these lots you would rarely find a stamp higher than a 12c the 24, 30 and 90c were found only in a few collectors in large places. One of those collections would contain many rare stamps now. Stamp collecting has rapidly improved and has been increased. (There were collectors in Europe long before any one in the U. S. had thought of it.)

A Lucky Purchase.

BY E. H. WILKINSON,

I suppose you have all heard of the auction sales of unclaimed packages by the Express companies. How one bidder would secure what appeared to be a valuable box, for a few dollars, and on opening his purchase find that it contained a dried up vine, or some other worthless article, and how a luckier person would obtain a valuable piece of property for a few cents.

The experience I had was of the latter class. It has always been a custom with me to attend the auctions of one of our large express companies. For a long while I saw nothing that caught my eye until one day in the spring of last year, I attended a sale in which a great number of packages were offered to the public. Several had been sold, when the auctioneer picked up a small package worthily tied up in brown paper with heavy cord, and about the size of an Inter-National Album. No one would offer any price what ever for it, until I bid five cents, more out of curiosity to see what it contained than otherwise. I soon had the package handed to me, no one raising my bid, a number of people crowded around me to see what my purchase contained. Tearing off

a corner of the paper around the package to my surprisid, I saw that I had some sort of a book. I left the crowd and went to my place of business. On removing the wrapper I found to my delight that I had a copy of one of the old issues of "Scotts International Albums." Opening it, almost the first thing I struck was a good sized sheet of the famous New York 3c blue, all being genuine and unused.

The spaces for United States stamps were nearly all filled, very few spaces being blank, and most of the stamps were unused. I remember the 1868 issue grilled, was complete and unused. Turning a few pages further I found a block of 4 of the Providence 10c black, unused, and an envelope with one of the 10c black 1847 general issue on it. The letter was addressed to:

I have it in my possession yet. U. S. Envelopes were not lacking in number & quality.

The First General Use OF POSTAGE STAMPS,

To Sir Rowland Hill are we indebted for the prepayment of letters by means of postage stamps. Among his other reforms he advocated most strenuously the prepayment of postage and suggested that the difficulties attending this might be obviated by using a bit of paper just long enough to bear the stamp, and covered at the back with a glutinous wash, which by applying a little moisture might be attached to the back of the letter. Of course his suggestion was opposed. Happily a stream of petitions poured into parliament urging this reform, and May 6th, 1840, it was adopted.

As soon as postage stamps were decided upon the government offered a prize of five hundred pounds for the best design and plan for the stamps, stating that the requirements were simplicity and facility in workings in combination with such

precautions as should prove effectual against forgery. Thousands of people wanted the five hundred pounds, Heath of London took the prize with a small but handsome design which was used until quite recently, the only change for years being in the color. There was also a prize offered for the best design for a stamped envelope.

This was won by Mulready, R. A., with a peculiar allegorical design, representing England sending out her winged letter angels, and these drawing the commerce of the world, by the side of the stamped envelopes and postage stamps of to-day this looks like work of antediluvian days.

"Honor to whom honor is due" and to England and Sir Rowland Hill should be given the honor of creating the postage stamps, which is now used by all civilized countries.

The stamps of Great Britain are printed at Somerset House, London.

Rare foreign were not lacking, these being old issues of New Brunswick, Brazil and many others.

In a large envelope at the back, I found about 300 stamps that the owner had evidently intended to mount. These were mostly common, with but a few good ones.

The Album had no name in it, and as enquiring at the express office failed to elect any information of the owner, so I concluded to keep it. The stamps were all glued down tight to the leaves, and I had to destroy the album before I could remove them, but I have most of the stamps yet. I think that the value of the stamps would come some place up in the thousands but as I neglected to value it until I had them scattered around and sold I can only form an approximate value of them.

I have attended several sales of differ-express company's since then, but I have never made as good a purchase as I did then. However, I am always watching for peculiar looking bundles, that appear to obtain stamps or envelopes. About two months ago, I was present at a sale, and there I purchased a small package of envelopes for 55 cents. It contained several 1847, 5 and 10 cent stamps on original envelopes, and a few of the 1851 issue. The greater number of the envelopes were from Germany, with stamps of small value on them.

Of course, in buying packages at such sales, you have to take the risk of their containing anything valuable. It does not pay to bid too high. I have seen persons bid several dollars for likely looking box-

es, and secure them upon opening them, one was found to contain several pamphlets on "Mormonism." Another contained a sample bottle of "Consumption Cure." and ather contained a bunch of dead grass. Once the auctioneer held up a box that seemed to contain a small tree or vine. He could get no one to bid on it and at last, becoming impatient, bid it to himself for 5 cents. The next day, on opening it, it was found to contain a "Folding clothes rack." Not very valuable, but well worth 5 cents.

Where are prices on U. S. Department als going to stop. It is only about a year ago when the wholesale price of the Executive Departmentals was \$8.50 and the average auction price 7.50 to 8.00 and now at the recent sale of S. B. Bradt two sets brought 10.50 and 1055 respectively.

I recently saw a curious thing in the 1870 3 center. The grill, or rather the GRILLS, for their was a distinct one in each corner was something unique. So also was the price wanted \$25.00

I recently obtained a Post Card of the present issue so cut that a portion of the stamp showed on both, the top and bottom of the card. Quite rare and curious.

A young girl pale and slim, but withal refined and beautiful, and in destitute circumstances, had been sent some \$20. from home and the letter containing it, owing to the improper direction, had not been received by her. Nearly three weeks had elapsed and the poor creature in despair had sought the postmaster's office, where in a frantic and excitable condition, she was ushered into my presence. After hearing her story I watched the electric button for a Messenger whom I sent to the delivery division to ascertain if such a letter had been received, and if so if it had been forwarded to the dead letter office; for," continued the secretary an accurate record is kept of every letter sent to that office. Soon the messenger returned with the letter, which I handed to the poor girl, with the remark that if she would open it I thought she would find her money. Her delicate white fingers nipped little pieces from the end of the envelope in rapid succession; her eyes gleaming with anxious expectancy, and as she caught sight of the green bills, she clasped her hands tightly over the envelope with its contents, and with tears streaming down her pale cheeks, exclaimed, God bless the postmaster. When she left there was not a dry eye in this room.

