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

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



## O PORTRAITS ON UNITED O STATES ADHESIVES. BY MISS ELMA IONA LOCKE.

VEN a small collection of post- age stamps, if carefully studied. will afford anyone a large fund of valuable information, not the least important part of which is the knowledge of biography which may be thus A young collector of a gained. healthily inquiring turn of mind will not remain long in ignorance of the names and lives of the personages whose portraits are scattered with such profusion over the pages of his album. The question will naturally arise: "Whose portrait is it?" and when this inquiry is satisfactorily answered, there as naturally follows: "Why is his picture used to adorn the stamps of his country? What great deed did he do, or what high station has he filled, that he should be thus officially recognized by his government?"

To gain answers to these questions he reads the biographies of the originals of his stamp portraits, and incidentally learns much of history as it is interwoven with the lives of these great men. A taste of history thus gained will most probably lead to a desire for a more connected knowledge of the great events which have shaped the course of nations.

Thus a study of the portraits on the stamps of our own country will result in a fair knowledge of American history and its makers.

A glance over the early issues of the United States reveals the fact that during the fourteen years in which stamps were issued previous to the Rebellion, in fact not until 1863, were the portraits of more than three men allowed to adorn Uncle Sam's private picture gallery, and in 1875 a law was passed forbidding the engraying of the portraits of living men on any of the stamps after that date.

On March 3, 1847 the Congress of the United States authorized the issue of postage stamps, but only stamps were issued in that year, a brown 5c stamp bearing the head of Benjamin Franklin, and a black 10c one with the portrait of George The reduction of the Washington. rates of postage in 1851 gave us a new set of stamps, with three new values, but only one new portrait-that of Thomas Jefferson, which was placed on the brown 5c, that of Franklin being changed to the Ic, where it rewithout interruption mained forty-two years, until the Columbian issue displaced it for a time only, when it was again given its old position in the issue of 1894. Though as the smaller stamps were used to some extent all through the Columbian year, one might truthfully say that 1867 and 1868; the 2c brown of 1870 the use of the lc Franklin has been; continuous since 1851, through all the changes of color-blue. buff. green. The portrait is after a profile bust of Franklin, by Rubricht.

The remaining values of 1851—the 3c red, 10c green, and 12c black-all bore the likeness of "the father of his country," and ever since, through all the changes in design, denomination and color, his portrait, after Houden's celebrated bust, has adorn-

brief space of time when the "locomotive" commemorative stamp was in use, and while the Columbian waved triumphant. Other values beside the regular letter stamps have borne Washington's picture, such as the 10c green of 1855; the 24c lilac of 1856; the 10c green, and 12c black of 1857; the 24c lilac, and 90c blue of 1860; the 10c green, 12c black, 24c lilac, and 90c blue of 1861; the 24c mauve of 1866; the 10c green, and 12c black of 1867; the loc green, 12c black. 24c lilac, and 90c blue of 1868; the 6c blue of 1869; the 6c blue of 1875; and the 3c vermilion of 1887.

Beside the Ic, Franklin has also appeared on the 30c orange of the issues of 1860, 1861 and 1868. the 5c brown of 1851, Jefferson's portrait is seen on the 5c brown of 1856: the 5c brown, and 5c red-brown of 1857: the 5c brown, and 5c yellow of 1861: the 5c chocolate of 1862; the 5c brown of 1868; the 10c brown of 1870 and 1872; the 10c chocolate of 1873; the 10c yellow-brown of 1875 and 1882; the Ioc purple-brown of 1886; the 30c black of 1890; and the 50c orange of 1894 and 1895. His portrait is from a life-size statue by Hiram Powers.

The next portrait we find in our United States album is that of Andrew Jackson, from a bust by Hiram Powers, which appears on the 2c black of 1863, and again on the 2c black of and 1872; the 2c vermilion of 1875: the 4c green of 1883; the 4c carmine of 188s; and the 3c purple of 1890, 1894, and 1895.

The fifth portrait is that of our martyred president, Abraham Lincoln, which, soon after his death, was placed on the 15c black, issued in 1866, and again in 1867 and 1868. but was changed to the 90c black carmine of the issues of 1866 and 1875. appeared the 6c red with a profile of ed the "letter" stamps, save for the Lincoln after a bust by Volk, and reissued in 1872, 1873, 1875, and 1882. His picture also appears on the 4c dark grown of 1890, 1894, and 1895, and on the 4c red-brown of 1898.

