The Hudson-Fulton

The Hudson-Fulton Commemorative, in the opinion of many, the most handsome stamp ever gotten out by the U.S., has been issued imperforate. Certainly the demand by collectors alone was great enough to warrant its appearance in this shape.

Cook-Peary Wrangle.

From a philatelic viewpoint, the only important thing about the Pole is, who established the first Post Office there? Glory be to that man. An appropriate design for the stamps would be a sea of ice (assorted colors) with a Flag and Brass Tube in the centre and the inscription "The beginning: No end in sight."

Current High-Value U. S.

(13, 15 and 50c and \$1) evidently are on sale throughout the country. Until recently more of the 1902 than the present issue were met with but now it is just the opposite. However, nice copies are not plentiful.

Business is Good.

The months of June, July and August are generally known as the dull season, but this year there has been little or no "dull season," and it may with safety be predicted that the time is not far distant when such a thing as "dull season" will be unknown. Collectors are increasing in number, their enthusiasm is becoming greater, conditions are better than ever and you can bet there's a great future for our glorious hobby.

Worth Framing.

North Borneo treats us to a new setthe most beautiful stamps seen in some time. Outfit consists of eleven values, bicolored, the center design being in black, the border in the color named, as follows: 1c brown, Tapir—2c green, Tree—3c lake, R. R. Station—4c scarlet,

Treaty Group—5c bistre, Elephant—6c olive, Rhinoceros—8c lake, Ploughing scene—10c blue, Wild Boar—12c deep blue, Malay Parrot—16c violet-brown, Native Fowl—18c moss-green, Cattle— 24 mauve, Cassowary.

Hinges.

We can get along practically without every philatelic accessory but hinges, yet, how few realize the importance of the hinge. Time was when we used the "home-made" variety and perforated "stickers" that stuck like glue, and now with the advent of the "peelable" article which often does not peel at all, the general idea seems to be that one brand of "Peelable" is as good as another. I think it is needless for me to state that there are plenty of poor hinges masquerading under the name of "Peelable." Bad hinges are effective in decreasing the value of stamps and injuring the appearance of an album. It behooves everyone to search for first class hinges and then (ha!) stick to them.

Expert Opinion.

Nicaragua Colors Changed.

After an abundance of surcharges from this prolific little Republic, a regular set has made its appearance. The plates of the 1905 issue (Scott's type A18) have been pressed into service again, but the colors are different. The new colors are as follows: 1c emerald, 2c red, 3c orange, 4c violet, 5c Prussianblue, 6c dark brown, 10c claret, 15c slate, 20c olive brown, 50c dark green, 1 p. yellow and 2 p. rose. The entire set has beeen surcharged B. Dto. Zelaya, for use in Bluefields and C. Dto. Zelaya for Cabo. Also the 10c to 2 peso overprinted "Official."

Harriman.

It may not be known that the late Mr. Harriman was an enthusiastic collector some years ago. Probably, in his retirement from active business, the famous railroad magnate might have taken to the hobby again, so that not only Financial Circles but other Realms as well have been robbed by the death of Mr. Harriman.

S. & C. A. Boom.

The long predicted boom in South and Central American stamps is here. It has been a long time coming, considering the merits of this group, but surely the vigor which the "boom" now manifests amply compensates for the delay. While the demand in this line has always been satisfactory with me, it has never approached the present volume. European firms also report an unprecedented demand for South and Central American stamps.

The Famous Paul Collection

Of Philadelphia, valued at about \$200,000, has been sold intact. Many gems of Philately, including a 2c Missionary (of which there are but seven known copies) were contained in this superb collection.

Colombian Republic.

It must be admitted that with the secession of Panama in 1903 and continuous insurrections of more or less political effect, Colombia stands preeminent as a republic of hasty changes. History repeats itself. Who can foretell how soon another province in that turbulent country will rebel and disannex? When Panama declared its independence and became a separate republic, the stamps soared. Some rose as high as 25 times the previous price. Moral: Wise collectors will try to complete this section before its gets in the public notice.

New Ecuador.

Have just received from my correspondent in Quito, the series that was issued last August to commemorate the National Exposition. The stamps are finely engraved and make a handsome appearance. The values are as follows: 1c green, 2c blue, 3c orange, 5c claret, 10c brown, 20c gray, 50c red, 1 sucre olive, 5 sucre violet. All but 5s. bear the portrait of some local celebrity. The 5s. depicts the principal Exposition Edifice. This country, by the way, is well worth the attention of every wide-

awake collector, the stamps for the most part being low-priced and a complete collection not difficult to acquire. Also there is much to be learned about the various issues.

Scotts type A 18, surcharged with Siamese characters and "Jubilee 1868-1908," the I and 3a, the pair for 10c.

Ecuador 1908, Triangle Set.

1c brown, (square), 2c blue and black, 5c lake and black 10c yellow and black, 20c green and black, 50c gray and black and 1 sucre black, (square), mint \$1.60. Scarce and very pretty.

U. S. No. 757A.

These stamps were printed in blocks of four, thus a block comprises a complete sheet. Another peculiar thing is that they are tete beche. An interesting addition to any collection. 10c per mint sheet of 4.

Argentine Republic.

1908, 12c orange-brown, the stamp that was withdrawn after three months of service. Destined to become scarce. A

few copies at 20c each. Also have the new color, 12c blue—at 3c.

Turkish Thessaly.

1897, 10 pa yellow green, 20 pa rose, 1 pia dark blue, 2 pia orange and 5 pia purple, the whole set, unused, o. g. (cat., 36c) 12c. These stamps are octagonal in shape and very odd looking.

