But when a man launches a magazine in which he crystalizes current gossip and rumor into history along certain lines, he must needs be apologetic.

We doubt, however, whether the most abject of apologies can conciliate the irritable critical temper of a philatelist already exhausted by too much reading.

Were we not, therefore, persuaded "that there has been a long felt want!" among advanced collectors and dealers for a first class paper, that will combine, as our title intimates, as its prominent feature, a *Record* of the current news of interest, new issues, etc., and a *Review* of the *Cream* of the many philatelic journals, that will best instruct and interest the reader, we should never have had the courage to thrust before you the present issue.

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We propose to publish as one of several new features which we shall introduce in philatelic journalism: The actual *value* of rare stamps, and by rare stamps we do not necessarily mean high priced ones, but such postals as are always in demand and rarely to be found and are frequently catalogued at one-quarter of their value, owing to lack of knowledge on the part of the dealer. This feature of itself will be well worth the price of subscription. We do not covet long-winded dull articles that have been rehashed time and time again. Our greatest object is to be instructive and to promote and to advance philatelic research among our readers. We ask that we be judged by this desire.

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### An Opportunity Not to be Lost

The World's Columbian Exposition that will be opened in Chicago in 1892 will give philatelists of this country an opportunity to arrange for a grand display of the postage stamps and stamped envelopes of the world, on a much more extensive scale than has ever been gathered in one place or ever undertaken before in any country. This opportunity must not be lost.

The great advantage it will be to collectors—and they are numbered by the thousands in this country—it is hardly necessary to state; to be enabled to see the philatelic treasures from the noted collections of governments and the world-renowned amateurs, will be a treat that every stamp collector would be willing to go a very great distance to see and study. The benefit to be derived from personal examination of the great rarities and to study the many varieties which such an exhibition would bring together, would be of the greatest value to every student of philately. It has been suggested to the commissioners of the World's Columbian Exposition that they have a special department devoted to such an exhibit, and that they interest the foreign governments also collectors and dealers to send exhibits, which added to the extensive display we are informed the United States post office department and the American Bank Note Co. intend making, together with numerous exhibits by our own philatelists we feel assured would prove one of the most interesting departments of the great fair, provided the matter is put into proper hands, of course, under the management of the commissioners. Such an exhibition, supplemented by the aid of our numerous associations, will be all that can be anticipated and will give stamp collecting a great boom. The success of the exhibition in England assures us that we in America, with this opportunity, can

secure such a show that it will be very hard to equal in the future by any country.

We are in receipt of letters from the secretary of the World's Columbian Exposition that are very encouraging, and also from the post office department, and if suitable, medals are to be awarded to induce the advanced collector to exhibit his gems. We feel assured that the great body of philatelists will endorse this project and work with one accord to insure a great success.

To the Editor of the RECORD AND REVIEW.

Dear Sir:—I am in receipt of your favor asking "my opinion in regard to the present crisis in the affairs of the American Philatelic Association." While you are perhaps a little hasty in calling the present condition of affairs "a crisis," yet it is without doubt a situation that the Association should not have been placed in, and would not have been, but for the peculiar methods of those connected with the publication of the *American Philatelist*. These persons are so thin-skinned that the moment attention was directed to these methods they threatened individual members with legal suits for cash owed them they claimed, for publishing the official journal. Members of the Association (myself included) received letters from the lawyers of these people notifying us of suits if their bills were not instantly paid. Such a course if persisted in, will naturally make a crisis and break up any Association even one as well founded as the A. P. A., for no individual member wants to be sued for the debts of an association of 600 members. And there is no justice in it either, for the members bringing the suits are just as liable for the association debts as the members they sue. And now one word about the cost of our official journal as shown by the books of the association for three years past, viz. 1888, 1889 and 1890. In a circular that lies before me dated New York, Oct. 3rd, 1890, and signed by Mr. Clotz and others, I find the statement that the *American Philatelist* costs us \$404 per year. How far this assertion is true can be seen by the following items taken from the reports that have been made during this time to the Annual Conventions by the Treasurers.

Figures, like other facts, are stubborn things, and these figures show the actual cost of the journal to be over \$650 a year, and this for a paper that has as steadily decreased in merit as well as size, as it has steadily increased in cost. These figures also show the importance of getting at the truth of a matter before issuing such a misleading circular as the one referred to. I will not here discuss the merits of the plan of making the *Metropolitan Philatelist* the official organ of the association, but before we do anything hastily let us at least fully consider the expense we are going to assume in publishing our own paper and not be misled by the statements made in the circular quoted from, as to what the paper has cost us in the past.

If there is anything an association like ours can afford to be luxurious in and pay well for, it is a first class paper to represent it, and the records of the convention will show that I have always advocated making the general dues large enough to make us comfortable in this respect, and I hope that will be the outcome of the present situation.

The A. P. A. is not dead and is not going to die, but will, I believe, be stronger than ever and take on new life and vigor from the very trials and troubles it is now passing through, and the experience it is now gaining will be of immense benefit to it in the future. The association will grow and the science it represents and which we are all devoted to, will grow, and in this connection I wish you most heartily great success in the new enterprise you have undertaken to advance it in the publication of the new paper announced by you THE RECORD AND REVIEW. There is plenty of room for you, and particularly at the top where I am sure you will get very soon. Asking your pardon for trespassing on so much of your space I am, Yours respectfully,

MR. EDITOR:—

You solicit my opinion regarding the present crisis in the A. P. A. I beg interest to say the following:

Like the individual human being, societies have to go through certain stages which may destroy or strengthen their existence.

Our association had so far been comparatively free from such emergencies as the teapot tempest between the president and the then secretary several years ago, hardly affected the members. Fortunate as this may seem for an organization of such phenomenal growth, it lulled the members into inactivity, trusting their welfare to the board of officers, who seemed to navigate their vessel to their satisfaction. Their awakening however proved to be a rude one when one morning the members found that their rights had been used by less than a handful of unscrupulous persons in furtherance of the latter's own purposes. I think if those members who believe their rights have been tampered with, will hold out together, that right will remain right, in spite of contemptible tricks. If those proxy holders at the last convention intended to disgust those confided in them, they could not have done better. The result is, the pouring in of resignations which is to be deplored. A. R. ROGERS, ESQ., EDITOR RECORD AND REVIEW.

In reply to your request for my views on the crisis in the affairs of the A. P. A., I shall be pleased to make such remarks as may serve to avoid a crisis in the future.

The difficulty is the same which causes all the trouble in the world, revolutions in nation, disagreement in the home—and the breaking up of societies—the want of money, and it has been brought about in our case precisely the same as in all others, from extravagance; living beyond our means.

We could well afford to have had our own journal, provided it were run with economy and ability, a combination difficult to find in people attending to their own business but next to impossible to secure in men managing property belonging to others. For this reason I favored securing the services of a first-class paper at a fixed rate. Personally, I always like to know exactly what my income is and then I can make my expenses conform thereto. Lack of this precaution is what caused all the disagreement in our association, but the crisis was caused by the annexed letter.

This is well calculated to bring consternation to many a quiet home when they find that they have been paying \$2.50 per year for the privilege of being defendant to a law suit for hundreds of dollars and learn, after paying a lawyer, that they have no defense to the action and are legally liable for the entire debts of the association which in the eye of the law is

simply a partnership in which every member is bound by the acts of any of its officers. No wonder the resignations are pouring in to the secretary.

Immediately on being appointed a trustee of the A. P. A. I used my best endeavors to have the association legally incorporated so that the trustees alone would be liable for its debts. I believe I was the first to broach the subject, which was thoroughly discussed with Mr. R. C. H. Brock, during a dinner at the Union League Club in New York. I worked faithfully to secure incorporation during my entire term of office, and was ably seconded by my colleagues, but so far without success although I believe the good work will be accomplished during the coming year, when I trust the A. P. A. will take on a new lease of life.

I am afraid I am trespassing too much on your space, but I must say a few words for the much abused proxy holders.

I was one of the largest proxy holders at the late New York convention as also at the previous one held in St. Louis. What is the result? I have had but one complaint that I had not voted according to the wishes of the gentleman who intrusted me with his vote and he had failed to instruct me beforehand. As a matter of fact the record will show that I rarely cast my entire vote one way, always taking care to use all instructed proxies exactly according to orders, and nearly two weeks after the convention I was publicly thanked by the Staten Island Philatelic Society, for the able way in which I had voted the proxies of the absent members of that society. The motion was introduced by Mr. Clutz and carried unanimously. I held the proxies of about forty members of that organization. Moreover I have since been repeatedly asked how I had voted on the *Metropolitan Philatelist* question, so that the inquirer could vote same way, if called on the reconsideration question. To the Editor of The RECORD AND REVIEW:

Your lines of Oct. 2d are at hand. You ask me my opinion in regard to the present crisis in the affairs of the A. P. A., and I take great pleasure to express to you my candid thoughts. The crisis I consider only a very slight one, that is to say if all the members will do their duty and *stick to the A. P. A.* All our trouble, that is to a great extent, arose through the action of a few proxy holders which abolished our official organ, but we gained one victory already by having this reconsidered and the calling for a general vote is out now. If every one will only vote we will have again our own organ and I feel certain that with a new literary board of five we will bring the *Philatelist* to its old standard.

If we cannot carry our point, which I scarcely can believe, then we have no right, to grumble, and we have to be satisfied for a year to come with the *Metropolitan Philatelist*. I fail to see *serious* reasons that members talk about resigning, we are to blame ourselves by having misplaced our proxies, and besides there is trouble in every society once in a while, but we must endeavor to go through them all; it cannot be remedied by resigning, therefore, it shall be the duty of all to go through thick and thin until we have our affairs regulated to perfection and not until then can we be proud to belong to such an association. The time will come surely.

All other troubles of which I hear talking I consider purely personal, and the best way is to let the respective parties fight them out amongst themselves.

Our board of officers is an excellent one and although the majority is in the East I am perfectly convinced that the West will have its equal show. There ought to be *no party feeling* in our association, every officer ought to do only the *best for the association* and let all members be a large body of friends.

No, I consider the crisis not serious enough to see the "*Death blow*" of the A. P. A., as some Western paper stated, and I should say that each member who would withdraw from our ranks at present be considered a coward, but I hardly believe there is one amongst us if you call all members attention to *vote every time* there is a general vote called for and not throw it in

the waste basket as it is done, to my great sorrow, by most of our members. They do not take enough interest, but when it goes wrong they all cry out, and whose fault is it? Their own. Well, gentlemen, take a little more interest in the future, in the voting and proxy matter, and then we will see what can be done.

I like to see the A. P. A. prosper and to this end we must work united.

Dear Sir:—I am in receipt of your favor, asking for my views in regard to the present crisis in the A. P. A.

As stated in the preamble to the Constitution, one of the objects of the Association is to cultivate a feeling of friendship among philatelists. Had this been borne in mind by the few proxy holders who abolished the *American Philatelist* at the late convention, the wide spread dissatisfaction that certainly exists could not have arisen; for they would have been governed by what they knew to be the wishes and feelings of the majority. Instead of this, proxies were transferred from one to another and bargains made in a most shameful manner.

No wonder, as the editor of the *Metropolitan Philatelist* informs us, so much business was transacted in the short space of one hour on the 11th of September by the official board, and "the matters of the association expedited and the interests of the members conserved." All that was needed was to carry out the bargains already made.