Notes on U. S. Stamps.

I recently received an albino, 2c on oriental buff. What is an albino? An envelope on which the stamp is impressed without any coloring matter.

There can be two complete sets of the war departmental stamps formed by those who are critical in shades. One will be of dull claret color and the other a pinkish brick red.

A nearly complete collection of India paper proofs of the private proprietary stamps was sold to E. B. Sterling for \$205 at the Mason Sale in 1887. This shows what some collectors think of proofs.

Among the latest finds in U. S. stamps is the five cent blue, head of Taylor grilled. It will probably rank the 30c of 1868, all over grill in point of rarity.

U. S. stamps are printed in sheets of 200

The Confederacy honored one of the Presidents of the U. S. which the U. S. never has, by placing his portrait on one of their stamps James K. Madison.

The original designs of the 1869 issue included one which represented the surrender of Burgoyne, but fear of offending our British cousins caused its rejection. This essay is one of the rarest of all our unadopted designs.

CONTINUED.

THE RUSSIAN BEAR BEGINS TO USE POSTAGE STAMPS.

Russia introduced the use of postal envelopes in 1845. These bore the imperial arms in a circle and were of four values only.

Adhesive postage stamps were first used in Russia in 1857, and have passed through several series. The issue of 1864 was very beautiful, combining elegance and simplicity in a marvelous manner.

The Russian provinces of Finland, Livonia, and Poland, by royal favor, were permitted to issue stamps, but they were much inferior in elaborate execution to those of the empire. The Polish stamps are now obsolete, having been superseded by those of Russia proper.

Young collectors many times find it a hard task to properly arrange and identify their United States stamps, without the aid of an illustrated catalogue. It seems it is against the law of the United States to print a picture or cut of its stamps. This law is not enforced in other countries. I recently had the pleasure of examining a late edition of an English catalogue. In it were perfect illustrations of all kinds of United States stamps and it also contained illustrations of English stamps. Thus it seems that there is no such law in England.

A party in Newark, N. J. purporting to be a dealer and having an extensive foreign correspondence is sending out "imitation type written" letters offering to sell his list of foreign correspondents for \$2.00. This party has been exposed before, and collectors should give him the go-by.

Most persons do not know that the present railway mail service, like a number of other things, was an outgrowth of the war, and was just placed in operation upon the Chicago and Northwestern railroad between Chicago, Ill., and Clinton, Iowa., in June, 1864. The material drawn upon for the work was to a great extent the ex-soldiers of the war of the rebellion, and it is now acknowledged that without them the service could not have reached its high standard of efficiency. They were inured to hardships, accustomed to discipline industrious, faithful and as obedient at long range as under the eyes of

their officers. They were also found to be full of resources in emergencies, capable of seeing when improvements were desirable and of intelligently making valuable practical suggestions.

From a comparison of the gross receipts of these offices for the last two quarters of last year it is found that the gross receipt of eight of the offices not only have not increased but have fallen off. The results of the experiment are not therefore altogether encouraging.

Philatelic Wrinkles.

BY E. H. WILKINSON.

Revenue stamps were first issued by the U. S. Government in 1837.

Some authorities claim that the first Philatelic paper published was the Stamp Collectors Mercury. It was published in Boston in 1866.

A new branch of Philately was started some time ago. It is the collecting of entire sheets of stamps. Take Great Britain for instance. and it is easy to ascertain the sheet, by noting the letters in each corner of the stamp.

Nine philatelists out of ten are specialists. Which of us United States Collectors would not rather have a U. S. stamp that is not in our collection, than that of any other country. Show me one that would prefer the stamp to be from some other country, and I will show you ten that would prefer a U. S. stamp. Of course, this rule does not apply to beginners and boys.

I noticed in a newspaper an article entitled. "To fasten a stamp in an album." It says the best way to fasten a stamp in an album is to get a small strip of paper and gum it to the upper edge of the stamp then double it like a hinge and with a tiny drop of gum fasten the other end to the album. Surely the person who wrote that article must be "behind the times." If we were to follow the directions, by the time we had a collection of two or three thousand stamps mounted, we would be "sick of it."

How many collections contain the two sets of postage due stamps, the brown and red brown. It is safe to say that not over half of the U. S. collectors notice the difference, simply because, as some of them say, Scott does not catalogue any such difference; so why should we notice them. There is now another variety yet to be noticed, it being brighter than the other issues.

I notice an amusing mistake in Scotts 51st edition. In Spain, the 1859 issue under the 12c orange, he makes a note "This stamp was never in use," and then price it at \$1.00 new, and 10c Used.

Great Britain now has a special delivery service. It will be conducted on nearly the same plan as our service.

I noticed an article in a philatelic paper a short time ago, entitled "save up your U. S. stamps." It advises collectors to save all the common United States stamps they can get, and states that "the common one cent and two cent grow in value as much as the older issues." I think the author of the article is mistaken, as the one cent and two cent of this issue, or of the last issue will probably never be worth over a cent a piece, while some of the old issues increase in value every year.

In the last number of Mekeels Weekly, I notice that Bosnia and Herzegovina will be annexed to Austria in 1892. If this is so, it will be a good plan to obtain all of the stamps of these countries you can, as there is sure to be a rise in the prices.

I recently received a registered letter with a ten cent green on which was quite an oddity, about two thirds of it was green while the rest of it was blue. I do not think it was changed by acid, because it is on the envelope, and the color is bright.

A BEGINNER.