Dominican Rep. 1900.

New U. S. Stamps.

If any of our readers have thought that the Government was through experimenting with our current stamps, it will surprise them to learn that the thing has barely begun. It seems that many complaints were made by the night clerks of the Post Office that most of the present colors cause a serious eyestrain and that the contrast was not sufficiently great to distinguish readily between the different denominations. The first stamp to be changed is the loc yellow. Early this month will see this value

in a deep brown on yellow paper. The 6, 15, 50 and \$1.00 will probably be the next to be experimented with.

It is hard to say what will be the permanent stamps and therefore one should get all new varieties promptly. Also, the imperfs, blue papers, etc., should not be neglected.

I have had to raise my prices on practically all recent U. S., owing to depletion of stock and difficulty in replenishing same. Don't put off getting what you need. The longer you wait, the more you will be obliged to pay.

"War with Nicaragua."

So announced one of our sensational papers lately. Surely, this could only be taken as a joke. The possibility of a picayune power like Nicaragua becoming involved in a war with a mighty nation like the United States is too ludicrous to be thought of.

However, it seems certain that our government, sooner or later, will take a hand in the administration of this troublesome Republic.

With the resignation of Zelaya (portrait can be found on the 1903 issue) matters are becoming more simplified for our Government to act.

The political future of Nicaragua hangs by a slender thread. A vivid imagination can forsee a set of U.S. stamps surcharged "Nicaragua Protectorate" or their own current stamps overprinted "Administracion Libertad, Paz y 1910" Estrada. (meaning Estrada Administration. Peace and Liberty, 1910.

A strong demand for the various issues of Nicaragua is already manifest.

Investment in Stamps.

Old time collectors often tell us that the opportunities for investment in stamps, are not what they were years ago. The enormous increase in value of old issues seems to prove this contention, yet, nothing could be more fallacious.

The individual examples of material rise of recent issues, are too numerous to mention. During the past ten years, plenty of stamps have doubled and trebled in value and not infrequently do we find some quoted at ten times what they were selling at a few years ago. A stampman who asserts that the time for investment is gone, is on a par with the Pessimist who will tell you that the young man of to-day has no chance.

A Clipping.

South American stamps are destined sometime, we believe, to attain great popularity in the United States. And when that day comes South American stamp portraiture will, of course, come in for its due share of study. Hitherto the portrait has been a postage rather neglected item in stamp study. Victoria or Edward are recognizable at a glance, and the details of their lives are too familiar to in any way pique our curiosity or rouse our interest. The same is true of the statesmen pictured on United States issues. But when we invade a field possessing the wealth and variety of portraiture of South American stamps we will have to amend our schemes of philatelic study to admit an entirely new element of interest .-- L. G. Quackenbush, Editor, Redfields Weekly Stamp News.

The 50c value of the recent Jubilee set has been surcharged "cinco centavos" for use as a 5c stamp. Evidently the supply of that value was early exhausted, being a denomination most commonly used. Have been unable to learn the quantity surcharged but being handstamped it is doubtful that there were many.

"A Sleeper"—The Lincoln Memorial on Blued Paper.

In gambling, we are told, if a winbing check is unclaimed it is called a "sleeper."

The Lincoln on experimental paper was issued without advance notice. No blaring trumpets signalled it's advent. The busy, hurrying stamp press new arrival and rushed onward. Few collectors were aware of its existence.

A friend suggests that it was overlooked, probably, owing to the veritable flood of new stamps the department was issuing at the time. Whatever the reason, the fact is that few collectors bought the stamp.

Inquiry last week brought the answer from the Third Postmaster General that the experiment had been a failure and that there would be no more blued paper used. This is the first definite announcement the department has made.

A canvass of the principal dealers in America disclosed the astonishing fact that 85 per cent were "out of stock." Two dealers never heard of experimental paper. The Lincoln on white paper will become a good stamp within a few years. A surprise awaits the collector to procure it. The largest company in America charges triple face and promises an increase shortly. The Lincoln stamp had a short existence.

If figures count for rarity, then the Lincoln on blue is 300 times as scarce as the white. Which would make it rather rare! The same proportion would make the blued paper cost \$18.00 each....*** "The Stamp News."

NEWS FROM WASHINGTON

Under date of May 26th, the Dept. advises me that it is not in position to furnish any information concerning a change of color of the 10c stamp or the issuance of a 12c stamp. Looks like the proposed reforms have been dropped.

BARGAINS

Have been fortunate lately, in acquiring a large parcel of popular stamps and most of them are being offered in this number of the "Advertiser." New and interesting items at attractive prices are the feature throughout.

"Low-priced Foreign."

To make it especially interesting, I have purposely included a number of items at about **half regular price**. Even aside from this feature, the list of "Low-priced Foreign," (to be found in another section of this paper), is well worth your attention.

Salvador.

Since Mess. Stanley Gibbons published Leavy's Work on Salvador, the Stamps of this Republic have received a remarkable boom. Also, the announcement of a specialized collection of Salvador bringing around \$5000, has stirred up the Philatetic World. Many have wondered that so high a figure should be realized for a country that had so long been held in slight esteem, but the explanation is not as difficult as might be imagined.

The transaction referred to did not surprise me very much because I had long known that the good varieties of Salvador (and there are quite some) are mighty scarce. Take for instance the provisionals of 1900 —not high-priced, but where can you find them? How many grace your album? Also, how about the so-called "Seebecks" of 1895 to '898 (regular issues and officials)? The genuine originals are anything but plentiful and some apparently cheap varieties hard to obtain.