The majority of the members are perfectly able to govern the Association, and carry on its work in the way they think best, and cannot be led by the nose by three or four Eastern individuals, for this is really about the number that precipitated what you call the *crisis*. I am confident the result of the vote now being taken will show this conclusively, and that this disturbing element will be effectually buried under what our friend Stone calls "a pretty big snow drift."

It is said 125 resignations are in the hands of the Secretary. I hope this number is much exaggerated, for it is much the better plan when anything goes wrong in a society, to remain a member and work to remedy the trouble. Yours very truly,

Dear Sir:—You ask me my opinion of the present crisis in the American Philatelic Association.

It appears to me that if resignations continue to pour in, we will not have a corporal's guard left, as I understand the secretary has received over one hundred since the last convention adjourned.

The postal card sent out with the circular of the president dated October 3d is made to read "I hereby vote *not* to reconsider" etc, and further down "I further vote *not* to restore," etc. I think this is a very unfair way to make the official vote read. It makes those members who desire to have the *American Philatelist* restored scratch out the word NOT twice, while those who desire to have the *Metropolitan Philatelist* the official organ have nothing to do but sign their name and number. While Mr. Tiffany explains this in his circular I think the fair way would have been to make each vote read "I hereby vote { <sup>not to</sup> } reconsider, etc. The President in a matter of this kind should act impartially, and let the members strike out "not to" or "to" as they feel inclined—and not send out a ballot to read one way.

This was the question as near as I can recall it.

I consider that there is now a crisis in the affairs of the American Philatelic Association.

What the outcome will be can only be conjectured, it will however lead to greater success in the future or to a general disintegration of the organization.

To preserve the interest in the Association, this effort of a few, to *rule*, must be put down and the *American Philatelist* must be restored.

If this is done I predict a large increase in membership, from collectors who have become interested in the organization and will want to join.

If, on the other hand, it is demonstrated that the affairs of the association are in the hands of those who will use it for their own selfish end, the better element of the existing membership will drop out.

Unfortunately many have already resigned and we have forever lost some of our best members.

The A. P. A. should be an organization of so high an order that, the tactics of a Bowery politician should be as much out of place in it, as in our first class business men's organization.

The introduction of sharp practices and strategical moves are not evidence of any ability upon the part of the parties bringing them forward. They are on the other hand, very much out of place and viewed in disgust by the better class of members. Yours for the success of the A. P. A.

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## HENRY CLOTZ

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We take pleasure in presenting to our readers a life-like portrait of one of the most prominent philatelists of the East. Mr. Henry Clotz began his career in Mainz, Germany, where on the 27th of May, 1847 he made his debut. Of his early career we know very little, but, after a thorough education in the best schools of his country, in 1870 he came to New York and entered the well-known house of Chas. Pfiser & Co., with whom he is still employed.

He developed in his boyhood days the hobby, so-called, of collecting stamps but it was not till 1880 that he entered the ranks of the advanced collector and which he did with such enthusiasm that to-day his collection ranks among the largest in this country.

His collection of foreign stamps numbers over 20,000 varieties besides his noted collection of United States postage, revenues, match, medicine and entire United States envelopes.

He was one of the organizers of the Staten Island Philatelic Society in 1883, and has held the office of treasurer since that time. To Mr. Clotz we are much indebted for the Staten Island permanent album, as he was one of the committee that got up that popular album, which is considered the best in the world.

We find him in 1886 holding the position of Exchange Manager of the A. P. A., and which responsible position he so successfully filled. Mr. Clotz' plans upon which he ran the exchange or as now called sales department after his term expired, were changed, but at the last convention he arranged a more simple way to carry on this important department and it was adopted unanimously.



He has had charge, since 1889, of the international exchange department of the A. P. A., and is also treasurer of the National Philatelic Society of New York.

Mr. Clotz has taken quite a prominent part in the present controversy in regard to the resumption of the *American Philatelist*, in which he is an ardent believer. He is a member of most all the large philatelic societies among which are Staten Island Philatelic Society, American Philatelic Association, National Philatelic Society, Brooklyn Philatelic Club, Dresden International Society, Chicago Philatelic Society, Western Philatelic Union, Copenhagen Society, Canada Philatelic Society, and others.

To such working philatelists is due the great success that stamp collecting has met with in this country.

We wish there were more like him in our ranks.

## Anniversary Dinner of the National Philatelic Society.

Tuesday, Oct. 15th, was the 17th anniversary of the National Philatelic Society, which they celebrated by inviting the Metropolitan philatelists to a banquet, held in the famous "Dairy Kitchen."

Around the tables were gathered some of the best known philatelists in the East; among them were: C. B. Corwin, Aug. Dejonge, J. W. Scott, D. S. Wylie, R. S. Hatcher, A. R. Rogers, J. M. Sheridan, J. Adenaw, Dr. Mitchell, A. Holland, W. S. Scott, Alvah Davison, Jos. Rechert, Henry Gremmel, M. C. Berlepsch, Joseph Holmes, L. S. Morton, H. N. Terrett, Ernst L. Schumann, Henry Clotz.

After an hour spent in social chat and attending to the inner man Mr. Aug. Dejonge, in that peculiar, but well known style of his, congratulated the National Philatelic Society on their success and presented the President, Mr. C. B. Corwin, with an immense bouquet, the compliments of the Staten Island Philatelic Society. His apology for not more extended remarks was that he was dry.

Mr. C. B. Corwin replied and reviewed the past history of the society. Among the achievements, the National brought out the Color Chart that has been such a great help to the collector.

He spoke also of the probable organization of the various societies in, and around, New York, into one large organization, in the near future. (Great applause).

In speaking of the A. P. A. matters, he said he believed in the survival of the fittest. He also announced that Mr. Scott had been induced to withdraw his resignation as a member of the board of managers of the *Metropolitan Philatelist*.

Mr. Chas. Gregory President of the Brooklyn Club, was then introduced, and amidst much applause thanked the National Philatelic Society for their invitation to the sister societies to the spread.

Dr. Mitchell, Mr. Jos. Rechert, Mr. Hatcher, Mr. Davison, Mr. Scott and others spoke.

We wish the National Philatelic Society many years of successful work.

We were very pleased to see the dinner carried out on temperance principles.

## Second German Philatelists Convention.

The second annual convention of German philatelists was held in Frankfort o M. on August 10, 1890.

Sixteen societies (representing about 2,000 members) were represented by as many delegates, each society having one vote irrespective of the number of its members. Dr. Klass, of the Dresden International Society, was elected chairman.

A meeting for the verification of credentials was held on the evening of August 9th, in the Palace restaurant, and the delegates were welcomed and entertained by the members of the Frankfort Society.

The convention met at 9 o'clock on the morning of August 10th,

in the restaurant attached to the Zoological Garden, and finished its labors by noon of the same day. In the afternoon a banquet was given to the visitors, which was largely attended by the members with their wives, during the course of which two original songs were sung, one of which was in honor of Rowland Hill. The Hungarian Band furnished the music.

The chief business transacted was:

1. A resolution was passed recommending the non-collection of the Hamilton Bank Note Company's stamps of Honduras, Costa Rica, Nicaragua and Guatemala, and any other issues made under similar contracts.

2. Appointing a committee to report to the third convention a plan to protect collectors and dealers against swindlers and counterfeiters.

3. Appointing a committee to report to the third convention a plan for publishing an official organ in the interest of all collectors.

4. Recommending strongly that stamped envelopes, etc., be collected entire and that the publishers of albums be requested to omit cut copies in future editions.

5. A resolution unanimously adopted, declaring that in view of the declaration of the London Philatelic Society, the Chalmers claim could not be accepted.

The third convention will be held in Dresden next year.

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### Notes on New Forgeries.

*Ceylon 1s. 9d.*

GENUINE.

Engraved in *taille-douce*, on stout, yellowish, rather hard white wove paper, watermarked with a star. The lines of the design stand out very slightly from the paper. The Queen's head is on an oval of crossed oblique lines, so closely set as to appear almost solid, unless looked at through a microscope; the lines running down from right to left under the chin are *curved*. The oval is outlined on the left side, but on the right side it seems to melt away imperceptibly into the next portion of the design, which is slightly lighter in color, and consists of horizontal lines, rather thick, perfectly regular and parallel, and placed very closely together. In the portion above POSTAGE there seem to be seven of these horizontal lines, and eight in the portion below the neck. The front point of the neck does not touch the edge of the oval. POSTAGE is on a solid label, but the label is hardly any darker than the rest of the background. The engine-turning in the frame, which contains name and value, is not continuous, but is interrupted on each side by a set of (about five) short, thick horizontal lines, serving to join the angles of the outer and inner frames together. Below this, on each side, but especially noticeable on the left side, the engine-turning, beside the usual fine lines, has a lattice-work of *thick* lines. This lattice-work on the left side reaches to the



beginning of the value label; there are two thick lines running down from right to left, and three from left to right. The right side is similar, but not so distinct. These broad lines appear to be laid over the fine lines of the engine-turning. The profile is not outlined. The name and value-labels are also not outlined, being formed, apparently, by cutting away the engine-turning of the background. The stamps are set *very* close together horizontally, being hardly three-quarters of a millimetre apart. (I do not know whether they are equally close together vertically).

FORGED.

This is the best counterfeit of a *taille-douce* that I have ever seen, and is likely to deceive any but a very old hand. Apparently engraved in *taille-douce* on white wove paper, rather thinner and much whiter than that of the genuine, though the face of the stamp has a faint greenish tint in my specimen, owing to imperfect wiping of the plate. There is no watermark, and all the dark lines of the stamp have been so strongly forced into the lines of the plate that they appear *sunk* at the back of the stamp. The said lines stand out from the paper very conspicuously in front. The oval containing the portrait is very dark, with a strong, dark outline all round, and is composed of straight crossed oblique lines, much more distinct than those of the genuine, and the horizontal lines immediately outside the oval are thin, scratchy and irregular. In the portion above *POSTAGE* ten of these horizontal lines may be counted, but below the neck they are so blurred and irregular that I have not been able to count them; there seem to be about twelve. The front point of the neck touches the outline of the dark oval. The solid label containing *POSTAGE* is distinctly darker than the rest of the background. The lines joining the angles of the outer and inner frame together, between the name and value-labels differ much from the genuine. That on the left has seven thin horizontal lines (exclusive of the outlines of the frames); and that on the right, instead of the horizontal lines, has some indistinct markings resembling “& n w.” there is no trace of the lattice-work between the two portions of the design. The profile of the face is outlined with a fine line, and the name and value-labels are also very distinctly outlined. The stamps are set much farther apart on the plate than on the genuine, being exactly one millimeter from each other, both vertically and horizontally.

*Query*—Does not this measurement point to a Continental origin for the forgery?

POSTMARKS.

Both my genuine and forged specimens bear the same postmark of bars, but they are thicker and heavier in the forgery. Unfortunately the cancellation has almost obliterated the head in my forgery, thus I have been unable to note any points of difference in the portraits. I must do the forger the justice to say that the inscription and the sign and shape and position of all the letters have been copied with absolute correctness. Nothing but photography or a direct transfer could have accomplished this. The only thing noticeable about the lettering is that it stands out very boldly from the paper in the forgery, whereas it is almost flat in the genuine.—*Monthly Journal*.

