Penny Postage.

From Mail & Empire.

To commemorate the establishment of the Imperial penny postage, on Christmas day, it has been decided to issue a special postage stamp of the denomination of two cents. The Postmaster-General has not fully decided upon the design, but several sketches are under his consideration, nearly all of which embody the Imperial idea. It is understood that the stamp will be in use for a limited period only. The reduced postage rates will be on letters passing between Canada and Great Britain and Ireland, British India, Newfoundland, and and the following African protectorates:-British East Africa-Ugunda, Zanzibar, Britsh Central Africa-the Niger Coast protectorate and the Niger Co.'s territory. the rate being two cents per half ounce. instead of five cents as heretofore. It is hoped that other portions of the Empire will have completed arrangements for adopting this reduced rate at the same time or shortly thereafter. Due notice will be given to postmasters and the public from time to time as to the countries or colonies to which the reduced rate will apply.

Card-board proofs. The first impression on thin card-board of a selected design as it will appear when issued

Compound perforations. Perforations at the top differing in numbers from those at the sides,

Continentals. Common stamps from the countries of Europe,

Current Issue. Stamps in use by a country at the present time.

Counterfeits. Spurious stamps. Imitations of genuine stamps.

Diagonally cut. Bisected from corner to corner and each half used on separate envelopes as postage.

Dic. The engraving of a stamp. This is usually metal and when the face is inked the impression when taken on paper makes a stamp.

Defective. Not perfect. Cut or mutilaed in some way.

Design. A sketch, pattern or model, usually called an essay when applied to stamps.

Newfoundland.

JENNEY, in The Canadian Philatelist, From the North there came a message to a distant, sunny clime, Twas a message from the icebergs to the fig tree and the lime: Others followed, bringing tidings, causing silent joy or mirth, Or perchance they told of sorrow, of some dear one gone from earth. Times it seemed as if warm currents from that far Atlantic Isle, Had swept southward, brightening nature, bringing to her face a smile; Then it seemed as if its bleak wind, flying fast o'er dale and hill, sought to pierce the golden tropic with a gruesome sense of chill. From the date of fifty-seven, every message came in state, And each bearer of a message, wore the livery of its date. First the shamrock and the thistle blazoned on a field of white And the name, St. Johns, Newfoundland, circling round from left to right; Then there came a page who bore the coronet in octagon, Quactefoil, with the same motto as its brothers, elder born. Later there came new devices, whispering of Atlanta's tanks, Cod and seal with iceberg background, and a schooner off the banks. In all colors of the rainbow, were these pages who were sped, With their tidings from Newfoundland, to a land with sunlight wed, Many years have faded in the dimming memories of the past, Each new generation rising, scarcely thinking of the last: Long-forgotten are the tidings which those messages once told, And the writer and the reader long have changed from life to mould, But those little bits of paper, that as passports served them then, still are treasured and hold places of great honor among men. While the thoughts they served to carry, over sea and over land, May have gone from us forever, by stern fate's unjust command. Still we see the sea and cod-fish, and the full-rigged fishing-smack On the pages of our album, and they bring old memories back.

Some Australasian Stamps

By CANADENSIS.

In taking up a scientific study of stamps it is necessary that collectors should learn the meaning of the different devices which we find depicted on the various issues. This can easily be accomplished by a little study, and then when you are showing your collection to a friend, you can explain the stamp and give a lucid reason why it bears that particular device. It is not enough to say "that is a Newfoundland stamp with a fish on it." You must tell them the particular kind of a fish it is, and let them know the cod-fish industry of the island has been the means of bringing out that stamp.

