
He got it and the reunion was a success, and Victoria was presented with a new Cashmere shawl.

OLD COLONY PHILATELIC SOCIETY.

(Organized July 19th., 1895.)

PRES., Geo. A. Round. SEC. & TREAS., L. C. Stearns. 1st. Ex-Sup't., F. P. Eldredge. VICE-PRES., H. H. Corbett. LIBRARIAN, C. T. Corey. 2ND. Ex-SUP'T., J. R. Sawtelle.

After systematic preliminary canvass, fourteen philatelists met July 19th in the rooms over F. B. Eldredge's store in Mansfield. G. A. Round was chosen Chairman, and L. C. Stearns Secretary pro-tem. A Constitution and By-Laws to meet the approval of the Society were drawn up and Officers were elected as above; also as Executive Committee, G. A. Round, F. B. Eldredge, H. H. Corbett, D. Smiley and S. W. Shepard; as Auditing Committee, H. L. Cobb and H. H. Corbett; as Literary Committee, G. A. Round, F. B. Eldredge and L. C. Stearns. The name of the Society was then decided upon, and meetings appointed for the first and third Wednesdays of each month.

The first regular meeting was held August 7th. It was voted to purchase chairs for the rooms and lock and key for a library. The 1st. Exchange Sup't. was instructed to get facts and figures about his department. The Librarian was instructed to buy a Scrap book. A bill for supplies was ordered paid. The following applied for membership : Howard Paine, W E. Hatch, A. L. Smith, E. O. Weld, Stanley Wilson, Richard Olney, all of Mansfield, and A. J. Kirby of Taunton. The charter was closed with 15 members. 3 Visitors were present. The Librarian reported 17 Philatelic Papers and Roger's Philatelic Blue Book donated.

The second Meeting was held August 21st. Several bills were accepted, and the Treasurer reported balance of 11.56. The above mentioned applicants were elected and two more applications read, Howard H. Elliott, Taunton and Thomas J. Fox, Mansfield.

A vote of thanks was extended Messrs Tweedy and Skinner for a carpet. The Librarian reported 24 new Phiatelic Papers and Scott's 55th. Edition catalogue received. 1 visitor was present.

The third Meeting was held Sep't. 4th. The two above applicants were elected members and the following applications received :- C. L. Soule and L. H. Benton of Taunton, Joseph Fulton, F. O. Shepardson and Russell Wheeler of Mansfield, and Edwin Chase of West Mansfield. Several communications and bills were read and approved. The reports of various Officers and Committees were read and ac cepted. C. T. Corey resigned as Librarian, and F. E. Hewitt was elected to fill the vacancy. It was voted to accept the COHANNETT PHILATE-LIST as Official Organ at the price named by the Publisher. The Librarian reported 38 additional papers received. 3 visitors were present.

All Philatelists are invited to call at the meetings or any other time. A cordial invitation is extended to Massachusetts Collectors to join. Initiation Fee 25 cfts. dues \$1.00 per year payable quarterly.

A Variety of Notes of Various Values.

In 1895 four countries had above 100 s amps each. In 1885 the number was 8, and in 1895 we have 71 having 100 or over.

607, or over 87 per cent., of Egypt's total issue, are official frank stamps.

According to Scott's 55th, Great Britain has 1629 varieties of postage stamps, and New South Wales 1622. Uncle Sam has 805.

In the same catalogue, see Hungary No. 23, Labuan No. 20, Madeira No. 25, and Siam No. 8. Then turn to page 330.

The International Postal Union has published a "postal dictionary" containing the names of all postoffices in the world, some 203, 000. Everything from Aa, in Norway, to Zywice, in Austria, is given.

There is according to the above authority, a postoffice in Norway by the name Hell. Fireproof envelopes should be used for letters passing through this postoffice.

Ten places have each kept the same number of stamps for years; they are: Bergedorf, Corea, Holstein, Ionian Isles, Mecklenburg-Stre-litz, Naples, Parma, Romagna, Schleswig, and Schleswig-Holstein.