**V. R. FORGERY.**—We have just met with a new and dangerous forgery of this stamp. A used 1d. black is taken and the top letters taken out, probably with acid; the texture of the paper appearing very rough under a strong glass. The letters V. R. are then "printed in," however, the letters are not carefully done, and a close examination shows that the junction of the bottom of the V, instead of being at a sharp angle is blunt, the left side of the V running into the right side some distance from the bottom. The R has also a much more curly tail than in the genuine, and is also rather too wide at the bottom.—*Monthly Journal*.

Dr. Kunkel, of Dresden, warns young collectors against a number of new counterfeits of rare stamps, some of which are offered as reprints, others cancelled and pasted on old letters, and others still sold as used or unused originals.

He instances a number of the Swiss Cantonal stamps, the 3 pfennig red, Saxony; 10 groschen green, Hanover; and several others.

**THE FORMOSA POSTAGE STAMPS.**—Philatelists, or stamp collectors, have lately taken considerable interest in what are called "Formosa stamps." The British Consul of Tamsui, in Formosa, in his last report says that many letters have been received at his consulate from collectors anxious to be in possession of this rarity, and it will therefore be news of interest to a large class that the supply has come to an end, and that their value must necessarily increase as times go on. The Formosa stamp in question has had a curious history. It is so far a genuine postage stamp that it was originally produced for postal uses, but as a matter of fact the intention was never carried out, so that it has been impossible to obtain specimens authenticated by a postmark. From a philatelic standpoint it has never been more than an "essay," but it has come into practical use as a railway ticket on the Formosan Government line. The supply issued for this purpose is, however, now exhausted, and, though a quantity are still in stock in the Governor's hands, they are not likely to be issued, and the Formosa stamp is therefore now virtually unprocurable. After having served as railway tickets, these stamps were cancelled by cutting off a corner, and have, it is said, since been destroyed. Had the Governor but known it they would have found a ready market in London, and had they been disposed of at a uniform price of 6d. each (they actually fetch 10s.) his Excellency might have recouped the whole expense of their original production by the sale of his used-up railway tickets.—*Times*, May 10.

At the recent Philatelic Exhibition in Vienna, a stamp was prepared and issued as a memento of the occasion. It was made from the die of the first issue Austrian stamps, with the date "1890" in place of the value.—*Stanley Gibbons, Monthly Journal*.

## The Delay on the American Philatelist Vote.

We publish below the correspondence between the committee representing the members of New York City and vicinity, who are earnestly working to have the *American Philatelist* resumed, and President Tiffany in regard to the delay in issuing the call for a vote on this question.

At a meeting held on the afternoon of September 27, the following committee were appointed to represent those members who are in favor of the *American Philatelist* being resumed: Henry Clotz, R. R. Bogert, G. H. Watson, R. S. Hatcher, Alvah Davison.

After considerable discussion, as to the lengthened delay in issuing the call, the following telegram was sent to President Tiffany:

NEW YORK, Sept. 27th, 1890.

Three weeks ago you were handed a call for vote on *American Philatelist*. We cannot wait for *Metropolitan Philatelist* to be published. If you will not issue call as authorized, we shall request members of official board here to issue call.

Signed by the Committee.

The following letter was sent, by mail, the same evening.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27th, 1890.

JOHN K. TIFFANY, Esq.

Dear Sir:—There has been much discontent on the part of the members regarding the delay in taking the vote on the *American Philatelist*.

In view of this a meeting was held on Saturday, Sept 27, and the general opinion was that the vote was being delayed in the interest of the *Metropolitan Philatelist*.

The delay was strongly condemned and a committee was instructed to wire you as follows.

(Here follows telegram as above).

We understand that your excuse for the delay is that there is no board of trustees to receive the ballots, but this we believe erroneous as the old board is still in office and we can assure you that the chairman of that board (Mr. Terrett) is ready and willing to receive the ballots.

The delay is hurting the chances of the continuance of the *American Philatelist* and we think the wishes of the majority of the members should be complied with and have the votes immediately called for.

The cards still continue to arrive the number now being 385, in addition to which dozens of letters have been received by Mr. Clotz, commenting in strong terms on the action of the convention.

To this letter came the following reply.

ST. LOUIS Sept 29, 1890.

Messrs. HENRY CLOTZ, R. R. BOGERT, G. H. WATSON, R. S. HATCHER, ALVAH DAVISON, Committee.

Gentlemen:—I am in receipt of your communication and dispatch of September 27th, and while I sympathize fully with your impatience, I think I should be justified in resenting the insinuation that the vote was being delayed in the interest of the *Metropolitan Philatelist*, or that I make any excuse whatsoever for the delay, which is not of my making. I do not understand that the members of the official board in New York would have any authority to issue the call which I was ready to make when in New York, had not I understood at the meeting of the official board that the resignation of Mr. Terrett was in the hands of Mr. Gregory, and been informed, shortly after the board adjourned, by Mr. Scott that he would positively refuse to receive the ballot, if sent to him. A new board of trustees having been appointed, it does not seem to me to be official etiquette to order a vote sent to the old

board until the new board has had an opportunity to accept. Not does it seem to be wise to call for the vote to be sent to the remaining member of the old board, whose authority to count it would cease the moment the new board qualified, which I am informed they will shortly do.

All officers of our association are expressly prohibited from incurring any expense until authorized by the trustees, hence it is the custom for the President to prepare his circular and form of ballot and send it to the trustees to be printed and mailed, as the ballot must be taken under their direction. Having no list of members, and no authority to have the printing done, I cannot issue the call until the new board is qualified.

As you seem to differ with my idea of what should be done in the matter, I enclose you a copy of the circular and form of ballot that I should mail to the trustees as soon as they qualify. As they would direct to whom the ballot would be sent, and have the address printed on the face of the postal card, I leave that blank. If you choose to have the circular and ballot printed, and the envelopes addressed and mailed, and think you know who can legally count them, or to whom they can properly be sent, I hereby authorize you, so far as I can, to have it done. I am of the opinion that even after the trustees qualify they will be without the necessary list of members to whom to address the circular and ballots until they receive the papers from the old board, or the Secretary, and that this may cause further delay.

I have no doubt that the new trustees when organized will order the expense to be refunded to any one who may make the advance, but as an officer I am prohibited from so doing myself. If the printing and directing were done, and the circular ready to mail to the new trustees so soon as they inform Secretary Walton of their acceptance, it might expedite matters.

While all this is quite irregular, it is the only suggestion I can make to hasten the matter, and I cannot recommend it.

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### Notes of Interest.

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THE Dresden International Society has nearly 1,500 members, but the regular meetings of July 19, and August 2, of this year were each attended by only 15 members, nine of whom were at both meetings; they seem to have centralization and thrive under it.

*Le Timbre Poste* for August, has illustrations of the Penny postal Jubilee post-cards and the various caricatures which have appeared so far.

The original post-card has dropped in price from 75 francs to 20 francs in the Paris market, and probably will come down still more.

*Der Philatelist* republishes Major Evans' article on the Chalmers-Hill controversy. The translation made by Mr. S. Siewert is an excellent one.

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### Who Was the First Stamp Collector?

Every little while I see some claim that so-and-so collected stamps in 1850 or 1851 and claiming to be the first stamp collector.

Now we all know that the first stamps were used in Paris about



250 years ago, but no copy has yet been found. Perhaps there were collectors in that day who collected the different varieties, proofs, errors, etc., and we may yet come across some philatelic album made at that time. It may be hidden away in the great library at Paris. Who can say?

I am led to this belief by some curious remarks I have come across in an old book printed, in 1699, in London.

Dr. Lister spent the year 1698 in Paris and on his return home printed a narrative of his doings. He says:

"Dr. *Turnport* showed me a Present which was made him by his country man of *Provence*, of a large Book in Folio of curious *stamps*."

And in another place:

"We went to the King's Library. \* \* \* In one room was the stamp collection of Mon. Marolles, which the King had bought in at a vast sum, to divert him. The catalogue alone of these stamps, no bigger than two small almanacs, cost me 14 livres; so much strangers are imposed upon by the crafty booksellers of Rue St. Jacques; but 'tis not in France alone where people are made to pay for their humour." Well said, Old Truepenny!

Can you, Mr. Editor, give me any information?

The *Stamp Collector's Figaro* in their last number states:

"We have it on good authority that two prominent philatelists, both members of the A. P. A. have in view the organization of two new philatelic associations upon a broad basis. One is known as 'The Stamp Collector's Union of North America' and the other 'The Western Philatelic Association.' It is probable that these two will be united and they will soon outstrip the A. P. A. in numbers, as we understand they are to be run on altogether different plans. The projectors of both of these organizations are very enthusiastic, but say if the members of the A. P. A. will come forward and undo the work done at the convention and place the A. P. A. where it belongs, they will co-operate with them."

The letters on A. P. A. matters from all the leading lights in the Association are timely and will be read with intense interest by all members of this famous organization. The great length of these letters has crowded out much other interesting matter, including our chronicle of new issues. We shall, however, make up for this omission in our next, which will be in the hands of all our readers on the 15th of November.

### Stamp Collectors' Societies.

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There are many stamp societies in the U. S. at present and we frequently hear of new ones being organized. Most of these are local, but at least three claim national importance. Their aims are varied, but they usually announce that their chief end is the gathering together of all stamp collectors in one fold, where they can dwell together in peace and unity. How far they have succeeded in this most of our readers are aware. The second aim is to aid one another in the exchange of their duplicates and many schemes have been tried to secure a working plan. We shall not dilate on their failures, and how nearly every one who has entrusted sheets to their agencies have suffered in one way or another, some have simply been deprived of their goods for one or two years, others have been robbed of their stamps, had their names forged to sheets, or suffered minor mishaps; however these are all incidents and will all be righted eventually, as fortunately for the poorer members there are usually enough well wishers in the organizations who are both willing and able to put their hands in their pockets and pay the bills. (Failing the aforesaid gentlemen coming to time; members have not been backward in commencing suit against any of their fellow members who were suspected of being able to stand the loss.)

All the ills from which the different societies have suffered have arisen from several easily corrected evils, the chief of which is undoubtedly the desire to secure a large number of members, which, combined with attempting to do much and a loose system of finance, would finally wreck any institution.

What is needed is a society which should include such of the thoroughly responsible collectors and dealers who desire to trade or have dealings with their fellow collectors. To this end a president and secretary should be chosen to manage the affairs, which would simply consist in looking after the references of applicants and recording complaints of members. Particulars of every case of fraud committed during the month, should be sent by mail, properly sealed, to each gentlemen in the association, and every member should send to the secretary particulars of any attempt to defraud him either by stealing his stamps, substituting other specimens, or neglecting to pay for stamps taken. This might possibly be supplemented by a list of new counterfeits and reprints. If such a society were formed and careful scrutiny given every applicant for membership, and the work confined strictly to the lines herein named, it would undoubtedly be of very great advantage to collectors. The dues need not be over 50c. per year. The editor is prepared to hear from his readers on the subject, and if any considerable number think favorably of the project, will be pleased to take steps to organize such a society.