The "land of the golden fleece" as Australia is called, bears some designs of animals that you should know all about. First of all take the 2 cent stamp of New South Wales of the 1888 issue, What do we see on it? Nine out of ten would say an estrich. Not much! It is a bird called an "emu." It is remarkable for its large size -standing several feet in height-and for its long hair-like plumage. It is one of the wonders of Australia, and is found in large numbers in the interior. On the same country's 8 cent stamp of 1889 we find one of the most beautiful birds in the world. It is the "lyre-bird" so-called from the magnificent lyre-shaped tail which adorns the male. The bird itself is the size of a pheasant, while its tail measures three feet. On the one shilling N. S. W. stamp we have the kangaroos. These animals have made great inroads upon grain and pasture lands, but by government bounties and the use of kangaroo leather they are gradually

declining. The kangaroos are so swift that they will often outrun a thoroughbred horse for miles. There are many varieties of these marsupials, from the 'old man,' standing seven feet high, through more than forty species and sizes to the little kangaroo mouse that can make its home in a tea-cup.

Western Australia was formerly called "Swan River." We see the swan on all her stamps. There they have the black swan, the most beautiful of its species, its ebony hue and proud symmetry being very picturesque.

Tasmania, however; has the most curious animal in all the wide world—some say it is half bird and half animal. It is the duck-hilled Platypus or Ornithorhynchus. It is found on the revenue-postals of 1882, 1, 3, 6d and 1 shilling values. This animal has the bill and feet of a duck and the body of an otter, the connecting link between quadrupeds and birds. Though it lays eggs it suckles its young.

The information gained, by a thorough systematic study of stamps, will soon solve the problem as to the "science of philately"—The Stamp.

A Condensed Philatelic Encyclopædia.

Continued from issue of Nov. 16th By Observer.

Emblems (Horaldic.) Watermarks in some of the early stamps of Great Britain. The two in the upper corners of the stamps represent roses of York and Lancaster. Those in the lower corners the Shamrock of Ireland and the thistle of Scotland.

Embossed. Stamps printed from a sunken die. Raised or in relief. The die is usually pressed against leather or some yielding surface, which is forced into the depressions of the die pressing the paper into shape—relief. This may be done without color as in the early Italian stamps or in part color as in the U. S. envelopes.

Engraving. Dies cut on soft steel then afterwards hardened and the impression given by pressure to other copper or steel plates. Upon this, ink is rolled filling up the little depressions or cuts made by the engraver. Then the plates are usually rubbed by the hand of the printer and then the printing made by the pressure over damp paper.

Engravers marks or secret marks. Little marks made on the die by an engraver so that he can tell his work, sometimes ordered by governments like the 1871-2 U.S. issue.

Entires. The whole envelope with the stamp on.





Error. A stamp on which some mistake is made, either in the color of the ink used, the engraving, the perforation or the surcharge.

Essay. A design for a stamp which is submitted to the postal authorities or persons ordering the stamps, for their approval or rejection. This design shows the stamp as it should appear when printed.

Fac-Similes. (Imitations.) Copies are usually made from some rare stamp and sold as a copy. This is the only distinction between a F. S. and a counterfeit.

Fiscally. Pertaining to government revenue received from stamps regularly sold and cancelled by its post offices.

Fibre. The fine, threadlike structure of paper. This fibre is usually linen, cotton, straw or wood. The quality of the paper to a great extent depends upon the fibrous material used



Imperial Penny Postage.

The design for the Imperial penny postage stamp has been announced. Mr. Mulock on returning from Great Britain invited designs from a number of artists, embodying the idea which he had in his mind, but when these were submitted he found that they did not meet the object in view. Then he sat down and roughly sketching what he wanted handed it to an artist that the lines might be skillfully and symmetrically drawn. The stamp consists of a neatly executed map of the world in miniature. The British possessions are printed in red, and these stand out in bold relief against a dark background. Surmounting this instructive picture is a representation of the Crown, underneath which is a bunch of oak and maple leaves, symbolizing the unity of England and Canada. At the upper edge of the stamp are the words "Canada postage," in a neat letter, Underneath the map is placed, "Xmas, 1898," so that the date of the inauguration of Imperial penny postage shall be made a matter of record. On each of the lower corners appears the figure "2," indicating the denomination of the stamp, and at the lower edge is this suggestive passage, taken from the words of one of our patriotic poets, "We hold a vaster empire than has been."