Henry Clay, after a bust by Hart, next appears, on the 12c purple of 1870, and 1872; and later, on the 15c bine of 1890, 1894, and 1895, and on the 15c olive-green of 1898. The head of Daniel Webster on the 15c orange of 1870 and 1872 is after the Clevinger bust, while a portrait of him is again seen on the 10c green of 1890, 1894, and 1895; and the 10c light brown of 1898.

The portrait of Gen. Scott, from a bust by Coffee, is seen on the 24c purple of 1870 and 1872. While that of Mexander Hamilton, after the Cerrachi bust, appears on the 30c black of 1870, and 1872, and the 30c brown of The likeness of Com. O. H. Ferry on the 90c carmine of 1870, and 1872, and the 90c purple of 1888 is after Wolcott's statue, and his portrait again appears on the 90c orange of 1800, and the \$1.00 black of 1894 and In 1871 there was issued a 7c stamp in vermilion, bearing the head of Edwin M. Stanton, after a photograph, it was reissued without the embossing in 1872.

in 1875 a 5c blue appeared with the portrait of Zachary Taylor, which in 1882 was changed to a 5¢ drab with a picture of President Garfield, taken from a copy of the photograph which was sent to Queen Victoria. Garfield again appears on the 5c blue of 1888, and the 6c brown-red of 1890, 1894, and 1895. Gen. U. S. Grant's portrait is on the 5c chocolate of 1890, 1894, and 1895, and on the 5c blue of 1898. Gen. Sherman's on the 8c claret of 1890, 1894, and 1895, and the likeness of James Madison is on the \$2.00 blue of 1894 and 1895, after a portrait by Gilbert Stuart. The design on the \$5.00 green of 1894, and 1895 is after a portrait of John Marshall, by the artist Henry Inman.

### CORREOS MEXICANO. BY W. FRANKLYN SLUSSER.

TO the American in Mexico the modus operandi of the Postal Department at times, becomes very annoying, and there seems to be no redress whatever.

During my six year's sojourn in the Republic, many amusing, as well as serious incidents have come under my notice, and, perhaps a description of them will interest the readers of this paper as well as it did me at the time.

During the early part of 1893 I subscribed for three of the best magazines published in the United States, and during the year that these subscriptions ran, I received just seven copies of the various issues.

This was while I was at Monterey. The foreign mail at this place was listed and pasted on a long board in the corridor, and by looking over this one could tell whether there was any

mail or not.

This was all very well, but on several occasions I called for letters listed, but someone had already taken them, and I never heard of them more.

At the sub-stations, mail was dumped into a soap box, and was distributed by the plan of "first come, first served."

In 1894 the system was somewhat improved, and was only held back by the careless handling of the mails by the railway postal clerks.

In the latter part of 1895, I was an employe of the Mexican National Ry., as coach trimmer, and hardly ever did a mail car come into the shops for repairs, but what the men found numerous letters, etc., left in the boxes, fallen behind shelves and laying in desks.

took some twenty pieces of mail matter to the General Superintendant, that I had found in the pigeon holes after the trio.

The people of Mexico are prohibited from sending money by registered mail, and are fined 20 per cent. of the amount so sent, when caught.

This seems somewhat absurd, but it is a fact, and is done so that the mail will offer less inducement for robberies by highwaymen and others.

Speaking of registered matter, this reminds me that I am a personal friend of a postmaster near Casas Grandas, and that on a certain Saturday not very long ago, he gave me a registered package to keep for him until the following Monday, as he had neither safe or pocket big enough to carry it in, and then he forgot all about the matter, and was only reminded of it at the end of several days when I brought the package out from my trunk and asked him if he had given it to me.

While at Colonia Juarez, I mailed uncertainty.

several registered letters, but never got any receipts for them from the postmaster, and felt somewhat worried until I found out that the letters had got through all right.

Colonia Juarez had a register office. and was authorized to receive registered matter, but several of my registered letters were held at Casas Grandes and after the lapse of ages I was informed where they were, and procuring a horse. I rode nineteen miles and got them.

Written orders don't go. You have to go and get them, and be identified each time.

Many complaints have been made throughout this section of the country, (Chihuahua,) and several protests have been sent to headquarters, but with no apparent effect.

