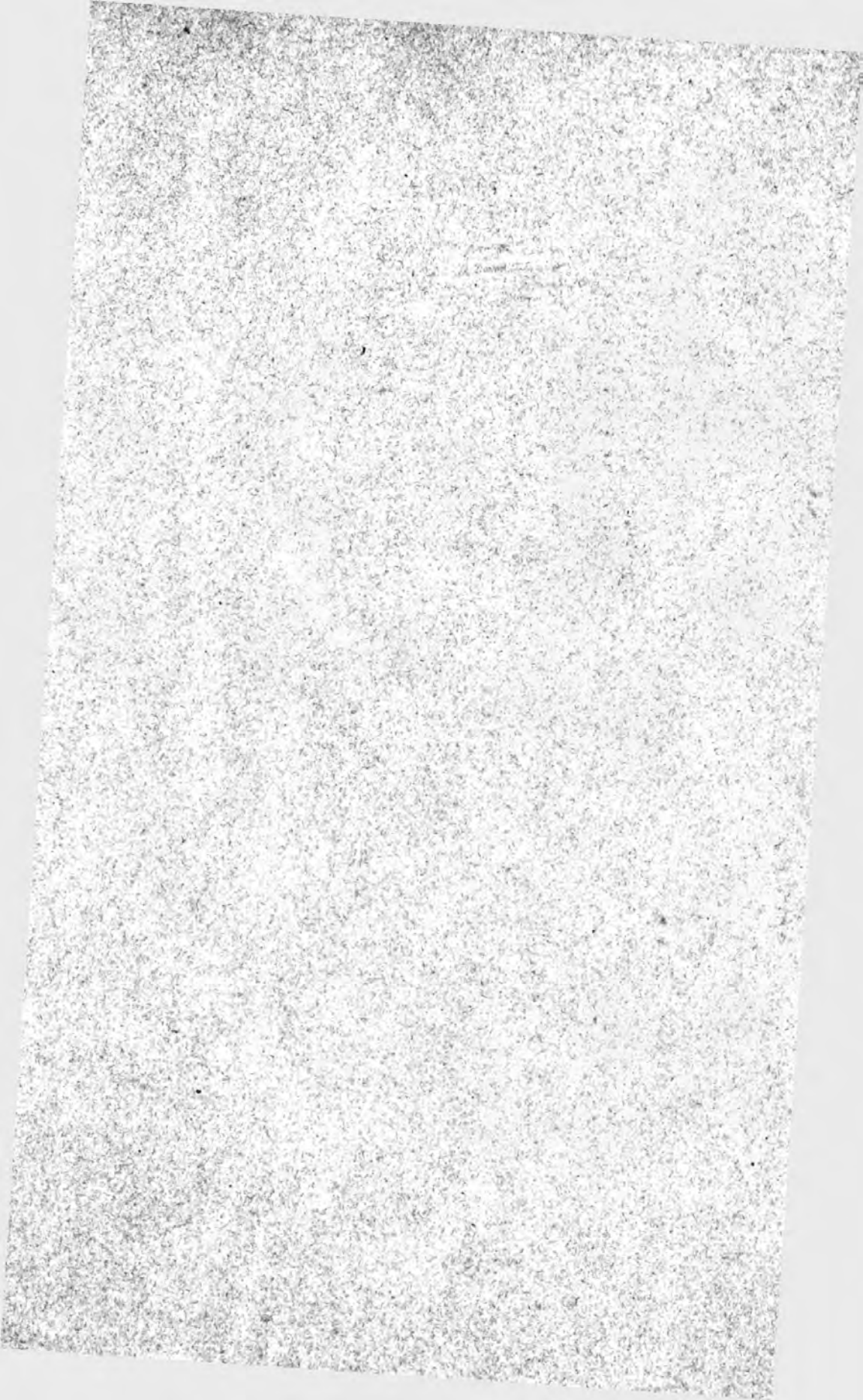

THE HOLTON STAMP CLUB.

As stamp collecting is seldom made use of for a serial story, why I will use it for one. I first became interested in stamps in 1883. One morning I met Harry Rockwood. "Hello! Hold on! Wait! Stop Jim!" he yelled. I stopped. When Harry came up, out of breath, I asked what was the matter. Harry called me to one side, and said, "see there!" at the same time exhibiting a sheet of used postage stamps. For some time we examined the stamps. Harry took me up stairs, and showed me a nice little room, all fitted up with seats, desks, table, etc. About 8 o'clock the boys began to arrive. We were going to organize the "Holton Stamp Club!" Those who came were George Rockwood, Tom Newall, John Raye, Fred Wilton, Ed. Milton, Frank Merrick, Joe Cane, Ray Newall, Will Jamison, Harry and I. We elected our officers. President, Edward A. Milton, Vice President, Frank H. Messick, Treasurer, Raymond G. Newall, Secretary, Harry Rockwood, Sales Supt., Joseph G. Cane, Exchange Supt., James C. Addon, (myself) Purchasing Agent, George C. Rockwood, Librarian, William R. Jamison. Counterfeit Detector, Frederick C. Wilton, Jr., Trustees Thos. J. Newall, Johnson J. Raye, George Rock-

