E turn farther in our albums, we see that the head of Queen Victoria adorns the stamps of Bermuda, Canada, Ceylon, Gambia, Gold Coast, Grenada, Heligoland, Hong Kong, India, Jamaica, Malta, Mauritius, Nata¹, New Bronswick Newfoundland, New South Wales, New Zealand, Nova Scotia, Prince Edwards' Island, Queensland, Sierra Leone, Saint Christopher, Helena, Lucia, Vincent, St's Settlements, Tasmania, Trinidad, Turk's Island, Victoria, &c., we know that all these different countries are in under British rule.

Turning farther we see the same head is used on the stamps of Fernando Po, Philippine Islands, Spanish West Indes, &c., as is on the stamps of Spain, and we know that they are Spanish provinces.

Then we see names that at first seemed curious and out-landish, such were Bremen, Cashmere, Cabul, Deccan, Montserrat, Punjaub, San Marino, Sarawak, Shanghai, and dozens of others. Now there are hundreds, aye thousands, who do not know where scarcely any of these places are, but with the collector, they are familiar.

When he gets a new stamp he places it in his album, turns to his maps, looks for the country (r place from which the stamp is from, and finds it.

So we see that while we are looking over our curiosities, we are, in reality sudying History, Geography and the Fine Arts.

# Our City's Industries.

# A SKETCH OF A BALTIMORE MANUFACTORY.

What has been accomplish
ed by J.W.F. DORMAN
Interesting FACTS

-:0:---

Pluck and energy will always win, and among our Baltimore men who have been successful, no one is better known or patronized than J. F. W. Dorman, of No. 19 German street.

Mr. Dorman, now in the prime of life, was born in Kentucky not quite forty years ago. He commenced business in Baltimore in 1866 in a small room over No. 95 W. Lombard street, cutting stencils. He so mafterwards rented the offices on the first and second floors of No. 97 W. Lombard st., and added the manufacture of tools used by stencil cutters.

From time to time other branches were added to his business, such as engraving, die sinking, &c. In 1870 he commenced the manufacture of Rubber stamps, and was one of the first in that business. This has developed into a very extensive and important branch of trade. The demand for Rubber Stamps is extensive in almost all businesses.

They are in daily and hou ly use in banks, counting-houses, brokers' offices,

agencies of every kind, stores wholesale and retail, in fact, it is impossible to mention any kind of business where Rubber Stamps are not used. So rapid ly has Mr. Dorman's business grown that feeling the absolute necessity for more room, he erected, in 1873, the handsome four-story and cellar iron building. No. 19 German st., and in 1875 he commenced making printing presses of small sizes, suitable for amateur printers, or counting-room and office work, of circulars bill heads, &c. He now manufactures larger sizes, for job printers. This part of the business has grown with astonishing rapidity, and demanded increased facilities and more room; the latter was obtained by adding a French roof to the building, the former by putting in improved machinery.

Mr. Dorman employs to-day over thir ty hands, who are kept constantly busy by the large and growing trade which he has, by skill, energy and ADVERTISING, built up at home in Baltimore, and extended over the country from Canada to So, America.

our. Dorman's building on German st. is a bee-hive of industry and activity and industry. In the cellar he has a 10-horse power engine and boiler which move his machinery throughout the building as needed. Near the engine is a power press, used in the manufacture of medals, checks, brass labels, &c. A blacksmith's shop completes the contents. On the ground floor is the sales room, where are arranged presses, from the size of a visiting card to jull job, worked by hand or steam.

The introduction of these small presses has given work to hundreds of boys, who have to a great extent, monopolised the printing of cards, circulars and small work. The work done by these presses compare favorably with that done by regular job presses. Several printing of fices of Baltimore, now doing a large and paying business, have grown from purchasing one of Dormans small presses as a start.

The second story of the building is devoted to the manufacture of rubber stamps, by a process of Mr. D's invention. Three printers are constantly at work setting type from which the stamps are molded, and afterwards vulcanized. One engraver and two other men, evoted to rubber work, making 6 hands in all, complete the force in this branch.

The third and fourth floors are filled with machinery, suitable for finishing and putting together presses. The fifth floor is used for painting, finishing a fixing machines for stripment. Stencil cutting, die sinking and engraving is also done on this floor.

Among the variety of coods manufactured by Mr. Dorman are the following: Acme and Excelsior seal presses, wax seals, eng. bank plates, dating stamps, fac-simile names, Centennial dater, rubber and radiood stamps, etc., etc.

Among the printing presses are the Maryland and Baltimorean hand or self-inking, costing from \$1.25 to \$25. Next the Monumental lever, and rotary, different sizes and prices up to \$120.

Steel stamps & figures, badges, burning brands, &c., German silver badges, plates, key tags and rings, stencil dies coady and made to order.

Twelve years ago the manufacture of stencils was comparitively nothing. The business done by Mr. Dorman to-day is very large, and shows what indomitable energy, coupled with an original and inventive mind can accomplish in so short a space. Mr. Dorman has done more than deserve success—he has commanded it.