Wild West Notes.

"Hang on to your Omahas" that is the best advice that can be given to the collect-these days, "get all you can" is just as good, however. All values are unusually rare for a stamp which has been in use for six months in the United States.

Many collectors think that their boom will "fall flat" in a manner similar to the Columbian issue, many dealers are offering but little for them, fearing a drop.

That they will become as common as the Columbians is impossible, they will be in use but several months; the Columbians were in use over a year. They are furnished to post offices only on special request of the postmaster and then the public, in turn, gets them by an expressed desire; the Columbian issue was furnished to every post office in the United States and were used instead of the regular small sized issue,


thereby finding their way on every package.

"Save your Omahas" again I say. Because dealers do not offer face for them is not a sign that they will not be worth that to everyone before long.

Every collector in the U. S. who purchased a complete set of the maple leaf issue while they were current, is hugging himself at every bound they take.

A stamp which will have a high figure set after it in the next catalogue, will be the five cent dark blue of 1898. It was used in that color such a short time and then its use was largely hindered by the Omaha of that value, so that speculators are investing largely in that denomination.

The writer has lately been trying to complete his sets of Hawaiian stamps and has had the misfortune to find it almost impossible. Everybody is holding back for the next catalogue, and the stamps are unobtainable at anywhere near 58th figures.




Grille or Grill. A grate. Philatelically it is an American word the usage dating back to the early 50's of the U. S. issues. The grille was a rectangle of indentations into the paper, impressed at the back of the stamp, and designed to break the fibre of the paper, causing it to readily absorb the cancelling ink and retain it so as to prevent washing and subsequently re-use.

Government Counterfeits. Stamps manufactured by a government from new plates in imitation of some former issue, the plates of the original issue having been destroyed.

Government Reprints. Stamps reprinted by a government from the original plates after the issue is obsolete.

Gum. The thin glazy substance on the back of stamps and flaps of envelopes. When moistened this becomes sticky or adhesive. Gum is made of dextrine, gum arabic, acacia, senegal and other substances.

Hinge or Stampmount. A bent piece of adhesive paper used to attach a stamp to a eard, sheet of paper or leaf of a book.



The above was the subject of an article that appeared in the first number of the Toronto *Philatelic Weekly*. The writer of that article, if such it may be called, re-

minds one of the frog that became so vain, because he had a few more stripes of green than his neighbors, that he puffed himself up until he was twice his former size. It is reported that the John Adams post card, which is meeting with so little favor, is to be withdrawn. This is a good thing. They would be a disgrace to the postal system of any other country. The U. S. has always prided herself on having the hombiest post cards in the world, with this John Adams emission she has beaten everything else she has attempted in that line. With the cheap card-board for printing, and the most hideous design that ever happened, beside which an afghanistan is a dream of beauty, the U.S. has the 'never' to call it a 'LADIES CARD'. The withdrawal will make them exceedingly rare, but few were issued and still fewer are the post-offices that have them on sale.

Collectors will do well to treasure the first printing of the Omaha's. This printing is distinguished by the richness of color, and in some cases, in connection with a slight blurring of the design. The later printings are clearer and the color is in every case lighter.

The xmas stamp has met with prime favor in Hastings. Nearly all local collectors specialize somewhat in Canadian and are never averse, no matter how much it may worry some, to placing new varieties of the interesting country in their collections. The colors might blend better, but in all things it is easy to find fault.

The ½ cent prop. has been found in a distinct red-brown and in the shade has easily secured the price of ten cents. The ¾ cent in lemon has been sold for six cents. Rumors that all revenues are soon to be perforated has caused bounds in prices for all values.