### A Unique Cigar Stamp.

Although there are not many of our readers who collect cigar and tobacco stamps, we are sure they will not begrudge the short space necessary to gladden the hearts of the few amateurs who take more interest in the outside, than in the contents of, cigar boxes.

The newly discovered stamp is a provisional issued for use in California and may be described as follows.

Quarter inch frame composed of crossed diagonal lines, and divided into three panels, the first contains "E. T. Cole" (in fac-simile autograph) "Inspector" (in italics). The second panel has the frame broken, to admit "U. S. INTERNAL REVENUE" above, "INSPECTORS STAMP" below, and contains the following "used in absence of stamps of this denomination, by authority of Frank Soule (in fac-simile autograph), "Collector First District California." The third panel contains the date 1868 and is penmarked with day and month of using 12 14, below in italic "*First District Cal.*" Between each panel is a portrait of Washington with "50 Cigars" above. The stamp is printed in brown ink and is  $1\frac{1}{4}$  wide by 11 inches long.

### Recollections of an Old Collector.

When I was,—well no matter how many years old in 1861, I had the idea first occur to me to begin a collection of postage stamps, being incited thereto by seeing several dirty little books with dirtier stamps firmly pasted to them, in the possession of many of my companions. They seemed very proud in their ownership of them, and talked so learnedly to me about their Ceylons, Spains, Wurtemburgs and so on, that I was charmed and felt I must have a collection of my own, and consequently I set about it at once. At the time, I had just commenced my business career in Nassau street, New York, as clerk to a lawyer, now by the way, an eminent judge, whose correspondence was large but almost entirely confined to America, so that beyond getting the current United States issues, I did not make much headway with my new hobby. Finally it occurred to me that it would be a good plan to be at the post-office a half hour or so before I had to be at my office and wait around there watching the people come for their mail and wait for the chance of some gentleman opening his foreign letters and throwing the envelope on the ground, which I would eagerly seize. In this way I got a good many stamps that I consider now among the most interesting of my collection, and the happy feelings it aroused in me I never experienced in later years, even after acquiring at great expense and trouble, some of my much more valuable treasures. At the time of which I am writing, the Post-Office Department occupied the venerable old edifice once called the Middle Dutch Reformed Church, on Nassau street, corner of Liberty street. It was a crazy old place, stuffy and ill-smelling, and on wet days the floor around the boxes was terribly slushy and uncomfortable. Our youthful crowd of col-

lectors after exhausting the economical methods of adding to their collections by swapping stamps, picking up envelopes on which were foreign stamps, etc., now began to turn their eyes in other directions for increasing them and relief was at hand. In the early months of 1862, the first regular dealer in cancelled postage stamps that I had ever heard of, came down in Nassau street, and established himself in a doorway right opposite the middle door of the Post-Office. His name was Brennan, and I was a regular customer of his for many years. The only other dealer in New York City, that I knew of at the time was a man named Bailey who had a stand at the northern corner of the City Hall park railing on Broadway. This man kept old coins principally, and the few stamps he had were nailed to a board, the nail or tack passing through the stamp.

He had, however, some unused stamps that he kept in a large blank book. I bought from him, among other things, the entire set of 1850 Spain unused for \$5.00. They were very rare in those days, and this was considered a very high price to pay for them. Mr. Brennan, the Nassau street dealer, did not deal in coins, nothing but stamps, and while he seemed to have facilities for getting a great many good stamps, yet he had (and I believe unknowingly), a great many counterfeits, many of which I innocently cherished and displayed in my collection for years as great treasures. I really think that the pleasure I experienced in believing in them so many years was a great deal more than the disappointment I suffered when I was rudely awakened from my dream, for I was, when I discovered their worthlessness, in a better financial condition to replace them by genuine specimens. I was, however, ten years in finding out that a set of British Guiana provisionals, which were among the best counterfeits ever made, were false. Even after I had been told so, I could hardly believe it; the signature of the postmaster of Demarara, Mr. E. D. Wright, the acid cancellation and everything else, was so well done. Brennan soon moved from his doorway around to a small room in Liberty street just behind the Post-Office, and his business increased so fast that he had to employ the services of his son and daughter as clerks to help him get through his quite large office and mail business. In after years he had an office in a basement in Nassau street near John, and then disappeared entirely from the stamp world.

About a year after I began collecting I first remember seeing the queer little metallic cases in which a man named Gault was putting the current issue of United States postage stamps, to be used instead of silver and copper change which was fast disappearing from people's pockets, owing to the premium on gold and silver caused by the war which was then gaining such tremendous and dire proportions. They had experimented with envelopes to hold them and in various other ways, but this was the first practical way of using a postage stamp as money, and like other strange things brought about by the war, soon became very popular. It was really a very ingenious method of combining advertising with a circulating currency, as the backs of these things were made to advertise various firms, quack medicines, hotels,



etc. They have now become very rare, as nearly all of them have been opened to get out the stamps they contained. Mr. Scott once told me that he opened a great quantity of them to get out the rare yellow brown 5c. stamp that was in them, they being on sale at the post-office at the time Gault was putting the stamps in his cases. They contained all values of the 1861 issue, from 1 cent to 90 cents and all kinds of advertisements. As many as 150 varieties of them have been recognized and classified, and I don't think the number will stop here, as new varieties are turning up all the time. They represent the only period in the United States history when the postage stamp was fully recognized by the people as money and used as a circulating medium.

Very early in the history of stamp collecting, the great and only Scott appeared on the field, and his first office was in Liberty street, and he shortly afterwards removed it to Nassau street and began issuing his catalogues. Speaking of stamp catalogues, the first one I ever saw or used, was used by Seaver & Francis in 1862, in Boston, and was an excellent work, its few pages containing excellent and accurate descriptions of the stamps, although no attempt was made to place any market value on them. What a contrast as I look at that little volume now and compare it with one of the great catalogues of to-day, and what a story the comparison tells of the wonderful growth of the postage stamp. Mr. Scott's catalogues were the first ones I can remember that priced the stamps, and they gave a great impetus to stamp collecting, and the older collectors found that they had some quite valuable stamps in their books. Then also began the race for the stamps to fill the vacant spaces in the albums, and prices went up very fast. As to albums, when I took my collection (?) out of the little blank book I first had it in, I put it in a Lallier album that I bought from Mr. Brennan, a beautiful book bound in full red morocco leather. But alas for my stamps, for this fine album contained octagons and circles as well as squares and some of my most valuable stamps were cut to fit these wretched spaces, and consequently ruined. I have had to buy the two colored high value United States envelopes of 1861 three times to get them right. The first time I bought them at the Post-Office window, and went home and cut them out round to fit in the circles in the Lallier album. The second time, I bought them at an advanced price, and cut them square for a later album, and finally I had to pay a great big price to get them for my collection of entire envelopes. I also bought the 4 cent envelope entire and cut the stamps out, but luckily cut them square. By the way, a word about this 4 cent envelope, as I remember perfectly well the circumstances under which it was issued, and I believe it was never used outside of New York City. The rate for drop letters deposited in the Post-Office was 3 cents, but when deposited any where else the carrier's fee of 1 cent per letter to take it to the general Post-Office was to be added, thus making the postage 4 cents. This made an inquiry for a stamped envelope of this value, and resulted in the department giving New York City the 4 cents envelope (3 and 1) which is now so rare and should be of the greatest interest to all New York collec-

tors. Well, to get back to albums, after ruining about half of my collection through the Lallier book, I got one of Scott's Common Sense albums, and I found it in every way worthy of its name. With the additional leaves furnished for it by him, as new issues came out, it lasted me for many years, and when I finally had one made in two volumes I copied the exact size and style of the old one, as I did not think it could be improved on. The leaves are blank, and I can cut them out of one place and insert them in another at pleasure, according to the requirements of the various stamp issuing countries. Immediately after Scott, a host of other dealers appeared on the field, and the stamp dealings blossomed out into a regular commercial business, and began to be recognized the world over. I remember dealing with a young man named Bechtel, who had a room in Nassau street, where he kept a large stock of stamps, particularly United States stamps. He was during the day, clerk in a very large importing and banking house and only attended to his stamp business after 5 p. m.

It is to his researches that we are indebted for the unearthing of the celebrated St. Louis stamp that is now so very rare, and for several varieties of Southern locals. He was also a heavy dealer in Confederate bonds and notes. I bought from him once \$100,000 of these bonds for \$25 for the lot, to paper a room with, thinking it would make a unique wall paper, but shortly after I bought them there was an inquiry for Confederate bonds on some legal points made in England, by Judah P. Benjamin, the Secretary of State of the late Southern Confederacy, and I sold my lot of bonds for nearly \$1,000 cash, and the room was not papered—at least, not with Confederate bonds.

The rush of stamp magazines, not at that time dignified by the name of philatelic literature—then began, and I must admit that some of these early papers are among the best that have been produced. I remember one volume of the *American Journal of Philately* in which all the newly issued stamps were printed in their proper colors and must have involved a great deal of work and expense. But the ranks of collectors were increasing so fast that it paid the dealers to cater for them to the very best of their ability, and their places of business were crowded with buyers from all ranks of society.

About this time the auction room developed another way for collectors to get their stamps, and from the first I have been a pretty faithful adherent of this way of obtaining them, having witnessed the evolution of the auction room for postage stamps, from sales of the crudest of forms up to the present scientific methods employed to conduct one. Two hundred lots were then considered a large sale. Today one of our most popular cataloguers does not hesitate at every sale to crowd six hundred lots and over on the auctioneer. The first auction of postage stamps I remember, was at Leavitt, Strebeigh & Co.'s rooms in Clinton Hall, now demolished. We were allowed to assemble in a little room up-stairs away from the large auction room so as not to interfere with, or disgrace, the regular auction business of the house. And yet, from that day to this, auctioneers have always told me that their best paying sales for the amount of work and ex-

hibition required, were the postage stamp sales. The auctioneer at the first sale I attended was a Mr. Wright, and a right good auctioneer he was too. Of course, at that time there were none better to compare him with. In the present day when we have Mr. Merwin of Bangs & Co. and Mr. Merry who can get through sales of 600 lots without losing their tempers—well very much—we are somewhat spoiled by their good nature and don't know what the early postage stamp auction martyrs had to contend with. Having brought the matter of collecting postage stamps up to the auction rooms of Messrs. 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### File No. 53,477.

It must be rather difficult to form a society in Paris and to our American ideas the requirements seem to be un-republican to say the least.

This is the way the official notice reads:

*Republique Francaise*—PREFECTURE de POLICE—CABINET—2nd Bureau—1st SECTION—File No. 53,477 (SOCIETY OF POSTAGE STAMP COLLECTORS.)—WE, THE PREFECT OF POLICE, having seen the request addressed to us on the 23rd of May, 1889, by the persons whose names and addresses are on the annexed list for permission to form a society, etc., etc.

Among the police requirements are, the obligation to notify the police at least five days in advance, of the place, the day and the hour when the society will hold its meetings; not to change their constitution without previous permission from the police; not to admit members for any other reason than as stamp collectors, nor to discuss any other subjects than those mentioned in the constitution under pain of immediate dissolution; to send each year to the prefecture a complete list of all the members, their names, titles, professions and residences, etc., etc.

The law commanding these requirements was passed April 10, 1834, when France was under the Bourbon King.

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### The American Philatelist.