Collectors would do well to pay a little attention to Salvador.

King Edward the VII.

With profound regret is noted the death of King Edward on May 6th. This genial Monarch whose many acts of kindness and wisdom had so endeared him to his people will go down in history as "Edward the Peacemaker."—A distinction he so well merited.

King George the V.

By a curious coincidence the date on which the new King ascended the Throne is the seventieth anniversary of the introduction of Postage Stamps and as all are aware His Majesty has been an ardent Philatelist for the past 20 years and possesses one of the finest stamp collections in the world.

While it is impossible to conjecture what effect upon his stampic affiliations, the exalted position of "Ruler" will have, it is hoped that Philately will claim the customary share of attention.

About Ourselves.

"Charlat's Advertiser" is all it should be—a boost for the business conducted by L. W. Charlat and a guide to the thoughtful Philatelist intent upon making desirable additions to his collection.

S. & C. A. Again.

Personally, the stamps of South and Central American Republics have always appealed to me. Also I felt that they were not receiving the attention merited by their many points of interest.

The issues of these countries are for the most part very attractive in design, not costly and practically limitless in historic and philatelic interest.

There is hardly a section of the Globe that has not already been cultivated philatelically and the time is ripe for collectors to turn their attention to S. & C. A.

We Americans have the additional reason that these Republics are close to us geographically, politically and otherwise. It is generally known that our trade relations are increasing rapidly and must before long assume considerable proportions. Also, the vision of a "Greater Republic" embracing most of the Western Hemisphere may be realized one of these days and then the status of S. & C. A. stamps will rise with a bound.

The head of the largest stamp business in the world has told us repeatedly that a boom in these countries is in progress and his advice to take advantage of prevailing prices should be heeded.

The general indifference with which South and Central American stamps have been regarded is rapidly vanishing and even the most skeptic now admit that the S. & C. A. boom is well under way.

Significant.

Every dealer of any importance can show a fair line of U. S. or British Colonials. Very few, however, have a decent stock of S. & C. A. Some of the latter will show a "phenomenal" change in price pretty soon.

About Nicaragua.

Just a little while ago Santos Zelaya, president of the Republic of Nicaragua, stole out of his capital-Managua- and disappeared.

Revolutionary forces, whose operations had been accomplished with repeated success, were pressing him hard; Isidor Rayner, indignant at the execution of two American boys, was clamoring for his life on the floor of the United States Senate; Attorney General Knox was believed to be laying plans for bringing the Nicaraguan to account for his misdeeds. Altogether, Zelaya appeared to be in a rather bad plight.

And evidently no one knew this better than Santos Zelaya. He fled and for days there was much conjecture as to where he had betaken himself. Then came the announcement of his discovery in Mexico.

And now it is stated that his identity was discovered before the fugitive president was ready to throw off his disguise, and this identification was by an official who recognized him through a picture he had seen of Zelaya on a Nicaraguan postage stamp.

Strange Freak of Fate. Through a strange fate the stamp upon which Zelaya's picture was printed was one that he issued in 1903 to celebrate the tenth anniversary of his successful revolt against President Sacaza. The issuance of this stamp was due to Zelaya's vanity, as well as to his desire to impress upon his people his military and political prowess. He desired to call the republic's attention to his achievements of the past and impressed on it his ability to withstand his enemies, for the tyrant had begun to hear the rumble of an approaching storm of revolt.



Zelaya, like many another of his ilk, laid great stress upon righthis political eousness and sense of fairness. One of the official stamps of his republic, issued in 1900, bore a pretty picture of a pretty woman representing Justice, but a careful

study of the figure shows that it was not a blind Justice and symbolical of Zelaya; it evidently had its eyes open at all times for its own interests.

The first stamp issued by Nicaragua as early as 1862 bore a picture of the arms of the nation, which are a reproduction of a group of mountains, on one of the peaks of which is perched a Liberty cap.

Another mountain stamp of the land shows where the feet of the giant Mometombe meets the sea.

In 1892, when various New World republics were postally and otherwise commemorating the discovery of America 400 years before, Nicaragua fell in line and got out a stamp picturing Columbus getting his first view of that Country's shores from the deck of of his ship. It was in 1502 that the explorer sailed along the Mosquito Coast of Nicaragua and gazed for the first time on the fair land that was destined to become the abiding place of one of the most turbulent of the little republics of Central America.

To Advertise Canal.



Few more interesting postage stamps exist, than that issued by Zelaya in 1896, to advertise the proposed isthmian canal across Nicaragua. It had been one of the most precious dreams of the people of that country that the United States

should decide upon the Nicaraguan, route for the canal. And Zelaya for personal no less than patriotic reasons was foremost in its advocacy.

Already steps had been taken to build via the Nicaraguan route and work had actually been done. As early as 1849 the scheme had found favor and Nicaraguans generally came to believe that theirs was the only feasible and logical location for the great waterway from Atlantic to Pacific.

Various concessions were granted at different times and although the prospects for a Nicaraguan canaloften looked bright the project was doomed to fail of realization. There were many advocates of the Nicaraguan route in the United States and commissions from this government that visited the locations suggested for the site of the giant waterway made reports that in many respects favored the land of Zelaya.

Interesting to Historians.

In Congress the whole matter was fought out and the Nicaraguan government had emissaries here to help boost the cause which meant so much to them and to their country. But the long and the short of it all was that the Panama route was eventually decided upon and everybody knows how valiantly work is going on now to complete the canal.

