NEW REVENUE STAMPS

BY THE EDITOR

Very likely one of the first effects of the Spanish American trouble will be the issuing of a new series of revenue stamps by our Country.

I recommend that all collectors secure all they can of these stamps, especially any odd values that may appear. Watch for varieties of paper, etc., or in the future these may be much sought for stamps and they will be so much superior to the Omaha gumbags as to utterly route the latter. If new revenues are issued this summer the entire defeat of the Omaha stamps is assured.

THE PHILATELIC PRESS

The Home Worker has merged into the Tennessee Philatelist, with Ben Carpenter, of Memphis and Chas. McNutt of Knoxville at the head.

The Perforator has passed into the management of Mr Stowell the Maryland printer. Number one under the new management is O. K.

STAMPS OF THE PONY EXPRESS.

EVERY COMMUNITY has some cherished spot or special event that recalls with its associations a marked historical epoch of its life, and its fame is ever refreshed and kept alive by the members of the community. What is true in general life is likewise true in philately. The postmaster's provisionals of New York, St. Louis and other cities the confederate locals, are looked upon as the SINE QUA NON among collectors of those cities, and a silent and steady search is constantly going on for these treasures.

In the west there are no stamps outside of the regular issue of our country that hold so sacred a place in the hearts of all collectors as the stamps of the Pony Express, issued by Wells, Fargo & Co.

They at once recall the stirring scenes of early pioneer life, that seem like fairy tales to the present generation.

Although issued by a private corporation they were sanctioned by Congress, and were in use throughout a large territory, not only the entire Pacific Coast, but reaching as far East as St. Joseph, Missouri, and its feeders comprising all large cities of this country and Europe.

They recall the exciting times attending the discovery and development of the world renowned Comstock lode. They exemplify the spirit of the times, "Get there at any cost!" The high values speak of the cost necessary to rush the letters

through, the rider in the center shows the means.

The shortening of time necessary to forward a letter from San Francisco to the states, was of vital importance to the rapidly-growing camps in the West. The long and tedious Panama route was pronounced too slow; hardy and daring riders were found to carry important mail from station to station across the continent. Not only rapidity but safety was necessary as great enterprises and immense sums were at stake. It is here that the great express company of the Pacific Coast, Wells, Fargo & Co., and its connections, found its true function.

They established routes all over the coast, using franked envelopes for their service. In the early part of 1860 they organized a special service across the continent for the more rapid forwarding of mail intrusted to their care. This was in addition to the regular but slower transportation of the mail matter by the stage coaches. Their service was independent of, but really auxiliary to, the U. S. mail. In order to provide means of prepaying the charges on the letters a set of stamps was issued, the now famous Pony Express stamps.

The charges as sanctioned by Congress, were \$5.00 per ounce for the through trip from Sacramento to St. Joseph with proportionately lower rates for intermediate points.

At the terminal point, St. Jo, the letters were placed in the care of Uncle Sam to be forwarded by him to their destination through the regular mails and vice versa.

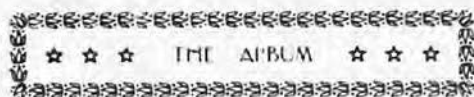

ON No other point do collectors differ as they do on the selection of the album that is to contain their collection. Now that albums can be had with or without spaces for minor varieties this point is again raised.

For the collector who has considerable money to invest in stamps I think the best album obtainable is a blank one, so that he can display as many varieties of each stamp as possible.

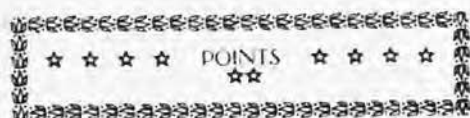
But where he intends to spend less, say \$100 a year, I think that a printed album without minor varieties is best. If one is going into all the interesting details of minute varieties he will need a blank album, as a printed one, no matter how complete, will never fully meet the needs of the real specialist.

If one cannot afford to keep up pretty close to the ever increasing new varieties, he should give up minor varieties and stick to straight stamps.

Where one has less than \$100 a year to spend for stamps he should use a 'straight' album until he has at least 4000 varieties. Then it is

time to get a blank album and enter into the realm of the advanced student of Philately.

In my estimation the beginner has no business with an advanced album.

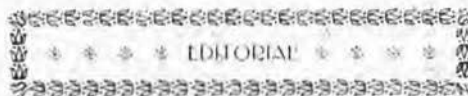

About 1891 he became interested in stamp collecting, and has made several fair sized collections, all of which have been sold profitably.

In 1894 he established "PHILATELIC FACTS." In 1897 it was re-established, with Mr. Gladden as publisher. In '98, Mr. Gladden decided to dispose of the publication, and devote his time to general publishing, he having lost interest in philately. 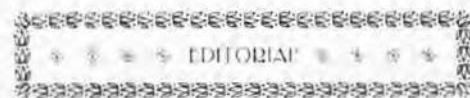

WE have lately had occasion to examine some very well forged stamps of Stellaland and from the number we could acquire, we may with certainty say that the forgery was carried out on a very large scale. They have been sent to us from Paris, and therefor we are induced to believe that the forgery is carried out in that metropolis.

The forgery may be detected very easily when compared with the genuine one. The genuine one is printed on very light blued paper, while the forged ones are printed on white-yellowish paper. The star above the arm is smaller in the forgeries; they are perforated 13½ instead of 12, and the perforation in the forgeries is much neater than in the genuine one. —Melita Philatelist.