We are pleased to be able to announce the result of the vote to re-establish the *American Philatelist* as the official organ of the American Philatelic Association. The vote is as follows:

To re-establish the <i>American Philatelist</i>	381.
To retain the <i>Metropolitan Philatelist</i>	35.

This is as it ought to be. The largest American philatelic society should publish its own paper and that journal should be the largest and best paper on the American Continent, but unfortunately this is a luxury which costs money, and it, therefore, behooves us to consider the ways and means to secure that end. There are several ways open to us among which may be named a prompt incorporation of the association with a few of the richer members as incorporators, who would be willing to assume all responsibility, thus relieving the members at large from the fear of having their goods seized, for the debts of the association. If this is not done the dues should be raised to five dollars per year and a clause inserted in the constitution absolutely prohibiting the officers incurring any debts or obligations before the money to meet the engagement is actually in the treasury. The association has been bankrupt for the last three years, during which time every member has had the sword of Damocles (in the shape of a five hundred dollar law suit) suspended above his head, although he was apparently in blissful ignorance of his danger. Barring the adoption of either of these essentials, the journal should certainly be restricted to four pages unless a first-class editor and business manager can be secured who will agree to make up all deficiencies out of their own pockets.

Dear Sir:—I beg to prefer charges through your honorable body, against Mr. R. R. Bogert, of New York, of

1. *Conduct unbecoming a gentleman.*

2. *Slander against the official board of the A. P. A. in general, and the vice-president of the A. P. A. in particular, in having written a letter to be found upon page seven of the RECORD AND REVIEW for October, in which he says, with reference to the convention, "Proxies were transferred from one to another, and bargains made in a most shameful manner," and, further, with reference to the meeting of the official board of the A. P. A., on September 11, "All that was needed was to carry out the bargains already made."*

As I am the only member of the official board who held proxies at the late convention, the direct assertion as to my own course of procedure is plainly apparent, but, to clinch the matter, Mr. Bogert personally stated, on October 27th, in the presence of Messrs. Ernst L. Schumann, Charles Gregory, J. To the Editor of the RECORD AND REVIEW:

Dear Sir:—When you asked me last month to write you my views of the present state of affairs of the American Philatelic Association I did not think that in complying with your request I should be drawn into a lengthy discussion that might only result in prolonging the unfortunate position in which the association finds itself. But when one of the "leading philatelists" to whom you applied for opinions on the subject takes up his pen to attack and insult the official board of the A. P. A. as the writer of the letter on the 7th page of the RECORD AND REVIEW does, I cannot help writing to you to accord me space enough in your paper to indignantly deny the charges he so flippantly makes against the officers of the association. And the fact that the writer of the letter referred to formerly held a very important office in the A. P. A. make his letter all the more malicious but at the same time makes it also the more incumbent on those he attacks to arise and defend themselves from such assaults. The writer in question begins by drawing attention to the fact that "in the preamble to the Constitution of the A. P. A. one of the objects of the association is to cultivate a feeling of friendship among philatelists; after establishing this point he proceeds to encourage these friendly feelings by the use of the following language, "bargains were made in a most shameful manner. No wonder so much business was transacted in the short space of one hour on the 11th of September by the official board, all that was needed was to carry out the bargains already made."

This statement is absolutely false. The official board met at my office on the day mentioned and the result of that meeting was a surprise to all the members of it and no one was more surprised than myself. This does not look like "carrying out bargains already made." How could the worthy gentlemen who claim such knowledge of what was done at the convention know so much about it when he was on the ocean returning from Europe while the convention was in session. And has he the right to assail the reputations of the officers of the association as he does in his letter upon hearsay evidence alone? For my part I assure you that I had no knowledge whatever of any bargains having been made by any members of the official board and I also solemnly assure you that I made none of any kind myself and it seems to me therefore that the language used by the writer of the letter referred to is most insulting and uncalled for and the official board in my judgment should take notice of it (inasmuch as the person referred to once held a very important office himself in the association) and if he fails to prove his charges, the Trustees should visit condign punishment on his head. It is an easy matter to protect oneself from an enemy's attack. You look for it and are not surprised when it comes. But when you are attacked by a friend and by one who is striving so hard to promote friendly feeling among the members of the association and philatelists generally, then it is just as hard to bear and now, should be punished in the same way that you would punish an enemy, and Mr. Editor, I have said all I wish to on this subject and hope you will excuse me for taking up your time with it.

### Reviews.

*Prices paid by the J. W. Scott Company, Limited, for the used postage stamps of all nations.* Published by the J. W. Scott, Co., Ltd. 163 Fulton street, New York City. Price 10c.

Again we are indebted to the keen commercial instinct and business foresight of Mr. J. W. Scott for a new departure in the stamp trade which is exemplified by the neat catalogue now before us. It is, we believe, the first time that any dealer has been bold enough to make a *bona fide* offer to buy every variety of stamps in any quantity, and time alone will show the wisdom of the step, but we may be certain

that at the first sign of success parties who are now living on the echo of his abilities will speedily come out with similar lists. All this however works for the benefit of collectors who will not only have one firm to sell to but several. The prices offered are very fair in the majority of cases, and some are very liberal while the suspiciously low figure placed against some issues would indicate that the author knew that a higher figure would bring out reprints cancelled to order, many plates being known to be in the hands of speculators waiting a favorable opportunity to flood the market. The printing, paper and general get up is very good, while the size is the much admired pocket form adopted by this house for all their catalogues.

*J. W. Scott's Best Postage Stamp Album.* Published by the J. W. Scott Co., Ltd., 163 Fulton street, New York City.

Advance sheets of this beautiful book are now before us and judging from these specimen pages it is the *chef-d'œuvre* of its talented author who for many years has been the acknowledged chief of stamp album writers. The present book differs from all that have preceded it in many particulars. The greatest improvement to our mind consists in giving the actual value of every stamp in the place made to receive it. Thus the collector can at a glance see how much it would cost to complete any unfilled sets, or can with equal facility determine the cash value of his entire collection. Placing pictures of the various designs in the spaces made to contain the stamps is as old as prepared albums, having been first invented in Germany, but the idea of drawing the stamp in miniature, is a new departure which is of decided value. In the old style the pictures were frequently mistaken for stamps, so great was the liability to do this that one well known amateur, used to paste a bar of paper across the picture to indicate its true nature.

There are many signs of careful forethought in the few pages before us but we await the entire book before giving our opinion in detail of its merits and demerits,

### On United States Envelopes.

Over four years ago the '82 watermark went out of existence with the first batch of the so-called Kellogg dies. The U. S. watermark has done duty ever since. Among the scarce envelopes issued since, there are seven of the two cent Kellogg dies and two of the five cent Garfield dies on '82 watermark paper (Scott, 827 to 828g., Horner 933, 934, etc.)

Has any one these envelopes without the word "Specimen"? I shall be glad of any information on this point. My own belief is that they are specimen envelopes made at the time the dies were changed, but through some accident in the factory a few got out without the word "Specimen." In other words, they were made at the factory for philatelic purposes.

I am inclined to this opinion from the fact that the Plimpton Company must have a good stock of all the different papers, with the '82 watermark. I have before me a lot of "Bidder's Samples," some with the "Special request," across the end, others with an address and "Special request" in the upper left corner. All these envelopes are of the current dies on different sizes and papers, and all are of the shapes authorized by the government in 1886 when the new dies came into use. But all the papers, except the manillas, bear the old '82 watermark. The manillas have a new watermark about one inch in length by three-fourths of an inch in height, made up of the three letters P. O. D.

If, by an "accident," some of these envelopes were to get into the hands of the dealers without the word "Specimen" printed on them, what a fine crop of great rarities, errors, etc., we should have! Judging from the past this is not an unlikely occurrence.

This is a list of the envelopes. All the papers or sizes are different:

7 one cent blue.	1 five cents blue.
28 two cents green.	1 ten cents brown.
9 four cents red.	1 thirty cents brown.
	1 ninety cents purple.

I hope collectors will be on their guard against any of these envelopes should they be offered without the word "Specimen" printed on them.

*Der Philatelist* gives a fair account of the A. P. A. convention and speaks very flatteringly of the dinner at Coney Island.

The Moscow (Russia) society set a good example by resolving last year that:

Whereas, our wives and daughters have sacrificed their own wishes and convenience by acquiescing in our absence from home on the meeting nights of this society.

Resolved, that we invite our families to meet with us at an entertainment and supper to be given by the society.

This was done and the Edison phonograph, shadow pictures, concert, etc., was the successful entertainment followed by a big supper.

The National Society could easily outdo the Russians if they would try.

### New Counterfeits.

*Der Philatelist* for October 15, calls attention to the following counterfeits in Japanese stamps and post cards.

1. The  $\frac{1}{2}$  sen brown and 1 sen blue post card of the first issue, with carmine border. Both the counterfeits are better printed than the originals but the flowers to the left under the arms are oval whereas they should be bell-shaped. The counterfeit sen has the Roman I instead of the Arabic 1 in the value. Several other tests are given.

2. The 2d issue of the post cards. The original has four characters, the counterfeit, five.

3. The first issue of stamps. The Greek (key) border in the counterfeit is very imperfectly carried out, and the two characters are quite high in the center, whereas in the original they are rather low.

The scarce 4 sen red, and the  $\frac{1}{2}$  sen brown, error, are both being manufactured in Japan out of the commoner stamps by erasures, etc.

The attention of the Japanese government should be called to these facts.

### The Athenæum, April 28, 1838.

During the Rowland-Hill's agitation of postal reforms, in the 30's he called attention to a new paper manufactured by John Dickinson, Hartford, which would prevent counterfeiting of the proposed envelopes.

John Frances, the proprietor of the *London Athenæum* from 1831 to 1882, was deeply interested in forwarding Rowland Hill's views, and to excite interest in the public he determined to print an entire edition of the *Athenæum* on this patent paper.

Arrangements were made with Mr. Dickinson, and the entire issue of April 28, 1838 was printed on silk thread paper, similar to that afterwards used for the Mulready and other envelopes, issued in 1840. This paper is of interest to every philatelist, and will be highly prized by the fortunate possessor of a copy.

A communication from the Brooklyn Philatelic Club in regard to the reunion meetings of the Metropolitan societies was read and Mr. Clotz was appointed a committee of one to confer with the other societies and report.

Upon the request of the publishers of the *Stamp Collector's Magazine* the secretary was instructed to send a list of members.

Mr. Wightman sends in his resignation, which was accepted. Messrs. Corwin and Scott of the literary board of the *Metropolitan Philatelist* notified this society of their retirement from such board of management.

Mr. E. L. Schumann, on account of the censure passed at the last meeting of the Nat. Phil. Soc. in New York, tenders his resignation as manager of the *Metropolitan Philatelist* for the S. I. Phil. Soc., as he considers such censure, as far as it concerns him, not in accordance with the facts and merits of the case and therefore unjust, and asks to be relieved from further duty as such manager.

Mr. Clotz thereupon offers the following resolution:

Whereas, We all are perfectly satisfied with the able manner in which Mr. Schumann has acted as manager and as our representative in the literary board of the *Metropolitan Philatelist* in general, and we know that he always has the interest of our society at heart, we find that the censure of the Nat. Phil. Soc., as far as it concerned him, was entirely uncalled for and we herewith decline to accept his resignation. It was moved and seconded by Mr. Albrecht and unanimously carried.