I recently had some camera films I remember on one occasion that I sent to me by mail from St. Louis, Mo., and they were carefully (?) opened and examined at the custom house at Cindad Juarez.

> Such a thing as a dead letter office is unknown in this country, and a letter once sent, never comes back if undelivered. What becomes of them? Quien Sabe?

It is always good policy to well pre-Otherwise it is pay mail matter. liable to fall by the wayside, and get lost in the shuffle.

Well perhaps I have said enough. I believe the Mexican Government is sincere in their desire to give first class postal accomodations, but they have much to contend with in the irresponsible minor officials who go to make up the majority in the service: and so long as vigilance is slack with them, so long will the effeciency of the Correos Mexicano be a thing of

#### Hints.

Old blue print paper may be used 37 - C. R. Gleason, Box 507, Iowa as follows: Print deeper than usual, take from frame and rinse once in

water.

Immerse in water to which a little ammonia has been added, and as soon as the picture shows up clearly plunge into a weak solution of Chloride of The color will immediately change to a bright blue, while the whites will remain clear. Wash well and dry. By this method even the oldest blue print paper will yield satisfactory results.

#### -x-x-x-

Plates may be rendered almost free from halation by applying to the back or glass side, a mixture of colodium and rouge, or any dark brown pigment. This can be easily wiped off with a damp cloth before developing.

manipulation whatsoever. It does not curl or crack or exhibit any other of the disagreeable characteristics of other sensitive papers, and it is on account of this combination of virtues without vices that it is to be so heartily recommended to the beginner.

Blue print paper is almost as easily made as it is handled, and with a little care any amateur may manufacture all he wishes with comparatively little expense or trouble. Any good unglazed paper may be used. though of course photographic paper is better.

The following formula is perhaps as good as any.

#### NO. 1.

Citrate of Iron and ammonium 14 oz. NO. 2.

Ferricyanide of potash..........1\(\xi\_0\)z. Water......8oz.

The Iron mixture may be made up and will keep for a long time. Potash mixture will not keep over five or six days at most, and it is advisible to make it up fresh just before it is needed for use.

It is advisible to sensitize the paper by lamplight, as it is more or less sensitive to daylight. Pin the paper to be sensitized on a flat board and moisten thoroughly with a wet sponge. Mix equal parts of No. 1 and No. 2 in a saucer and apply to the paper with a broad soft flat brush (a letter copying brush is perhaps the best as it unites in one all these qualities.) Put on just sufficient to cover the paper evenly without streaking it. As soon as the solution has set hang up in a dark place to dry. It should dry quickly, as if it is a long time drying it is apt to be streaked. Even if bought ready made blue print paper cost but one half as much as ordinary Blue print paper is no doubt the silver paper, and where the latter

home it will cost about one fourth of what it can be purchased for.

Print until the shadows are slightly bronzed—that is until they have a metalic shiny look and are a bluish green in color.

Wash in running water fifteen or twenty minutes, or if one has not running water, wash in changes of water until the print no longer tinges the If the finer details wash water blue. out the picture has been underprint--d, if on the contrary the bright or white lights are tinged blue, the picture has been over printed.

After the print has been washed sufficiently, blot up all extra moisture with a clean blotter and pin up by one corner to dry.

There are so many uses to which the blue print is admirably adapted. Letter paper may be sensetized and a picture printed at the top making an attractive as well as original letter head.

Use unglazed writing paper for this and sensitise a strip a little larger than the picture to be printed. Cover ill parts of the sensitized paper while printing. Wash the whole sheet in water. Blot off superfluous moisture and dry under pressure (a copying press is perhaps the best thing for the purpose.)

Impressions of wood treasures may be taken on blue print paper. this the printing frame must have a clean glass which just fits it. On this lay whatever flower, leaf, or spray, you wish to make an outline of. Put a sheet of blue print paper over it, and expose to the sun until the paper Wash in several is slightly bronzed. changes of water and dry.

When dry trace in the veins, if it be a leaf or the outlines of a flower with a line brush and a cake of French

blue water color.

Moths and butterflies may also be photographed this way. Lace patterns may be printed on blue print paper, and designs of flowers and leaves for art needlework which besides being original are true to nature and if one has not the gift or accom-

plishment of drawing, this is an excellent way to make patterns which are sure to br correct.

