The Postal Card is the paper published in the interests of postcard coliectors, and cannot fail to be of value to them. All the current information about postcards is to be foind in the Postal Card.

Mr. A. Monteith, of Tuebrook, Livergoo!, sends in some mounts of a very good quality. He does not state the price, but no doubt they are as cheap as they are good.
The I'hilatelic Joumal of Great Britain, for September, is quite up to its usual mark, which is saying a great deal. A few extracts from correspondents ppon the proposed Pritish Exhibition of Postage Rtamps is both amusing and instructive. All our contemporary's correspondents seem to hold the opin on that an exhibition before long is necessary and certwin to take place, but the renue is made the sulject of very diverse views. Several correspondents suggest the advisability of holding it in the provinces, one gentleman naming Birmingham, and another, Liverpool. The opinion of the P.J. of G.B. is in favour of London, and however much enthusiasm towards an exhibition might be shown by local collectors were it held elsewhere, for our part we doubt if sufficient support would be accorded anywhere outside London. to make it a financial or philatelic success. The useful epitome, by Mr. Skipton, includes Trinidad and United States stamps, while the Rerien of Revieus is even better than heretofore, if that be possible.

The S.B. Bradt Co., Wabssh Avenue, Chicago, have favoured us with the catalogie of their Eighth Sa'e. to be held on Oct. 19th. The lots include many degirable sets and single stamps, especially United States. The firm intend to ho'd three sales during the World's Fair, and anyone having stamps to dispose of, may place every confidence in them.

That smart Transatlantic paper, The Collector, is in good form for September, although the reading matter, of course, is of more interest to our American friends than to us.

Messrs. Latwrence \& Co. are gradually improving the appearance of the Philatelic Extract and Advcriser, but much remains to be done ere it can be seriously considered as a paper of any use to philatelists.

These were specially printe:l in 1888 without gum and periovated 13 to ascompany the other sets of reprints as given in our lists. As the 20 reis bustre was the only obscletc raduc, the others might be ciassified under specimen stamps.

The Journal stamp, 2t reis, has been reprinted twice, in 1886 with "agores" overprint 14 mm long, and in $1880^{\circ}$ with smaller typs, 10 mm . long.

## AS OTHERS SEE US.

[From Birmingham Daily Mail, Sept. 9th, 1892].
Possibly there is no man who pursues a hobby with more persistent enthusiasm than the philatelist, which is, being translated, a collector of stamps. But the development of the mania promises to institute systems of speculations before which the operations of collectors in the past must sink into insignificance. The coming exhibition of postage stamps, which is to open at the Palais de l'Industric in Paris, has given a notable fillip to the trade in used stamps. The Stamp Exchange in the Champs Elysees fell for some time into a state of languor, now it is brisker than ever. One sees there every morning between three and four hundred 1 hi atelists, or speculators. They meet in the open air near the Marigny end of the gardens, and make as great a hubbub as if they were at the Bourse. Quotations of the prices are telegraphed all over France and abroad. A postcard was sold for E10, because it had gone all round the world after it was addressed, and bore 72 postmarks, and yet it was evident that means had been taken to cause it be sent on through 72 post offices, for the original and supplemental addresses were written in small characters with red ink, so that the postmarks might not be unduly interfered with. So many and clever are the forgeries of stamps that a coliector, to avoid being bitten, has to be as keen in his judgment as a purchaser of "ancient" coins.

We believe the commission is the same, viz ., $10 \%$, which includes expert opinions on genaineness.

There are many stmmp which are not so highly pized in America as in Eng'and, and it is excoedingiy usefal to get catnlogues of American Sules. The first on the ground was the Scott Stamp and Coin Co., Fast 23rd Street, New lork, and the firm will le specially lively in a few weeks. Thes chnrge no commission for buying but either a deposit or satinfactory reference inust accompany bids. In Chicago, the $S$. B. Bradt Co., of 132, Wabash Avenue, commenced their second serson on Sop. 14th. A few prices from this, their 7 th sale, will be found in our Auction Rejorts. They a!so recieve commissions to buy for collectors, and charge no commission.

We strongly advise benyers to send for cataloguce, and to forward bids for lots; we have met with many of the gems of our own collection in this way, and are often agreeably surprised to find that we have purchased considerably under our limits.

## THE PARIS EXHIBITION.

When I visited the Champs de Mars, in 1889, locomotion was more difficult as the attractions of that Exhibition were of more general interest than the one ol ened on Sep.t. 15th. Still, a goodly number assembled at the opening ceremony to congratulate President Dr. Legrand and Secretary Levourd on the stecess of their efforts.

After listening to the fine band of the 76th Infantry a general promenade of inspection took place. By far the largest and best collection was shown by Messrs. Stanleg Gibbons \& Co., under the supervision of Mr.
C. J. Phillips, complete plates of Sydneys, Nevis, and tirst issue 'lasmania, seemed quite common with this firm, and their Vestern Australia was probably the finest lot ever brought together.

The President's exhibits comprised many stamps, worth risking cholern or mal de neer to get a sight of. 1 Tis datanc.e in entire sheets and varieties of syllabic could unly be equalled by the exhibit of Mr. Hacon, at the London Exhibition. His unused twopenny Post Office and complete plates of the native series of Mauritius filled your refresentative with nore envy than anything in the show.

Bar:y Guianas, original Reunions, and first issue Sandwich lsles were the gems in the Doctor's collection, adenired by all.

The veteran, M. Moens, of Brussels, exhibited specimens of all the works issued by his firm, and quite a library they formed.

Mr. Morley, of Mapeli'd, gave a good representation of Einglish stamps.
M. Mors' artistic exhibit was much admired, and proves what nice ornaments you can produce with such common things as V.1k. English, Shiling Nova Scotia and New Brunswick duable (ienevas, and 3 pf. Saxony. This certainly was the star of the exhibition.

Messrs, T. Buhl \& Co. showed plates of Sydney Views; and provisional Mexico, Albums and the Stamp Nears completed their stall.

The collector of Swiss stamps would have been charned with M. M. Blanchurd \& Hauscr's collections.

Mr. Brown, of Salisbury, had a highly representative show of Straits Settlements and Dependencies, nis Johor, Perak, etc., were ill many instances complete, the errors (fearfully and wonderfully made) were all there.

Looking at the Exlibition, as a whole, I shall classify it anongst the decided successes of I'hilately, and if the members of the I.P.E. who are agitating for an English Exhibition know the difficulties which have been overcome, and are pre ared to face them, and can persuade collectors to put on view such stamps as were seen at Paris, another good lift will be given to the good old hobby.

Among English prize-winners, Mr. Mackenzie won a Silver Medal in the Collection section; Mr. W. Morley, First prize for Fiscals; and Major Evans, First prize in the class for Collections of Catalogues, de.

WHY should there be so little sense of dignity among philatelic journalists? Surely the position occupied, at least presumably, by the writer for a Philatelic Journal, is that of a leader of thoughts among philatelists! Surely the position of any journalist is an honourable one !-even if the paper is published with the object of advertising the wares of a particular firm, the writers in that journal should not be so oblivious of their own interests as to circulate utter rubbish among their supporters. Our hobby is an intellectual as well as interesting one, the end and aim of both dealer and collector is the same, and the philatelic writer must be either dealer or collector,why then should we see such contemptible, often offensive productions among the small fry of Philatelic Journalism? If we have the welfare of our science at heart, we should do all in our power to make outsiders respect it and us, and show that we have thinkers among us, but the aim of many of the smaller journals seems to be to make Philately the laughing stock of the Philistines. In saying this we have not so much in mind the English Philatelic Press, as the American, and only the lower grades of that. We are not cursed with a feeling of ultra-respectability, nor false modesty, but we would ask how any respectable man could stand up and argue for the intellectual qualities of his
hobby, when confronted by an opponent who held in his hand one of these ridiculous and often offensive effusions. By all means let us have humour and fun, but not vulgarity and thinly-veiled nastiness.

lines for direction, and a penny current red stamp stuck in top centre, overprinted with large arms of the state overlapping the stamp, the words-"brief kaart" in large type each side of stamp, all in black on white card; he explains that these are a re-issue of the provisional cards in use for a short time. Mr. Walker also sends a new card same type as described above, but without lines for directions, with the addition of oranje under brief, and vrijstant under kaart; this card is surmounted with a threepenny blue current stamp, overprinted $\mathrm{r} \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. , and arms in black.

UNITED STATES.-The Scott Stamp and Coin Company have sent us specimens of new Reply Post Card, large size, ornamental border, medallion of President, surrounded by band lettered message card one cent, and on the annexed Card reply card one cent.

## REVIEWS:

The Milatelic Journal of Great Britain contains an exhaustive account of the Paris Philatelic Exhibition, and has a frontispiece giving a fine and Irge view of Mr. Brown's stall thereat ; it also contains n complete list of the prize-winners. The Review of Reviens has some choice extracts from various philatelic sources and well maintains its reputation. The Mctropolitan Philatclist gives a forecast of the Columbian Postage stamps to be issued next year. The stamps will be executed by the American liank Note Company, which is in itself a guarantee of the merit of the production. Tho same paper gives some information about the U. S. envelopes.

The Philutelic Monthly World is as smart as ever and gives the very latest issues, as it always does.

The Cataloguc appearing in the American Journal of Philatcly advances as far as India, and gives an exhaustive list of the stamps of the various Native States. Much valuable and uncommon information is prasented, and the varities of error in the Bhopal stamps are simply appalling.

In the Scptember number of the New York Post Office, Mr. Gregory concludes his account of the actual thing, viz., the New York Post Office. The general get-up of this periodical reflects the utmost credit on Mr. Gremmel.

The Stamp issued by Messrs. Grevaing and Spooner, is as usual, newsy and bright, a rather smart bit of
doggrel with the refrain-" Your subscription has expired. Please renew!" appears foremost of the matter. The editor extends a kind invitation to the Philat le Chronicle and Advertiser, which we must decline with thanks; we might come in contact with the individual who writes "A Philatelic Reverie" in the Quuker City /'hilatelist.

The Collector, another American exchange, does not contain much information of advantage to outsiders, but it must be of great use to the sons of Philatelia, whose official organ it is.

The last Amexican paper to notice is the Quaker City Philatelist. We find therein "A Phitatelic Reverie" by one, Canadensis. This, we are informed, was written expressly for the Quaker City Philatelist. We should imagine that one other such articlo would annihilate the suptort extended to the Quaker Cify Pinilatelist unless it caters for the slums and gutters.

Vindin's Philatelic Monthly for September is very entertaining reading, and provides very useful information about the doings of our confreres in the Antipodes.

The Stamp Neus contains a continuation of Mr. A. A. Bartlett's Reminiscences; the list of New Issues is very full, and the account of the Paris Exhilition is tae best we have yet seen, being full, complete, and critical.

The Editor of L'Echo de la Timbrologic does not think justice has been done in conferring only the Second Honourable Mention in Class 8 upon his praper. He is of opinion that the efforts of his raper in the interests of the Exhibition merited recognition in the 17th Class, which was entablished to reward the most praiseworthy efforts to make the Exhibition successful.

The Stamp Collector which now includes the Piilintelic Monthly Neus is very readable. We sympathise with our Contemporary on the loss of the combined labour of 'several men for a few days' in preparing the type for the advertising pages, whereby they are unabie to give their advertisements in this issue.

We can recommend the new firn of Monteith and Co., Portland Street, Southport, to the notice of collectors who desire to buy medium stamps. We have been favoured with a sight of one of their shects, which are priced very reasonably, no discount; approval sheets are the speciality.

The Wholesale List of Messrs. Stanley Gibbons will repay pernsal-several good and cheap lines are offered.

Another new bark is essaying the troubled waters of Philately. Mr. H. Fisher, late senior partner of the firm of Fisher, Titley and Co., has commenced an independent business under the style of "The Bath Stamp Co.," 5: Bridge Street, Bath : the wholesale list should be of advantage to small dealers, while the
retail list is one of the neatest as well as chearest we have scen, and shou'd be in the liands of every collector.

To give an ider of the large qumatity of stamp albums used in the United States, we might say that the J. W. Scott Comprany sold last month 1,500 copies of their BEST album.

Mr. W. T. Wilson, of Westminster Road, Mandsworth, has dissolved partnership with Mr. Cheveley. Mr. Wilson has probably the finest stock of good stamps in the country. Mr. Cheveley will continue to carry on the Auction business and is sure to give every satisfaction to his patrons.

Messrs. Rayward Bond and Co., issue a neat and cheap lietail l'rice List.

The Wholesale Price List of Messrs. Clarke and Co., Cambridge Road, Lee, is one of the cheapest and best we have seen. In some lines they are facile princeps.

## REPRINTED STAMPS.

Compiled ly W. K. Jornt. (With notes by the Editor and others).

BAMRA.-The 189o, type set stamps, lettered Bamra Pojtage, below native characters, and lower a bandrol were reprinted in the following year to meet the demands of collectors.

The reprints followed the original setting well, and it is difficult to decide in single stamps if from origival or reprinted sheets. Entire sheets may be classified as originals if they are formed by these numbers of stamps to the sheet ; the $\frac{1}{4}$ anna, 16; the the $\frac{1}{2}$ amna, 16 or 96 ; the 1 anna, 72 ; the 2 amas, 80 ; the 4 annas, 96 ; the 8 annas, 96. All the sheets of reprints are formed with 20 stamps, 5 rowes hovizontal and four vows vertical.


NOTE.-The $\frac{1}{4}$ ama and 4 annas are on a vather lighter faper than the originals; the $\frac{1}{2}$ ama is on paper of more roseate hate than the originals. The error A of Postage, cmiffdd, exists on criginals only. The inverted $B$, of Bemva, and inverted Ra, of Bamra, exists only on the reprinted sheets.

## BADEN

Only the two imperforate issues have been reprinted. The originals were printed on stout unsurfaced paper, on thin surfaced paper, and on surfaced paper, thicker and less smooth. The black impression on the reprinted stamps is more pronounced, and the colourcd papers have a fresher and brighter look than the originals.

In 1867, the following were reprinted, on rather stout surfaced paper.

The originals have gum on the tip of the flap only; in the reprints the gun is along the edge. The originals have a tresse on the fap, bat the reprints a rosace which belongs to a later issue (1862) of this country.

It is impossible to distinguish between original and reprint of the above; few, if any, of the other values than the two first were used. All have been excellently forgea, and the cheap sets zsually met with belong to that class.

## BELGIUM.-

The first isste only is known to have been reprinted. A certain test is that the watermark (two L's interlaced) found on oviginals, is wanting in the reprints.

In 1866, the two following, with value in straight line, were reprinted on white wove, on horizontally laid, and on vertically laid paper.

## THE COLUMBIAN ISSUE OF U.S. STAMPS.

The new set of United States Stamps will be of the same height as the present series, but twice as long, the increased size being thought necessary in order to properly display the illustrations. These are intended to commemorate the discovery of America by Columbus, and several of the illustrations have already been decided upon.

These are the " Discovery of America by Columbus-Firstsight of Land;""Columbus' Fleet at Sea," from Revista de la Marina; "Landing of Columbus," after the Van der Lyn picture in the United States Capitol; "The Santa Maria," Columbus' flagship, after Alfred Harrisse ; "Columbus, Asking Aid of Queen Isabella;" Columbus Reciting the Story of His Discovery to Ferdinand and Isabella on His return from His First Voyage." On one of the denominations will appear a portrait of Columbus.

It is expected that the entire series will be put on sale January 1st, 1893, and during the succeeding year will entirely supersede the present series. It is expected that the net revenue to the Government from the sale of these stamps will be very large, and that their sale to collectors will largely exceed any previous issue. It is also believed that this issue will greatly stimulate interest in the Exposition both at home and abroad.-New York Evening Post.

How the printing will take all that cheek of her gracious majesty I don't see!

## ITEMS.

He came slowly into the Editorial sanctum. He sat down and gazed wistfully upon us. He then said, "I have a conundrum. 'What stamps would best suit a lunatic?' You, for instance," he casually remarked. We remarked that we did'nt know. "One cent. stamps, of course," he said. We told him we did not understand. "Wants sense stamps," he yelled, "don't you see the joke." We did, and sadly, but with a feeling that we were doing our duty, we slew him. His remains are now awaiting identification.

