LATE NEWS

A "World-Wide" Special was issued March 25th by McKeel's Weekly Stamp News, the cover being especially designed by Mr. Frank Prescott, of St. Louis. The publishers deserve much praise for this number.

A. M. Travers, formerly Acting 3rd Assistant Postmaster General, has been discharged from the service and subsequently arrested, charged with violation of postal laws, which provide that no postal official shall sell any postage stamps for more or less than face value. It seems that the recent shades and minor varieties were the stamps in which he speculated.

At a recent meeting of the Board of Directors of the American Philatelic Society, August 22nd was chosen for the opening day of the 26th annual convention, which meets in Chicago. Preparations are already being made by the members in that city for the entertainment of the visitors.

The article, "Stamps of the Canal Zone," by William Evans, which has been running for a year in *The Stamp Journal*, has come to a close and has been published in book form by the publishers, Stamp Journal Pub. Co., Florida, N. Y., from whom it may be secured at 25 cents.

We have received among a number of foreign exchanges, the first number of "*Le Collecteur Belge*," published by H. Vertongen, Hoboken, Belgium. It is printed in several languages, and is devoted to stamps, post cards, etc. Contains 22 pages, including cover, and is very readable.

A Queer Mail Delivery

One of the most remarkable mail routes in the world is that which a letter journeys in getting from Beebe Plain, Vt., to Beebe Plain, Quebec, Canada. While the two offices are within ten feet of each other—are located in the same room, in fact—a letter mailed from one office to the other must make a trip of 294 miles—67 miles in Canada and the rest in the United States.

The plain, old-fashioned store building, which is situated on the international boundary line, contains both the United States and Canadian offices. There are separate entrances to each, but both are in the same room, have the same lobby, and there are no partitions to mark the division between the domain of Uncle Sam and the possession of King George.

"If you mail a letter from the Vermont side addressed to the Quebec side," says the postmaster, "it goes from here to the junction, then to Newport, then to White River Junction and back to Lenoxville, Quebec, over the Boston and Maine. There it is transferred to the Grand Trunk and goes to a southbound mail pouch, and comes to Stanstead Junction, and then back to this same building, a distance of 294 miles."—Post Card Echo.