A young philatelist or "beginner" has some queer ways. He or she which ever it may be sees an "ad" in some weekly story paper the "Golden Days" for instance in generally puff of small dealers "ads" of 50 or 100 stamps 10c etc., They

immediately send for it but when it arrives in most cases there are but eight or ten different stamps, while the rest is made up of various stamps such as Gt. Britain 1881 Post & Rev. or Bavaria 10pf rose etc. Such stamps do a collector no good. If they would pay a little higher price and get of a large and responsible dealer they should expect good stamps.

I can remember the first packet I bought several years ago. It read similar 50 var. foreign stamps from Mexico, Ceylon etc., 12c. A— Kye, New York. I sent for it but when it come what was in it 1 1c Mexico green 1886 and 1 5 cent brown Ceylon 1886, the rest were as described above. I would advise young collectors to let an advanced collector help them along with their collection. AUT.

POSTAGE STAMPS IN THE UNITED STATE.

Congress, in 1845, authorized the use of postage stamps, but it was not until 1847 that the payment of postage in cash, sometimes by the sender and sometimes by the receiver of the letter, was superseeded by postage stamps.

Third Assistant Post-master General Hazen gives this short history of the use of postage stamps in the United States.

"In 1847 the first stamps were issued. They were of the denominations of five and ten cents. The five cent stamp had a picture of Ben Franklin, and the ten cent stamp the head of Washington as the principle figure in the design.

Those heads have continued to adorn the postage stamps of our country from that day, to this. The stamps first issued were a little larger than those now in use.

In 1851 the carrier system was introduced in all large cities, and stamps of peculiar design, costing one cent each, and known as carriers' stamps, were issued for the purpose of providing prepaid delivery.

In that year the letter postage was reduced to three cents and the old brick dust red three cent stamp came in. At the same time the issue was enlarged to eight stamps the largest denomination being ninety cents.

The portrait of Jefferson was introduced on the five cent stamp, but the other seven bore the heads of Washington and Franklin in different designs. These stamps were the most popular ever issued.

POSTAGE STAMPS

IN THE UNITED STATES *Continued.*

The new three cent stamp issued in 1861 was of a bright red. It was almost as popular as its predecessor. At that time the three cent stamp was the popular stamp or the one most in use, and not the two cent stamp as now. The light red stamp remained in use until 1869, when there was a decided change in the design of the entire issue. The new stamps were square instead of oblong, and many of them were printed in two colors, the central design being in one tone and the border in another. The principle figure in each design was in almost every instance a representation of some mode of carrying the mails instead of the head of some departed statesman.

The three cent stamp was printed in blue, and the principle figure in the design was a locomotive. That issue of stamps lasted ten months.

The people clamored so against them that in 1870 a return was made to the old designs, which were printed, however, in different colors.

The three cent stamp was then made green with the head of Washington in the center of the design.

That stamp is of such recent sale that its design is familiar to everyone.

A great many of them were stored in old cash boxes, and stamp boxes, and occasionally we find them on letters received at this office.

The green three cent stamp which was adopted in 1870 continued in use longer than any of its predecessors. It was used until October, 1s, 1883, and it might continued in use much longer had not Congress reduced the rate of letter postage to two cents.

Under the new law a brown two cent stamp was issued. It continued in use until 1887, when its color was changed to the objectional green.

Notes & Comments.

BY E. W.

We have seen some of the Exchange books of the S. of P. and, although they contained many good stamps, there were a number of counterfits in each book. They also contained a great many common foreign that are of no use whatever. The bylaws should be observed, and no counterfits be placed on the sheets. In one book I noticed several of the counterfit Roman States, & some counterfit Mexico. Otherwise, apart from having a number of common European on, they present a very neat appearance, & the method used in putting up & sending out the books is a very good one.

It is my opinion that too little attention is given to the collecting of Auction Sale catalogues. As they are without doubt one of the most essential parts of your Philatelic Library, if you have one, and if you do not have one, you should

keep several copies of the catalogues above mentioned, on hand for reference. These are the only medium by which philatelists can find the proximate value of many varieties which are not priced in the regular, standard catalogues. If your copy is not priced, borrow one from a friend, that is and place the prices in your own for future reference. You will find it will be of good use to you.

I see in some paper, that Sierne Leone means "The mountain of the Lion," and Monteuogro signifies "Black Mountain."

Our juvenile collectors should be grateful that they live in an era when there is plenty of philatelic papers a good part of them with able editors and contributors to tell him what to collect, and what to refuse, how to collect and how to put them in the most suitable album. I say a good part of the papers have able editors, of course there are number of papers that have editors of no experience or ability. Quite often the average beginner results being considered an idiot; and thinks that he knows a thing or two himself, and goes on collecting just what he pleases and how he pleases. He had better take the advice proffered him, or he will soon find himself swindled out of his money, and have his collection half full of counterfits.

"The experiment of having free delivery in small towns is not satisfactory, in several of the offices the receipts have fallen off. Congress appropriated \$10,000, at last session, for making this experiment."

The above was seen in a philatelic paper, and the following in another.

"Mr. Wanamaker is pleased with the results of his experiment in small towns with a free delivery. In every case, the delivery of mail by carriers, who also collected as they went around, has been followed by increased receipts at these offices, and though in some cases the increase is not sufficient to pay the expenses of free delivery, it is very likely that the experiments will be followed by a very considerable increase in the number of free delivery offices." I rather think that the last article is right.

Druggists that sell postage stamps are not all the purely benevolent person that the general public may take them to be. Many concerns dealing in small inexpensive articles, and those that have a large mail trade, take in thousands of dollars worth of stamps every year, and sell them to the druggists and others. As a consequence the druggist may make a neat profit on his retail sale of the same stamps.

The first Post-office in the Colonies was established in 1710 by act of Parliament. During the Revolution this department was controlled by Congress.

How rare the tax stamps used by England when our 13 colonies were first formed, for placing on papers, tea, etc., to show there was a tax on these articles. I doubt if one collector out of a thousand ever owned one of these, and would have considered himself lucky to ever have seen one.