wood. At our next meeting we took in Ralph Newall, James Ralston, Weston Reed, Frank Ralston, Andrew King, Jacob King, Arnold Whitmore and Harry Whitmore. We now had 19 members. About that time, Harry's father moved his grocery down town, and we had the building all to ourselves. At our third meeting we took in twelve more members, 31 in all. We figured up cash assets. We had \$7.75 in the Treasury. Together we made up \$292.45. We decided to start a paper, and call it the "Forest City Philatelist." We invested \$150 in printing office, \$100 for stamps, \$42 for catalogues and papers.

SKETCH OF THE LIFE OF J. NEUBAUER, OF 407 E. 87th ST., N. Y.

Joseph Neubauer, was born on the 15th day of May, 1876, during the year of the great centennial. He began his early schooling at Grammar School No. 20, while but a boy of four years and from thence he has been gradually successful, both personally and in business pursuits. He had an untiring desire for all study; especially for history, and well might he have, for his father played quite a prominent part in our late civil war, which ever inspired in him a devotion for this study. In all other duties he was most equally successful. He left Grammar School No. 20, at the age of 13, having past the highest class, (during which time he received numerous prizes both for punctuality and attention to study,) and would have followed up this course, had health at that time permitted. As it was he received a permanent position soon after, at a commanding salary where he is at the present time, ever willing to persevere and advance.

During the last few years he took considerable interest in Philately and was at first connected with the "National Exchange," edited by John W. Stowell, and conducted the "Puzzle Corner" in this paper in such a satisfactory manner that he was immediately secured by the "American Youth," when the "National Exchange" retired in its favor. He is now with the "American Philatelist and Collector" in which paper he conducts the "Puzzle Dep't." He intends writing occasional short serials, his first one, the "Stamp Hero," having met with quite a success, considering that it was a first attempt. At his last birthday, quite a number of philatelists and stamp collectors gave

him a pleasant surprise party at his home and the merriment passed off to the general satisfaction of everybody present. And this is only a part of the life of the young philatelist. May his future be in reality as favorable as it now indicates. Long success to him.

WHO ARE PHILATELISTS?

This question is an easy one to answer. We have known people to say, "who are philatelists? Nothing but delicate, indoor boys. No man would bother with such a silly hobby." Is this true? No, in every country and nearly every state and county you can find stamp collectors, who are men not boys. True, boys are collectors, and more numerous than older collectors, but would our hobby-philately grow if there were no boys becoming interested in it. Boys grow into men as well as girls into women. A collector who loves philately, will not trade his collection for a few articles of no value. Look at the philatelic associations. Through some corresponding, we know of a boy who has just lately become interested in philately. If correspondence will do this, what will talking and local organizations do? We know of many who collect U. S. stamps, just to see how many they can get. Are they philatelists? No, they do not collect for the pleasure and instructions, but merely to show their friend how many they can get. We have many frauds, among our ranks, but where can you find a business pleasure, or any organization that hasn't some one who will act dishonestly when they have a chance? P. H. Ilately.

THE FUTURE OF PHILATELY.

Written for the N.J.P.

I HAVE noticed with great interest in the past few years of the and extensive growth of philately. Must I say in the United States, or the Western Hemisphere? No, I can readily see foreign nationalities have been equally progressive as our U.S. philatelists. Upon looking over my old philatelic library of some years back, I can scarcely notice one foreign dealer who advertises, even a collector with his exchange notice. The only reasonable conclusion which I can draw from this is. That the dealer was not the advertiser, nor the collector yet reared. In this age of philately foreign collectors have forged to the front. Their advertisements numerous and their productions on philatelic subjects, are read much more eager than formerly. J.W.Scott, might hesitate to ask him what he thought of the future of Philately, but ere two months would elapse, he would, no doubt, tell you that the present year be much better than any previous one. A.R. ROGERS certainly realizes this, or he would hardly undertake such a thing as his "PHILATELIC BLUE BOOK," which is issued at an enormous expense.

[Had he issued this book five years ago it would have been a failure but no doubt he realizes the growth of philately, and his undertaking will be no "game of chance," but an absolute certainty. I regard the present year [which without a doubt, governs the future years] as the most promising one for Philatelists, and I would rather invest money in stamps at Catalogue value, than to put it on interest at 6 per cent which would be small compared to the profit on the stamps.]

It is remarkable at the rate which U.S. stamps are advancing
