##  <br> PHILATELIC PEN POINTS. <br> 

Quite a little wordy war is on between two holders of U.S. 4 c and 30 c envelopes of 1886 is isue. It is claimed 1,000 each of the 30c Nos. 1527, 1531, 1538 and 1545 were printed and 500 each of the 4 c Nos. 1524 and 1529 , and one firm has reduced ite price日 about 85 per cent on the 30 c and 25 per cent on the 4 c .

Austrian stamps cancelled KK ETAP-PEN-POSTAMT Nr. XXIX, both with date, were used by the Austro-Hungrian armv during the occupation of Bosnia prior to July 1879.

The caps on the 2c 8tamp of 1890 U . S. were caused by damaged transfer rolls, probably due to the roll being hardened too much, part of it slipping off. A stemp having the cap on the right 2 only sold about a year ago, unused for $\$ 5.25$.

Type II of the 40 centimes orange stamp of France 1849-50 and 1870-71 issues existed but twice in each sheet of 300 stamps, being the 6 th and 7 th stamps in the last row of the right hand pane.

Quite a little history is attached to the atamps of the iesue of 1853-60 of France perforated 7. These were the result of an inyention for perforating stamps by a Mr. Susse, who used his machine on sheets bought from the postoffice in quantity as a small discount, selling them perforated at face, and he tried to induce the French Government to adopt it, but the holes being punched so large the machine was not the success hoped for.

A pretty story is out about our present 2 c stamp imperforate. It seems a lot were placed at some office for the benefit of an inventor of an automatic stamping machine, but some one manared to get hold of quite a supply and sold them at priees ranging from 10 c to 25 c each. They are now being sold for about 4 c each.

## A Bit of Stamp History.

## By A Retired Stamp Dealer.

Stamps, impressed and adhesiwe, are extensively used in making and verifying payments of money. Stamp duties were first imposed in Eugland in 1694; the basis of the existing law is the stamp acts of 1870 . For the protection of the public revenue penalties are $\mathrm{im}-1$ posed; thus anyone receiving a premmm of insurance without issuing a properly stamped policy is liable to a fine. Where the law requires a stamp, an unstamped docunient cannot be given in evidence in civil proceedings unless the party producing it is willing to pay the duty and an additional penalty. Stamp duties are a sort of indirect taxation. It is admitted that they ought to be moderate in amount; excessive duties on negotiable instruments, transfers of property, or legal proceediegs would operate to the discouragement of business. The amount of stamp duty received in the United Kingdom has risen from $\mathfrak{£ 6 , 7 2 6 , 8 1 7}$ in $18 \pm 4$ to $£ 8,040$, 091 in 1859-60, £ $11,307,944$ in 1879-80, and $£ 13,460,000$ in 189091 . During the American civil war, 1861.65, stamp taxes were laid on all manner of legal documenis, bank drafts, checke, and on packages of variour kinds of manufactured goods, but these were gradually whdrawn. The last stamp taxes on matches, proprietary articles, playing cards, checks, etc., were repeated in 1883 , and the reventue from adhesive stamp, which was $\$ 4,140,175$ in 1863 , had risen to $\$ 16,544,043$ in 1870 , and was $\$ 7,053,053$ in the last year, vanished from the internal revenile returns. Forgery of stamps is severely punished.
stamps for postal purposes were used, or it was proposed they should be used, in Paris as far back as 1653. Stamped paper on covers for that purpose, boll with impressed and embossed stamps, seemed to have bern used in the kingdon of Sardinia in 1819, several values being provided for.

Charles Finflit suggested the idea of using stamps for the prepayment of postage in 1833-34. Stamps, or labels (gummed) to be pasted on articles liable to doty, were in use by the British Indand Revenme Dept. in the days of Geo. III, though they were not issued ready gummed. The use of a piece of stamped paper just large elough to bear the stamp, with a glutonous wash on the back rendered adhesive by moisture was recommended by Sir Rowland Hill in a pamphlet of 1837, and his post olfice reform of 1840 gave o pportunity for carrying out the suggestion with success.