The Scott Stamp and Coin Co. presented this society with a copy of their catalogue just published for the library, and Mr. Keutgen moved a vote of thanks.

Meeting adjourned.

JOHN WALTER SCOTT.

We are much pleased to be able with this number to present to the readers of the RECORD AND REVIEW an excellent portrait of the man who has so deservedly earned the title of the Father of Philately, Mr. J. Walter Scott. Mr. Scott, who has just completed his forty-fifth year, is as most of our readers know, in active business at 163 Fulton street, New York, and is president of the J. W. Scott Co., Limited, who are doing an immense business in every description of stamps and coins. Mr. Scott is one of the busiest men of the age, as all who call in to see him can testify, and particularly as he is acknowledged to be the highest living authority on stamps and, in fact, on all philatelic matters. Mr. Scott's life has been a busy one, and few of those who meet him and talk with him realize the fact that he

has had such an adventurous career as he has passed through. Coming to this country while quite a youth, he set out for the gold mines and amidst the excitement and peril of a camp life for nearly two years, secured enough of the yellow dust to shake the commoner kind of the camp from his feet, and return to New York City. After casting about for a congenial business (for he was not of those natures who can idly rust themselves out) he chose the stamp business and immediately returned to England where he secured a large and valuable stock of stamps with which he came back to this country. At first he opened an office in Liberty street near the Old Middle Dutch Church which was then used by the United States authorities as the post office. From that time until the present his life has been devoted to the development of philately and everything connected with it, and this and future generations of collectors thank and will thank him for his literary labors in its advancement. He has turned out an unceasing stream of catalogues, albums, magazines, articles for newspapers and societies and is as active in all these respects to-day as he ever was.

His crowning work in the opinion of his friends, however, he has just completed, and it is, as all the productions of his brain and pen have been, his latest and best. This is his last album that is just ready for the great number of collectors that are waiting for it. It is truly called J. W. Scott's Best Album and it deserves the title. When the older collectors compare it with the so-called albums they first put their so-called collections in twenty-five years ago it sets them at once thinking what advantages the collectors of the present day have over those of the period referred to. There are several new features to this new album, each of which will commend itself to those who use it, and it comes in all styles and at all prices so as to be within the reach of every one's purse. Mr. Scott has, as usual, surpassed all his previous efforts in the production of this beautiful and useful work.

He has, however, for a long series of years accustomed us to just such surprises and we therefore accept this with the rest. It is one more laurel in his literary wreath, and one that the entire philatelic fraternity will willingly award him. And in closing this short sketch of the life of this remarkable man and recalling his many literary successes we cannot help saying to ourselves—"What next?"



### Two Newly Discovered Locals.

We have lately seen two heretofore unknown local stamps which, in the absence of illustrations, may be described as follows: Small oblong inscription enclosed in frame of zigzag lines, ZEIBER'S ONE CENT DISPATCH, printed in black, on blue writing paper.

The stamp was on a letter dated 1851 and addressed to a gentleman in Painesville, Ohio. Our second discovery is of the same design as the circular Blood and is evidently copied from that well known stamp.

Inscription in circular band; For the Post Office, above, G. H. Harri below, in center, City Despatch Post; printed in black on white paper.

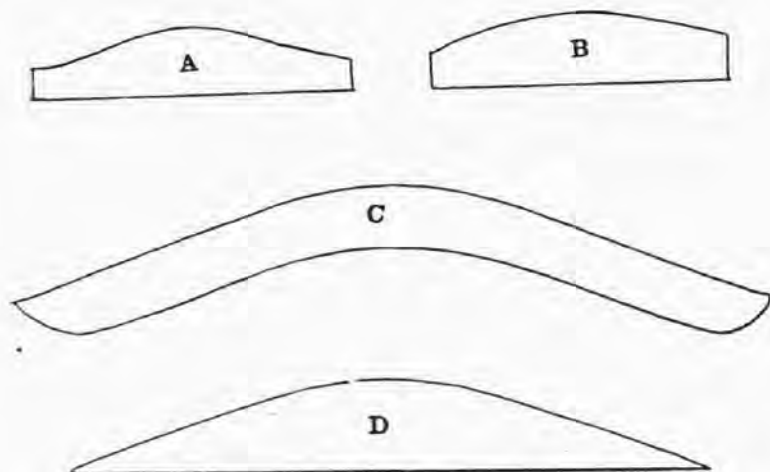
We have also heard of the well known local, Post Office one cent Despatch, white letters on solid ground, having been found printed in green. We have not yet been able to see this, but believe the report trustworthy.

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Letter Sheet Envelopes.

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Mr. Springer introduced in the House of Representatives on April 1, 1878, a bill for a postal letter-sheet envelope with postage stamps impressed upon them, but it was not till March 3, 1879, that Congress passed the bill. An attempt was made by Postmaster Howe, in the same year, to carry out the law, but the contractor who was to have provided the letter-sheet envelopes did not fulfill his contract and nothing was done.

It was not until Mr. Vilas became postmaster-general that any notice was taken of the law which had been a dead letter since its passage. Mr. Vilas was sanguine of the scheme's success, and the contract for the supply of the letter-sheet envelope was given to the United States Sealed Postal Card Co., who owned the patents of Mr. L. H. Rogers, the patentee of the letter-sheet envelope. The American Bank Note Co. are the manufacturers.



The first letter sheet envelopes of the style that the United States government are now issuing at their various post-offices was mailed in the New York post office to a friend by the writer, and bears the cancellation date, Aug. 21, '86, 10.30 A. M.

First issue.—As the lettering and stamps have not been changed and are so familiar to every one I will not describe them. The letter sheet was manufactured from very poor paper and the gum on the back so lightly put on that it was hard work to make them stick. The perforations at top and sides were very close together, there being eighty-three perforations on the top line and ninety-six perforations on the side, the folding guides being two perforations, one on each side of the side lines of perforations. On the back of the sheet the gum on the sides goes from the top down to the folding guides, on the lap it is gummed style A.

Second issue.—There are forty-one perforations at the top, and the side perforations are the same as the first issue, but instead of having folding guides on both sides they are but one on one side only. The one in my collection bears the date, Sept. 16th, '86. It is the only one I have ever seen. The folding guides are on the right side, but I believe there were some issued with the folding guides on the left side also. The gum on the back is like that on the first issue.

Third issue.—Is on a stiffer paper and has thirty-three perforations on the top line and seventy on the side lines. The folding guides are on one side only and on the opposite side there is a space left equal to three perforations. These perforated folding guides are found either on the right or on the left side of the sheet. The gum on the back extends the full length of the perforations, and that on the lap is similar to style D.

Fourth issue.—The perforations at the top are the same as on the second issue, *i. e.* forty-one and on the sides 90. The folding guides are the same as the third issue and can be found either on the right or on the left of the sheet. The gum on the back and the sides is the same as the third issue but of the gum on the lap there are three varieties in this issue: first, style B; second, style C; third, style D, thus making six varieties of the fourth issue as there are perforated folding guides on the right and on the left also of each.

Fifth issue.—Here we find a big improvement in the letter-sheet envelope; it is on good paper, watermarked, and printed on the face is the series 1, 2, 3, etc. (for every million distributed to the post offices is a series and as the last that have been issued are series five that means that these are part of the fifth million of watermarked sheets that have been delivered to the post-office department by the American Bank Note Co.) These are all perforated same as the fourth issue and gummed on the sides full length of perforations, and on the lap, style D. The folding guide perforations are either on the right or on the left side.

The thousands of varieties in length are caused by the cutting of the letter sheets by dies on the top and bottom by cutting machines so that hardly two boxes (500) are the same size.

### The Auction Season of 1891.

Many American philatelists place their chief reliance on the winter auctions to fill out their collection, and experience shows that intelligent and careful buyers find no difficulty in securing choice and valuable stamps at prices which insure their resale at a profit when circumstances dictate the policy of turning a collection into cash. Stamp auctions were first conceived and carried into successful operation by Mr. J. W. Scott, at the Mercantile Library building, on the evening of May 28th, 1870, when a fair collection was disposed of under the hammer, and met with such success that stamp auctions at once became an established institution in New York. For years Mr. Scott had a monopoly of this business and probably would have retained it to this day but for his temporary retirement from business in 1886. On his re-entry into the philatelic arena in 1888 many choice collections were placed in his hands for sale, and although several were sold entire three remained for auction which were disposed of during last winter at prices satisfactory to both buyers and sellers. On the approach of the present auction season, Mr. J. W. Scott's services were solicited by the owners of many fine collections which resulted in the album of Mr. Camp being selected as the first to be dismembered for the benefit of philatelists. The selection was well made as the collection contains just the class of stamps which are in such great demand at the present moment; rare American and a general run of moderate priced foreign stamps, in fact, stamps suitable for the general collector and the speculator. A casual run through the catalogue reveals such stamps as the 5 and 10c. St. Louis, beautiful specimens of all the regular series of U. S., complete sets of all the department stamps including the four high values of the State department, which are all sold separately so that all may have a chance of filling their set. A nearly complete set of Reay war department envelopes, all in perfect condition and of the old dark red color, the 10c. being probably the finest specimen known.







Among the foreign issues of note may be found the 2 annas green of India, a great rarity, some beautiful Mexicans including the newly discovered Cuernavaca, an original perforated Connell which is of great value, two one shilling Nova Scotia stamps, a fine shilling Newfoundland scarlet, both the rare Tuscany 2s. and 60c., the blue  $\frac{1}{2}$ t. arms of Naples, old Mauritius, Sydney views, superb unperforated Azores and Madeira, rouletted West Australia, fine old Spain, including the rare

2 real stamps and, as the showmen say, a host of other things too numerous to mention. Catalogues will be sent to all subscribers to this paper.