Nicaragua's canal stamp was issued at a time when it was thought it would be a factor in spreading broadcast the special advantages a route through that country would afford the canal builders. The stamp presented a map of Nicaragua and showed by clearly defined lines how the canal could be cut from shore to shore, It availed nothing.

Zelaya was much disappointed by the failure of this government to select the Nicaraguan route, as was indeed all his people. The canal would have meant much to the land, and the loss of the coveted possibilities did not leave a sweet taste in the Nicaraguan's mouths for Uncle Sam.

But it is fair to observe that Nicaragua's stamps are as interesting historians as the stamps of other countries. There seems to be a great store of learning and useful information laid up in all of them.

Another Royal Collector.

The recent momentous events which have taken place in Portugal, resulting in the overthrow of the Monarchial Government and the establishment of a Republic, calls to mind the fact (though not generally known) that King Manuel has one of the finest Stamp Collections in existence amongst Royalty of Europe, excepting the suberb ones of H. M. King George of England and the Czar.

Only a short while ago, the Royal Philatelic Society of London was presented with a unique Collection of Portuguese Reprints by the erstwhile Monarch of Portugal and it is hoped that the future will find his devotion to our hobby, even more intense than the past has found it.

New Honduras

With the exception of the old Comayagua and Tegucigalpa provisionals, Honduras has never entered the field of surcharges but the start has been made just now.

The last mail from Hunduras brought the following surcharges :

1 on 20c. ultramarine (1907)

5 on 20c.

10 on 20c. "

overprinted in black, green and red respectively, large thick numerals in each case and nothing else to denote the value. The work is very crude and evidently accomplished by handstamp.

New Paraguay.

According to my correspondent in Asuncion, the Government of Paraguay has placed an order for two new series of stamps, one set to commemorate the centenary of independence (which occurs in the early part of 1911) and another for regular use to replace the current issue which has given rise to a good deal of dissatisfaction owing to its crude appearance.

It is expected that the South American Bank Note Co. will manufacture the new stamps and fine looking productions are assured.

Chile News.

The much talked of Juan Fernandez stamps have finally made their appearance, but the strange thing about this



issue is that they not used in are Juan Fernandez at all. The entire supply was used up in Chile in the cities of Valparaiso, Santiago and Iquique and perhaps not a single copy sent to the Islands which bear their name.

And no wonder. -the Islands of Juan Fernandez are used solely for keeping convicts and the amount of mail matter in the place does not average a dozen pieces a day.

The new Commemorative stamps of Chile have also been isued. The set is printed in two colors and consists of values from 1c to 10 pesos. The 10 pesos stamp is of particular interest, as it bears a portrait of Admiral Thomas Cochrane, who was of great benefit to Chile in its wars against the yoke of Spanish Rule. This is the only instance of a British Admiral figuring in the philatelic portraiture of a Spanish American Republic.

New English Stamps.

About four months ago, the Postmaster-General of Great Britain announced that several artists had been employed to make designs for the stamps that were to bear the likeness of the new King, but as yet there has been no news of a choice being made, and it is beginning to be doubtful whether the stamps will appear much before the coronation, which is scheduled to take place some time in June. 1911.

A Discovery.

In a parcel of several thousand New Foundland that was sent to me



recently, there was about 600 of the new Tercentenary or "Guy" issue and in glancing through them, I discovered the 1 and 2c in a hitherto unknows perforation, viz; 12 x 14. Perf. 12 is the only kind chronicled for this issue and it

would be interesting to know whether the other values come 12 x 14.

Judging from the proportion in my lot this variety of perforation should be very scarce.



The 10 on 15c. comes in two distinct colors of surcharge namely red and brown of which the latter was probably a small printing as it is less frequently met with than the former.

Contrary to general expectations the change from one political faction to another, has not brought forth a multitude of new stamps—nothing but these three provisionals have been issued and undoubtedly they are perfectly bona fide.

Salvador 1910.

The current set (Scotts type A67) has been completed. The last values to be issued were the 4, 12, 19, 29, 50 and 100c. 19 and 29c. are curious denominations for stamps and will probably not be plentiful in used condition.





The complete set consisting of eight values, viz.: 1, 2, 5, 10, 20, 50, 1 and 2 Bols, now offered at only \$1.24. The high value of this series, the 2 Bols. is alone worth the price asked for the entire set. Excellent value here.

Italy, Garibaldi Stamps.

Popularity of U.S.

For the past twenty months the stamps of our country have been given the most attention known for years and it is becoming more and more apparent that their rightful place is with the "staples" of Philately.

U. S. without doubt are among the most interesting and legitimate stamps ever issued and are unquestionably on the same plane of respectability and genuine worth as early European. Why they have been subject heretofore to but a fiful popularity, may be explained on the score that most collectors felt that U. S. stamps were fairly plentiful and always readily obtainable.

The recent rise in values of our stamps and the difficulty in obtaining the scarcer ones even at the advanced prices, plainly points the necessity of not favoring Foreign at the neglect of U. S.

As a rule, foreign collectors aim to have a fine representation of the stamps of their native land and thus in England, we find English stamps the greatest in demand, in France, French stamps have the precedence and so on throughout all countries.

It should rightfully be the ambition of all American collectors to have the best possible showing in U. S. stamps and the present era of popularity will not only endure but become greater.

Revenues.

Since about seven years, U. S. Revenues have suffered some neglect. This has perhaps been due to the reason that the Spanish War Tax was repealed and the certainty of no further issues of documentary Revenues for the future,—thus eleminating the prospect of any novelties.

