Grilled Stamps.

In the third variety the grille is still smaler, measuring 11x13 millimetres. The reangle consists of 14 rows, each containing small squares or parts. This variety was dopted January 8, 1868. It is rather comon and may be found on the lc, 2c, 3c, 112c and 15c.

A certain amount of capital will be well invested in a good stamp catalogue and in subscribing to one or more philatelic periodicals. Sufficient knowledge may thus be obtained to enable the tyro to recognize the

value of his purchases.

You want a complete collection, as far as you can obtain, and it is, therefore, a matter of pride and exultation if you secure a particularly rare stamp, or if you discover a variety not known to your brother collectors, as in the case of the recent discovery of secret marks on the issue of 1872.