*J. W. Scott's Best Postage Stamp Album. The J. W. Scott Co. Limited, 163 Fulton Street, New York, publishers.*

We have just seen copies of this work that Mr. Scott has been so busily employed in producing during the past year. It is issued in the same sizes that he has made so famous for albums, and the attractive covers and binding will commend its outward appearance to young

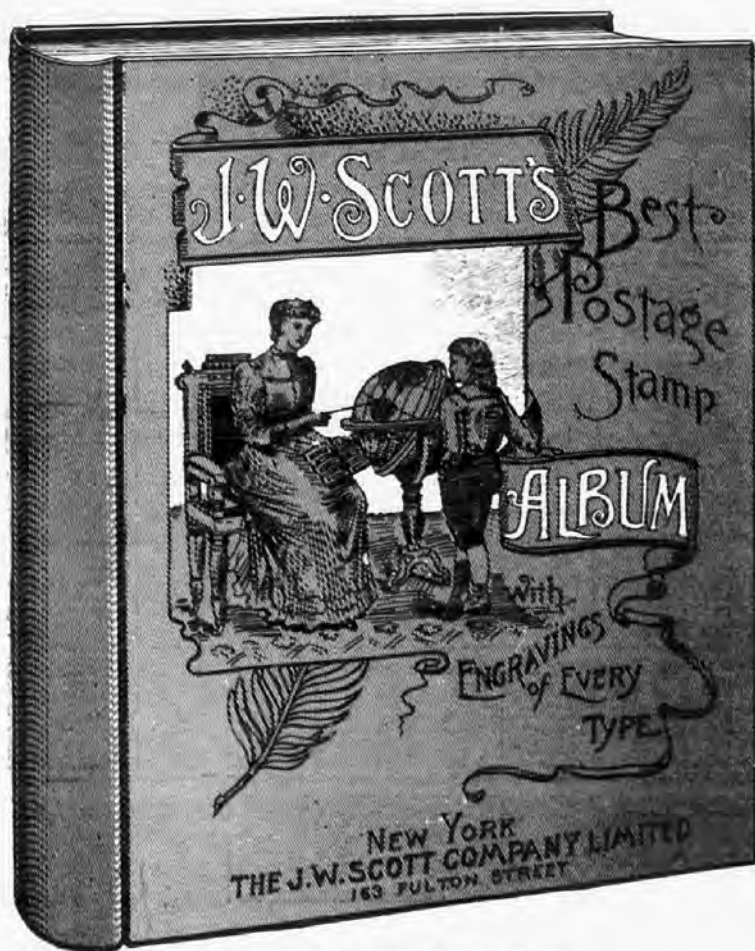

and old alike. On opening it we find many changes for the better from Mr. Scott's "International" album, and changes that all collectors will, we think, be as favorably impressed with as we are. The

first striking improvement we notice is the maps of the geographical position of each stamp issuing country, all engraved to its correct scale, at the head of each page where the stamps are to be put, thus showing the correct relative size of each country. This fills a long felt want, and will be appreciated by parents and teachers who have to answer so many questions from young collectors as to where the different countries are, questions that frequently bother the old heads quite as much as the younger ones. Then follows the populations



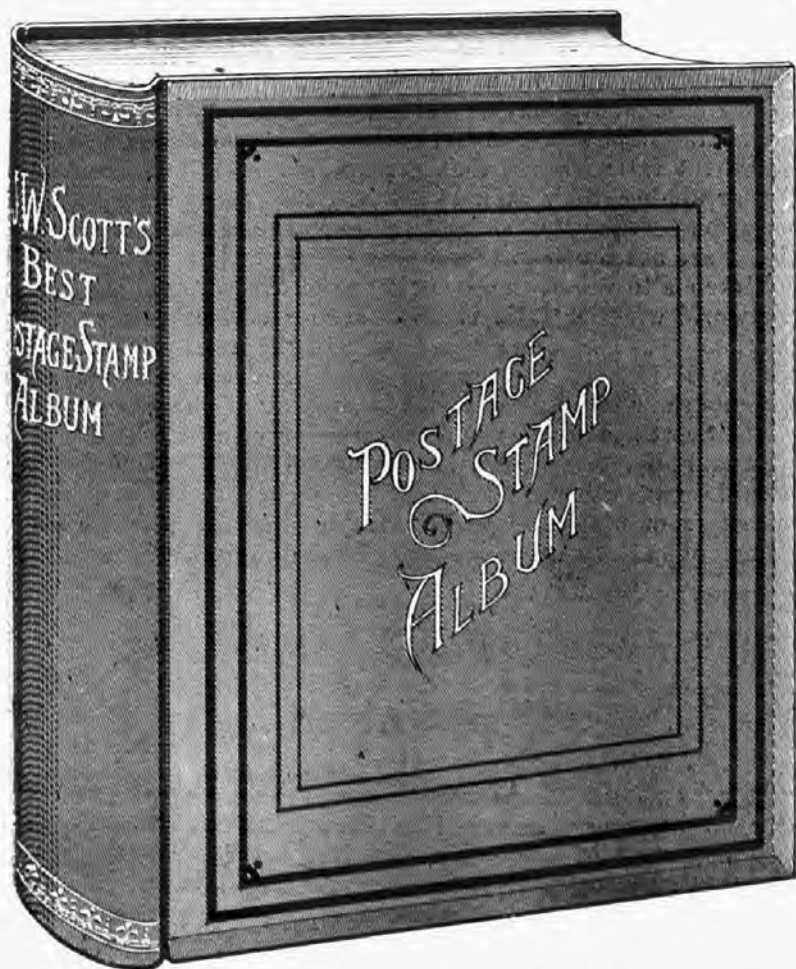
Reduced fac-simile of cover of \$2.50 edition.

taken from the census collated this year, a statement of the form of government and the pith of the country's history in as few words as it can be told. Another striking feature in this connection and a good one is that Mr. Scott has placed the name of the person whose portrait is on the stamp, over the square made to receive it so that it will always be in full view after the stamp is in its place and thus be an instructor to both young and old forming, as it will, an historical portrait gallery



when the squares are full. The next important point to notice is that each square contains the market value or catalogue price of the stamp required to fill it, and this will be fully appreciated by all whether the spaces are ever filled or not.

The geographical arrangement of the countries show quite a departure from the International Album and is also in the direct line of improvement. Mr. Scott commences with the United States and then passes to our nearest neighbors on this continent, British America and



Mexico, after which the regular alphabetical order is carried out to the end of the volume. A supplement for United States revenues is bound with it which if not used by every one, need offend none. Chronologically the book is brought down to almost the day of its issue, as we notice that the latest stamp issuing colonies, British East Africa and the Leeward islands, whose stamps are not yet known to the great majority of collectors, have their pages in the book. With the arrangements of the squares made to receive the stamps through-

out the album, we fancy every one will be pleased, they are very neatly ruled, with a liberal amount of room for each stamp and a beautiful little picture in miniature, of it. There is also a description of its color and denomination which will be a great help to collectors in arranging their sets, as the colors were not given in the International Album where the types were, and it was very confusing. In this album this evil is remedied and we think it will be appreciated. From a careful examination of the different pages we are much pleased to find that great care has been taken to have no spaces made for any but bona fide stamps, issued for government postal service, and not made by postmasters and others to sell to collectors. In this respect its value to the philatelic world is very great, and the later editions of the International Albums will suffer very much by comparison with it. We also find none of the errors in dates that occur so frequently in the pages of the International that have so frequently perplexed collectors when arranging their stamps by it. The many errors also in the description of the colors of the stamps in the last edition of the International are not found in this album.

Taken altogether, the book is one of exceeding value to the philatelic world whether it is used to keep a collection in or to arrange collections by. The reduced fac-simile of the front page of Nicaragua gives a good idea of the general appearance of the album, while the other cuts show the various styles of binding of the different albums.

Mr. Scott has done collectors a great service and one that will long be felt and appreciated, and he has added by its production, another honorable and conscientious philatelic work to the many that have manated from his active brain. We predict for the new album an immense popularity with all classes of philatelists.

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### Incorporation.

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BY A. R. ROGERS.

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It was expected at the late convention that the report of the committee on incorporation would be acted upon, but it was deferred till later on account of the absence in Europe of Mr. Mack, one of the committee. Mr. Mack has returned, and it was supposed that President Tiffany, who is one of the committee, would take the matter up at once, but in reply to a letter addressed by the writer on the subject, he does not advise it till the troubles in the ranks of the A. P. A. this past summer have blown over.

Now we do not agree with President Tiffany and I think we voice the sentiment of many of the members. Why should we incorporate? For the following special reasons, and the earlier the better.

1. To protect every member against the liability of being sued for any debt that may be incurred by the officers of the A. P. A.

This of itself is a sufficient reason if no other remained, especially so since three of our members had suits instituted against them this fall

by other A. P. A. members, for the bill of the literary board. Luckily it was withdrawn.

2. Large clubs and societies as a rule are incorporated for the reasons above stated, also that they may have more businesslike management, which is very essential if we do not wish to be head over heels in debt all the time.

3. To increase its membership and general usefulness.

The questions that the A. P. A. members will have to decide shortly will be:

Shall we incorporate the association under the laws of the State of New York or shall we go on under our present hazardous principle? The report of the committee advise if we do incorporate that we do so under the laws of New York State. If we decide to incorporate then we must consider the best feasible plan that will in all its ramifications be to the best interest of all, whether North, South, East or West, and to that end I wish to submit to the members, for their consideration the following rough sketch of a plan on which to incorporate the A. P. A.

#### PLAN.

1. It is necessary to have a number of responsible men to sign the incorporation papers and according to the law, the majority of whom must necessarily be residents of New York State.

I would propose that each State or territory in which there are at least five members, appoint one of their number to sign the incorporation papers and that the New York members elect from their number the quantity the law requires to make the necessary majority.

2. When this is done (which should be finished in thirty days after date the trustees have announced that the A. P. A. members had voted in favor of incorporation). The incorporators (as many as can) should meet in New York City and sign the necessary papers and then forward them to the various elected incorporators that had not signed it, and on receipt of the papers forward them to Albany for its barrel of red tape and seal.

Upon receipt of the incorporation papers from Albany, as many of the incorporators as can attend a called meeting should meet and elect the following officers:

President and trustees. Secretary and trustees, whose term will run till the next convention. The president shall preside at the annual convention and attend to the regular duties of his office. The trustees shall manage the affairs of the association, have power to appoint the various officers such as the literary board, including purchasing agents, exchange managers, etc., and transact all the business, make contracts, elect new members, pay bills, etc., but they are not to have the power to undo any acts or works made in the annual convention, or change the constitution or by-laws, and during the hours of the convention their powers are nulled. Five of the trustees necessarily must be residents of the State of New York. The secretary's office to be a salaried one fixed by the board of trustees, and the secretary will also be secretary of the board of trustees.

Each State or territory in the United States having a membership of five or more shall organize (as before stated and shall meet in convention twice a year) into a State branch of the A. P. A. They shall elect a presiding officer who shall be the resident vice-president of the A. P. A.

The main object in this plan is:—1st by organization in each State to largely increase the membership of the A. P. A. as well as to create a deeper interest in its objects and, 2d:—to have a representative voice in the affairs of the association. That at the annual convention the vice-president or his representative from his State shall be the recognized delegate and will carry out the wishes of the members of the State he represents.

At the annual convention these delegates with the officers of the association and trustees shall constitute the congress of voters. For each five members in a State the delegate shall have one vote besides his own.

This plan gives every State an equal showing according to the number of members it represents and does away with the controlling of votes by one or two parties.

Each State should adopt a constitution and by-laws prepared by a proper committee so we could all work in harmony together with these two essential points in view:

1. To arouse a greater enthusiasm in the A. P. A. work and thus increase its members.

2. To be able to so instruct its chosen vice-president that at the convention he may do his best to carry out their instructions.

NOTE:—Will you if this meets your ideas or if you can make any suggestions to better the interest of the A. P. A. members, write the editor, as our object is to put the A. P. A. on a solid and businesslike foundation.



### Literature.

Under this heading we find in a prominent German philatelic paper a savage review of a catalogue issued by a rival house. Hitherto we had thought that all the fighting and squabbling was "in our midst," so to speak, but we take a melancholy pleasure in the misfortunes of our friends, and are rather glad to see that we have not a monopoly of human nature.

The review begins:—"We have before us the first installment of this pompously announced work. With the exception of Blank's hand-book (another rival dealer who is thus neatly stabbed) we have never seen so wretched a book. Of the contents we may say that it contains many new and good things, but—but the new things are not good and the good things are not new, and as to the language and style, it abounds in such errors of grammar and language that we are forced to inquire whether the compiler can be a German, so brutally has he treated his mother tongue," etc., etc.