All philatelists wonder why the English Colonies which put the Portrait of Queen Victoria, do not use the Portrait as it is today. But whether it is to save expense or to flatter their sovereign, there is very few that do. Canada uses it on her revenues, and Newfoundland also uses it.

The Mexico last issue, officially sealed, is a queer looking stamp. At first glance one would think it was a counterfeit, or something like. The gum is generally a yellowish color, looking like common mucilage.

The collecting of Mexican Revenues seems to be becoming quite popular, as an example of their quick sale, a dealer here bought 500 and sold them in less than a week, in small lots. Next thing we will want, will be Canadian Revenues and then, all revenues. It seems that some collectors think that the philatelic field is not large enough, and they want something more to collect. We surely have enough to collect now. The U. S. has several hundred varieties of revenues, which is enough for the average philatelist.

I have seen several philatelic Libraries that contained a number of half amateur and half philatelic papers, & several Coin & stamp papers. Let us throw these out, they are simply a disgrace to our collection, and are of no benefit to us whatever. If you are going to form a Library, place in it only the best papers, and you will have a library to be proud of.

THE STAMPS OF HAYTI

BY W. P. TODD.

In the Sep number of the One Dime, I saw a piece entitled 'The Stamps of Hayti' it only gave them through the 1887 issue, and I am going to finish it the 1891 issue had 4 varieties as follows:

1 Vermilion	3 Blue
2 Purple	5 Green.

All of this set staid in issue until 1891, except the 2c purple, and in 1890, they became short. So they surcharged the 3c blue across the face with red surcharge, and it said "Denx 2 cents" In 1891 the whole set of 1887 went out and a entirely new design came in, that was made in Paris. The new design had the arms of Hayti, with a palm tree surmounted by a Phrygian cap, and the numbers in the top corners only with the word "cent" between the two numbers, the new issue do not have the numbers of the stamps in letters as in 1887, and under the arms of Hayti they had the words, "Republique D'Hayti." And at first they only issued the following which were issued about Jan. 1st. 1891. 1c violet: 1c rose: 2c blue. But about July they issued 2 more of the same design as follows. 3c gray: 5c yellow. The size of the new issue are the same as that of 1887, $\frac{1}{2}$ x1 inch.

The catalogue of the third Auction Sale of A. R. Rogers, N. Y. has been received. It is very neatly arranged, the cover being especially attractive. On the inside is a portrait of Mr. Rogers. The catalogue has been revised by some of our best authorities. There are many varieties catalogued not usually noticed for sale. One of the best noticed is the St. Louis 20c, Die B. the reserve price being \$600. It is said but four of these stamps are in existence, and that it is the rarest American Postage Stamp.

BIRMINGHAM, Conn., Dec. 1st, 1891—

The United States government has not paid Albert Daggett for postal cards for some time because he has failed to supply the demand made upon his factory for the new cards.

These cards were to have been issued July 1, Inspector Newton says, but were not, and on September 10 the government notified him that payment would be withheld until the contract was filled. The sub-agencies at St. Louis and Chicago were supplied, but the reserve supply here was not up to the required amount and issuance of the new cards could not be made on that account. The other cards are all right. Daggett says that scarcity of stock has prevented his fulfilling the contract.

Philatelic Wrinkles.

BY E. H. WILKINSON.

There are over 100,000,000,000 pieces of mail matter posted every day throughout the world.

The "Weekly," still turns up. It is now in its second volume. Two other "Weeklys" have turned up, one devoted to Ornithology & Oology, the other partly to stamp collecting.

Some of the collectors in Nebraska are agitating the question of forming a state club, and to run it on about the same plan as the S. of P. They propose to admit only collectors living in the state.

And now it is new cards. The stamps are bad enough, but the cards,— Oh my! The largest is a dirty brown color, or something about as bad. The smallest is not quite so bad, but still——.

Auction sales are all the rage now. It is the ambition of every dealer to give one. Even collectors try to auction off their collections. A collector recently advertised to auction off his "large" collection of foreign & U. S. stamps of 1800 varieties. Among the "rarities" noticed, was one said to be worth 85 cents.

The best thing that a would-be stamp paper publisher can do is to sit down and give the matter some thought before he decides to issue a paper. The issuing of one or two numbers, or even three or four numbers, does more harm to philately

than many think. It is impossible to make a paper pay on the start and to give satisfaction to its readers and advertisers—

The law against removing stamps from mail matter in transit is strict. The fine is \$100, or imprisonment for six months. A clerk at the Lincoln, Neb. P. O. was recently arrested for removing foreign stamps from letters as they came in. His arrest was caused by a collector, who became annoyed at receiving all his foreign letters without any stamps on them, as some of them would be quite rare. The clerk is not a collector himself, but he sold the stamps to collectors in the city.

Ask almost any philatelic publisher if it pays to publish a philatelic paper and he will almost invariably reply that it does not. The writer never attempted to publish a paper, and so does not know for certain just how much it would take to publish and mail one edition of a paper with 1500 circulation, but it certainly seems as though some of the publishers must be a little mistaken. The advertisements in one month's edition of a paper, whose circulation was said to be about 1000 copies per month, amounted to \$213.25, at the publishers rates. This was without counting in the amount paid for subscriptions. It does not seem possible that the cost of one edition for 1000 copies came to nearly this amount. Another paper of the same circulation taken, the advertisements amounted to \$149.50. The last named was a small uncovered paper. The average amount for five small papers taken was \$55.50, and the average for five larger, 16 page, papers, was over \$100. This without allowing anything for subscriptions. 25c per year from each subscriber surely ought to pay the cost of printing.

The New Postal Subsidy Act.

BY J. HENRY THOMAS.

One of the best and most recommended bill, that the Fifty-first Congress drew up and passed, was the adoption of a certain Congressional members bill, known as "The Subsidy Bill." Which also passed through the Senate, the members of which, could easily see, what an immense good, such an act, could do for the benefit of American, (United States) shipping. The President's signature was not long in following, on this bill, after having passed through both Houses; who, acting under the directions of his (the President's Secretary of State, came to the same conclusion, as the Senate had, regarding the benefits United States meantime circlose would deprive from the passage of such an act.

