A PHILATELIC FRIEND.

A friend, in the true sense of the word, to the beginner as well as to the advanced collector of postage stamps is the hand-book. With a small beginning, it has to day become an indispensible reference book, without which an earnest philatelist can get There are so many issues of hand-books, that the choice of one is very difficult to the collector. But if we look a little closer at some of these productions of philatelic literature, we find that there are but few among them, that really deserve the name of a hand-book. In the most cases they are but a speculation of some dealer who sends out his price lists and catalogues among collectors under the name of hand-book.

Naturally enough, these do not conain anything but a list of stamps issued mostly by incomplete and inaccurate, with their prices of course, it is nice to know the value of ones stamps, but there are too many colectors who view this as the most important thing. The collector should not look for the money value of his stamps in the hand-book, but learn as much as possible about the inscriptions etc. on the stamp and for this, the simple recording of the stamp is not sufficient, but it must be taken up In all its peculiarities. Only then does the hand-book fulfil its mission when it leads the collector to a more accurate study of his treasures, when he continually learns more secrets from them and is lead to discoveries, which always tend to keep up the interest of the philatelist for his hobby.

What value does not a good handbook possess on the acquisition of a new stamp. From it the collector can learn of the genuineness of the specimen, and it frequently leads him to discover that the stamp upon which he had looked on account of its color as an unknown issue, is nevertheless only a chemical change or a falling cff of the ground color.

Meeting adjourned at 9: 45 P. M.

The Third Annual Convention of our National Association met at Boston, August 13th and continued for three days. There were about fifty members present in person, and 286 by proxy. it was a very successful gathering in every respect. The reports of the officers show very flattering results in the progress made during the year, 330 new members having been admitted making a total of 606 members in the Association.

The Treasurers' report showed \$304 in the treasury. It was adopted that the Secretary receive a salary of \$150 a year. The constitution was mended up a little. St. Louis, the Monday of fair week, in October, was chosen as the place and time for the next convention. The Philatelic Exhibition held in connection with the convention was a grand success and one of the finest of its kind it ever held in America and some valuable collections were exhibited.
