THINGS WORTH KNOWING.

TO PAINT

Magic Lantern Slides.

Draw on paper the size of the glass you mean to paint. Fasten this at each end of the glass with paste or cement, to prevent it from slipping.

Then reverse the glass so as to have the paper underneath, and with some very black paint, mixed with varnish, draw with a fine camel-hair pencil very lightly the outlines sketched on the paper which are reflected on the glass. It would add to the natural resemblance if the outlines were drawn with a strong tint of each of the natural colours of the object., but in this respect the artist must please his fancy. When the outlines are dry, colour and shade the figures., but observe to temper the colours with strong white varnish.

Phosphorescent S P A R .

Coarsely powder some fluor-spar (obtainable at a chemist's), and sprinkle it in a dark room, on a hot fire-shovel,

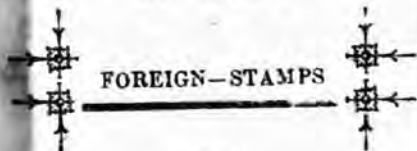

How to Deal in Foreign Stamps

By GEO. BURTON.

PART I.

Foreign Stamp Collecting and Dealing has made immense strides in the last few years.

From being the pastime of a few individuals, with hardly half-a-dozen dealers in the country, and scarcely as many publications, it has become not only a source of interest and study to thousands, but a regular department of business.

In response to the demand for knowledge on the subject, numerous publications have sprung into existence, varying in size, from those as large as a letter sheet to a respectable looking journal of eight pages.

Collectors may be divided into the following classes—those who collect for show, or because it is fashionable—those who collect for profit, making it a business—and those who collect for a genuine love of it, and whose investigations make them familiar with whatever department their collections may lie in.

The United States of America is what may be termed the grand centre for Foreign Stamp dealing and collecting, there exist the largest firms in the world, and the most important publications of the trade are issued from that country.

Foreign Stamp Dealing is an easy, profitable, and interesting employment, that is if you know anything about it, but I am supposing that you do not, and I am going to endeavour to teach you in the plainest manner I possibly can all about it, and I shall not only try to make it interesting to those who wish to deal in Foreign Stamps, but to those who collect them as I have before said—for love of it and a study.

In the first place, if you are starting in any business you must have price lists, and in Foreign

Stamp trade especially, as buyers generally go for those who can boast of list, not to those who write price lists on odd leaves of school copy books, &c., as I have seen some, not that I wish to say anything against them, as everybody must begin at the bottom step to go up the ladder.

Well, you will now ask yourselves—how can I get lists printed, I have no capital?

I can answer this for you, and can recommend a good substitute, one that I can recommend with confidence, as I can say, and am not ashamed of it—I used it for printing my lists when I first made a start,—it is a copying machine, manufactured by Mr. Wm. Belk, 101 Scotland-street, Sheffield, from whom I bought mine, some two years ago, and I use it yet. They are made in various sizes, but I think the price of the first size is 3s.9d. postfree, which is plenty large enough.

It is easily managed—you write one copy, and can put a border round and fancy work on, and you can take about fifty clear copies of it instantly, but I cannot give directions, &c. here, but can recommend you to Mr. Belk as above who I am sure will deal fairly with any young beginner, send stamped envelope for particulars. With the aid of such a machine you will be able to compete with those dealers whose lists are acknowledged to be works of art.

I will leave you to follow these instructions, as being the first, and in next month's number I shall dwell on how to get your stock, and shall give names and addresses of competent dealers.

PHILATELIC NOTES

Great Britain was the first country to issue postage stamps, and in 1840 a prepaid envelope, designed by Mulready, made its appearance. Thus showing that stamps are of a much more recent origin than most people imagine.

Stamps were first used in 1840.

In Paris there are over fifty Foreign Stamp Dealers, and no less than 5 journals advocate the study of Philately. M. Phillip de Ferari has a collection of 150000 and keeps two librarians exchanging and classifying his enormous collection.

Postage stamps were first used in the United States in 1847.

The growth of Philately is much too slow, and the number of steady collectors too few. Surely the Philatelic papers should keep the spirit up, but they do little towards it.

The real carrier stamp of the U.S. bearing the head of Franklin is extremely scarce. Those which are now sold are reprints.

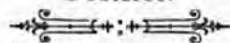