Not until 1879 was it disputed that the credit of the adhesive stamp was due Sir Kowland Hill. Though in 1846 Mr. Jas. Chalmers, a book seller of Dumdee, received a testimonial from his fel-low-citizens for the post office reforms advocated by him, including the use of adhesive stamps, but from 1879 upwards to 1891 a pamphlet controversy was carried on by Mr. Patrick Chalmers insisting that the credit was wholly due his father. The idea, it was affirmed, was fally developed as early as 1834. Specinien stamps were made and exhibited in that or the next year on Mr. Chalmers' premises, the plan was submitted to Sir Roland Hill in 1839, and was then, but not before, taken up by the latter. This was strenuonsly denied by Mr. Pearson Hill Mr. Hill read an elaborate statement on the subject befors the Iondon Philatelic Socipty on November 1881, aftirming that Mr. Chalmers had failed to produce any evidence that his father had suggested adhesive stamps in 1834, or had communicated his ideas on the subject to anybody before 1839a date years subsequent to that at which Sir Rowland Hill had derived the idea from Mr. Chalmers. Both may have hitupon the plan independently; but adhesive stamps without the uniform penny rate would have been complicated and cumbrous. Sir Rowland's reform of 1840 for the first time made the adhesive stamp, which he had sug-
gested at the beginning of 1837; a practical suggestion. Mr. Pearson Hill's case maintaining his father's claim was mublished in 1888 as a pamphlet entitled The Origin of Postage Stamps. Mr. Chalmers on his side iscued numerous pamphlets with many testimonials from persons professing to remember the suggestion of adhesive stamps by Mr. James Chalmers in 1835 and subsequent years, but without any colltemporary documents to certify the early date maintained.

With the postal reform of 1840 the franking of letters was abolished in Kritain, and pennystamps introduced. The first English postage stamps was black, but the same year Mr. Muhcody designed the famous 'Muhcody envelope, intended to be both cover and stainp which was not a practical success and withdrawn the same year. Singe then upwards of 100 stamps of varjotis values have been used in Britain; in the British Empire, including colonies and dependencies, upward of 1600 different postage stamps are or have been in use. The red penny stamp in use in. Great Britain from 1864 to 1880 underwant, some 150 minor modifications, so that for stamp collectors Britain itself presents a large feld. The use of adhesive stamps was authorized in the United States in 1847; prepayment of stamps was made compulsory in 1856.

Stamp collecting began to be a common and fashionable hobby about 1861, whioh spread from Britain to the Continent, and in 1890 there were then collections of postage stamps of all kinds, of which the aggregate value was estimated at more than 100,000 Pounds. The stamp collecting persuit, which clained to be a science, is called philately, trinbrophily, and tinbrology; and there are numerons philatelic societies in Britain and abroad who publish (Continued on Ping 6.)

The reason for perforating the 1882 isbues of British Guiana with the word SPECIMEN was to prevent fraud, the stamps having been printed by a private firm and the government adopted this method of marking the stamps which were good for postage. However a few of them were used without the perforated word.

The stamps of Hamburg were restricted in their use, being good only for postage in that city and to Bremen, Lubeck, Oldenburg, Ritzbuttel, Heligo land, Netherlands, England and Unit id States. Stamps of various other German States had to be used for correspondence with other countries.

The official stamp credited to the North German Postal Cunfederation in Scotc's catalogue should really be listed under Hamburg, as the stamp was issued and intended for that city.

Forty thousand of the ONE CENT on 3 cents of Newfoundland of 1891 were printed and were divided as follows:
Thirty-two thousand of Type 1; 6400 of Type II; 1800 of Type II1. Each sheet contained 50 stamps, 40 of Type 1, 8 of Type II and 2 of Type III. This surcharge on the gray or brown shades of the 3 cent stamp are counterfeits, the originals being only on the lilac or slate shades.
"Philatelic Quillings," a new, neatly printed 12 page paper has jnst arrived from Worcester, Mass. I. E. Bigelow is at the helm as editor and we wish him all possible success in his venture.