Some find interest only in such fields as are fraught with plenty of possibility of new issues and varieties,—on the other hand there are many to whom a definite limit makes a strong appeal and naturally their inclinations are strongly drawn toward something like U. S. Revenues.

For the benefit of this class of collectors as well as in response to several requests, I have put a large list of U. S. Revenues in this number of the "Advertiser."



Last month I announced the discovery of the 1c and 2c New Foundland Ter-Centenary perf. 12×14 , and remarked that it was possible some of the other values came in this variety of perforation. Since then, the 5c value has turned up. A perforation variety of this kind is of the first importance and interest. Collectors of New Foundland should look into this.

The provisionals appear to be printed in small quantities, as required for use, and it is reasonable to suppose that some of them will be rare. No one can tell just which will turn out "good," so it is best to get them all as they appear. I have about a dozen agents in this country, and am pretty sure to get everything new. On another page in this issue of the "Advertiser" will be found my offerings of recent Nicaragua provisionals.

SEEKS AID FOR NICARAGUA.

E. H. Wands Will Try to Arrange Loan Like That to Honduras.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Ernest H. Wands, the American financial adviser to the Nicaraguan Government, left Corinto to-day for the United States, according to a telegram received by the State Department.

Mr. Wands, it is understood, is coming to America on a mission, the object of which is to place Nicaragua on a firm financial basis. He will consult officials of the State Department and American bankers regarding a loan to the Nicaraguan Government of from \$12,000,000 to \$15,000,000. The United States is considerably interested in rehabilitating Nicaragua, and, it is said, will exert its best efforts to place that country on a stable footing.

If the Senate contrms the pending treaty with Honduras and thus sanctions to the principle involved of formally lending a helping hand to the Central American republics, it is understood that a similar arrangement will be negotiated with Nicaragua.--N. Y. "Times" of March 9.

If a transaction of this nature is consumated, there is no telling how closely related Nicaragua and the United States may become. Wise collectors will complete Nicaragua now.



STAMPS AND PHILATELY.

By Francis C. Nicholas, Ph.D.

Whether simply collecting stamps is philately, has occupied some little attention. If the school-boy accumulating pretty material because the specimens please his fancy, is to be compared with the earnest student of stamps who looks on them as tokenmarks of the history of modern progress, then philately must be considered as little more than a pastime, and not in any sense a study worthy of serious minds. Such a view of philately would make it nothing but stamp collecting, but the philatelist would make of every stamp collector a student, and a reader.

In stamp collecting, the prized specimens are those which are attractive to the eye, though no human being of sufficient intelligence to find pleasure in assembling beautiful objects can be entirely insensible to historic interest, and ethnologic associations.

In philately, mere attractiveness is subordinate to the deeper interest which a specimen may possess. As an example, the highly esteemed Mauritius stamp of the first issue, representing as it does a period of colonial developement in English history, is not a beautiful stamp; yet, being representative, it creates an interest which a stamp designed to make simply a beautiful appearance could never command, even though the number of known copies was no greater than those of the Mauritius.

The stamp collector seeks only to please the eye, the philatelist labors for a grouping of material which marks out different periods, and events in modern history and the geographical distribution of the races. The collection of the philatelist is even more than this; it is ethnological in that it represents the impress of the efforts of different and varied peoples to attain their best expression of the beautiful, commensurate with a service to be rendered. Thus, only stamps that are manufactured in the country of issue are of premier interest. They show us the capabilities of the natives; and help us to determine the extent of their progress in the are of printing, and design and their probable position in the civilized world.

Stamps have an ethnological value only when they are the product of

native effort in the adaptation of an article which is to serve a purpose of utility. The philatelist seeks to obtain such material and combine it in collections which represent the impress of the handiwork of divers people laboring under the different circumstances of their environment. The material is purely ethnological and to collect the various specimens, bringing them together for suitable study is philately.

In looking over, and studying the stamps in his collection, the philatelist finds in many specimens that something is lacking; they seem featureless, they appear to duplicate in a measure, though they are distinct varieties, or they may seem to be out of place, as if not properly arranged. These unsatisfactory stamps, in almost every case, will be found to have been made made outside the country of issue, and therefor possess but very little real relation to the people who used them.

The beautiful examples of the engravers art, as expressed by the issues of the American Bank Note Co. and the Hamilton Bank Note Co. of New York; or Perkins, Bacon & Co., Waterlow & Sons, and De La Rue & Co. of London; or by any of the engraving establishments foreign to the country using the stamps which they have supplied, are not of the same interest as the work of people native to the soil where the stamps have been used. Such imported material is perhaps pleasing, and pretty, but it is lacking in full ethnological expression, and the association of ideals, and abilities at reproduction, represented by distinct national characteristics. These imported stamps seem out of place, strangers as it were, in a foreign classification.

This defect is pronounced in the great majority of the issues for the British Colonies; the stamps represent London, not the colony using them. Similarly, most of the recent American issues represent New York, not the Republics in which they were used.

The stamps which occupy the premier position in value and interest, are those which belong wholly to the country in which they were used: and that is why the old stamps are so expressive, and the modern stamps, in many instances, so lacking in distinctive features.

Stamps native to the country in which they are used have their distinctive expression, telling of something. We look at the early issues of New South Wales and it is a bit of that land brought to us. The scarce first issues of Dominican Republic, though but rough examples, are expressive of a people. The early Mexican stamps tell of Mexico. The stamps of Colombian Republic are distinctively of that country. English stamps tell of english stability, those of France of an artistic people and from Germany we have stamps expressive of German precision.