Stamp Collecting. - In Europe alone there are several million stamp collectors. All sorts and conditions of men and wo:nen seem to take a delight in philately, and it has thousands of juvenile votaries. One of the most valuable collections in the world is that of M. Phileppe de Ferrari, son of the Duchess of Gallièra, which is worth $\{120,000$. French stamp collectors have a weakness for Asiatic specimens, for the 1847 issue of Mauritius, and for 1842 examples of the stamps of Bourbon Island. The former are valued at $£ 48$ apiece, and the latter at $£ 160$ each. The stamps of British Guiana (1850) and of Hawaii (1852) fetch higher prices still. Among distinguished philatelists may be mentioned the Tsar of Russia (whose collection is worth at least $£ 60,000$ ), the

Prince of Wales, the Duke of Edinburgh, the late Prince Imperial, Baron Rothschild, \&c.-Daily Paper.

A Leetter delivered after 50 Years' Delay.-The annual report from St. Martin's-le-Grand, contains some remarkable incidents, but has it ever recorded such an extraordinary episode as this, which occurs in the recently issued report of the Postal Department at Melbourne. In 184 I a man arrived in the colony with a letter from England for another man who had previously emigrated. The latter could not be found, and it remained in the Melbourne General Post Office until last year-exactly half-a-century-when it was delivered to the person to whom it was originally addressed.

$\mathbb{M}^{x}$V esteemed contemporary has for some two or three months past been engaged in airing the opinions of various enthusiasts who are desirous of repeating the expe:iment of 1890 , and holding another English Philatelic Exhibition. The pros and cons of the project have been discussed, the probable cost calculated, and even the locality of the exhibition, in the opinion of several correspondents, fixed. As an item in the great Republic of Philately, we take the utmost interest in any projects which have for their object the furtherance of the study, and any assistance we can render is always ready at the first call; but in the present instance we must take something more than a mere general interest in the scheme, and say more than can be expressed by a passing notice. We mention above that the locality has been fixed in the minds of several correspondents, and the reason why we must sound a decided note is because our own worthy city of Birmingham is generally pointed out as the most promising spot for the proposed venture. There is much said in favour of Birmingham, but not one argument could hold good when contrasted with the claims of London, except the very strong one that Birmingham is centrally situated for all England. But is it true that philatelists of

Lancashire and the North would be more likely to attend an exhibition in Birmingham than in London?

The two questions to consider are-first, "Would provincial philatelists visit a place for the single attraction of an exhibition, or on account of that attraction in combination with the other attractions which the place holds out ?" and as a corollery, "Would the attractions of Birmingham bear comparison with those of London?" The second question every philatelist must bear in mind is this-" Would an exhibition in Birmingham command as good exhibits as one held in London, and would dealers be as likely to take space at such an one ?" It is very certain that the philatelists of Birmingham, alone, could not make an exhibition pay; but we will say this, that among the Birmingham collectors there are the men of business who will reduce expenses to the minimum, and make the best use of receipts. There are halls and rooms to be obtained at most reasonable rates, there are willing philatelists to do the work. The question remains, " Will outside collectors do their part by patronising the extibition ?" If this ques. tion can be answered in the affirmative, then the exhibition will take place within a few months.

By the time this number is in the hands of our readers, Christmas will be within measurable distance. For the second time we wish our readers, with all heartiness, the Season's Greetings.

SARAWAK. - Messrs. Whitfield King and Co. send specimens of the new 1 cent current type and perforations, printed in violet and black.

STRAITS SETTLEMENTS.-A new 1 cent stamp, Scychelles type, has been printed in green, and will supersede the overprinted ic. and 8 c . green as soon as stocks are exhausted.

TASMANIA.- We learn from Vindin's Philatelic Monthly that the following stamps have been ordered, and will shortly be on sale; design similar to the recently issued 5d.:-

## REPRINTED STAMPS. (Continued.)

BADEN.-Mr. Harry Hilckes writes us that the 9 kr . rose has not been reprinted, but does not give authority for his assertions. Messrs. Collin and Calman include this value in "The Advanced Catalogue," published by The Scott Stamp and Coin Company, and we have been shown specimens which answered every detail of design, yet which were on stout surfaced paper of similar texture to that on which the acknowledged reprints were printed.

BERGEDORF.-Mr. Harry Hilckesagain takes us to task, and informs us we are wrong in saying it is impossible to detect reprint from original. We have turned to his book at his request, and would point out that that the differences in type do not occur on the earliest reprints, and we consider all the stamps printed from the doctored plates more of the nature of imitations that reprints.

CANADA.-Pemberton's Handhook states that the 12 d. black has been reprinted. We also have seen it and all the pence values on thin wove paper in their normal and fancy colours. These are looked upon as essays, but possibly are reprints.

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.-The 1861 issue, usually known as wood blocks, were reprinted in 1883 on wove paper, but without the two errors of colour. The oviginals were on laid paper, and are much duller in shade. Proof of reprint is found in "London Philatelist," September, 1892.

BREMEN.--No stamps of this city are known to have been reprinted. A great number of unpostmarked counterfeit adhesives are often looked upon as reprints, but none have been sufficiently well executed to deceive the initiated. The band stamp of the envelopes exists in three types. The one with narrow shield, usually met with on blue and white paper we consider bad.

BRITISH GUIANA.-The 1852 issue of I cent magenta and 5 cents blue were both reprinted in 1865, with perforations $12 \frac{1}{2}$. The colours, however, are much more vivid, and they are easily distinguished from originals, even with the perforations lopped, although on thicker paper they are far less opaque on holding to the light.

At the same date ( 1865 ) the 1853 issue, I cent red and 4 cents blue, were reprinted, and sent out both imperforate and perforated 13. They may be distinguished by being on thin papcr, whitst the originals zerie on stout white neove paper.

The 1860 I cent rose was also reprinted at same time on thin paper perforated 13 . The origival teas on thick paper and guages 12.

BRUNSWICK.-The 1865 issue, which have been classed as reprints, are genuine Government remainders.

New Lssues are to the fore as usual ; the various types are prepared by a photograplic process, and presented as a frontispiece.

The Editors of the Stamp Neas complain that we neglected mention of their award in our account of the Paris Exhibition. We published the article as received from our special representative-and it will be noticed that we only give the namos of the wimers of the principal prizes. We should have been most pleased had we been able to chronicle the name of Messrs. Buhl among the recipients of the highest awards.
The Stamp Collectur's Morthly gives a good deseription of the forged 1d. and 6d Nova Scotia.

Birmingham has produced another stamp paper. It is called the city Stamp, and is published by Mr, J. H. Cooke, Hick Strcet, Birmingham. Subseription is Gd. per annum.

The October number of the A Acrican Jownal of Philately continues Messrs. Collin and Calman's excellent catalogue. An exhanstive description of the stamps of various Indian States is given, and some brand new information about these (to some) interest. ing emissions.

The Philatelic Monthly Horld is still to the fore with its list of New Issues.

We have received from Mr. Jewell, Dortland, Me., U.S.A., a copy of the October number of 'he Philatelic Era. There is nothing but praise for this excelleut paler. ## REPRINTS. <br> By HARIlY HILCKES.

Mr. Harity Hilches, of the now stamp firm of Lilekes, Kirkpatrick \& Co., Cheapside, London, has sent us a copy of his translation of Dr. Kalckhoff's Gernian work.

We welcome the book, and consider the price (1s 6d) so low that neither dealer nor collector who handles unused stamps, is wise to be without it. We have not
soen the original work, but should suppose that the English translation is more valuable by the additions made by Major Evans' notes on Cashmere and other native stamps. A form is sent out with each volume, and the reader is invited to fill up same with suggestions or corrections for the bencfit of a future edition, which we predict will soon be required. We should not be too critical on so difficult a task (as we know it to be from experience) of compiling from items scattered all over Philatelic literature, yet our own lists of Mexican and some other countries, which we have obtained from high officials in the Postal Service, will be found to differ from the work now under review.

We heartily wish, and think the book will attain a decided success.

$\tau^{-}$IE issue of the new "Columbus" stamps for the United States, again raises the interesting question as to who really discovered America.

The answer of nine-tenths of those who might be asked the question would be the same, and that answer the one word-Columbus! But to what extent is popular opinion correct in this connection. It is open to doubt whether Columbus ever saw the mainland of America, and, if he did, he was not the first European, by hundreds, who not only saw it, but landed on it, and settled there. We all know the legends of the Northern Sagas, the stories of the glorious Vinland, the land of wine,-but as these accounts are merely hereditary traditions, and many have received their origin in the imagination of some Northern bard, we are entitled, notwithstanding the disquieting thought that these Northmen were grand and intrepid sailors, who might have reached the Western World, to lend a deaf ear to their assertions. The tale runs that the vessels of these hardy Norsemen after discovering Iceland and Greenland, pushed on to the west and landed somewhere upon the shore of the St. Lawrence, thence their ships sailed southward, entering Chesapeake Bay, and even penetrating as far as Florida.

Later voyages carried these hardy mariners round the Gulf of Mexico to the shore of South America, where they landed and formed settlements. The discoveries took place about the year 1000, or 500 years before Columbus sailed on his venturesome voyage. These narratives, however, superior people look upon as apocryphal in the extreme,-they want corroborative evidence, can such be supplied ? It is generally acknowledged that the Northmen occupied the Western shores of Greenland, establishing many trading posts, and forming Greenland into a Bishop's See, in fact the list of Bishops nominated to the See, from very early times until 1537, is known. But Greenland is not America. A French mariner, several years before the voyage of Columbus, is said to have sailed from Dieppe, and to have landed in South America, where he discovered the remains of a Scandinavian town, but the records of his voyage were destroyed in a great fire at Dieppe in 169+, We are therefore driven to seek other evidence. In the Smithsonian Institute, at Washington, is a tomb of masonry, discovered in Boston Bay at the end of the last century. It contained a skeleton, and an iron handle of a sword. The skeleton was that of a white man, and the sword-handle was of European makeprevious to the fifteenth century,-a century earlier than Columbus. At the same Institute is a facsinile of the curious inscription in Runic characters, with cryptograph signs and drawings, known since 1860 as the Dighton Writing Rock, and which means, when translated-"One hundred and thirty-one men of the North occupied this country with Thorfinn." The most convincing proof of all, however, is the inscription at Arrow Head, on the Potomac river. It marked the tomb of a Norseman's wife, and bore an inscription,
which, translated into English, reads-" Here lies Syasi, the fair one of Western Iceland, the widow of Kolder, sister of Thorgyr, by her father, aged twenty-five years. God be merciful to her." In the tomb, among other things, were found two coins of the Eastern Roman Empire. When it is known that these Northern pirates were employed by the Emperors of Constantinople to defend them against the Turks, this discovery is very significant. But what makes this inscription on the banks of the Potomac most interesting is the discovery in Iceland, near the church of Shalholt, in the year 1863 , of a document bearing the date of 1117 , which relates the deathof Syasi, and describes very clearly the position of her tomb in Vinland.

Columbus clearly led the way for continued communication with America, but the sometime received suppositiont hat he was the first European to discover the New World must be relegated to the same limbo of exploded myths to which the assertion that Rowland Hill in- vented or suggested penny postage, or that Watt discovered steam, or Stephenson railways, have been consigned. All these great men conferred inestimable benefits upon their kind, but popular fancy wrapped them in a halo of glory to which they never aspired.

## CHRONICLE.

ARGENTINE REPUBLIC. - On the 12th October, 1892, were issued two stamps commemorative of the discovery of America. 400,000 were issued, and bought up by noon in lots not exceeding 100 stamps. The plates have been destroyed. They are of two values, 2 and 5 centavos, shape oblong, design the Columbus fleet in full sail; top label,

Republica Argentina; sides, 12 Octobre, 1892 ; bottom, centavos; value expressed in figures, in square corner labels at bottom; watermark, a rayed sun.

CHILI.-Two more values have been added to the current set, and a new value of one peso of more elaborate design, all rouletted.

FRANCE.-Designs have been invited for an entire set, to supersede the stamps in use.
GRENADA.-Since chronicling (in November) the eightpence overprinted in black, " 2 d . surchargr postage in three lines, we have met with-

HAYTI.-The Philatelic Journal of America describes a 2 cents provisional formed by overprinting the three cent gray with deux. two cent on red. Errors (?) nlay be found without initial or terminal letters of surcharge.

LIBERIA.-Messrs. Clarke and Co. send us the 1883 three cents mauve, overprinted in black postage due 3 cents, in three lines, surrounded by a black square of ornamental rule. We hear that the corresponding six cents has been similarly treated to produce an unpaid 6 cents.

MACAO.-The 200 reis has been converted into 30 reis by over-printing in red, new value.

MAURITIUS.-We are informed that two new values are in preparation-I and 15 cents.

NANDGAON.-The Stamp News chronicles a new issue without English inscriptions. Two values have already been issued, imperforate- $\frac{1}{2}$ anna green, 2 annas red.

PARAGUAY celebrated the 12 th of October by overprinting the new ioc. lilac within an oval, 1492 12 de Octolve, 1892. 55,000 were issued, and sold out by 11 a.m. on day of issue.

SALVADOR.-The Stamp News chronicles the 18925 centavos, grey overprinted, ver-tically,-un-centavo-in black.

SARAWAK.-The eight cents has been' overprinted for use as 2 cents.

TASMANIA.-The Postmaster has kindly sent us specimens of the new sixpence, which we described last month, and informs us that the $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$., the $2 / 6$, and the $1 /$ is also on sale at the Post Office.

VICTORIA.-The colour of the eightpence has been changed to green.

## SOCIETY NEWS.

## Birmingham Philatelic Society.

The first ordinary meeting of the current year was held at the Rooms, on Friday Evening, January 6th.

After the minutes of the previous meeting had been read and confirmed Messrs. C. A. Stephenson and F. S. Saville were elected " ordinary" members, Messrs. J. H. Cook, C. A. Smith-Ryland, Edmund Shorthouse, and A. Weiz (of Buda Pest) " corresponding" members. With respect to the last named gentleman it was resolved that he be informed that to all foreign members special packets only can be sent, owing to the weight of the ordinary monthly exchange packet.

The members then commenced a discussion on "The Stamps of New Zealand and Tasmania." Good copies of all the ordinary issues and many of the rarities were shown by the members present.

The ist issue "one penny" buff postcard of Tasmania was shewn, with a provisional halfpenny stamp embossed below the ordinary stamp; also the error of the first issue (one of the ornaments in the top of the frame being inverted) similarly treated, as well as the current white card. It is said that only 94 of the first two types were printed, being the entire stock of that issue remaining in the hands of the P. O. authorities. The requisite number was made up by adding the same stamp to the current issue.

A vote of thanks was passed to Mr. H. Hilckes for a copy of his "Illustrated Catalogue of Reprints," and to Messrs. Lundy and Morley tor the Fiscal Phitaletist.

It was resolved to resume the discussion of the above countries at next meeting, and, if possible, to add Queensland.

## RULES. <br> Objects.

1.-The objects of the Society shall be the Study and Exchange of Postage Stamps, Envelopes, Postcards, and W rappers.

## Nembers.

2.-The "ordinary" members, who have the use of the IRooms, Library, etc., must be members of the "Aston Old Edwardinns' Association," and shall pay an extra subscription of $2 / 6$ annually, which shail include a year's subscription to the "Philatelic Chronicle." Past and present Governors and Masters of King Edward's Grammar School, Aston, and all "Old Boys" from any of the Schools of Edward VI.'ths foundation, are eligible for membership of this Association. Anyone desirous of becoming a member shall on payment of his subscription (2/6), but not before, be accepted as a nember pro tem., and shail be subject to formal acceptance or rejection at the next ordinary meeting of the Association-election to be by ballot, one dissentient vote in five to exclude.

The "Corresponding Members" shall bo any other persons who shall pay an annual subscription of 26 , including one year's subscription to the "Philatelic Chronicle." Such persons, unless well known and responsible, must furnish two good references, and will then be elected by ballot, like the ordinary members.

## Committce.

3.-The Committec sball consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Hon. Treasurer, Hon Secretary, and at least four other members; all to be elected annually.

## Addrcsses

4.     - Fach member of the =ociety shall furnish his address from time to time to the Hon. Sec. and all notices, letters, etc., sent to such address shall be considered as duly delivered.

## Meetings.

5.     - That the fixed meetings be held on the first Friday in each month, except August and September, at 8 p.m., and other meetings as arranged.

## Subscribers.

6.-That every nember shall be considered a subscriber for the ensuing year unless he send notice in writing of his intention to resign, to the Hon. Treasurer, not later than the 1 st of December.

## Ifules.

7.-These rules shall not be altered except at the General Mecting, or at a special meeting to which every " ordinary member" shall be summoned.

## Subscriphions.

8.-All subscriptions must be prepaid, due on January 1st in each year.