The first issue of stamp of New Caledonia, the 10 centimes of 1859 , was designed by a sergeant of marines. They are lithographed and a sheet contains 50 stamps, all differing from each other in minor points.

Siam, Scott Nos. 62 to 65 a incluaive, were printed from a die which was rejected. However, a few were used.

The 4 and 10 atts are not listed in all catalogues, but there are copies in existence both used and unused.

You may have met with the 1892 issue of New Zealand with advertisements on the back of the stamps. This was done on 1893 and 1894 and was a reve-nue-raising project on the part of the goverument. However no philatelic interest is attached to such stamps.

## Mail Carriers of The Frozen North.

The capacity of the reindeer for team work is remarkable. His hoofs are very broad, and do not penetrate the snow crust. His average weight is about 400 pounds. He will swiftly draw a sled carrying 601 pounds, and with this load can cover from fifty to sixty miles a day. Reindeer teams now carry the mail from Kotzbue to Point Barrow, Alaska, a distance of 650 miles, the most northerly post route in the world. At the end of his journey, or at any stopping-place, the reindeer is turned loose, and at once breaks through the snow to the white moss which serves as food.

## Queensland.

The Orown $Q$ watermark in the stamps of Queensland exists in different forms.. Collectors possessing any stamps bearing this watermark will doubtless be searching for the rare varieties.

## How The Prince of Wales Spends His Time.

WHAT a contrast between the King of England and the heir to his throne, the Prince of Wales, The father "weighted with the crown' rushes up and down the land in motor cars and special trains, attending christenings, race meetings, receptions, garden parties, semi-state and state functions, morning, noon and night. The son, whose only trouble seems to be the riddle of killing time, sits in his room at Marlborough House pasting stamps into an album or reading a book. He does absolutely nothing, and does it with such masterly inactivity as to rouse ore almost to enthusiasm at the idea of how successfully this proud Prince manages to while away his golden days. Prince Prosper in Faryland hadn't a more delightful cycle of years than his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. I will give you a brief, authentic sketch of the day's doings at Marlborough House:

Those of you who hug the
ancient idea that princes get up in the morning to the fanfare of trumpets, deck themselves out in royal robes and pass down a gallery lined with bowing and obsequious flunkeys will be disappointed at this recital of the humdrum existence of an apparently middle-class suburban home. The Prince, the Princess a ad the rest of the family are up "betimes," which means about $80^{\prime}$ clock in the morning. There is the ordinary breakfast of a well-to-do English family, and the head of it beguiles the intervals between bacon and eggs with the morning papers. After breakfast there are charity letters to dictate to a secretary, for even the Prince of Wales is not exempt from the incessant stream of begging letters and appeals from charitable institutions which weigh down the postman's bag at every delivery. having completed this, the heaviest task of the day, the Prince goes for a walk in St. James's Park or Hyde Park.

He is accompanied by one of his equerries, who live in Marlborough House, and when this constitutional is over it is time to go back and prepare forluncheon.

Sometimes there is a guest, but more often the meal is taken only in company of one of the equerries and a lady of the Princess's household. Luncheon over there must be some stamps to sort (the Prince's stamp collection is the finest in the world and is said to be worth cunsiderably over $£ 100,000)$. Then comes another walk in the park and then a book to read until teatime, when there are generally one or two visitors. Dinner, 8.30 P. M., is quite informal, with a guest or two only here and there. If the royal couple go to the theater dinner is set for 7 o'clock but as they do not often go to the theater the evening is spent quietly at home, the Prince seading a book and the Princess doing some useful fancy work with the needle. Bed at 10.30 P . M. Is this not truly a picture of beautiful domestic bliss? Nevertheless I am quite certain that when the Prince of Wales comes into his own he will surprise the British people by his mental grasp of affairs, his widesympathy with all classes of the people and his inherited capacity for governing.

