## RECENT EMISSIONS.

*Germany.*—Our Berlin correspondents write us that the new German stamps will be issued on the 1st of January. The design will be, it appears, in the centre an imperial eagle, in white relief, and will have the value together with the words "Deutsche Reichspost." Our correspondents further state that the values will be, for the adhesives, precisely as of the present issue, viz.,  $\frac{1}{4}$ ,  $\frac{1}{3}$ ,  $\frac{1}{2}$ , 1, 2, 5 groschen, and 1, 2, 3, 7, 18 kreuzer. The values of the envelopes will be 1 groschen and 3 kreuzer, and the values of the newspaper  $\frac{1}{2}$  groschen and 1 kreuzer.

*Russia.*—Our Moscow correspondent, writing us under date 14/26 October, informs us that it is the intention of the Russian Government to issue two values of post cards, one of 3 kop. for local correspondence, and the other of 5 kop. for general use throughout the empire. Our friend also remarks that on the 1st of January a new 25 kop. postage stamp for registered letters will make its *début*.

*Cape of Good Hope.*—A five shilling stamp has been issued in this colony. Colour—light orange. The size and design are identical with those of the lower values.

*France.*—It is reported that two post cards, of the values of 5 and 10 centimes respectively, are about to be issued. For various reasons, however, we are inclined to doubt this. We hear, however, upon good authority, that the rates of postage are to be raised 5 centimes. To meet this the Government purpose issuing two stamps value 15 centimes, brown, and 25 centimes, darkish blue. These will be used in place of the 10 and 20 centimes stamps.

## GLANCES AT OUR CONTEMPORARIES.

We shall be glad to review any magazines and other periodicals likely to prove interesting to our readers. Authors and others will oblige by forwarding us copies of such works as they may wish to have reviewed as early as possible.

"The Vaudeville" (Edited by F. J. Stimson and A. C. Skinsley, London.) We have to acknowledge the receipt of the first three numbers of this magazine. The chief feature of "The Vaudeville" is that it is wholly the production of amateurs. Among the contents of No. 1, a poem, by Miss H. Coyne, styled "Enguendand," is especially worthy of notice.—An Irish serial tale, productive of no small amount of mirth, to even the most sedate, is contributed by Mr. O'Nolan Martin; it is styled "The Devil's Relatives; or, the Adventures of Mick McCloskey." By the first few chapters of this tale we are enabled to predict a treat in store for the Irish readers of "The Vaudeville," from the quill of Mr. Martin. All loving lectures, in the Artemus Ward style, must read "Facts and Wax," by T. Con. O'Leigh. Chess, Draughts, and Puzzles are all treated in a manner which, together with the tales, pronounce "The Vaudeville" to be a magazine well worthy of perusal, and we can confidently recommend it to all our friends.

"The Philatelist." (Brighton: S. Smith and Co.) This magazine maintains its position as one of our best timbrographical publications. We should be glad to comment more freely upon this periodical did space permit.

"The Stamp Collectors' Magazine." (Bath: S. Smith and Co.) We have just received No. 116 of this magazine. The number for November surpasses, if possible, its predecessors in objects of interest and useful information for collectors. Amongst other articles, we notice a paper entitled "Forged Stamps from Hull." The object of this chapter is to expose a firm of stamp dealers, who, it appears, have been selling imitations of the rarer stamps, at a very low figure. As this subject is of great importance to

every collector and dealer, we have noticed it in another column.

## FORGERIES.

We intend, monthly, to give a short paper on recent forgeries, and also a few general hints whereby to prevent our friends being swindled. The series will be commenced in our next number by an essay on "Forgeries, and how to discern them," by "Philatelic." For the present we content ourselves with giving a short extract from a contemporary, entitled—"Forged Stamps from Hull."

(From "The Stamp Collectors' Magazine," for November.)

From this able magazine we learn that a firm of "dealers" (wholesale, we believe,) have, for the last few months, been deceiving the stamp collecting community, right and left, by selling not "Rare Foreign Stamps," as they advertised, but imitations. We further learn that the scene of their operations is—Hull.

Our chief motive in bringing these facts before our readers is that, for the last few months, we have been annoyed by several of our friends having returned the sheets sent them on approval, together with a letter, in which they state that they can obtain stamps, such as we mark 1s., for 1d. in the same town. Thus we knew that our customers were being deceived and their albums filled with worthless shams. Every philatelist will acknowledge that Messrs. Smith deserve great credit in fearlessly exposing this imposition, and for the good of every collector, we regret that want of space alone prevents us giving a fuller extract from "The Stamp Collectors' Magazine"; but we feel sure that anyone purchasing this month's number, and reading the article to which we refer, will fully endorse Messrs. Smith's opinion, namely, "that it is quite time these things were stopped," and conclude by hoping that if any of our friends have received stamps which they *think* are forgeries, if they will forward them, together with the letters which accompanied them, we shall then be in a position to take steps which we think necessary.