## REPRINTED STAMPS

(Continued.)
BADEN.-The Scott Stamp and Coin Company of New York offer in their sale on January 18th, Lot 453, two 18519 kreuzer rose as reprints. We hope to secure this lot, as the stamps will be evidence as to whether our original contention is correct that this value has been reprinted.

CAPE VERD.-Messrs. Whitfield King have kindly lent us a complete set of the reprinted stamps of this colony, which were made for and a set presented to each member of the Postal Congress held in Lisbon. The values consist of

The reprints are on thick white wove paper, ungunmed and perforated 13. The originals were perforated toth $12 \frac{1}{2}$ and 13 , except the 50 reis green, 200 reis orange, and 300 reis ochre, which have only been found perf. $12 \frac{1}{2}$.
The whiteness of the paper and the lack of gum in the reprints is, however, sufficient test for separation from originals.

The reprinted stamps are far scarcer than the originals.

NOTE.-The difference in colour of paper was probably caused by the gum, as we have entire sheets which are quite white at the margins which have not been reached by the gum.

COLOMBIA.-No reprints have been made of these stamps, although many forgeries have been offered as reprints. The $18612 \frac{1}{2}$ centavos has been closely imitated in the Republic, but by private enterprise. It may be distinguished by having no period after the word "Granada." The 1888 medallion provisional issue, we believe, was continued to be manufactured for some time after it had fulfilled its legitimate use. The later printings should be looked upon as reprints.

COSTA RICA.-The 1863 perforated remainders were sold to a speculator, who induced the Government printer to convert them into imitations of the $188 \mathrm{I}-82$ provisionals. The half real blue was overprinted 1c., 2 c ., and 5c., the two reales vermilion loc., and the four reals green 20c. all in smaller, thinner, and different type to the original provisionals. All four values of the 1863 issue were overprinted "oficial" also by the Government printers on these remainders; but as no official stamps were printed for use until after the 1863 issue had been superseded, these must be classified as ranker forgeries even than the former.

## EXCHANGE SOCIETIES.

## By Guy Semple.

There can be but little doubt that Exchange Societies are a powerful factor for the benefit and furtherance of our pursuit. They afford both the beginner and the more advanced philatelist frequent opportunities of adding desirable stamps to his collection; and, second only to philatelic literature, are by far the best mediums of information as to what is going on in the stamp world, new issues, new surcharges-and too frequently new forgeries are seen in the packets long before those collectors who exchange by private correspondence only have even heard about them.

Personally I send sixteen sheets for circulation, and see thirteen packets every month. Very seldom do I pass one of the latter on to the next member without finding something to take of, though the prevalence of utter rubbish, and that often at high prices, is to be regretted on some sheets.

In every Exchange Society, at some period of its existence, two questions inevitably arise-How is the packet to be forwarded, and in what order, to the various members? The latter question is the most important, and generally excites the most controversy. I do not think there can be any doubt that the best way is for each member to see the packet first in turn, those not sending sheets going to the end of the list for the month. The opponents of this system say let the largest collectors see the packet first, and so on in order of the size of collection. This would work very well if the large collectors would confine themselves to taking stamps they had not got ; but it is not so, they-and who could resist doing so-take any cheap stamp they see "for exchange." Moreover, the specialist with a collection of a few hundred varieties, probably much more care-
fully made and more valuable than a general collection, does not deserve the low place that this arrangement causes him to take.

As regards the manner in which the packet should be forwarded from member to member, I consider registered letter post should be the only way allowed; it is by far the safest, though the compensation the authorities would give in event of loss would be extremely unsatisfactory. I had some correspondence with S. Martin's Le Grand about a year ago on the subject, and owing to the fact that unused stamps are to be found on the sheets, and other reasons, the loss of a registered or insured packet would to the owners of the stamps be almost a total one. Statistics show that registered packets of any sort are but rarely lost ; and this can be our only consolation for adopting the least unsafe of several very unsatisfactory methods.

The Secretary should, in the interest of members, always mark forgeries as such, though the anonymous "F." "?" "Ba!!" should be strongly discouraged. It is needless to say the Secretary should set the example by sending the best and largest sheet himself; and his stamps, as his manner of discharging his duties, should be without reproach.

## REVIEWS :

Tho ever-welcome Philatelic Journal of Great Britain resumes i,s appearance with the heview of

Reviews. An apology for the non-appearance of the supplement in November is published, and so we must forgive Mr. Reviewer, but must warn him not to do it again, we miss it too much. It might be an advantage to give the page of illustrations for new issues the right way up, perhaps the Editor thought his readers would stand on their heads with delight at getting the Revicw reinstated ;-or, stay ! our copy may have been inverted by error. Item, rare inverted frontispiece for sale,-unique error,--offers wanted!

The piece de resistance of the Stamp News is the "Reminiscences," or, as a friend of ours calls it the " lemisines" of Mr. A. A. Bartlett, and most interesting they are, containing choice items of stamp intelligence, and much Philatelic philosophy. The Review is meagre, but the new column of Notes and Queries " fills a long-felt want."

Messrs. Lundy and Morley open entirely new ground in Philatelic literature with the first number of the Fiscal Philatelist. We cannot say much about the contents, because we know little about fiscal emissions, -but the get-up of the work is first-class, and it looks as though it had "come to stay."

The Stamp Collectors' Journal has quite as much interesting matter as the majority of Philatelic papers, the same, withal, very useful. In ads. it is facile princeps.
The Stamp Collectors' Monthly commences its fourth volume with the January number, and gives an interesting article from the pen of Lieutenant Thorpe on Stamp Collecting and Philanthropy.

Bric-ì-Brac for January is to hand. Mr. Palmer's name does not appear in the last six lines of the second page.

L'E'cho de la I'imbrologie gives an article on the Early Stamps of Ceylon, by MI. Victor Flandrin.

The Metropolitan Philatelist gives full particulars of the designs for the Columbus stamps, and Major Evans' articie on "Stamps and Stamp Collecting" is continued.

Mr. Jewett's Philatelic Era is the most readable book, if not the most instructive, which reaches us from the "other side." The Review is really good. 'I he Reviewer shares with us the opinion expressed in our leading article for November.

Mr. Brown's expected catalogue has appeared. It is a work of some sixty pages, and gives Mr. Brown's price, wholesale and retail, for most stamps. Prices of sets and packets are given, and much miscellaneous information. The collector should get this work, as many stamps are supplied by Mr. Brown at cheap rates, and the fact that Mr. Brown supplies them, is a proof their genuineness and good condition.

The Postal Card should be in the hands of every postcard collector.

The catalogue of the Scott Co.'s 118th sale is to hand. This formidable book catalogues 2,016 lots A very pleasing departure is the presentation of two plates, produced by a photographic process, showing the rarest stamps included in the sale.

Mr. Nunn, of Bury St. Edmunds, has reissucd his "Stamp Dealers of Great Britain." This is a moat useful little book, and is thoroughly up to date. Publishers and makers of philatelic novelties are noted, and particulars of the most important stamp papers published in England are given.

The Scott Stamp and Coin Co., New York, U.S., have just issued their new price catalogue, and we feel very much pleasure in commending the same to our readers. Every type of stamp is fully illustrated, and the blocks being arranged with the letterpress makes it an easy book of reference. One feature is distinctly advantageous to Englishmen, as all the English stamps are illustrated, thus forming an useful guide to the proper arrangement of our own country's somewhat intricate emissions, publishers in this country not being permitted to use blocks of English stamps. As wo have often pointed out, the prices of stamps vary much here from the value in the States, this list used side by side with Gibbons' will indicate the variations, and will in an hour recoup dealer or collector the 2 s . spent on it. MODERN Collectors seem very neglectful of present opportunities of completing their sets whilst current. Dealers, a few years back, complained they could not sell such stamps as Labuan and Leeward Islands, but as soon as news came that these were to be withdrawn, they were beseiged with letters of enquiry, and readily sold out at treble former prices. Changes are frequent, and some morning, ere long, we shall read in our Chronicle that Bechuanaland has been absorbed into the Cape of Good Hope, or Newfoundland into the Dominion of Canada, for Postal Administration.

Our American cousins now use geographical terms in describing stamps, and the catalogues of the Albrecht sales describe stamps as being damaged in N.E. corner, or a few perforations missing on the S. side. We presume a crack should read springing up N.E. by N., rapidly enlarging to a gulf, due $E$. ; so much for the science of Philately.

Under the Presidency of Cleveland, it is probable that the duty on stamps entering the United States will be repealed. France, however, under its new tariff laws, is enforcing a duty of $2 \frac{1}{2}$ frs. per kilogramme, which is equivalent to about $1 /-$ per lb . weight.

The Philatclic Journal of Great Britain for February commends the proposals for a Philatelic Exhibition to the notice of the Birmingham Society at its next meeting. We cannot, of course, say whether the Society will undertake the responsibility suggested, but we fancy that as the London project has fallen through, it is just possible that an exhibition may be opened in Birmingham in a month or two. We shall probably be able to speak with more authority in our next issue.

## CHRONICLE.

AZORES.-A 75 reis in carmine and a letter card of 25 reis for Angra, Horta, and Ponta Delgada are in use.

BARBADOS.-Mr. Mayers sends us from Barbados a specimen of the ordinary penny embossed envelope, overprinted $\frac{1}{2} d$. in purple. He informs us that two types were used, one considerably larger than the other. Of the small type, 2,400 were overprinted in purple, and two dozen in black, two dozen of the large and small type, one on each envelope, and five dozen large type, purple, doubly surcharged on each ervelope.

We are of the same opinion as our correspondent that collectors were considered in the matter.

BORNEO.-The four cents rose has been overprinted I CENT, in two lines, in a similar manner to the recent provisional, one on five cents.

CANADA. - The Interrational Philatelist chronicles the 5 cents green Registration stamp on watermarked paper.

CEYLON.-The 1884 green, two cents stamp, is to be re-issued, and will be welcomed by collectors who object to the never-ceasing variations of the surcharged stamp it will supersede.

CONGO (Portuguese).-From Philatelic Record we learn that a 5 reis stamp has been issued in orange, with head of King Carlos.

EGYPT.-The Monthly Journal illustrates a new official stamp without a declared value, in which the oblong oval contains the words service de l'etat, and Arabic characters, in place of the usual Pyramid and Sphinx. A 3 mil stamp in yellow, and a 2 piastres in redbrown is also announced.

ERITREA.-The current Italian stamps have been overprinted in black colonia eritrea, for use in the Italian Colonies on the Red Sea.

FIJI.-We learn from Vindin's Philatelic Monthly that the 6 d . stamp has been surcharged five pence in two lines. The permanent five-penny stamp, though designed, has not yet been approved of.

FUNCHAL.-The 75 reis in carmine has been added to the new set.

GREAT BRITAIN.-Captain Northey has sent for our inspection an envelope which bears the current penny pink stamp embossed in its usual position, and below, an albino impression of the same. Monstrosities but seldom emanate from Somerset House, and this envelope issued in ordinary course is possibly unique.

MAURITIUS.-Mr. W. F. Wadams, the Handsworth dealer, has aceived supplies of the new 15 cents, mentioned in our last. It is identical in colour and design with the 16 cents (except numerals of value), which we presume will now be withdrawn, and which value is now being drawn upon for the
production of a provisional one cent by overprinting one cent in black Roman capitals, in one line, and barring out the original value. We suppose the provisional two cents has been superseded, as we have received a current type permanent two cents in bright violet, overprinted one cent in black capitals, over original value, and expect to find that the stamp exists also without overprint.

NEW ZEALAND.-Filatelic Facts and Fallacies chronicles the smallest Post Card in the world being printed by the government for Messrs. Austin Walsh \& Co., tobacco merchants, of Auckland, and having printed upon it the current type halfpenny stamp, size $2 \frac{3}{4}-\mathrm{in}$. by $1 \frac{1}{2}-\mathrm{in}$.

ORANGE FREE STATE.-The Post Cards described in our November number were by some unaccountable mistake ascribed to Transvaal, instead of to the Free State. Mr. Walker, of Pietermaritzburg, informs us that another variety exists, being a 2 d . stamp, overprinted $I \frac{1}{2} d .$, and affixed to the card in a similar manner to those previously chronicled by us.

PARAGUAY.-The Philatelic Record describes a new set of stamps, lithographed on plain paper, and perforated 13 by $13 \frac{1}{2}$.

CONFEDERATE STATES OF AMERICA.-Hosts of the local stamps have been forged and sold as reprints. The following have been reprinted from the original dies :-

Local for Kingston. The original was printed on blue paper, the reprint is on white.
Local for Knoxvifle. The five cents black was printed on quadrille paper, the reprint is on plain paper.
Local for Nasuyille. The three cents red original is of a duller shade than the reprint.

DANUBIAN STEAM NAVIGATION COMPANY.-In 1877 the ten soldi was reprinted in violet, in vermilion, and in green, the 17 soldi in vermilion only.

The originals were perforated $9 \frac{1}{2}$, the reprints are imperforate.

DENMARK.-In 1886 a batch of reprints was prepared.

## REVIEWS:

The January number of the Philatelic Journal of Great Britain has some remarks upon the proposed exhibition, which are noticed elsewhere. The Review of Reviews is in another form, but has not deteriorated in the change.

The Stamp Collector for January wishes its readers "A Happy New Year." In commenting upon its reduction in subseription to $1 /$, Mr. Editor surmises that the stamp world will look askance upon so tremendous and far-reaching a revolution in philate'ic literaiture. He says, "We have not the slightest
doubt but what we shall have the whole philatelic press down upon us."" Never mind, friend Collector, go on reducing, and present the picture of a philatelic Ajax defying the editorial lightning,-in proud consciousness that you are only doing your duty.

Tindin's Philatelic Monthly for December contains the commencement of what promises to be a most valuable work on the "Stamps of Queensland."

Messrs. Collin and Calman's catalogue in The American Journal of Philately comprises the concluding articles on the native Indian stamps. Mr. Corwen's list of the "Stamps of Trinidud " is a most comprehensive catalogue of varieties.

Mr. Hoy F. Greene fills the first page of The Philatelic Era with another poetical gem, which is very readable after a littic practice to make the rhythm fit, and a fair amount of ingenuity to get the rhymes to match. The revicwer and editor of the Era are evidently different persons. In the same number (December) which contains this effusion the following critique appears:--"In the October issue of the Nebraska Stamp, Roy F. Greene lass broke out again.' I have about made up my mind that this western author is a youth yet in his teens, who has a ' literary propensity ' and inflicts the philatelic public with periodical efforts. And the publication containing this, elaims to be 'A monthly devoted wholly to the best interests of stamp collectors." "

The Stann, published by Mr. Spooner, contains a very neat account of J. W. Scott, the well-known New York dealer.

The Postal Card begins its fifth volume with the January number.

The Philatclist is the title of a new magazine which is shortly to see the light at Denver, Col., U.S.A. The editor and proprietor is Mr. Lewis Bishop, and from the style of his prospectus, the intended venture should be a success.

Mr. Wood, of Hanley, Stafis., gives us another proof of his enterprising spirit by the issue of a tenpage circular, produced in first-class style and containing the rules of the North Staffordshire Stamp Exchange, together with eight pages of advertisements.

The Retail Price List of the Bath Stamp Company (Manager, Mr. H. Fisher), is a very neat production, and contains many cheap lines for the medium collector.

The more we look into Messrs. Callf \& Co.'s new Price List the better we like it. Every line is interesting. In most prico lists you may find an interesting offer, but usually hidden away among uninteresting and ordinary items; but here you can hardly find unything unimportant. The sets advertised for sale are not the usual sets of commerce, but sets of good and often rare stamps, many of the sets of old issues are complete or nearly so, and we are assured that all
stamps sold are good copies, in fact, the poorer ones may be obtained in special books at discounts of $40_{k}^{\prime}$ or $50 \%$, Taking the list all round we consider it one of the best in the trade.

Messrs. Cameron \& Co., of Jerscy, have issued their fifth wholesale list for the months, Feb.-April, and for dealers who desire wholesale lots of British Colonials and South American, it is undoubtedly the best.

The Scott Coin and Stamp Co. (Lim.) hold their 120 th sale on Feb. 23rd. We should recommend our readers to send to Messrs. Scott, at New York, for their catalogues, which will always shew a great many lots worth trying for.

The J. W. Scott Co., of New York, are selling the Do Coppet Collection on April 3rd to 26th. We have received a copy of the catalogue of this enormous sale, the most extensive ever attempted in stamps. The catalogue contains 194 pages, and comprises 2,804 lots. Collectors who desire to speculate should seud for a catalogue, which is, in itself, a curiosity.