Perhaps many of my readers, do not understand what this article speaks of, so for their benefit, I will try to explain This Bill to them, and make it as clear as possible.

The English Government, and in fact, most all of the European Governments have been in the habit of paying annual tributes to its favorite Steamship Lines, running steamers under their flag, under the pretense of paying so called Mail Subsiders, for which, the Steamship Co's steamers must carry the mails, and be built, according to the requirements of their respective Governments, so that in the pretense case of war, the officials

would equip these vesels as transports, coast defencers or put them to any use required; the Company possessing the steamships so used, would receive a small comepasation. The most heavily subsidized Steamship Co. to day, is the Cunard Line of Liverpool.

It has always been the desire of our Government, to have our mails carried on steamers, carrying our flag, and of our Steamship Lines, but it was impossible to operate a steamship line to a foreign port, with a foreign line to compete, they received a financial aid from their Governments, while our line did not. But now, by the passage of this Subsidy Bill, which allows an annual subsidy, of a special sum of money, for every mile traversed in a passage from port to port, to United States, having their steamships built in the United States, flying our flag and being named by our citizens, let us hope in the near future we can have our mail cross the ocean in our own vessels and our flag. May this Bill, be the means to restore our shipping, to its former position, as mistress of the sea.

Official Stamps of the U. S.

The U. S. Government in 1873 issued for the Executive, Justice, State, Navy, Agriculture, Post Office, Interior, Treasury, and War Departments stamps for letters and packages.

The Executive Dept. has only five stamps color: carmine, the denominations are 1, 2, 3, 6 and 10 cents.

These stamps command higher prices than other Dept's stamps.

The Justice Dept. has ten stamps of a purple hugh. 1, 2, 3, 6, 10, 12, 15, 24, 30, & 90 cents.

The designs of the Department stamps are same as common U. S. and having same heads etc.,

color green. The 2, 5, 10, & 20 dollar denominations are black and green with profile of stuart. These stamps are rare.

The Navy Dept. has issued twelve beautiful blue stamps.

There is one error among the lot which is 2c green instead of blue, which commands high value.

Agricultural Dept. has nine yellow stamps same size and design as others. values ranging from 1c to 90 cents.

The Post Office Dept. has both adhesive and envelope stamps.

The adhesives numbers ten color black with large figure of value in center.

This is the only Dept. that has this kind of stamps. The envelopes number fourteen. Issued from 1873 to 1878 on lemon and white paper. This Dept. has also stamps for letters in "Dead Letter

Office" and "Due" stamps. There are four "Officially Seals" the first issued in 1872 is the largest stamp used in the U. S. for postage, color green.

In 1877 a smaller brown stamp was issued ground work "Post Obitum," another stamp like above was issued in 1879 only ground work was of "Lithographed"

In 1888 another one was issued like the 1879 only lithographed brown.

There are seven varieties of "Unpaid or Due" stamps 1, 2, 3, 5, 10, 30 and 50 cents color brown.

The Dept. of Interior has a set of ten stamps color vermilion, and values ranging from 1 to 90 cents. Stamp of same design and head of common adhesives.

The "Treasury Dept" has a set of ten brown stamps, price ranging from one to 90 cents.

The War Dept. has more stamps than any other department. It also has envelopes.

The adhesive number eleven and are red in color while the envelopes number forty, color light red, and dark red, printed on white, manila, amber, cream, orange, fawn and blue paper.

The Justice Dept. stamp are marked "Specimen" in gum near bottom. A.C.T.

STAMPS OF THE UNITED STATES.

There are but very few stamps as interesting as those of the United States.

The first stamp was issued by the New York postmaster in 1842-43-44-45. Baltimore, Brattleboro, Millbury, Providence and New Haven postmasters in 1846. St. Louis in 1847. Carrier stamps in 1849 & 1851.

In 1847 the Government issued two stamps.

5c brown (Franklin)

10c black (Washington)

they were printed on both blue and white paper.

In 1851 were printed a set of 5 stamps, with various heads in oval. U S in upper corners and were unperferated.

They were:

1c blue (Franklin)

3c red (Washington)

5c brown (Jefferson)

10c green (Washington)

12c black (Washington)

3 more were printed in 1856 the first two like last, but last one has head in square instead of oval, they were:

24c lilac Washington

30c Orange Franklin

90c blue Washington.

In 1856-60 stamps same as previous issue only perforated as follows:

1c blue Franklin

3c red Washington

3c red Washington with outer lines (error.)

5c brown Jefferson

5c red brown "

5c brown Jefferson with orn'al cut off

10c green Washington

12c black "

24c lilac "

30c orange Franklin

90c blue Washington.

Again they say that it is nothing but the play of boys and will soon die out. Witness that they never attack hard-shelled geologists with their hammers and curiosity. They never mention the time and trouble spent in gathering daisies and pressing them with hot irons. Anybody who will stop to think about it will deny the statement that it is child's play and will soon die out. The hundreds of papers devoted to our science, the number of dealers, and the one hundred thousand philatelists rise up & denounce the assertions.

Stamps were first issued in 1840, since then there has risen one hundred thousand philatelists to cry shame on the people who defame our study. Many argue that inquisitive and tapping geologists, pressers and hot-ironers of daisies have done the world a great deal of good. May be so, who denies it? But a school boy with his album and five hundred stamps will tell you more about the size, area, and population of a country than your

Many people spend hundreds of dollars upon gold lace for their hats and gold buttons for their coats, which are only for show and do not teach anything. These same people with a tenth part of the before mentioned money could start a stamp collection which would teach them more than ten of "Capt. Mayn Reid's" book could.

Children frequently spend five or ten cents for candy, which usually brings a doctor. With the same amount of money the children could start a collection which would teach them reading, geography, and lots of general knowledge.