Blue print paper is an excellent thing to take with you when you go on a vacation, as it requires none of the cumbersome bottles of solution,

It is a good idea to take sufficient with you to make a print from each negative, make notes with regard to negative on back of print, and you have one of the best indexes of your stock of views which ingenuity can invent.

omparatively little is known of the revenue stamps of Mexico; and yet for specializing, the Philatelist of today will find no other class of stamps so interesting, nor so easily obtained, and this is especially so with the stamp collctor of moderate means who, if a general collector could never hope to obtain the many rarities known to be in existance.

A St. Louis firm has for some years' past issued an album especially for Mexican stamps, and have also put upon the market a catalogue and price list of all known Mexican revenue stamps.

This, in a measure, has added to the Philatelist's interests in collecting stamps, and it is safe to say there are no less than 1500 collectors in the United States alone, who collect Mexican Revenues.

The classification is as follows:

1-Document stamps.

(Documentos y Libros.)

2-Internal Revenue stamps.

(Renta Interior.)

3-Custom House stamps.

The first of the Document stamps appeared in July, 1874, and were used until January, 1876, when all remainders were returned to the Government office and destroyed.

This issue was perforated, and the 1p blue, also exists unperforated. Stamps bear control number on back in blue ink, and in most copies the color has slightly faded. The complete set is catalogued at \$13.30.

The issue for 1876 appeared in the latter part of December of the previous year, and were used until January, 1877.

The following stamps were issued: 1876.

These stamps were perforated, but owing to the worn punches, a great many varieties exist, and I have seen a specimen of the 10c imperforate. The set is valued at \$13.20. In the early part of 1877, owing to the failure of the Government in getting out the new issue, the one cent was changed to violet, and the 1, 3, 5, and 10c were surcharged "Para 1877," and used for several months. These were also perforated. The stamps of this variety are naturally scarce, and the four varieties easily bring \$12.00. By the first of April, the new set was ready, and the remaining surcharged varieties were recalled and destroyed. The new set consisted of the following:

## DOG PONY EXPRESS.

ruary I think) the Kansas Pacific Railroad, found it necessary to erect a substantial depot in the city of Ellsworth, Kan. The railroad had only been extended as far as Ellsworth for something less than two years, but a number of buildings and "dugouts" had accumulated along side the track besides the so-called depot, which was nothing more than a sentry box with a large sign denoting the gave of the brave men employed by this company, I had seen some, such as W. After the tearing down of this shanty, (for it was in reality nothing more) large quantities of express labels tied up in stacks of about 250 labels each, were scattered around, and these allowed to lie on the ground for days as there did not seem to be any owner or care-taker of the companies property. Boy as I was, I was curious as to the meaning of some words and pictures on some of these labels, and one day picked up a package of them which were printed in red, and each label seemed to have on it six men riding quickly, over each rider were the words "Pony Express." I could not make out the meaning of this Pony Express business, so I concluded to take the package home where some one may be able to enlighten me. Mind you, I had been "saving" stamps for three or four years, but these did not seem to be stamps to me as there was no perforation about them. took nome this package with me, and there met Major Coffee of the 6th U. S. Cavalry, then stationed at Fort Harker, some four miles east of Ellsworth; the major asked what my package contained, and on seeing the labels gave me a long story of the history of the Pony Express, and of many of the daring rides made by the carriers, among many of the names he gave of the brave men employed by this company, I had seen some, such as W. F. Cody, (Buffalo Bili) Jack Brady (then at Fort Harker) and Jim Hickok, (commonly called Wild Bill) as they had at different times stayed at my father's hotel in Ellsworth, so I made up my mind to find out more of the interesting subpeople.

I had at that time a very large dog named Zip, which was the largest have or had ever seen, and which I used to ride around like a pony, and the major having several times seen him with me, said that I could make pocket money by making a Dog-pony Express out of him, as the troops at the post often needed sundry articles from the city for which they had to send or wait until "off-duty day." More especially could we, "me and Zip," make money, since there was a military ball in the city every Thursday night, and some of the men always forgot some part of their equipment, and could send a note by mail, and have the article taken to them, and they would not mind "four bits" (fifty cents) for the trouble of deliv-

Well. I talked the matter over with my chum, one John McCune-still living I think in Kansas-who was in the scheme from the start; first o.f on the following morning we gathered up all the packages of stamps that we could find, which were then in a muddy condition as it had rained on the previous night.