From these observations it may be possible to construct a classification of specimens according to their philatelic and ethnologic interest, as follows:

1st, Stamps of Premier Interest

All stamps produced wholly by the people of the country in which they were used.

2nd. Stamps of General Interest

All stamps which, while not directly of the country where they were used, are still of origin sufficiently allied with that country to make them, in a measure, expressive of the country for which they were designed.

3rd, Stamps of Interest by Adaptation

These include the mass of stamps made by engraving companies entirely foreign to the country in which the issues were to be used, but which have been adapted to the special uses of the country by overprints or surchages because of the necessities of special requirements.

4th, Stamps of Limited Interest

The large number of issues by Corporations and private interests entirely foreign to, and out of sympathy with, the country where the stamps were to be employed.

5th, Stamps of Local Interest Only

All non-official local stamps, prepared for use within a limited area and representing a person or firm.

Numerous sub-divisions could be added to the proposed classifications, still as a general proposition, the five groups cover the whole field.

Almost without exception, it will be found that the best material can be classed as proposed for stamps of premier interest. Hence, as a natural inference, we may decide that the stamps which will become valuable are those comparatively rare modern specimens which have the characteristics as suggested for stamps of premier interest.

From these observations, it may be claimed with some assurance that not rarity or beauty alone will give value or popularity to a stamp; it is the ethnologic association which establishes the merit of a specimen.

UNIQUE PROVISIONALS.

There are various kinds of interesting provisional stamps, from the overprint of a new denomination or designation to the surcharged or surchargeless bisects, not to say anything of those curiosities in provisionals made by surcharging the marginal strips taken from the regular stamp sheets. vale 05 cts CORREO DE^{*}1911

a method originating from the French offices in Zanzibar, but it has remained for prolific little Nicaragua to furnish philately with the most unique provisionals ever issued for legitimate postal purposes.

Before giving a description of them, it might be well to outline the state of affairs which led to the birth of these provisionals. About a year ago, the authorities in Nicaragua noticed that regular their supply of postage stamps, particularly the denominations in common use, was getting very low, whereupon they tried to negotiate for a new issue, but owing to the instability of the Nicaraguan Government, it was impossible to get a firm that would accept the order except on a cash basis.

At that period, Nicaragua was in very bad shape financially and unable to pay cash. Owing to the urgent need of stamps and believing that an official personally would meet with success where correspondence failed, a representative of the Government was dispatched to New York with orders to try Europe if necessary.

This party returned to Nicaragua with the report that the best terms he could secure were offered by a London firm, whose ultimatum was \$10,000 cash and the balance on time. It is reported these terms were finally accepted and that a new issue is well under way and due for delivery in Nicaragua any day.

As before stated, it was about a year ago that the need of stamps became keenly felt and during all this time something had to be done to supply the demand for the exhausted values.

The most expedient way of doing so, that of surcharging, was resorted to and accordingly the odd values which were on hand, viz., the 3, 4, 15, 20 and 50c, 1 peso and 2 pesos were used to make into 2, 5 and 10c stamps, the needed ones.

In August, 1910, the first provisionals made their appearance and different varieties kept coming and coming for about seven months by which time all the values of the regular postage stamps were gone. In the emergency Revenues of various denominations were employed to create the necessary 2, 5, 10 and 35c postage stamps. After about four months, during which time all the Revenues that could be spared were converted into postage stamps, the authorities were obliged to find a new scheme for producing the urgently needed postage. The only available material was some railroad labels, small in size (about the same size as current U. S.) and already so much covered with surcharges to make it practically impossible to effectively resurcharge them for use as postage. The authorities had to discover a way to overcome this apparently unsurmountable obstacle and in the ingenious solution of this perplexing problem is found one of the most striking examples of the old adage "necessity is the mother of invention."

Here is what was done. The surcharge was printed on the backs of the stamps, a method never employed by any other country.

The official decree, dated August 4, 1911, authorizing the issue of these provisionals, provides that they are intended for immediate use only and the purchaser is required to fetch the mail to the post office and have the stamps affixed in the presence of the postmaster. These precautions were evidently a means to prevent the supply from becoming exhausted before the arrival of the new regular issue which by this time are doubtless in use.

The provisionals referred to consist of four values, the 2, 5, 10 and 15c. They were printed in sheets of twenty, the work is the crudest (they appear as if printed in 1811 instead of 1911) and practically every stamp is different from the other, not to mention the variations of the revenue surcharge on the now reverse side.

Come what may, the philatelic fame of Nicaragua is now forever secure. She has given to philately the most unique of all provisionals.



MORE ABOUT NICARAGUA.

In the last issue of the Advertiser there was an article dealing with the recent Nicaragua Railroad Stamps with postal surcharge on the back and from the large number of inquiries that I have received in reference thereto, these curiosities of Philately have certainly succeeded in arousing great interest among collectors.

It is, however, no surprise that such should be the case. The peculiar points of distinction possessed by these provisionals entitle them to unusual attention. Here is a country so much impoverished by continual rebellion and depredation as to be unable to raise funds to pay for making so vital a necessity as a set of postage stamps. After resorting to other makeshifts, nothing but a supply of fiscally-surcharged Railroad labels are available for transformation into postage and these are already so much covered with overprint as to make them practically useless for further conversion. Then occurred the idea to print the postal surcharge on the back, thus inaugurating an entirely new method of dealing with an emergency and incidently producing varieties hitherto inconceivable even by the most fertile imagination.