Dear Sirs:--In your issue of Feb. I notice the statement that the only stamps bearing eyeglasses upon them are from Luxembourg. I wish to correct this statement. The late official issue from Brazil has on every value which I have seen the portrait of a man with "specs." I think that one of the issues from either Monaco or San Marino also has eyeglasses. In the Jan. issue I also noticed a statement which is not altogether true. The statement is that the Brazil figure stamps are the only ones without any way of telling from what country they come. The Wei Mai Wei issue of China does not have very much besides the value to tell from what place they emanate. Nos. 2, 3 and 4 of Cauca have nothing on them to tell from what country they come and numbers 3 and 4 do not even give a value. Number I of Cauca also does not have any value on the face of the stamp. None of earlier postage due stamps of Netherlands have any words on them by which any one not a collector could arrive at a good idea from what country they are from. The Dominican Republic
dues of 1901 do not have any thing on them which would lead any one to a very clear idea of what country they are from. I could continue this list for three or four sheets but I think this list will be long enough to convince that in the words of Soloman there is "nothing new under the sun" except the Maldive Islands and other fakes.

The next birth we should celebrate is that of Zachary Taylor on Nov. 24th. Since his picture is on two of our stamps we should honor "Old Rough and Ready."

## Shades and Varieties of Recent U. S.

By M. Hale JONES, JR.

To the one who studies the recent U. S. with any sort of care it is sure to appear that the shades and minor varieties are plentiful, altho not cataloged. In the 1902 issue there were many minor varieties and shades of the $2 c$, and the 4 c came in light, dark and red-brown. The roc of this issue, and the five, also appeared in light and dark shades. The 8c probably showed the most pronounced shades, as I have it in black and also a very light lavender shade. It surely seems as though such pronounced shades should attain some recognization, since the least deviation in color of British Colonials, for instance, is duly noted and priced.

But now for the crowning variety of the ry08-9 issue. It is in the 13c; and consists of a short, thick line, about 5 mm in length, extending from the top border line and cutting the top of the " $g$ "' of "Postage." The manner
of its discovery was rather odd; a gentleman went to the post office to secure three stamps, with plate number attached, of all values of the new issue. He noticed the variety in the center one of the three I3c stamps. He showed it to several collectors, who immediately "made tracks" for the post office and bought up all that remained. The two in my possession bear the plate number 4948, and it follows that all sheets from this plate bear the variety. As a rule, about one sheet in five bears the variety, but it always is in the same position on the sheet. Now, Mr. Collector, if you are wise, you will hustle to your post office and get one of these interesting stamps before the plate is destroyed. Nuf sed.

## CURIOUS COINS.

Coin collectors have interesting objects of search in two coins which belong to the transition period between the French Republic and the Second Empire. One of these is an extremely rare coin which was struck off just at the moment of the assumption of the reins of Empire by Napoleon III. Only the die for the obverse or head of a new imperial coin had been completed, and by some accident, or possibly by some mischievous design, a coirr was struck off which bore the head of "Napoleon III., Emperor," on one side, and "French Republic" on the other.
This contradictory coin is of interest to others than numismatists, for it symbolizes in a striking way the many sudden changes which have taken place in French politics in the past century.

With the other coin a singular story is connected. While Louis Napoleon was prince president, and just before he made himself emperor, a decree was issued ordering a five franc silver piece
to be coined bearing his image.
The dies were made, and one coin was struck off as a sample and sent to the prince president for approval. But some time passed before he examined it. When at last he gave it his attention he was annoyed to find that he had been represented on the coin with a "love-lock," or hooked lock of hair on the temple, which he did actually wear at that period, but which he thought unsuitable to so dignified and permanent a representation of himse'f as an effigy upon a coin.