Give us then our due and allow our young science to grow to the beauty of man-hood and age.

Notes and Comments.

E. H. WILKINSON.

The Essex County Philatelist for Feb. contains an article on a "Philatelic Fund" that, if I am not mistaken, appeared in some of our Philatelic Papers several months ago, and is therefore rather stale. The paper will probably contain some good articles before long, however, as the editor is offering prizes for the best articles on philately sent him.

A number of philatelic frauds have turned up recently. There is the one London, and the more recent case in St. Louis. A Spaniard who claims his name to be Fernandez, but is really Jaeger, Torres, and who claimed to be from Madrid, Spain, sold a party in Texas about \$200 worth of bogus Spain, and received a lot of rare old Confederates in payment. He was arrested in St. Louis on March 4th. He denied having any counterfeits in his possession, but upon searching his trunk, it was found to be overflowing with dangerous counterfeits of the early issues of Spain. Mekeels News contained a long article about the matter.

J. C. All mentions in Mekeels News that "a young man from somewhere down south, - - - - , left a good many dollars worth of Confederate stamps behind him, not in the hands of the dealers, but with those other villains, pickpockets." Does he mean Luhn, editor of Southern Philatelist?

The Southern Philatelist does not come up to the usual high standard, for February. It contains a number of advertisements, and a good share of them are the Southern Stamp & Publishing Co's ads, however.

Why is it a collector can never obtain a fifth as much for his collection, when he wants to sell, as he has paid for it. I have seen a collection that contained some really good stamps, and that cost the owner over \$100. offered for sale, and the highest offer he could get for it was \$15.

Also this certain town was greatly inhabited by Sea captains who would be gone away for about 3 or 4 months and of course a great deal of correspondence would be going on between them and their families.

Well he secured these stamps and at last had a very large collection of stamps I was told by him that the Pony express, and pony mail carriers, and dove dispatch was very plentiful, he says this album is at his old home in Maine and that he is going to write for it, what pleasure it will be for me to peruse those rarities of over 30 years of age over and over never tiring and all brought about by an Old Philatelist. Philatelic News.

The Spy Glass and the Eagle Philatelist are now one. The name of the latter is retained and the consolidation of these two papers has made a fine philatelic magazine although both of them were formerly good.

The Government recently ordered the Scott Stamp & Coin Co., to cease using cuts of U. S. stamps etc for the purpose of illustrating catalogues etc.

We hear that the price of Scotts 52nd edition catalogue has been increased to 50 cents.

It is now a crime in France and Germany to imitate postmarks and surcharges.

Some of the South & Central American countries are to have new issues of stamps this year to commemorate the Discovery of America in 1492.

A collector recently found a stamp(?) which is printed on strong thin paper bearing the following United States of America, exchange, No. 3537. at the right hand end the letter "R" was printed. The stamp is about $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches long and $\frac{3}{4}$ in. wide and is perforated. Can any one give any information concerning it?

The company charges no fee for the purchase of stamps but expects to make money by the advertising in the small books which the stamps are in. These little books contain much interesting matter besides the advertising and the company thinks the offer will prove a success.

Philatelic Pencilings.

It has not been decided as yet whether the Government, will issue a new set of U. S. stamps in 1893 in commemoration of The Worlds Fair, or not.

The Cincinnati, Postoffice, has been favored recently with canceling machines, they are said to cancel 90,000 letters or postal cards per hour.

I had recently the opportunity to gaze at something unusual in { the postage stamp line } it was an ordinary 1870, 3ct green U. S. stamp, embodied in a small case or locket and suspended for a gentlemen's watch charm, thus making it

rather showy but neat watch charm. Probably the owner was interested in stamp collecting.

Much interest has been taken in U. S. stamps, this year, now that there is an album made and designed especially for this grade of stamps, it is thought that it will cause a boom, in the way of collecting U. S. stamps, many collectors have dropped out from collecting foreign stamps but follow up the pursuit of Philately by collecting the U. S. issues.

A Cincinnati Saving's Bank, issues a 5c stamp in two colors red and blue, they are a little larger in size than the 1888 issue 5c blue, and in the middle of the stamp is the word canceled and at the head of the stamps the name, Nickel Savings Society of Cinti. These stamps are not used for mailing purposes, only as deposits for the members of the society or bank.

Varieties in U. S. Stamps.

Written For "One Dime."

BY "WOLVERINE."

Among the stamps of our own country there are many which are found in several shades. It is curious that so many collectors fail to collect these oddities. Few collections contain the two sets of due stamps, brown and red brown, and the red and light red of the War Dept. In the Post Office Dept, stamps two colors are found, the black and the dark green. All of these are distinct shades and should be collected.

The two cent stamps, 1872 appear in two colors, brown and dark brown. The ten cent of the same issue has two colors. There is a rare error in the 4c slate 1883. Most of these stamps are green but once in awhile a distinct slate colored one is found.

Some of the Treasury department stamps have been printed on pink paper but they are very rare. The 3ct 1856 has three shades, one being nearly black. In the 2c present issue, several shades are found.

No collector is foolish when he collects these varieties. He must collect for himself and if he wishes to advance in Philately he must study up these oddities and errors. He will then very likely obtain many treasures as a reward for diligence and may not have to expend much money for them either.

most all advanced collectors collect errors and oddities. There was a time when fun was made of people who collected the varieties of the 5c, 1861, but now the ones who thought it was foolish are sorry they did not get all the "five centers" they could. It was the same way with the grilled stamps, but now these bring big prices when they are sold. As the "hobby of hobbies" advances, collectors should collect oddities and errors as readily as they would the regular stamps.

As seen by the "Philatelic Fraud Reporter" there are about as many frauds now days as there ever was, and probably more. This is one of the worst drawbacks to an enjoyment of philatelic life.

Anniversary of Postage Stamp.