We then rigged up a small office on C. street, made a schedule of rates as follows: One light parcel 25 cents. one parcel under five pounds 50 cents, anything over that \$1.60, and were ready for business.

We did well, that is to say for two boys, until April 1st when the ball season stopped. We took turns in riding to the post, and delivered almost all kinds of merchandise from a letter to a barrel of mess pork, which of course we could not carry, but paid a farmer who was going to Brooksville. 50 cents to leave it.

In the fall of the year 1872, the 6th cavalry were farther west and our trade fell away until early in 1873 the

Harker, and resumed the military ball season, but they seemed to be under more strict discipline as it was seldom anything was left behind for us to deliver. The stamps which we found were of the 10c, 25c blue, 25c red and \$1.00 red.

They had all been cut into blocks of six, and tied up in packages of about 250. We had as near as I can think two packages of the 10c of which we rarely used any, three of the 25c red, two of the 25c blue and three of the \$1.00 which also was seldom used. using them we affixed the value of amount due to the parcel in stamps for which we mostly used the blue as it was more in keeping with uniform of the troops.

These stamps were very heavily gummed, and after affixing to the parcel we drew a black crayon across the stamps which obliterated it. the Spring of 1873, Major Coffee, then on his way to the Lava Beds to avenge the murder of General Canby. laid over a day at the city, and incidentally inquired as to our venture: I further plied him with more questions on this historical subject, which he answered by giving me many more interesting incidents, winding up with eloquent expression: where ran the Pony Express at from 75 to 150 miles a day, now plies the lightning express of the Union Pacific at from 50 to 60 miles an hour, going west, and coming east on its southern branch the Kansas Pacific."

Miss Ida M. Howard a former P. S. of A. member and collector recently divorced philately and married a young man in Wichita.



ARGENTINE REPUBLIC STAMPS OF 1892.

A LL philatelists know that in 1893 our Government issued sixteen different kinds of stamps each bearing a design commemorative of the discovery of this continent by Christopher Columbus. These stamps were intended for use only during the year 1893. Very few of us know that this same idea was carried out by Argentine Republic in 1892. But the stamps of Argentine Republic were only to be sold one day, and this day was October 12, 1892, the day on which Columbus first caught sight of the New World.

There were only two denominations issued, the 2 centavos and the 5 centavos. There were 200,000 of each

issued. When the day for the sale of the stamps arrived the excitement was intense, and long before the office was opened an immense crowd had gathered. People even came to the office before daylight, and fairly forced their way to the doors.

No one was allowed to purchase more than fifty stamps of each kind to prevent speculation. Everyone bought stamps and at three o'clock every stamp had been sold.

At four o'clock speculation was rife, and the same stamps that were sold at face in the morning were fetching 50c. Dealers made money, and the post-office clerks made a fine thing as over 50,000 of the 200,000 was bought up by them. The demand for these same stamps was so great from the European dealers that the Government of Argentina had to put some more on the market, so they had another 500,000 of each value printed,

and filled all orders for European dealers. This caused the price to drop very materially. You can now buy a pair at any dealers in Argentina for 30 centavos money, or 15 cents American currency.

There are several collectors Buenos Ayres who will not have anything to do with these stamps. same stamps are worth very little, and I am taken aback to see Scott's price of 40c each, which I consider fabulous. In Buenos Ayres you will see several of these stamps encased in gold frames and nicely got up as charms for watch chains and pins for neckties.

It is a matter of impossibility to tell the second print from the first, but it is reported that they were all printed at one and the same time.

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* A BRIEF GENERAL HIS-TORY OF STAMPS.

IT is recorded that in 1653 the first postage stamp was used in Paris. Unfortuately it was issued by a local company, and was soon withdrawn.

According to the old method, private corporations had charge of the transportation of letters. The sender seldom paid the charges on them. There is an interesting story relating to this.

In a certain English post office, a young man, Rowland Hill, was present when a poor girl called at the window for her mail, and a letter was handed to her. She took it, turned it over, looked at it carefully, then said sorrowfully that she had not the money to pay the amount due. Mr. Hill took pity on her and paid the patch companies. charges himself. He noticed subse-

quently that she repeated the occurence, and asked her for an explana-Then the poor girl confessed that there was an understanding between her and her brother. were very poor and very fond of each other, (quite a frequent combination.) As they had to separate, and were too poor to pay postage, they devised certain marks to be put on the outside of their envelopes. In this way they knew whether the other was sick or well. If a streak of luck should strike the receiver, the postage could be paid: if not the one receiving it could tell by the outside marks something of the condition of the other.