Noticing Mr. Bennett, of Stoke Bishop, as a continual adverister, we sent for a packet cach of N. S. Wales, Victoria and New Zealand, and obtained real good value in old issues, including varieties of watermark and perforation rarely found in packets.

We have just received the price list of Messrs. Cameron and Co., Jersey. It contains prices of sets and single stamps, their speciality boing unused colonials at low prices.

$M^{s}$$S$ far as the Birmingham Philatelic Society is concerned, the suggested exhibition must fall through. It is hardly to be expected that a youthful Society like this should undertake the responsibility involved in the organization of a Philatelic Exhibition. "Mortals step in where angels fear to tread,"-but it shows a great power of discretion in the Birmingham Society to decline a venture from which its powerful Metropolitan compeer shrinks. The end of Philately will be better served by a series of small but perfect exhibitions, such as the one provided by the London Society, on February 22nd and 23 rd, which has evoked so much admiration on every side.

## CHRONICLE.

BARBADOS.-The Barbados Post Office, having used up all the halfpenny circular covers, have issued a provisional supply. Design, a hand-stamped double circle, lettered "Paid at Barbadoes," surmounted by a crown.

BRITISH LEVANT.-Mr. F. 'Iucker informs us that the 40 paras surcharge is now found upon the current Halfpenny, vermilion.

CANADA.-A new letter card, exactly similar to the English one, except for value, "three cents," has been issued. Inscription - Canada Letter Card.

CONGO. - A provisional $3 t$ franc stamp has been created.

GREECE.-We are indebted to Mr. Slade for the information that the colour of the 25 c . stamp has been altered from blue to purple.

GUATEMALA.-Mr.H. A. Slade informs us he has an envelope franked with half a two cent. stamp, the supply of one cent. stamps being temporarily exhausted at Mayatenango.

LABUAN.-The unwatermarked 40 cents has been overprinted two cents.

The unwatermarked 16 cents has also been converted into a six cents. Both overprints in black.

MONTENEGRO.-The 25 nov is now printed in brown.

NICARAGCA.-The new issue has been put on sale. Design, Arms in Shield, above, correos, value below, tipt. on left, 1893 on right, numerals in four corners. Perf. $12 \frac{1}{2}$.

1 cent. Jellow brown
2 eents vermilion
5 cents blue
10 cents slate
20 cents red
50 cents violet
1 peso dark blue
2 pesos green
5 pesos rose
10 pesos orange
Official stamps have icen made by printing all the above values in slate and overprinting in red, franguro official.

ROUMANIA.-A $5^{\circ}$ bani green unpaid letter stamp has been issued on paper watermarked with arms.

SALVADOR.-The 1893 dated issue has appeared, with legend, "Correos del Salvador" and a portrait, which is supposed to represent the President, a policeman, or the great Seebeck himself. Paper, plain wove, perforation 12.

SIAM.-The 24 atts has been overprinted 4 atts in black, in two different ways, first, in Siamese characters only at the base of the stamp, second, with 4 atts in English characters added at top of stamp.

SIERRA LEONE.-The three-halfpenny stamp has been overprinted half penny in two lines, and the original value obliterated with a double-lined black bar.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.-The 3d. now comes in deeper olive, and the 6d. in dark blue, perforation and watermark as before.

TRANSVAAL.-Mr. L. H. J. Walker has sent us specimens of the one shilling green overprinted $2 \frac{1}{2}$ pence in black, which has been issued for use on foreign letters, the rate being reduced to $2 \frac{1}{2}$ pence on the entry of the Republic into the Postal Union. One stamp occurs in each sheet with misplaced hyphen in the fraction $\frac{1}{2}$. The overprint may also be found inverted.

The same correspondent sends us the sixpence blue overprinted i Penny in black. Several stamps on each sheet show only the word Penny.

UNITED STATES.-The registration fee having been reduced to 8 cents, two new stamps are to be issued, of similar size to the two issues now in use. The small one will pourtray "General Sherman," the large one a representation of "Columbus restored to favour."

The special delivery stamp is now printed in orange yellow instead of blue.

THE ordinary meeting, on Friday, March 3rd, was devoted to "The Stamps of New South Wales, especially uncatalogued varieties of watermark and perforation."

Mr. Johnson introduced the subject by giving a "preliminary list" of the varieties of perforation and watermark which he had in his own collection. This comprised a number of varieties not previously chronicled. They were carefully compared with the stamps in the collections of Messrs. Walton, Hollick, and other members, with the result that all varieties were confirmed and several others added. Before the close of the meeting very satisfactory progress had been made towards forming the desired Reference List of this country, which seems in the later issues to offer a wide field for philatelists. Mr. Johnson also showed a number of double and irregular perfs., as well as two different types of the figure 6 in the watermark of the sixpenny lilac.

A hearty vote of thanks was passed to Mr. J. Cobb for kindly lending N.S.W. stamps for the purpose of examination; also to the London Philatelic Society for invitations to their exhibition of the Stamps of British India and Ceylon.

## THE COLUMBUS STAMPS:

$T$
HE new stamped envelopes of the Columbian series will embrace five sizes now in use and three new sizes, viz:-

P $5^{\frac{7}{8}}$ by $3 \frac{5}{8}$ inches.

The colour of the stamps corresponds with similar values in the adhesives. The engraved space is $\frac{7}{8}$ by $1 \frac{1}{3}$ inches.

The new stamps are already "in trouble." A lynx-eyed observer has discovered that on the one-cent. stamp Columbus is spelt with an R instead of a B . Then there are serious complaints about the amount of licking required.
Now the complaint has been made that many people are mistaking the new stamps for the ioc. Special Delivery Stamp. Mr. Wanamaker accordingly gave orders on Jan. 24th that the Ioct. special delivery stamp should hereafter be of a light orange colour instead of deep blue.

Commercial people are astonished that the Postmaster-General should order the colour of a permanent stamp, such as the special io cent, to be changed since the new Columbians are here to stay only a few months.

Under the proposed new legislative provision the State is to furnish stamps to its legislators, and a clerk is to put them on the letters. It is suspected that there are at present occasional bright mornings when some of the law makers find it difficult to lick the whole area of a Columbian stamp.

## THE EXHIBITION

OF THE

## STAMPS OF BRITISH INDIA \& CEYLON.

THE London Philatelic Society held a private exhibition of the stamps of British India and Ceylon at the rooms of the Society, Effingham House, Arundel Street, Strand, on Wednesday and Thursday, February 22nd and 23rd.

The exhibition being a private one, admission could be obtained only through a member of the London Philatelic Society, but the gathering of philatelists was eminently representative, and the great treat provided amply repaid all who attended.

Space forbids our giving a full account of the exhibits, but we may say that the show of both countries was practically complete, every known variety being en evidence, quality rather than quantity seemed to be the general object of the exhibitors, but still many very rare stamps were exhibited in blocks, pairs and strips.

The collection of Ceylons, shown by Mr. A. de Worms, was undoubtedly the great sight. It can only be termed superb, every stamp being a magnificent copy, and the arrangement of shades virtually complete. In the same country, Mr. W. Blest showed a gem of a collection,-small but choice. Major Evans exhibited the extremely rare $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. bleute, rouletted,-the 2d. green, rouletted, was aiso included among the exhibits.

Reverting to the Indian show, Mr. Douglas Garth's exhibit was first, although other fine collections were present. Messrs. Staniey Gibbons presented a very interesting lot, among which was the identical four annas, with head inverted, which deceived Mr. Garth and other members of the London Society prior to the Assmus trial.

The exhibition of blocks and portions of sheets, by Mr. W.T.Wilson, elicited much admiration. That gentleman showed, among mazy other blocks, a double strip containing twenty-four 2 s . Ceyions, showing the width and the bottom edge of the sheet. Another noteworthy exhibit, by the same gentleman, was a splendid block of one shilling stamps, surcharged "service," 15 in number. The fourpenny imperf. Ceylon, belonging to the Earl of Kingston, a copy barely touched by the postmark, was the finest ever seen by our representative,-this stamp is unknown in an unused condition.

The Exhibition gencrally, showed conclusively that the highest aim of the exhibitors in making their collections was condition. The whole show was an object lesson, tending to teach collectors that a perfoct collection is one in which every stamp is clean and perfect, and although, of course, few visitors could
hope to vie in completeness with the collections shown, yet everyone could learn before he went away, the lesson that, in Philately, cleanliness is next to perfection.

He now sends us specimens of the One Penny wrapper converted into halipenny by overprinting in violet $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. ; also of new halfpenny and one penny postcards with stamp of same design as new adhesives.

Wrapper, $\frac{1}{d}$ in violet on 1d. carmine, buff paper.
Postcard, d. stamp in marone, on white card.
Postcard, 1d. stamp in carmine, on buff card.
CANADA.-Two new stamps have been issued. Design, Queen in widow's weeds in circle, legend in circular band above canada postage, and in straight line at bottom value in words, with figures of value twice repeated
immediately above the lower legend, paper, white wove, unwatermarked.

> 50 cents, blue

We have definite information from the Dominion that the dollar stamp, chronicled by a contemporary, has not been issued, nor is it contemplated.

GREAT BRITAIN.-Mr. Roger Wilson, of Birkenhead, has sent us an envelope franked with half a penny stamp, and which had mailed a circular.

Many of our Birmingham collectors have specimens of similar oddities; also of English stamps surcharged "Cyprus," which have been permitted to pass unchallenged. 'They are, however, all illegal, and should not be allowed by the officials to frank mail matter.

HAYTI.-The design has been altered somewhat, the leaves of the palm are drooping, and the word "cent" is in smaller type.

LUXEMBOURG.-The set, with portrait of Grand Duke, similar to the 10 and 25 cents, is completed by the following :-


MEXICO.-The 1884 ten cents green exists imperforate. Mr. Cheveley, of London, has an unsevered block of four for a future auction.

MOROCCO.-The Moorish Government has at last instituted a Post Office of its own, and the stamps are very curious in their way. They are not adhesives, nor are any date stamps used, but the seal of each agency is inked in different colours, and impressed on the wrappers.

The Tangier-Fez courier service, instituted by the agents of "Le Printemps," of Paris, was discontinued on Jan. Ist of this year, and the service was transferred to the French Government, so ordinary French stamps are now in use.

PARAGUAY.-Mr. H. A. Slade, of St. Albans, has drawn our attention to the one cent, which has been printed centavos, instead of centavo, an error which will probably be rectified.

SEYCHELLES.-In our February num. ber we were enabled to give, in advance of any contemporary, news of contemplated changes in postal rates, and necessary surcharges. It was, however, decided not to issue the 12 cents on 16 cents, but a further surcharge was made by overprinting the 96 cents with 90 cents in two lines.

STRAITS SETTLEMENTS. - The thece cents on 32 cents stamp was intended by the postal authorities for use on money-orders, and the stamp was only used in times of emergency for the purpose of franking letters.

SURINAME.-Messrs. Clarke and Co., Cambridge Road, London, S.E., have shown us the $2 \frac{1}{2}$ cent. black and yellow, perforated horizontally and imperf. vertically.

TONGA.-As King George of Tonga died last month, aged 97, philatelists may expect yet another issue from that island.

UNITED STATES. - The two eight cents stamps, foreshadowed in our March number, have made their appearance, the Columbian one in dark lake, and the small stamp in pure brown.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA.-The current threepence has been overprinted in green ONE PENNY.

10.-(a) Every member shall send to the Exchange Superintendent, not later than the 25th of each month, one or more sheets of best puplicate stamps, with price written ahove each, on thin paper, note size, bearing on the front the name and address of the owner - space being left underncath for signatures of members removing stamps, and ruled colmmins for number and emount-any notices of stamps for exchange, etc., may be written on the back of the sheet. Post

* cards and ontire envelcpes must not be sent. Each Memper must enclose a stamped ADDREgSED ENYELope for Return of his shret, on three-halfpence will be cearged for same.
(b) The Exchange Suparintendent shall, by the 5th of the following; month, make the sheets into a packet, and forward by registered
post to the Member who is to receive the packet first, and he to the next on the list, and so on in the order of the list which will be enclosed in the packet. Each member removing stamps must initial vacant places, and write his name, number of stamps removed, and amount, on the front of each sheet, and also insert the total amount in the monthly list.
(c) The packet shall be forwarded by registered post; any Member neglecting to do so will be held respos bie for any loss, damage, or delay which may occur, and will be liable to have his name removed from the Club List.
(d) When the packet is returned cach sheet shall be returned to its owner. All letter requiring an answer must contain a stamped addressed entrlope.
(e) Messrs. Stanley, Gibnons \& Co.'s catalogue is to be the general standard for pricing stamps; but in the case of curious varicties or extra fine copies, Members are to use their own discretion.
(f) The packet must not be kept longer chan one clear day by any Member, under penalty of a fine of Threepence per day, unless satisfrctory reason is forthcoming (Sundays excepted); and every fourth Member od the list shall send a post card to the Fxchange Superintendent, informing him of the safe despatch of the packet. Any Member neglectiug to do so will be responsible for any expense incurred in making inquiries.
(a) The Exchange Superintendent shall not be resjonsible for debts of Members, or for any stamps or sheets lost in transit.
(i) There shall be no cash settlements, but each Member the first month after joining shall be credited with a balance of $10 \%$. No Nember shall exceed his balance. ## REVIEWS.

$\tau$HE illustrations of new issues appearing in the Narch number of the Philatelic Journal of Great Britain are remarkably clear, and a distinct advance upon the previous plates. The Review of Revicus collects the valuable tit-bits from everywhere, and serves them up for the delectation of its readers in its usual masterly fashion.

While on the subject of reviews, a word of praise must be given to the "Philatelic Review-Critique," which appears in the Pluilatelic Era. Our American contemporary has a very able critic in Mr. C. W. Small, whose large contribution to each number greatly enhances the value of the Era to both American and Eurojean readers, presenting, as it does, r. complete resumé of the current American philatelic literature.

The magnificent catalogue of Messrs. Collin and Calman in the American Journal of Philately has advanced as far as Labuan. The only drawback to the thorough enjoyment of this fine work is the unquiet suspicion that the conclusion must perforce be postponed to the Greek Kalends.

Mr. Albert R. Rogers contributes an exheustive account of the proposed exbibition of stamps at the World's Fair to the Metropolitan Philatelist. The account is illustrated with a view of the building and diagrams and designs of the arrangements for showing the stamps.

Mr. E. T. Parker, of Bethlehem, Pa., U.S.A., has favoured us with a copy of his No. 59 Price List containing some 100 pages. This book is one of the most valuable a collector or dealer can bave, giving, as it does, the current prices of stamps in America, and unlike most price lists, its large size enables it to give the list of medium and rare stamps of every country in a most comprehensive manner. No. 60 will be larger than 59 , and a nominal charge of 15 cents will be made, which will be refunded to all purchasers from it.

The February issue of Mr. Spooner's raper, The Post Office, maintains the high position gained by previous issues. A most interesting and useful articie on "The Type Names of Surcharges" supplies a vast amonnt of information of a kind sadly lacking among philatelists.

We have received No. 3 of The Stamp Collectors' Herald, published by Mr. R. Walford White. We presume there was a No. 1 and a No. 2, but we have not yet seen them. The number under notice is very neatly arranged and printed, and is full of that class of matter which is almost universally neglected in most philatelic publications, mamely, advice in varic,us forms upon the more elementary matters appertaining to philately. We wish the bright new-comer every success, and should like to sce Nos. 1 and 2.

## THE WORLD'S FAIR EXHIBITION.

THE World's Fair Executive Committee of the American Philatelic Association have at last completed the preliminary work, and are now ready to announce the result of their work for the past year.

The expenses incident to the preper arrangement of this exhibition, including the purchase of suitable cases, will be about $\$ 3,000$, and as it is the desire of the Committee to interest all collectors of postage stamps, it has been resolved that the necessary amount be raised by a popular subscription, to which every collector will have an opportunity to contribute.

Subscriptions for any amount not exceeding \$25 and not less than $\$ 1$ will be welcomed.

Evers subscriber will receive the official catalogne containing a complete list of the treasures exhibited, Which catalogue will be ready for distribution some time during the summer, and the published price of which will be 50 cents.

All subseriptions must be accompanied by the amount subscribed, and they will be duly acknowledged in the American Philatelist, and by Mr. George H. Watson, Treasurer, 36, Broad Street, New York City, to whom subscriptions and remittances are to be addressed.