The postage stamp will celebrate its fifty-second anniversary on May 6. Its invention is due to a printer, James Chalmers, of Dundee, Scotland, who died in 1853. England, fifty-two years ago, introduced the new system of preparing letter postage, and, according to a decree of Dec, 21, 1839, issued the first stamps which were to be put before the public on may 6 of the following year.

A year later they were introduced in the United States and Switzerland, and within three years had become common in Bavaria, Belgium and France. One of the most important and valuable collections of postage stamps and other postal devices in the world is in the German imperial postoffice museum at Berlin,— St, Louis Republic,

Philatelic Breezes.

A new paper partly devoted to philately will shortly appear from Richmond, Va. John F. Weckert is the publisher.

The series of portraits appearing in the "Philatelic Journal of Great Britain" of the London stamp dealers are excellent. Why don't some New York paper publish biographies and photos of the leading N. Y. dealers?

The Iowa Philatelic Association is the latest. It already numbers forty-two members, "The Eagle Philatelist" is the official organ.

A convention of the postmasters of the first class offices has recently been held Washington D. C. A number of resolutions recommending changes in postal laws were adopted. It was recommended that postal Notes in fractions of \$1. be issued. It was also recommended that postmasters be permitted to employ persons to test carrier routes to ascertain if letter carriers loiter. A proposition was adopted for the establishment of separate corps of collectors of mails and the exemption of Union soldiers and sailors from civil service examinations for such purpose. A resolution was adopted that postmasters be required to return to senders all second, third and fourth class matter, indorsed to be returned, the senders agreeing to pay return postage. The bills pending in Congress relegating paper-bound books to the third class and re-

stricting the distribution of sample copies of newspapers and periodicals were indorsed. An enlarged size of stamped envelope for the special delivery service was recommended. The postmaster General was urged to make a liberal appropriation for a post office at the World's Fair. It was the sentiment of the convention that the bounds now required of postmasters are excessive, and that corporate security should be allowed to all bounded employes. **FELIX.**

An innovation contemplated by the Postoffice Department is the tubular post. Before very long it is expected that all cities and large towns in the United States will have systems of Pneumatic tubes for transmitting mail. This method has proved most successful in London, Paris and elsewhere. Collections are made half-hourly, the metal carriers traveling at the rate of fifty miles an hour or more. The cost of a tubular message in Paris is ten cents; in Vienna, six cents. Plants of this description are expensive but the business pays well. Some years ago a tube was constructed underground between the capital at Washington and the Government Printing office. It was big enough to shoot a man through and was intended for the transmission of bundles of documents. Owing to faulty construction it has never worked. FELIX.

The following is going the rounds of the press which I have notice in several News papers of late. It is headed A BOY SWINDLER who is held in Boston for working the mails for Fraudulent Exchanges. Boston Mass April 18th Wm H Cozzens, whose father said he was but

16 years old has been held for trial by United States Commissioner Hallet. He is charged with having worked the mails for fraudulent exchanges in all classes of goods, principally stamps and bicycles.

The young prisoner has been a very skilful operator in four different towns. He advertised in boy's papers as B W King at Framingham, E B Atwood at Medfield, Charles B Purdy at Natick and Henry Hartson at South Framingham & offered to exchange all kinds of articles for stamps from &1 to \$6 in value or for other goods. He received remittances from all over the country. Some of them as far west as Iowa and from North to Mich, even to the Gulf States. When he got the stamps it is charged that he did not remit the articles he promised.

Of The H. P. S.

1. Individual members may belong to either the Exchange or Sale Department if so desired. Members wishing to participate in the Exchange Department must circulate sheets therein; but any member may participate in the Sale Department.

2. If the manager of a branch Society will give a special agreement to the Society for the payment of stamps taken, and return a full report of all stamps taken, and the said agreement shall be signed by at least four members of the branch who are over twenty-one years of age, and certified to be worth such a sum as the Exchange Superintendent finds necessary, the members of such a branch may participate in the Exchange Department.

3. All members of the Sale Department who do not remit promptly will be excluded from the circuit, and their names shall be listed by the Official Collector in the Official Organ. All members of the Exchange Department will be dropped from the circuit who do not forward Exchange books or sheets three days from receipt of them.

4. Each member of the Exchange Department shall at least twice a year, about June 25 and December 25, select from sheets or sheet to be sent him by the Exchange Superintendent stamps to the amount that is due him by members for

stamps taken by them belonging to him, unless the Exchange Superintendent sends cash.

5. Any member removing a stamp from an exchange sheet or book must write the name plainly on the space from which the stamp is taken. If one of these is without name or stamp, it shall be the duty of the next member to notify the previous one, and also the Exchange Superintendent. Failure to do so will make the last party responsible.

6. If members do not settle according to the terms of their contract, they will have the account against them given to the Official Collector for collection.

7. All stamps must be circulated on sheets or books to be obtained from the Exchange Superintendent.

8. Members must observe and carefully attend to the printed directions on the sheets or books if they wish to have their names remain on the circuit.

9. The Exchange Superintendent will not be responsible for sheets or books containing stamps that are lost in transit if not sent by registered letter or express.

10. Only stamps belonging to one member shall be forward to the Exchange Superintendent.

If the societies are consolidated there ought to be some like the S. of P. left to prepare the younger class for the high standing in future years, and if the S. of P. do have to take up with the "Sops" they may come out at the head yet and all there old good qualities right up to the standard.

A new letter box System.

BY WOLVERINE.

The Post Office department has recently favored the adoption of a new scheme which will soon be put to use in several large cities.

In places of about 100,000 population there are generally from 30 to 50 mail-carriers. According to the new system each house along the carrier's route is to have a letter box for the mailing and receiving of mail.

The government has designed a pattern of box and prefers that people obtain that kind but any way the box must be at the owner's expense.

The Gov't box is said to have an arrangement by which the carrier can see from the sidewalk whether there is any mail in it or not. If there is not, and there is no mail to be delivered there it saves him many steps.

Each carrier has a specified route and for the persons living on the route to adopt the new plan, there must be two thirds of them in favor of it, otherwise the mail is delivered in the old way.