This incident set Mr. Hill to thinking, and resulted in the final establishment of cheap, prepaid postage. Through the influence of Mr. Hill, an experimental rate of four pence was As it worked satisfactorily, the rate was lowered to ld. at which it has since remained.

As the world progresses, new improvements come. More letters were sent, the sender occasionally prepaying the charges. This practice spread, as many others do.

This made it necessary for the postmaster to write on the envelope. whether it was prepaid, and other information necessary in its journey. This was soon found to take to much time, so the postmaster printed labels to stick on the letter. These labels changed in form until they were worded something like a milk ticket. "Good for transportation of letters."

In 1841, in the United States. A. M. Greig's City Dispatch Company, commenced the selling of the labels. Many were set with movable type, but later were engraved, as the latter added more to their beauty. Blood & Co., sold labels, then all dis-

The United States postage rates were very high in 1844. A "single letter" meant one sheet of paper. the communication consisted of two sheets, or a newspaper clipping inserted, double rate was charged. a paper or magazine contained nineteen hundred square inches or less, one cent per copy was paid for postage: over nineteen hundred square inches was charged 21 cents.

In 1847 the rate on a letter weighing less than a half ounce, and whose destination was less than 300 miles was five cents. For the same weight, over 300 miles, the postage was ten he became a dealer.

cents. Also at that time the charge Now in this country a letter weighing twice as much can be sent twice as far for less than half the cost of that time.

Postmaster Cave Johnson succeeded in getting congress to pass a bill authorizing the issuing of stamps. March 3, 1847, after the failure of J. M. Niles, preceeding Postmaster-General.

The first purchaser of stamps in the United States was Henry father of "Josh Billings." He was in the general post office department when the first sheets were brought in. He hastily inspected them and purchased one each of the ten and five cent denominations. The former he presented to Governor Briggs, Massachusetts, and the latter kept as a curiosity. Did he then dream of the amount of stamps saved as curiosities there would be in 1900?

After the introduction of stamps in this country, the people took a dislike to them, as they had done in England. Until 1855 stamps were placed on only about eight per cent. of all letters mailed. But in this year compulsory prepayment was enforced.

The history of stamps, from 1850 to the present date is well known to all collectors.

Stamp collecting is supposed to have originated in France. terprising gentleman, knowing that the fad of collecting various curiosities, was quite fascinating, wondered why stamps would not answer the purpose, as well as woods, bugs, flowers, coin or relics. So he started a collection and interested everyone with whom he came in contact. Soon

An American gentleman who was traveling in Paris, ran across this peculiar dealer. He occupied a large building, which was filled with busy clerks, attending to the wants of school boys and girls, who spent their treasured money for stamps. appeared ludicrous to the practical American who could not see why little pieces of printed paper should have But as a any value of importance. curiosity of his travels, he bought an album, stamps, etc. This was the seed which once planted in our productive American soil, has multiplied until almost every village and city contains at least one collector.

In conclusion, I will give a few disconnected facts.

The postage and revenue stamps of the United States, form a picture presidents, gallery of forty-eight great statesmen and warriors. Washington's face appears on 25 stamps; Franklin on 21; Jefferson 13; Jackson 10, and Lincoln on every issue since 1866, except Columbian series.

Since 1875 it has been unlawful to print the picture of any living man on stamps, notes or other government papers.

In the United States are 70,360 post offices. These sell yearly 4,000,000,000 pieces of stamped paper.

During the process of stamp manufacturing, the paper is counted thirteen times. In over thirty years, not one sheet of paper has been lost from the post office department.

There seems to have been two printings of the Great Barrier Island Pigeon Post Stamps. In one all lines are very heavy and of a very dark blue, the other, the lines are

very thin, printed in ultramarine. The first printed are poorly centered, while the later printings are more carefully turned out, giving the stamp a much neater appearance.

The prospectus of an exclusive advertising sheet has reached me, hailing from Chicago. Characteristic of this city, the circular is full of wind. When a publisher makes the statement that he does not expect second class rates, but will mail each paper in a one cent wrapper, the whole thing looks suspicious. In addition to all this the publisher offers to spend

60c in mailing copies of his journal for every 50c sent him for advertising.

