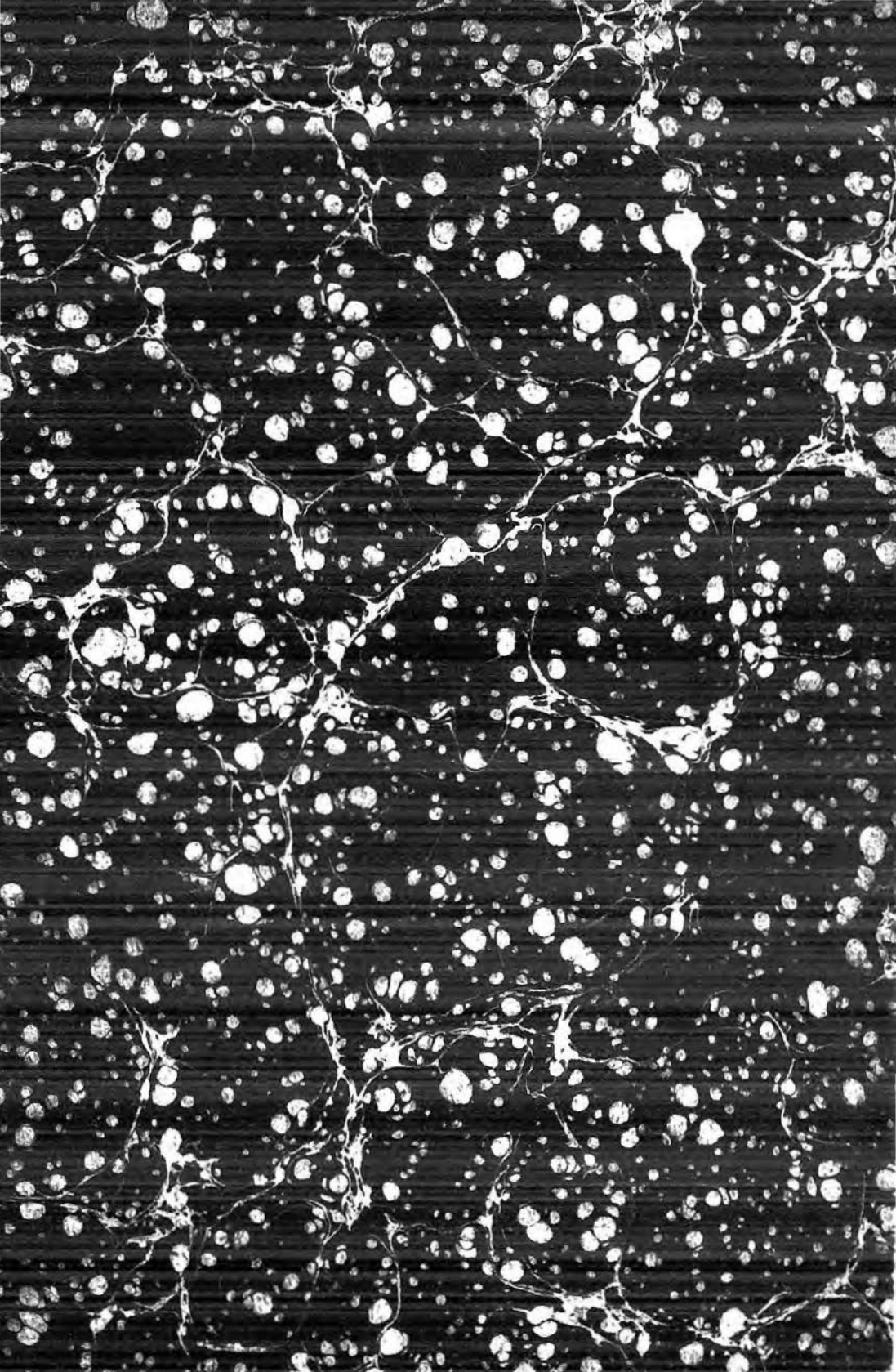
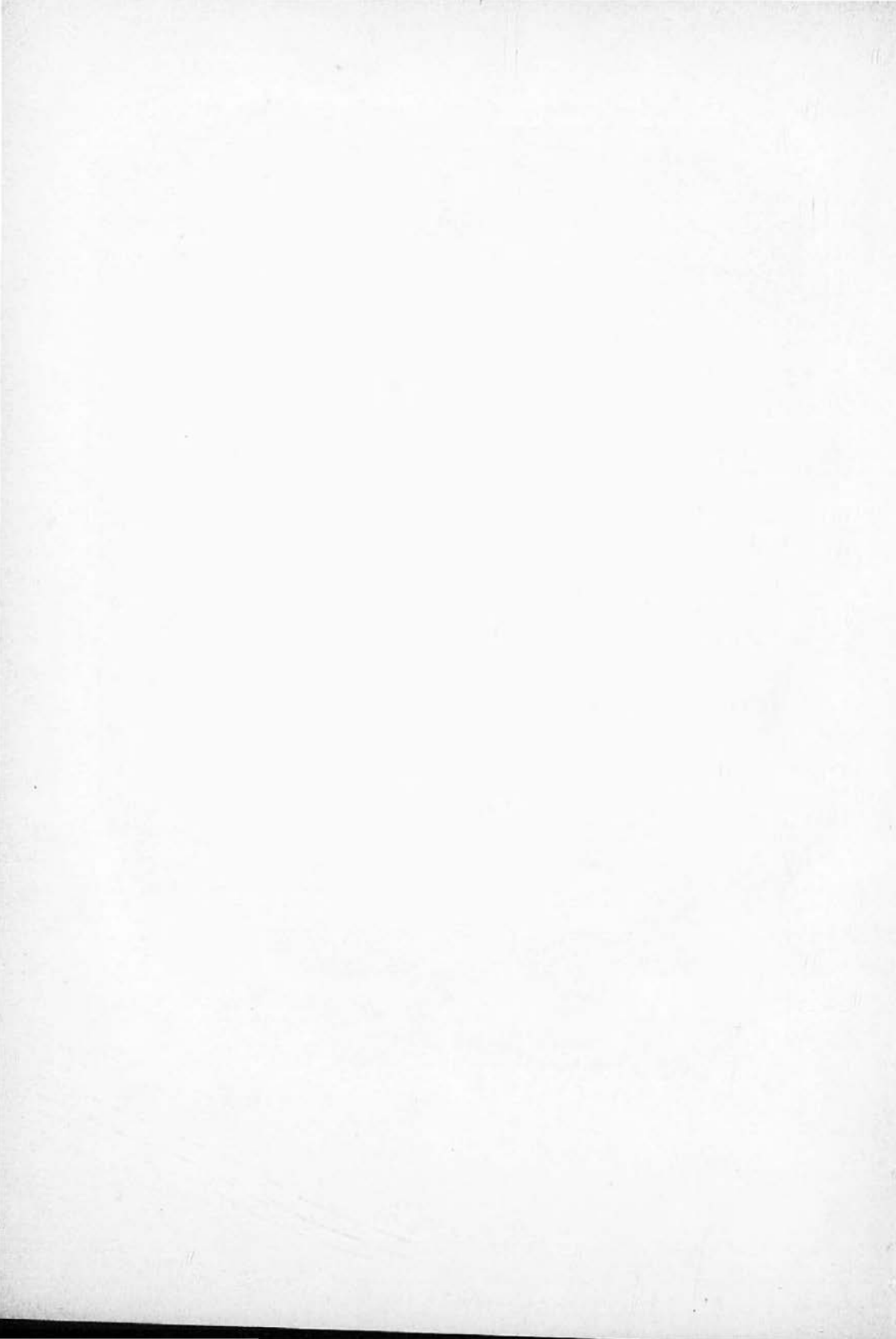