More than half of the people don't have boxes now and when mail is delivered, in most places, it necessitates the ringing of the door bell etc. So that when the box system is brought into use it will be of great benefit to the householder, the carrier and the government.

Of course there will be many of the poorer class who will not wish to buy a box, but it is stated that they are not com-

pelled to purchase one, so that the scheme will probably be favored by a majority of the citizens.

What is the matter with philatelic serials? Several of the large and very correct journals don't like the idea of philatelic serial stories. Now of course, some of the "kid" papers are full of such things and appear ridiculous, there are many which contain scarcely anything else.

But the writer can see no reason why a good, well written story is amiss and I know that a great many philatelists would rather read one of these than one of the dry, long articles which are often found in some of the bulkier class of journals.

What collectors enjoy most is a paper in which there is news, articles on philatelic subjects, and sandwiched in with a readable serial.

Not that each and every number should have a story but that they should be put in occasionally. Such a paper is palatable, and a real benefit to collectors.

**OLD LETTERS.
BY CHAMBERLIN.**

The old letters written before the use of stamps are quite curious. I have a few that in place of a stamp has "Paid 10cts" written with pen in one corner.

They used no envelopes a large sheet of paper was written full, and folded until it was about three inches wide and six in length. When the ends were bent over, one was placed on the inside of the other and held in place with wax.

Judging by the dates of the letters a friendly correspondence consisted of one or two letters a year.

I suppose they thought they could not afford to write oftener. But they filled up the paper when they did write.

In those days post-marks were nearly all written. I have but one very old post mark, (about 1840) it is in red. The only printing is the name of the town and the day of the month on which it was mailed.

A Rare Philatelic Find.

When I stopped I swore that some ghost was watching the treasure of the trunk, as for treasure being in the trunk I had no doubts, I was bound to have the contents of that trunk so I boldly made up my mind to get the barn owners consent, I am glad to say I got the barn owners consent and so I went to the barn this time with no fears (it was day time). I once more entered the barn the same old scenes and views met my eyes but what struck me most was to see that the old trunk still stood in the corner in apparent good order, I approached the trunk which had caused so much trouble and worry, I took a careful survey of it before I went at it.

I produced my keys (all I had) and tried every one in the lock but the original key must have been a very funny shaped key judging from the looks of the key-hole & lock. I was sorry but my patients would not bear it no longer so I had to resort to an old hatchet near at hand to open the trunk up. Philatelic Pen Rushings.

Well, now that we are to have an Exhibit at the Worlds Fair, let those who have it in charge boom things and make the Philatelic Exhibit a success. We believe they will.

The new Columbian Envelopes appeared last month and are works of art. There will doubtless be a great rush for these and they will be collected in all shapes, entire, cut square, and round, (by the beginners). The paper of which the new envelopes are made appears to be of a better grade than that of the old issue.

Several of the metropolitan auction dealers have got things right down fine as regards the running of sales but we understand that a philatelist who is present at the sale may bid over somebody's mail bid, perhaps by only a cent and thus secure the lot. If this is true, it is not exactly fair for the mail bidder, as it is this class which ought to be accommodated. The collectors who are present at the sale should not be told any of the mail bids and should be allowed to cast but one bid on one lot, if a collector wants a certain lot, let him bid sufficiently high to secure it. Open up the mail bids last.

If you are a member of the H. P. S. a one inch ad in One Dime will cost you but 15 cents.

Notes and Comments.

Two stamps of the present issue which will rapidly rise in value after this issue has been superseded by the next, are the 6 and 15c. The 6c are already quoted at from 1 to 3c a piece used, and each month brings some advance. The 30 and 90c values will not advance much for some time to come. Probably no more than the same values of the 1872 issue. The 30 and 90c Due stamps promise to soon become scarce, as they are seldom used. Even now it is difficult to obtain good specimens, as most of the dealers hold all they can get, waiting for prices to move forward, and only disposing of heavily canceled or otherwise defaced. If these stamps go out of use entirely, as has been predicted by other writers, they will soon be among the unobtainable.

Among late issues of common stamps which will soon be scarce, may be noticed the used specimens of the Central American Seebeck issues. Used specimens of the first issue of Nicaragua and Salvador are now quoted by many dealers at almost double the prices they were placed at when issued. More especially is this noticeable among the high values. Unused stamps of these series do not rise to any great extent, but collectors can be certain they can never buy them at any lower prices than they are now offered at, as one of the stipulations made by Seebeck to dealers buying the of him is that they agree not to sell them any lower than the prices set by him.

It is proposed as a new method to exterminate philatelic frauds to publish an official list of the "dead beats" and to circulate it among all the dealers. There is no doubt but what this would protect the dealers first rate, but Low about the collectors. They would derive no particular benefit from it unless it was also circulated among them, which, however the originate of the scheme does not think necessary. If this method was put into operation, it would soon cause collectors to devoutly wish such a thing had never been thought of, for as soon as the frauds find they can no longer cheat the dealers, they will assiduously turn their attentions to the collectors. and, forsooth, would find the majority of them to be easy prey. This would be something like the Republican Protective Tariff, which protects one class of people, but not the other.

How many collectors know when the bill was passed that caused these pretty and instructive stamps to come into existence? Not very many, I think, this bill became a law in July, 1862. It went into practical operation in September of the same year,

The design of the 3c stamp issued in 1881 for Siberra bears quite a resemblance to the current Canada 3c. The color being black, however. We recently saw one on an S. of P. exchange sheet marked 1c. It was very heavily cancelled and the owner had evidently mistaken it for its commoner likeness.

Each member of the Exchange Department shall at least twice a year, about June 25, and December 25, select from sheets or sheet to be sent him by the Exchange Superintendent stamps to be announced to him by members for stamp taken by them belonging to him, unless the Exchange Superintendent sees cause.

5. Any member removing a stamp from an exchange sheet or book must write the name plainly of the space from which the stamp is taken.