Canada can never rest. The notice has been issued by Mullocks Government to surcharge all the present supply of 3c stamps, to conform to domestic letter rate of 2c. No doubt next week we'll hear of something new, perhaps an entirely new issue, as some of the Indian tribes in the northwest are unable to read the values on the current set.

Rev. Whitmer, ex-president of the Nebraska Society, is Supt. of the Auburn Chautauqua, Aug. 11 to 20th. Any collectors visiting, should look up Mr. Whitmer, as he will be well paid for his time. Rev. Wnitmer is now pastor of the First Methodist Church at Tecumseh, Neb., and although a very busy man, still finds time to talk stamps as only a veteran can. Mr. Whitmer owns one of the finest and most complete collections in the west, being very strong in unused and perfect specimens of great rarities.

The ill fated newspaper stamps are at present a drug on the market. Many collectors in large places bought up a great many sets in hopes of a raise. Instead of a large profit, the price has gradually fallen until the holders are willing to sell at "any old price." I notice a western dealer is offering single specimens of any value at from 50c for the \$2.00 value, to 75c for the \$100.00 stamps.

I have just received from Cuba a copy of the 5c blue U.S. surcharged, but lacking the 5. Whether this is an error or not I do not know, and should be glad to hear of any others. I notice a number of dealers are offering "printers errors" for sale at fancy prices, and no doubt the stamp mentioned above is an undiscovered variety.

The issue of private proprietaries has brought such a mass of letters to the issuing companies, as to, in some cases, require the employment of an extra clerk. At first most of the firms sold a few stamps to each applicant. at a slight advance over face; but as the demands seemed to increase, most of them now refuse to sell at all, but refer the collector to some certain dealer who will supply the stamps at a certain stated price. Johnson and Johnson, ask the collector to prepay his order at the rate of 5c per stamp. As this is more than 500 per cent. over face value, very tew collectors will order any; but send to his dealer for what he may need.

The Chicago Record prints a peculiar story of a 12d black Canada that sounds rather strange. The stamp was found in a waste basket, and sold to a dealer for \$5.00 along with a lot of other stamps. The dealer in turn selling the stamp in a 25 cent packet to a Hamilton, Canada, dealer. stamp kept on changing hands until it brought the modest sum of \$1500.00, was presented to a collector in the States where it rested for awhile, but finally slipped to the floor, was swept up in some trash and burned. was the end of one of the rarest stamps the world, but not a word of it is believed by-ADAM DOLLARD.

Dept. are always glad to hear if there is any frauds among our ads, and will do all we can to keep such out, and believe Payne's article in last month Perforator, to have a proven reference or philatelic rating, should be acted upon by our papers, and glad His statement on papers of few numbers, and suspend, is sort of fraud, and it is true. Trouble is papers good deal like societies, seem to be too many of each, and have always been in favor of less national and more local and state societies where collectors can get together and form acquaintance, and help each other by exchange, and think it is very true that more can be learned at a meeting in a day than you can by yourself in a month. I usually hold paper over the hypo tray after the image appears, and the moment it is black I plunge it in, and by using a large square deep dish for hypo is more convenient, and can work paper good deal as developing plates. #### HINTS ON PHOTOGRAPHY.

Rock the Dish Gently .- Many beginners seem to think that by violently rocking the dish they are assisting development. But, as a matter of fact, just the opposite is the case. Very gently rocking, just sufficient to keep the liquid slowly moving, is really far better. Violent rocking does two harmful things. It brings the fluid in contact with the air and oxidises it, so reducing its developing power; and secondly, it forms bubbles These are very apt to and froth. leave their mark on the plate. the other hand, if the plate is put in the developer and allowed to stand quite still you are very likely to get

They are so called because they bear some slight resemblance to the rippling of the sand caused by a gently flowing tide. Therefore, in order to get the best value out of plates and developer rock the dish gently just to keep the developer slowly and evenly moving.

A Makeshift Tripod Screw.—Here, prevention is better than grumbling at one's loss. Therefore attach the screw to the tripod top by means of a bit of thin chain or catgut. But, in case of a loss when far from home, cut a bit of fairly soft wood just a trifle larger than the lost screw. Then patiently work it round and round in the bush of the camera until a thread is cut. This will be enough to steady the camera on the tripod.