The prince president sent for the director of the mint, and ordered him to remove the "love lock." Then he found that his silence with regard to the piece had been taken for approval, and that the stamping of the coins had commenced.

The work was stopped, and the image deprived of its undignified lock; but the twenty-three coins that had already been struck off were not destroyed, and are now regarded as of great value.

## Unrolling The Mummy Of An Egyption Prince.

-:o:-

Egyptologists will learn with more than an ordinary degree of interest that the process of embalming was unknown, or rather was not practised, 2,500 years before the birth of Christ. At least there are grounds for this opinion, as the result of an altogether unique ceremony at Manchester (England) recentiy, when there took place within the precincts the Victoria University the unrolling of a 4,500-year-old "mummy." The "body" was that of Prince Numa Nekt, of the Twelfth Egyptian Dynasty, and the operation was conducted in the presence of some of the profesiors of the University and other gentlemen, by Miss Margaret A. Murray, F. S. A., who has been delivering a course of lectures on ancient Egypt at the Manchester University.

It seemed an interminable period before all the wrappings covering the remains were removed, and when the object was at last revealed it was clearly established that it was not a mummy in the scientific acceptation of the term, but a mere skeleton which had been preserved in some way. No sooner had the last bandage been removed than the "mummy" crumpled into dust with the exception of the skull. A second "mummy," that of the prince's
brother, a high priest of the time, was not unrolled.

The Manchester Museum was the highest bidder for the relics, and the British School of Archaeology in Egypt accordingly parted with them. Hitherto the oldest mummy unrolled has dated back only to the eighteenth' dynasty, and if Manchester has paid a somewhat heavy price for the treasures, it has, however, demonstrated by actual evidence that embalming the dead so as to preserve the body was a process of later introduction than 2500 b. C

NOTES ON RECENTISSUES.星
$\$$ It is announced that the crown of Russia is to issue a set of stamps to commemorate the tercentenary of the rule of Russia by the Romanoff family. The set is to containe portraits of variousczars and czarinas made from paintings by great artists. It is not known whether this issue is to be permanent but sirce the first few stamps of a regular issue were sent out a few days ago it is supposed that it will be much like the charity stamps of a few years ago which were issued only for sale to collectors.
TAnnouncement has been made; though the Hanoverian government refuses to affirm or deny the report, that a large reserve stock of unused Hanover stamps has been discovered in a number of boxes at the Hanover post office.

Biography of Rev. H. Wendt, I. S. S. Member No. 4.

How l Began To Collect Souvenir Post Cards.

## F. B. Eldredge.

Being a natural born collector. it is not very strange that I should have saved the first set of Souenir Cards that ever came into my possession. That set was 12 Official Souvenir Cards issued by the World's Columbian Exposition at Chicago, Ill., in 1892. Tthey were sent to me by a friend who was visiting the exposition. The next card I obtained was an advertising card issued by the firm of Parke, Davis \& Co., of Detroit, Mich., and used by them to inform their customers when they could expect their representative to call upon them; it was a picture of their Main Laboratory, and it came into my possession March ro, 1902. Then I received from a friend who was in Danville, N. Y., at the Jackson Health Resort, a set of three cards showing the exterior of the building, the interior of the cottages and the interior of the Christian Union Chapel.

These cards were the nucleus of a collection now numbering about four thousand cards, of which about one thousand are foreign.

As I am a stamp collector also, I have requested stamps on view sides of my foreign cards, and a great many of them are in that condition.

My foreign cards represent the following countries, viz: Argen-
tine Republic, Algeria, Bulgaria, Brazil, Belgium, Bavaria, Bahama Islands, Barbados, British Guiana, Canada, Cyprus, Chili, Cape of Good Hope, China, Costa Rica, Cuba, Danish West Indies, Denmark, Egypt, France, Finland, Great Britain, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Holland, Horta, Italy, India, Jamaica, Japan, Mexico, Madagascar, Malta, New Zealand, New South Wales, Norway, Natal, Paraguay, Porto Rico, Portugal, Philippines Russia, Roumania, Spain, Sweden, St. Pierre et Miquelon, Switzerland, Trinidad, Tasmania, Tunis, Transvaal, Turkey, Uruguay, Venezuela, Victoria, and Western Australia.