The lost-office department have allotted to the Ametican Philatelic Association, in the Enited States Govenument building, one of the best firc-proof buildines in the grounds, a large gallery overlooking the Post-office exhibit. This gallery is 65 feet long by 25 feet wide.

The large cases are 20 feet long, and hold 144 sheets each, the same size as the Staten Island sheets. The smaller cases are 15 feet long, and hold 108 sheets each. The half cases against the rail and wall hold half the amount of the double cases. There is room for 1,116 sheets in the cuses, besides wall space. This will give room for a collection of 50,000 stamps.

It is the intention of the Committee to secure as complete a collection of the stamps of the world as can be got, and to this end the collectors, whether members of the American Philatelic Association or not (as this is to be an exhibit of postage stamps by American collectors under the auspices of the American Philatelic Association), are invited to notify the Committee of any countries that they have which are complete and in fine condition, and that they are willing to loan for this exhibit.

As soon as the collector has notified the Committee that he is willing to exhibit a certain country, they will send him as many sheets as are allotted to that country.

The Committee have decided to use shects made especially for this purpose, same size as the Staten Island sheets, with a view of giving the most artistic effect as they are grouped together.

On receipt of these sheets, the collector is to mount his stamps as carefully as jossible, and return them by registered mail as quickly as possible to the Committee.

The Committee do not bccome responsible for any stamps, the exhibitors sending them at their own risk. The Committee, however, have been carefully selected, and represent the leading collectors in the country: They are mostly men of neans, from whose collections there will be many thousands of dollars worth of stanys exhibited, so the utmost care will be used to insure the safe return of all stamps sent for exhibition.

The shoets containing stamps will be kept in a safe deposit vault in New York until they are ready for
shipment to Chicago. The stamps will be properly insured against fire and loss in transit. Jurt of the Committee will go to Chicago and receive them, and with the Hanging Committee will put them in the proper cases.

The cases are made of white wood, staincd cherry, thee glass being heavy plate, lying flat on the top of the stamps. Each frame will be locked by the Committee and sealed. Around the cases are a number of screws to be screwed down, making it impossible to mpen them.
As no catalogue will be allowed on sale in the Government Building, the Committee will issue an official catalogue, containing a full description of the exhibit, who the exhibitorsare, what they exbibit, etc., and will handsomely illustrate it with photo-engravings of some of the exhibits. These catalogucs will sell at fifty cents each, and will be on sale at all dealers and on the news stands in Clicago, so collectors will have no trouble in securing one, as it will be an interesting souvenir of their visit.

It is expected that this exhibit will be the largest and most valuable one ever gathered together, and that the benefits stamp collecting will derive from it will be a greater increase in our number and an impetus to our hobby, tending to make it more popular than ever, and redounding to the honor of the American stamp colicetors.

Foreign Stamps in Displte.-On Friday, March r7th, at the Bow County Court, Frederick Deane, of 7, Bulganah-road, Thornton Heath, was summoned at the instance of Mr. Charles Francis Postlethwaite, foreign stamp and colonial agent, of 6I, Hampton-road, Forest Gate, for the recovery of the amount of a very valuable collection of stamps, which had been obtained on approval. The defendant did not appear, and judgment was given against him for the amount claimed by Mr. Postlethwaite.

A very interesting conversation was held, however, upon the perfs. and watermarks of the various Australian colonies, especially N.S.W. 不MOVEMENT is on foot for establishing a Stamp Club in London. It has been felt for a long time, by the large body of philatelists, that an indefinable something interposes between them and the leading Society,-a feeling of coldness and lack of cordiality. While everyone will acknowledge the great value of the work done by the London Philatelic Society, and will give the Society unstinted praise for its great and manifold exertions in the interests of the science, yet the bulk of collectors see nothing in the Society which invites them to any effort to secure membership. The members of the London Society are undoubtedly the leaders of philatelic thought, and it is well that they are in a position to keep aloof from the rank and file, and yet maintain the confidence of all,-but man is a gregarious animal, and the philatelist, at least in his own opinion, is a
responsible human being, hence the desire to have some place where he may meet his fellow not only in the pursuit of his favourite science, but to exchange the social word, and indulge in the less formal pursuits of life. The suggestion, now we understand assuming a practical form, for establishing a Stamp Club in London, will meet with the cordial approbation of all philatelists, and is a great step in the direction of popularising philately. If a club be established in the metropolis, why not one in the larger provincial towns? And supposing such clubs to be formed, how quickly will the general public, who now regard our science as a mild form of lunacy, recognise the vast amount of utility and practical education to be obtained trom the pursuit! Curiosity will beget interest, interest will secure disciples, disciples will spread the gospel of philately the length and breadth of the land! Truly the idea is brimful of possibilities, and is worthy of support from all whose interest is in the science. The great stumbling-block to be avoided is the limiting of the purposes of the club, or the scope of its influence, to any mere formal project, - to be a success the purposes of the club must be eldstic, combining the social with the formal element, the membership must be cosmopolitan,-confined neither to class nor clique,-the attractions offered must appeal not only to the philatelist, as such, but to the philatelist as a social being, and with these objects kept steadfastly in view, who can predict aught but unlimited success.

HE Ordinary Monthly Meeting took place on Friday evening, May 5th, when the members took a "recess" from their New South Wales task in order to examine some of the novelties which have been accumulating.

The stamps and envelopes of the Columbian issue (United States), were shewn first. In the case of the stamos, it has been suggested
that the different sizes in which the stamps are found, are due to irregular shrinkage of some of the plates. If so, what accounts for so many varieties of type?

According to this preliminary investigation, the variations appear most marked and most numerous in the 3 c . and 4 c . In one variety of the 3 c. , the knob at the top of the stamp, in the right top corner, is quite separated from the other part of the figure. In this value and the 4 c ., the leaves which overlap the circles containing the numerals vary considerably in number.

A large number of distinct shades and other minor varieties were noted in all the values. Some of these might be accounted for by a deficient supply of ink or by some defect caused by the multiplication of the plate.

Some fine copies of the 1857 issue of the U.S. were shewn on the original covers. All had the outside lines and other marks which distinguish the early copies of this isste. One copy had been twice perforated.

Mr. A. E. Baxter was elected an ordinary member; Messrs. W. A. Kings, H. Clark, T. Ridpath, and W. S. King, corresponding members.

Midland Colnties Stamp Fxchange.The May packets are not so well procided with sheets as previous months, no doubt owing to the non-philatelic weather. Many good sheets are sent, but the number of contributors has somewhat fallen off. Members are requested to send good sheets for June and July. 'The 1882-86 Issue, P'ersian.-The Persian 50c. stamp, grey-black, surcharged Officicl, we are informed, was so overprinted because a consignment of stamps from Paris was stolen, and quietly sold to the dealers, hence the stamps issued by the Persian Government were surcharged to distinguish them from the stolen ones. Mr. E. H. Watts, of Newport, Mon., however, has a copy which he obtained from Teheran, presumably from the post office there, and he also has a copy apparently genuinely postmarked. It is worthy of note, however, that Senf gives no space in his album to the unsurcharged stamp.

## REVIEWS

ๆHE Philatelic Journal of Great Britain for April reaches us without the usual plate of new issues, instead, a portrait of Mr. G. B. Calman, of New York, and a well-written account of this wellknown philatelist is given. The Rerient of Revicus is decidedly great, and not only instructive, but in many parts distinctly amusing.

Mr. E. F. Broderip has a useful article on the French stamps in the April issue of The Stamp Collector, and presents very piainly the salient features of the various types.

We have recejed the fourth number of the Stamp Chronicle and Circular, published by some gentleman or gentlemen, who evidently wish to hide their identity, for, although we have carefully, individually and collectivels, gone through the issue, we cannot find the publisher's name or address. Why is this? The paper is certanly not one to be ashamed of, it is certainly small, but distinetly good.

The City Stamp flourishes apace,--we shall be compelled to let loose our now poet, if our contemporary bursts into song again.

IIr. A, F. Basset Hull's article on the Fiji Times Express, which appears in the March number of Vindin's Monthly, casts a great deal of light upon these somewhat mysterious productions, and should be read by all who are interested in them.

The Philatelic Journal of America gives some very good cuts of several leading philatelists, with a short account of each. The portrait of Mr. C. J. Phillips presents a life-like appearance of that genial and popular philatelist.

The expected Ihilatelist. published by Mr. Bishop, of Denver, Colorado, has at longth been issued. While not up to the standard of the Jeading American journals, the first number of The Philatelist is very interesting reading. In an article on "The Standard of Philatelic Literature" we find the following:-"If an editor (or angone) should pick up a philatelic paper to-day, what would he find in it? In a far too great a majority of them, I am sorry to say, Mush! Twaddle! Drivel! Column upon column, page upon page of it! The personal hit at some poor philatelint who was caught out in the rain, or an instalment of poetry (!), after the sityle of 'There was an Old Woman of Guinca,' to the exclusion of any and all possible matter of $\Omega$ real philatelic nature." Mr. Glass! here's to your good health! we have protested against the same thing ourselves, and rejoice to find that American philatelists and American philatelic papers are rising in jadgment upon the rubbish. If the popular voice will only include the vile mixture of philately and drivel, written by certain verdant American youths, in its condemnation, all may yet go well.

The Post Office for April is a very good number of a consistently good magazine.

We are pleased to see evidence of reformation in the Quaker City Philatelist. The April number contains much matter of philatelic interest, and the gentleman whose tastes wander in the direction of doubtful rhymes has been relegated to a back seat.

We do not uilmire poetry of the sentimentalphilatelic varicty, but a bit of rhyme which appears in the Canadian Philatelist from the pen of Mr. Chas. Jenney is decidedly superior to any we have yel read in an American philatelic publication, although a bit rugged in parts, it is pleasant reading, and free from bathos.

Messrs. Butler Bros.' Wholesale Price List for May and June has weached us, and we recommend dealers to obtain it, as there are many lines worth investing in.

It mas be of service to such of our readers as collect colonials to point out to them a firm, not long known to us, who have at the present time good stocks of medinm and rare colonial stamps. Early issues of British Colonies are a speciaity with the London Stamp Co., Queen Victoria Strect, E.C., who may be depended upon to supply all ordinary wants at a reasonable price.

The Columbian Stamps.-At ioz firstclass post-offices in the United States, during the month of January, 1892 , stamps to the value of $\$ 1,870,483 \cdot 06$ were sold, while during January, 1893, the amount sold was $\$ 2,254,476 \cdot 6 \mathrm{I}$, of which $\$ 545,810 \cdot 3 \mathrm{I}$ was realized from the ordinary series, and $\$ 1,708,666 \cdot 33$ from the Columbian. It speaks volumes for the popularity of the Columbian
stamp that people who have the option of buying either kind, preferred to take the Columbian stamps in the proportion of more than three to one.

## AS OTHERS SEE US.

COLLECTORS of postage stamps are finding, just now, comfort in the fact that though these cherished objects are still rising in the market at home and abroad, they are believed by experts to have nearly reached their maximum. It is chiefly unused stamps of foreign countries that hare gone up, especially those of the small German states. The reason giten is their long and continued neglect by native collectors, who, till lately, would take nothing but used copies. Those who are inclined to " make a plunge" in stamp collecting, however, are warned by The Philatelist that there is need to be very wary in these days, especially in regard to Americans.

In the issues of the United States there is quite an epidemic of speculation, and prices are abnornally high. Hoarding goes on to what this writer considers "an absurd extent" It is not merely hoarding, as understood and practised by the ordinary collector in the sense of putting aside useless duplicates in the hope that they may turn out precious some day, but hoarding in the sense of depleting the market of certain issues so as to bring about a sort of "corner" in the pestage stamp market. The Philatelist, however, is of opinion that such a rise will be unnatural and fleeting, and will result in the burning of some speculators' fingers.Liverpool Etening Express.

The Duke or York as a Stamp Collector.-It will surprise nobody to hear that the Duke of lork is to preside over the anmual dimner of the Philatelists' Society. No schoolboy ever collected stamps more enthusiastically than has the only remaining son of the Prince of Wiales. He is deep in the mysteries of first issues, withdrawn issues, and official stamping. He is said to have a very excellent private collection, and he does not disdain, even now, to add to his treasures. The philatelists will have an enthusiastic president at their feast, and all schoolboydom will rejoice. Certainly there are few amusements more instructive than stamp collecting. The lad who indulges in this pastime intelligently learns not only geography, but a little (at the least) of the Constitutions of the States of the world. The Duke of lork will do no harm in supporting the schoolboy " mania" if he warns his friends against speculating in rarities.Birmingham Daily Mail.

## IMPERIAL PENNY POSTAGE.

IN the House of Commens, Mr. Loder moved a rosolution affirming that in view of the recent statement of the Postmaster-General, that there are no serious financial or administrative objections to such a step, the time had come when the charge for the transmission of letters from the United Kingdom to all parts of the British Empire should be reduced to one penny per half-ounce letter. The motion was seconded by Mr. M. Lawson, and opposed by Mr. A. Morley, on the ground that it would entail a further heavy loss of revenue, and would, moreover, be opposed to the wishes of many of the Colonies, some of whom were parties to the Postal Union. - Mr. Henniker Heaton traversed the arguments of the Postmaster-General, which, however, were strongly supported by Sir J. Fergusson. Mr. Gladstone said that the Government would be glad to be in a position to accept and give immediate effect to the proposal if it were in their power, but asked how, with a small and doubtful surplus, and against the wishes of some of the Colonies, they could do so, especially as such action would involve a bresch of faith towards Australia. Mr. Goschen concurred with the Prime Minister; and the Chancellor of the Exchequer having stated that in the opinion of the Government the proposal contained in the resolution was one which ought to be carried into effect when the finances of the country would permit, and the Government were free from the obligations by which they were now bound, Mr. Loder withdrew his resolution.

## NOTES ON THE "EMBLEM" SERIES OF YiCTORIA.

[Being a paper read before the Philatelic Society of Victoria, by Charres B. Donse.] - T'indin's Monthly.

I N choosing the above subject for my paper this evening, I am fully aware that I am trespassing on well-trodden ground, and am alive to the fact, that after the lengthy and elaborate articles that have appeared on these stamps in Vindin's Monthly from the pen of the President of the Society, anything that could be written by me must necessarily be insignificant and trifling. In my opinion, the stamps of Victoria form a collection in themselves, and the most interesting portion of the collection is the "Emblem" section. It is when collecting these that the advanced
collector is in his element, having an abundance of minute varieties and shades to classify and arrange. To a beginner, the different small varieties of the "Emblem" series appear somewhat difficult to distinguish and master, but after a little study of the different kinds of papers, \&c., the philatelist can readily tell at a glance one variety of "Emblem" from another. In dealing with the subject in this short paper, I do not propose to describe the design of the stamp norits mode of production, as that has already been fully done by others, and in a far better manner than ever I could hope to do it. I merely intend taking the various kinds of papers upon which the stamp was printed, and mentioning which of the respective values-id., 2 d ., or 4 d . -I have met with on that kind of paper, and whether in a perforated, rouletted, or unperforated state, together with any notes I may be able to make. Taking them first, the

## WOVE PAPER, WATERMARKED STAR,

The id. and 4 d . appear to have been issued on this paper, both in an imperforated and rouletted state. The star paper on which the stamp was printed, was a quantity of the same kind as the 1 d . and 6 d . Queen on Throne, were printed upon, and was taken over by Messrs. Calvert Brothers on their accepting the first contract for printing these stamps. The paper is of the same kind and from the same maker as that upon which the star watermarked Van Dieman's Land, first issues of South Australia, Ceylon, and other British Colonies are printed. Both the Id. and 4 d . values are comparatively plentiful on this paper in an imperforated state; the latter value especially, but the rouletted copies are scarce, especially the id. value of which, as yet, I have not yet seen an authentic specimen on the original paper. The best copy I have seen is in the collection of Mr. Derrick, of Geelong, but unfortunately it is off the original paper. I have seen specimens that have been reputed rouletted, but these have been either very badly rouletted, or rouletted on portion of one side of the stamp only. As
showing the comparative scarcity of the id. to the 4 d . value in a rouletted state, I may mention that out of 1,500 mixed emblems that were lately turned out and gone through by a collector here, there were ten single specimens and one pair of the 4 d . value, in a rouletted state, but not a single specimen of the id. value. I have seen catalogued the id. value on star watermarked paper, and perforated 12 , but have never seen a specimen of this variety, and doubt, very much, its existence. Considering that the id. star watermark were issued about 1857 , and that perforation was first applied to stamps in Victoria towards the end of the year 1859 ; that the emblem series were first perforated about 186 I , and that in between these years the penny value was issued on wove paper, no watermark, both in an imperforated and rouletted state; I am inclined to think that there is very little chance of any of the Id. value on star paper having been officially perforated. Mr. Moens, of Brussels, catalogues a specimen of the id. star paper, perforated horizontallyand rouletted vertically, but I fear that this is a production emanating from his own country, or possibly one that before leaving its birthplace should have been branded "made in Germany." The 2d. value does not appear to have been issued on star paper. I am unable to say why, unless that Messrs. Calvert Brothers having first printed the 4 d . value, and then the id. value on the star paper, the supply taken over by them became exhausted before they commenced printing the 2 d . value. The Id. value is found in two shades of green, and the 4 d . value in a number of shades of red.

