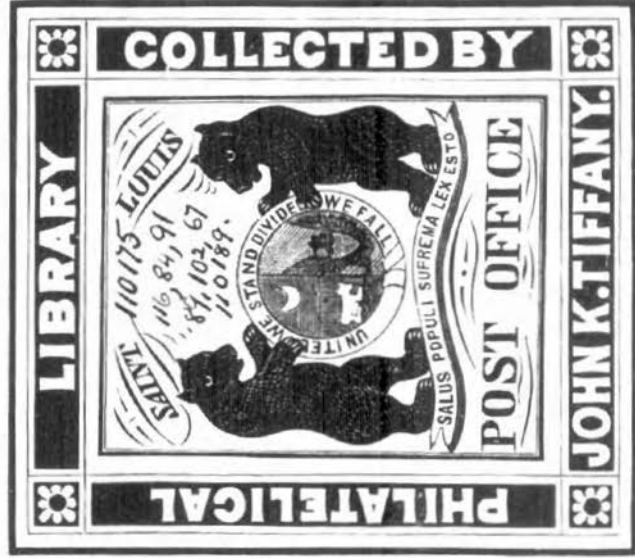

British India was the first country to enter the Postal Union on July first 1876.

Heligoland has an area of only one square mile, but issues twenty three stamps of very artistic designs.

The new Holland Unpaid are an improvement on the old.

The ten cent rose St. Domingo exists with and without thrust lines in the background.
