RARE POSTAGE STAMPS.

Extravagant Prices Paid for Issues Made by a Nashville Postmaster.

One of the rarest known postage stamps, and consequently one of the most prized by collectors, is the ten cent stamp issued at Nashville in 1861, by Postmsster McNish, and bearing his name. Some months ago Mr. Carels sold one he had had for many years for \$25, and it was afterwards sold in Paris for \$50. It had been taken off the original envelope, and as counterfeits have been manufactured. Mr. Carels before selling it had to get letters from Mr. McNish, Dr. Blackie and others vouching for its authenticity. A son of Mr. Edmund Cooper, who is making a collection, found among his father's old letters an envelope bearing a cancelled specimen postmarked. etc. Recently he accompained his mother to New York on a visit, and while there sold the stamp to a dealer for \$37.50 The stamp being on the original postmarked envelope, and bearing its own credidentials, so to speak, made it much more valuable.

Even rareer than this stamp is the three cent stamp issued by Mr. Mc-Nish, as a used specimen has never been found, and one on the original End.

envelope and well authenticated would sell for a most extravagant figure. Mr. McNish also issued a five cent stamp, used specimens of which sell from five to eight dollars, the writer of this paragraph having sold a fine specimen for ten dollars.

"THE SUNDAY STONE."

There is a wonderful stone in the coal mines of England called "the Sunday Stone" and this is the way it gets its name. There is a limestone in the mine, and the water that is always trickling down carries with it this limestone, and all along the bottom of the pit it is continually making a layer of white, which little by little turns into hard stone. when the miners are at work and the coal dust is plying about it mixes with the limestone and a black layer is formed. Day and night are clearly shown by the black and white layers, and Sunday is marked by a white layer three times as thick as the usual width, so that when a section is dug through at the bo tom of the coal mine, the days of the week can be easily traced and the "Sunday Stone" is plainly seen.

UNITED STATES COINS.

The rarest United States coin is the Double Eagle of 1849, of which there is only one in existence, and be longs to the United States Mint Cabinet. The next in rarity is the Half Eagles of 1815, for which, it is said the King of Sweeden to complete his collection of United States coins, had to purchase one at the enormous price of \$2,000. Of this Half Eagle of 1815 there are only known five specimens to exist.

The Silver Dollar of 1804 is also one of the rare coins, of this dollar only ten genuine pieces are known to exist, all of which are held by collectors. Of the 1804 dollar several re-strikes have been made. To obtain a fine one from original die would cost at least \$1,000; there are many altered dates. The Half Dollars of 1796 and 1797, if in fine con dition brings \$40, of the two, the 1796 is the rarer and usually sells at a still higher rate.

The Quarter Dollars of 1823 and 1827, if in good condition, sell readily at \$20 each; but if in strictly fine preservation, double that sum is cheerfully paid.

Of the Dimes, there are none of extreme rarity, still among the rare coins of that denomination, that of 1804 is the rarest, and if in good condition can be bought at from \$5.00 to \$10.00; but a fine specimen would bring a great deal more.

Among the Half Dimes, that of 1802 is the rarest, and a very fine piece with that date sells readily at \$100.

GOLD COINS OF UTAH.

Gold coins were coined at Salt Lake City, Utah, by direction of the late Brigham Young, Governor of Utah at that time. The denominations were \$20, \$10, \$5, and \$2.50

The \$5 piece was coined from 1849 to 1860. There were two sets from different dies. The other denominations were coined from 1856 to 1860 inclusive. Medals have been coined in gold, silver, and copper, for rewards at agricultural fairs.

The Desert Museum, at Utah, Cabinet No. 4, is devoted to coins, and contains the gold coins of Utah—the silver and gold of that region; the nuggets and the first silver brick made there, also the first manufactured gold of Salt Lake. etc., etc. The coin collection contains many rare coins of the Kingdom, Republic, and Empire of Ancient Rome; also many rare antiquities in gold, silver, and bronze. THE STAR-FISH CACTUS.

All plants of the cactus kind are so wonderfully made that they are able to bear the heat and dryness of very hot climates, without showing any evil effects, they draw in the heavy dews that fall at night—literally drink them in—and then when the heat of the day comes on, this moisture supports the plant and gives it health and strength. Flowers often grow out of cacti in a very curious form. Some have been found where the flower greatly resembles a star-fish.

POST OFFICE CURIOSITIES.

The Post Office department has onened at Washington a museum of articles, which have reached the dead letter office, either as undelivered. because the proper parties could not he found, or as unmailable articles. The museum occupies a good sized mom, and the cases reacting from foor to ceiling, are full. Among the articles is a huge rattlesnake, coiled in a glass jar, with open mouth and forked tongue. He was put into the mails alive, inclosed in a perfo ated in can. Beside him is another huge snake, perhaps four feet in length, and next to that a coup e of centipedes, equally as poisonous in their bites, and almost invariably fatal. They were all put into the mails alive. On the other side of the jar containing the rattlesnake, is a baby alligator, and the head of another perhaps a year old. Below is a collection of specimens from various mines in the West, the value of which is considerable. One little package among these contains about \$100 worth of gold. On a shelf above is a collection of coins, some of which are very rare, several coins dating back full 200 years being among the num ber, there is a locket bearing on the back the inscription "Mrs. Lucy Randolph, died 1783. One hundred years ago. The locket contains a picture of a soldier, and it is supposed that he confiscated it somewhere in the South during the war; had his own picture inserted instead of the one whose name it bore, and sent it to his sweet-heart, who never called

for it at the office of delivery. Beside it, is another picture a gentleman and a lady in a gold frame, which has been in the department over 40 years awaiting a claimant. Besides this is a set of false teeth upon a gold plate, and just below is a bott'e of beer which some kindhearted person had sent to a beerdrinking friend, but which failed to reach its destination. There are several bridles, various parts of a saddle, horse shoes, and a light iron hitching post-every thing, as the lady in charge of the museum oddly remarked: "Every thing but a horse."