Changing Plates when Traveling.-Make it your invariable rule never to leave home with your camera without also taking a good size sheet of orange paper. This you can get at any photographic dealers for about a penny a sheet. Fold this up neatly and enclose it in a home-made brown paper envelope which just fits the bottom (or side) of your camera case. Suppose you are at a hotel and want to change a few plates. Borrow the use of a room with a small window. Block this up with anything at hand, sheet or brown paper. Borrow an ordinary candle and holder, fold up your sheet of orange paper (double thickness) to form a cone open at each end, one end being large enough to slip over the candlestick. ple of pins hold this together. Put your candle as far away from the table on which you are going to change, and you need fear little risk by any light reflected from the ceiling if only you turn your back to the light and shade your plates by bending over them with your body.

their attention:-To be successful in this branch of photography many matters need careful attention-e.g., a suitable and appropriate grounds, pleasing position of the animal, quick plate and shutter, etc. One point only is here mentioned just now-viz: to get the animal's attention, and keep it still at the right moment. This can be done with nearly every likely subject by making a noise with which the subject is fami-Suppose your "sitter" is a dog. You can nearly always get his attention at once by imitating the buzz of a bee, or the slightly audible mew of a cat. A cat, on the other hand, is usually timid, but with a little patience and a feather at the end of a string, scratching a pin along a piece of rough paper, you can generally get her attention. Sheep and cows on the field will generally be attracted by a careful imitated bark of a To catch the attention of a horse one must learn to whinny in horse-like fashion. A shrill whistle will also nearly always arrest the attention of a horse in the field.

Removing Films from Waste Negatives.—There are several ways of doing this. One easy way is to take the spoilt plate straight from the fixing bath and set out to dry in any out-of-the-way place. is dipped in warm water, the next day usually, the film can be peeled off with the finger. Another way is to put the plates for half-an-hour in a bath of strong soda and water (i. e., kitchen soda). Another way is to put the plate in any fairly strong acid that happens to be at hand, i. e., "spirits of salts," i. e., hydrochloric acid: say one part acid and five parts This method is not to be rewater. commended, as there is a rish of damaging one's own fingers and clothes. Do not be in too great a hurry to Photographing Animals: To catch | throw away old negatives. Pieces of clean glass are useful to the photographer for many things—to make vignetting glasses and so on.

N leaving Santos at about 5:30 p. m. the next morning. At about four o'clock the celebrated Sugar Loaf, at the entrance of the bay of Rio De Janerio, was seen, but we steamed very slowly and got opposite Fort Santa Cruz, at about five and dropped anchor. Well, readers I must say that the sight of such lofty mountains, and beautiful green verdure at the top quite took me by surprise, it was the most magnificient sight I have ever seen.

The celebrated Organ Mountains was shown to me, and I must say that they do resemble the tubes of a mammoth organ. This gentleman also collects revenues of the world, and he has a collection bordering on 20,000 varieties. I spent a most enjoyable three hours with this German Brazil-I then went to the post office to mail some letters to Buenos Ayres and Santiago. Pernambuco was to be our last Brazilian port of call, and I looked forward to see any collectors or But lo, when we arrived there was a tremendous storm blowing and we were forced to drop anchor outside the bar and wait, in a little while the signals from the lighthouse was run up, you will not let any pas-Was I not mad, I sengers on shore. can assure you readers I was. say that Pernambuco looks very pretty from outside the bar, but was informed that it is one of most dirty cities in the world, but if it was worse than Rio it was bad indeed, as I have seen some very dirty towns and cities in Europe, but I will give the medal of dirt to Rio de Janerio. While at at anchor here in Pernambuco, a few of us passengers were looking at the

sharks playing around the ship, and after getting a hook and a piece of salt pork we started to fish, and by good luck we landed one of about six feet, on deck. This was great sport as all the passengers ladies as well as children helped to get the monster on deck by helping to pull on the rope. After steaming ten days we dropped anchor at St. Lucia, to take in coal, but again we were prevented from going on shore owing to our coming from a yellow fever port. It was hard luck, as I wanted to look around for stamps. Well, after steaming eight days we made the Scotland lightship, and gradually steamed up to our pier.

I want here to extend my thanks to my friends Mr. L. T. Broadstone, of Superior, Neb., and to Mr. J. Walter Scott, for their greeting and favors that they have done for me.

I am here collectors and readers among you and I thank you all for reading this my experience of my trip to the biggest republic.