The plating of these stamps, particularly in used condition, makes a most interesting study and is neither expensive or troublesome. Now, while the material is obtainable, is the time to work on these lines and indeed many collectors have already commenced. Furthermore, there is an opportunity at the present time to secure these interesting stamps at a truly nominal price. I have been successful in obtaining a supply and same is being offered herein. Every collector, regardless of his preferences and even if he collect only special countries, should have at least a single set of these most remarkable provisionals of Nicaragua.

Important Exhibition.

Though it is difficult to find the reason, yet it cannot be denied that in this country we have never had a Philatelic Exhibition of the importance attained by those Abroad. Surely this can have been due to nothing but lack of co-operation. A strong organization is now at work on an International Exhibition to be held in New York in 1913. It is promised that this venture will compare very favorably (not to say excell), with anything of its kind in Europe. A Committee composed of the leading Philatelists in America will devote their efforts towards securing the best possible showing and there is no doubt of a great success. The most prominent collectors both here and in Europe are expected to participate. Among the former may be mentioned, G. H. Worthington, J. N. Luff, C. L.

Pack, H. J. Crocker, W. H. Crocker, E. R. Ackerman, George Gould, Lucien Delafield and many others. To see such a splendid aggregation of treasures will be worth coming thousands of miles. Here's to the Exhibition!

Crisis in Ecuador.

According to a recent dispatch from this Republic, there is great unrest and much civil warfare owing to the inability on the part of its populace to agree upon who shall have the reins of government. One of our gunboats has been ordered to Quayaquil for the purpose of protecting American interests and if necessary to assist in restoring tranquillity. It would be a great move in the direction of progress if the United States were to assume a sort of guardianship over Ecuador as well as most of the other South and Central American Republics who through weakness or otherwise, seem quite incapable of administering their governments. As things are now, these countries are constantly prey to the machinations of unscrupulous politicians and worse. The lives and property of peacable citizens and foreign merchants are in danger. Because of these conditions, it is impossible to secure capital and energy for the development of these States. It would be a blessing for them if the U. S. were to step in. Let's start with Ecuador!

Abroad and Return.

Much has been written about the "advantages of travel". In fact, far too much for the peace of those who are impressionable.

To be sure, travel is beneficial but the benefits are decidedly dispropor-tionate to the cost in cash, energy and discomforts. It seems to me that and discontions. It seems to me that to Americans, the greatest benefit de-rived from travel is that they become convinced that the good old U. S. A. is the finest country in the World. However, from a philatelic view-point, Europe is much the superior. Philately, there occupies a more im

Philately there occupies a more important place than here in the regard and the commerce of the people.

The great Tapling Collection and the superb ones of King George, Lord Crawford, Lord Palmerston, Mr. Duveen, Count Ferrari, Baron Rothschild, Prince Richelieu (and others, too numerous to mention) are a wealth most wonderful and well worth traveling thousands of miles to Also, the dealers' fine shops and see. still finer stocks are sure to delight the philatelist.

London will come up to ones ex-pectations. The famous Public Buildings, Museums, Churches, etc., are beautiful and replete with interest for the traveler.

Most of the architecture in Lon-don is 18th Century or earlier. The few modern structures, such as The

Savoy, Cecil, Waldorf, Aldwych, New Post Office, Hammerstein's Opera and other 20th Century improvements instead of creating a modern appear-ance, only help to accentuate that at-mosphere of antiquity which is so attractive to Americans.

The traffic is very remarkable for its volume and the masterful manner in which it is handled by the Police. However, at times it is very funny indeed. For example, almost any day you can see on the Strand, Taxi Cabs, Auto Busses, Miniature Steam Engines (with trucks attached to them), gines (with trucks attached to them), Four Wheelers, Fiacres, Horse Carts, Donkey Carts, Tricycle Wagons, Push Carts, etc., all in a row. Imagine a sight like this on Broadway. Clothing and Taxi fares are lower than here but the Restaurants and Theorem are just as expensive and

Theatres are just as expensive and generally not as good. Trocadero's, Simpson's, The Regent, The Hol-born and The Cecil are all good places to dine but Delmonico's, Sherry's, Whyte's, The Astor and The Knicker-

bocker are better. London is THE philatelic center. More collectors and dealers are to be found there than anywhere else. They are an energetic, enterprising and courteous folk and Philately has no better devotees.

New United States Stamps.

In addition to the proposed issue for the Panama Pacific Exhibition, consisting of four values, 1, 2, 5 and 10c, there will be a set of twelve for use in conjunction with the latest parcels post system.

Arrangements are now under way for the production of this series. The stamps will be considerably larger in size than our current issue and several pictorial designs will be used. There will be twelve values, ranging from lc to \$1. I understand the parcels post stamps will not be available for regular mail, the ordinary issue being retained for the latter purpose.

The new stamps will be very welcome if only to dispel the monotony of the Washingtons and Franklins.

Nicaragua Notes.

Recently, I have had about fifty requests for Nicaragua novelties. It seems that because of the sensational occurrences there lately, collectors were expecting results in the shape of more provisionals but there has been nothing in that line.

In spite of revolution, bloodshed and arson, the postal department succeeded in maintaining an adequate supply of the stamps of the last type.

Having a poor government, Nicaragua is constantly in danger from the plottings of political plunderers and soldiers of fortune and it would be a very good thing if our country assumed the proper control of this troublesome little Republic as there seems no other way to promote its welfare and to safeguard American interests there.

