An enterprising youth living in Grove Road, Bow, E., has been for some time past engaged in the manufacture of surcharged stamps of U. S. Columbia and Ecuador. Amongst the many who patronized this ingenious young man were Messrs Theodore Buhl, & Co. who being more sagacious probably than the majority of their brethren "smelt a rat" and proceeded to investigate the authenticity of these surcharges.

Conclusive evidence was forthcoming the Record communicated with, and a statement of the whole affair on the authority of Buhl & Co., was laid before the readers of that organ in a recent issue. To this the guilty author of the forgeries replies with some warmth, and at the same time gives the lie direct to the information supplied by Buhl & Co. The Jan., No., of the Stamp News contains a statement by these gentlemen, which in effect, again accuses 'the

We hope the Frenchmen will "kick" them out of France:—so long Messrs G. & B.