## THE NEW CATALOGUE.

0UST upon going to press, we received the ninth edition of Messrs. Stanley Gibbons' Catalogue and Price List. Time forbids us giving a detailed account of the book, but our impression upon glaneing through it is decided $y$ favourable. We notice that the chronological order oi the emissions in some places,
notably in New Zealand, is corrected, while several omissions of past editions have been rectified. With regard to the cataloguing of varieties, we notice that in the colonials, at least, these have been considerably enhanced, varieties of perforation and watermark being distinctly noted. The fictitious prices of one or two of the West Indian Islauds, which appeared in the eighth edition, have been reduced to their proper level, altbough in the stamps of these islands the prices have generally, and in some cases alarmingly risen. As a guide for the collector, the value of the work is greatly increased, and although, at so short a notice, we cannot affirm that no errors are to be found in the book, yet we do say that the ninth edition of Messrs. Stanley Glbbons' Catalogue is a distinct gain to the science of philatoly.

GTHE prices realized generally at the sale of the De Coppet collection are ach. nowledged in every guarter as a most emphatic testimonyof he progress of philately. To have bought this immense collection would have required something over five thousand pounds, a fortune to the majority of people, and, allowing for natural and progressive increase in value, a fortune must have been spent in amassing it; but to consider that this collection, huge though it be, is inferior in bulk, completeness and value, to other collections in either hemisphere, gives us an idea of the grave and important position which the science has now assumed. To have spen
thousands of pounds in gathering together a collection such as the one lately owned by Mr. De Coppet is nothing,-a monied madman might have done it,-to the lay mind there is no evidence of business, calculation, or prescience in this,-rather the reverse,-but when we observe the spectacle of men, mature in mind and years, competing their wealth, one against another, to secure these valuable, yet valueless, pieces of paper, we must perforce acknowledge some potent factor at work,-to see one useless bit of paper comprised within a diameter of two inches, sold for many thousand times its weight in gold is surely a sight for gods and mon. If this wonderful sale, which plainly marks an epoch in philately, is so astounding in its effect upon the philatelic world, with what staggering emphasis must it force itself upon the notice of the non-philatelist, - the scoffer; when we hear such an one now, we must not assume the diffident smile and the haliapologetic word,-no, the science of philately has reached a point which must command the respect of even the stemest man of business, -we must gravely reach the catalogue of the De Coppet sale, turn to the description of the British Guiana 2 cents, rose paper, and then point out the price,-one thousand and ten dollars,-two hundred and ten pounds. This will be enough to silence all cavil, no one, save he be a fool or a fanatic, can argue that philately has not at length become a power to be met and treated with respect.

BRAZIL.-The following values have been issued, same type as the last 100 reis.

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.-The twopence, ochre, has been overprinted ons PENN: in black, and original value barred over. Some of these provisionals do not show the period after overprint.

LIBERIA.-The three-cent inland stamp, chronicled by some of our contemporaries as having been altered from black to vermilion, is denounced by The London Philatclist as a fraud, on the authority of the Postmaster of Liberia.

NEWFOUNDLAND.-According to The Philatelic Record a new issue is contemplated, with portrait of Queen, as shown on the new English coinage.

Two new stamps are announced by Mr. Gremmel in The Post Office, same type as 3c. Newfoundland, values 3 cents and 8 cents, colours not given.

NIGER COAST PROTECTORATE is the new name for The Oil Rivers Protectorate, and the new issue stamps are to bear this title.

SANDWICH ISLANDS.-We are informed that all current stamps are to be overprinted Provisional Government; 1893 .

SEYCHELLES.-The 13 cents grey, overprinted 12 cents, is chronicled by Tho Philatelic Record, so that our list given in February was not incorrect, as stated by several of our contemporaries.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.-'The twopence is now perforated 15 .

ST. VINCENT.-At the time of departure of last mail to this country there were no fourpenny stamps at the post offices, the new fourpence yellow having been absorbed by collectors. We should not be surprised if Sir Charge commenced operations again. The twopence-halfpenny is now printed on paper in which the watermark, Crown C.A., appears on each stamp; formerly it fell on alternate rows of Crown C.A. and double lines. The colour has undergone a decided change from pale to a hue which is deeper, and has a slatey cast about it. Previous to the arrival of the deeper coloured stamp a
provisional $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. had been prepared, but never issued.

TASMANIA.-The postal fiscals of the Platypus and George and Dragon types have a genuine Philatelic standing; all have been issued at the post offices as ordinary postage stamps, and for a considerable time, $1 /-, 2 / 6$, $5 /$ and $10 \cdot$. As we have this information from head-quarters Philatelists need not hesitate to add the unused fiscals to their collections.

TONGA.-The British Consul informs us that of the provisional fourpence on Id., 4,000 only were printed, and of the eightpence on twopence only 2,500 .

TRANSVAAL.-Of the new issue, foreshadowed in our last number, the halfpenny has been issued in bronze green, design, paper and perforation unaltered.
'TURKS ISLANDS.—Gibbons' Mouthly Jourval announces the twopence-halfpenny in hilue, otherwise unaltered.

VICTORIA.-Le Timbre Poste chronicles the one shilling in carmine red.

ZULULAND.-Several papers announce the issue of the English threepence overprinted Zululand. As this stamp has been in use five years the information is rather behindhand.

## THE NEW STAMP CLUB.

$\mathrm{A}^{7}$the meeting held on April 27th, at the Gambriaus Restaurant, Mr. Cheveley in the chair, it was decided, after considerable discussion, to adjourn until June 27th. It was stated by Mr. Ginn that several members of the Philatelic Protection Society had been considering the subject for some time, and would present a scheme at the next meeting.
$\sigma$ HE promoters of the meeting, held Apl. 27, at which the prepondering influence of the P.P.A. so ruthlessly pulverised their proposals, are not disposed to assume the rolle of the toad under the harrow, but
have decided to make a fresh departure, and not wait to see the direction events take on June 27th.

A Committee of Collectors is being formed, and the Club will be an accomplished thing by the end of this month. Mr. H. Hilckes, 64, Cheapside, E.C., is Secretary, pro tem, and to him all subscriptions(ten shillings per anmum) must be paid, for which one foreign and one English paper will be sent gratis.

The most significant point in the new proposal is the suggestion that the Club should be entirely managed by collectors, and that not more than one third of the membership shall be dealers, and those only of unexceptional standing.

## REPRINTED STAMPS <br> (Continued.)

GREAT BRITAIN.

UlNUSED specimens of the black penny having been asked for by a favoured individual, a sheet was struck in that colour, specimens may easily be distinguished from originals by the crown watermark which is of the large instead of small type, no paper remaining with the latter; moreover the facsimile is from the re-touched die.

HAMBURG.
The $186+$ issue $\mathrm{I} \frac{1}{2}$ and 21 schilling have been reprinted as required since 1879 , when the plates were accuired by a continental dealer. The originals were imperforate and perforated $13!$, and on paper watermarked with sinuous lines. The reprints are imperforate, perforated $15 \frac{1}{2}$, or perforated $13!$, all on unwatermarked paper. However, genuine originals may be met with occasionally without watermark, as, if the paper were put the wrong way into the printing machine, the top and bottom rows would not show the watermark. The reprints appear to be carelessly printed and the later printings show wear of the plates.

1866 issue.-The $1 \frac{1}{4}$ sch. reprints are made
from the old envelope die which has been altered, the chief difference being:-the original stamps have an open circle in the centre of each of the four rosettes dividing the inscription. In the reprints there is no zuhite centre.

The 1 b sch. has also been reprinted from an envelope die. Reprints are distinguished by the $g$ of schilling rumning into the irner line of the frame.

The majority of the reprints are or thicker paper than the originals.

The envelope stamps have also $\mid$ een reprinted both on entire envelopes and on strips of paper.
$\frac{1}{2}, 1,1 \frac{1}{2}, 2,3,4$, and 7 schilling.
These reprints are all too dull in colour and on thinner paper than the originals.

## NOTES ON THE "EMBLEM" SERIES OF YICTORIA.

[Being a paper read before the Philatelic Society of Victoria, by Charles B. Donne.] - Vindin's Monthly.
(Concluded.)
WOVE PAPER, NO WATERMARK.

ALL the three values are found on this paper, both in an imperforated and rouletted state, and the 1 d. and 4 d . also exist on this paper in a perforated state, but not as far as I know the 2d. value. I have seen reputed specimens of the 2 d . perforated on wove paper, no watermark, but in all of these, on close examination, I have found some small portion of the single line figure 2 d . visible. All three values are found in a number of shades on this paper.

## laid paper.

On this paper the id. value is found only in a perforated state, in two shades of green, the paper being laid horizontally. The 2d. value exists, rouletted on paper laid both horizontally and vertically, in two colours, violet and lilac. The 4d. value is found imperforate on paper laid vertically, perforated on paper laid horizontally, and rouletted on papers laid both horizontally and vertically. 1 have seen specimens of the $2 d$. value on laid paper claimed as imperforated, but these have merely had the rouletted dents trimmed from off their edges. I have never seen an imperforate pair of the 2d. value on laid paper. The ${ }_{4} \mathrm{~d}$. value, imperforate, on paper laid vertically, I have seen in pairs, which proves its existence in that condition. The 4 d. , on paper laid horizontally, I have never yet seen, but I see no reason why it should not exist, as the 2d. value is comparatively plentiful, both on paper laid vertically and horizontally. The 4 d . value abounds in shades on this paper.
watermark, single line of value on WOVE PAPER.
The only stamp issued on this paper is the 2d. value, on paper watermarked single line

2, and was printed in shades of lilac and slate colours. The later printings shew defects, possibly due to wear of the electros from which they were printed.
wove paper watermarked with value in words.
On this paper the id. value is found in two shades of green, on paper watermarked "One Penny" in words. The 4d. value does not appear to have been issued on this paper, but the 2 d . value appears in two colours, lilac and slate, in various shades on paper watermarked "Two Pence," and also printed in slate colour on paper watermarked "Three Pence." Why the stamp was printed on this paper I am unable to say; it is evidently the same paper that the 3d. beaded oval was printed on, and was possibly resorted to in an emergency. Copies of the 2d. on paper watermarked "Three Pence" can readily be distinguished by the dark colour of the paper, as it generally has the appearance of having been stained, due to the heavy coating of gum that is always found on it. Specimens of the 2d. value are reputed as having been printed on paper watermarked "Thrse Pesce," but I am inclined to think that this is due to defective watermarks. Many specimens I have seen have the watermark blured and indistinct, and often in such a state that it is almost impossible to make out the watermark. I myself do not think that the error exists, as if it does exist it would also appear in specimens of the 3 d . beaded oval, and as far as I know, none of the earlier stamps have been found on paper watermarked "Three Pence." Specimens of the 2 d . value and on paper watermarked "Three Pence" and on paper watermarked "Two Pence" are found with the watermark inverted.

## PELURE PAPER.

None of the three values were issued on this paper. I have been shown a specimen of the id. value, perforated, reported to be on pelure paper, but in my opinion it is merely a light-coloured thin wove.

## A. R. ROGERS' AMERICAN PHILATELIC BLUE BOOK.

$\top$HE work issued by Mr. Rogers, of New York, under the above title, has at length been issued. Whatever delay there has been in its issue is amply accounted for by the tremendous amount of labour and energy evidently expended on the work, and, considering it is virtually the work of one man, it is a monument to lis untiring energy and unremitting perseverance. The work contains 275 pages, and is an almost complete compendium of American Philately:-It gives us two lists of American collectors, - one arranged according to the States in which they reside, and the other in alphabetical order; it contains particulars of each philatelist, his address, age, business, socicties of which he is a member, speciality, size of collection, and wants; it furnishes a nearly complete list of American dealers, and many foreign ones, a list of American societies, with particulars about each, and a catalogue of the principal Philatelic papers in the English language, with particulars of size, rates, publishers, circulation, \&c.

This book is absolutely necessary to the dealer, while it is of the utmost utility to collectors, and we must heartily congratulate Mr. Rogers upon the splendid result of his labour and ingenuity.

## REVIEWS:

THE Philatelic Journal of Great Britain contains a capital portrait of Mr. F. R. Ginn, with an equally good account of that estimable gentleman in the letterpress.

The Stamp Collector's Monthly for May does not contain a vast amount of reading matter, but the excellent article on "The Cantonal Stamps of Switzerland " amply atones, and is a most useful and instructive description.

The May number of The Stamp Collectors' ITerald might be described as a faker's number. The Stamp Chronicle and Circular, although of few pages, is crammed full of interest to all philatelists. "How Postage stamps are made" is well worth anyone's perusal.

The Quaker City Philatelist improves as it gets better, we mean larger. There is much interesting reading to be found in the May number.

Onc of the best edited papers in the United States is the 4 merrican Ihilatelist, for which Mr. W. C. Stone, the well-known philatelist, is responsible.

L'Feho de la Timbrologie contains the continuation of the articles on the "French Colonies," New Caledonia being the colony described in the May number.

We should advise all dealers to secure the current copy of Messrs. Cameron's Wholesale Price Catalogue.

Mr. W. T. Tajlor has removed to No. 75, Freehold Strect, Hull, where he will in future carry on his constantly increasing business. Mr. Taylor can supply some useful lines in Used Colonials, especially Western Australia.

TT the meeting summoned by the Philatelic Protection Association, on June 27th, it was proposed to establish a Philatelic Exchange for the sole use of dealers, and this proposal being adopted, the P.P.A. have sent an invitation to dealers, inviting co-operation in the formation of the Exchange, which may now be looked upon as an accomplished thing. The Exchange will, no doubt, be a useful adjunct to the trade, and as most trades in large commercial centres have long possessed such institutions, the value of which has been proved, stamp dealers are to be congratulated upon having taken a step which will no doubt greatly tend to their advantage, as giving them a definite standing among commercial men. The members of the Philatelic Protection Association who were prominent at the meeting of $A$ pril 27 th, and who, by their action at that meeting, caused it to be adjourned until June 27th, have placed themselves in a position, which, to the view of the outsider, requires a little explanation. It came as a surprise to some of the gentlemen present when the chairman ruled that this meeting (June 27 th) was an entirely new meeting, and the action of the previous one could not affect it. There are only two ways of looking at this statement; either the chairman was mistaken, or else he was stating the deliberate views of the proposers of the new scheme. We do not intend to hazard an opinion, but we would ask in the interests of outside philatelists, why the promoters of the new scheme used such strenuous efforts to get the matters brought before the meeting of April 27th put off for two months, if they did not intend them to be discussed even then, when their own scheme was prepared,-if they had no intention of allowing the original matters to be broached at the
second meeting, by what right did they chloroform them at the first. If, on the other hand, the meeting on June 27 th was an offshoot of that on April 27 th, why was it not public,-it seems a curious form of procedure for a public meeting to be adjourned until a fixed date, and then only the favoured few to be admitted. We fancy the fact must be that the P.P.A. wished their scheme of an Ex. change to be kept quite distinct from any other, and that any seeming contradictions in their action were the result of over-impetuousness, for we know from our own experience of the gentlemen who are prominent in the P.P.A. that no intentional slight would be offered. We cannot qualify our terms of congratulation to the members of the P.P.A. upon the wise step they have taken in establishing an Exchange, and we think the companion scheme for a London Philatelic Club may grow the better from occupying an independent position.