EDITORIAL.

A WORD OF GREETING.

The PHILATELIC FRAUD REPORTER is a novelty in stamp journalism. We begin work in a field as yet comparatively little explored. True, here and there a paper has devoted a limited amount of space to the exposure of philatelic frauds; but the P. F. R. intends to make the showing up of these petty thieves its only work. And to do this successfully several things are necessary.

First, we want *you*, whether you are dealer or collector, to send us the names and addresses of those persons (if there are any such) who have defrauded *you*. This will benefit both you and us; you, because by means of the exposure you may be able to

Fraud Notes.

Fred Arnold, W. S. Barnholdt, G. W. Keifer and Willie Burt are especially bad frauds. Dealers and collectors should beware of them.

Ben L. Darrow, of Indianapolis, Ind., is reported as a fraud by Thos. A. Leavitt, and also by W. S. McLean. This gentleman (?) publishes the *Wheelmen's Gazette*, a large monthly magazine devoted to cycling. He advertises extensively in leading American periodicals, such as the *Arkansas Traveller* and the *Magazine of American History*.

H. C. Moody in a recent letter says, in speaking of certain frauds, "I wrote to the A. P. A. Trustees, and they do simply nothing and say nothing. What are they called Trustees for? What is their benefit to the A. P. A.?" Mr. Moody evidently has just cause for complaint.

Anton Dworak, the well known dealer of Geneva, Nebr., has been exceptionally lucky as far as frauds are concerned. He has escaped unhurt, except in one case, when Allen Harvey, the now well-known fraud of Mt. Winans, Md., bled him to the tune of \$1.50.

Dealers are urged to send the names of substituters, as well as of straight frauds. One class is as bad as the other.

Allan Harvey, of Mt. Winans, Md., defrauded Wilson and Roberts, of Cincinnati, Ohio, out of \$8.73. They have placed the matter in the hands of the P. O. Inspector. We learn the above from a recent letter from the gentlemen.

A. N. Spencer is something of an artist. When sending his list of frauds he indulged his artistic proclivities, and what was our surprise to discover a carefully drawn beat (beet) as part of the contents of his epistle.