I wish to say just a few words relative to exchanging with foreign collectors. Out of 300 addresses that I sent cards to, I received a reply from only about roo, and still they were addretses that I took from a reputable foreign directory of Philocartists.
My experience at home is somewhat different, as I have yet to senc out the first card that did not bring back a reply; of course I have many cards due me from our home collectors, but the first one I send out is always answered.

The STAMP NEWS, published monthly by A. C. Roessler of ${ }^{1} 957$ Washington Ave., N. Y., is another new paper and made its first appearance on May I , 1 cog. It is a 4 page house-organ and bargain sheet with newsy items and special offers of stamps.

The HOBBYIST of May was the first paper publishing the official numbers of the quantities issued of the Canadian lercentenary or Quebec issue, to wit: 1-2c $2,000,000$. Ic, 22,530,000. 2c, 35,100,000. 5c, 1,200,000. 7c, 700.000. IOC, 500,000. 15c, 300,000. 200, 304.200. This shows that none of them are very rare, though the 15 c is the rarest of the lot.

The COLLECTORS' JOURNAL of Chicago finds it much more difficult to produce the promised color-chart than was expected. Some of the printing inks will have to be manufactured expressely for the purpose, as the publishers are determined to get the correct shades, if that is possible.

The STAMP LOVER for May announces "The Golden West Stamp Exhibition' in London, which is to be opened on May 8,
and to remain open until the end of September. What makes this particularly interesting to American collectors is the fact that the exhibition will consist of Postage and Revenue Stamps of the United States and its Colonies, and that the exhibition room will form a sort of philatelic meeting place during the whole summer.

# Hints for the Young Collector 

Written Especiall for "Philatelic Flashes"' By HOWARD BANNON



S THIS paper will probably fall into the hands of quite a number of non- collectors, especially boys and girls, an article on what to collect and how to begin the collectjon will be of of interest.

Stamp collecting is the peer of all hobbies for young people. It learns them to be neat and to pay close attention to the little points points and details. Then stamp collecting will aid the boy or girl who is studying geography and history as they will be lead to search for little things concerning countries that they do not find prominent mention made of in their text books. There are quite a number of small countries and colonies that are not mentioned in the geographies used in the common schools.
Let me suggest to you grownup people who are interested in some non-collecting boy or girl,
that you give them some phil. atelic literature and, if possible, some nice looking foreign stamps. An interest in Philately will thus be awakened in them. It will undoubtedly prove to be of great benefit to them in future years.

To the person who is just beginning, or, rather the one who desires to begin, I suggest that your first step be to subscribe to some good stamp journal. If there any collectors in your vicinity, it will be of benefit to you, if you form their acquaintance.
Possily some member of your family or your near friends have some letters, received from foreign countries, or some of them may have old letters bearing stamps of the formerissues of this country. If so, have them give them to you. They will form -a nice beginning for your collection.

The best of these may be mounted in a blank book at the
the beginning. A regular album however, will be desirable. I would not advise the beginner to purchase a high priced one at the start, as he will, in all probability, desire to specialize on some certain country or countries when he gets started. The collector will see the need of having a reliable stamp catalogue so that he may be informed as to the actual value of any stamp. It will be to his interest to secure one before making many purchases.

The collector should keep close watch upon the advertising columns of his stamp papers or other publications that contain the advertisements of stamp dealers. Many special bargains are offered by the dealers, from time to time, and all of. The many variety packets offered by the dealers offer a splendid opportunity of quickly acquiring a large collection of the cheaper stamps.

After mounting the best specimen of each variety selected from the packets, the others may be used for exchanging with other collectors. The beginner should not be too hasty in purchasing stamps. It is better to purchase a small number of good specimens than to buy a lot of damaged stamps that are not fit to grace the pages of any true stamp collectors album.
As the collection increases, the collector will find it to be to his advantage to buy at auction.