The collecting of United States envelopes must be increasing in Europe as we notice a two-page advertisement of an American dealer

in one of our German contemporaries, devoted solely to entire United States envelopes. We are pleased to see that the prices are about the same as those in J. W. Scott's catalogue of entire United States envelopes.

### Unnoticed and Unexplained Surcharges and Cancellations.

I have a particular fondness for stamps which bear a surcharge not indicative of a change in values. A German stamp with the field-post or one bearing a French post office cancellation interests me more than many a rarer stamp.

Perhaps the best-known of these stamps are those of Uruguay, surcharged FUERA DE HORA. Of these I have three varieties; one enclosed in a double-lined parallelogram with cut off corners, another in a single-lined parallelogram with rounded corners and a third, of which I have but one copy so badly cancelled that I can make out DE F . . . MA HORA

Formerly the Prussian post office stamped letters received after the mail bags had been locked, "NACH SCHLUSS."

Lately Peruvian stamps are found with the surcharge or cancellation "FUERA DE BOLLJA," Bolija being the Spanish equivalent of the French Valise or German Felleisen, the inscription indicating that the letters had been received after the bags had been closed, but the letters forwarded.

I have an Argentine 5 centavos (1867) bearing the surcharge "TOO LATE." Probably the English government had a postal agent in Buenos Ayres at that time.

Venezuela likewise of late has been surcharging letters and stamps FUERA DE HORA in violet.

I have several United States stamps used in the '70's, which bear the stamp "TOO LATE."

The English post office in stamping letters received after the regular hour, have a regular system of charging one penny extra for the first fifteen minutes, twopence for the half-hour, and fourpence for those letters received forty-five minutes late. The stamps themselves are not cancelled by a special too late stamp (except by accident) but the amount of extra postage is generally shown in the dating stamp thus: L. 1. LONDON 19 OCT. 77. L. 2. Mark Lane, Ap. 18, 82, but sometimes a special stamp is used, a single-lined square with L. 1 or L. 2 or L. 4.—Abridged from J. H. Anheisser in the *Postwerth Zeichenkunde*.

### Address of President Gregory.

*Address of the Members of the Brooklyn Philatelic Club.*

This being our annual meeting, it is again my duty as set forth in the constitution of this club, to address you as your president, on topics relating to its interests, and this duty I will endeavor briefly to fulfill. I have had the honor of filling the chair, as president of this club, for three successive terms, and in relinquishing it to my successor I feel that I can congratulate



you most heartily on the steady growth of the club, not only in its numbers, but in the greatly increased influence it wields in the philatelic world. In membership we have increased from sixty-five (our strength at this time last year) to eighty-five at present on our roll, and the average attendance at our meetings has been very favorable and satisfactory. The minutes will show that much has been done at our meetings to develop the cause of philately and to carry out the purposes for which this club was called into existence. A number of papers of great interest to philatelists have been from time to time during the year, prepared by our members and read before these meetings and been preserved for the use of others by being printed in the philatelic journals. We have also had a great many exhibitions of rare stamps from some of the most valuable albums in the world, and in the discussions that have taken place over them, very much knowledge has been added to what was possessed before in regard to many of them. Our club has also been represented at the various stamp exhibitions here and abroad, and one of our members, Mr. F. de Coppet, had the honor of receiving the silver medal of the stamp jubilee exhibition held in London the past year. All this is very pleasant to tell about and to think over, but we cannot stop here. To continue in our successful career we must still be up and doing. We must keep on in our good work if we wish to keep our present high place among the stamp societies. We must continue to attend the meetings. We must continue to prepare articles of interest and read them before the club, and we must continue to show the rarities of our albums, and above all, we must continue in the path that has always been trodden by this club, which is the one that leads through the pleasant fields of philately, and not wander from it to the rocks and pitfalls of politics and arguments. As I reminded you last year, this club is not a social club or a debating society; it is a philatelic club, and let us all insist on keeping it so. Since our last annual meeting death has cast its shadow over this club and removed from our midst our friend and brother philatelist, P. Van der Willigen. He was ardently devoted to our beloved science and had, in addition, endeared himself to all of us by his genial and intelligent manners. He will long be a pleasant memory to all of us who knew him and were accustomed to meeting him here. He was, at the time of his death, one of the trustees of this club, which office he filled honorably and faithfully.

The past year has also witnessed the formation of a new metropolitan philatelic club, the Hudson County Philatelic Association of Hoboken, New Jersey, to which we extend a hearty welcome. This leads me to ask you to give serious attention to the project now being urged, to acquire in some convenient locality suitable meeting rooms where joint meetings of the four metropolitan societies can be held and where members can meet during any day or evening. If this plan can be successfully carried out, it will give a very great impetus to philately not only here but all over the United States. The combined strength of the four societies is fully equal to the accomplishment of this project, and I hope to see the Brooklyn Philatelic Club well in the advance in the matter, and I recommend the subject to you most heartily. Rooms could easily be obtained in the upper floors of some one of the numerous high buildings recently erected in New York, where the light would be good all day for the exhibition of stamps and the electric light could be had at night.

Another subject I wish to bring before you is to remind you that the sixth convention of the American Philatelic Association will be held in New York City again on the third Monday in August of the present year. Let us all try to attend it and do our share to advance the cause of philately that it represents all over the United States, and laying aside all personal feelings and ambitions let us strive for such success for it as it has never had before. I am sure this club will be among the foremost in welcoming all the delegates and members from other cities who will attend it, and that we shall still be able to show them that we are workers in the philatelic cause as well as talkers. One more matter and I shall have finished. I is not too early to speak to you of the great World's Fair that will take place two years from now, in Chicago. At that fair the metropolitan philatelic societies should

give the most complete and extended exhibition of stamps that has ever been made, and our committees and sub-committees should be appointed very soon to meet with those appointed by the other societies and carry this exhibition to a successful termination and make this part of the fair one of its most attractive features.

And now, gentlemen, in retiring from the chairmanship of this club, I thank you most heartily and earnestly for the unswerving support and kindness you have always shown me since I have had the honor of presiding over you, and I bespeak for my successor a hearty continuance of it, and thanking you for your patience in listening to me this evening, I beg to wish you farewell.

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Editorial.

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In the first number of this paper we promised our readers that our pages should be devoted to keeping them posted on the actual value of stamps. In some of our previous numbers we have unwisely wandered from our original intention by admitting various articles, interesting no doubt to a great many, but not business. The world is well supplied with papers devoted to the literary side of stamp collecting, while those whose pages are filled with stamp gossip can be counted by the hundreds, even the scientific study of stamps is carefully looked after in the *Metropolitan Philatelist*. Our field, however, is unoccupied and will be filled to overflowing with full reports of every auction sale and other information of permanent value to buyers. Auction catalogues furnished in time will be reproduced for the benefit of European buyers.



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The Auction Season of 1891-2.

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It is now twenty-one years since the first postage stamp was sold at auction. That memorable sale which was destined to revolutionize the sale of stamp collections throughout the world was conceived and carried to a successful issue by J. W. Scott. At six in the evening of the 28th day of May '70, the first lot was called by Mr. William Leavitt, the entire catalogue of 270 lots being sold in two hours, realizing four hundred and seventy-seven dollars, the commissions on the sale being twenty-five per cent.

The value of the collections sold has steadily increased while the number of sales have risen from one or two in the season to two or three per month. The greater number of sales were conducted by Mr. Scott, but many imitators have arisen in this country and in Europe, which has not worked to the benefit of collectors, as the charges have remained at about the same figure while the service has deteriorated even where reasonable security was obtained, which in some cases was altogether lacking.

The present season has been selected to entirely reorganize the auction business, commissions have been reduced to 10 per cent. and the sales will be lifted out of the rut they have been allowed to get into by incompetent hands. In future an auction will mean an auction the stamps will be sold for cash only, and the

auctioneers will make no charge for buying. There has been no reason for keeping the commissions at such an abnormally high rate as 25 per cent. except that the auctioneers have given long credits and of course had to charge for the risk they took. Much dissatisfaction has been expressed at the way some auctioneers have of opening bids after the lots had been knocked down, but right here we wish to record our admiration of the honorable way in which Bangs & Co. conduct their business and the superb tact, judgment and decision with which Mr. Merwin officiates at the hammer.

The present cut in auction charges is wholly for the benefit of collectors. Of course there is no profit in writing a twenty page catalogue, printing two thousand copies and paying the postage on the same, to say nothing of rent, gas and clerk hire. The seventy-five to one hundred dollars commissions on a sale will hardly suffice to pay expenses and will not leave a dollar for management, but it is expected that the facility afforded amateurs to sell at about cost price (to say nothing of large profits to be made by careful buyers) will greatly stimulate collectors in their search for rarities and have a beneficial effect on the stamp business throughout the world. Of course it must be understood that auctions conducted at this price are experimental and will certainly be discontinued unless they are brought forward in sufficient numbers to keep the force of clerks employed steadily engaged. The J. W. Scott Co., Limited, are entitled to the thanks of the entire stamp collecting fraternity for the new era they have inaugurated.

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#### A Chance to Speculate.

The entire remainders of the stamps of Antigua, Dominica, Montserrat, Nevis, St. Christopher, and the Virgin Isles will be sold to the highest bidder who will doubtless place them on the market at a fair advance over cost.

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#### The New South Wales Reprints.

The necessity of a paper devoted to the commercial side of stamp collecting was never better exemplified than by watching the downward course of these sheets during the past years. The first set of sheets sold in this country were negotiated by M. Giwelb and



were sold by him in this city for five hundred dollars. Another set was planted through the Scott Stamp and Coin Co. at about half that figure, later many New York collectors secured sets at about fifty dollars and the chances are that half that sum would secure any quantity of sets at the present day. Had the full particulars been published it is very certain that such prices could not have been obtained.

## HANOVER.

10 gr. green, made from the 2 gr. and heavily post-marked over the value.

## SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

3d. on 4d. with the black surcharge changed to red. 4d., old type, with the star watermark obliterated and crown and S. A. stamped in its place.

## TRINIDAD.

1851.—Without value; the red, purple-brown and blue stamps made from the Mauritius stamps of similar type.

## GREAT BRITAIN.

Unperforated 1d. red, watermarked small crown, changed to the 1d. *bluish-black*.

The Committee of Experts of the Philatelic Protection Association will be happy to examine and report upon any specimens of the above mentioned stamps, on condition that such stamps are sent to the Secretary, accompanied with sufficient postage for reply.

We have lately seen a very deceptive forgery of the 6p. Nova Scotia, which, owing to the prompt action of the New York dealers is not likely to trouble collectors, as when the culprit was caught he promptly dumped the plate in Newark Bay. The principal point of difference is in the thickness of the figure 6 in each corner of the stamp, while the centre being printed from a lithographed transfer from a steel die, shows the usual roughness of the lines. The paper, also, is not of the right texture, and the color, although of many shades of green, does not strike either of the correct ones.

GREECE.—We have also under examination a fine imitation of the 80 lepta of the first type. It can be distinguished by being slightly smaller than the genuine stamps and the shading to circular disk on left side, is too heavy; this is specially noticeable where the shade is carried around the bottom. The specimen before us is printed on laid paper.

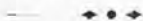