½ cent each is the price which is easily secured for fine copies of the 1 cent Omaha the 4 cent is selling for face, the eight commands a price of five cents. Pretty good isn't it? This is for used copies of course.

As there is a steady demand for these values 6 and 10c used, dealers can readily get \$5.00 and Very few collectors \$9.00 per 100. therefore can expect to purchase copies from their dealers at the usual 30% as only 500,000 of each of these values were issued they will likely sell for full catalogue in every instance.

The second auction sale of the

Philatelic Club of Toronto, was brought to a successful issue on Tuesday eve. Dec. 6th in their Club Rooms Forum B'ld'gs. I noted an attendance of 17 active collectors. Over 45 lots consisting chiefly of the medium class of stamps were disposed of. Price ruled fair, and I believe all buvers have since had reason to congratulate themselves on their bargains.

Scott's supplement has disappointed many with prices on the maple leaf issue. But few will take cat. for their stamps of that issue.

a writer in the Virginia. Phil., is worrying about the fact that the Omaha Exposition is going to be held in '99, fearing that the use of the Trans-Mississippi stamp will be extended to include that year. There need be no fear of this however, as the department made its last printing some time ago. As planned, that issue will be absolute after Jan. 1st although still available for postal use.



A CONDESSED PHILATELIS : ENGYGOPEDIA.

CONTINUED FROM ISSUE OF DEC. 15,

IMPRESSIONS—Methods employed in printing stamps.

ENGRAVING.—The designs first cut on a matrix of soft steel which is afterwards hard-ened and transferred by pressure to copper or steel plates.—Then the ornamental work is engray d by a machine it is called engine turned or lathe work engraving.

Typography or Surface Printing,—
The design is not cut in but left untouched
by the engraver and the space or parts not
wanted are cut away. The exact reverse of
engraving.

Type Set.—Printed from regular type used by most printers.

Embossed Printing.—See embossed in previous issue.

LITHOGRAPHY.—The design is drawn upon stone or copper covered with oil or some mixture containing oil. An acid is then covered over the design which eats into the stone or other material, through the lines traced by the artist.

Wood BLOCK.—A design engraved on box wood or other hard wood and called a wood engraving.

IMPERFORATES or 1MPEFORATED stamps are not pierced. To separate the stamps they must be cut.

Inverted—Reversed, Some part of the printing turned upside down.

LAID PAPER.—Paper made from a pulp dried upon parallel wires. Such paper held to the light shows alternate light and dark lines

LETTER-CARD.—A combination of a post card and a scaled letter issued by some countries, usually at the same rate as Post cards.





Local Stamps. Stamps used by chartered corporations or private persons to prepay postage. These stamps not being of government origin and limited to a certain district.

Manilla Paper A coarse paper made of manilla or hemp fibre.

Municipal Stamp. Stamps issued by a city for circulation within the city limits.

Native Paper. Paper made by natives of any countries. This term is usually applied to paper (early issues) made in India, Japan and China.

Newspaper Stamps. For prepayment on newspapers.

Obsolete. Out of date. Out of use. Stamps not receivable for postage.

Oddity. A stamp in which some mistake is made either in color design, printing or perforation, or differing in some other way from the original design.

Plate-numbers. Stamps adjacent and connected with the imprint and the number of the plate on which the stamps are printed. The U. S. plate-numbers are always found upon the border of the sheet of stamps. The plate-numbers of old English stamps are always found upon the stamps, either at the sides or in the corners. Paper. Battone paper. See back num-

bef. Carron paper. Very thick.

Grante paper. Very fine silk paper.

Lampaper. (vertically laid) paper. having paralell watermarked lines running through it.

GOLD BEATERS SKIN. Strong transparent paper.

MANILLA paper. It is usually coarse paper, made of manilla or hemp fibre. NATIVE paper. A soft loosely woven paper made by the natives of India. OLD paper. Loosely woven having an old appearance.

Parier Moire. See back number.

RICE paper. Soft silky paper made from rice straw.

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