The present restoration of peace was due entirely to the intervention of the U. S., an intervention which was not only sanctioned but very much welcomed by the Nicaraguan Government. It is very evident that without the assistance of our Marines, Nicaragua would have been quite unable to cope with the situation.

Coming to stamps again, it is a cause for congratulation that the recent difficulties did not necessitate a new crop of provisionals. Specialists in Nicaragua have their hands full as it is. However, perhaps it is best not to decry the issuance of new varieties. Those collectors who have been careful to get all the 1910-1911 surcharges must be very pleased indeed for they secured not only a very interesting lot of stamps but also a good financial investment at the same time. Here is a startling example: when I first got what is now Scott's No. 253 my price was 25c. Today the stamp would bring \$10 and the actual value, considering the great rarity of the stamp, is nearer \$50. I predict this will be one of the great rarities of 20th Century stamps.

Interesting Discovery.

United States 1847 Issue. It has never definitely been settled as to what was the date of issue of the first stamps of our country.

Tiffany gives the date as July 1st, but adds that the actual date of use probably was not until August 5th.

I recently purchased a specialized collection of the 5c 1847 including a large number of covers and among them I found one with a superb pair in a rich brown color and sharp impression. The postmark was "Philadelphia, July 30, 10cts," and the address Halifax where it was received "Aug. 3, 1847."

This cover establishes the month of issue as July but the exact date remains a mystery yet to be solved.

A New United State Protectorate.

For several years I have made a specialty of the stamps of Nicaragua, and the popularity of this country with collectors, has been due largely to my efforts. The stamps seem to be possessed of unusual attractiveness-they were cheap, of large variety, and of sufficient interest to engage the attention of the studious Philatelist. Added to these features was the ever recurring probability of Nicaragua becoming closely connected politically with the United States. In the March, 1910, issue of the Ad-vertiser I said, among other things: "A vivid imagination can foresee a set of stamps surcharged, Nicaragua Protectorate," but this was looked upon as highly imaginary.

Lately, President Wilson and his cabinet were occupied with formulating a treaty for a protectorate over Nicaragua, and there is no doubt this scheme would have been negotiated if it were not interrupted by the Mexican complications. Secretary Bryan's proposed plan provided:

That war should not be declared without the consent of the United States.

That no treaties would be made with foreign governments that would tend to destroy her independence or that would give those governments a foot-hold in the Republic.

That no public debt would be contracted beyond the ordinary resources of the government has indicated by the ordinary revenues.

That the United States should have the right to intervene at any time to preserve Nicaraguan independence or to protect life or property.

That the United States should have the exclusive right to build a canal across Nicaragua and should have a ninety-nine year lease to a naval base in the Bay of Fonseca, and to the Great Corn and Little Corn islands in the Caribbean, with the privilege of renewing the lease.

The United States in return would pay Nicaragua three million dollars (\$3,000,000) to be used in public works and education.

It will be recalled that the Nicaraguan route was at one time strongly recommended for the purpose of an Atlantic, Pacific canal, and it is a good thing that our government is beginning to realize the importance of controlling this project, and the prevention of its development by a foreign power.

The control of Nicaragua by the United States is of peculiar significance to collectors, creating as it will an additional country for the "United States and Possessions" group, a very welcome addition when we consider how much more interesting are the stamps of Nicaragua compared with Canal Zone, Phillippines or Porto Rico.

Nicaragua was the first of the Central American countries to issue stamps. Commencing in 1862 with the beautiful Arms type, made by the American Bank Note Company down to the present locally printed Cordoba surcharges, its postal history is replete with peculiar interest.

Iu 1892, following the lead of the United States, Nicaragua issued a set of stamps commemorating the discovery of the New World. The design (Scott's A 7) shows Columbus viewing the coast of Nicaragua from the deck of the Pinta. In 1896 and 1897 the stamps advertised a Nicaraguan Canal Route, the project having been under consideration at that time.

The Nicaraguan Route was strenuously advocated by some of the commissioners who had been on a tour of investigation there. When it is considered how much the Nicaraguan Canal would have meant toward the development of that country, naturally, one of its fondest hopes was shattered when the Panama Route was adopted, but the proposed protectorate plan should console them for the loss.

The provisional stamps of 1901 are very interesting. The ten cent (Scott's No.) gives us the first combination of gold and purple ever used on stamps. The fifty cent of the same issue shows a very curious error reading 1091 instead of 1901, an extremely rare variety.

The well-known features of the tyrant Zelaya, who held Nicaragua in his iron grip for more than ten years, are pictured on the set of bi-colored stamps of 1903.

Owing to differences in the monetary systems of the Interior and the Coast, the year 1904 gave birth to a

series of surcharges for the provinces of Bluefields and Cabo respectively, and many of these have become very scarce. However, a gold standard has been recently adopted throughout the country, and thus the same stamps are being used everywhere, and separate issues will be required no longer.

Very unusual errors are furnished by the provisional issue of 1908. Some of the dates read 1008 and 8908, the latter surely will prove convenient material for the enterprising new issue editor of 8908, but it is very doubtful whether they will be distributed by the Pecksniff Service at ten per cent over face. The 1910 and 1911 provisionals are sufficiently large in variety and interest to challenge the efforts of the most highly advanced Philatelist, the unique "printed-on-the-back" issue alone providing a branch that can not be equalled for study. "United States and Possessions" collectors and others will do well to get busy on this country before the head-lines in the papers announce that the Nicaraguan Treaty has been concluded.