The other project, the proposed Stamp Club, has not been allowed to drop. Is we announced in our last number, and we may point out that we were before any of our contemporaries in this, the project was virtually decided prior to the meeting on the 27 th, and Mr. Hilckes, as the most prominent mover, has issued a circular inviting philatelists to a meeting early in August to draw up the necessary rules and appoint officers. The stated objects of the Club are such as we suggested in our article of May 2oth, but of course are open to amendment. Mr. Hilckes is perfectly satis. fied with the support accorded to him up to the present, and we may be sure that no efforts will be spared to ensure success.  (With Notcs by NON-LEX.)IN the May issue of the Canadian Philatelist rppears a poetical effiusion under the above title of which we reproduce part. Captain Mildmay is the latest disciple of the sentimental-philatelic-patheticGreen School, and we wish to do ail we can to encourage the budding genius of these youthful writers, we remember when we were children ourselves. The poem opens with the good old fashioned sitting-by-thefire situation, recalling the glories of the past, which are 'crowding through my dreaming heart,' \&c. Again the gentleman sees the usual little album in the cloth and gold, why cloth and gold is not stated, it must be an American firm that covers its albums in cloth and gold, perhaps this is where their value lies, -the gentleman proceeds to tell us.
"Many years have come and vanished since that eventful das,
When my little album came in ever bright array"
This is affecting, a procession of years headed by an album, which came in clotli and gold. But
"How well I can remember those happy days of yore Made bright by Philately, but they, alas, too soon were o'er"
Now this is what we admire most in these pocts, as somebody says, "Throw rhythm to the dogs, I'll have none on't" or something like it. Away with such paltry considerations as metre, or rhyme;-Great Walter Scott! Yore and o'er as rhymes! But enough.-The great line of this stanza is to follow:-
"Through after days of darknoss, and whate're ill betide"
That is the worst thing about American poets, they will introduce obscure Indian expressions, - darknoss
and whate're may be something very complimentary in Choctaw or Iroquois, but we prefer English. To resume, passing over the Chinese word unblembished which we cannot translate,
"I view my fair colonials as I turn its pages o'er, Such a bright array of treasures has ne'er been seen before"
Evidently a good collection of colonials,
"Here rest the stamps of merry England, the mistress of the sea,
Others may be rare and costly but they have no charm for me."
' No charm for me,' why does not our worthy friend dispose of his priceless bright array of colonials, if they have no charm for he.
"Their colors are the brightest, the prettiest ever seen, And surrounded by a circle is a photo of the Queen"
No doubt the gallant captain has secured a set of the English stamps issued for the next jubilee; design,-photo of Queen, in circle, bright colours.Our Canadian friend is evidently a bit of a naturalist, he has discovered what he would probably call a rara auis, viz:-' A beaver clad in brightest red'-which, strange to say is 'an emblem of Canada's vastness, an emblem of its powers,' and mirabile dictu, this bright red beaver 'tells of far-off times, way back unto our birth'-evidently a well-informed beaver, surely the disciples of Darwen should be informed of its existence, unless, dreadful thought, this bright-red beaver has the same origin as those many-headed snakes, lizards, and other creeping things, sometimes seen by people who do not belong to the Good Templars. The next line is colossal, this is where the true power of our American friend shows itself.
" Through after gears of trouble, till now, a nation of the carth."
With a little explaration the reader may appreciate the grandeur of this idea, -and understand its meaning.

The concluding stanza is truly affecting.
"As I gaze upon my treasures, some dimmed, some worn, some old,
And think of stories they could tell but which must be untold,
A gentle stream of singing comes floating softly by,
Like zepltyr's breezes bringing a seraph melody."
We have some dim recollection of an inferior poet using language similar to these last two lines, probably he plagiarized Captain Mildmay. Unfortunately the Captain does not say where the singing comes from. Possibly it is the beaver exercising his vocal powers.
Never mind, Captain, go on, you can give some of the poets of the effete old world a start and a beating, one thing we can truthiully say, neither Longfellow nor Shekespeare ever wrote anything to compare with
your poem. Go on, friend, and anything we can do to help you shall be cheerfully done. You only want time.

## THE PHILATELIC EXHIBITS AT THE WORLD'S FAIR.

在LTHOUGH the Colloctors' exhibits are yet in a very incomplete condition, Mr. A, R. Rogers has made some progress in the matter. The principal objects of interest to Philatelists, at present, are the various Government exhibits, but before long the Philatelic Committee will have their show en evidence.

On the ground floor of the Government Building may be seen the frames containing the United States Post Office display, and in other parts of the building are frames of stamps, \&c., sent by the different post offices of the world. Thesc exhibits are not arranged from a philatelic point of view, although interesting to collectors from their connection with stamps. Some of these contain photographs of postmasters and officials, others the appurtenances of the post office, as hand stamps, \&c., while others contain designs formed of the various postal issues. The whole of the issues of the U.S.A. are more or less represented, the American Bank Note Company shewing imperforate proofs of the general issues, from 1847, while cases of Revenue, Document, and Proprietary Stamps are shown in the same condition. Perhaps the most interesting of these exhibits is the one labelled "First Sheet of Columbian Postage Stamps, printed at 12 o'clock, November 5th, 1892, in the presence of A. D. Hazen, Third Assistant-Post-master-General, and J. MacDonough, President of the American Bank Note Company." This statement bears the signature of these two gentlemen.

Messrs. F.Graham Taylorand L. E.Legge, of Port of Spain, Trinidad, show a very interesting collection of Trinidad stamps, also the original stone of the red, 1856 issue, and other most interesting items. Mexicolshews a large variety of permanent and temporary issues, but many of them of doubtful calibre, some, in fact, indubitably bogus. The Tasmanian exhibits of complete sheets of all issues is very complete,-those of the first issues are from the obliterated plates. There is much of philatelic interest to be seen in the buildings, but no doubt the exhibit will be of greater interest when Mr. Rogers shall have completed his labours.

It is stated tbat a parcel of a certain weight sent from England to Switzerland costs 1s. Gd. A package Iflb. heavier can be forwarded from Switzerland to England for 7d d. This is one of those sort of things no fellow can understand, and no Postmaster.General can satisfactorily oxplain.


## J. W. SCOTT.

John Walter Scott was born in England in the year 1845. After having secured an ordinary education, J. Walter decided to emigrate to America, and arrived there in 1861, just at the time of the late civil war. He was attracted by the gold mines in the Rocky Mountains and thither he went. After spending two years among the running camps, and chat vocation not suiting him, he decided to go to New York and attempt his living by some other method. His time in the west was not spent in vain, however, as he had accumulated a fair share of "gold dust," and with this he determined to commence a coin and stamp business. He had all this time been an ardent and enthusiastic collector, oven having boen caught by the "boy dealer"
fov'r' in school. Forthwith he sailed to England to sr ,ure his stock, and returning very soon, an office was opened in Wall St., near Nassau, which was then within a stone's throw of the Old New York Post Office, in the Middle Dutch Church, corner of Cedar and Nassau Streets, where the imposing edifice of the Mutual Life Insurance Building now stands. The business was at first not very successful as the country was in throes of a great war, and people had more important matters to think about than stamp collecting, but a large trade was done in war tokens, medals, etc. After the strife was over, more collectors sprung up, but the increase was very slow. It was difficult to secure a stock of stamps, and there were very fem of
them which sold over a dollar; so the bulk of purchases were small ones. After a few years of business Mr. Scott believing that the advantages of open competition for rare stamps would be looked upon with favour, announced with much trepidation the first public sale of postage stamps and which took place on May 28, 1870, in the old Mercantile Library Building, at Astor Place and Eight Street, and the result was satisfactory in every way. More sales followed very soon, and Mr. Scott also had the honour of selling the first collection of stamps at a public auction in England, March 18, 1872, which was as great a success as the first American sale.

In 1866, Mr. Scott found it necessary to employ more capital, and the firm of J. W. Scott \& Co. was organized, and two years later the publication of The American Journal of Philately was commenced. The same year the first printed album was issued. Previous to that time it was customary to mount the stamps in any carcless hap-hazard manner, using mucilage or paste to fasten them down securely in their place. This album was of course crude in make-up, and would bear no comparison with the magnificent books now in the market. The most important adjunct to a collection, however, outside of the stamps themselves, is a catalogue, which has been tersely described as the dictionary of philately. The imposing catalogue of to-day had their inception in the first standard catalogue ever published in irook form by Mir. Scott in 1867. Previons to that time, small pamphlets were in use among collectors, and it was necessary to keep all of these small leaflets together so that the collector could refer to them when necessary. In a few years later the business removed to larger and more commodious quarters in 146, Fulton Street, where the company remained until 1882, when they removed to 707, Broadway, under the New York Hotel, and the f.rm name was changed to Scott \& Co. In 1866, Mr. Scott, having an ample fortune, retired from the business with the intention of spending his remaining days in enjoying the fruits of his long and hard labours. But fickle Dame Fortune, however, had other plans for him, and by an unforseen and unfortunate chain of circumstances, instead of living to enjoy the pleasures of the money he oarned, lost almost everything. With the same spirit with which he earned his first fortune, he again entered the stamp business, and organized the J. W. Scott Co., Limited, commenced business in 1888 at 163, Fulton Street, and has continued there ever since with every degree of success.

He is a typical American business man, closely attentive to his work, shrowd and energetic. The long time he has been a philatelist has seriously affected his eyesight, and he is thereby obliged to hold articles very close to Lis eyes in order to distinguish them.

The Metropolitan Philatelist is edited by Mr. Scott, while his son, Walter asqumes the business manage-
ment. This magazine, as is well-known, has a worldwide reputation and some of the best articles on philately appear in its columns.

## AN ARTISTIC STAMP EXHIBIT.

$M$PORTION of the highly-interesting exhibit which Uncle Sam will make at the Chicago World's Fair, is just being completed by the American Bank Note Company in their building in Trinity Place. It is a compleie collection of all the postage stamps issued by the Government since the general postal system went into effect in 1847.

The collection comes down to the two latest stamps issued-the regular and the Columbian series in eightcent registered letter stamp, in dark purple maroon. In the first series issued there were but two different stamps, one having the head of Franklin and one of Washington.
Since 1861 the American Bank Note Company, or its predecessor, has manufactured the stamps, and President James MacDonough, who has charge of the mounting and framing of the present collection, has superintended the manufacture of a greater portion of all the stamps issued by the American Government. The stamps will be mounted on one immense card about 7 feet by 11, artistically arranged, so as to put the different colours in harmonious relations.

There are some curious features in the collection. The smallest stamps ever issued by the Government came out in 1869. They were about one-third smaller than the regular series in use now. They lasted but one year, and in 1870 were swept away for a stamp more generous in size. In 1873 stamps were first used for the different departments, and there were ten different stamps in use. In 1874 the newspaper and package stamps were brought out, running in value from one cent to $\$ 60$, with denominations between rumning down through $\$ 36, \$ 24, \$ 12, \$ 4, \$ 2$ and $\$ 1$. The face value of the stamps in the collection would go well inte the thousands, and the collection will have really cost $\$ 1,000$ before it gets to Chicago.

The public are not, I think, generally aware that by marking a registered letter "Fragile, with care," they can saddle the Postmaster-General with responsibility for damage to the contents, as well as for loss within the prescribed value. This valuable piece of information is hidden in the recesses of the "Post Office Guide," where, with many others equally valuable, it has every opportunity of becoming a dead letter. For want of it, an old lady in the country, who recently sent her teeth to be repaired in London, has lost them for ever. The teeth, though registered, were delivered smashed to atoms, and as they were not marked, "Fragile, with care," the Deprertment repudiatea all responsibility for the disaster.

The book contains 87 pages, and forms a most careful and exhaustive list of the thirty issues of these colonies. The work is undoubtedly far in advance of anything similar yet attempted, and Messrs. Gilbert Harrison and Lieut. Napier are to be congratulated upon their success. The other volumes at present projected are "The Transvaal," by E. Nankivell, "Indian States," by Major Evans," Shanghai," by W. B. Thornhill, and South Australia," by Lient. Napier and Gordon Smith.

THE Annual Election of officers and committees, is, at the present time, greatly exciting the minds of American Philatelists. The American Philatelic Association, the Sons of Philatelia, and kindred Societies of lesser importance, are considering the business to be done at their annual conventions, and the leaders who are to be chosen for the forthcoming year. The Philatelic "Press is busily engaged in pushing this or that 'ticket,' and elections and rumours of elections fill every page. There is a great deal of wisdom underlying all this fuss and confusion for there can be no doubt in the mind of anyone perusing the current American Philatelic literature, that philately is at fever heat among its votaries in the States. Everyone is anxious to record his vote, and each philatelist, or would-be philatelist, is on the tip-toe of expectation to see what the morrow will bring forth. But wherein does the aforementioned sagacity lie? The answer to this question is obvious upon a moment's reflection. In this country at the present moment philately is stagnant, or nearly so. The dealers have virtually closed shop, and collectors have put away their collections and gone to the seaside or country. What are our brethren in America doing? Their holiday takes the form of a visit to Chicago, Niagara, or other well-known spot, where they will meet their fellow philatelists in council, and proceed to the election of officers and formulation of rules for the approximate twelve months. The drift of our argument then is clear. We have no such associations in England as the A.P.A. or S. of P., and this is a matter to be regretted when viewed from several standpoints. We cannot at this moment enter into the arguments for or against the establishment of such associations in our country, but the fact
that these the whole year round, and provide neverending interest for its votaries, is a great argument in favour of their being, and is worthy of consideration by the collectors of Great Britain. We have only one association pretending to be national,-the I.P.U. The interest taken in its doings is very limited. Cannot something be done to put it on a more popular basis? The officers complain of the stagnant condition of the members -when the annual election takes place, not a dozen record their votes, and altogether it looks as though the Union would entirely fall to pieces, were it not for the praiseworthy efforts made by one or two officials to keep it alive. There are only a few months to elapse before another election is due, let us make an effort to follow the example of cousin Jonathan, and endow the Association with something approaching a national interest in its being.

It is not often that we use the columns of the Philatelic Chronicle and Advartiser to speak on our own behalf, but we now venture to ask those of our friends who are satisfied that they are getting good value for their money, to procure us one other subscriber. Everyone can, with a little trouble, get one, and it is a duty our subscribers owe to themselves (as well as to us for our efforts), as the more support we receive, the greater will be our endeavours to increase the usefulness of the Philatelic Cluronicle. We feel sure that the mere mention will be enough to cause our friends to make the small exertion required, but as an acknowledgment of the effort, we will add an extra three months to the term subscribed for by any of our friends who send us one or more new subscribers.

不RGENTINE.-The $1,2,3,5$ and 100 . stamps of 1890 have been overprinted oficial diagonally in black.
BOLIVIA.-The following is translated from L'Intermudaaire de la Timbrologie. The carelessness of the Director-General of Posts has been great in consequences to collectors. Each post-office made what surcharges it pleased; we recently announced that fiscal stamps had been used postally. Only at the post-office of Cochabamba, as far as we can see by the post-marks, have these been used, the fiscal stamps of ic. and 5 c . being surcharged with the word 'provisorio' and '1893' in red ink with a hand stamp, both vertically and horizontally. We have several of these stamps on the envelope. We have also received some envelopes with the stamp of 20 cents, green, cut in two to frank a letter of 10 centavos; these stamp. had been used in Bolivia, and we have no evidence of their use to frank foremg letters.

The obsolete stamps of $187 \mathrm{I}, 5 \mathrm{c}$. green and roc. red, eleven stars, which were demonitized like all the stamps of the obsolete ennission of Bolivia, are, most curiously, allowed to frank letters. At last, to put an end to this disorganization in the use of stamps, the administration caused to be lithographed at La Paz stamps similar to those of the current issue, for the values of Ic . and 5 c . The first has nine stars, the second eleven. Why, no one is able to tell. Several other novelties are also announced, but we catalogue only those of which we are certain. These are: 1c. fiscal, Justice, blue surcharge, Provisorio, 1893. 5c. do. do d. do.
20c. gree:a Arms, 9 stars, perf. 12, half a stamp serving for 10c.
Ic. rose, lithographed, Arms, 9 stars, perf. 12$\}$
5c. b ue,
We gather, however, from El Filatclista SudAmericano that the following are issued:

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.-We have the provisional One Penny on twopence without obliterating har. The current set are to be superseded.

INDIA. Mr. Stephen Alogar, of Calcutta, writes stating that the new one rupee stamp, which was chronicled in December, 89 g , has not been issued to the public, as yet, owing to a large number of the old one rupee stamps being left unsold. The other set has the profile to the left, and is contained by a similar oval band without the spandrels. Besides these sets there has been issued a 25 centimos stamp commemorative of the discovery of America by Columbus, and representing the debarkation upon the mainland. The complete sets are -

## TENTATIYE REFERENCE LIST OF INYERTED WATERMARKS,

By G. Johnson, B.A.

IFEEL sure that no apology will be needed for offering the following list of Inverted Watermarks. The subject is one which is being taken up more actively every day, owing to the desire to collect every known variety, and it has been stimulated recently by collectors giving short lists of the varieties they have met with. Moreover the stamps which are watermarked are generally speaking those which have the most admirers, and, descending to the monetary point of view are those which have shewn the greatest tendency to advance in price. Thus it behoves us to make our collections as complete as possible when chances offer themselves.