Quite a number of reliable dealers sell stamps in chis way. Bids are sent in by mail and the collector can ofter what he thinks he can afford to pay. Very often stamps can be secured at a small fraction of their real value when purchased at aucion.

If you are not a collector, become one. You will be surprised at the many pleasures you will find in caring for the little colored bits of paper. Many people who took up the hobby, years ago, are still ardent devotees. Do you suppose this would be the case were there not some pleasure to be obtained from that hobby of all hobbies-PHILATELY?

The Labuan and North Borneo stamps on the market are very cheap but are not worth the prices collectors pay for them. The stamps are purely speculative. They are printed by The British North Borneo Co. in London, who, after using a few for pastage to give them charactar. print sheets of them, cancelled to order and sell them to dealers who -in turn dispose of them to other dealers and to the trade. They are constantly making changes in the stamps and all the tricks of the trade, such as surcharges-inverted etc., errors of all kinds are used in the printing of these labels. This is $2 n$ injury to stamp collecting and collectors should not invest in these stamps.

Then we have the "Seebecks" a term given to certain issues of South and Central Amerisan stamps
listed by collectors. Mr. N. F. Seebeck was a New York stamp dealer who later became president of the Hamilton Bank Note and Engraving Co. In 1879 he entered into a contract with several of the South and Central American Republics wherby he agreed to provide them with an entire new issue of stamps each year free of charge if he could have all of the preceeding issue that remained unsold. For a time his plan worked out line as the stamps sold readily at fifty cents per set and he was making a handsome profit. As his firm did the printing there was no question but that the quantity was ample. In a few years collectors became disgusted with this scheme and refused to buy them any more; so when Mr. Seebeck saw there was no more profit in it for him he abandoned the business. It is well for collectors to be on their guard when buying stamps of the Seebeck countries. For the benefit of collectors who are not familiar with the countries and issues, I give them.

One ingenious collector, however, finds little trouble in adding to his specimens of primitive hand-writing. OUR PHILATELIC JOURNALS OF TO-DAY.
By J. Russeli Reed,
Each year shows signs of a remarkable increase in the production of new philatelic journals in the
ited States and it is doubtful if any other contry is represented with as many. But it is surprising to note how few of them contain anything philatelic. Surely, there is enough going on in this philatelic world of ours to be worthy of mention. If you will notice, it is generally these four and eight-page "circulars' that contain so little philatelic matter; and are filled up with jokes or other matter of no interest whatever to collectors. What is the use of calling them philatelic magazines unless
they contain philatelic matter? In many instances, these papers are edited or published by mere youths whose knowledge of philately isn't much.

It is a fact, that these so-called philatelic magazines seldom attain a high mark in the field of philatelic journalism, either from lack of support or encouragement.

On the other hand, take Mekeel's Weekly Stamp News, without doubt the best stamp paper we have. Then there is Redfield's Stamp Weekly, a close second and a good paper for the beginner. The Stamp Journal, Phidatelic West, and last but not least Philatelic Flashes, are all fine papers and deserve the support of every collector both in our country and abroad.

## Postage Stamps as Dower

## Bride Brings Spouse Pair of Canceled Stamps. Value $\$ 8,000$.

PAKIS, Aug. i. -What seems at first sight the most modest dower on record is the bridal portion of the wife of a sergeant in the French army. He formed one of the French contingent lately in Crete. As soon as he arrived thete he placed histreasure for safety in the strong room of a bank at Canea, where it lay during the foreign protectorate. When the time came for the troops to withdraw the sergeant reclaimed his
stamps. It was an event in Crele, for he was a very popular man, and a crowd accompanied nim to the bank and cheered when he reappeared carrying the little box inclosing his treasure.

The Paris paper which tells the story says that philatelists may expect a sensation ere long.