Those who despise the idea of 'positions of watermarks' may be reminded that, although not actually inverted, the stamps of Falkland Islands, Labuan and Sierra Leone, can only be classified by the position of their watermarks, as

This of itself shows the 'position of watermark' has a considerable philatelic value apart from the curiosity, oddity, minor variety, or distinct variety as collectors may severally call it.

For some time past I have specially marked all stamps in my collection in which the watermarks are inverted, and finding that I had considerably more than have been noted I was asked to give a full list of them. I do not for one moment arrogate to myself the honour of having made anything like a complete list, as you will see by the title of my paper. If, however, collectors have any additional varieties, I should be much obliged if they will send a list of them to me at 208, Birchfield Road, Birmingham, or to the Editor. I feel sure that many more varieties are to be found even in the stamps of Great Britain aud New South Wales, where the greatest numbers have already been discovered. In the case of the latter country the stamps are classified in the way I suggested in a paper read to the Birmingham Philatelic Society, and which will be published in due course.

Inverted watermarks are of two classes:-r.-We will call 'accidental.'
2.-Where each row of stamps is printed tete-beche to the next, thus making half the stamps on the sheets have inverted wmiks., as in the case of the current Grenada.

Mr. Tiffany continues the excellent and comprehensive list of the Stamps of Peru in the Metropolitan Philatelist, while Mr. A. J. Craig contributes some usefulinformation about the stamps of Prince Edward's Island. The convention of colurse, occupies some space.

The July number of the rhilatslic Journal of America is the best paper we have received from America for some time. Mr. Mekeel is to be congratulated upon the excellent show he makes. The size of the paper is increased and is full of scientific phiiately.

The Quaker City Philatelist still continues to improve. It was alwars a go-ahead publication, and bids fair to run some of its older brethren close in the near future.

The post card collectors of Great Britain should not fail to receive regulariy the only paper devotod entirely to their interosts. The Posial card published at Elizabeth. N.J., U.S.A. is of the utmost use to all who are interested in cards
M. Fiandrin continues his excellent accounts of the French Co'onies in L'Echo de lit Timbrologie. The paper contains also mech more useful philatolic pubulum.

The Bath Stamp Company purpose issuing in a few weeks a first 'Annmal.' The book will contain some 30 pages, and will be gratuitously circulated among established $p$ hitatelists. A certain amount of space is reserved for general advertisements, but application must be immediate.

Messrs. A. Cameron and Co.'s wholesale list is a necessity to dealers, current colonials are listed more numerously and cheaply than by any other wholesalo firm.

## THE NEW LONDON CLUB.

$\sigma$HE " City of London Philatelic Club is the name given to the London club for stamp collectors and dealers, promoted by Mr. Harry Hilckes, Mr. Percy C. Bishop, Mr. G. C. Warden, Jun., and other metropolitan philatelists. The preliminary meetings are over, and the club is firmly established. At the initial meeting at Kennan's Hotel, Crown Court, Cheapside, on Wednesday, August 2nd, twenty-three gentlemen put in an appearance. Mr. G. C. Warden took the chair. The rules drafted and signed by the Provisional Committee - Messrs. Hilckes, Bishop, Nicholson, Warden, and Kellar-were read to the meeting by Mr. Percy Bishop, who had been chosen to act as secretary, pro. tcm., and were passed with a few trifling alterations. The annual subscription was fixed at ios. (without entrance fee for the first year), this amount to include the supply of two official organs-one English, the other foreign. It was decided to have a committee of eleven, made up of three dealers and two collectors; and to give the committee full power to expel any undesirable niember.

Exactly a week later-namely, on Wednesday, the gth instant-the first general meeting of the club was held, Mr. G. C. Warden again presiding. Mr. Bishop read the amended rules, and one or two further additions were made, the whole being then ordered to be printed, on the motion of Hr. Harry Hilzkes
and Mr. Auguste Keller. The hon. secretary read a list of 55 original and founding members of the club, and, in reply to a question from Mr. Max Clarke, announced that nine of these were dealers and the reit collectors. Then came the election of officers. It had been intended to elect only seven of the committee, but on the motion of Mr. Fred. Geo. C. Lundy, it was resolved to appoint all, with the sole exception of the President. For the hon. secretary, Mr. Percy C. Bishop was proposed by Mr. Harry Hilckes, and unanimously supported, while, with equal unanimity, Mr. F. B. Nicholson was chosen as hon. treasurer, and Dr. George Isaac Bryant as hon. librarian. Messrs. Harry Hilckes and G. C. Warden were elected joint vice-presidents, and other committee members appointed were Messrs. Herbert McMillan Fred. Geo. C. Lundy, J. C. Joselin, Walter Morley, and Auguste Keller. Mr. J. C. Joselin moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Hilckes for his vigorous handling of the preliminaries, and Vice-President Walden was thanked by acclamation for his services as Chairman. The following are the

## RULES.

## CITY OF LONDON STAMP CLUB.

1.-That this club be known as the City of London Stamp Club, formed for the purpose of bringing together philatelists for the discussion of philatelic questions and for the interchange of ideas and opinions generally, upon matters philatelic; th cmeetings to he held weekiy.
2. -That Membership be open to stamp collectors of either sex over the age of eighteen.
3.-That the Annual Subscription be 10/- pasable in advance on the 1st of October in each year. This subscription to entitle every member to the receipt of two I'hi'atelic Magazines-one English and the other Forcign. Members joining after the ha'f-year to yay only lia'f subscription; no entrance fee to be imposed during the first year.
4.- That a Comunittee of Eleven members, including President, two Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Librarian, be elected at each annual general meeting of the Club, such committee consisting of three dealers and eight collectors. The President of the Club to be a rollector; of the Vice-Presidents, one to be a collector and one a dealer. For Committee purposes five shall form a quorum.
5. That Election for Membership be by open hallot
of the Committee. whose duty shall be to fully investigate any objections that may be lodged. Eivery candidate against whom no objection is raised shall be elected as a matter of course. Candidates must be projosed and seconded by members of the Club. Though Dealers and Collectors be alike eligible for membership. the dealers shall at no time number more than one third of the total membership-that is to say, if among 60 members there be 20 dealers and 40 collectors, no more dea!ers shall be admitted till at least two more collectors have joined.
6. That admission to the ciub room or rooms be by membership card ouly, each member being permitted however. to introduce a Guest, on the understanding that such guest shall not attend more than twice in that capacity.
7.-That a Secretary beelected once a year. with porver to appoint an assistant if he deem it necessary. The services of the Secretary, as of all other officers of the Club, shall be tuonorary.
8. - That a Treasurer be elected once a year.
9.-That a Librarian be annually elected to receive and account for all donations of books and papers, with a view to the formation of a Philateic Reference Library, for the iree use of members. Funds yermitting, the hon librarian shall have power to purchase on the Club's belhalf, such standard philateic works as may be needed.
10.-That the Committee be empowered to deal with any complaint or dispute that may arise among the members. The expulsion of any undesirable member shall also be left entirely to the Committee.
11.-That one-half the total membership of the Club may at any time call upon the Committee to convene an extraordinary general meeting seven days' notice of such meeting being given to all members of the Club.

The first committee meeting, and the first ordinary general meeting are fixed respectively for the first Tuesday and the first Monday in October. MONTENEGRO.-According to Smith and Co.'s Monthly Circular this principality has found an excuse for a jubilee, 1893 being the 4 coth anniversary of the introduction of printing. So adhesives, envelopes and post cards have been overprinted with two lines of Russian Characters and the dates 1493 and 1893.

NORTH BORNEO.-A new set of stamps is in preparation of the Seychelles pattern.

NEW SOUTH WALES.-We have met with the threepence green, Cr. \& N.S.W., with perforation roxim. In a lot of diademed head, imperforate twopence, we found a specimen rouletted on one side. These varieties have hitherto been unchronicled. We are informed authoritatively that the colour of the current $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. will shortly be changed.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.-Mr. Rosenhain has sent us the new penny post card, card buff, stamp and inscription printed in brown. Design Post Card in long ornamental tablet intersected by circle in which South Australia appears within circle, Royal and Australian arms, the stamp is rectangular, head of Queen in circle around which are words Postage South Australia. I in circles in each top corner, below One Penny and steamer making for port with lighthouse. The one penny adhesive is now perf. 15 .

ST. VINCENT.-On the authority of R.R. Bogert we chronicle fourpence yellow overprinted, $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$ in black, however we very much doubt its authenticity as the yellow stamps were only on sale at the Post Office for a few days and we have received news direct from the authorities that there were absolutely none left in the Island, and that it
is moreover probable that further supplies of fourpence will be in a different colour.

2ldd. on 4d. black and yellow?
SANDWICH ISLANDS.-A correspond. ent writing from Hawaii says that the Government had 75 sheets of the 12 c . mauve surcharged in black, to start with. These were quickly sold out. The Postmaster then had all the other i2c. mauve surcharged in red. The following provisionals are sold out, and are not obtainable at any post office.

2c. vermilion, 1864
12c. mauve (black surcharge)

One sheet of the 2 c . violet was printed with surcharge inverted.

## U.S.A. SOCIETY CONVENTIONS. By Emil Neuffer.

THE Eighth Annual Convention of the A.P.A. is a thing of the past. It was held in Chicago, Ill., Aug. 15th, 16th and 17 th. There were about fifty stamp collectors present. The election was held according to the regulations of the State of West Virginia, under the laws of which state the Association is incorporated. The election was not an election of President, etc., but of five directors; those candidates receiving the
largest number of votes will be elected on the Board of Directors. If there be two candidates for the same office, one of them will have to take some other position.

The following is the result of the election:-
Board of Directors: Alvah Davison, 319 votes; H. E. Deats, 222 votes; J. K. Tiffany, 200 votes; N. W. Chandler, III votes; E. Doeblim, 96 votes. Board of Trustees: Henry Clotz, 177 votes; J. Rechert, 133 votes; J. O. Hobly, 124 votes. Either Mr. Tiffany or Mr. Deats will have to accept the vicepresidency. [Mr. Tiffany, Pres., Mr. Deats, Vice-Pres.-ED.] There were 258 members represented.

The A merican Philatelist was discontinued, but is to appear once a year, as soon after the convention as possible, and the reports of the Association are to be printed in the Philatelic Journal of America, free of charge, and each member will be furnished with a copy of the report in circular form. The dues have been reduced to \$1 per year.

The International Secretary was instructed to furnish a German paper with a monthly list of dishonest collectors (by request).

Roy F. Greene was re-elected Librarian, but immediately resigned from the society on the defeat of the Kissinger faction, as did several others.

## PHILATELIC SONS OF AMERICA.

The above is the title of a new society organized in Chicago with thirty-one charter members. C. W. Kissinger is President, and it is to be a rival of the S . of P .
the united philatelic association.
The above society passed into oblivion after its mock convention in Chicago, but the members will be continued in the P. S. of A. Nearly all the conventions next year will be held at Niagara Falls.

The io th. reprints of 1851 and 1856 issues are to be met with printed Tete Bêche.

The die of this stanip is held by a German Dealer, who prints as required, using pink
gum, fortunately he has not succeeded in getting the right colour, moreover the die has undergone repair, especially the band portion, so that comparison with the original makes detection easy.

The originals were issued at first with red but afterwards with white gum, the die is in the hands of the same German Dealer, and the reprints he pours on the market would be very difficult to distinguish, but that paper is used to print them on which is much whiter and of a much smoother surface than that used for the originals.

## DE COPPET COLLECTION OF MEXICO.

MR. W. T. WILSON, of Birmingham, has just returned from New York, having purchased on bloc this magnificent collection. We had the pleasure of a rough glance at most of the books in which the stamps are mounted, but had not the requisite time to make anything but the most cursory examination. Mr. De Coppet is known universally as a great collector, and his reputation as a first-class philatelist, evidenced by his work on the Tolima and Bolivian plates, is enhanced by this mighty collection, which stands as a monument of philatelic skill and enterprise. Mr. De Coppet has collected Mexican for fifteen years, and
the result is a really great collection of fifteen thousand specimens, many of which are unchronicled, and were unknown to the Caillebottes, whose work on the subject in the pages of the Record, is still considered, and worthily, the standard authority on Mexican stamps. We saw fourteen large albums, and we understand that Mr. De Coppet is still arranging the remainder which will bring the collection up to twenty volumes. Mr.Wilson is to be congratulated upon securing, undivided, the great collection which cannot be too dear at the price paid for it, which, we understand, will come out at something like $\notin \mathrm{I}, 000$.

## THE WORLD'S FAIR STAMP EXHIBITS. <br> (By our own Commissioner.)

$8{ }^{\circ}$HEN I visited the Exhibition at Chicago on Aug 6 th to 9 h, my first thought, of course, was the exhibit of Postage Stamps. Having discovered the baildind where the stamps were to be found, by means of diligent enquiries of people of various nationalities, including free and independent Anericans who seemed, by their manners, to be strongly innbued with the uational feeling that one man is as good as another, and better, - I naturally indulged in pleasant anticipations of the treat in store. When I reached the much-advertised extibition of the American Philatelic Association, pain and disappointment took the place of pleasure - talk about a beggarly array of empty cases. this can hardly describe the state of things, certainly there were handsome cases which had evidently cost a lot of money, alas! nine-tenths of them were empty. - I enquired for a catalogue, but no one had ever heard of such a thing in connection with the Pbilatecic exhibit, uo attendant was in charge, and there was no information to be got for love or money, -not one of the officials in the building couid even refer me to a local authonity. Certainly the comparatively few stamps in the cases were labelled with the names of their several proprietors, and under the circumstances there was nothing to be done, but to make the best of things and examine what was there. Far and away the best exhibit was the collection of United States Government issues, shown by Mr. Deats, this was really a great show, and nothing seemed to be wanting. No other exhibitor showed anything out of the common, though some cases belonging to Messr3. Jerome (Chicago) \& Rich (New Xork City) were very fair. Mr. Stern also had a medium exhibit. The other collections are but medium, and marred by forgeries, though a lot of British American Colonies, on the whole enve'opes, addressed to Edgar Nelton, Juggler, in various parts of the world, contained many very nice stamps, and deserves a word of praise.

Happening upon a gentleman better acquainted with the topography of the Exhibition than myself, I learned that a show of stamps was to be seen in the Anthropological building, and wending my way there, found a very nice exhibit of the Soott Stamp and Coin Co., with a young lady in charge, who, strange to say, had married a gentleman from our own neighbour-bood-Walsall. A fair amount of business seemed to be transacted at this spot. I next discovered the show of Messrs: Stanley Gibbons, an effective dispiay, and weil worthy of the leading stainp firm, but stowed away in a rather unlikely spot in the Liberal Arts Building. 1 was here informed of an exhibit belonging to a Canadian dealer, somewhere in the buidding, although I failed to discover it.

My next move was to the Post Office exhibits, which I bad little difficulty in discovering, and here I found much to interest and amuse. The stamps shown were mounted upon elaborately hand-painted cards in frames. (The Unit d States stamps have already been described so we omit this description). The set of first Samoa, were reprints. There was also a very nice collection of used Trinidad, strips and pairs of early issues, \&c., and in the centre of the case the lithograph stone from which the red stamp was printed, as well as the drawing on stone of the blue lithograph.

The exhibit, contributed by the Mexican Government was a very doubtful lot, as far as the presumably rare stamps were concerned.-Among them was the 4 reales, black on yellow, Gothic surcharge, an indubitable fraud, - by the way the stamps of this issue are being reprinted and offered all round duly postmarked, having the appearance of being taken Irom the original letters,-this matter is at present occupying the attention of the P.P.A. There were several very fishy provisional issues in the style of Patzcuaro, from Puebla, Tlaxeala, \&c. The original letter recoptacle from San Cristobal is shown. It consists of a comical human face, painted flesh-colour, with a moustache, and imperial, or, as our American Cousina put it 'chin-whisker',-the open mouth being the orifice of the letter-box. A series of ten spirited coloured drawings in the Japanese style, represented the methods of carriage and delivery of letters in the Mikado's dominion. The Dead Letter office exhibited four large cases containing everything from a scalp to a stagbeetle,one very amusing article which appealed strongly to my risible faculties was a leather-bound book, containing a bottle of Whiskey, ingcribed "Spiritual Series, -Ireland's True Spirit" There is much to interest and amuse, but very little on the whole to appeal to one as a philatelist.
